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P R E F A C E.

THIS is essentially a book of reference, and hence there is much repetition which would otherwise be unnecessary. The text of the Orders is printed in Part I., the Orders being arranged so as to bring all those relating to one County as near to each other as possible. The effect of the Orders is explained in Part II. Here each County is treated by itself, so that by aid of the cross references it will be possible to ascertain with regard to any particular County the precise changes effected on its boundaries or on the boundaries of the Parishes which it contains. The work of the Boundary Commissioners in this department is not yet wholly accomplished, but in the First Appendix will be found a list of the only questions now awaiting settlement, with an explanation of the stages which they have reached. Should it become desirable, I shall issue a supplement dealing with these when they have been finally disposed of. In the interests of the legal profession, however, I could not longer delay publication.

Discrepancies may be observed in the spelling of certain place-names. In such cases it will usually be found that the name is spelt in the Order as it is given on the Ordnance Survey Maps, and in the enumeration of subjects as it is given in the Valuation Roll. The Valuation Rolls sometimes give varying spellings.

I have endeavoured to make the details accurate, utilising for this purpose the information at my disposal when I was Secretary to the Boundary Commissioners, and receiving ready assistance throughout from the staff of the Commission, and during the few weeks which have elapsed since my demission of that office from Mr. J. J. Cook, the present Secretary. But it is right to warn those who use the book that they ought to supplement by local inquiry the information here given, as there may be cases in which my endeavours after accuracy have failed. I shall esteem it a kindness if those who detect errors will communicate them to me.

It would be greatly for the public advantage if two complete sets of one-inch Ordnance maps (and six-inch Maps, where the changes are minute) were placed in some public office, one set coloured to show the boundaries of Counties and Parishes as they were prior to the work of the Boundary Commissioners, and the other set coloured to show the new boundaries.

The number of those to whom I am indebted for assistance makes it impossible to thank them all by name. In the course of a somewhat voluminous correspondence, I have uniformly met with the utmost readiness to assist, without any regard on the part of my correspondents to the trouble entailed on them. Inspectors of Poor especially have laid me under obligations, of which I am the more sensible when I recall the many valuable public services which they habitually render without remuneration. But I cannot too warmly thank Mr. ALEXANDER BAIN, formerly County Assessor, Perth, and now City Assessor, Aberdeen, for his unwearied and efficient aid, without which it would have been impossible for me to ascertain the various subjects affected by the complicated readjustments of area in Perthshire. For details as to the portions of Railway Lines transferred I am indebted to the kindness of Mr. W. MUNRO, Assessor of Railways and Canals.

My thanks are also due to SHERIFF CHEYNE, Chairman of the Boundary Commissioners, and to Mr. JOHN CHISHOLM, Advocate, for allowing me to consult them from time to time, but of course they are in no way committed to the views expressed. In the preparation of the Indices I have had the invaluable aid of Mr. C. D. LAURENSEN, Commercial Bank, Lerwick, which has enabled me materially to forward publication.

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been almost wholly got rid of through the powers conferred on the Commissioners. But, secondly, there are the more serious difficulties arising from the fact that different administrative statutes employ the same name to denote areas which differ substantially in boundaries and in contents. I have shown elsewhere¹ that in Scotland the word "parish" may mean six different things;—in other words, in speaking of the parish of A, you may mean six different areas according to the particular branch of local administration with which you are dealing. Similarly "county" may have eleven different meanings. As the effect of the 1889 Act has been allowed for in this statement, it will be observed that, without simplification in the statutory definitions of the various administrative areas, a mere rectification of geographical boundaries, although a step in the right direction, is not in itself sufficient to produce the desired result.

Powers of the
Boundary
Commissioners
and of the
Secretary for
Scotland.

The Boundary Commissioners had no general mandate to rectify or declare irregular or undefined boundaries. How strictly their powers were defined may be best gathered by a comparison of section 49 of the Act with section 51. Section 49 lays down the powers of the Boundary Commissioners in questions of simplification of area, and section 51 defines the analogous powers which the Secretary for Scotland may exercise after the powers of the Commissioners expire. Subject to the conditions specified in section 51 (the antecedent recommendation of a County Council or a Town Council, and the subsequent approval of Parliament), there is hardly a conceivable alteration on the area of a county, a burgh, or a parish² which the Secretary for Scotland has not power to effect. He has general powers of altering the boundaries of these areas, and he may even create new parishes. But the defects with which the Boundary Commissioners were directed to deal were carefully specified. The Act (section 49) requires them to frame orders for dealing with "counties, burghs, parishes, and detached parts" of counties and parishes, "so that each burgh and parish, if the Commissioners shall, in the whole circumstances of the case, deem it

necessary or expedient; may be within a single county, and that no part of a county or parish be detached therefrom." These duties may thus be formulated:—(1.) To provide that each burgh and parish shall, if expedient, be within a single county. (2.) To provide that no part of a county shall be detached therefrom. (3.) To provide that no part of a parish shall be detached therefrom. It is to be observed that the Commissioners had a discretion in the first case, but none in the second and third. While a burgh or a parish might be allowed to remain situated in more counties than one, it was imperatively required that every detached part of a county or of a parish should be dealt with. Doubts were thrown on this interpretation of the clause (which was that adopted by the Commissioners), but these doubts were disposed of by an opinion of the Lord Advocate (Robertson), and by the decision of a Committee of the House of Lords which had under consideration an opposed Order of the Commissioners dealing with the parishes of Kinnell, Lunan, and Maryton.¹ In that case it was argued that a certain detached part of the parish of Maryton might be allowed to remain as a detached part of that parish. The opinion of the Lord Advocate on the general question involved, which had been obtained by the Secretary for Scotland in connection with a previous case, was laid before the Committee, and the Committee adopted it, holding that the parish of Maryton must be dealt with so that no part of it should be detached therefrom.

The Commissioners had thus jurisdiction to deal only with parishes situated in more counties than one, with detached parts of counties, and with detached parts of parishes. They interpreted the term "detached part" as implying actual physical separation, either by the sea or by an intervening part of another county or parish.

The number of areas thus falling to be dealt with turned out on inquiry to be considerably greater than had been anticipated. Of the thirty-three counties into which Scotland is divided, thirteen counties had detached parts, twenty-five in number.²

The counties by which these detached parts were surrounded, or with which they had the longest common boundary, numbered fourteen. Eight counties, however, which had detached parts of their own, also contained detached parts of other counties, while five counties had detached parts but did not contain detached parts of other counties, and six contained detached parts of other counties but had no detached parts of their own. Thus in the method of dealing with detached parts of counties nineteen counties were concerned. One of these detached parts—the detached part of Dumbartonshire, consisting of the parishes of Cumbernauld and Kirkintilloch, and having its longest common boundary with Stirlingshire—was excluded by the Act from the consideration of the Commissioners.¹

There were sixty-four parishes situated in more counties than one, of which two were situated partly in three counties and the remainder partly in two counties. These sixty-four parishes were spread over twenty-nine counties. In the case of the four remaining counties (Shetland and Orkney, the two northmost, and Kirkcudbright and Wigtown, the two southmost counties of Scotland), it was found that they had no detached parts of their own, that they contained no detached parts of other counties, and that their boundaries coincided with burgh and parish boundaries. In these, therefore, the Commissioners were not called upon to deal in any way with the county boundaries.

There were two burghs² situated in more counties than one, viz., the royal burghs of Glasgow and Renfrew, each of which was situated partly in Lanarkshire and partly in Renfrewshire. The parliamentary burgh of Galashiels is in a peculiar position. It was at one time situated partly in Selkirkshire and partly in Roxburghshire, but as the county boundary which ran through the burgh was badly defined, and as difficulties were found to arise from the fact of the burgh being situated in two counties, Acts of Parliament were obtained which provide that the burgh of Gala-

shields, whatever its police boundaries may be now or at any future time, shall always be wholly included in the county of Selkirk.¹ Police burghs are not among the areas referred to in section 49, but it may be stated that the only police burgh situated in more counties than one was the police burgh of Coupar-Angus. It was, however, situated wholly within the parish of Coupar-Angus, and by the method of dealing with that parish the police burgh has been placed wholly in the county of Perth.²

One hundred and thirty-four parishes had detached parts, two hundred and nineteen in number. These parishes were situated in twenty-five counties.

These facts sufficiently show how numerous were the instances in which the Commissioners were called on to provide for the alteration of county and of parish boundaries. The extent and the importance of the changes effected must be gathered from the text of the Orders and the explanations given in the body of this work, but it may not be uninteresting to refer to one or two of the more glaring anomalies of area which have been dealt with. The parish of Logie was divided among three counties in such a way as to cut up the parish into six separate parts. One of these belonged to Perthshire, two to Stirlingshire (one being a detached part of Stirlingshire), and three to Clackmannanshire (one forming part of a detached part of Clackmannanshire).³ Not only had the parish of Croy & Dalcross one detached part situated in Invernessshire, but the main portion of the parish was so divided between the counties of Inverness and Nairn that it was broken up into six parts. Four of these six parts were situated in Invernessshire (one being a detached part of Invernessshire), and two were situated in Nairnshire.⁴ The Perthshire parish of Caputh had eight detached parts. The main portion of the parish was situated near Dunkeld, but three of the detached parts were locally situated in Forfarshire, one consisting of Broughty Castle at the mouth of the Firth of Tay.⁵ The parish of Weem in Perthshire had eleven detached parts. The main portion of the parish

extended to 1444 acres, with a rental of £1312:14s. The eleven detached parts had an extent of 40,441 acres, and a rental of £4555:9:3.¹ These were the most striking instances of unsuitable administrative areas, but there were many others equally inconvenient in practice.

Prior statutory provisions.

In various prior statutes dealing with local administration, there were provisions under which some of these anomalies were dealt with for the purposes of the particular branches of administration with which these statutes were concerned.

Detached parts of counties.

The more important of these provisions related to detached parts of counties.

County Police.

In the County Police Act, 1857² (section 35), it is provided that, for the purposes of the Act, "all detached parts of counties shall be considered as forming part of that county by which they are surrounded, or if partly surrounded by two or more counties, then as forming part of that county with which they have the longest common boundary." The same Act makes even fuller provision for the jurisdiction of Sheriffs and Justices in such detached parts. By section 36 it permits "any Sheriff or Justice of the Peace of any county to act as Sheriff or Justice of the Peace in all things whatsoever concerning or in anywise relating to any detached part of any other county which is surrounded in whole or in part by the county for which such Sheriff or Justice of the Peace acts." The simplicity of these enactments is, however, marred by the somewhat complicated provisions relating to the levying of police assessments,³ and by the option given to certain detached parts (Cumbernauld and Kirkintilloch, Culross and Tulliallan, and Alva) of retaining their connection with the counties of which they were respectively detached parts.⁴

County General Assessment.

The County General Assessment Act of 1868⁵ contained provisions for dealing with detached parts of counties exactly similar to those quoted above from section 35 of the County Police Act, and gave a similar option to the detached parts above mentioned.

Roads and Bridges.

The Roads and Bridges (Scotland) Act, 1878,⁶ adopted the

same policy for the purposes of road administration, but carried it further. Except for the purpose of paying off old road debts (for which purpose detached parts were to remain connected with their original counties), this Act provided that every detached part should form part of the county by which it was surrounded, or with which it had the longest common boundary. Prior to the passing of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, there were eleven counties in Scotland in which the Roads and Bridges Act had not been adopted. But in the other twenty-two counties there was no exception to the rule that detached parts should be merged in the counties which they adjoined, and, curiously enough, the three detached parts favoured in the County Police Act all fell under this rule in regard to road administration. For road administration the Dumbartonshire parishes of Cumbernauld and Kirkintilloch were included in Stirlingshire, the Perthshire parishes of Culross and Tulliallan were included in Fifeshire, and the Stirlingshire parish of Alva was included in Clackmannanshire.

Unfortunately this policy was not adopted in the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts. The Act of 1878 ¹ adopted simply the county as the landward area of administration. In the absence of any special interpretation, "county" of course included all the detached parts of a county, however inconveniently situated for administration from the county centre. The Act of 1884 ² did indeed permit of the inconvenience being remedied to a certain extent, by providing that, for purposes of administration, one local authority might by agreement transfer part of its area to the jurisdiction of another Local Authority; but it declared that any such transfer should not affect the power of making or levying a rate, thus limiting the value of the remedy.

Thus it appears that before 1889 provision, more or less adequate, had been made for dealing with detached parts of counties in all the more important branches of county administration. Undoubtedly, although the remedial measures were not in every instance adequate, the more obvious inconveniences had disappeared. But it still was the case that, in all matters not expressly provided for, detached parts of counties fell to be

administered from centres with which they were not in immediate connection. It was reserved for the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, to provide for the final and almost complete disappearance of such anomalies. Section 44 of that Act provided that, subject to the action of the Boundary Commissioners, counties should have the contents and boundaries which they had or would have for the purposes of the Roads and Bridges (Scotland) Act, 1878, and section 49 required the Boundary Commissioners to deal with detached parts of counties once and for all. By section 40 the Act provides that the parishes of Cumbernauld and Kirkintilloch, although a detached part, shall, for the purposes of the Act, be considered as forming part of the county of Dumbarton. This is now the only instance in Scotland of a county with a detached part. By section 39 of the Act the scattered fragments of the county of Cromarty were merged in the county of Ross & Cromarty, and under the Orders of the Boundary Commissioners all the remaining detached parts of counties disappear.

Results of dealing with detached parts of counties.

Parishes in more counties than one.

Any inconveniences due to parishes being situated in more counties than one do not seem to have received the same attention from the Legislature. Indeed parochial and county administration have hitherto been kept so distinct that no appreciable difficulties have been experienced from the fact of a parish being situated in two counties. But the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, seems to shadow forth a scheme of administration under which each county shall consist of a group of entire parishes. It is, for instance, hardly in harmony with the spirit of the Act that one Parochial Board should appoint representatives to district committees in two different counties, especially when it is considered that such a representative need not be a ratepayer in the part of the parish which is administered by the district committee on which he sits. There are certain special provisions in the County Police Act, 1857,¹ repeated in the County General Assessment Act, 1868,² affecting the parishes of Fossoy and Logie, but the only statutes, so far as I am aware, which contain general provisions dealing with parishes or burghs situated in more counties than

one are the Public Health Act, 1867,¹ and the Registration Act, Public Health. 1854.² Under the Public Health Act each burgh, and for landward districts each parish, was a separate area of administration with a separate Local Authority. For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Act a Local Authority was empowered in certain cases to apply to the Sheriff. In the case of a parish situated in two counties it was obviously inconvenient that such applications should have to be made by one Local Authority to different Sheriffs, according to the locality in which the nuisance arose, and therefore power was given to the Board of Supervision to determine in which of such counties a parish in this position should be deemed to be for the purposes of the Public Health Act.³ The necessity for such a provision disappeared when, under the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, the district of the county superseded the parish as the area for public health administration, and accordingly the Board of Supervision by circular cancelled all determinations previously made in virtue of this power. The Act relating to the Registration of Births, &c. provides that "the Sheriff of each county shall have the control and superintendence of the registrars of the several parishes and districts within such county: Provided that, where a parish shall be situated in more counties than one, such parish shall, for the purposes of this Act, be held to be within the county in which the parish church is situated."⁴ Since these appear to have been the only administrative inconveniences experienced from the overlapping of parish and county boundaries, the conjecture may be hazarded that the directions to the Boundary Commissioners to make the boundaries of burghs and parishes, so far as expedient, coincide with those of counties, indicate a new departure in the policy of the Legislature in the direction of entrusting County Councils at some future time with a supervision over matters, such as poor relief and education, which are at present administered by parochial bodies. A not impossible development of such a policy is the merging of the parish in the district,—in other words the enlargement of the administrative unit in matters of poor relief and education.

Results of dealing with parishes in more counties than one.

The Boundary Commissioners have so dealt with parishes situated in more counties than one, that of those which they found in this condition only five remain in it, viz., Stow, Ardnamurchan, Kilmallie, Croy & Dalcross, and Kirkliston.

The first three could be satisfactorily dealt with only by the formation of new civil parishes, which the Commissioners had not power to do. The parish of Stow is situated partly in the county of Edinburgh and partly in the county of Selkirk. The Selkirkshire part of the parish would naturally form part of a suggested civil parish of Caddonfoot, which would be situated wholly in the county of Selkirk, and which it is within the power of the Secretary for Scotland to form after the powers of the Boundary Commissioners expire.¹ Each of the parishes of Ardnamurchan and Kilmallie is intersected by the boundary between the county of Argyll and the county of Inverness. These parishes are of great extent, and the Commissioners expressed the opinion that convenience of administration would be facilitated if each was divided into two civil parishes, the county boundary in each case to be the boundary between the new parishes.² It is thought that this also might be effected by the Secretary of Scotland.³ The parish of Croy & Dalcross was so dealt with by the Commissioners as to be placed (considerably altered in area) wholly in the county of Nairn, but their Order was amended by Parliament in such a way as to leave the parish partly in two counties. It would hardly be possible now to carry through a scheme under which the parish should be placed wholly in one county.⁴ The parish of Kirkliston offered the most difficult

problem. No method was discovered of dealing with it satisfactorily, and accordingly it remains situated partly in the county of Edinburgh and partly in the county of Linlithgow.

In addition to these five parishes which remain situated in more counties than one, it is possible that in the case of three parishes the Commissioners may find it necessary to create this very defect, which in other cases it was their duty to cure. Should the Draft Order dealing with the city of Glasgow¹ pass into law in its present form, the parishes of Cathcart and Eastwood, which are now situated wholly in the county of Renfrew, will after 15th May 1892 be situated partly in the county of Lanark and partly in the county of Renfrew. A similar result might follow if effect should be given to the proposal to place the extended city of Aberdeen wholly within the county of Aberdeen. The parish of Nigg, which at present lies entirely within the county of Kincardine, would then be placed (if no change were made on the parish boundaries) partly in the county of Aberdeen and partly in the county of Kincardine. In all these cases it is evident that the paramount importance of having a large city wholly within one county far outweighs the inconvenience (such as it is) of having a parish situated partly in two counties.

By the Draft Order dealing with the city of Glasgow, &c.,¹ it is proposed that the burgh of Glasgow should be placed wholly in the county of Lanark, and that the burgh of Renfrew should be placed wholly in the county of Renfrew. The position of the parliamentary burgh of Galashiels and of the police burgh of Coupar-Angus has already been explained.²

Burghs partly
in two coun-
ties.

The inconveniences arising from the existence of detached parts of parishes have only indirectly received attention from the Legislature,—a fact somewhat surprising when the number of these detached parts is considered. Inconveniences thus arising in ecclesiastical matters have in many cases been remedied by the formation of *quoad sacra* parishes, and the Legislature, taking advantage of this, has in several cases made provision for obviating similar inconveniences in matters of civil administration. For the purposes of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1872,³ “parish”

Education.

(the area of administration in landward districts) includes parishes or parts of parishes which are united *quoad omnia* or *quoad sacra*. It was recognised that an area formed with a view to convenience for church attendance was likely to be convenient for school attendance, and thus many detached parts of parishes were indirectly dealt with for the purposes of educational administration. Section 17 of the Education Act of 1872 also permits the formation of school districts out of parts of parishes, but this power is not known to have been taken advantage of.

Registration of Births, &c.

The only other provision for dealing with detached parts of parishes is that contained in the Act which instituted the existing system of Registration of Births, &c.¹ While there may be some dubiety as to the interpretation of the definition of "parish" given in the Act,² it is understood that a few *quoad sacra* parishes existing at the date of the Act were adopted as registration districts,³ and thus some detached parts were indirectly dealt with. But a further power is contained in section 10 of that Act, under which the Sheriff may divide any parish or unite two or more parishes in one registration district. It is understood that this power has been exercised, with the result of remedying in numerous cases one inconvenience to which the existence of a detached part of a parish frequently gave rise.

Results of dealing with detached parts of parishes.

These provisions for dealing with detached parts of parishes were not far-reaching. Now, in virtue of the Orders issued by the Boundary Commissioners in compliance with section 49 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, no parish⁴ in Scotland is left with a detached part, unless indeed we except the case of the parish of Gorbals (combined with the parish of Govan for poor law purposes, and situated wholly within the city of Glasgow), of which the old kirkyard situated within Govan parish remains detached from the rest of the parish.

Purposes for which Orders of the Commissioners have effect.

The nature of the alterations in administrative areas made by Orders of the Boundary Commissioners having been thus sketched, it is necessary to direct attention briefly to the purposes of administration for which these alterations are to receive effect.

The Act itself provides that "such alterations shall have effect for all purposes, whether County Council, Justices, Sheriff, Militia, Parochial Board, School Board, Local Authority, or other, save as hereinafter provided."¹ In a case like this, of a general enactment with specified exceptions, the obviously convenient course is at once to formulate these exceptions. When that has been done, the statement will hold good that for every purpose save those so formulated the changes in area provided for by the Boundary Commissioners are to have effect. It may be added that, in the opinion of the law officers for Scotland (1890), the words "or other," occurring in the clause above quoted immediately before the words of saving, do not fall to be construed in a limited manner as meaning "other purposes *ejusdem generis* with those enumerated," but must be construed absolutely.

The saving words at the end of the enactment above quoted refer to sections 95 and 96 of the Act. The savings contained in these sections may be considered under three heads.

(1.) Nothing done in pursuance of the Act is to alter the limits of any parliamentary constituency, or the right to be registered as a voter or to vote at any parliamentary election.² This is a very simple provision, and no difficulty can arise in construing it. It may, however, be explained that, with very few exceptions, the changes in county boundaries provided for by the Orders of the Commissioners might receive effect for parliamentary purposes without producing any sensible alteration on the constituencies. There are only one or two cases in which the change would be of any magnitude.

(2.) Neither the Act, nor anything done in pursuance of it, is to alter "the limits within which the valuation roll for a county or burgh is made up as at the passing of this Act," or the right of assessing for the expenses of valuation and of registration of voters.³ The utility of this provision is much questioned. The Valuation Act of 1854,⁴ and amending statutes, proceed on the principle that it is desirable to make the areas of burghs and counties

for valuation purposes correspond as nearly as possible with their areas for parliamentary purposes. The intention was to facilitate the formation of the roll of parliamentary voters, and undoubtedly, as between counties and burghs, this was a matter of some importance before the county and burgh franchises were assimilated. But at all events, as between counties, it seems unnecessary and undesirable that the areas of counties as they were before being affected by Orders of the Commissioners should be perpetuated as rating areas. In the present state of the law, valuation rolls must be made up for the counties as they were prior to any alterations effected by the Commissioners. The rolls so formed may possibly be sufficient as they stand for the formation of the parliamentary registers of voters; but where changes have been made by the Commissioners on county boundaries, county clerks must exchange portions of their valuation rolls, in order that they may be in a position to levy the county rates. But in those cases one County Council must continue to assess, for the purposes of valuation and parliamentary registration, areas which for every other administrative purpose have been transferred to the charge of another County Council. Let it be supposed that the saving of which we are now treating had not been made. In that case all that would be necessary, in order to give effect to the provision saving existing parliamentary constituencies, would be that county clerks should exchange those portions of the valuation rolls which deal with the areas transferred by the Commissioners from one county to another, so that the parliamentary register might be made up. So far, indeed, no advantage perhaps is gained. But in the case supposed the boundaries of a county as altered by the Commissioners would be its boundaries for valuation and registration rates in the same way as for general county rates, and no County Council would levy rates beyond its ordinary administrative area. Nothing appears to be gained by continuing matters as they stand. On the contrary, there is a totally unnecessary complication in rating, which would disappear if the last half of section 95 of the Act were repealed, and in place thereof a provision enacted for the necessary exchange of portions of valuation rolls, on the lines of sub-section 4 of section 28 of the Act.

(3.) "Nothing in this Act, nor anything done in pursuance of this Act, shall alter any right to or affecting teinds or any ecclesiastical arrangements or jurisdictions."¹ This section, in so far as it deals with teinds, seems to have been slightly modified by the Registration of Certain Writs (Scotland) Act, 1891, section 1, sub-section 3,² which declares that the alteration of county boundaries provided for by the Commissioners, shall have effect for the registration of writs relating to teinds. The saving seems clear enough as regards the rights of ministers to teinds, and as regards the boundaries of the parishes within which ministers and church courts have jurisdiction. Any alteration made by the Commissioners on the area of a parish receives effect for civil purposes only. Teinds will continue to be paid to the minister of the same parish as hitherto, although the area in respect of which they are paid has been transferred to a different civil parish, and ecclesiastical jurisdictions will be exercised over the same areas as before. So the Order will not have effect for the proclamation of banns, this being *inter sacra*.³ The question, however, has been raised whether heritors' assessments are to be levied over the same area as formerly, notwithstanding that the Commissioners have altered the area of the parish. To this the answer seems undoubtedly to be in the affirmative. The duties of the heritors—to provide and keep up church, manse, glebe, and kirkyard—have always been regarded as ecclesiastical arrangements, and are therefore saved by the section above quoted. The obligations relating to church, manse, and glebe unequivocally fall under this category, but doubts have been expressed on the matter of kirkyards. The difficulty has been suggested, not with regard to the liabilities of heritors in the matter, but with regard to the rights of parishioners in kirkyards. These, however, are only two sides of the same question, for if the liabilities of heritors to provide kirkyards fall under the head of ecclesiastical arrangements, the rights of parishioners in kirkyards must come under the same head.

Burying-grounds in Scotland are of three kinds. (a.) The kirkyard has been described as "a space of ground appertaining

and generally contiguous to a parish church, dedicated to the purpose of interment after death of the inhabitants of the parish to which the church belongs." ¹ The duty of providing and managing kirkyards and of enlarging them lay with the heritors, and the Presbytery could compel the heritors to perform this duty. The method of discharging this obligation "accords substantially with that in which they are bound and may be required to provide church accommodation." ² As, therefore, all arrangements regarding a kirkyard proper are ecclesiastical, it may safely be inferred that rights of interment in kirkyards, and liabilities with regard to them, are saved by section 96 of the Act from the operation of the Commissioners' Orders. (b.) The second class consists of burial-grounds provided by the Parochial Board or other Local Authority under the Burial-Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855, ³ and amending Acts. Any expenses incurred under these Acts are raised by assessments levied in the same manner as poor-rates. It seems clear that proceedings in pursuance of these Acts are acts of civil administration, and can in no sense be regarded as dealing with ecclesiastical arrangements or jurisdictions. Accordingly the area of a parish for purposes of rating under the Burial-Grounds Acts is its area as altered by any Order of the Commissioners, and it is thought that the privileges of burial will be similarly affected, so as to attach only to those within the rating area. ⁴ (c.) It is understood that in some cases a kirkyard, originally provided by the heritors, has been enlarged by the Parochial Board under the Burial-Grounds Acts. It is possible that different rights and liabilities may attach to the old kirkyard from those which attach to the added portion. There may, however, be ground for holding that the heritors, by transferring the duty of enlarging the kirkyard to the Parochial Board, have divested themselves of their rights, and that the whole area, old and new, is to be treated as a burial-ground under purely civil administration. ⁵

These, then, are the only matters in regard to which the Orders of the Commissioners altering boundaries are declared not to have effect. The Orders operate for all other purposes. It would hardly be possible to enumerate these purposes, nor would it be of any special utility, but a few illustrations may be given. One of the most obvious changes is the alteration in judicial arrangements. Transference from one county to another implies that appeal must be made to a different Sheriff Court or J.P. Court by those living in the area transferred. The change of perhaps greatest magnitude is the alteration in the County Council's area of operations, so extensive in their nature, relating as they do to police, roads, public health, cattle disease, and many other matters. Changes may be involved in the composition of local administrative bodies. Where a property qualification exists, as with the Commissioners of Supply and Parochial Boards, property in an area transferred necessarily carries the qualification to the county or parish to which such area is transferred, and a proprietor claiming on property in this position must transfer himself to the administrative bodies of the new county or parish. Similarly County Council electors in the areas transferred from one county to another will exercise their franchise in the new county, and a like change will take place with regard to Parochial and School Board electors, where there have been alterations in parochial boundaries. Subject to the exceptions above detailed, every reference in any Act of Parliament, or in any Order or other public document, past or future, to a county or parish simply by name—as, for instance, the county of Fife, or the parish of Logie—will henceforth be held to relate solely to the area of the county or parish as now altered by the Orders of the Commissioners. For instance, if the Board of Lunacy has, by Order issued long prior to 1891, declared that the county of Fife shall form one lunacy district, this Order must, after 15th May 1891, be interpreted to apply to the county of Fife as altered in area by the Boundary Commissioners. It applies to the county of Fife, whatever the area of that county may be at any particular time. The opposite would hold good, if prior to 1891 this lunacy district had been declared to consist of "the whole area lying within the existing boundaries of the county of

Fife." In that case the word "existing" defines the boundaries once and for all. But unless such a term as "existing" is contained expressly or by implication in the Act of Parliament, Order, or other document dealt with, then the alterations made by the Commissioners will have effect in the areas so referred to. Good examples of both cases are found in the districts for the registration of births, &c. Where the registration district is simply the parish, as defined in section 8 of the Act of 1854,¹ any change in the area of the parish will at the same time be a change in the registration district. But where the Sheriff has designated a special registration district, under section 10 of that Act, no Order of the Boundary Commissioners can affect such a district. It is an area with specially defined boundaries, which could be altered by the Commissioners only by a special clause, and as incidental to an alteration on parochial boundaries.²

It is not unlikely that questions of this description may arise with reference to the interpretation of charitable bequests which favour special counties or parishes. According to a recent decision³ the county or parish in such a case is to be taken as it existed at the date of the testator's death, the principle being that, as you must ascertain what community the testator intended to benefit, the proper way of doing so is to take it as it was when the bequest came into existence. It does not appear from the report that the general question, though stated, was argued in that case. It humbly appears to me that a distinction may be drawn between a bequest which clearly discloses a deliberate intention to limit the benefits to an area as existing at the testator's death, and one which is designed to benefit a community loosely described as those living within certain specified counties or parishes. Each case will probably be decided according to its special circumstances, but it appears to me that there are some in which the wide general words at the close of section 49, sub-section 1, of the Act may receive effect, and the benefits of a bequest of this

character be enjoyed only by the favoured area as altered by the Commissioners.¹

While, however, the general statement holds good that all transferences effected by the Orders of the Commissioners operate for all purposes not expressly excepted, a word of explanation may not be out of place to guard against an unwarranted interpretation of this statement. The transfers so effected are transfers of area only; they do not affect the property, debts, or liabilities of the administrative bodies interested in the transference.² Section 49 of the Act deals solely with administrative areas; it is left to section 50 to deal with financial questions.³ No matter how great the changes in the area of a county or of a parish may be, that county or parish is left, so far as the Orders of the Commissioners are concerned, with all its property, debts, and liabilities as these existed prior to the date at which the Orders came into operation. It has been plausibly argued that the transference of the third of the rating area of a parish should surely carry with it a third of the parochial or school debt. It may be answered that in that case it must also carry a third of the assets of the parish, such as school buildings, parochial board office, &c. But the real answer is that section 49 of the Act only empowers the Orders of the Commissioners to make changes in area, while section 50 provides a method according to which the necessary financial adjustments may be made by agreement, and failing agreement, by the arbitration of the Commissioners. It is clear that no hard and fast rule, that debts and liabilities shall pass according to the rateable value of the area transferred, could ever produce just results, for it ignores the responsibilities which such an area carries. You may have an area transferred having a large rental but entailing responsibilities which swallow up double the rates received from it, and you may have the converse case of a rate-producing area with

no liabilities. There may be difficulty in some cases in ascertaining what should come under the term liabilities. In the article referred to in note 2 on the previous page, I have given reasons for holding that, in regard to a Parochial Board, the term "liabilities"¹ includes not only paupers actually chargeable at the date of any transfer of area made by the Commissioners, but also the contingent liabilities of that board in respect of persons born within the area of the parish, or having a residential settlement within it, as it existed prior to any such change of area, and that the Orders of the Commissioners make no change on these liabilities.² It is clear that, if there were no remedy, such an interpretation of the effect of the Orders might in many cases be most unjust. But section 50 provides a complete and satisfactory remedy to those authorities which care to take advantage of it.

Effect on
rating.

While, however, the Orders of the Commissioners do not directly affect the liabilities and assets vested in the County and Parochial authorities at the date of transfer, they alter the areas managed by these bodies for current income and expenditure. All rates³ must be levied within the area of the new county or parish, and current expenditure may be made only in respect of that area. The result in some cases is curious. Take the case of an area transferred from the county of A, which has no county debt, to the county of B, which has a county debt. Since a County Council must levy its rates on the county, whatever its area, the County Council of B must levy the rate for the repayment of its debt on the whole county, including that unfortunate transferred area as being now part of the county, though that area had no part or lot in the incurring of the debt. Take the converse case,—that of an area transferred from the county of B, which has a debt, to the county of A, which has none. Here the county of B may under section 50 of the Act fairly ask the county of A to relieve it of a portion of its debt proportionate to the rental of the area transferred. But, for the payment of any portion so taken over, the County

Council of A must assess its whole area, and cannot levy a special rate on the small area transferred to it from the county of B. Every part of the altered area of a county must bear the burdens of that county, just as it shares in its privileges. What has been said of a county holds good equally of a parish. Temporary hardship may in both cases be entailed on individuals through such transfers of area. Certain ratepayers may have their rates doubled without redress. But this is simply a case in which, the Legislature having declared for simplification in areas, the individual must submit to loss for what the Legislature regards as the benefit of the community. It is quite clear that for rating purposes the county or the parish is the county or the parish as altered in area by the Commissioners, and that, without express authority, administrative bodies can neither go beyond the areas as they now exist, nor treat parts of these areas differently so as to create a system of differential rating.

The alterations effected by the Commissioners on county boundaries have effect for one very important purpose, viz., the registration of writs in the Register of Sasines. This can hardly be called a purpose of administration, but the law officers for Scotland have given it as their opinion that it must be numbered among the purposes to which section 49 of the Act refers, and this has been put beyond doubt by the Act printed in the Second Appendix to this volume.¹ The main object of that Act was to secure that for the purposes of such registration all the Orders of the Commissioners should come into operation at the same date. Accordingly it provides that, notwithstanding the dates specified in the Orders, they shall for this purpose only come into operation on, but not before, 15th May 1892. This postponement has the further advantage of giving conveyancers time to familiarise themselves with the changes produced by the Orders. It may be suggested to conveyancers how desirable it would be not to content themselves with incorporating county changes alone in future deeds. No doubt all that is required to render the registration valid is to have the deed registered in the appropriate division of the Register of

Sasines, which entails nothing more than accuracy in ascertaining the county to which the lands dealt with belong. But for purposes of identification changes in parochial boundaries also should be given effect to ; otherwise considerable confusion may arise in the future, when the new boundaries of parishes have become familiar and the old boundaries are forgotten. In every case in which the lands dealt with by the conveyancer have sustained a change, whether in their county or in their parish relations, this change should be expressed. Where no county change is made it is not *necessary* to specify a parochial change, but accuracy and convenience point alike to the importance of describing the lesser change as well as the greater. The stereotyped form, "sometime in the county of A, but now in the county of B," can without difficulty be adapted to parochial changes, and I hope that the details given in this volume may enable any conveyancer to ascertain with a *minimum* of trouble whether the lands he is dealing with have been affected in any way by an Order of the Commissioners.

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

1. The Orders here printed include all which have been confirmed prior to 1st November 1891. There are one or two cases not finally disposed of, regarding which details are given in First Appendix.

2. By the Registration of Certain Writs (Scotland) Act, 1891 (printed in Second Appendix), it is provided that, notwithstanding the dates specified in the Orders of the Boundary Commissioners, these Orders shall, "for the purposes of regulating the registration of writs in the appropriate divisions of the General Register of Sasines for Scotland, and for that purpose only, come into operation on, but not before," 15th May 1892.

3. At the close of each Order the dates of its various stages are given. The Draft Order was published on the date on which it appeared in the *Edinburgh Gazette*. In each case a reference is given to the page of the *Gazette*.

4. The Orders are printed according to Counties. The Counties are arranged according to the method adopted in the Census Returns, "so that a zig-zag line, beginning at the north of Scotland and carried to the south, passes successively through every County." Where an Order relates to more Counties than one, it is placed under the County which by this arrangement comes first.

And whereas a part of the parish of Fowlis Wester, containing 590 acres or thereby, situated at or near Auchnafree and adjoining the parish of Crieff, and detached parts of the parishes of Monzie and Dull, is, as shown on the Ordnance Survey maps, detached from the main portion of the parish of Fowlis Wester :

And whereas a part of the parish of Methven, containing 2823 acres or thereby, situated at or near Tullybeagles and adjoining the parishes of Auchtergaven and Little Dunkeld, is, as shown on the Ordnance Survey maps, detached from the main portion of the parish of Methven :

And whereas a part of the parish of Moneydie, containing 25 acres or thereby and situated south of Moneydieroger, is, as shown on the Ordnance Survey maps, detached from the main portion of the parish of Moneydie, being separated therefrom by the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Auchtergaven :

And whereas a part of the parish of Monzie, containing 1107 acres or thereby, situated at or near Innerpeffray and adjoining the parishes of Crieff, Muthill, Trinity-Gask, and Madderty (being the part marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Monzie detached No. 1), is detached from the main portion of the parish of Monzie ; and another part of the parish of Monzie, containing 6774 acres or thereby, situated at or near Auchnafree and adjoining the parishes of Monzievaird & Strowan, and Crieff, and a detached part of the parish of Fowlis Wester (being part of the area marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Monzie detached No. 2), is also detached from the main portion of the parish of Monzie ; and another part of the parish of Monzie, containing 7953 acres or thereby, situated in Glenalmond and adjoining the parishes of Little Dunkeld, Fowlis Wester, Methven, Moneydie, and Auchtergaven, and a detached part of the parish of Redgorton (being the part marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Monzie detached No. 3), is also detached from the main portion of the parish of Monzie :

And whereas a part of the parish of Redgorton, containing 1261 acres or thereby, situated at or near Burmeston and adjoining the parish of Auchtergaven and a detached part of the parish of Monzie, is, as shown on the Ordnance Survey maps, detached from the main portion of the parish of Redgorton :

And whereas it appears to us, after communicating with the authorities and others interested and considering all objections to the terms of our Draft Order thereanent, to be expedient to alter and adjust in the manner hereinafter provided the boundaries of the said parishes of Auchtergaven, Comrie, Crieff, Fowlis Wester, Little Dunkeld, Methven, Moneydie, Monzie, Monzievaird & Strowan, Muthill and Redgorton :

Now therefore we, the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, determine and order as follows :

- I. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the detached part of the parish of Monzie marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Monzie detached No. 3 as lies to the south of the River Almond, shall cease to be part of that parish, and shall form part of the parish of Methven.
- II. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Methven shall cease to be part of that parish, and shall form part of the parish of Auchtergaven.
- III. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Auchtergaven shall cease to be part of that parish, and shall form part of the parish of Moneydie.
- IV. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the parish of Auchtergaven as lies to the west and south-west of Tullybelton estate and to the west of the eastern boundaries of the farms of Gourdliehill and Woodend on the Athole estate, shall cease to be part of the parish of Auchtergaven, and shall form part of the parish of Monzie.
- V. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Redgorton shall cease to be part of that parish, and shall form part of the parish of Monzie.
- VI. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the parish of Fowlis Wester as lies north of the River Almond and south of the watershed between Strathbraan and

Glenalmond shall cease to be part of the parish of Fowlis Wester, and shall form part of the parish of Monzie.

VII. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the parish of Fowlis Wester as lies to the north of the watershed between Strathbraan and Glenalmond shall cease to be part of the parish of Fowlis Wester, and shall form part of the parish of Little Dunkeld.

VIII. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Crieff situated at Auchilanzie, and so much of the parish of Crieff as lies to the north of a line starting at the boundary between the parishes of Crieff and Monzievaird & Strowan at the point at or near Blue Craigs where the farm of Mains of Callander (sometime called Stonefield) on the estate of Ochtertyre marches with the farm of Conyachan on the estate of Glenalmond, and running thence in an easterly direction along the march between the estate of Glenalmond on the one side and the estate of Ochtertyre and afterwards the estate of Monzie on the other side, until it meets the main portion of the parish of Fowlis Wester, and thence along the northern boundary of the parish of Fowlis Wester to the most eastern point of the parish of Crieff, shall cease to be part of the parish of Crieff, and shall form part of the parish of Fowlis Wester.

IX. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, that portion of the parish of Monzie which lies between the parishes of Crieff and Fowlis Wester, and also the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Monzie marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Monzie detached No. 1, shall cease to be part of the parish of Monzie, and shall form part of the parish of Crieff.

X. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Crieff situated in Glenshervie at or near Auchnafree, being part of the area marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Monzie detached No. 2, shall cease to be part of the parish of Crieff, and shall form part of the parish of Monzievaird & Strowan, and the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Monzie, being the remainder of the area marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Monzie detached No. 2, shall cease to be part of the parish of Monzie, and shall form part of the parish of Monzievaird & Strowan.

XI. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Fowlis Wester shall cease to be part of that parish, and shall form part of the parish of Monzievaird & Strowan.

XII. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the lands situated

- at or near Auchnafree marked on the Ordnance Survey maps "Lands claimed by no parish" shall form part of the parish of Monzievaird & Strowan.
- XIII. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the aforesaid detached parts of the parish of Monzievaird & Strowan marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Monzievaird & Strowan detached No. 1, Monzievaird & Strowan detached No. 2, and Monzievaird & Strowan detached No. 3, shall cease to be part of the parish of Monzievaird & Strowan, and shall form part of the parish of Comrie.
- XIV. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Monzievaird & Strowan marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Monzievaird & Strowan detached No. 4, shall cease to be part of that parish, and shall form part of the parish of Muthill.
- XV. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the parish of Muthill as lies to the north and west of a line starting at the point on the boundary of the parish of Muthill where the public road from Comrie to Ardoch by Glenlichorn crosses the Newton burn, and running in a north-easterly direction along the said burn until it enters the parish of Monzievaird & Strowan at a point near Mill of Fortune, shall cease to be part of the parish of Muthill, and shall form part of the parish of Comrie.
- XVI. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the parish of Crieff as lies to the south of the River Earn shall cease to be part of that parish, and shall form part of the parish of Muthill.
- XVII. With respect to the effect of this Order upon the operation of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1872, and Acts amending the same, the following provisions shall have effect:—
- (1.) This Order shall come into operation on the 28th day of February 1891 for the purpose of School Board elections.
 - (2.) The School Board of each of the School Districts within the areas affected by this Order shall continue to exercise the same rights and privileges, and be subject to the same liabilities, and its jurisdiction shall extend over the same area, as heretofore, until the date in the year 1891 at which it falls to retire from office.
 - (3.) From and after the date mentioned in the preceding sub-section, and subject to the qualification that nothing herein contained shall affect the School District of Amulree, or the powers, duties, or liabilities of the School Board of Amulree, or the mode of electing the said School Board, the areas of the School Districts of Auchtergaven, Comrie, Crieff,

The existing School Board of Logiealmond shall continue in office until the election in the year 1891 of a School Board for the parish of Monzie, and thereafter the School Board and School District of Logiealmond shall cease to exist.

- (4.) Subject to adjustment as hereinafter mentioned the whole property, debts, and liabilities of the School Board of Logiealmond shall, upon the election of a School Board for the parish of Monzie in the year 1891, become the property, debts, and liabilities of the said School Board of Monzie, and on the same date the whole property, debts, and liabilities of the present School Board of Monzie shall become the property, debts, and liabilities of the School Board of Crieff.
- (5.) Nothing herein contained shall prejudice the right of the authorities affected by this Order to provide, in the manner prescribed in the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, for the adjustment and disposal of any property, debts, and liabilities at present vested in or attaching to or by this Order transferred to such authorities. In particular the transfer made by the immediately preceding subsection shall not prejudice the rights and liabilities of the School Boards of Crieff and Fowlis Wester arising in respect of the transference to the said parishes of portions of the area at present under the jurisdiction of the School Board of Monzie.

XVIII. Save as otherwise provided herein, this Order shall come into operation on the 15th day of May 1891.

Now therefore we, the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, determine and order as follows:

- I. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the parish of Oxnam as lies to the west of a line starting at the south point of the eastern march of Scraesburgh, being a point in Towery Plantation on the boundary between the parishes of Jedburgh and Oxnam, and running in a south-easterly direction to the nearest point on the road from Oxnam to Mossburnford, thence in a generally southerly direction along the centre of the said road to the point at which it meets the track leading to Birken-side Cottage, then along the said track till it joins the track from Cringle Burn to Birken-side, then to and along the west fence or boundary of the enclosure attached to Birken-side Cottage until the march of Dolphingston is met, thence along the north and east marches of the farm of Dolphingston until it reaches the road leading from Mossburnford by Falla, thence along the centre of the last-mentioned road until it reaches the march of Stotfield near Stotfield Burn, thence along the north-eastern march of Stotfield Farm until it reaches the

 - III. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the aforesaid detached part of the parish of Jedburgh marked on the Ordnance Survey maps Jedburgh detached No. 1, as lies to the south of the march between the farm of Mervinslaw on the one side and the farms of Old Jedward and Earlsheugh on the other side, shall cease to be part of the parish of Jedburgh, and shall form part of the parish of Southdean.
 - IV. Nothing herein contained shall affect the School District of Edgerston, or the powers, duties, and liabilities of the School Board of Edgerston, or the mode of electing the said School Board, or the registration district of Edgerston.
 - V. This Order shall come into operation for the purposes of School Board elections on the 28th day of February 1891, and for all other purposes on the 15th day of May 1891.

- I. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the parish of Kirkpatrick-Fleming as lies to the west of the eastern fence of the road forming the eastern boundary of the estate of Scotsfield shall cease to be part of that parish, and shall form part of the parish of Dornock.
- II. This Order shall come into operation for the purposes of School Board elections on the 1st day of January 1891, and for all other purposes on the 15th day of May 1891.

PART II.

EXPLANATION OF THE CHANGES EFFECTED BY THE
ORDERS OF THE BOUNDARY COMMISSIONERS.

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

1. The Counties are arranged in the same order as in the Census returns, "so that a zig-zag line beginning at the north of Scotland and carried to the south passes successively through every County." The Counties have the same numbers as in the Census returns.

2. The subjects transferred are enumerated under the head of the County or Parish to which they are transferred. Thus when an area has been transferred from County A to County B, the subjects affected are enumerated under County B, and a cross reference is given under County A.

3. The names of subjects are those contained in the Valuation Rolls. In the description of subjects the term "farm" includes the farm-house and servants' houses, and the term "croft" includes the house. But where any of the servants' houses on a farm have distinctive names, such houses are detailed separately. "House" includes cottage, and "land" includes gardens, yards, &c.

4. The names of proprietors are in almost every case those given in the Valuation Rolls of 1890-91. It is therefore to be borne in mind that in some cases those who are described as proprietors may be limited owners only, such as liferenters or leaseholders.

5. Where villages or towns are affected, the names of the subjects and the proprietors are not usually given. The description of the area transferred is in such cases quite sufficient to show whether and to what extent any subject in the village or town has been affected by the Order.

6. The Ordnance maps referred to are those published by the Ordnance Survey Department on the scale of one inch to the mile. Those published down to this date (November 1891), show the Counties and Parishes as they were before the Orders of the Commissioners came into operation. It is expected that, when the work of the Commissioners is completed, revised maps will be published to show the altered boundaries, but the sheets of the revised maps will bear the same numbers as the present maps. The Orders and the explanations can be readily followed on the maps as published at present.

7. An ampersand (&) is used where a County or a Parish has a double name, *e.g.*, "Ross & Cromarty", "Fetlar & North Yell."

8. In most cases it is necessary to read the text of the Order along with the explanation, because the full descriptions contained in the Orders are, as a rule, not repeated in the explanation.

EXPLANATION OF ORDERS.

1.—COUNTY OF ZETLAND.

I.—COUNTY BOUNDARIES.

No change.

II.—PARISH BOUNDARIES.

1.—FETLAR & NORTH YELL AND MID & SOUTH YELL.

The parish of Fetlar & North Yell was a combined parish, formed by the union of the two ancient parishes of Fetlar and North Yell, which were separated from each other by the sea. The former consisted of the island of Fetlar, with surrounding islets, and the latter consisted of the most northerly of the three parts into which the island of Yell was anciently divided for ecclesiastical purposes. By the Order printed at p. 3 the ancient parish of North Yell was disjoined from the parish of Fetlar & North Yell, and annexed to the parish of Mid & South Yell. Under this arrangement and with an accompanying simplification in nomenclature, the island of Fetlar, with dependent islands, becomes the parish of Fetlar, and the island of Yell, with dependent islands, becomes the parish of Yell.

As these reconstructed parishes possess clearly defined natural boundaries, it is unnecessary to specify the lands individually affected. It is sufficient to enumerate the islands which are now included within the parish of Fetlar and the parish of Yell respectively.

The parish of Fetlar consists of the following islands:—(1.) Fetlar, 10,133·6 acres; (2.) Urie Lingey, 55·9 acres; and (3.) Daay, 23·3 acres.

The parish of Yell consists of the following islands:—(1.) Yell, 52,923·2 acres; (2.) Gloup Holm, 30·4 acres; (3.) Linga, 122·2 acres; (4.) Hascosay, 750·5 acres; (5.) Uynarey, 71 acres; (6.) Orfasay, 37·9 acres; and also three small islands, 15·6 acres. The island of Bigga, 235·8 acres, belongs in common to the parishes of Yell and Delting.

(Sheets 130 and 131 of the Ordnance Survey maps of Scotland, one-inch scale.)

2.—BRESSAY BURRA & QUARFF, AND LERWICK & GULBERWICK.

The parish of Bressay Burra & Quarff was a combined parish consisting of the three ancient parishes of Bressay, Burra, and Quarff. The ancient parish of Bressay consisted of the island of Bressay, with

surrounding islets situated on the east side of the mainland. The ancient parish of Quarff was situated on the mainland, being bounded on the north by the parish of Tingwall, on the north-east by the parish of Gulberwick, and on the south by the parish of Cunningsburgh. The ancient parish of Burra consisted of islands contiguous to Quarff and Cunningsburgh on the west side of the mainland. Thus Quarff and Burra were separated from Bressay not only by the sea, but also by the parish of Lerwick & Gulberwick. By the Order, printed at p. 3, the ancient parishes of Quarff and Burra were disjoined from the parish of Bressay Burra & Quarff, and annexed to the parish of Lerwick & Gulberwick. In this case also it seemed desirable to simplify the names of the reconstructed parishes, and accordingly they are to be known respectively as the parish of Bressay and the parish of Lerwick.

Here, again, it is unnecessary to specify individually the lands affected, since the boundaries of the parishes, as altered in area, follow lines which are either natural, or well known and defined. The Ordnance Survey maps of Shetland show the boundaries of the ancient parishes. A brief description will therefore suffice.

The parish of Bressay consists of the following islands:—(1.) Bressay, 6918·8 acres; (2.) Isle of Noss, 762·3 acres; (3.) Inner and Outer Score, 36·9 acres; and four small islands, 22·8 acres.

The parish of Lerwick consists of the following districts:—(1.) The ancient parish of Lerwick (entirely mainland), 3158·8 acres; (2.) the ancient parish of Gulberwick (entirely mainland), 2793·8 acres; (3.) the ancient parish of Quarff (entirely mainland), 2098·5 acres; and (4.) the ancient parish of Burra (insular), consisting of the following islands:—(a) Papa, 148·4 acres; (b) West Burra, 1781·5 acres; (c) East Burra, 1242·4 acres; (d) Houss Ness, 32 acres; (e) South Havra, 147·9 acres; (f) Little Havra, 29·4 acres; and six small islands, 16·1 acres.

2.—COUNTY OF ORKNEY.

No change either in county or in parish boundaries.

3.—COUNTY OF CAITHNESS.

I.—COUNTY BOUNDARIES.

No change.

The parish of Reay was situated partly in the county of Caithness and partly in the county of Sutherland, but the mode in which it has been dealt with has entailed no change on the county boundaries. See county of Sutherland, Farr and Reay, *infra*, p. 131.

II.—PARISH BOUNDARIES.

1.—HALKIRK AND THURSO.

The parish of Thurso had one detached part which extended to 7074 acres, and was bounded on the north-west by the parish of Reay, and on the east and south by the parish of Halkirk. It consisted of the Crown lands of Dorrery. By the Order printed at p. 4 this detached part was disjoined from the parish of Thurso and annexed to the parish of Halkirk.

The following are the subjects thus transferred from the parish of Thurso to the parish of Halkirk :—

2.—REAY.

The parish of Reay was situated partly in the county of Caithness and partly in the county of Sutherland. By the Order printed at p. 5 no change was made in the county boundary or in the boundaries of the Caithness-shire portion of the parish. A change, however, was made in the area of the parish, for the Sutherlandshire portion was disjoined from the parish of Reay and annexed to the parish of Farr, in the county of Sutherland. The parish of Reay, as thus altered in area, consists solely of the Caithness-shire portion of the old parish of Reay.

For particulars see county of Sutherland, Farr and Reay, *infra*, p. 131.

4.—COUNTY OF SUTHERLAND.

I.—COUNTY BOUNDARIES.

No change.

The parish of Reay was situated partly in the county of Sutherland and partly in the county of Caithness, but the Order dealing with that parish (printed at p. 5) makes no change on the county boundary. See Farr and Reay, *infra*, p. 131.

II.—PARISH BOUNDARIES.

I.—DORNOCH AND ROGART.

The parish of Dornoch had one detached part lying to the north of the parish. This detached part contained 725 acres, and was bounded on the east by the parish of Golspie and elsewhere by the parish of Rogart. It was situated at Kinnauld, immediately to the east of Rogart Railway Station.

By the Order printed at p. 5 an exchange of territory was effected between the parish of Dornoch and the parish of Rogart. By Clause I. the detached part of Dornoch was transferred to Rogart. By Clause II. Dornoch received from Rogart an area which embraces nearly the whole of that part of Rogart which lies to the south of the watershed between Strath Fleet on the north and Strath Carnach (including Strath Tollie) on the south. The new boundary thus laid down between the parishes of Dornoch and Rogart leaves the existing boundary at a point about three-quarters of a mile west of the point at which the boundaries of Dornoch, Rogart, and Golspie meet. It is a point on the watershed about a quarter of a mile north of Carn Liath. Thence the new boundary follows the watershed in a westerly direction till it reaches the summit which lies about three-quarters of a mile west of Creagan Glas, and about a quarter of a mile east of Loch na Saobhaidhe. At that point it leaves the watershed and strikes direct in a south-westerly direction to the forkings near the source of Allt an Cealgaiche (not named in the Ordnance Survey one-inch maps). It then follows that burn to its confluence with Allt Garbh Airidh, where it reaches the boundary of the parish of Creich. All to the south of that line is disjoined from Rogart and annexed to Dornoch.

2.—FARR AND REAY.

The parish of Reay was situated partly in the county of Caithness and partly in the county of Sutherland. By the Order printed at p. 5 no change was made in the boundary between the counties; but the portion of the parish in the county of Sutherland was disjoined from the parish of Reay and annexed to the parish of Farr, *i.e.*, so much of the old parish of Reay as was situated in the county of Sutherland now forms part of the parish of Farr. Thus the parish of Reay now consists solely of the Caithness-shire part of the old parish.

5.—COUNTY OF ROSS AND CROMARTY.

By section 39 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889 (52 and 53 Vict., cap. 50) the counties of Ross and Cromarty are "united for all purposes whatsoever under the name of the county of Ross & Cromarty." The result of this is to dispose of the various scattered portions of the old county of Cromarty by placing them entirely in the new county of Ross & Cromarty.

I.—COUNTY BOUNDARIES.

There are only two parishes which were situated partly in the county of Ross & Cromarty and partly in other counties, viz., Urquhart & Logie-Wester and Urray. Urquhart & Logie-Wester was situated partly in Nairnshire, the part in Nairnshire being a detached part of that county. Urray was situated partly in the county of Inverness.

The following changes in county boundaries have been made:—

A. With the County of Inverness.

1.—URRAY.

The parish of Urray was situated partly in the county of Inverness and partly in the county of Ross & Cromarty. No change is made in the county boundary. By Clause II. of the Order printed at p. 7 the part of the parish of Urray previously in Inverness-shire remains in that county, but ceases to be part of the parish of Urray, being transferred to the Inverness-shire parish of Kilmorack.

For details see county of Inverness, Kilmorack, *infra*, p. 150, and for changes on the area of the parish of Urray see Contin, &c., *infra*, p. 136.

2.—KILMORACK.

The Inverness-shire parish of Kilmorack had a detached part situated in that county near Muir of Ord, presenting the appearance of a narrow wedge of the county of Inverness driven into the county of Ross & Cromarty. By the Order printed at p. 7 (Clause I.) this detached part was disjoined from the parish of Kilmorack and from the county of Inverness and annexed to the parish of Urray and to the county of Ross & Cromarty. Accordingly the boundary between the two counties, which formerly ran from the Beaully River up the north-east and down the west boundaries of the wedge-shaped detached part of Kilmorack, now runs along its south boundary. The county boundary as altered now runs up the Beaully River to the mouth of the Black Burn (about 200 yards further up the Beaully River than the old boundary); and thence it runs up the Black Burn past Tomich till it rejoins the old county boundary, along which it continues westwards.

It consisted simply of the barony of Ferintosh. Under various Acts, public and local, it has for some years been treated as part of Ross & Cromarty for most county purposes, and by the Order printed at p. 6 this transference is completed, the detached part being disjoined from Nairnshire and annexed to Ross & Cromarty.

II.—PARISH BOUNDARIES.

1.—CONTIN, DINGWALL, FODDERTY, AND URRAY.

The parish of Fodderty had two detached parts. Fodderty detached No. 1 extended to 18,474 acres, and was almost surrounded by the parish of Contin. Fodderty detached No. 2, extending to 2720 acres, lay to the south of the main portion of the parish, and was separated from it by a narrow strip of the parish of Dingwall. Not only had the parish of Urray two detached parts in the county of Ross & Cromarty, but in addition part of the main portion of the parish was situated in the county of Inverness. Urray detached No. 1, containing 2463 acres, was almost surrounded by the parish of Contin. Urray detached No. 2, with 38,561 acres, lay in Glen Orrin west of the main portion of the parish, being separated from it by a strip of Contin and a strip of Fodderty detached No. 1. In dealing with these two parishes it was found necessary to effect alterations on the boundaries of the parishes of Contin and Dingwall. By the Order printed at p. 7 the following changes were effected on the four parishes concerned :—

(1.)—Contin.

The only territory taken from Contin is the small portion of the parish lying to the south of the watershed between Strath Conan and Glen Orrin which was transferred to the parish of Urray. On the other hand Contin received a large accession of territory, for there were

transferred to it detached part No. 1 of the parish of Urray, and all of Fodderty detached No. 1 except the portion lying to the south of the above-mentioned watershed. The change on the boundaries of the parish can be very simply followed on the map. In order to ascertain the new boundaries follow the old southern boundary from the east end of the parish in a westerly direction till it meets the boundary of Fodderty detached No. 1 at or near Meall a' Bhuic Gaibhre. From that point draw a line in a westerly or south-westerly direction along the watershed till it reaches the boundary of Urray detached No. 2 at or near Meall Giubhais. At this point the line meets the western part of the old southern boundary of Contin, along which it continues to its westmost point. This is the new southern boundary of Contin. The extreme west boundary, the north boundary, and the extreme east boundary remain as before, and the area within these forms the new parish of Contin.

(2.)—*Dingwall.*

With the view of uniting Fodderty detached No. 2 to the main portion of that parish, part of the parish of Dingwall has been transferred to the parish of Fodderty. The part so disjoined consisted of a narrow strip of territory situated beside Loch Ussie and bounded on the north and north-west by the main portion of the parish of Fodderty, on the south-west by the parish of Urray, on the south by Fodderty detached No. 2, and on the east by the centre of the road leading north from Keithtown past Upper Bogchroë and Baddamhroy to Coill an Rìghe (not shown on the Ordnance Survey one-inch maps). The last-mentioned boundary has thus become part of the western boundary of the parish of Dingwall.

The parish of Urray has lost two portions of its old area. Urray detached No. 1 has been transferred to the parish of Contin, and the part of Urray which was situated in the county of Inverness has been transferred to the parish of Kilmorack in that county. On the other hand the detached part of Kilmorack in the county of Inverness has been transferred to the parish of Urray and to the county of Ross & Cromarty; and Urray detached No. 2 has been united to the main portion of the parish by the annexation to Urray of those intervening portions of Contin and of Fodderty detached No. 1 which lay south of

the watershed between Strath Conan and Glen Orrin. The change in boundary effected by the addition of the detached part of Kilmorack is described above (Kilmorack, p. 132). The change made in the north boundary of Urray by the additions from Contin and Fodderty is the same as the change on the south boundary of Contin already described (p. 135).

2.—KILLEARNAN AND KNOCKBAIN (KILMUIR-WESTER & SUDDIE).

The parish of Killearnan had a detached part situated at Tore. It contained 2007 acres, and was separated from the main portion of the parish by an intervening strip of the parish of Knockbain (Kilmuir-Wester & Suddie). It may be explained that the parish marked on the maps Kilmuir-Wester & Suddie is commonly known as the parish of Knockbain.

By the Order printed at p. 8 the following alterations were made on the boundaries of these two parishes :—

(1.) The main portion and the detached part of Killearnan were united by annexing to that parish the intervening portion of Knockbain. The old road from Munloch to Redcastle runs in a south-westerly direction for nearly half a mile along the south-east boundary of the detached part of Killearnan. It leaves that boundary at the southmost point thereof and runs past Glackmore to the nearest point of the main portion of Killearnan parish. The north fence of this road, from the point at which it leaves the detached part to the point at which it meets the main portion of Killearnan, is made the new boundary at this part between Killearnan and Knockbain, all that part of Knockbain which lies to the north of it being transferred to the parish of Killearnan.

(2.) Gallowhill Wood (with croft), which formerly lay partly in Knockbain, was placed entirely in the parish of Killearnan. The new parish boundary at that part is the centre of the track on the east side of Gallowhill Wood from a point on the north about 700 yards north-

west of St. Johns to a point on the south about 500 yards north of Balagunneerie.

(3.) That part of Killearnan which lay east of the centre of the road leading from Allanglach past Artafallie to North Kessock was transferred to Knockbain.

(4.) The whole farm of Bellfield was placed in Knockbain.

The last change, however, does not involve any alteration on the boundaries as laid down on the Ordnance Survey maps.

3.—APPLECROSS AND LOHCARRON.

The parish of Lochcarron had four detached parts, all surrounded by the parish of Applecross. Lochcarron detached No. 1, containing 141 acres, was situated above a mile to the south of the southern end of Loch Damh. The other three detached parts, containing 89, 46, and 491 acres respectively, were situated at the head of Loch Kishorn and on the left bank of the River Kishorn.

By the Order printed at p. 9 the following changes were effected:—

- (1.) That part of Applecross which lies east of the River Kishorn and south of the north march of Kishorn estate was transferred to Lochcarron. In this way detached parts Nos. 2, 3, and 4 of Lochcarron are united to the main portion of the parish. The new boundary between the parishes at this part consists of the centre of Loch Kishorn, and the

medium filum of the River Kishorn from its mouth to a point about a quarter of a mile north of Tornapress; from this point it runs in an easterly direction along the march between the estates of Kishorn and Lochcarron until it meets the old boundary of the parish of Lochcarron at a projecting point about 300 yards north of Loch na Caillich.

- (2.) Lochcarron detached No. 1 and a portion of the main portion of Lochcarron lying to the east of this detached part were transferred to Applecross. The alteration on the boundary between the parishes due to the latter transference is fully described in the Order (*supra*, p. 9), and need not be repeated.

4.—BARVAS, LOCHS, AND UIG.

The parish of Lochs had a detached part situated at Carloway, and lying between the parishes of Barvas and Uig.

By the Order printed at p. 11 this detached part has been divided between the parishes of Barvas and Uig by a line fully described in the Order, which, however, there may be some difficulty in tracing on the map for the first part of its course. The starting-point, Geodha Shealaiga (which is not marked on the one-inch Ordnance Survey maps) lies on the coast nearly due north of Carloway between two points

which are marked on the map Aird Ghoudhann and Rudha an Trilleachain. The starting-point once obtained, the line may readily be traced (running always in a generally south-easterly direction) by the succession of Lochs through which it passes, viz., Loch Langabhat, Loch Ghleadhairean, Loch Shanndabhat, Loch Mor Connaidh, and Loch Airidh Seibh, till it reaches the boundary of Uig in Gleann Eiracleit. All to the west of this line goes to Uig, and all to the east to Barvas.

6.—COUNTY OF INVERNESS.

I.—COUNTY BOUNDARIES.

The county of Inverness had one detached part—a portion of the parish of Croy & Dalcross. There were also ten parishes situated partly in the county of Inverness and partly in other counties, viz., Ardnamurchan, Cawdor, Cromdale, Croy & Dalcross, Daviot & Dunlichity, Kilmallie, Moy & Dalarossie, Petty, Small Isles, and Urray.

The county boundaries have been dealt with as follows :—

A. With the County of Argyll.

1.—ARDNAMURCHAN.

The Commissioners have not dealt with the parish of Ardnamurchan. It is nearly equally divided between the counties of Argyll and Inverness, the area in Argyll being 115,063 acres, and in Inverness 117,762 acres. Every consideration of convenience points to the desirability of dividing a parish of so great extent into two separate parishes. The county boundary, which runs along the centre of Loch Sheil, is well defined and convenient for administrative purposes. A hope is entertained that the Inverness-shire portion of the parish may be disjoined from the Argyllshire portion and created a separate civil parish by the Secretary for Scotland under section 51 of the Local Government Act. The Boundary Commissioners had not power to carry this scheme into effect, but expressed their approval of it.

2.—KILMALLIE.

This parish was divided between the counties of Argyll and Inverness by a boundary which, traversing the district situated north of Loch Eil and south of Loch Arkaig, was exceedingly irregular and inconvenient. By the Order printed at p. 14 Loch Eil was made the new county boundary, and the portion of Kilmallie north of Loch Eil so far as previously in Argyllshire was transferred to Inverness-shire. The Commissioners have expressed the opinion that the portion of Kilmallie remaining in Argyllshire might suitably be formed at some future time into an independent civil parish. The new county boundary (which was so drawn as to place the main road leading to the west from Corpach wholly in the county of Inverness) is fully described in the Order (p. 15), and can be readily followed on the map. It seems necessary only to explain that Allt Dubhaidh is the burn which flows from Loch an Dubh Torr an Tairbeart into the Callop river.

According to the Ordnance Survey returns, the parish consists of nine islands, viz., in the county of Argyll, Canna 2908 acres; Sanday 577 acres; Rum 26,785 acres; Muck 1585 acres; Oigh-sgeir 76 acres; Eilean nan Each 97 acres; and a small island 8 acres; and in the county of Inverness, Eigg 7803 acres, and Eilean Chasgaidh 102 acres. By the Order printed at p. 16 the parish was placed wholly in the county of Inverness.

B. With the County of Elgin.

1.—CROMDALE.

The parish of Cromdale was situated partly in the county of Elgin and partly in the county of Inverness. By the Order printed at p. 16 the county boundary has been left undisturbed, but the Inverness-shire portion of the parish has been transferred from the parish of Cromdale to the Inverness-shire parish of Duthil & Rothiemurchus. The parish of Cromdale as altered in area consists solely of that part of the parish which was previously in the county of Elgin. For details, see Cromdale and Duthil, *infra*, p. 147.

It may be explained that the county boundary in question is one which was mutually agreed upon by the counties interested, the agreement being given effect to by the Act 33 and 34 Vict., cap. 16.

C. With the County of Nairn.

1.—CAWDOR.

The parish of Cawdor was situated partly in the county of Inverness and partly in the county of Nairn. The Inverness-shire portion has been transferred to the county of Nairn, the whole parish being thus placed in that county. For details see county of Nairn, Cawdor, *infra*, p. 152.

The parish of Croy & Dalcross was divided between the counties of Inverness and Nairn by a most irregular boundary line. The parish also had a detached part situated in Inverness-shire and forming part

of that county. By the Order printed at p. 13 the detached part of the parish was transferred to the parish of Inverness (see Croy & Dalcross, &c., *infra*, p. 148). The parish as thus altered in area by the disjunction of its detached part was redivided between the two counties concerned in such a way as to avoid the inconveniences caused by the former boundary, with the result of leaving the parish pretty equally divided between the county of Inverness and the county of Nairn. There was thus an exchange of areas within the parish between these two counties.

The new county boundary runs in a south-westerly direction along the north-west boundary of the parish of Croy & Dalcross from its north end to the point near the west end of Loch Flemington, at which the old county boundary strikes in a south-easterly direction into the parish. It then runs along this county boundary, first south-east, and then south-west until it meets the northern boundary of the estate of Holme, a little south of Croy village. It then runs along the northern and western marches of the estate of Holme until it strikes the River Nairn east of Cantray House. Thence it runs south-west up the River Nairn to a point north-west of Croygorston. Here it turns again to the south-east, keeping Croygorston on the east, and Dalroy and Finglack on the west, and reaches the boundary of the parish of Cawdor at a point about three-quarters of a mile north-east of Beinn Bhuidhe Mhor.

By section 41 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, the parishes of Gamrie and Inverkeithny and parts of the parishes of Alvah and Rothiemay (all of which are Banffshire parishes) are to be deemed to be in the county of Aberdeen for public health and road administration. Clause (g.) of the section, however, saves the powers of the Boundary Commissioners. By the Order printed at p. 26, it is directed that these parishes shall form part of the county of Banff for all purposes not saved by the Act. As the areas affected by the Order were held to be in the county of Aberdeen only for certain limited purposes of administration, it does not seem necessary to specify the subjects affected. It is sufficient to state that the four parishes named are now for all purposes situated wholly in the county of Banff.

2.—CABRACH.

The parish of Cabrach was situated partly in the county of Aberdeen and partly in the county of Banff. By the Order printed at p. 23 it has been placed wholly in the county of Banff.

Also a number of subjects in the village and residential districts of CULTS and WEST CULTS, which are wholly transferred to the parish of Peterculter. These subjects are too numerous to detail, and the fact of their transference will be quite easy to ascertain, since all Banchory-Devenick north of the Dee is transferred to Peterculter, and this includes the whole district of Cults.

4.—CAIRNIE.

The new boundaries are fully described in the Order, but the following explanations may be of assistance:—(a.) the Douglas Burn referred to in Clause I. is the burn which leaves the detached part of Cluny at a point east of Ordhill and reaches the main portion of Cluny at Burnside; (b.) the road from Aberdeen to Alford leaves the parish of Echt at a point immediately north-east of Kinnernie and enters the parish of Cluny north of Linton House.

9.—LOGIE-COLDSTONE, STRATHDON, TARLAND & MIGVIE, AND TOWIE.

These four parishes form a group, and can best be dealt with together. The parish of Strathdon had a detached part in Glenkindie, bounded on the east by the parish of Towie and on the west by the parish of Glenbucket. This detached part was so situated as to separate a part of the parish of Towie at Glencuie from the rest of that parish. In the case of these two detached parts these defects have been cured by the Order printed at p. 34, which has transferred the detached part of Strathdon to Towie, thus uniting the detached part of Towie with the main portion of that parish. By the Order printed at p. 35, Tarland & Migvie detached No. 3 was transferred to Strathdon; Tarland & Migvie detached No. 1 was divided between Strathdon and Towie, Strathdon receiving the part situated on the left bank of the Deskry, and Towie receiving the remainder; and Tarland & Migvie detached No. 2 was transferred to the parish of Logie-Coldstone. The north-east corner of Logie-Coldstone was transferred to Tarland & Migvie, the new boundary being the road described in Clause IV. of the Order.

By Supplementary Order signed on 6th July 1891 (*Edinburgh Gazette*, 7th July 1891, p. 694) the Commissioners directed that the parish of Tarland & Migvie as altered in area should henceforth be known as the parish of Tarland.

The parish of Caputh occupied a peculiar position. It had no fewer than eight detached parts. The main portion of the parish and five of the detached parts were situated in the main portion of the county of Perth. Two more of the detached parts were at the same time detached parts of the county of Perth, surrounded by the county of Forfar, and the remaining detached part formed part of the main portion of the county of Forfar. The three last-mentioned detached parts fell to be dealt with in adjusting the Forfarshire boundaries in order to secure (1) that the county of Perth should have no detached parts; and (2) that the parish of Caputh should be situated wholly in one county.

It was also found necessary to deal with the parish of Fowlis-Easter, which is for certain purposes united to the Forfarshire parish of Lundie.

4.—LOGIE.

This is possible in the case of all parishes except two, viz., the parish of Caputh, of which detached parts were scattered without the slightest regard to geographical convenience, and the parish of Dunkeld & Dowally, one detached part of which will be dealt with in a different group from that in which the main portion of the parish is placed. In all cases the usual cross references are given.

1.—ABERNETHY.

The parish of Abernethy has been altered in area through the transference of certain parts of the parish which were formerly in Fife to the Fife parishes of Newburgh and Strathmiglo by the Order printed at p. 46.

11.—KILMADOCK AND KINCARDINE.

Part of the parish of Kincardine situated at Thornhill was separated from the main portion of the parish by the southern part of the parish of Kilmadock. By the Order printed at p. 73 an exchange of territory was effected between these two parishes. Part of the detached part and part of the main portion of Kincardine were given to Kilmadock, and the remainder of the detached part was united to the main portion of Kincardine by the annexation to Kincardine of a small intervening part of Kilmadock. The line described in Clause II. runs along the road which leads from Bridge of Teith south-west to Ramoth. 12.—LECROPT.

The parish of Lecropt was situated partly in the county of Perth and partly in the county of Stirling. The parish has now been placed wholly in the county of Perth, but its area is altered somewhat. Under the Order printed at p. 51, (1) it received the addition of a small portion of the parish of Logie lying west of the Scottish Central Railway line, and (2) there was transferred to the parish of Logie all that part of the Stirlingshire portion of Lecropt which lay to the east of the west boundary of the railway.

For particulars as to the changes thus effected, see Lecropt, *supra*, p. 205, and County of Stirling, Logie, *infra*, p. 280.

13.—PERTH AND TIBBERMORE.

The parish of Tibbermore had two detached parts, both of which were wholly surrounded by the parish of Perth. Tibbermore detached No. 2, situated at York Place, Perth, was situated wholly within the parliamentary and municipal boundary of the burgh of Perth, and the greater portion of Tibbermore detached No. 1 was also situated within the same boundary. The effect of the Order printed at p. 74 is to transfer to the parish of Perth the whole of Tibbermore detached No. 1 and so much of Tibbermore detached No. 2 as lies within the municipal boundaries of the burgh of Perth, and to transfer to the parish of Tibbermore that part of Perth parish which lay north of the Scouring Burn and west and north of the west and north burgh boundaries.

The following subjects are affected :—

- (1.) Transferred from the parish of Tibbermore to the parish of Perth.

The subjects are too numerous to particularise, but they consist of all those subjects in the parish of Tibbermore which are entered in the valuation roll of the city of Perth for the year 1890-91. 14.—COUNTY OF FIFE.

I.—COUNTY BOUNDARIES.

The county of Fife contained a detached part of the county of Kinross, consisting of a detached part of the parish of Portmoak. A detached part of the county of Perth, consisting of the parishes of Culross and Tulliallan, lay between the county of Fife and the county of Clackmannan; it formed part of the county of Fife for road administration. There were three parishes situated partly in the county of Fife and partly in other counties, viz., Abernethy, Arngask, and Dunfermline.

The county boundaries have been dealt with as follows:—

A. With the County of Kinross.

1.—DUNFERMLINE.

There was a dispute as to the county to which a part in the extreme north of the parish of Dunfermline belonged. It was claimed by the county of Fife and by the county of Kinross, but of recent years it was assessed as in the county of Kinross. By the Order printed at p. 77 this part of the parish of Dunfermline has been transferred to the parish of Cleish, and has been declared to form part of the county of Kinross.—See County of Kinross, Cleish, &c *infra*, p. 269.

2.—BALLINGRY, KINGLASSIE, AND PORTMOAK.

The detached part of the parish of Portmoak which was also a detached part of the county of Kinross was by the Order printed at p. 76 transferred to the parish of Kinglassie and to the county of Fife. A further alteration on the county boundary has been made by the same Order in conjunction with the Order printed at p. 75. The boundary between the two counties was the old channel of the River Leven. Between the years 1826 and 1836, however, a new channel was made for the river, which is now locally known as the New Cut. By these two Orders the centre of the New Cut was substituted as the county boundary for the centre of the old river channel throughout the whole distance along which that channel was formerly the county boundary. It is understood that by purchase or excambion the New Cut has been substituted for the old channel as an estate march for a considerable part of its course. The districts affected by this change were situated in the parishes of Kinglassie and Portmoak, and in a detached part of the parish of Ballingry (Ballingry detached No. 1). So much of Kinglassie and of Ballingry detached No. 1 as lay north of The Cut have been transferred to the parish of Portmoak and the county of Kinross. The remainder of Ballingry detached No.

1 and those portions of Portmoak which lay to the east of this detached part and to the south of The Cut have been transferred to the parish of Kinglassie and placed wholly in the county of Fife.

The following subjects are affected by this alteration of county boundaries :—

For details see Perth, Abernethy, *supra*, p. 198, and Abernethy, &c., *infra*, p. 256.

3.—CULROSS AND TULLIALLAN.

These two parishes formed one detached part of the county of Perth, bounded on the west by the county of Clackmannan, and on the east by the county of Fife. By the Order printed at p. 45 these parishes were wholly transferred from the county of Fife to the county of Kinross, no change being made on the boundaries of the parishes themselves.

It is impossible to enumerate the subjects transferred in so far as these lie within burgh, or in town or village, but the chief landward subjects will be detailed. The broad statement holds good that every subject in the parish of Culross and every subject in the parish of Tulliallan now forms part of the county of Fife.

5.—ANSTRUTHER-WESTER AND PITTENWEEM.

The parish of Anstruther-Wester had one detached part extending to about an acre, and surrounded by the parish of Pittenweem. The parish of Pittenweem had two detached parts, each containing about an acre, and both surrounded by the parish of Anstruther-Wester. By the Order printed at p. 80 these two parishes were made to exchange their detached parts, and the boundary between the parishes, which was previously badly defined, has been rectified. All the districts affected by this Order lie within the burghs of Anstruther-Wester and Pittenweem, and the subjects are individually of small value. Owing to this fact, and to the uncertainty of the previous boundary between the parishes, it has been found impossible to detail the subjects affected. It is sufficient, however, to draw attention to the new boundary between the parishes. It follows the parliamentary boundary between the burghs of Anstruther-Wester and Pittenweem from the north boundary of Pittenweem parish down to the Pittenweem and Anstruther road. It then strikes east from the parliamentary boundary, running along the centre of this road to its junction with the Chain Road, down which it runs to the sea. All to the west of this new boundary is now in the parish of Pittenweem, and all to the east is in the parish of Anstruther-Wester.

The area transferred from Pittenweem to Anstruther-Wester includes 4 chains of the North British Railway line and a portion of Anstruther Goods Station.

6.—AUCHTERDERRAN, BALLINGRY, KINGLISSIE, AND PORTMOAK.

15.—COUNTY OF KINROSS.

I.—COUNTY BOUNDARIES.

The county of Kinross had one detached part which was at the same time a detached part of the parish of Portmoak. It was surrounded by the county of Fife. There were four parishes situated partly in the county of Kinross and partly in other counties, viz.—Arngask, Dunfermline, Forgandenny, and Fossoway.

The following changes have been made on the county boundaries.

A. With the County of Fife.

1.—DUNFERMLINE.

There was some doubt whether a narrow projecting part at the northern extremity of the parish of Dunfermline was in Fife or in Kinross. By the Order printed at p. 77 this area is declared to form part of the county of Kinross, being transferred to the parish of Cleish, in that county. The county boundary so declared is the south march of the estate of Moreland on the south, and the march between the old parish of Dunfermline and the formerly detached part of the parish of Torryburn on the west.

For subjects transferred, see Cleish, &c., *infra*, p. 269.

2.—PORTMOAK, BALLINGRY, AND KINGLISSIE.

The detached part of the parish of Portmoak, which was at the same time a detached part of the county of Kinross, was by the Order printed at p. 75 transferred to the county of Fife and to the parish of Kinglassie. There has also been effected a rectification of boundaries between the two counties affecting the parishes of Portmoak, Ballingry, and Kinglassie. The result of the Orders dealing with these parishes (printed at p. 76) is to make the new channel of the River Leven (The Cut) the new county boundary from a point about 600 yards east of New Gullet Bridge down to the parish of Leslie.

The subjects affected are detailed above, County of Fife, Ballingry, &c., p. 249.

B. With the County of Perth.

1.—ARNGASK.

The parish of Arngask was situated in three counties—Fife, Kinross, and Perth. No change has been made on the area of the parish, but the whole parish has been placed within the county of Perth by the Order printed at p. 46.

2.—FORGANDENNY.

The parish of Forgandenny was situated partly in the county of Kinross and partly in the county of Perth. By the Order printed at p. 47 the Kinross-shire part of the parish was transferred to the county of Perth (and at the same time transferred along with another portion of the parish to the parish of Forteviot).

3.—FOSSOWAY & TULLIEBOLE.

The parish of Fossoway & Tulliebole was situated partly in the county of Kinross and partly in the county of Perth. By the Order printed at p. 48 the whole of the parish, except the portion lying to the west of the line described in Clause I. of the Order, was placed in the county of Kinross. The excepted portion is retained in Perthshire and annexed to the parish of Glendevon.

By Clause III. of the Order printed at p. 50 the Perthshire portion of the parish of Alloa was transferred to the county of Stirling and to the parish of Logie. It consists of about 4 acres of land situated at Gogar Haugh, and belongs to Mrs. Morries Stirling of Blackgrange.

B. With the County of Stirling.

1.—ALVA.

The parish of Alva formed a detached part of the county of Stirling. By Clause I. of the Order printed at p. 50 the parish was transferred to the county of Clackmannan.

2.—LOGIE.

The parish of Logie was situated partly in the county of Clackmannan, partly in the county of Perth, and partly in the county of Stirling. The Clackmannanshire part of the parish was in three portions. One was in the detached part of the county of Clackmannan situated at Causewayhead; it has been transferred to the county of Stirling, while remaining in the parish of Logie. The second consisted of the Menstrie district, adjoining the parish of Alva; it is retained in Clackmannanshire, but has been transferred from the parish of Logie to the parish of Alva. The third consisted of the Blackgrange property; it is retained in Clackmannanshire, but has been transferred from the parish of Logie to the parish of Alloa. In the case of the last-named portion there is a slight rectification in the county boundary, whereby, instead of running along the centre of the Alloa and Stirling road as previously, it is made to run first along the one side to Gogar Loan and then along the other, thus dividing the road transversely instead of longitudinally between the two counties.

3.—STIRLING.

The parish of Stirling was situated partly in the county of Clackmannan and partly in the county of Stirling. The counties of Clackmannan, Perth, and Stirling each claimed an interest in this parish. All the alterations on the boundaries of the parish are enumerated below (Logie, p. 282), but as between the counties of Clackmannan and Stirling the only change effected is that the portion of the parish of Logie which was included in the detached part of the county of Clackmannan has, by the Order printed at p. 50, been transferred to the county of Stirling. 3.—STIRLING AND ST. NINIANS.

The parish of St. Ninians had three detached parts, all situated within the parliamentary limits of the burgh of Stirling, and all, either wholly or partly, surrounded by the parish of Stirling. In order to adjust the boundaries of the two parishes, certain exchanges of territory have been made, which are fully narrated in the Order printed at p. 87.

(1.) There have been transferred from the parish of St. Ninians to the parish of Stirling—

- (a.) The detached parts of St. Ninians ; (b.) the part of St. Ninians parish situated at Raploch, which lies east of the western parliamentary boundary of the burgh of Stirling ; and (c.) the part of St. Ninians situated at Forthbank, which lies west of the eastern parliamentary boundary of the burgh of Stirling.
- (2.) There have been transferred from the parish of Stirling to the parish of St. Ninians—
- (a) Those portions of Stirling parish which lie on the right bank of the River Forth, and to the east of the eastern parliamentary boundary of the burgh of Stirling ; and (b.) that portion of Stirling parish which lies to the east of the Stirling and St. Ninians Road and of Port Street, and to the south of Craigs Street.

As a large part of the area affected is within burgh, and includes numerous urban subjects, it is impossible to give a complete enumeration of the subjects. It may be desirable, however, to give a complete description of the new boundaries of the parish of Stirling. Commencing at a point on the existing parish boundary in the centre of the old bridge near Bridgehaugh, follow the existing boundary (which is also the burgh parliamentary boundary) up the River Forth to the point at which the old parish boundary and the parliamentary boundary diverge. Continue to follow the parliamentary boundary, first up the River Forth, and then (leaving the river) west and south past Kildean, until the parliamentary boundary intersects the old parish boundary south of the village of Raploch. Thence follow the old parish boundary, first south-west, then south-east, till it reaches the centre of the Stirling and St. Ninians Road. Then let the line run in a northerly direction along the centre of the Stirling and St. Ninians Road to its junction with Craigs Street, thence south-east along the centre of Craigs Street till it again reaches the old parish boundary near Aitken's Mill, then in a southerly and south-easterly direction along the old parish boundary till it again meets the burgh parliamentary boundary. Thence follow the burgh parliamentary boundary north till it again meets the old parish boundary near the Forth. Thence continue along the old parish boundary down the River Forth to the point at Abbey Ford at which the old county boundary continued north while the old parish boundary struck east. Continue down the River Forth along the old county boundary to the point south of West Grange, at which it again met the old parish boundary. Thence strike north-west along the old parish boundary, and follow that boundary till it meets the boundary of St. Ninians detached No. 3. Follow the north boundary of St. Ninians detached No. 3 till it again meets the old boundary of the parish

of Stirling. Thence follow the old parish boundary of Stirling, first north-west and then south-west, till the starting-point is reached.

The following subjects are affected :—

(1.) Transferred from the parish of St. Ninians to the parish of Stirling (all situated within the parliamentary and police boundaries of the burgh of Stirling).

- (a.) The lands of Goosecroft, on the north side of Craigs Street.
- (b.) Parts of the west side of Port Street and of Dumbarton Road, and the whole of Allan Park.
- (c.) The whole of Abbey Road, the farms of Queenhaugh and Shiphaugh, and other subjects, especially portions of the North British, Caledonian, and Forth and Clyde Railways lines, and of the Bridge of Allan Tramways.
- (d.) Land and houses at Raploch and Kildean.
- (e.) Land at Forthbank enclosure No. 346, and parts of enclosures Nos. 347 and 348, as shown on the Ordnance Survey maps.

(2.) Transferred from the parish of Stirling to the parish of St. Ninians.

18.—COUNTY OF DUMBARTON.

There was only one parish, viz., New Kilpatrick, which was situated partly in the county of Dumbarton and partly in another county. The county has a large detached part consisting of the entire parishes of Cumbernauld and Kirkintilloch, but it is provided by section 40 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, that, notwithstanding the provisions of the Act for dealing with detached parts, this detached part shall continue to form part of the county of Dumbarton.

The following is the only change in the county boundary :—

I.—NEW KILPATRICK.

This parish was situated partly in the county of Dumbarton and partly in the county of Stirling. By the Order printed at p. 89 the parish was placed wholly within the county of Dumbarton, no change being made on the parish boundaries. The area thus transferred includes the town of MILNGAVIE, which contains a very large number of subjects of small value, which it would be useless to enumerate. The landward subjects are, however, given below. Every subject in the parish of New Kilpatrick (including every subject in the town of Milngavie) is now in the county of Dumbarton.

2.—KILMALLIE.

The parish of Kilmallie also was situated partly in Argyllshire and partly in Inverness-shire. The Order printed at p. 14, while not placing the parish of Kilmallie wholly in one county, altered the county boundary which runs through that parish. Instead of following as formerly an irregular line through the parish considerably north of Loch Eil, it now runs along the centre of Loch Eil, and from the head of that loch it follows the line, described in the Order, to Loch Sheil. The effect of the Order, therefore, is to transfer a certain area in the parish of Kilmallie from the county of Argyll to the county of Inverness.

3.—SMALL ISLES.

By Clause I. of the Order printed at p. 95 the detached part of the parish was transferred to the parish of East Kilbride, thus remaining in Lanarkshire. By Clause II. of that Order the remainder of the parish of Cathcart was placed wholly in the county of Renfrew. But as this would have caused the boundary between the counties of Lanark and Renfrew to run along the centre of a road (a most inconvenient boundary), the part of that road (the road between Symshill and Croftfoot) which had been thus divided between the parishes of Cathcart and Carmunnock was placed wholly in the parish of Cathcart and in the county of Renfrew.

27.—COUNTY OF BERWICK.

3.—MELROSE.

The parish of Melrose was originally situated entirely in the county of Roxburgh. By Statute, however (30 & 31 Vict., cap. 85, and 39 & 40 Vict., cap. 60), it is secured that whatever part of the parish of Melrose may be at any time included within the police limits of the burgh of Galashiels, shall *ipso facto* become part of the county of Selkirk. A considerable portion of the parish of Melrose was thus placed within the county of Selkirk. By the Order printed at p. 120, so much of Melrose parish as was at the date of the Order situated within the county of Selkirk (*i.e.*, so much of Melrose parish as lay within the burgh of Galashiels) was transferred to the parish of

4.—ROBERTON.

The parish of Robertson was situated partly in the county of Selkirk and partly in the county of Roxburgh. By the Order printed at p. 121 the parish was placed wholly in the county of Roxburgh.

5.—SELKIRK.

The parish of Selkirk was situated partly in the county of Selkirk and partly in the county of Roxburgh. And whereas certain parts of St. Cuthberts parish are, as shown on the Ordnance Survey maps, detached from the main portion of St. Cuthberts parish, *videlicet* :—(1) A part containing 3 acres or thereby, situated at or near Barony Street and surrounded by City of Edinburgh parish; (2) a part containing 0·77 of an acre or thereby, situated at or near Broughton Street and surrounded by City of Edinburgh parish; (3) a part containing 10 acres or thereby, situated at or near St. James Square and surrounded by City of Edinburgh parish; (4) a part containing 0·25 of an acre or thereby, situated at or near Leith Street and surrounded by City of Edinburgh parish; (5) a part containing 0·66 of an acre or thereby, situated at or near Low Calton and adjoining City of Edinburgh parish and a detached part of South Leith parish; (6) a part containing 6 acres or thereby, situated at or near Calton New Burial Ground and adjoining the parishes of Canongate and South Leith; and (7) a part containing 53 acres or thereby, situated at or near Abbeyhill and adjoining the parishes of Canongate and South Leith:

And whereas it appears to us, after communicating with the authorities and others interested, and considering all objections to the terms of our Draft Order thereanent, to be expedient to alter and adjust in manner hereinafter provided the boundaries of the said parishes:

Now therefore we, the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, determine and order as follows:

- I. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, those portions of Canongate parish, of St. Cuthberts parish, and of the parish of South Leith, which are situated within the boundary line herein-after described, shall cease to be part of their respective parishes, and shall form part of City of Edinburgh parish, viz. :—

A line starting from the point in the centre of the street known as North Back of Canongate, to the south of the Burns Monument, at which the boundary between City of Edinburgh parish and the main portion of the parish of South Leith leaves the boundary of Canongate parish, and running first in a northerly direction along the said boundary between City of Edinburgh parish and the parish of South Leith until it intersects the street known as Regent Road, thence in a north-easterly direction along the centre of the last-mentioned street to a point opposite the centre of Regent

Terrace Lane, thence in a northerly direction to and along the centre of the said lane and of Royal Terrace Lane to the north end thereof, and continuing in the same direction as the last-mentioned lane to the centre of the street known as London Road, thence in a generally westerly direction along the centre of the last-mentioned street to the centre of the street known as Leith Walk, and along the centre of the last-mentioned street to a point south-east of the Theatre Royal opposite the head of Broughton Street, thence in a northerly direction to and along the centre of the last-mentioned street, the centre of the street known as Mansfield Place, the centre of the road leading from Mansfield Place to Canonmills, and the centre of the street known as Canonmills to the centre of the bridge crossing the Water of Leith at Canonmills, thence up the *medium filum* of the Water of Leith to the centre of the Dean Bridge, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the Dean Bridge and the centre of the street running along the west side of Randolph Cliff, the west side of Randolph Crescent Gardens, and the west side of Randolph Place, and the centre of Queensferry Street, to its junction with Princes Street, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the last-mentioned street to a point opposite the boundary between St. Cuthberts Burying-ground and West Princes Street Gardens, thence in a southerly direction to and along the said boundary till it reaches the north boundary of the North British Railway line, thence in an easterly direction along the last-mentioned boundary until it meets the boundary of the aforesaid detached part of Canongate parish containing Edinburgh Castle, thence along the northern and eastern boundaries of the said detached part of Canongate parish until it reaches the centre of the street known as Johnston Terrace, thence in a westerly direction along the centre of the last-mentioned street to a point opposite the west end of the block of buildings in the last-mentioned terrace forming the Married Soldiers' Quarters, then in a southerly direction to and along the existing boundary of the said detached part of Canongate parish containing Edinburgh Castle by the west side of the said block of buildings till it reaches the Grassmarket at the junction thereof with the street known as King's Stables Road, thence across the Grassmarket to the north end of the street known as the Vennel, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the last-mentioned street and of the street known as Heriot's Place to the centre of the street known as Lauriston Place, thence in a generally easterly direction along the centre of the streets known as Lauriston Place, Teviot Place, Lothian Street, South College Street, and Drummond Street to the centre of the street known as the Pleasance, thence in a

northerly direction along the centre of the last-mentioned street and the centre of St. Mary Street until it meets the street known as the Canongate, thence across the last-mentioned street to the south end of Cranston Street, thence along the centre of the last-mentioned street and the centre of the road running underneath the North British Railway lines to the centre of the street known as North Back of Canongate, and thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the last-mentioned street to the point from which the said line started.

- II. Subject to the provisions of the said Act the aforesaid detached part of City of Edinburgh parish situated at or near Elm Row, the aforesaid detached part of City of Edinburgh parish situated at or near Maryfield, and so much of the aforesaid detached part of City of Edinburgh parish situated at or near Royal Terrace as is not included within the boundary line described in the first section hereof, shall cease to be part of City of Edinburgh parish and shall form part of South Leith parish; and so much of the remainder of City of Edinburgh parish as is not included within the said boundary line shall cease to be part of City of Edinburgh parish, and shall form part of St. Cuthberts parish.
- III. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the aforesaid detached part of Canongate parish containing Edinburgh Castle as is not included within the boundary line described in the first section hereof shall cease to be part of Canongate parish, and shall form part of St. Cuthberts parish.
- IV. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the aforesaid detached part of the parish of St. Cuthberts situated at or near Calton New Burying-Ground, and the aforesaid detached part of the parish of St. Cuthberts situated at or near Abbeyhill, shall cease to be part of the parish of St. Cuthberts, and shall form part of the parish of Canongate.
- V. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the aforesaid detached part of St. Cuthberts parish situated at Abbeyhill as is within the St. Cuthberts & Dean School District shall cease to be part of that district, and shall form part of the school district of the burgh of Edinburgh, but save as in this section mentioned nothing contained in this Order shall affect the school district of the burgh of Edinburgh, or the powers, duties, and liabilities of the School Board of the burgh of Edinburgh, or the mode of electing the said School Board.
- VI. This Order shall come into operation on the 15th day of May 1892.

It is understood that this Order is unopposed, and merely awaits confirmation by Her Majesty in Council.

Explanation.

The change of boundaries proposed in this Order does not seem to require explanation. Clause I. gives the new boundary of City of Edinburgh parish, which can be easily followed on the six-inch Ordnance maps. That line once discovered, Clause II. is readily understood. Clauses III. and IV. also only require a reference to the six-inch maps.

2.—Draft Order by the Boundary Commissioners dealing with the Burgh of Glasgow, &c.

COUNTIES OF LANARK AND RENFREW.

BURGH AND CITY OF GLASGOW AND BURGH OF RENFREW.

PARISHES OF EASTWOOD, GOVAN, AND RENFREW.

WHEREAS the parish of Govan is situated partly in the county of Lanark and partly in the county of Renfrew :

And whereas the burgh and city of Glasgow is situated partly in the county of Lanark and partly in the county of Renfrew :

And whereas the burgh of Renfrew is situated partly in the county of Lanark and partly in the county of Renfrew, the part in the county of Lanark being situated in the parish of Govan :

And whereas it appears to us, after communicating with the authorities and others interested, to be expedient to alter and adjust the boundaries of the said counties of Lanark and Renfrew, and of the parishes of Eastwood, Govan, and Renfrew in manner hereinafter provided :

Now therefore we, the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, determine and order as follows :

- I. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the parish of Govan and county of Lanark as is situated within the police limits of the burgh of Renfrew shall cease to be part of that parish and of that county, and shall form part of the parish of Renfrew and of the county of Renfrew.
- II. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, that part of the parish of Govan in the county of Renfrew which is bounded on the east by the boundary of the burgh and city of Glasgow as defined by section 4 of the City of Glasgow Act, 1891, on the south by the parish of Eastwood, on the west by the parish of Abbey, and on the north partly by the

- parish of Abbey and partly by the existing boundary between the county of Lanark and the county of Renfrew shall cease to be part of the parish of Govan, and shall form part of the parish of Eastwood.
- III. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the burgh and city of Glasgow (as defined by section 4 of the City of Glasgow Act, 1891) as is situated in the county of Renfrew shall cease to be part of that county, and shall, except as hereinafter provided, form part of the county of Lanark.
 - IV. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, the parish of Govan as altered in area by this Order shall, except as hereinafter provided, be wholly included in and form part of the county of Lanark.
 - V. The present County Councillors for the police burgh of Kinning Park shall cease to act as members of the County Council of Renfrew, and shall, until the next election of a County Council, be additional members of the County Council of Lanark, with all the powers, rights, and duties of County Councillors for a police burgh.
 - VI. For the purposes of Registration of Writs in the Divisions of the General Register of Sasines for Scotland, the following provisions shall take effect:—(a) The portions of the parishes of Cathcart and Eastwood situated within the boundaries of the burgh and city of Glasgow as defined by the City of Glasgow Act, 1891, and transferred by Article III. hereof from the county of Renfrew shall be included in and form part of the county of the barony and regality of Glasgow. (b) The parish of Govan as altered in area by this Order shall, notwithstanding Article IV. hereof, continue to be included in the county of the barony and regality of Glasgow, and the portions of the said parish disjoined therefrom by Articles I. and II. hereof shall cease to be part of the said county of the barony and regality of Glasgow, and shall form part of the county of Renfrew.
 - VII. Nothing herein contained shall affect any action or proceeding instituted, raised, or depending, before any Court, civil or criminal, previous to the date on which this Order comes into operation, and the same may be proceeded with, determined, and followed forth by diligence or otherwise as if this Order had not been made.
 - VIII. All proceedings under the Acts regulating the licensing of public houses in Scotland relative to the granting of licenses to endure for the year beginning at Whitsunday 1892 in any district affected by this Order shall take place before the Magistrates to whose jurisdiction such district is by this Order transferred, and shall be competent to them only.

IX. This Order shall come into operation for the purposes of Article VIII. hereof as soon as confirmed, and for all other purposes on the 15th day of May 1892.

Draft Order, *Edinburgh Gazette* 3d November 1891, p. 1153.

Explanation.

The following are the changes proposed to be made by this Draft Order :—

1. There is a small part of the burgh of Renfrew (the police and the parliamentary boundaries of the burgh being the same) which is situated in the county of Lanark and in the parish of Govan. This small area is proposed to be transferred to the county of Renfrew and to the parish of Renfrew, so that the burgh of Renfrew shall be situated wholly in the county of Renfrew and in the parish of Renfrew. The subjects thus proposed to be transferred are all within burgh. (Clause I. of the Draft Order.)

2. There is a small tongue of the parish of Govan, lying on the north border of the parish of Eastwood, which has been left outside the new boundary of the city of Glasgow. This small tongue is situated in Renfrewshire, and it is proposed to continue it in that county and to transfer it from the parish of Govan to the Renfrewshire parish of Eastwood. (Clause II. of the Order.)

The small area thus transferred consists of—

3. The city of Glasgow as defined by the City of Glasgow Act, 1891, is partly in Lanarkshire and partly in Renfrewshire. Clause III. proposes to put the whole of the extended city in the county of Lanark. The subjects so to be transferred are far too numerous to detail. They are situated partly in the parish of Govan (Polmadie, Strathbungo, Pollokshields, Pollokshields East), partly in the parish of Cathcart (Crosshill, Crossmyloof, Langside, Mount Florida), and partly in the parish of Eastwood (Shawlands). If the proposal contained in the Clause becomes law, it will only be necessary to ascertain whether a subject is within the city of Glasgow in order to discover in what county it is placed. For Registration of Writs in the Register of Sasines all the areas thus transferred will be within the County of the Barony and Regality of Glasgow. (Clause VI.)

4. The effect of the change just described would be to place the parish of Govan wholly in Lanarkshire, with the exception of the police burgh of Kinning Park, which would remain in Renfrewshire. Clause IV. would, however, place the parish wholly in Lanarkshire, and would thus transfer the whole of the police burgh of Kinning Park from Renfrewshire to Lanarkshire.

3.—Draft Order by the Boundary Commissioners dealing with the Counties of Aberdeen and Kincardine, &c.

COUNTIES OF ABERDEEN AND KINCARDINE.

PARISHES OF MARYCULTER AND PETERCULTER.

WHEREAS part of the parish of Peterculter and of the county of Aberdeen, containing 44 acres or thereby, situated on the right bank of the River Dee at or near Inch of Culter, and adjoining the parish of Maryculter in the county of Kincardine, is detached or nearly detached from the main portion of the said parish of Peterculter and of the county of Aberdeen :

And whereas it appears to us, after communicating with the authorities and others interested, to be expedient to deal with the said detached or nearly detached part in manner hereinafter provided :

Now therefore we, the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, determine and order as follows :

I. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, so much of the parish of Peterculter and of the county of Aberdeen as lies to the south of a line drawn down the *medium filum* of the River Dee from the point southwest of Pittengullies at which the boundary between the counties of Aberdeen and Kincardine leaves the *medium filum* of the said river, till the said line again reaches the last-mentioned boundary, (being the aforesaid detached or nearly detached part of the parish of Peterculter and of the county of Aberdeen) shall cease to be part of the said parish and county and shall form part of the parish of Maryculter and the county of Kincardine.

II. This Order shall come into operation on the 15th day of May 1892.

Draft Order, *Edinburgh Gazette* 11th December 1891, p. 1355.

Explanation.

The area proposed to be affected by this Draft Order is a small part of the county of Aberdeen (parish of Peterculter) which lies south of the River Dee at Inch of Culter. If the proposal is carried out the following subjects will be transferred from the county of Aberdeen to the county of Kincardine (and at the same time from the parish of Peterculter to the parish of Maryculter) :—

4.—City of Aberdeen, Counties of Aberdeen and Kincardine, Parishes of Aberdeen and Nigg.

By the City of Aberdeen Act, 1891, the city of Aberdeen is made to embrace a portion of the county of Kincardine and of the parish of Nigg situated at Torry. It has been suggested as desirable that the city of Aberdeen should be placed wholly in the county of Aberdeen, by transferring this portion of the parish of Nigg from the county of Kincardine to the county of Aberdeen. No decision is known to have been come to by the Commissioners. The proposal may take either of two forms—(1.) It may simply declare that so much of the county of Kincardine as is included within the limits of the city of Aberdeen shall cease to be part of that county and shall form part of the county of Aberdeen; or (2) it might in addition declare that the area so transferred (being part of the parish of Nigg) shall cease to be part of the parish of Nigg, and shall form part of the parish of Aberdeen. In both cases the area dealt with is the same. The first has the effect of placing the parish of Nigg partly in two counties, while the second remedies this and makes the county and parish boundaries coincide. The area simply consists of that part of the city of Aberdeen which lies south of the River Dee.

SECOND APPENDIX.

Registration of Certain Writs (Scotland) Act, 1891 (54 & 55 Vict. cap. 9).

An Act to make provisions in regard to the Registration of certain Writs in the Divisions of the General Register of Sasines for Scotland.—[11th May 1891.]

WHEREAS the alterations of the boundaries of certain counties made by orders of the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland in pursuance of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, will affect the registration of writs in the appropriate divisions of the General Register of Sasines for Scotland, and such orders will, unless Parliament shall otherwise determine, come into operation on or before the fifteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one :

And whereas certain of said orders have received and others await confirmation as provided in the recited Act :

And whereas it is expedient that for the purposes of registration as aforesaid the coming into operation of all such orders should be postponed to a date which may be applicable to all orders made or to be made by the said Commissioners :

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

I. With respect to the registration of writs in the General Register of Sasines for Scotland, the following provisions shall have effect, that is to say :—

- (1.) The orders of the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland made or to be made in pursuance of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, notwithstanding the dates specified in such orders respectively, and notwithstanding the confirmation of any of such orders as provided in the recited Act,¹ shall, for the purpose of regulating the registration of writs in the appropriate divisions of the General Register of Sasines for Scotland, and for that purpose only, come into operation on but not before the fifteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two :

- (2.) It shall not be necessary that separate divisions of the General Register of Sasines be kept for the counties of Orkney and Zetland : ²
 - (3.) All enactments in this or any other Act and anything done thereunder affecting the registration of writs relating to any lands in Scotland shall be deemed and taken to apply to the registration of writs relating to the teinds of such lands : ³
 - (4.) Nothing contained in this Act shall invalidate any writ recorded in the General Register of Sasines for Scotland before the passing of this Act, or affect injuriously any rights depending on such writs, or, except in so far as herein expressly provided, interfere with the operation of any order of the said Commissioners.

II. This Act may be cited for all purposes as the Registration of Short title. Certain Writs (Scotland) Act, 1891.

THIRD APPENDIX.

MEMORANDUM as to the effect on the Settlement of Paupers of Orders of the Boundary Commissioners.

In view of the decision of the Court of Session on 17th July 1891, in Special Case, "The Parochial Board of Borthwick v. The Parochial Board of Temple," and in view of the different opinions held regarding the effect of Orders of the Boundary Commissioners on parochial settlement, the Commissioners think it right to state for the guidance of Parochial Boards the principles which, in their opinion, would govern the decision of such questions if no financial adjustment were made under section 50 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889.

These principles are as follows :—

For the purposes of the law relating to the settlement of paupers, where an area has been transferred by an Order of the Commissioners from the parish of A to the parish of B, birth in that area prior to the date of transference will be deemed birth in parish A, and birth in that area on or after the date of transference will be deemed birth in parish B. Similarly, residence in that area prior to the date of transference will be deemed residence in parish A, and residence in that area on or after the date of transference will be deemed residence in parish B.

Thus, supposing the district of O to have been transferred from the parish of A to the parish of B at 15th May 1891, we have the following results :—

1. All persons born in O prior to 15th May 1891 have a birth settlement in the parish of A.
2. All persons born in O on or after 15th May 1891 have a birth settlement in the parish of B.
3. All persons residing in O who at 15th May 1891 had a settlement by residence in the parish of A retain that settlement until they have lost it by non-residence for the statutory period within the parish of A as altered in area. Take the case of a person who has resided in O since 1881, and continues to reside there till 1899. At 15th May 1891 such a person had a residential settlement in the parish of A. He will retain that settlement until 16th May 1895.

He will then lose it and his birth settlement will revive. But on 15th May 1896 he will have acquired a residential settlement in the parish of B.

It is hardly necessary to state that an Order of the Commissioners does nothing to transfer liability for paupers chargeable at the date of the transference effected by the Order. These are existing liabilities which may be dealt with under section 50 of the Act.

The Commissioners intend that, as a general rule, the principles above explained should form the basis of their awards, and they think it well that Parochial Boards desiring the intervention of the Commissioners under section 50 of the Act should have this in view in preparing their claims.
