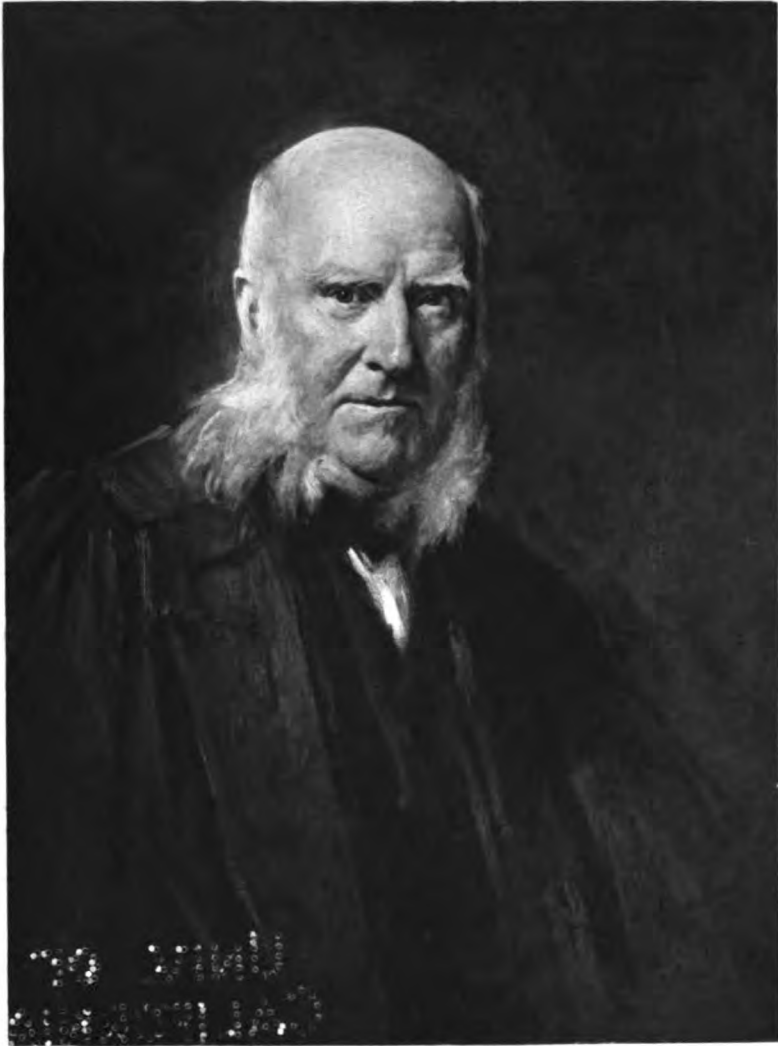

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INTRODUCTION.

THE laws of Scotland are founded upon the *Regiam Majestatem*, a book believed by many to have been compiled by the order of King David I. [1124-1153]. It was the only ancient written law of the country, but its powers seem to have had little impression on the populace, for it is recorded two-and-a-half centuries later that—"In those days there was no law in Scotland, but the strong oppressed the weak, and the whole kingdom was one den of thieves. Homicides, robberies, fire-raising and other misdeeds remained unpunished, and justice seemed banished beyond the kingdom's bounds."¹ For a lengthened period a keen rivalry existed between the civil and ecclesiastical judges. The Scottish kings, from William the Lion to Alexander III., vigorously supported the former, but the powers of the latter in the Bishop's, and subsequently in the Consistorial, or Commissary, Court, were considerable. The Bishop, or his "official, was the only judge in matters of status—legitimacy, bastardy, divorce. He was kind enough to take charge of the affairs of widows, orphans, and all *personae miserabiles*, all questions of slander, all disputes between churchmen, the whole management of Notaries Public, questions arising upon covenant when the covenant was sanctioned by an oath, the large class of business connected with wills, testaments, probates, executry—in a word, of all moveable succession, and perhaps of succession in heritage, for there was a time when Scotch heritage could be left by will . . ."

Regard must also be had to "the business brought into their Courts by consent of parties, and add to that all the influence of all the Notaries, the largest class of 'men of business,' as we call them, and who were all churchmen, or dependents of churchmen, and so preferring the ecclesiastical courts."¹

James I. got Parliament to pass a number of enactments, and these and posterior provisions gradually superseded the *Regiam* referred to. Generally the law of Scotland strongly resembles that of England in regard to those branches which have either been created or greatly extended through the progress of modern civilization. Trial by jury in civil cases, and many of the most important parts of mercantile and maritime law, though differing considerably in form, are substantially English.

In early times litigants were accustomed to appear in Court in *propria persona*, but an altered system obtained towards the close of the fifteenth century, when the personal attendance of the parties to civil actions was dispensed with, excepting "when the proceedings might result in the defender being declared infamous." In ordinary cases parties were permitted to appear by a representative or substitute, called a *procurator*, who had been formally appointed "to win or tyne the cause." The term "procurator" was at first held to be sufficiently wide in its meaning to include "any one patron or friend, to whom a litigant committed the management of the proceedings in an action."

Lord Bankton expresses the view that prior to the institution of the present Court of Session in 1532 there were "no advocates licensed by public authority." As Sheriff Begg remarks,² how-

ever, we “know that long before that date the forms of civil jurisdiction were so complicated and the proceedings so technical as to render it very difficult for a non-professional person to conduct his own cause. Moreover, as far back as our statutes and the extant records of our temporal courts extend, we find numerous references to *forspekars* or *forespeakers* (*prolocutores* or *prælocutores*) and *advocates*, terms which seem to have been used as synonymous.” The following provision of a statute passed by James I. in 1424, seems to recognise the persons so designated as professional pleaders :—

Ande gif thar be ony pure creature that for defalt of cunnyng or dispense can not or may not folow his cause, the king for the lufe of God sall ordain that the Juge before quham the cause suld be determyt purvay and get a lele and a wyse advocate to folow sic pure creatures cause. And gif sic cause be obtenyt the wranger sall assyth bath the party scathit and the advocates costes and travale.

A fire unfortunately took place in the office of the Commissary Clerk of Aberdeenshire, at Aberdeen, in October, 1721 (September, 1719, according to the Society's first Crown Charter), when the documents and books which would doubtless have disclosed the date of the formation of the Society, were destroyed. Sufficient writs remain, however, to show that by the middle of the sixteenth century the procurators (or advocates as they were then frequently designated) in practice in Aberdeen acted in concert for the defence of their interests as well as for the maintenance of the dignity and standing of their profession. Only those of good character, education and ability were admitted as members, and applicants for admission have several times been rejected as unsuitable on one or other of those heads. The following Golden Rules for professional conduct were adjusted and subscribed by the sixteen members composing the Society in January, 1764, the eight members next admitted

being also required to subscribe in acquiescence :—

1. To act without fraud or dissimulation.
2. To be lovers of peace, and bridle the passions.
3. To be haters of chicane and unnecessary contention.
4. To lose no opportunity of doing good.
5. To show mercy and compassion to all in distress.
6. To relieve the distressed and oppressed.
7. To do charitable actions to the poor.
8. To plead the cause of the widow and fatherless.
9. To be bountiful.
10. To avoid covetousness.
11. To examine well in the beginning that the cause we take in hand (we have reason to believe) is just ; at least that it is not obviously unjust.
12. To be ever willing to take up with reasonable terms.
13. To study and practise humanity, material equity, strict honour and integrity.
14. To avoid calumnys, dissension, and fomenting of pleas.
15. Not to support wrong nor combine with knaves.
16. To despise bribery and corruption.
17. To avoid rash swearing and perjury and tampering with witnesses.
18. We should not promise too much, nor say and gainsay.
19. To avoid hypocrisy and not pretend law, and preach up religion, at same time trampling on both.
20. To be very cautious in accepting of Trusts, and only on just considerations ; and to execute the same with honour, and candour, without extravagant and unjust exactions, or taking advantage of the necessitys of those concerned.
21. To avoid buying up of law pleas or controverted claims.
22. To avoid encouraging Bankrupt Debtors to defraud their just and lawfull Creditors.
23. Men of liberal professions should not deal in illiberal practices ; particularly to abstain from sordidness about their fees ; employing the first qualitys of the mind and chief virtues of the heart.

Many hold that the Society was not formed till October, 1633, and as evidence they cite the following order passed by Sheriff Principal Thomas Crombie :—

(2 Octr 1633)

The quhilk day the Shref Principall forsaid causit call and convey befor him the persones particularlie following quha ar the ordinar advocates and procuratores of this judicatorie and hes bein in use to procur in all causes They ar to say Mr. Alexr Irwing Mr. Williame Barclay Mr. Williame Lumsden Mr. James Irwing Mr. Alexander Davidson Mr. George Andersone Mr. Alexander Reid Mr. Alexander Paip Mr. Robert Reid Alexander Thomsone Mr. Alexr. Gardyn George Middiltoun Williame Cordoner John Hunter Mr. Andrew Clerk and George Merser Quhilkis persones being all personallie present and the Shreff understanding of thair abilitie honestie and judgement to continow as memberis ordinar advocates and procuratores of this seat The said Shreff be wertew of his office and autoritie Resaiwit and Admittit them and everie ane of them to that place and priviledge and causit them all to be solemlie sworne for thair dew obedience and reverence to the seat and for faithfull and trew using and discharging of thair place and charge and for obseruing of sick guid and laudabill lawes actes statutes and ordinances as sould be sett down and prescrywit And farther the said Shref Declairit and Ordainit and expreslie dischargit all uther persones quhatsumewir of all libertie or priviledge to compeir or procur befor the Shref or his deputtis at any tyme heireftir in quhatsumewir caus or to tak upon them to be advocates or procuratores except they be first lauchfullie admittit be the Shreff and his license and libertie purchessit giwin and grantit to that effect. ¹

Crombie, who was laird of Kemnay, a Writer to the Signet, Member of Parliament, and a Privy Councillor, proved a zealous Sheriff as well as a stickler for etiquette. The date of his appointment as Sheriff is not recorded, but he issued no orders prior to August, 1633, two months before the date of the above record of his first meeting with the Aberdeen bar. The clause, "the Shreff understanding of thair abilitie honestie and judgement to continow as memberis ordinar advocates and procuratores of this seat," clearly proves that 1633 was not the date of the origin of the combination or Society.

In the petition presented to the Sheriff Principal and his Deputies on 7th October, 1656, by Andrew Thomson, "nottar publick in Aberdeen," the crave is submitted that his lordship may, "with the advice and consent of the procurators of his judicatory, admit the petitioner to be an ordinary procurator before the samen judicatory." The same procedure was gone through until a comparatively recent date, followed before admission by the administration by the Sheriff to the applicant of the oath *de fidei*.

Commentaries of doubtful compliment have sometimes been made on the Society and its members. Thus James Gregory, writing in 1804, uses the following sentence—"My dear countrymen, the Aberdonians, have long been known to be very sharp folks—so very sharp that it has been estimated that if their attornies (whom they sometimes call advocates, sometimes proctors, sometimes solicitors) were allowed to practise in London, they would in seven years have the fee simple of the whole of the county of Middlesex." Sir Walter Scott in his "Diary," under date 14th March, 1826, has—"Some lawyer expressed to Lord Elibank an opinion, that at the Union the English law should have been extended all over Scotland. 'I cannot say how that might have answered our purpose,' said Lord Patrick, who was never non-suited for want of an answer, 'but it would scarce have suited *yours*, since by this time the *Aberdeen Advocates* would have possessed themselves of all the business in Westminster Hall." Lockhart, who gives the Scott "Memoirs" to the public, sneeringly remarks in a footnote, that "The *Attorneys* of the town of Aberdeen are styled *Advocates*. This valuable privilege is said to have been bestowed at an early period by some (sportive) monarch." As a variant, Robertson, in his "Book of Bon-Accord," p. 209, remarks—"On the north side of the Court house is a chamber set apart

for the meetings of The Society of Advocates. By this title (generally confined to the highest branch of the profession) the practitioners in the courts of the shire and burgh have been distinguished for more than two hundred and seventy years: by what authority it was assumed is unknown, but tradition ascribes its origin to a grant by James VI., in gratitude for a sum of money advanced by the procurators to his needy majesty."

It was probably on 30th July, 1685, that the scheme originated in the Society for a fund from which the widows and orphans of members might be relieved. It has been well managed, enabling widows to receive an annuity of £70. From a separate general fund decayed members are granted generous allowances according to individual circumstances.

The Society has been honoured by the conferment of three separate Crown Charters, dated 27th January, 1774, 20th February, 1799, and 13th May, 1862, respectively. Full copies are given on pp. 1 to 51.

The most cursory perusal of the following pages cannot fail to impress the reader with the important part played by members of the Society in the general affairs of the city and county of Aberdeen, as well as those of adjacent counties. Gratuitous services of an onerous character, frequently involving professional responsibility and monetary expenditure, seem to have been ungrudgingly rendered, and if rewards were few and appreciation sometimes slight, there can be no doubt that those services materially aided in bringing the North-east of Scotland to its present high standard in educational, commercial and military affairs.

Of the six hundred and thirteen individual members admitted since 1549 three fell in battle—Alexander Reid and Robert Reid at the Crabstone on 13th September, 1644, and Francis Gordon while fighting under the French flag before September, 1748.

The last named supported the disastrous cause of Prince Charlie, went out with Lord Lewis Gordon, and acted as "General Quarter Master to the Rebels." In consequence he was refused a pardon. James Duff was present at the skirmish at Inverurie on 3rd December, 1745, for which he escaped subsequent punishment doubtless through his then being only 16 years of age, and having only newly entered upon his legal apprenticeship. James Petrie read the Pretender's Proclamation at the Market Cross, "assisted the Rebels in all their meetings at Aberdeen," and "levyed money" on their behalf. John Hutcheon aided in guarding Napoleon Bonaparte as a prisoner at St. Helena. Eighty-seven have been officers in Militia, Volunteer or Territorial forces, many serving as privates as a stimulus to other young men to do likewise. Two became clergymen—David Gordon and William Humphrey. Thomas Burnett was Purse Bearer to the Lord High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Four became Lord Provosts of Aberdeen—John Cheyne, James Blaikie, Sir Alexander Anderson and John Webster, Jun. In 1853 no fewer than three of the four city baillieships were held by advocates—Messrs. Alexander Henderson, Robert Ledingham and William Ross. Of Provosts of Old Aberdeen were James Scougal and David Robert Morice, while David Littlejohn was for several years Chief Magistrate of Woodside. John Cheyne was M.P. for the burgh of Aberdeen in the Scottish Parliament, Robert Lumsden was representative at the Convention of Estates, and John Webster, Jun., was representative in the Imperial Parliament. James Scougal was M.P. for the burgh of Kintore in the Scottish Parliament. Upwards of one hundred and forty became proprietors of estates of varying size and value, and several proved such improving landlords "as to call forth the marked approbation of the Highland and

Agricultural Society, and the admiration of all practically acquainted with such enterprise."

Of professional appointments, fifteen accepted office as professors or lecturers, forty-six became Sheriffs, Sheriffs-Depute, Sheriffs-Substitute or Honorary Sheriffs-Substitute at Aberdeen, whilst of those who were appointed Sheriffs-Substitute of outside jurisdictions were—George Forbes, Banffshire, Patrick Forsyth, Kincardineshire, Hugh Fullerton, Kincardineshire, John Law, Sutherlandshire, Thomas Mackenzie, Sutherland, Ross and Cromarty, Andrew Robertson, Forfarshire, and James Strachan, Kincardineshire. James Scougal became a senator of the College of Justice under the title of Lord Whitehill. Twenty-six were Procurators Fiscal, and fourteen were Sheriff Clerks of Aberdeenshire. Eight were Town Clerks of Aberdeen, while several held similar appointments for other Royal Burghs in the district.

James Scougal was a member of the Faculty of Advocates, as was Clements Lumsden of the Society of Writers to H.M. Signet. Three others became members of the Society of Solicitors in the Supreme Court—Messrs. Robert Collie Gray, James Ross and James Watson.

In the field of Literature the output by the members is very creditable. William Kennedy stands unexcelled as a local annalist, his MS. List of Members of the Society, and List of Apprentices, forming the groundwork of a large number of the individual records in this volume. The works of Dr. Grub, Dr. Littlejohn and Dr. John Stuart are of outstanding merit in expiscating the religious, commercial, agricultural and general life of past times. The lighter side had a votary in Charles Winchester. The Muse was courted by Norval Clyne and Alexander Gardyne. Heraldry had a careful exponent in Peter Duguid, Banking in George Walker, Genealogy as well

as local Territorial History in George Cadenhead, and statistical details and general themes in Alexander Emslie Smith. English Word Study, Bibliography, and ancient northern history have each been dealt with by Hugh Fraser Campbell, as has Physical Culture and System of Musical Drill by George Cruden. Editions of Marischal College Arts Class Records were carefully edited by Patrick H. Chalmers, F. T. Garden, Harvey Hall, and T. A. W. A. Youngson, while John Buckley Allan and William Garden were editors of Records of a similar character in connection with Aberdeen University. Nor have legal works been forgotten—George Duncan, W. D. Esslemont, J. T. Jeffrey, D. R. Morice, David Reith, A. M. Williamson, and R. M. Williamson having each written on different phases of Scottish Law.

The Continuity Table given in the Appendix shows that seventy-four members followed in the footsteps of their father; seventeen in those of their father and grandfather, while Arthur David Morice followed the footsteps of his father, grandfather, and great-grandfather.

The following remarks by the late Sheriff Comrie Thomson, when he met the members in the Library on 7th May, 1883, express with clearness an opinion shared in by all those knowing the inner working of the Society :—

I have the privilege of looking back upon more than seventeen years of invaluable assistance, of loyal support, of unvarying kindness at your hands. I take this Resolution and this meeting rather as the articulate expression of a feeling to which your constant demeanour during the time that I have been with you, has borne perhaps a more silent but a not less certain testimony. Gentlemen, it is always a fortunate circumstance for a professional man to gain the goodwill, not only of the public, but of his professional brethren. The latter know about his work, they see it, they appreciate its difficulties and its dangers, and I may say it is their business to regard it with a critical eye. But such an opinion on the part of one's professional friends is greatly enhanced when it is given expression to by a body of lawyers whom the whole opinion of

the country regards as amongst the foremost in the legal profession. Your kindly sentiments, however, are not the only, or indeed the principal ground upon which I feel myself indebted to you. I have had occasion more than once . . . to say how much the labours of the bench in this Sheriff Court are lightened by the assistance of the bar. I repeat that statement now, and I am sure that I am not using the language of exaggeration when I say that in every case where it is necessary to disentangle a mass of evidence or to disinter a body of authority, more than half of the work has been done for the bench at the hand of the members of the bar who were engaged in the case. . . .

I . . . cannot help recalling the day when I first stood here among you, nor can I fail to remember those who then surrounded me . . . Mr. Newell Burnett, who then was your President, gave me a cordial welcome. Mr. Stronach, Mr. Chalmers, and Mr. Angus, with their courtly gracefulness, which took one back to an age of which one had read, but which one was too young to have seen, — these have gone, but have left us an example of high honour, and of gentle manners. But there remain of that worthy company not a few, among whom I may be allowed to specify yourself, Sir (Mr. John Smith, Jun., President), my esteemed friend the Treasurer of the Society (Mr. William Yeats), Sir Alexander Anderson, Mr. Murray, Dr. Grub, Dr. Edmond, and the honourable gentleman who with such distinction fills the office of Member of Parliament for this city (Dr. John Webster). I venture to assure you, Gentlemen, that the influence of such men is not lost. I see the effect on those who have been joining the ranks of your body from year to year . . .

It was formerly customary for the members to dine together on the evening of the Annual Meeting of the Society in November. Prominent gentlemen of the city and county were invited as guests, and the proceedings were wont to pass off with *eclat*. Through the courtesy of Dr. Littlejohn, the Toast List of one of these functions—that of 27th November, 1838—is here given:—

ROYAL CHARTER erecting the Society of Procurators in Aberdeen into
a Body Politic, dated 27th January, 1774.

GEORGE, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, France and Ireland,

WHEREAS We considering that Thomas Mosman, John Clark, David

John Durno, Alexander Carnegie and Arthur Dingwall Fordyce, Procurators in
Aberdeen, have humbly represented to us by their Petition that the City of

Aberdeen, on account of its size, business and population is the chief City in Scotland north of the river Forth, that in that City, besides the Courts of its own jurisdiction as a Royal Burgh, the Courts of the Sheriff and Commissary are held, the jurisdiction whereof extends through a spacious and cultivated region, in which lie several royal burghs and many great market towns, that the Procurators admitted by and acting in those Courts have carried on business from the earliest times as a Society, called or known by the name of the President and Society of Procurators in Aberdeen, and have by regular yearly contributions among themselves promoted and established a very large fund for the maintenance of the decayed members of the said Society and the Widows, Children and other relations of the Members falling into poverty; that, although the said Petitioners have carried on business as Procurators in Aberdeen beyond the memory of man under the name of a Society, nevertheless through the loss of all their writs and evidents, which perished when the office of the Commissary of Aberdeen was burned in the year 1719, they cannot with certainty discover their first constitution or the nature of their Society so that they can safely manage their funds and other affairs—Therefore the said Petitioners, for the removing of these incon-

veniences and for the better preservation of the said Society, humbly prayed Us to grant to them Our Royal Charter for of new incorporating them and their successors by the name, style, and title of the President and Society of Procurators in Aberdeen, with such powers, privileges, rules, and provisions as are usually given to bodies politic and corporate of the like nature and as to us should seem proper, that We, weighing in Our mind the said Petition and desiring to give all due encouragement to so useful and pious an institution, in terms of the said petition and by virtue of Our Royal prerogative and out of Our special grace, certain knowledge, and mere motion, Have Granted, Constituted, Declared and Ordained, likeas We by the tenor of these presents Give, Constitute, Declare and Ordain, that the said Thomas Mosman, John Clark, David Bartlet, Alexander Innes Senior, Alexander Innes Junior, Dr. William Thom, William Nicol, John Gordon, William Burnett, Alexander Lumsden, James Ramsay, Alexander Duthie, David Morice, James Watson, Charles Tait, John Durno, Alexander Carnegie and Arthur Dingwall Fordyce, and such other persons as shall first have been duly admitted Procurators in the Sheriff and Commissary Courts of Aberdeen, and

shall have contributed to the funds of the Society in manner aftermentioned, shall be a corporation and body corporate and politic by the name and title of the President and Society of Procurators in Aberdeen, and that they and their successors shall henceforth have perpetual succession for the better and more effectual managing, directing, ordaining, and appointing all matters and affairs pertaining to the said Society and the funds belonging to the same, and We for the purposes foresaid Make, Erect, Create, Constitute and Appoint, the said Thomas Mosman [and others] and such other persons as shall first have been duly admitted Procurators in the Sheriff and Commissary Courts of Aberdeen, and should have contributed to the funds of the Society in manner aftermentioned, into a corporation and body politic and corporate forever by the name and title of the President and Society of Procurators in Aberdeen, with power to them or the major part of them of administering, directing, ordaining and appointing in all matters and affairs pertaining and belonging to the said Society its administra-

tion, estates, funds and other matters and affairs: And that the said Corporation by the name and title foresaid shall have full power, and be capable according to law, of having, purchasing, accepting, holding, possessing, enjoying, and retaining in perpetuity or otherwise lands, tenements, or heritages of whatever kind or nature (provided always that the free annual rental of the lands, tenements, and heritages to be so acquired, or which have already been acquired, to and for the use of the said Society shall not exceed the sum of £500 Sterling the rents being severally computed as they were at the time of acquiring the same, all feu-duties, ground rents, minister's stipends and other public burdens whatsoever having been deducted), And also of lending money at interest on heritable or personal securities, of holding goods and chattels, and of receiving and holding donations and legacies for the purposes aforesaid, and in like manner of selling, pledging, and wadsetting any of the lands, tenements, or heritable subjects already purchased or to be acquired for the use of the said Society, or which at any future time shall be purchased and acquired by the said Corporation, and of giving and granting leases and tacks of the said lands, tenements and other heritable subjects and

giving the same in feu by way of perpetual lease for a competent feu-duty: And likewise under the name and title foresaid it shall be lawful to raise and carry on actions, and sue and be sued, in whatever courts and places and before whatever judges, justiciaries and other officers in all actions, disputes, causes, complaints, matters, suits, and demands whatsoever in such mode and form as shall be lawful to any other of our subjects or to any other body politic or corporate, And also that there shall be a Common Seal to the said Corporation for all the business and affairs of them and their successors, and it shall be lawful to them and their successors from time to time to break, change, or renew the said Seal as to them or the major part of them shall seem expedient, which Seal shall be kept by their Treasurer, who shall attend with the same at all their meetings wherein it shall be necessary, or shall cause it to be present; and We for Us and Our heirs and successors direct, ordain and appoint, that every year two general meetings of the said Corporation shall be held, one on the last Tuesday of the month of June, and the other on the last Tuesday of the month of November, at such place or places and hour or hours as the President and Society from time

to time shall appoint, with the power of adjournment as to the said general meeting shall seem expedient; and that the first general meeting of the said Society shall be held on the 28th day of June 1774, between the hours of 11 and 12 of the same day, in the usual place in which the members of the said Society are generally accustomed to hold their meetings: And We also Grant and Declare that the said Thomas Mosman [and others] should be the first members of the said Corporation, and that the President and Members in the said general meeting in the month of November shall have full power and authority to elect a President, Treasurer and other necessary Officers for the ensuing year, and also to appoint a Committee of five of their number who shall be a permanent Council, with whom the Treasurer shall consult and deliberate in the usual administration of the funds of the said Corporation with power of adjournment as to them shall seem expedient: And We Grant power and authority to the President of the said Corporation for the time being at his

pleasure, or as often as their affairs shall require it, to call meetings of the said Society on twenty-four hours notice given to the other members : and that the said President shall have the right of presiding at all meetings of the said Corporation, and of having a deliberative as well as a casting vote on every question when there shall be an equality of the votes of the members present, provided nevertheless that the President shall not have a negative voice against calling a meeting of the Society, but in his absence, or on his refusal so to call a meeting, it shall be lawful to any five or more members of the said Corporation consenting for that end to call a meeting *pro re nata* on twenty-four hours notice given to the other members as aforesaid, and that such meeting shall have power to elect a President *pro re nata*, and to proceed and resolve on all business and affairs of the Corporation which shall be submitted to them in the same way as if the annual President had attended and presided at such meeting : And We Ordain, Direct, and Appoint that it shall not be in the power of the President and Members of the said Corporation or their successors to expend any more or greater sum or sums of money in charity within a year than the free annual produce and revenue of the estates and securities belonging to the

said Corporation and the current collections, subscriptions, and donations of that year (all burdens being deducted therefrom) together with the overplus of previous years, shall yield and produce however much may seem to be necessary for the established charities of the Society, and that the property and principal sums which form the sums of the said Corporation shall remain whole and entire for ever after for the benefit thereof; and that the division of the said free produce and revenue shall be limited and made allendarly among the poor and indigent Members of the said Society, and their Widows, and among the indigent Children and Grand-children of poor Members, before all others, and in the order of preference above set forth: And, failing such poor persons, among the indigent brothers and sisters of any deceased Member of the said Society and their children, in the same order, and that such division shall only be made at the stated general meetings of the said Society; And that an annual account of the property and funds of the said Corporation, and the money received and expended by the Treasurer, shall be prepared and produced in presence of the general meeting in the month of November, for examination and approval, and that the books and accounts thereof shall be exhibited at every meeting for

the inspection of the President and other members of the said Corporation: And We further Will and Declare that no one shall have right or be entitled to become a member of the said Society and Corporation, unless he shall first have been duly admitted a Procurator in the Sheriff and Commissary Courts of Aberdeen according to the usual form and practice in such cases, and have been received by the Society, and have contributed to the funds of the said Society the usual fees of admission, or shall have paid whatever else shall have been fixed and appointed to be received by any ordinance or byelaw of the said Society to be made for that purpose (the said fees never exceeding the sum of £30 Sterling for the admission of any member), and, when any Member shall be admitted into the said Corporation, his name shall be inserted in a Register to be kept for that purpose, and he shall remain and continue a Member so long as he shall continue to be taxed and pay the yearly contributions of the said Society, or such yearly contributions as shall be afterwards appointed and ordained to be received from the members of the said Corporation by any Ordinance or Bye-law to be made at their discretion (the same never exceeding the sum of 20/- sterling for any Member): And We for Us and Our Heirs and

Successors Give and Grant to the said President and Members of the said Corporation and their successors assembled in general meeting from time to time full power and authority to constitute, ordain, and make such and so many Bye-Laws, Constitutions, Rules, and Ordinances as shall appear proper and necessary to them or the major part of them then and there present for the better administration and direction of the said Corporation, and to alter and rescind the said Bye-Laws, Constitutions, Ordinances, and Rules or any of them, as to the said President and Members so assembled or the major part of them then present shall appear necessary : And We will that all and sundry such Bye-Laws, Statutes, Rules, and Ordinances to be made in manner foresaid be duly observed and kept, provided that such laws are not contrary or repugnant in any manner to the laws of this Kingdom and the tenor of the said Charter,— And that the said Bye-Laws, Statutes, Rules, and Ordinances to be imposed from time to time or any repeal or alteration of them, or any of them, shall be agreed to, constituted, and confirmed by a general meeting of the said President and Members to be called and held soon after the meeting at which the same are made. And moreover We out of Our special grace, certain knowledge, and mere

GREETING :

WHEREAS We considering that in the year Seventeen hundred and seventy-four certain persons, Procurators in Aberdeen, humbly represented to Us by their petition that the City of Aberdeen, on account of its size, business, and population, was the chief City in Scotland north of the river Forth, that in that City, besides the Courts of its own jurisdiction as a Royal Burgh, the Courts of the Sheriff and Commissary were held, the jurisdiction whereof extended through a spacious and cultivated region, in which lay several royal burghs and many great market towns, that the Procurators admitted by and acting in those Courts carried on business from the earliest times as a Society

Therefore the said Petitioners, for the removing of these inconveniences and for the better preservation of the said Society, humbly prayed Us to grant to them Our Royal Charter for of new incorporating them and their successors by the name, style and title of the President and Society of Procurators in Aberdeen, with such powers, privileges, rules, and provisions as are usually given to bodies politic and corporate of the like nature, and as to Us in Our great wisdom should

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, QUEEN, Defender of the Faith, To all to whom these presents shall come, GREETING :

WHEREAS WE, CONSIDERING that a humble Petition has been presented to us by, and on behalf of, "The President and Society of Advocates in Aberdeen," setting forth, That by Charter or Letters Patent, bearing date the 27th day of January, in the year 1774, His Majesty King George the Third, incorporated certain persons therein named, all of whom were Procurators before the Sheriff and Commissary Courts of Aberdeen, and such other persons as should first be duly admitted Procurators in these Courts, and should contribute to the Funds of the Society in manner therein mentioned, into a Body Politic and Corporate, under the name and title of "The President and Society of

“The President and Society of Procurators in Aberdeen”), cum diversis potestatibus prout in eadem Carta expressis, et cum potestatibus inter alias emendi et tenendi terras integri annui valoris tempore emptionis, post faciendam deductionem prout in dicta Carta exprimitur, quingentas libras Sterlinenses non excedentis: Et quod per aliam Cartam vel Literas Patentes, de data vigesimo die mensis Februarii anno Domini millesimo Septingentesimo nonogesimo nono, dictus serenissimus noster avus Georgius Tertius Corroboravit et Confirmavit omnia privilegia potestates et jura, quæ dictæ Societati concessa fuerant per dictam Cartam supra recitatam, nisi in tantum eadem mutata per Cartam nunc recitatam; et de novo Incorporavit Societatem antedictam, et tales alios viros qui priusquam rite admissi fuissent Procuratores in Vicecomitis Commissariique Curiis Aberdoniæ, et qui per Societatem recepti fuissent et contribuerent opibus ejusdem in modo in illa memorato, in Corpus Corporatum et Politicum, nomine et titulo “Præsidentis et Societatis Advocatorum in Aberdonia” (in vulgari “The President and Society of Advocates in Aberdeen”), cum omnibus potestatibus privilegiis et juribus prius Societati antedictæ concessis per cartam primum antea recitatam, et quibusdam aliis potestatibus juribus et privilegiis, et inter alia, cum potestate emendi et tenendi terras

Procurators in Aberdeen,” with sundry powers, as therein expressed, and with powers among others to purchase and hold lands of a clear yearly value at the time of purchase, after making the deduction in the said Charter expressed, not exceeding £500 sterling: AND THAT, by another Charter or Letters Patent, bearing date the 20th day of February, 1799, His said Majesty King George the Third, ratified and confirmed all the privileges, powers, and rights, granted to the said Society by the above recited Charter, except in so far as the same were altered by the Charter now under recital, and of new incorporated the aforesaid Society and such other persons as should first be duly admitted Procurators before the Sheriff and Commissary Courts of Aberdeen, and who should be received by the Society, and should contribute to the Funds thereof in manner therein mentioned, into a Body Corporate and Politic under the name and title of “The President and Society of Advocates in Aberdeen,” with all the powers, privileges, and rights formerly granted to the said Society by the said first above recited Charter, and with certain additional powers, rights, and privileges, and among others with power to purchase and hold lands in addition to those

authorised to be purchased and held by the Charter first above recited, of a clear yearly value not exceeding £250 sterling: AND THAT the Petitioners and their predecessors have, since the date of the foresaid Charters, managed and conducted the affairs of the said Society, and that the funds thereof have greatly increased, and become extensively useful to the indigent Members of the Society, and to the Widows and indigent relations of deceased members, for whose benefit they were intended, and directed by the said Charters to be applied: AND THAT the Petitioners have, from time to time, purchased and acquired, and they now stand possessed of, heritable properties, the clear yearly value whereof, at the time of purchase, estimated in manner directed by the said Charters, nearly approaches to the limit prescribed by the said Charters as aforesaid: AND THAT as the Society is possessed of considerable sums of money, which are yearly increasing by means of entry monies and otherwise, and which may be advantageously invested in the purchase of heritable properties, it had become desirable that the foresaid limit should be removed, and that the powers to purchase and hold lands and heritable properties should be enlarged: AND THAT, in the year 1822, the Society appropriated part of their funds then existing, and of the future annual contributions and entry money of Members, to the establishment of a Fund for the benefit of

Widows of Members of the Society upon a principle which has been shewn by repeated scientific investigations to ensure its being maintained in full efficiency, and which Fund has been found to operate most beneficially for the interests of the Society: AND THAT they have also erected a Hall and Committee Rooms for their meetings and for transacting the ordinary business of the Society; and have formed a Library, which now contains a large and valuable collection of Books, besides maintaining a General Fund for the other charitable uses mentioned in the said Charters, and for the general purposes of the Society: AND THAT the provisions of the said Charters had in the lapse of time become less calculated to promote the objects of the Society, in accordance with the progress which it has made, and with the requirements of the present age, than it is desirable they should be; and that it would tend to promote these objects and the future prosperity of the Society if a new Constitution were granted by a Royal Charter enlarging the powers of the Society in regard to purchasing and holding heritable property, and in other respects, and varying the regulations laid down in the said Charters for the proceedings of the Society, and for the management of the funds and affairs thereof, and by which the Petitioners and their successors should be

of new erected into one Corporation and Body Corporate and Politic, under the name and title of "The Society of Advocates in Aberdeen," with a perpetual succession, and with power to carry into effect the objects before expressed and all the powers usually granted to Bodies Corporate of the like kind: WHEREFORE the Petitioners humbly Prayed that We would grant unto them our Royal Charter for of new erecting them and their successors in the said Society into one Corporation and Body Corporate and Politic, under the name and title of "The Society of Advocates in Aberdeen," with a perpetual succession, and with powers to carry into effect the objects before expressed, and all the powers usually granted to Bodies Corporate of the like kind:—WE, taking into our serious consideration the aforesaid Petition, and being desirous to promote, so far as in our power, so useful and benevolent an Institution, THEREFORE, in compliance with the said Petition, and by virtue of Our Royal prerogative, and out of Our special grace, certain knowledge, and mere motion, have GIVEN, GRANTED, APPOINTED, CONFIRMED, and DECLARED, as we do by the tenor of these presents, give, grant, appoint, confirm, and declare, that the present Members of the said Society, and such others as shall be duly admitted and received by the Society in

them, by the name and title of "The Society of Advocates in Aberdeen," hereby granted to them, in the same manner, and as fully and freely in all respects as the same were vested in, and held, and might have been enjoyed, dealt with, and disposed of, by them under the aforesaid name and title of "The President and Society of Advocates in Aberdeen": AND WE, for Us and Our successors, DIRECT, ORDAIN, and APPOINT, that there shall be an Annual General Meeting of the said Society upon the last Tuesday of November, at such place and hour as the Society shall from time to time appoint, with the power of adjournment as to the said General Meeting shall seem expedient, and that the Members at such Annual General Meeting assembled, or at any adjournment thereof, shall have full power and authority to elect a President, Treasurer, and other necessary office-bearers for the subsequent year: AND ALSO to appoint a Committee of at least five of their number, with whom the Treasurer shall consult and deliberate regarding the Funds of the said Society: AND ALSO to appoint such other Committees as may appear to be necessary for the proper management of the affairs of the Society, and to delegate to them such powers as shall seem expedient: AND WE farther GRANT and DECLARE that the President of the said

Society, for the time being, shall have power and authority, at his pleasure, or so often as their affairs shall require it, to convene a meeting of the said Society, on previous notice of at least twenty-four hours given to the other Members residing or carrying on business in the City of Aberdeen: AND THAT the said President, whom failing, the Treasurer, whom also failing, any other Member to be appointed by the meeting, shall have the right of presiding at all meetings of the said Society; AND THAT at all Meetings the attendance of at least seven Members shall be necessary to form a Quorum: AND THAT in all questions that may arise among the Members present at any meeting, in regard to any matter or thing which it is competent for them to decide, the same shall be determined by a plurality of votes; and in all cases where the votes shall be equal, the President of the meeting shall have a casting as well as a deliberative vote; PROVIDED, nevertheless, that the Annual President shall not have a negative voice against calling a meeting of the Society, but that in his absence or refusal to call, it shall be lawful to any five or more Members of the said Society consenting for that end, to call a meeting *pro re nata*, giving notice of at least four and twenty hours to the other Members as aforesaid; and that such meeting shall have power to

elect a President *pro re nata*, and to proceed and resolve on all the business and affairs of the Corporation which shall be laid before them, in the same manner as if the Annual President had attended and presided at such meeting: PROVIDED ALWAYS that in the case of the death, resignation, or disqualification of the President or Treasurer, or any other office-bearer of the said Society during the currency of the year for which he was elected, it shall be in the power of a General Meeting of the Society, called with notice of that object, to elect others to act in the place of those so dying, resigning, or becoming disqualified, for the unexpired portion of the year, till the next Annual Meeting: AND WE, for Us and Our successors, ORDAIN, DIRECT, and APPOINT, that it shall not be in the power of the Members of the said Society or their successors to expend any more or greater sum or sums of money for the purposes hereinafter mentioned, within any one year, than the amount which the free annual produce and revenue arising from the Lands and Securities, and other property belonging to the said Corporation, and from the current collections, subscriptions, and donations, of that year (all burdens affecting the same and other current expenses of the Society being deducted) together with the overplus of the previous year, shall

yield and produce, however much may seem to be necessary for the established charities and other payments of the Society; reserving always to the Society full power and liberty to judge of the circumstances which shall warrant the giving of aid, and the amount to be given in every instance; AND THAT the capital stock of the said Society shall be kept whole and entire for ever after for the benefit thereof; AND THAT the division of the said free produce and revenue, after defraying all expenses connected with the proceedings of the Society, shall be limited and made allanarly to and among the decayed Members of the said Society and the Widows of deceased Members, and among the indigent children and grandchildren of deceased Members, whom failing, among the indigent fathers and mothers, and brothers and sisters of deceased Members of the said Society and their children in the order above set forth, and for the support and extension of the Library, and also, if they shall see fit, in educational grants for the benefit of the children of Members; AND THAT such division shall only be made at the Annual General Meeting of the said Society; but providing, that in case of urgent necessity, or where an alteration in the situation or circumstances of a Member or of his relatives aforesaid, occurs after the said Annual Meeting.

EARLY RECORDS AND SOCIETY'S MINUTES.

Att Aberdeen The Thirty day of July 1685 years In presence of
Mr. James Scougall, Commissar of Aberdeen.

The which Day The Commissar and members of court abov and underwritten having taken to their serious consideratione how necessary and convenient it is to have ane Contributione stocked for such of their relicts of the said Society or Orphants there shall happen to be depauperatte, with ane unanimous consent made ane offer of a voluntar Contribution as follows vizt.

The Commissar forsaid to give tuinty merks scots mony, the clerk and prōrs ilk ane of them ten merks, to be payed in for the end abov written to John Pedder clerk depute Collector appointed for that effect, That it might be lent out to some responsa'll persons Be consent of the Commissar and their successors. That the same may bear annuall rent, And like ways the Commissar forsaid was satisfied to pay Five pounds scots at the rising of each Sessione and the Clerk and each prōr half ane Rex dollar att the rising of each Session for the same usc. The first terms payment beginning the last of February 1687 years.

Item, It is enacted that no part of the forsaid mony prin'll or @ rent be disposed of without consint of the Major part of the members of the forsaid court, the Commissar being always on of their number.

Item, It is enacted that non shall hereafter be received as prōr before the said court but in manner under written allendarlie.

Primo. He that intends to enter prōr as said is must have recourse to the eldest prōr for the time being, who is herby impowered to call a meeting of the rest of the prōrs that they may receive his petitione and consider whi'ter or not it be fitt to give their consent thereto.

Secundo. It is appointed that no prör shall subscribe their consent to any such petition privately but in the face of the forsaid meeting allenarlie.

Tertio. It is enacted that no stranger who has not been bred with some member of the forsaid court for some considerable time shall be admitted as prör till they undergoe such ane examine and tryall as the Commissar & remanent members of the said court shall think fitt, and that the saids strangers so entering shall pay for the use of the poor forsaid Two Hundred pounds Scots, and that no stranger be admitted if any one of the prörs oppose the same.

Quarto. If any who has served ane member of the forsaid courts for any considerable time desire to enter prör & shall undergoe a tryall as said is, he is to pay Fourty pounds scots to the poor and if he enter without a tryall upon bill he is to pay ane Hundred Merks.

Quinto. It is enacted by unanimous consent that no person be recommended but those who are of knowen integrity honesty & skill.

Sexto. It is enacted that every prentice and servant writers to Clerks or prörs shall pay Ten merks at their entry for the use of the poor abov written.

Septimo. It is enacted that no prör shall lend his name to any summons or other citation given in be any person, except themselves or their servants be employed be either persewer or defender, unless the persons givers in of the saids summonses or excutions be priviledged to make use of a prörs name be the consent of the members of the said court at a meeting as said is. And all those who shall be licensed as said is shall pay ten merks at their entry for the said licence for the use abov spec'd and fourteen shilling each Session.

Nota. 14 February 1689 Thir acts wer ratified and signed by the Commissar & prörs and each prör ordained to sign them after his admission, and all strangers to pay 500 Merks of Compositione.

29 NOVEMBER 1689.

The said day the Commissar and the Prörs of the Commissar court of Aberdcen undersubscribeing Takeing to their consideration that there are few or no young men attending or serveing about the said court who are endeavouring to qualifie or breed themselves to be Prörs

before the same, and the occasion thereof proceeds chiefly from the discouragement they meet with by admitting of severall Stranger Prōrs before the said court who have not been bred about the same for two hundred pounds of composition payed by them, whereas they that are educat about this court pay a considerable Prentice fee and a Composition at their admission: Therefore for the further encouragement of young men to breed themselves about this court, which certainly capacitates them the better to goe about business and actions before the same (seeing strangers cannot in two or three years understand the form and practice of this Court) The saids Commissary and Procurators underscryving Doe appoint that no stranger that has not been bred about the Court shall be admitted till they undergoe such ane Examen and Tryall as the Commissary and members of Court shall think fitt and pay ffyve hundred merks of Composition to the uses specified in the preceding Acts Insert in this book, and that no stranger shall be admitted if any of the Prōrs oppose the same. . . .

The said day the Commissary & members Considering that by the fatall accident of fire which happened to the Commissary Clerk's office upon the 31st day of October last by past the haill records and papers therein wer burnt and consumed, particularly the principall Register containing the acts anent the money contribute by the members of Court for their poor, the acts anent admission of prōrs and the Compositions payable by them with the dues payable by writters and Apprentices together with the forme of process observed before the courts att Aberdeen; And also Considering that Severalls of the members of Court had exact coppies therof which wer subscribed by the Commissary Clerk's servant upon the thirty one preceeding pages of this book Att the design of the members of Court ffor supplying the said Acts and forms of processes which wer burnt as said is: Therefore the said Commissary and members of Court subscriving have Ratified homologate and approven and by these presents Ratife, homologate

and approve the haill forgoing acts contained in this book with the forme of process written on the preceeding thirty one pages, And Declares this present record therof to be also valid sufficient and effectuall to all intents & purposes as the principall register which was burnt as said is, And be ther presents ratifies and approves the admissions of the Prōrs before the said Commissary court, where admissions are extant in the Shirreff court books. 26 JANUARY 1731.

The following Regulations were unanimously Agreed to and Enacted viz.

That the haill former Acts and Regulations be Ratified and Confirmed except in so far as they are hereby Altered.

Item, That for hereafter There be no Licentiates And that none but prōrs, call, manadge, and carry on processes, particularly That no Clerk or Clerks servants medle therein.

Item, at outgiveing of processes, The prōr for the pursuer Sign a note Mentioning what papers he hath given out, and to whom, as also the date, And that upon Returning the process The prōr for the Defender Sign a note, Mentioning what papers he hath Seen and Returned.

Item, That all defences, answers, replys etc. be signed by the rexive prōrs under protestation To Add and Eik as they shall afterwards have occasion.

Item, That all confirmations be expedie by prōrs.

12 JANUARY 1778.

. . . The meeting considering that the Magistrates and Council of Aberdeen have begun a Voluntary Subscription for raising a Body of men for his Majesty's service, to be called the Aberdeen Volunteers, for

reducing the Colonies to their former allegiance, they unanimously approve of that measure, and empower the President to sign in name of the Society for One hundred guineas for that purpose.

8 NOVEMBER 1782.

The President laid before the Meeting an application addressed to him from the Lord Provost of Aberdeen mentioning the unfortunate State of the Town and Country and the situation of the Crop which in general remains in the fields uncut, And the present scarcity of meal thereby arising, And that a subscription was commenced among all ranks and Individuals, Societies and Corporations for importation of Grain wherever it can be found either at home or abroad, for which purpose people were despatched Southward to purchase Grain, and Commissions were likewise sent abroad, And the Lord Provost concludes his Letter by asking the aid of the Society of Procurators. The Society having considered the said letter are unanimously of opinion and resolve that they ought to give a liberal Contribution in this extraordinary season of calamity and distress for so laudable a purpose as the life and support of themselves, their fellow citizens, and the inhabitants of the town and Country, And therefore, over and above the subscriptions already made by the members of the Society as individuals, the Meeting hereby recommend to and empower Mr. Gordon of Craig the President of the Society to subscribe One Hundred Guineas to be paid by the Treasurer from the funds of the Society for the purpose mentioned. . . . But as they consider the funds belonging to the Society as a Sacred Deposit under their Care for charitable purposes only, they hereby declare that the Contribution now ordered shall never be urged as a precedent for any future encroachment except upon such occasions of Urgent and General Distress as the present, which calls upon every member of society for charitable aid.

14 FEBRUARY 1798.

The President stated to the Meeting that he had thought it his duty to submit to the consideration of the Society the expediency of their showing their loyalty and public spirit in the present crisis of affairs, by

contributing collectively towards the exigencies of Government of which so many Corporations in this kingdom as well as individuals have already set the laudable example. He presumed that the propriety of the measure admitted of no question, And therefore moved that the Meeting would proceed to determine, first, the quantum of the contribution, and secondly, the means of raising it in a manner the most equal and least burdensome to the Society, but so as to avoid any encroachment upon the public funds, which he was humbly of opinion ought to be applied solely for the charitable purposes of the Society's institution. The Meeting after maturely considering the foregoing motion, unanimously resolved that there should be a contribution from the Society for the above purpose of One Hundred Guineas . . . They authorise the Treasurer accordingly, and to remit the money how soon he finds similar contributions are in the course of being remitted.

17 FEBRUARY 1798.

The President stated that in consequence of a notification from the Magistrates yesterday, it had been suggested that the sum to be given by the Society towards the expenses of Government should be added to the subscriptions of the Citizens at large, in which view what was ordered at last meeting was by many of the Members thought inadequate, he therefore, at the desire of Six Members of the Society, had called this Meeting that they might give such directions as they judged proper.

The Meeting having resumed the consideration of this business, and being satisfied of the expediency of making a liberal contribution, unanimously resolved that One Hundred Guineas should be added to the former subscription of the Society . . . , and they authorised the President to subscribe the said sum of two hundred Guineas in name of the Society accordingly.

19 FEBRUARY 1799.

The meeting having observed that, by a late decision of the Court of Session, the Society of Procurators of Glasgow are exempted from having soldiers billeted upon them, and as the foundation of that decision is equally applicable to the Society of Procurators in Aberdeen, they

have resolved to claim the same privilege, and they direct their Treasurer to notify this resolution to the Magistrates of Aberdeen and to request that they will give the necessary directions to their Billet Master thereanent.

17 MAY 1799.

The President . . . presented to the Meeting the New Charter from His Majesty erecting the Society into a body Corporate by the Stile and Title of The Society of Advocates in Aberdeen, a Title which the Members and their Predecessors had individually enjoyed for several Centuries as appears by authentic Documents in the Society's Custody. The Charter also contains a very considerable extension of the powers and privileges of the Society . . .

The Meeting further appoint the Gentlemen who composed the former Committee, with the addition of Mr. David Morice, to be a Committee for suggesting such alterations as may appear proper in the Regulations of the Society agreeable to the New Charter . . .

19 JUNE 1799.

. . . The meeting having taken under their Consideration a plan of a Charter Room,¹ to be made out in the Record Office, for the purpose of containing the Society's Charters, Title deeds, and Books, they approve thereof, and direct the same to be executed under the inspection of Mr. Kennedy, one of the Committee.

28 JANUARY 1806.

The Society, on the Motion of Mr. Alex^r. Carnegie, while they deeply regret the loss sustained by the death of Mr. Morice, one of their number, late Sheriff Substitute of the County and City Assessor, have learned with peculiar satisfaction the appointment of Dr. Alexander Dauney, one of the Members of the Society, to these offices, being perfectly convinced that he will discharge the several duties of both with distinguished

ability and with equal advantage to the Public and Credit to himself. Therefore unanimously resolved that the President or Treasurer be instructed in name of the Society to intimate and express the same to Dr. Dauneŷ in Court upon his first taking his seat on the Bench as Sheriff; and at the same time to congratulate him upon his appointments.

Ordered a Copy of these Resolutions to be transmitted to Mr. Moir of Scotstoun, Sheriff Depute of the County, and another to Dr. Dauneŷ himself.

24 MARCH 1806.

The Committee to whom it was remitted to obtain a proper Seal with a suitable Device for the Society having seen a sketch thereof from the Treasurer, approved thereof, and ordered a Seal to be got agreeably thereto. . . .

Ordered the Charter Room in the Record Office to be painted; and the Charters and Title Deeds of the Society in the hands of the Treasurer, with the books and papers for which he has not immediate occasion, to be deposited therein.

25 NOVEMBER 1806.

The Treasurer also delivered into the meeting the Matriculation Book, in which were entered the Names of the Members of the Society from the year 1549 to this period, made up from such Records in this City, and other authentic Documents as he had access to; specifying the dates of their admission, deaths, and other particulars, as far as his research could enable him to go.

He also delivered in to the Meeting a similar Book, containing the Names of Apprentices to the Members of this Society from the year 1774, when the first Charter was obtained, down to this date. . . .

18 JANUARY 1808.

The Society having taken under their Consideration the very extraordinary manner in which Mr. Leslie of Powis¹ has of late, in several

instances, when in Court, behaved towards Doctor Daunev, the Sheriff Substitute, and to the Court, were unanimously of opinion that Mr. Leslie's conduct in those instances was highly improper and reprehensible, and that the Writings he has obruded upon their notice were most disrespectful both to the Bench and to the Bar. The Society therefore, Resolved unanimously to express on this occasion their just esteem for Doctor Daunev the Sheriff Substitute, their respectful sense of his Abilities and Impartiality as a Judge, and obliging attention as a Gentleman—And to assure him of their Cordial Support in maintaining the dignity of his office as well as the Respect due to the Bar. . . .

22 FEBRUARY 1809.

The Treasurer then laid before the Meeting a letter addressed to him by Dr. Daunev, President of the Society, of the following tenor, viz. :—
 “Aberdeen 12 February 1809. Sir, I send you a Seal which I have taken the liberty of causing be engraved for the Society of Advocates here by one of the first Artists in London, and of which I request the Society to accept if approved of. I am, &c.” The Seal was at same time produced to the Meeting.

It was then moved and unanimously ordered that this Seal (of which the Meeting highly approve) be accepted of and used by the Society as their “Common Seal” in time coming. And that their thanks be given to Dr. Daunev for this fresh Instance of his Attention to whatever can tend to promote the respectability of the Society.

9 MARCH 1810.

The Committee of Management reported that in Consequence of the powers committed to them for the Sale of the Society's lands at Forresterhill the same had been sold by public Roup on the Second Current to George Hogarth, Esquire, Merchant in Aberdeen, at the upset price of £2,500 Stg. . . .

13 NOVEMBER 1813.

The said — having also been called before the Committee and Examined as aforesaid, They found him not sufficiently Qualified to be

admitted a Procurator of Court, and Remanded him to his Studies for six months, and Reported accordingly to the Judges.

21 AUGUST 1815.

— applied for authority to enter into an Indenture with — H. As he had attended College for only one session it was stipulated that the apprenticeship should extend over six years and that another session at College should be given.

24 NOVEMBER 1818.

Mr. Francis Gordon gave in a written statement to the meeting of the following tenor, viz. :—“That the Records under his charge as Sheriff Clerk Depute had for years past suffered greatly for want of accommodation, as well as from the dampness and insufficiency of the places appointed for keeping them. That repeated applications had been made by the Sheriff Depute and himself to various County meetings, and the situation of these records minutely, and yearly, reported on, by the Sheriff Depute to the Judges at the Circuit annually, as appointed by the Act 49, Geo. III., cap. 42, as will appear from the excerpts now produced from the Freeholders Minutes, and of said annual reports, as well as a copy letter from the Sheriff Clerk to the County Clerk. That he (Mr. Gordon) had kept fires, and sat in the back office until his health was so much impaired that he was obliged to give it up, and that fire was occasionally still kept in said back room—but as the Records were suffering, and as vermin had lately got into the office, notwithstanding that cats and poison had been placed there—he moved that a Committee be appointed to examine and report on these matters, as greatly interesting to the Society, and as the Sheriff Clerk, although custodier of these records, had no power to move them, and had hitherto been unable to procure further or better accommodation for them.” Which Statement and Motion together with the excerpts therein referred to, having been deliberately considered by the Meeting, they expressed their unanimous and sincere regret that a subject of such deep interest and importance to every Society and individual connected with the County of Aberdeen, as the preservation of these Records, should in any,

the least degree, be overlooked, or neglected, by those whose province it is to care for them. But, being of the opinion that it would be unwise in them, as a Society, to incur any responsibility, on the occasion, they declined to interfere, recommending however to Mr. Gordon to leave nothing undone on his part, for having the grievances alluded to remedied with the utmost expedition, by those liable.

Mr. Burnett stated to the Meeting the advantages, which, in his opinion, would result to the future interests of the Society, by having a Lecturer on Scots Law and Conveyancing, appointed under their patronage, who might open a class in Aberdeen, for the instruction of apprentices, and others, and thus save them the expense of going to Edinburgh, according to the present practice, and prosecuting the same studies there. This suggestion having received the unanimous approbation of the meeting, Mr. Burnett then moved that a Committee should be named to report on the expediency of the measure, and the best mode of carrying it into effect, which motion was adopted. Committee appointed accordingly.

2 JANUARY 1819.

The following Rules and Regulations regarding the proposed Lectureship having been submitted by the Committee were after consideration adopted by the Society:—

(1) That the office shall be perpetual, and an application be made in the proper quarter for having the Incumbent attached to the University, as Professor of Scots Law. (2) That his duty shall be to deliver a complete course of Lectures each year upon Scots Law and Conveyancing; the first part of the course to embrace what relates to the Scots Law, and to occupy — months, viz., — at the rate of one hour each Lecturing day, and five Lecturing days each week,—and the second part to embrace what respects Conveyancing, and to occupy — months each year, viz., — at the same rate per day and week, as specified in the former case. (3) That the Class shall be open to all who choose to attend the same, and it shall be left to the Lecturer's own discretion to fix the amount of his fees,—with this exception only in favour of Apprentices to Members of the Society, that the amount exigible for each course of Lectures shall not exceed Three Guineas in the whole for each Student—that is, Two Guineas for the first part of the

Course, and One Guinea for the last. (4) That it shall be resolved as a standing Regulation of the Society that every Apprentice entering into Indenture after the office is once established must attend the Course of Lectures (both parts) for at least two years during the period of his Apprenticeship,—failing of which he shall not be entitled to claim admission as a Member of the Society. And it shall be recommended to all such Apprentices whose Indentures have commenced previously to the date of the appointment in contemplation, and are then still current, also to attend two complete Courses of these Lectures. (5) That the person who fills the office of Lecturer now proposed shall always be a Member of the Society of Advocates in Aberdeen, chosen by and from amongst themselves, *ad vitam aut culpam*; but with this express proviso or condition, that the Society are to be the sole Judges of the *Culpa*, and may, two-thirds of them concurring, vacate the appointment if they see cause, without being obliged in any Court of Law, or otherwise, to specify such cause. It ought also to be a fundamental condition of the Appointment that the Incumbent should at all times hold himself subject to the control of the Society with respect to the plan of his Lectures, and the regulations under which the Institution is to be maintained and carried on. And as it must be of the utmost consequence to the success of the Scheme altogether, particularly at the outset, to have the office filled by a person of respectability, whose professional knowledge is not only unquestioned, but who combines with that knowledge some more general turn for literary pursuits, the Society, it is humbly thought, in making their choice, should look to these qualities as paramount to every consideration, and give their support to that person, and to that person only, who appears most eminently to unite them.

21 JANUARY 1819.

Mr. Andrew Robertson elected first Lecturer on Scots Law and Conveyancing.

Thereafter Mr. William Stuart stated that he conceived it would be highly expedient to have the Sheriff Clerk's office attached to the Court House, and that a room for the preservation of the Records should also be provided, the expense to be defrayed by the Sale of the Record Office, or otherwise as may be found practicable. And he moved that a

Committee of this Society be appointed to meet and communicate on this subject with the Committee or Committees, appointed by the Town and County of Aberdeen, to forward and procure an Act of Parliament for erecting a new Jail, and to report to this Society on the expediency and practicability of the measure. This motion was seconded by Mr. David Hutcheon, and carried by a majority. Committee appointed accordingly.

29 MARCH 1820.

The following Address was agreed to be transmitted to His Majesty King George IV.

“To the King’s Most Excellent Majesty,—Most Gracious Sovereign, We the President and Society of Advocates in Aberdeen, incorporated by Royal Charter, beg leave to approach the Throne, and to offer the tribute of our humble but sincere condolence on the demise of our late Revered Sovereign, Your Majesty’s much beloved Father, and the premature fate of His Royal Highness the lamented Duke of Kent.

“Under the pressure of these dispensations our concern is alleviated only by the recollection that the Imperial Crown devolves upon a Prince who has already given proof that he knows how to wear it, with honour to himself, and for the glory of the British name.

“Permit us, Sire, on an occasion so interesting, to mingle our congratulations with those of a loyal people, and to give assurance of attachment to Your Majesty’s Person, our Veneration for the Laws, and our love for the Constitution in Church and State.”

3 AUGUST 1822.

The following Address was agreed to be presented to His Majesty King George IV. upon his intended visit to Scotland.

“. . . Most Gracious Sovereign, We Your Majesty’s most dutiful and loyal subjects the President and Society of Advocates in Aberdeen, incorporated by Royal Charter, beg leave to approach the Throne, to tender our sincere and most cordial congratulations upon Your Majesty’s arrival in the Capital of Your Royal Ancestors, Kings of Scotland.

“While we, in common with Your Majesty’s other subjects, feel impressed with the deepest sense of the honor which has been conferred on the People of Scotland, by this Royal Visit to your Ancient Kingdom, permit us, Sire, to testify our attachment to Your Majesty’s Sacred Person; and our veneration for the Laws, Liberties and privileges which we have the happiness to enjoy.

“We hail your Majesty’s arrival among us, as another gracious pledge of your paternal regard for the welfare of the people of Scotland; and trust that Your Majesty’s visit will be attended with the happiest effects; by animating all ranks with the liveliest sentiments of gratitude for the many inestimable blessings which flow upon us under Your Majesty’s mild and benign Government. Deign, Sire, on this auspicious occasion to accept this testimony of our homage; while we fervently pray that Your Majesty may long continue to reign over a free and happy people.”

13 NOVEMBER 1822.

Resolution passed expressive of regard and favour for Mr. Alexander Moir of Scotstown, who has now resigned his appointment as Sheriff Depute of Aberdeenshire after discharging the duties in an able and upright manner for upwards of twenty seven years.

26 NOVEMBER 1822.

Mr. Carnegie laid before the Meeting a Memorial relative to the proposed situation of the New Jail, representing that several years of experience had been acquired of the advantages and disadvantages likely to arise from having the Jail discontinuous to the Courthouse and at the distance of nearly a mile from the centre of the Town—that in several respects a Jail or Prison at Bridewell would from its distance from the Courthouse be totally deficient as will appear from the following among other considerations:—

(1) Experience has already shown that there must be a considerable risk and very great inconvenience in the frequent removal of prisoners backward and forward between the Jail and the places for examination and trial—particularly at the Circuit Courts of Justiciary such removals could not be attempted without the aid of the military—which, at times, it may not be possible to procure. (2) The inconvenience to Sheriffs,

Magistrates, Agents and all others (whether in behalf of the public or of the prisoners themselves) whose duty it is to attend precognitions and the multifarious and daily examinations of prisoners, civil as well as criminal, at such a distance from the centre of the town, is inconceivable and can scarcely be known except by those who from their official or professional duties have been obliged to experience it. It may perhaps be said that this might be obviated by having the prisoners brought from the Jail and examined at the Courthouse, which would in the course of investigating crimes be often absolutely necessary, particularly in the identifying of prisoners, as well as of stolen property. That the idea of an unfortunate civil debtor being paraded through the public streets, perhaps in irons, is quite revolting—but it is likewise to be attended to that persons committed for debt could not be removed on any account or for any purpose from the Jail without rendering the Magistrates liable for the debt. (3) The additional annual expense which must be occasioned both to Town and County in consequence of having the Jail and Courthouse so remote from each other is no trifling consideration—for, by keeping up the old Prison as a Lock-up-house, or place of temporary confinement, a measure which would be indispensably necessary, an extra Jailor or Servant must be employed and paid for, and the expense of removing Prisoners backward and forward before and after trial (even supposing the Sheriffs, Magistrates, &c., were to be obliged to submit to the same drudgery which they have hitherto experienced) would in the most economical way possible amount to a very considerable sum yearly. That these objections and others contained in said Memorial were distinctly foreseen and repeatedly urged previous to the passing of the Act 59, George III., and the expediency of having the Jail and Courthouse in some central situation and contiguous to one another was universally admitted and even acted upon, at different meetings of the Town and County. It is hoped, however, that it is not too late to retract, and that, as no progress has yet been made in the erection of a new Jail, the Commissioners will pause before proceeding to the [building] in a situation liable to so many objections, and after considering the subject in all its bearings, endeavour to find the means of erecting it on the area of ground behind the Courthouse, where it is presumed every requisite accommodation, joined with convenience and economy to all concerned, could at once be obtained . . .

25 JUNE 1824.

The President stated that he called the Meeting for the purpose of considering the propriety of showing some mark of respect to the Remains of Mr. Moir of Scotstown, late Sheriff of the County. The Integrity and Talents of Mr. Moir as a Judge and his virtues as a Gentleman being imprinted on the minds of every Member of this Society, he felt that any Eulogium from him would be quite superfluous. The Proposition therefore which he begged to move was that the Members shall assemble in a Body in full Mourning tomorrow at one o'clock and join the Funeral Procession opposite to King's College and accompany it from thence to St. Peter's Churchyard, the Place of Interment. The Motion was seconded by Mr. Crombie and unanimously adopted by the Meeting.

2 JULY 1824.

Committee reported the purchase on behalf of the Society of the Fourteenth lot of the Lands of Belhelvie. Approved.

18 MARCH 1831.

Agreed to petition in favour of Parliamentary Reform.

8 SEPTEMBER 1834.

Agreed to present an address to the Lord Chancellor in the following terms—"Unto the Right Honourable the Lord Brougham and Vaux, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, &c.,—We, the President and Society of Advocates in Aberdeen, Incorporated by Royal Charter, beg on this occasion to join with our fellow Citizens in expressing the high gratification which is afforded to us by your Lordship's visit to Aberdeen. We assure your Lordship of the profound respect in which we hold your exalted public station and your personal distinguished talents and extensive acquirements. We gratefully acknowledge the philanthropic, assiduous and useful exertions uniformly made by your Lordship as a Member of the Commonwealth, for the education, instruction and general advantage of your Countrymen. We have an entire reliance upon your Lordship's anxious desire to execute faithfully and for the public welfare the powers which devolve upon you as the first legal Functionary in the

Kingdom, as a Minister of the Crown, and a Member of the Legislature, for which your abilities, both natural and acquired, so eminently fit you. And we sincerely wish that your Lordship may, by a continuation of the wise and patriotic discharge of your high functions, live long and happy in the confidence of your King, and in the esteem of your Country."

29 NOVEMBER 1836.

. . . Mr. Lumsden, the President, then reported to the Meeting, in order that the same may appear recorded in the Minutes, that according to what had been previously resolved on at a General Meeting, he and the Treasurer had this morning laid the foundation stone of the first dressed course of the Society's New Building in Union Street [at corner of Back Wynd], in presence of James Milne, Esquire, Lord Provost of Aberdeen, and a numerous body of the Members of the Society. That there was enclosed in the Stone a large Glass Bottle, made purposely at a Glass Work at Leith, containing the following articles, viz. :—

10 JULY 1837.

Address of Condolence adopted for transmission to the Queen Dowager, as also an Address to Her Majesty Queen Victoria on her accession to the Throne.

16 OCTOBER 1837.

Agreed to take part in the procession and ceremony at laying the foundation stone of the New Buildings for Marischal College.

10 JULY 1839.

Agreed to Petition the House of Commons in favour of the uniform penny postage scheme presently before the House.

18 FEBRUARY 1840.

Address to the Queen and Prince Albert on the occasion of their marriage, adopted.

18 JUNE 1840.

Addresses to the Queen and Prince Albert on the occasion of an attempt upon their lives, adopted.

24 NOVEMBER 1840.

Addresses to the Queen and Prince Albert on the auspicious birth of a Princess Royal of England, adopted.

3 MAY 1841.

Resolved to Petition Parliament against any alterations being made in the present system of Banking in Scotland.

19 MAY 1841.

The Sub-Committee reported that they had prepared a manuscript Catalogue of the Books in the Library, and the meeting authorised the printing of the Catalogue.

18 JUNE 1841.

Agreed by a majority:—

I. That this Society regrets the recent proceedings of the General Assembly in regard to the majority of the Presbytery of Strathbogie, as being in direct opposition to the law of the Country, destructive of the Established Church of Scotland, and oppressive and tyrannical towards the Clergymen composing that Majority, in whom obedience to the law is construed into Crime.

II. That, highly approving of the conduct of the majority of the Presbytery of Strathbogie, and strongly condemning the illegal proceedings of the Assembly, the Society conceives that the Presbytery's majority merit the countenance and support of all by whom the law and the constituted authorities of the Land are respected, and so are entitled to the Society's warmest sympathy.

And the Society accordingly direct that these Resolutions be communicated to each of the Eight Clergymen, composing the majority of the said Presbytery; to the law officers of the Crown in Scotland; and to the members of both houses of Parliament connected with the city and county.

17 NOVEMBER 1841.

Addresses to Her Majesty and Prince Albert on the occasion of the birth of an Heir Apparent to the British Throne, adopted.

17 JUNE 1842.

Address to Her Majesty expressing abhorrence of the late atrocious attempt upon the life of Her Majesty, and the Society's sincere joy at Her Majesty providential escape from the danger in which she was placed, adopted.

26 AUGUST 1842.

Addresses to the Queen and Prince Albert on the occasion of their visit to Scotland, adopted.

22 MARCH 1845.

Agreed to Petition Parliament against Interference with the Scotch Banking system.

16 OCTOBER 1846.

Agreed to restrict the half yearly money terms to 20th June and 20th December of each year instead of extending or spreading out the transactions of the Aberdeen money terms over four days in each half year as formerly observed.

18 JANUARY 1847.

Agreed to memorialise the Lord Advocate to take measures for procuring a law to enforce more complete and accurate Registration of Births, Deaths and Marriages in Scotland.

17 FEBRUARY 1847.

Tribute to the memory of the late Andrew Murray of Murrayshall, who for twenty-four years had acted as Sheriff of Aberdeenshire, adopted.

22 MARCH 1847.

Agreed to entertain to Dinner as a mark of respect, John Thomson Gordon, Advocate, on his appointment as Sheriff Depute of the County.

20 JULY 1847.

Report submitted that there had been purchased on behalf of the Society the lands of Hill-Cairnie in the parish of Skene, extending to about 1037 acres, of which 558 acres are arable and 228 acres are wood.

3 APRIL 1848.

Agreed to entertain to Dinner as a mark of respect, Archibald Davidson, Advocate, on his appointment as Sheriff of the County.

11 JANUARY 1855.

Resolutions arrived at approving of the Union of the Universities of Aberdeen.

2 JUNE 1858.

Petition against the Universities (Scotland) Bill, adopted.

25 JANUARY 1859.

The Society being of opinion that in consequence of the great increase of business in the Sheriff Court, the appointment of an additional Sheriff Substitute at Aberdeen is imperatively necessary it was agreed to memorialise the Sheriff and the Lords of the Treasury craving such appointment.

10 MAY 1859.

The following arguments were urged for the appointment of an additional Sheriff Substitute,—(1) That the Sheriff Substitute of the Aberdeen district of the County of Aberdeen is charged with a greater amount of labour than any Judge can perform with justice to the public interests, and greater than is required from any other Judge in Scotland. (2) That there is no adequate provision for the discharge of the duties of Sheriff Substitute at Aberdeen, either in Civil or Criminal business, during his necessary absence from the City, or if he should be incapacitated by sickness. (3) That it is therefore “essentially necessary for the public service” that an additional Sheriff Substitute, resident in Aberdeen, should be appointed. (1) There are at present two Sheriff Substitutes for the County of Aberdeen, with a district assigned to each. One of them is resident in Aberdeen, the other in Peterhead. The population under the jurisdiction of the Sheriff Substitute in Aberdeen, amounted, according to the census of 1851, to 167,781, and it is now supposed to amount to nearly 200,000. The population of the entire County in 1851 was 212,032; its area is 1970 square miles. . . . The only Counties having larger populations than Aberdeen, although spread over comparatively trifling areas, are Edinburgh and Lanark. The former with a population of 259,435, and an area of 399 square miles, has a Sheriff and three Substitutes all resident in the Capital. Lanark has a population of 530,169; its area is 987 square miles. The Sheriff, as in Edinburgh, is resident, and has six Substitutes. Every County in Scotland, with a population of 80,000 (or less than one-half of the population of the Aberdeen district of the County) has two Sheriff Substitutes. . . .

The Civil and Criminal business of the Court at Aberdeen has increased year by year until the Sheriff Substitute, though eminently prompt and quick in the despatch of business, declares himself unable longer to discharge the duties, and has applied for the assistance of an

additional Substitute. This great increase has arisen through the rapid development of the trade, commerce and agriculture of the district, and also through the additional duties which by recent legislative enactments have been devolved upon the Sheriff Substitute. A large portion of his time is now occupied in taking proofs, all of which were formerly taken by Commission. . . .

No sensible relief would be given by the division of the Aberdeen district into two with a Sheriff Substitute for each. By far the greater part of the business arises in the City of Aberdeen and its populous neighbourhood. In Aberdeen the country shopkeepers and tradesmen purchase their goods, the farmers dispose of the most of their produce, and the factors of the landed Proprietors are mostly resident. The County population having thus frequent occasion to transact business in the City, can go there with less inconvenience and with greater facility than to towns in the County much nearer their residence. Aberdeenshire has only one chief town, and from it the whole turnpike roads of the Country radiate up the valleys of the Dee and the Don, through the Strath of the Garioch, and to Huntly, Turriff, etc. Railway and telegraphic lines already made, or in course of formation, connect all these districts and places with Aberdeen. These valleys running inland from Aberdeen, have no communication with each other, but by cross roads, always difficult for vehicles, often impracticable in winter, and unprovided with public conveyances.

3 SEPTEMBER 1867.

Property in Concert Court, Broad Street, having been acquired for the purpose of erecting thereon a new Hall and Library for the Society, Mr. Matthews to-day submitted plans thereof.

21 MAY 1869.

Amended plans by Mr. Matthews submitted and remitted to a Sub-Committee for consideration.

8 NOVEMBER 1870.

Resolutions of condolence and regret at the death of Mr. Andrew Jameson, Sheriff of Aberdeen and Kincardine, adopted.

12 NOVEMBER 1870.

Resolution to memorialise the Government to appoint Mr. John Comrie Thomson, Sheriff Substitute, as Sheriff, passed.

JUNE 1873.

Property in Union Street, at corner of Back Wynd, which had formed the Advocates' Hall and Library, sold to Lockhart and Salmond, Confectioners, etc.

23 AUGUST 1876.

Memorial adopted for presentation to the Home Secretary craving that through the recent death of Mr. Christian, who had held the office of Sheriff and Commissary Clerk of Kincardineshire, the office might be abolished and the duty transferred to the Sheriff Clerk of Aberdeen, thus completing the judicial amalgamation of the two Counties.

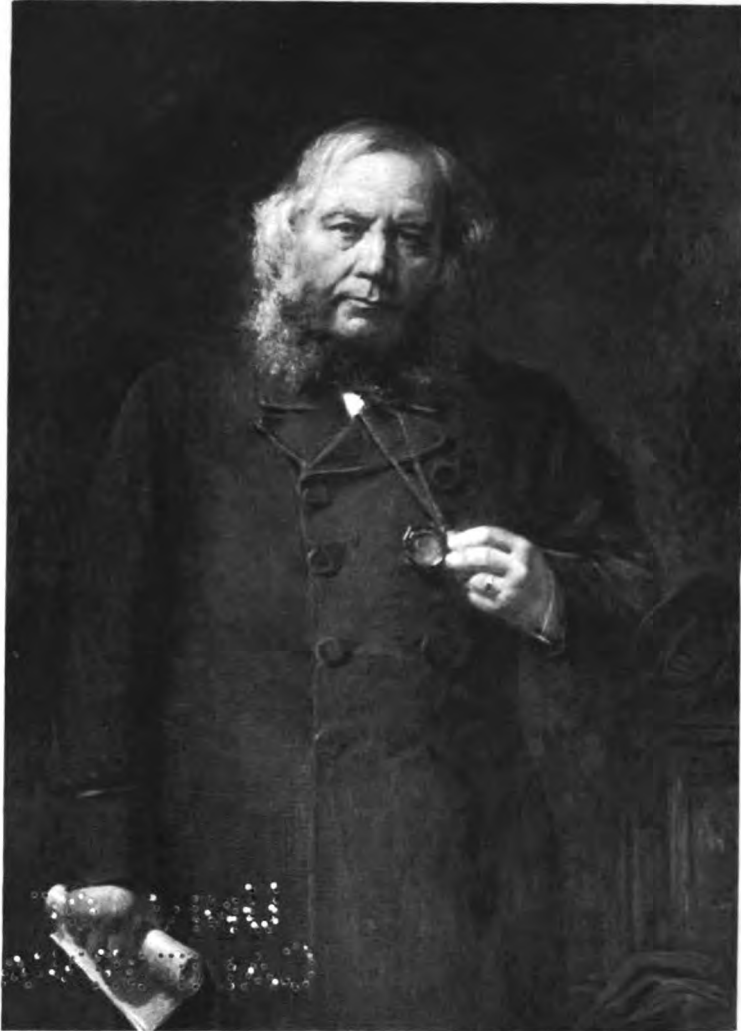

"That he, The Treasurer, happened to be present when Provost Blaikie breathed his last, and had thought it proper immediately to write to the President, who had gone to Edinburgh, but transmitted an immediate answer deploring in the most feeling terms the melancholy event which had occurred in so awful a manner, and requesting the Treasurer to announce that he was most ready and anxious to join in any measures that might be thought right by the Society to show every possible respect to Provost Blaikie's memory. That he, The Treasurer, had also had a communication with the Magistrates, and in consequence of this had called the present Meeting. That the Magistrates had taken the whole charge of the Funeral, which was to be a public one—and Mr. Angus, Town Clerk Depute, being present, requested him to read to the Meeting the Programme proposed by the Magistrates on the occasion, which he did accordingly, and the Meeting generally approved of the same—and it was then resolved that the Members should meet in the Library a Quarter before Two o'clock on Tuesday preparatory to attending the Funeral as a body, and that each member should have black crape on his Hat."—Society's Minute.

Rait, Mr. Daniel Bradfutt, and Mr. John Chalmers, Regent or Professors and Teachers in the said College, Complaining of ane Interlocutor of the Lords of Session in Scotland, of the 20 of July 1744, and of ane Interlocutor of the 4th of December last, whereby they adhered to their former interlocutor, made on the behalf of Charles Hamilton Gordon, Advocate at Edinburgh, And Praying That the same might be reversed ; And that this House would be pleased to afford the Appellants such other relief, as to their Lordships in their great wisdom should seem proper. As also upon the answer of the said Charles Hamilton Gordon, put into the said Appeal, and due consideration had of what was offered on either side in this cause, It is Ordered and Adjudged by the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, That the said interlocutors complained of in the said Appeal be, and the same are, hereby reversed. 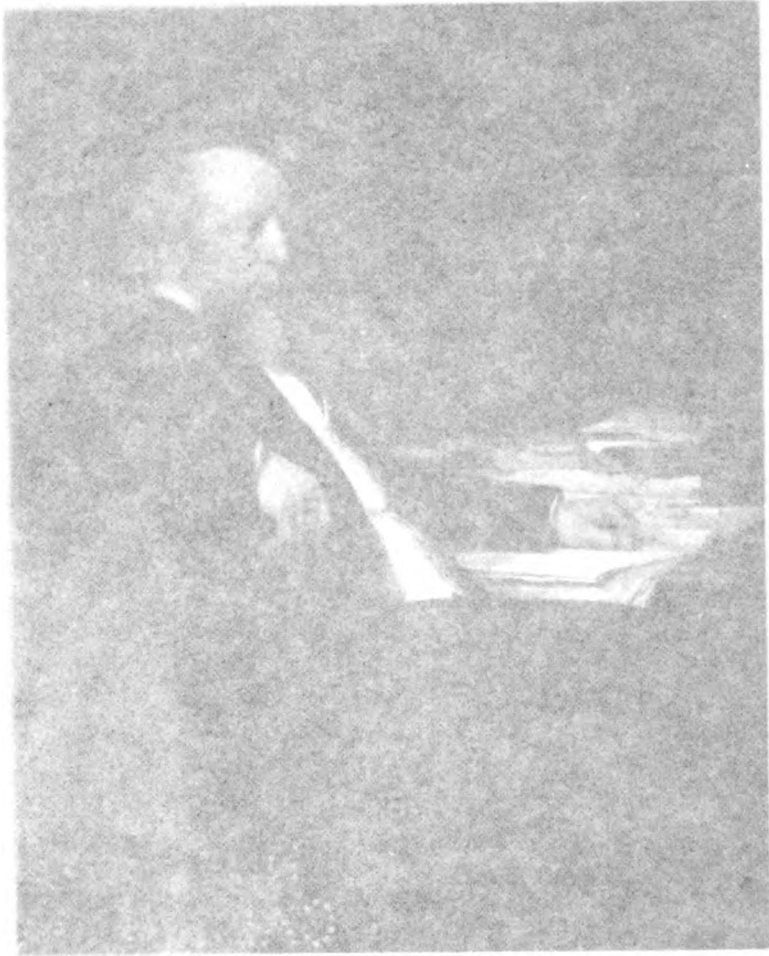

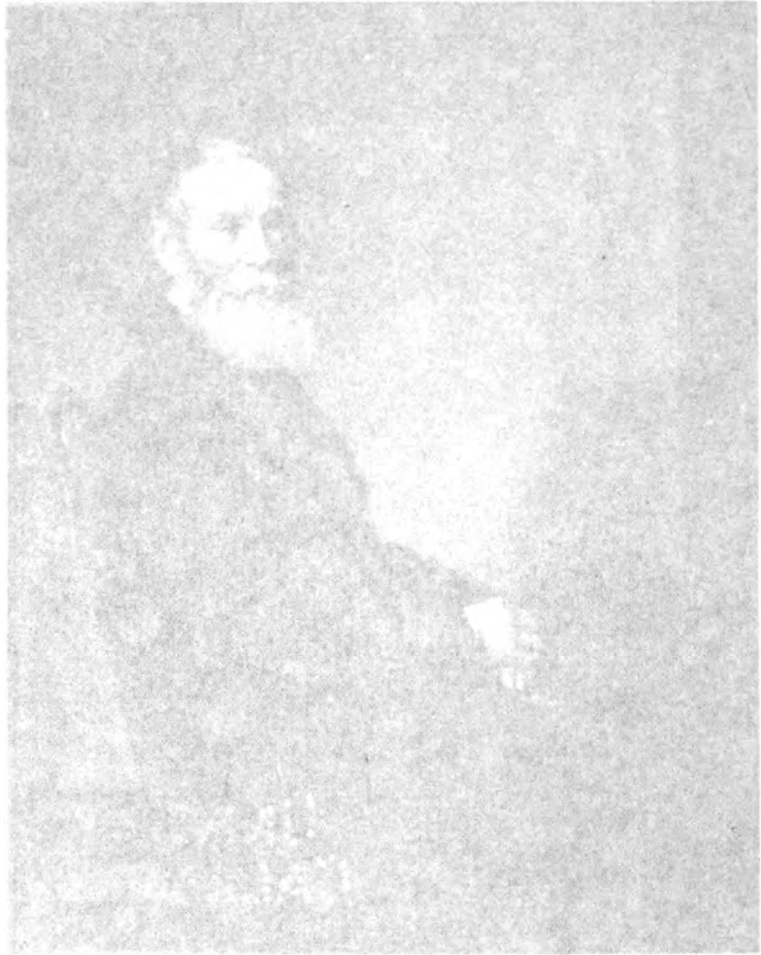

¹ "Referring to our obituary of to-day, in which we have recorded the death of Mr. Farquharson of Whitehouse, we cannot allow the opportunity to pass without paying a tribute to the sterling worth of his character. Mild, gentle and affectionate in disposition, modest and retiring in conduct, guileless, single-hearted and sincere, largely gifted with that charity which thinketh no evil, thoroughly contented in the station in which he was placed—his aim through life having been 'to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with his God'—he has passed from this world, leaving the inheritance of a good name, which is rather to be chosen than great riches. Early in life Mr. Farquharson became a member of the legal profession in this city, and was long the confidential agent and commissioner for several of the most considerable proprietors in this county, gaining for himself by his strict integrity and disinterested conduct, not only their attachment but also the gratitude and respect of their tenantry. In the district with which he was more immediately connected, he took a lively interest in many public improvements. Mr. Farquharson was the lineal male representative of the . . . branch of the family whose surname he bore, and who settled in the upper district of this county in the early part of the 16th century. During all the troubles of the House of Stuart, his ancestors took a warm interest in the Royal cause, three of whom lost life and lands in its behalf—first, Findla Mhor, killed at the battle of Pinkie while bearing Queen Mary's Standard; second, the gallant and chivalrous Colonel Donald Farquharson of Castleton and Monaltrie, styled in his time 'The Pride of Braemar,' the lieutenant and attached friend of the illustrious Montrose, who, having been killed at Aberdeen in March, 1645, was subsequently interred in the Laird of Drum's Aisle, his great Commander having sent 1000 horse to witness his funeral rites; and, third, his grandfather, Harry Farquharson . . . who fell at Culloden while gallantly leading on the Mar men in their impetuous charge at the commencement of that disastrous battle, leaving a numerous youthful family to lament his loss. Blessed and happy is the death of the upright man. . . ."—*Aberdeen Journal*.

I duly received the letter which you wrote me the sixth of October, and see by its contents that one of my subjects named Tonges Rolofs Jansen, an inhabitant of my province of East Friesland, while trading with his ship in Merchandize not prohibited to a neutral owner, has been taken and carried into Aberdeen, and illtreated by a Scotch Privateer contrary to the general law of nations, and that he has not been able to obtain his release, nor satisfaction, nor Justice, notwithstanding all your exertions on his behalf. I have been (and indeed you had reason to believe I would be) very much concerned to hear of such manifest injustice done to one of my subjects, altho' of no high rank; but I am not the less sensible of your generous proceeding; and I am really affected to find, that a stranger, as you are to me, should have taken in hand, without any private view, the defence of oppressed innocence against the injustice of your own Country. I therefore hasten to return you my thanks, and express to you my grateful acknowledgment, as well as the esteem and the particular value which I entertain of such uncommon virtue. If a man of a similar way of thinking stood in need of any other reward, it would be a pleasure to me, and my duty, to bestow it on him. I have not delayed the communication of your letter to my Minister at London, the Count Lusi; and have given him positive orders to make the strongest representations to His Britannic Majesty's Ministers, to get at least the releasement of the unfortunate Jansen and his men; and to obtain full and speedy justice for him. I expect it the more, as I have taken the most equitable measures, by publishing two Declarations, of which a printed copy is enclosed, that my subjects, during the course of the present war, shall only carry on an innocent Commerce, entirely conformable to the Law of Nations, and noways prejudicial to any of the belligerent powers; making use only of the liberty natural and customary to neutral countries. As to the rest I recommend the unfortunate Jansen to your further assistance, and I pray God to have you in His holy keeping.

It was found under the floor during the restoration of 1867, and the principal slab now lies at the north-west corner. It shews numerous emblems, including an effigy of Leith in low relief, two shields displaying the Leith and Garden arms respectively, a sand glass, and two shovels. At the top and round the margin is an inscription in Latin, which, in some parts, is considerably defaced. The late Mr. Andrew Gibb gave a drawing of the slab in Vol. XII., plate IX., of the "Proceedings of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland," to illustrate his paper on "Some Suggestions as to our Mural Antiquities." Bisset took out lawburrows against William Reid, for whom John Gordon of Tulligraig, Sheriff-Depute of Aberdeen, became security for £500. Bisset then complained to the Privy Council (Vol. viii., p. 115) that the Reids had by all "indirect meanes," this long time, "procurit" his "hurte." Thus, on 2nd May, 1607—a day appointed for the service of God, and "ane proclamit fast"—while the complainer was "going to the kirk [in Aberdeen] in a moist quiet and pecialbe maner without ony kynd of armour" the said Andro, at the instigation of his said brother, waylaid him "in ane quiet vennell quhilk gois fra the said complenaris house to the kirk," and "with gantillat, plaitsleve, sword, daigair, and heyland durk" set upon him, and, with the guards of his sword, gave him "mony deidlie stryckis in his heid, schoulderis, and small of his bak, and left him for deid; sua that he lay bedfast ane lang space thairefter in grite disease and dolloure, and was maid unable to use his calling for the intertenyment of his familie." The defenders still lie in waite for him, so that he dare not remain in Abirdlene, the place of his dwelling, for fear of his life. Defenders not compearing were declared rebels. William Reid quickly threw a different light upon the matter, at the same time laying bare the cunning of Bisset. His statement bore that having lately been in Edinburgh for eight or nine days, the said Bisset, whom he had daily met there, "evir craftelie in all his counterfoote speicheis with the said complenair, inquired of his dyet hameward." At last Bisset, hearing that complainer was obliged to repair with all diligence to his own house, where his wife was at the point of death, resolved "to mak his advantage of this the said complenair his necessitie," and caused deliver to him at the Nether Bow a copy of said charge. Bisset having failed in his proof, suspension was granted. A week later Reid had again to appeal to the Privy Council . . . that Bisset, finding himself disappointed in the pursuit stated, has now raised criminal letters, under the borrowed name of the Advocate, charging complainer and Marione Rolland, his spouse, to answer for the crime of adultery. "Now they had been lawfully married 15 years ago in the kirk of Culsalmond by the late William Straith, minister there, and have ever since cohabited in Aberdeen; their marriage has never been called in question; all their bairns have been baptised by the bishop and ministers of Aberdeen, and the complainer himself has for divers years borne office in the kirk. In the whole course of his life he has approven himself an honest man, free of "haviae and sclanderous imputations most foolishlie and miliciouslie gevin out aganis him be the said Abacuth, whose malice and wicked disposition is not only extendit aganis the said complenaris self, . . . but aganis his innocent and young children, whom he preisses to his malicious and folische inventiones to caus be repute bastardis." Both parties compearing, the Lords found that the defender Abacuth has behaved himself "verie maliciouslie" against the pursuer, and therefore "verie schairplie admonish him to forbear such form of doing hereafter."

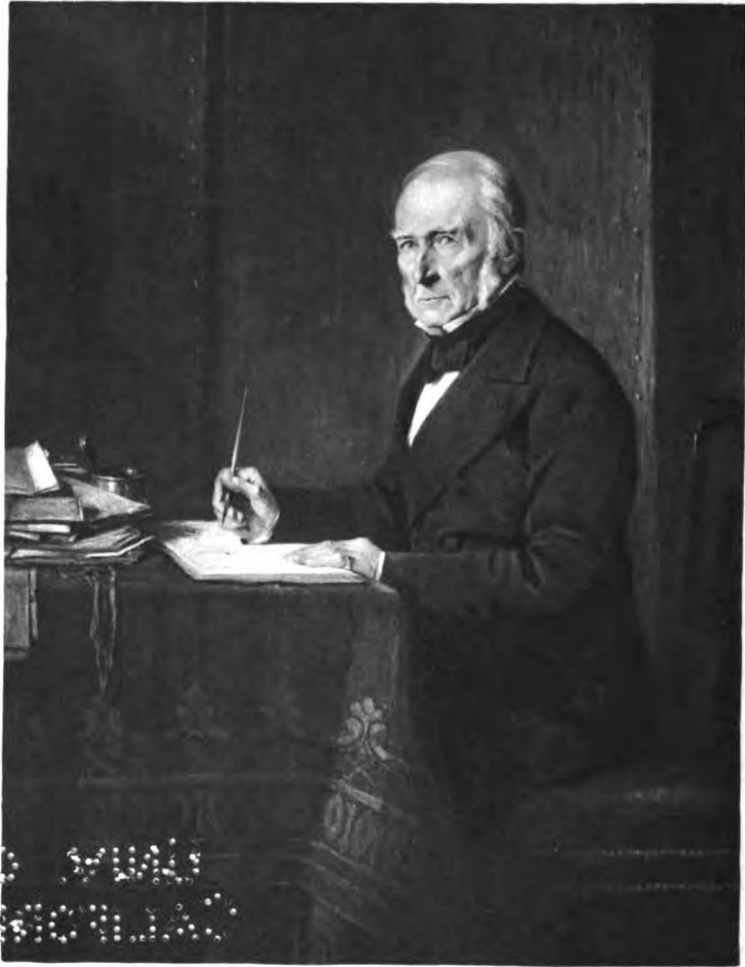

1. Introduction

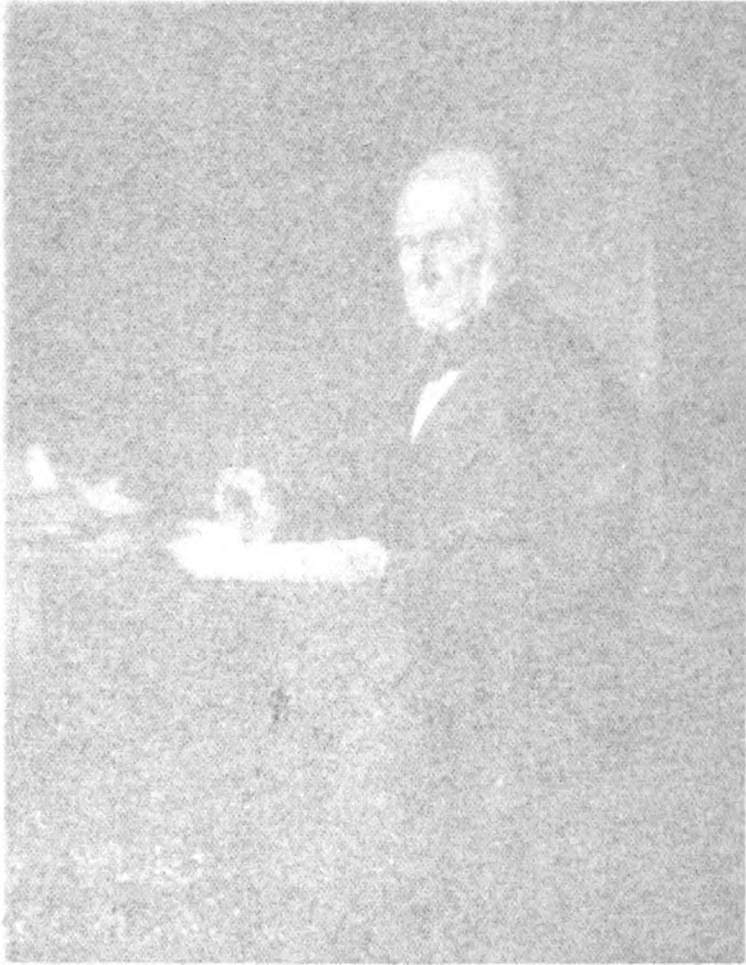

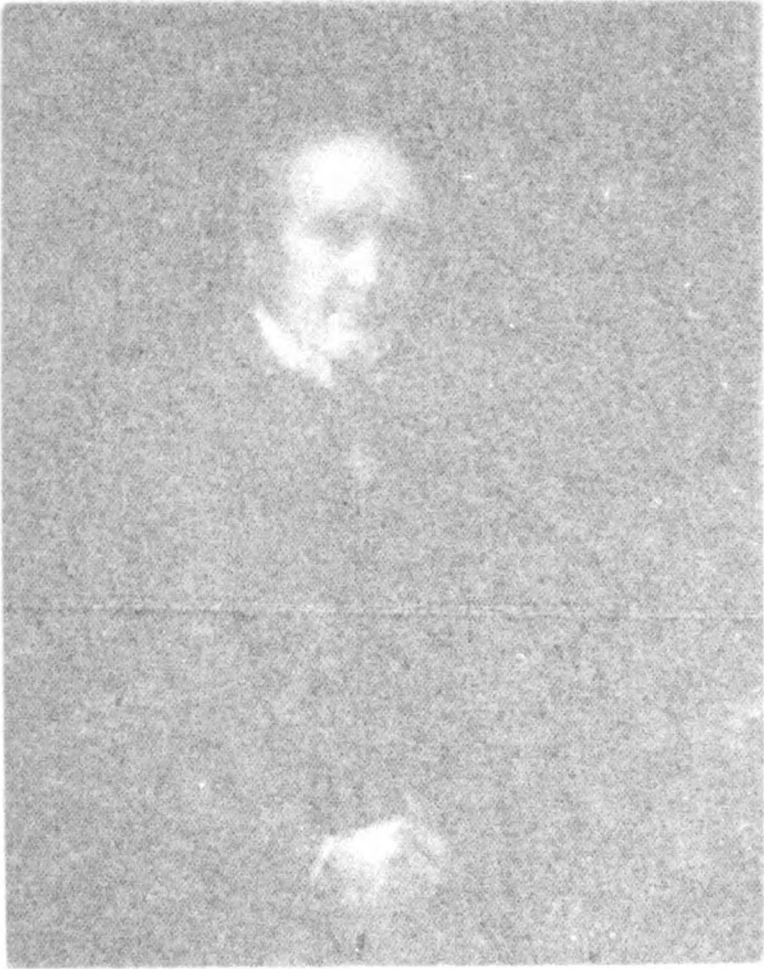

Shortly after his election, in 1848, as Councillor in the second ward, he was engaged in one of the most prominent fights of his Councillor life. Dissenters were in a majority at the Council Board—Provost Thompson being at their head—and a motion was made, and carried, to do away with the time-honoured procession of Magistrates and Councillors to the West Church. Mr. Torrie opposed the motion with all his might, declaring that he had looked into the records for 800 years back to prepare himself for its discussion. Provost Henry mildly supported him, but it was of no use, only four voted in favour of the procession. Mr. Torrie dissented and protested at the time, but, having a great respect for the old church, and wishing to preserve her dignity intact, he resolved to go further, and keep up the Sunday civic procession himself. Five of them, we believe, attended, and Mr. Torrie walked behind them, the sole representative of Town Council and Magistracy, and with a solemnity and stateliness equal to the occasion. He did not persist in his course, however, and the procession ceased, except on the one annual occasion on which it is still kept up. His energetic defence of this ancient practice pleased a number of the citizens, and shortly afterwards they made him a present of some plate as a token of their admiration of his conduct. . . ."—*Aberdeen Journal*. Mr. Torrie was also an active prosecutor of the Glen Tilt Right-of-Way case.

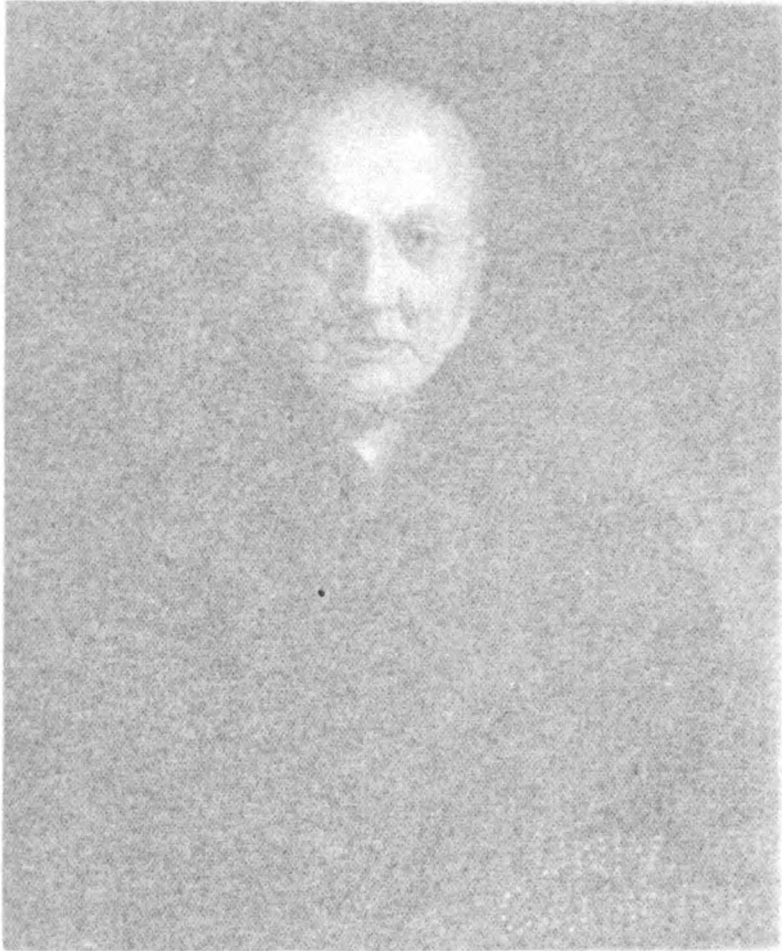

I

Deed of Constitution of the Society's Widows' Fund.

WHEREAS the Society and Corporation of Advocates in Aberdeen has for many years been possessed of considerable funds in land and money lent on personal security, the annual produce of which has been appropriated according to the terms of their Charter: That although these funds have been found more than amply sufficient for the ordinary and necessary purposes of the Society, and have of late years been considerably increased by the great number of additional members admitted, who have paid large sums in name of entry money, as well as annual contributions, yet no proper or adequate fund has hitherto been established for a provision to the widows of the members thereof. And whereas the institution of a permanent and separate fund for a certain provision to the widows of deceased members would be beneficial and creditable to the Corporation, a scheme for that purpose had, after mature consideration, been prepared, and was approved at the Annual General Meeting of the Society, held upon the twenty-sixth day of November, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-two. Therefore the Society have unanimously agreed to, and do hereby enact and establish, the following Rules and Regulations for the due administration of the said INSTITUTION, and which are appointed to be strictly observed in all time coming:—

First.—That, for the purpose of instituting a fund for a provision to the widows of the members, the sum of five thousand five hundred pounds sterling shall be taken from the present money stock or funds of the Society as on the Twentieth day of December, Eighteen Hundred and Twenty-two years, and vested in manner after-mentioned, to be improved at interest, and kept separate and distinct from the other funds of the Society, under the title of

“THE WIDOWS’ FUND.”

Second.—That, in further aid of said Fund, there shall be appropriated thereto the sum of forty guineas on the admission of every member of the said Society or Corporation after the first day of January in the present year out of the ordinary entry money of sixty guineas at present payable to the Society; and when such entry money shall be extended to one hundred guineas, according to

the regulation of the Society established on the Second day of January, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Nineteen, then the sum of sixty guineas shall be appropriated out of said sum to the Fund hereby instituted.

Third.—That, in further aid of the said Fund, there shall be appropriated thereto yearly the sum of one guinea out of the annual contributions at present payable to the Society by the members; and also one guinea out of the entry money at present payable to the Society by an apprentice on his entering into an indenture with any member of the Society, entitling such apprentice to the privileges of the Corporation.

Fourth.—That the foresaid sums hereby ordered to be appropriated to the support of the said Fund shall be applied to the uses and purposes after-mentioned, namely: In the first place, for payment of necessary expense of management. In the second place, for payment of annuities to widows of deceased members; and in the third place, for establishing a capital for the purposes of the present INSTITUTION.

Fifth.—That there shall be paid to the widow of a deceased member an annuity of thirty pounds sterling per annum, payable in moieties on the Twentieth day of June and Twentieth day of December in each year, commencing the first half-year's annuity at the first Twentieth day of June, or Twentieth day of December, after the death of her husband, for the half-year immediately following the said term; but declaring that no annuity, nor half-year's annuity, shall be payable out of this Fund to any widow until the twentieth day of December, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-four, when one half-year's annuity shall be paid for the half-year following that term, and that the respective annuities shall cease and determine at twelve o'clock noon of the Twentieth day of June or Twentieth day of December immediately preceding the deaths of the annuitants respectively, and declaring farther that in case at any time, owing to any unforeseen defalcation of the funds calculated on by the aforesaid scheme, or to the number of the widows entitled to the benefit thereof exceeding the proportions calculated to the reduction of interest of money, or to any other cause, it shall be found that the accumulation of capital is not progressively equal to the calculated amounts, then and in that case it shall be in the power of the Society from time to time to order and appoint the annuities to be restricted in such a manner, and for such period as shall appear to them to be necessary, and such restriction shall be made accordingly; on the other hand if, from experience, it shall appear to the Society that the Fund is progressively advancing, and can, with safety to its stability, afford an additional allowance to the widows, it shall be in the power of the Society to increase the annuity from time to time as they may think proper, and that it is hereby declared that no widow shall forfeit her annuity by entering

on a second or any future marriage, and it is also declared that, although she should marry a member of the Society for her second husband, or any future husband, she shall in no case draw more than one annuity.

Sixth.—That, if any member shall die leaving his annual contribution unpaid, such deduction shall be made from the annuity to his widow as shall be equal to the arrears due by him and interest thereon from the time the same became due, and upon the death of any member before he shall have paid seven years' rate, then such deduction, in manner after-mentioned, shall be made from the annuity payable to his widow, as, together with the same paid by him, shall, exclusive of interest, amount to seven years' contributions: Provided always that there shall be no deduction on any account from the widows' annuity for the first year they come on the Fund, but that a sum not exceeding one-fifth of the half-year's annuity for each subsequent half-year shall be deducted till the said deductions, along with the same that had been paid by the member himself, shall amount, as aforesaid, exclusive of interest, to the full sums that may be remaining unpaid for seven years' rates and arrears, unless the annuitant shall choose to pay up the whole at once; and it is hereby declared and agreed to, that the widows of members at present on the General Funds of the Society, and such other widows as may (in the meantime before the opening of the present INSTITUTION) be placed thereon, shall enjoy their annuities during their respective lives in the same manner as if the present Fund had never been established.

Seventh.—That the securities for the sums of money to be lent out shall be taken in the name of the President and Treasurer, and their successors in office, for the benefit of the Institution; and it shall be in the power of the Society to lend out the money belonging to this Fund on heritable or undoubted personal security as they may think proper, or to invest the same, or such part thereof as they may think proper, in the purchase of Government Stock, Stock of the Bank of England, or landed or other real property, with the approbation of the Society or Committee of Funds annually appointed.

Eighth.—That the Treasurer shall keep a regular book containing a particular account of the funds of the present INSTITUTION separate and distinct from the other or general funds of the Society; that he shall annually lay his accounts before the Committee of Funds, who shall audit the same and report thereon to the Annual General Meeting of the Society for their consideration.

Ninth.—And whereas the foresaid annuities are intended as alimentary provisions, therefore it is enacted that the said annuities payable to the widows shall not be assignable nor liable to be affected by arrestment nor otherwise attachable by creditors, nor shall they be subject to the *jus mariti* of any husband whom they may afterwards marry, or affectable by his debts or deeds; but shall,

notwithstanding such assignation, arrestment, attachment, or subsequent marriage, be paid to the widows themselves upon their simple receipt.

That these Rules and Regulations¹ shall be subscribed by all present members of the Society, and also by all future members at the time of their usual admission.

Married Margaret (died at Whitehill, 23rd January, 1907, aged 92), second dau. of William Arbuthnot of Dens. Died 19th April, 1885, aged 83.

ARNOTT, JOHN.

Son of Alexander Arnott, sometime merchant in Aberdeen, and brother of Neil Arnott, the well-known physician and natural philosopher. M.A., Mar. Coll., 1811. App., first, to Alexander Webster (1794), from 30th April, 1809, and, second, to John Campbell, W.S., Edinburgh. W.S., admitted 20th December, 1821. Died, unmarried, 5th April, 1864, aged 70.

Son of John Barron, watchmaker, Aberdeen, and Ann Allan, his wife, being elder brother of Lambert Barron, advocate (1834). M.A., Mar. Coll., 1817. App., first, to Alexander Smith (1804), from 19th May, 1815, second, to Robert Burnett, W.S., and, third, to Alexander Donald, W.S., Edinburgh. W.S., admitted 4th June, 1829. In partnership with Charles Gordon, W.S. (1824), firm being Gordon & Barron. Married, 26th December, 1837, Elizabeth, second dau. of Alexander Adie, optician, Edinburgh. Died at Aberdeen, 11th August, 1851, aged 50.

BEGG, DAVID GRAY.

Only surviving son of Rev. Alexander Begg, M.A., Mar. Coll., 1818, Congregational minister, Fraserburgh. Alumnus, King's Coll., 1845-47. App. to Clements Lumsden (1825), from 1847. Called to the Bar, Lincoln's Inn, 1859. Married, first, in London, 5th September, 1860, Sarah, eldest dau. of Robert Millington, and, second, in 1872, Henrietta Fox. Died 22nd July, 1898, aged 68.

BEST, THOMAS WILLIAM.

Son of Thomas Best, banker, Aberdeen. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1847-50. App. to James Murray and James Garden (Murray & Garden), from 14th June, 1849. Merchant in Bombay. Died unmarried.

BODIE, CHARLES.

Son of Alexander Bodie, in Bush, Auchterless, and Janet Mackie, his wife. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1827-31. App. to William Simpson (1813), from 1st September, 1829. Solicitor in Turriff. Died, unmarried, at Turriff, 31st March, 1875, aged 62.

BOOTH, JOSEPH.

Son of George Booth, watchmaker, Aberdeen. M.A., Mar. Coll., 1821. App., first, to Alexander Allan (1810), from June, 1819, and, second, to James Shepherd, W.S., Edinburgh. W.S., admitted 9th December, 1830. Died, unmarried, at Hatton of Fintray, Aberdeenshire, 13th August, 1871, aged 68.

BOWMAN, ALEXANDER GORDON.

Son of John Bowman, M.D., of Gayfield, Forfarshire, and Margaret Gordon, his wife. App. to James Brebner (1828), from 28th June, 1833. Master in Surgery. Married at Canterbury, 17th March, 1842 (then designed as "only surviving grandson of the late Sir Alexander Gordon, Bart., of Lesmoir, Aberdeenshire"¹), Eleanor (died at Portobello, 21st January, 1843), dau. of Henry Ricketts, of Chenlett Lodge, Hampshire.

BOYD, JAMES TOWER.

Son of George Boyd, merchant, Ceylon. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1847-49. App. to Francis Edmond (1829), from 1st December, 1849. Banker in Canada.

BREBNER, ALEXANDER CROMBIE.

Eldest son of James Brebner, advocate (1828). Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1847-50. App. to his father. In Audit Department, Somerset House. Died, in London, 26th January, 1873, aged 41.

BROWN, ARTHUR RICHARDSON.

Son of William Alexander Brown, M.A., St. And., 1854, LL.D., Aberd., 1895, member, Faculty of Advocates, Sheriff Substitute of Aberdeen, Banff, and Kincardine, and Elizabeth MacGeorge MacIndoe, his wife. Born at Edinburgh, 16th May, 1875. M.A., Aberd., 1896. App. to Alexander Davidson, John Whyte, David Macbeth Moir Milligan and Duguid Rae Milne (Davidson & Garden), from 10th May, 1894. Member, Faculty of Advocates, admitted 13th March, 1903.

BURTON, JOHN HILL.

Second son of Lieut. William Kininmond Burton, 94th Regiment, and — Paton, his wife. Born at Aberdeen, 22nd August, 1809. Educated at Grammar School, Aberdeen; M.A., Mar. Coll., 1829; LL.D., Edinb., 1864, and Aberd., 1871; D.C.L., Oxon., 1878. App. first, to Charles Winchester, and, second, to Thomas Burnett and Newell Burnett (Thomas & Newell Burnett), from 31st October, 1826. Member, Faculty of Advocates, admitted 23rd December, 1831. Secretary to the Prison Board of Scotland, and, subsequently, Historiographer Royal for

Married, first, Mary Ann Leslie, dau. of John Rutherford of Hunthill, and, second, on 26th July, 1841, Mary Isabella, third dau. of Thomas Selby, Ipswich. Died 20th February, 1854, aged 50.

DUTHIE, WALTER.

Son of Alexander Duthie, advocate (1764). Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1804-5, etc. App., first, to Alexander Daune (1776), from 13th April, 1807, and, second, to William Handyside, W.S., Edinburgh. W.S., admitted 10th March, 1817. Succeeded to the estates of Burnside, Rosehill, and Ruthrieston, Aberdeen. Portrait in "Modern Athenians." Died, at Edinburgh, unmarried, 30th September, 1868, aged 78.

ESSON, GEORGE AULDJO.

Son of John Esson, merchant, Quebec. M.A. (with honours), Mar. Coll., 1831. App. to Duncan Davidson (1794), from 12th November, 1830. One of the original members of The Society of Accountants in Edinburgh, Incorporated 1854. Accountant in Bankruptcy, Edinburgh, appointed 31st October, 1856. Author. Married, 4th February, 1844, Margaret, dau. of Major Alexander Skene, 24th Regiment. Died 13th March, 1888.

EWING, ALEXANDER.

Only son of Alexander Ewing of Tartowie, M.A., King's Coll., 1810; M.D., Edinb., 1815; Lecturer on Anatomy, Aberd., and Barbara

McCombie, his wife. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1844-47. App. to John Blaikie and John Smith (Blaikie & Smith), from 10th August, 1846. As a "Deputy Assistant Commissary General" served throughout the campaign of 1860, in the North of China (medal); also during the operations against the Taepings, in the vicinity of Shanghai, in 1862, etc. Lieut.-Col., and Staff Paymaster, Army Pay Dept. Musical Composer; the tune "Ewing," sung to the hymn, "Jerusalem the Golden," immortalizing him. Succeeded to Tartowie, Kinellar. Married, first, on 1st June, 1867 Juliana Horatia (died 1885), authoress, second dau. of the Rev. Alfred Gatty, D.D., Vicar of Ecclesfield, Yorkshire, and, second, Elizabeth Margaret, dau. of the Rev. Anthony Cumby, Vicar of Bolton-on-Swale, Yorkshire. Died 16th July, 1895.

FARQUHAR, ARTHUR.

Son of Arthur Farquhar, shoemaker, Aberdeen. M.A., Mar. Coll., 1838. App. to Charles Chalmers and Nathaniel Farquhar (Chalmers & Farquhar), from 19th July, 1837. Land Surveyor in Australia.

FORBES, HENRY DAVID.

Son of Duncan Forbes Mitchell, of Thainston, and Katharine Ann Fraser, his wife. Born 12th November, 1790. M.A., King's Coll., 1808. App. to Andrew Jopp (1796), from 12th November, 1808. Married, 27th May, 1816, his cousin, Margaret (born 6th July, 1796, died 19th August, 1839), eldest dau. and heiress of Alexander Fraser of Fraserfield, previously, and afterwards, Balgownie. Died 24th July, 1869.

FORBES, JOHN.

Youngest son of James Forbes, merchant, and sometime magistrate of Aberdeen, and Elspet Gordon Morgan, his wife. Born 4th February, 1838. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1853-56. App. to John Yeats and Alexander Flockhart (Yeats & Flockhart), from 28th May, 1855. Barrister, Lincoln's Inn, 1862. Q.C., 1881. Recorder of Hull from 1887. Died at Dover, 6th May, 1877.

FRASER, WILLIAM NATHANIEL.

Second son of Francis Fraser of Findrack, Commander, R.N., and Garden Winchester, his wife. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1832-34 and 1835-36. App. to Duncan Davidson (1794), from 1st July, 1834. S.S.C., admitted 10th December, 1850. Became proprietor of Torna-veen and Findrack. Married, in 1846, Philadelphia Lambe (died 14th October, 1879), dau. of Hugh Veitch of Stuartfield, Town Clerk of Leith. Died at Edinburgh, 13th November, 1899, aged 82.

GAMACK, JOHN HUTCHISON.

Son of William Gamack, writer, Peterhead. M.A., Mar. Coll., 1856. App. to Thomas Burnett and Newell Burnett (Thomas & Newell Burnett), from 29th May, 1854. Manager, Agricultural Company, Newcastle, New South Wales.

GAMACK, WILLIAM.

Son of Alexander Gamack in Coburty, Aberdour. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1805-7. App. to Thomas Burnett (1796), from 10th August, 1807. Writer in, and subsequently Postmaster of, Peterhead. Baron-Baillie, Vice-Admiral Depute, and Clerk of Lieutenancy, Peterhead.

GILLIES, JAMES.

Eldest son of Robert Gillies, of Little Keithock, merchant, Brechin, and brother of Adam, Lord Gillies. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1775-76, etc. App. to John Gordon (1753), from 1774. Minister of Menmuir, Forfarshire, 1779. Married Anne Durward. Died 11th January, 1783.

GORDON, GEORGE.

App. to Alexander Lumsden (1759), from 1773. Ensign, 78th (afterwards 72nd) Foot, 15th January, 1778; Lieut., 15th September, 1780; served on Coromandel Coast in 1788. Died in 1792.¹

GORDON, WILLIAM ROBERT.

Son of John Gordon, wine merchant, Malaga. Born 24th September, 1812. Educated at Grammar School, Aberdeen; Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1825-27. App. to James McHardy (1817), from 22nd October, 1827. Solicitor in Keith in 1833, and subsequently in Banff. Procurator Fiscal of Banffshire, January, 1842, to May, 1879. GRANT, ROBERT.

Son of Robert Grant, farmer, Old Morlich, and Isobel Ross, his wife. M.A., King's Coll., 1842. App. to John Duncan (1824), from 16th June, 1842. Minister of Stracathro, Forfarshire, ordained there in December, 1851. Married, at Manse of Craig, in 1867, Anne Wardlaw, dau. of Rev. Robert Mitchell, minister of Craig, near Montrose. Died at Stracathro, in June, 1909, aged 85.

HAY, JAMES.

Son of James Hay, factor at Fyvie, and proprietor of Monkshill, and Elizabeth Fraser, his wife. M.A., Mar. Coll., 1790. App. to David Morice (1764), from 1788. Succeeded to Monkshill, Fyvie. Died, unmarried, 14th February, 1828, aged 53.

HENDERSON, JOHN WISHART.

Eldest son of John Henderson, sometime Manager, North of Scotland Bank (Limited), now General Manager of the Clydesdale Bank (Limited), and Sarah Thomson, his wife. Born at Edinburgh, 3rd February, 1884. Educated at Rugby; M.A., Aberd., 1904; B.L., 1906. App. to Alexander Duffus (Wilsone & Duffus), from 1st November, 1904. Law Agent, admitted November, 1907. Notary Public. With Mackenzie, Robertson & Co., writers, Glasgow, from November, 1906, and partner in that firm from 1st January, 1912.

JAMIESON, GEORGE AULDJO.

Son of James Jamieson, M.D., Mar. Coll., 1840, and Anne Maria Auldjo, his wife. M.A., Mar. Coll., 1846. App. to Charles Chalmers and Nathaniel Farquhar (Chalmers & Farquhar), from 4th June, 1846. One of the original members of The Society of Accountants in Edinburgh, Incorporated 1854. Married, first, 27th November, 1860, Mary Jane (died 30th June, 1864), eldest dau. of David Souter Robertson of Lawhead; and, second, on 23rd April, 1867, Susan Helena, elder dau. of Robert Oliphant, Rossie, Perthshire. Died at Edinburgh, 18th July, 1900.

LAING, PETER.

Afterwards proprietor of Craigmyle, and assumed the name of Peter Laing Gordon. SUTHERLAND, ALEXANDER GORDON.

Son of Neil Sutherland, M.D., Aberd., 5th December, 1800, and Magdalen Gordon, his wife. Born 16th January, 1804. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1818-20. App., first, to Andrew Jopp (1796), from 21st February, 1821, and, second, to Alexander Blair, W.S., Edinburgh. W.S., admitted 19th November, 1829. Died, unmarried, 25th October, 1869.

TAIT, THOMAS.

Son of William Tait, farmer, Crichtie, Kintore, and Elspet Smith, his wife. Born at Crichtie, December, 1801. Educated at Parish School, Kintore; Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1816-19. App. to John Ewing (1811), from November, 1818. Founder of Port-Elphinstone Meal Mills, and Inverurie Paper Mills. Married, 18th May, 1833, Catherine Fraser (died 11th January, 1908, in her 98th year). Died 11th September, 1870.

WILSON, NATHANIEL.

Son of Nathaniel Wilson, factor at Cluny, and afterwards farmer at Mill of Kincardine, and Euphemia Angus, his wife. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., 1799-1802. App. to Duncan Davidson (1794), from 18th September, 1804. Fell at Waterloo, 18th June, 1815.

YOUNG, ARCHIBALD.

Son of Robert Young, factor, Monymusk, and Jean Leslie, his wife. Alumnus, Mar. Coll., entered 1783. App. to John Innes (1776), from 1780. Writer in Banff; Collector of Cess and Taxes; Commissary Clerk, and Procurator Fiscal of Banffshire. Characterised as "The King of Wits." Married at Banff, 2nd July, 1797, Jane (died 30th November, 1841, aged 63), eldest dau. of James Donaldson of Kinairdy, Marnoch, Banffshire. Succeeded, as heir of entail, to the estate of Kininvie, Mortlach, when he assumed the patronymic of Leslie. Died 31st October, 1841, aged 74.¹

YOUNG, ROBERT.

Son of Robert Young, farmer, Inchbroom, Elgin, and Margaret Milne, his wife. App. to James Blaikie and Patrick Bannerman (Blaikie & Bannerman), from 13th August, 1825. Solicitor in Elgin, from 1st April, 1831, when in partnership with William Grigor, firm being Grigor & Young. Author of "Annals of Elgin," and histories of Burghead, the Parish of New Spynie, etc. Married, first, at Murtle, Aberdeenshire, 21st April, 1836, Isabella Thurburn, dau. of Hugh Johnston, of St. John's, New Brunswick, and, second, at Kilnhillock, Cullen, in August, 1873, Jessie, dau. of John Wilson, late of Branjan, Banffshire. Died 17th January, 1879.²

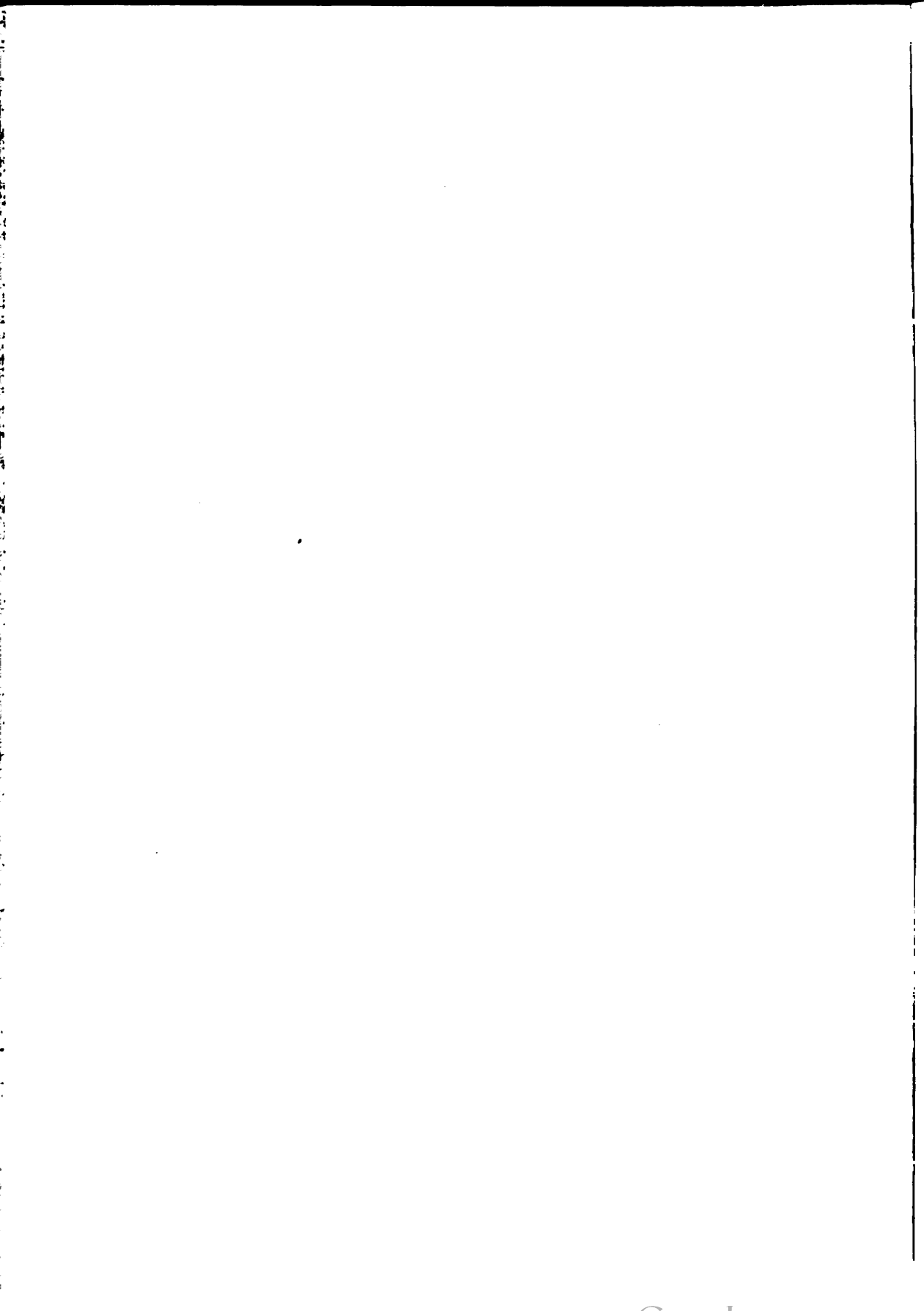
