The Conference was held at the Thomas Cooper Library at the University of South Carolina. The official title of the conference was 'Burns at 250: Contemporaries, Contexts and Cultural Forms'. The speakers were drawn from North American and Scottish Universities and there were also several presentations by non-academics.

Some papers were also presented by graduate students from South Carolina, Glasgow and Edinburgh Universities.

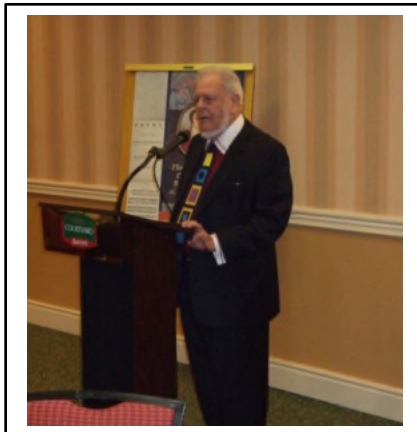
