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## SCOTTISH PLANT FOLKLORE

Winter was not kind to gardens this past year. The ice storms suffered on the East Coast last February wiped out all of my Foxglove! Before starting this project two years ago, I already had several varieties of native plants growing in my garden. Plants like *Achillea Millefolium* (Yarrow), *Cytisus Scoparius* (Broom), *Armeria* (Thrift), *Chenopodiaceae* (Thistle), *Lady's Mantle* (not *Alchemilla vulgaris* variety~, *Rubus Fruticosus* (blackberry), *Ajuga reptans* (Bugleweed), *Digitalis Purpurea* (Foxglove), *Lythrum Salicaria* (Purple Loosestrife), and *Hypericum Androsaemum* (St. John's Wort) are easily found at local garden centers. No perennial garden is complete without most of these! Michael (Cochrane) Hartley; did your *Sorbus aucuparia* L. (Rowan or Mountain ash) tree and Foxglove survive the winter?

Special note: In the 17th and 18th century, all of Europe was trying to outdo each other in creating spectacular gardens. Scotland's interest in formal gardening began in the middle of the 18th century (creating flower gardens was not a high priority) and when it did, Scots were so successful at formal gardening, that England and France sought Scottish landscapers and gardeners to work in their gardens.

**STELLARIA Holostea** - (Greater stitchwort, Easter Bell, Bruisewort, and Soapwort) Hardy perennial, grows 6 to 8 inches tall, has bright white blooms in May/June. Found among the bluebells in hedgerbanks, thickets, and neglected woodland gardens.

**Purpose:** Makes a good ground cover where grass won't grow". Soap was made from this plant by "bruising" or crushing the leaves to cause it to foam-up, hence the name of soapwort, or brulsewort. (Did you know that soap is a Celtic invention?) Also called stitchwort because mixing with powder of acorns, and drunk in wine, it would cure the pain in your side. I wonder just how much wine you had to drink, with Stitchwort of course, to cure your pain?

**Garden Folklore:** Unknown.

**Gaelic:** tuirseach - sad, dejected

**Zones:** 3-7 (but not sure)

**TROLLIUS europaeus** - (Globe flower) Trolliuses require moist soil and thrive when planted in wet beds or at the edge of a pond or stream. If you plant them in full sun, they will require frequent watering. Globe flower has large buttercup-shaped yellow flowers measuring 2 inches across, reaching heights of 24 to 30 inches tall. Most old plant books refer to Globe flower's Scottish names; Locker Goulans, Lucken Goliande or Lucben Gowan.

**Purpose:** The flowers being fragrant while drying were strewn over the floors during holidays.

**Garden Folklore:** Scandinavian Trolls are supposed to unlock the flower at night and drop venom in the "cup" to poison dairy-maids and herdmen.

**Gaelic:** "ol, olachan = drink

**Zones:** 4-7

**V. Tricolor** - (Wild pansy, or Johnny Jump-up) *Violae* are popular bedding, edging or rock garden plants. They bloom profusely and have long lasting flowers. They like to grow in rich, humusy soil and in full sun, and will tolerate some shade, especially during hot weather.

England and Scotland has the reputation for growing the best violets and pansies. In 19th century England, contests were held to see who grew the best Violet. Scotland carried home more blue ribbons from these contests which increased the demand for Scottish violets.

**Purpose:** Celts made a tea from the dried leaves and used it as a love potion. (folklore or purpose?)

**Garden folklore:** The three petals were thought to be representative of the Christian doctrine of the Trinity, and the flower was sometimes called herb trinity. German and Scottish folktale: pansies were called stepmother. The large lower petal is the mother, the two large petals to either side of her are the well-dressed daughters, and the two small upper petals are the poor stepdaughters. According to the doctrine of Signatures, pansy leaves, which are heart-shaped, were used to cure a broken heart.

**Gaelic:** Spog ns cubhaig = heart's ease

## Cochranes at Celtic Festival

The House of Scotland in Balboa Park, San Diego holds a joint celebration each year, with the Houses of Wales and Ireland, of our common and diverse Celtic traditions. This year's festival was on Saturday, April 29, 1995. The site was outside and inside the War Memorial Building in Balboa Park. Daytime festivities included Scottish and Irish dancing, singing, Welsh choral music, clan and society tents, piping, drumming and Highland dance competitions, display pavilions, story telling, travelogues, an ancient Celtic village, and food and drink for sale. Some 22 clan tents were in evidence including the Cochrane Tent, which was well staffed by California Commissioner Carol Cochran Fossett Yaremko, and spouse Bob. We were "discovered" by some Cochran(e)s who were excited to take away clan literature and application forms.

In the evening there was a full dinner and ceilidh, with more Scottish and Irish dancers, *pipers*, Welsh music and songs. Clan Cochrane' was prominent here too, as Carol was honored with the task of carrying the haggis as it was piped in before some 230 guests. Needless to say, Carol was adorned in her Cochrane tartan.

# COL. WILLIAM M. COCKRUM "HISTORY OF GIBSON CO., IN" 1884

The COCKRUM family of Gibson County are of Scotch descent and among the very early settlers of this part of IN. Col. James W. COCKRUM, the father of William M. was born in North Carolina in 1799. From there he removed to TN and in 1816 came to Gibson County, IN. He settled near Francisco (the farm now owned by Cpt. C. C. Whiting), but soon after removed to a farm east of Oakland, where he lived for many years. He subsequently removed to a farm where the town Oakland now stands, where he remained until his death in 1875. He was in the early "training day" colonel of the militia, and he wore the title with becoming dignity ever after. He followed steamboating into the lower rivers. He was the owner of two steamboats and also owned and ran a great number of flatboats that carried produce to New Orleans and other Southern cities. In addition he carried on farming and mercantile business at home. In his later years he became an active and zealous member of the General Baptist Church, and his devotion to the cause of Christianity led him into many charitable acts of both a public and private character. His efforts in building up that religious denomination of which he was a member, and supplying it with a suitable house for worship, is still recollected by the people of Oakland and vicinity. He was a just and honest man not from policy, but innately so from convictions of right and justice. It can be truthfully said of him that he died leaving to his posterity the legacy of a life and name untarnished by an act of

wrong or in justice to a living man, His intelligence pointed out clearly to him that the basis upon which must rest the future security of our free institutions was the general knowledge and education of the masses, and that a free and liberal system of schools was the best safeguard of our liberties. Therefore any proposition in that direction found in him an enthusiastic and earnest supporter. He believed that the masses could not be educated too much. The Oakland Institute stands as a monument to his enterprise and liberality in that direction.

Politically he was an old line Whig, and afterward a Republican. He represented Gibson County in the legislature, first in 1848 and again in 1852. He was an active promoter and one of the first directors of the Air Line Railroad. He was a firm temperance man, and with the aid of his two sons, kept Oakland free from saloons until 1881.

Mr. COCKRUM was twice married. His first wife was Sarah BARRETT, a native of North Carolina. By that union is James M. COCKRUM, the sole survivor. He was born in 1828. He followed the bent of his father's mind in regard to educational matters, and has done much for the schools of his vicinity. He was also among the first business men of Oakland. In 1861 he abandoned mercantile pursuits and promptly shouldered his musket and went to the front in the defense of the imperiled liberties of this country. After the war he re-engaged in merchandising, and subsequently studied law and engaged in real estate business

in which he still continues. After the death of his wife, Col. James M. COCKRUM married Judah P. BARRETT, sister of his first wife and daughter of William Barrett. Col. William M. is the only survivor of that union. He was born 8 Dec. 1837 on the old COCHRUM homestead, now in the center of Oakland City. He is a self-made man. There was but poor opportunity in his youth for receiving an education. At the breaking out of the late war, he enlisted in Company F of the Forty-second Regiment Indiana Volunteer Infantry and rose through the intermediate grade from the second lieutenant to the lieutenant-colonel of the regiment. He veteranized both his regiment, and continued in the service until the close of the war. In the Battle of Chickamauga he was desperately wounded, an ounce of lead passing through his body at the hips. He was captured lying on the battle field and taken to Libby prison, where his wound received insufficient treatment. At the hands of rebel surgeons. After suffering untold miseries his rugged and strong frame brought him through but left him a cripple for life. In his younger years he engaged in company with his brother in a general store and produce business. They dealt very largely in pork and leaf tobacco. After the war they engaged in agricultural pursuits, and later in stove manufacturing. Col. COCKRUM in many respects is a typical western man, imbued with that vim, enterprise and push so characteristic of the tree sons on the West. He has

done more, perhaps to build up the town of Oakland than any other resident.

On October 23, 1856, he was united in marriage to Miss Lucretia HARPER, daughter of John and Marjorie (O'Neil) HARPER. She is also of Scotch-Irish descent. Nine children have been born to them. Their names in the order of their birth are: John B., who is a lawyer and member of the law firm Handy, Armstrong, and COCKRUM, of Boonville, in Warrick County, the leading law firm in that county; Ella Clara C., who is the wife of T. M. CAMPBELL; Willie, dead; Oliver M.; Zoe; Mary; James W.; and Onie M. COCKRUM. Mrs. COCKRUM is a very earnest worker in the cause of Christianity, a member of the General Baptist Church, and does all she can to promote and forward the interest of that religious denomination Politically Col. COCKRUM has, since casting his first vote, been an ardent Republican.
