ON THE COVER



The Culross Abbey House is located 7 miles west of Dunfermline and overlooks the Firth of Forth. It was built by Edward Bruce in 1608 and acquired by William Cochrane when he married Lady Mary Bruce. William Cochrane was the grandson of the First Earl and father of the Eighth Earl (The Eighth Earl having succeeded his second cousin once removed to the title). Culross Abbey was sold in 1793 by the Ninth Earl after losing the family fortune.

The house has gone through many alterations. It was originally a two-story building. A third story was added but later removed. At one time it was described as a block of three stories with a tower at each end. The doorway has six windows on each side and there are thirteen windows on the second floor. It was a dilapidated mansion when the Tenth Earl was growing up and a roofless ruin later in his life. It was restored early in this century.

HURRICANE HUGO AFFECTS WILLIAMSBURG GAMES!

The annual Williamsburg Scottish Festival scheduled for the third weekend of September, was moved to a local Holiday Inn because of Hurricane Hugo! Anyone who lives along the Atlantic Coast can testify to the unpredictable nature of hurricanes. Hugo's path was expected to move up the Eastern Seaboard and arrive in the Williamsburg area on Saturday. As a precaution, the Games were moved inside. The illustrations herewith are from the cover of the family record of William and Mary Cochrane's descendants who settled initially in the Illawarra District of N.S.W. Among these descendants; Trevor Cochrane of Candela and his niece, Sandra (Cochrane) Florance are foundation members of our Clan. Sandra (our first secretary) is also secretary of the Army Wives Association. Trevor is a retired (if any farmer can ever be retired) dairy farmer and resides at "Kawangie".

Trevor has written an interesting and imaginative account of the emigration of Eliza Cochrane and her husband, John Keys, mentioning, later alia "man-eating Kangaroos" and of falling off the earth "down under". If everyone in his or her retirement would write down the family history how much easier it would be for those coming after them. How many of us had the opportunity to quiz elderly relatives and regretted that they had not done so! Somehow, as the years roll by "family" suddenly becomes important!

William and Mary had thirteen children only two of them "died young" as the genealogists say. The remaining eleven married and appear to have had "issue", some in abundance! Other than Cochranes, of course, on the distaff side are names such as: *Keys, Martin, Flower, Berkeley, Chegwidan, Osborne, Irvin, Rankin, Ball, and Beatson*. To these can be added at least forty more names through which the "crimson thread" of Cochrane blood still flows! To the people, then, who produced this Cochrane family record, Congratulations!

In the forward to this magnificent record Richard Reid gives an excellent summary of the conditions which forced, in the 1850's some one hundred and one thousand Irish emigrants to head for Australia and New Zealand. In January 1847 GEORGE DAWSON, a wealthy County Londonderry landowner wrote to a friend...."I do not exaggerate when I tell you that from the amount I open my hull door in the morning until dark I have a crown of women and children

crying out to save them from starvation....I have been obliged to turn my kitchen into a bakery and soup shop to enable me to feed the miserable children that cannot be sent empty away. So great is their distress that they actually faint on getting food into their stomachs.”

Famine also hit Scotland and Scots in their thousands emigrated to Canada, U.S.A., South Africa, Australia, and New Zealand.

Congratulations are in order, surely for the person who named this booklet, *WILLIAM AND MARY!*

“WHO ARE THE SCOTS??”
And
“WHENCE CAME THE COCHRANES??”

Dr. Ian Grimble, author of *The Sea Wolf* was asked by BBC Scotland to run a long series called, “Who are the Scots?” This he did and it was a great success and repeated many time. So it is with great temerity that the writer is attempting here to embrace this subject in the space of a few paragraphs. It was prompted by a desire to find the origin of the Cochranes in this maze.



When one looks at the map above it is not surprising to find that the “Name” Cochrane (originating in the Renfrew area) comes not from Gaelic, or from the Norse, but from the ancient “Brit”. COCH RHEN = RED BROOK. The family name, then, gives no clue as to the nationality of us Cochranes.

The original Scots came from free SCOTIA or Northern Ireland. They were a Celtic race and they brought with them their Irish Gaelic language. Usually an incoming invader is gradually

absorbed by the "locals": this was not the case with the Gaels. These "Scots" gradually absorbed the Picts totally and even the Scandinavians who invaded from the north and the west. Even the South-west marked "Britons" were absorbed to a marked degree while the Angles area retained the English. There was an 'in-put" of English and Norse into the Gaelic Language and this accounts for the difference between today's Irish and Scottish Gaelic. The modern "Scots" tongue is English with a marked Scottish accent. There has been a resurgence in the learning of Gaelic, especially in the Scottish Islands and the children are being taught Gaelic in the island schools.

The writer is yet to find the Cochranes listed among the Highland Clans but they are listed with the "Scottish Clans of Old". So we must accept that we are of Scandinavian origin of Celtic if not of Gaelic origin.
