2002 GAMES SEASON OPENS AT SOUTHERN MARYLAND FESTIVAL

On a dewy spring morning along the banks of the southern Potomac River, the 2002 Scottish Games season was opened to the scrill of pipes and graceful leaps of dancing maidens. While the Southern Maryland Festival is Celtic in nature, a goodly number of Scottish Clans set up their tents along a broad avenue adjacent to the main stage. The many vendors displayed their wares along another corridor where bargains and newly discovered treasure could be quickly purchased. The COS tent was centrally located halfway up the walkway toward the Barn.

Chief Eric Bartock and his wife, Becki, arrived early with a full car ready to feed and educate the multitudes. **Scribe** Martha Walls and Randy Gregory brought the tool kit in time to finish nailing everything to the ground in case of inclement weather. Soon joined by other COS stalwarts, the tent was fully ready for business by the 10 a.m. opening. The usual discussion about the placement of the American flag was an expected highlight of the early morning. The sunny weather held through the morning and into the afternoon. COS was constantly visited by many clan seekers and curious Celts.

The tent was full of workers and visitors throughout the day. Dick and Iris Hyson, Jim and Iris Nimmo, Jim

INTERNET SCOTTISH TRAVEL BARGAINS GALORE

Travel opportunities to Scotland have become a real internet bargain for those looking to visit the country of their ancestors. The onset of Mad Cow Disease in early 2001 created havoc on tourism inside Scotland as a result of travel restrictions on many rural areas. Although the disease was never detected in Scotland, authorities were properly cautious and limited possible exposure and spread. The tragedy of September 11th in New York, Washington and Pennsylvania severely contracted the ease of air travel and increased the fearful aspect of travel to the public.

The restoration of confidence in travel management and improved security at airports worldwide has provided an opportunity for the public to take advantage of travel cost savings, lowered air fares and lodging promotions in Scotland. IcelandAir offers exceptionally low fares between Washington and Glasgow. By becoming a member of the Netclub (a free service) at www.icelandair.com, travelers can receive additional savings of hundreds of dollars on short term member-only promotions. As an example, a Lucky Fare of \$269 roundtrip from BWI to Glasgow was offered to Netclub members in May. In the height of the season, June travel fares for members are \$399 and August costs \$529. Add the mandatory taxes, fees and September 11th Security Fee of \$105 to any ticket.

Even online auto rentals, normally an expensive item, are considerably reduced at www.orbitz.com. Alamo offers a \$220 weekly rate from Glasgow airport. In country rental agencies have rates as low as \$22 per day. Of course, extremely favorable foreign exchange rates contribute to travel savings.

Lodgings are always a prime consideration. The Dunalastair Hotel in Perthshire offers a nightly rate of \$49 per night. The Rowan Tree Country Hotel in Aviemore

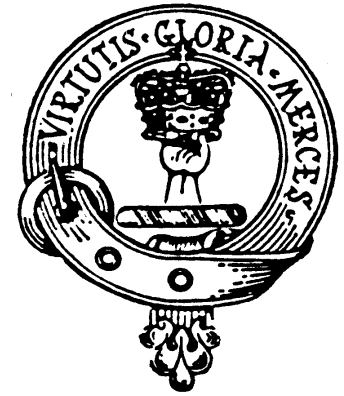

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GENEALOGY

MORE DEATH RECORDS

Last month I wrote about probate records and how they are useful in genealogical research.

Last year I wrote about one type of vital statistics — death records. However, what records can help us if neither probate records nor death records are available? This article will cover some possible alternatives.

One little known source of information that gives as much information as the death certificate, if not more, is the funeral home record. Funeral homes maintain records on all people that they bury or cremate. These records are often quite complete. For example, my father's record gave the following information:

Name of deceased
Date of Death, Place of death, Last place of residence
Birth place, Birth date, Age
Length of residence in city
Wife's maiden name, Father's name, Mother's maiden name
Social Security No., If veteran, what was Cause of death
Physician, Informant, Address of informant
Date of interment, Cemetery

As you can see, quite a lot of information!

Funeral homes are quite easy to track down. I gave several talks on beginning genealogy and in each talk I mention ten basic books that constitute a genealogy library for beginners. The tenth book is *National Yellow Book of Funeral Directors & Suppliers*, published by Nomis Publications, Inc., Youngstown, Ohio. While I use this as an attention getter, this book is quite useful. It lists every funeral home in the U.S. with addresses and phone numbers. Nomis updates this book yearly and it should be available in most libraries. If not, a local funeral director will have a copy.

Another useful source of information is at the cemetery — the gravestone. Gravestones can give birth and death dates. Additionally, gravestones can imply relationships by their location. If I came across several Lenz gravestones side by side, I would suspect a close relationship — perhaps a family. If the cemetery was a small one, and there were other Lenz gravestones in that cemetery, I would suspect that they

were also related. While visiting the cemetery is the best way to go, this is often not possible. A next best substitute is a published cemetery record. Many local genealogical or historical societies have published books that contain the gravestone inscriptions. For example, the Mercer County, Pennsylvania, Genealogical Society has published a 16-volume set that contains all cemeteries in Mercer County. By the way, one of my pet peeves is the alphabetical cemetery book. All the names are arranged in alphabetical order, thereby denying the researcher the benefit of knowing the relative locations of the gravestones and establishing possible relationships.

Other possible records that you should not overlook are cemetery burial records and church records. The cemetery maintains records on burials and these records can provide birth, death, and address information. Normally you should try to get these records at large cemeteries. Church records or sexton's records can also provide useful data, but unfortunately are often hard to locate.

PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES

The following recommended changes to the Clans of Scotland's Bylaws are being submitted to the Membership by the Council for approval at the next regularly schedule membership meeting (Note: *Italicized, bolded text indicates additions to the Bylaws.*)

ARTICLE II, MEMBERSHIP

(Change summary: reinstate the Associate Membership classification)

Amend:

Classes: There shall be *four* classes of Members: Regular Members, Life Members, Honorary Members, *and Associate Members*

Add:

Associates: In addition to members, the Clans of Scotland, U.S.A., Inc. reserves the right to associate itself with persons – or with organizations not qualified for Regular Membership, but espousing its purposes or having interests or talents that contribute to its program. Such persons or organizations shall be called Associates or Associate Members and shall be eligible to participate in the activities of the Corporation other than business meetings and voting. Where the Associate is an organization, firm or corporation, that Associate may appoint one natural person as its representative. Such representatives so appointed shall be the only person entitled to participate in activities.

ARTICLE VIII, STANDING COMMITTEES

(Change summary: amend the Membership Committee charter, expand the Program Committee to include entertainment functions, eliminate the Refreshment Committee, and add the Communications Committee)

Amend:

General: Each standing committee will consist of the Chairman and at least one other member, appointed by the Chief, and approved by a majority vote of the members present and voting at a regular meeting. Their membership in the committee will extend to the next succeeding annual meeting or until such time as their membership in the committee is otherwise terminated. Nothing in this Article shall prohibit the Chief from appointing ad hoc committees as appropriate from time to time. *Members may provide any recommendations or suggestions to the Committee Chairmen for inclusion in the next Committee meeting. Each Committee Chairman reports his or her Committee's activities to the Council for approval prior to reporting to the general membership.*

Membership Committee: It shall be the function of the Membership Committee to assume the initiative in establishing programs and ways and means to attract new members *and* to contact prospective members, ~~evaluate their qualifications, and advise the membership concerning their eligibility.~~

Program/Entertainment Committee: It shall be the function of the Program/*Entertainment* Committee to arrange for the program that is conducted pursuant to the objectives of the Corporation during the non-business portion of all regular meetings at which there is an opportunity to conduct such a program, ~~except to the extent that the Refreshment Committee provides for such a program.~~ *The Program/Entertainment Committee will also give guidance and assistance in preparing the Annual Calendar of Events and help to coordinate these activities once they become official sponsored activities.*

Delete:

~~Refreshment Committee: It shall be the function of the Refreshment Committee to determine the need for refreshments to be served at any regular meeting and to provide for the serving of refreshments when appropriate.~~

Add:

Communications Committee: It shall be the function of the Communications Committee to develop, promulgate and maintain communication media for both the general membership and the public at large. Such media may include, but are not limited to, brochures, advertisements, Internet web sites, telephone trees, and email broadcasts. The purpose for these media shall be used to inform the membership of special activities, issues and events not contained in the newsletter, and to educate the general public with the goals and objectives of the Clans of Scotland.

MEMBERSHIP DUES

March 31st marked the deadline for getting your dues in to the *Clans of Scotland* and remain a member in good standing. It is important that you renew your membership promptly, as this tells us where we stand financially. The Council is constantly looking at the budget, deciding how much we can afford to do this year.

Clan Donald

"Per Mare, Per Terras" (By sea, By Land)

"Ní b-éibhneas gan Chlainn Dombnaill ..." "It is no joy without Clan Donald ..."

Plant Badge: Heather

Slogan: Fraoch Eilean (Gaelic: The Heathery Isle)

The **Clan Donald** is one of the most numerous and widespread of the Scottish clans, and includes several families, who, while using different surnames and/or methods of writing the same surname, have an identical genealogical derivation. Of these, the families of MacDonald or McDonald, and MacDonnell or McDonnell, are the most common names.

The important position occupied by the **Clan Donald** and its branches, which refer with pride to their noble descent from the independent rulers of the island principality, is as the Kings of the Isles. The history of **Clan Donald** goes back over 800 years and the **Clan Donald** was involved in the triumphs and defeats in the fight for independence; and, its origin is connected with many of the most interesting questions of Scottish ethnology.

Clan Donald began its recorded history with Somerled, a descendant of Conn of the Hundred Battles and Clan Colla. Somerled's defeat of the Norse King of Man in 1156 gained independence for southwestern Scotland that survived for over four centuries.

The clan takes its name from Donald, the 3rd Lord of the Isles and grandson of Somerled, who lived until 1269. Donald's son was the original "Mac" (meaning "son of"). It was Donald's great-grandson, Angus Og, the 6th Lord of the Isles who sheltered Robert the Bruce at the lowest ebb of his career. Later, leading a small band of men for the Isles, Angus Og was instrumental in Bruce's victory over the English at Bannockburn, the battle that won independence for Scotland. In recognition of Clan Donald's part in the victory, Robert the Bruce proclaimed that Clan Donald would forever occupy the honored position on the right wing of the Scottish Army.

Today **Clan Donald-USA** is the largest Clan organization in America. Unlike Clan societies in Scotland and the societies of several other clans in the U.S., **Clan Donald-USA** has always considered itself an extension of the Clan across the sea.

OATMEAL DATE PIE *by Martha Turner*

1/4 cup softened butter or margarine	1 cup honey
3 eggs	1/6 tsp salt
1 tsp vanilla	1 1/4 cup oatmeal
3/4 cup snipped pitted dates	1 unbaked 9" pie shell

Beat the butter and honey together until creamy. Add the eggs and beat until smooth. Stir in the salt, vanilla, rolled oats, and dates. Pour the date mixture into the prepared pie shell and bake in a 350 degree oven for 45 minutes or until the center is set when lightly touched. Let cool completely before cutting. Top each serving with ice cream, if you wish. Makes 6 servings.

For individual servings, pour the pie filling mixture into 6 greased custard cups, 6 oz. size. Pour about 1" of hot water into a 9" X 13" baking pan. Set custard cups in the water and bake uncovered in a 325 degree oven for 40 minutes or until set when touched lightly. Serve individually with cream poured over the top.

offer rooms for about \$38. Even the B&B's are reasonable. Arrochar Hotel near Loch Lomond offers a single occupancy rate of \$42 per night.

Purchases of Scottish goods are a great bargain because of the current exchange rate. As of this writing, the British Pound was quoted at \$1.45. It doesn't get much cheaper than that.

So, start your search at www.scotland.com. It's time well spent if you are looking for that opportunity to get back to Burns' Highlands. With a little planning and shrewdly taking advantage of those unadvertised bargains, yesterday's long-planned visit to Scotland can become today's reality.

DEEPER DABBLES

What's that mean, "Deeper Dabbles?" Well, if you read my last column, I discussed shortcuts to finding your roots. None of it is approved by professional genealogists, but it makes for good small talk at cocktail parties and Scottish games.

A funny thing happened on the way to this column. Someone actually asked me for documentation showing that the VanDevours of Maryland are in my family tree. I had to 'fess up. Yep, it was the old follow the name trail from databases all over the internet and hope that someone has something documented somewhere. That kind of takes the wind out of your sails. But I only languished becalmed in the horse latitudes for an hour or so. By the way, do you know where the term "horse latitudes" comes from? Send me an email and I'll tell you. We don't want to get PETA mad at us.

After my humiliation (not!), I jumped back onto the net and proceeded to get some documentation. Not of the VanDevours, of course. They predated the United States by about 150 years or so. No, I was hot on the trail of the census data for my surname family.

Success! With just a bit more than a little help from the Caddo County GenWeb people, great-grandpa Robertson was living in Oklahoma in 1900, 1910 and 1920. Then he disappeared. Grandpa was a newly wed living in Washita County, Oklahoma in 1920, only a few miles from great-grandpa. My oldest uncle, now deceased, was 18 months old for that census, and Dad wasn't even a gleam. Without actually going to the National Archives and making copies of the ledger pages, I downloaded images from the journal pages. That makes the first time that I actually have primary documents to prove anything going backwards.

Nothing drives us like success. So, onto my mother's side of the family - for whom information is mighty sketchy. I found my great-grandfather working for the Market Street Railway Company in San Francisco (I knew they lived in San Fran since grandma told me all about the '06 earthquake - she was eight at the time). This info came through the San Francisco GenWeb site, the 1900 City Directory. I tried using the census to do some locating, page by tedious page, but there were more enumeration districts (ED) in San Fran in 1920 than there were people in Washita County, OK. Back to the 1930 City Directory. Yep, found my great-aunt living in a hotel. That must have been between selling the house in Burlingame and buying the house out in the Avenues (where my mother grew up).

In the process of rummaging around the California sites, I become ensnared in the USGenWeb. It turns out that there is a huge network of genealogists and researchers who

are all on line and run gratuitous searches at request. One is called the NORCAL network (for Northern California). Yes, there is a SOCAL network, but any self-respecting Californian north of Monterey doesn't acknowledge anything south of Carmel. Something to do with the water...

I also found the CASAFRA net, which is the San Francisco cousin of NORCAL. Ever since enrolling on both lists, every day brings a ton of really great information. I know more about 1854 Millville in Shasta County than any man has a right to know. If the information on 1864 Sonoma County keeps coming, I might find I'm related to General Vallejo (but that would be a stretch). And, what would you like to know about every day events in 1874 San Benito County. Yes, folks, really dedicated people are transcribing the newspapers of those eras and putting the data on the net. Maybe I can't use the data yet, but it keeps me pumped enough to keep trying.

I think I last mentioned that I found that ggg-grandpa Robertson served with the Union in the Civil War. If not, I'm mentioning it now. Another great discovery - ggg-grandpa Cox served with the Confederacy during the War of Northern Aggression. How many Sanford Harold Cox's can there be in Atlanta in 1861? Maybe I should bring applications for the Sons of the American Revolution and Sons of the Confederacy for the whole family. It's too soon to drag out the applications for Sons of the Golden West.

I can see it now. South a bit from Millville, at the foot of Mt. Shasta, by the shores of Lake Siskiyou, by the cold ice melt waters, stood the old Scot McGrumpus (in his Red Robertson kilt) with the 1890 census...
