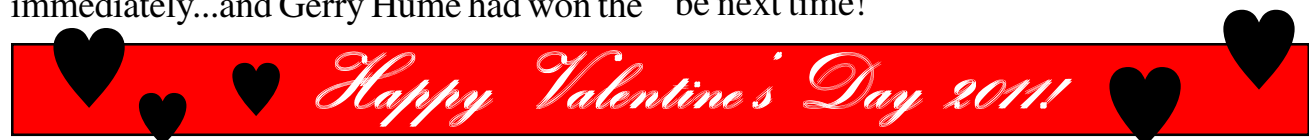
A quick email to the Internet Clan Home mailing list...responses almost immediately...and Gerry Hume had won the

The State of *The Home Works*

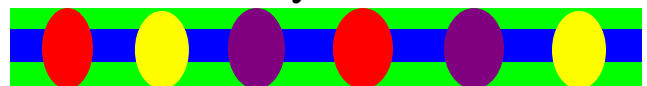
We'd surely like to thank Al & Judy Eaton for "bankrolling" this issue of the Clan Home newsletter - *The Home Works*.

Jacquie and I just came back from a great two-week trip to England and Scotland.

I had gone ahead to go to the 24-Hour Race at LeMans and then met Jacquie on her arrival at the Manchester Airport.

We picked up our rental car at the airport and bravely headed out.

Our plan was to go first to the south of England for Jacquie to enjoy some of the sites relevant to her Wing family heritage.

We stayed two nights in Newbury and then one night in Liverpool. From there we headed north to Dunkeld for two nights and then three nights in Aviemore.

On our return south we spent two nights in Edinburgh and our last night in Manchester.

We loved the areas around Aviemore and Dunkeld and found they both made great jumping off points for day trips.

A few suggestions are in order if you are planning a trip. The weather is at best

unpredictable, so pack accordingly. Rental cars start very small and get up to merely small - keep in mind that it will need to hold all of your luggage. Diesel fuel is definitely cheaper than gasoline, so if you will be driving far, consider the cost of fuel. Many hotels offered no help in getting luggage to and from the room - so pack light.

By far the best decision we made was to get a chip for the GPS which covers England and Scotland. The help from the GPS was crucial to maintaining some semblance of marital harmony. With very few exceptions, the GPS led us through hundreds of roundabouts without a problem. I ordered it from Amazon.com and it cost about \$40. It was well worth it!

A real Scottish recipe -

Scotch Eggs

I made these at Hogmanay this year...I think I made 18 - and they were gone the next time I passed by the breakfast table!

I now understand why they are so expensive - they take patience to make. However, they are GOOD. I simply tripled the recipe for the 18 "for a crowd" eggs. You'll need:

- * 6 hard boiled large eggs
- * 1 pound bulk sausage
- * 1 egg beaten well
- * bread crumbs

Hard boil the eggs and remove the shells. Divide the bulk sausage into six patties. Flatten the sausage patties and put 1 boiled egg in the center of each sausage pattie. Wrap the sausage around the eggs, forming a ball. Chill the sausage-wrapped



eggs at least one hour.

Dip the sausage wrapped eggs into the beaten egg and roll in bread crumbs. You may finish these one of two ways: first - cook in a heavy skillet in a small amount of oil, turning them constantly so they will cook evenly. This will take about half an hour.

Secondly, you may cook them about 20 minutes in the skillet and then bake them for another 20 minutes in a 350 degree oven.

Serve with hot mustard.

There WILL be Gatlinburg (TN) Scottish Highland Games celebrating their 30th anniversary this May!

For the 30th consecutive year, Scottish clans will gather in the foothills of the Smoky Mountains for the Gatlinburg Scottish Highland Games, scheduled May 13 and 14 at Mills Park. There is a small admission fee for the event. The weekend's festivities will begin with a parade down the Parkway in Gatlinburg on Friday evening in which all Scots are invited to participate.

The Gatlinburg Scottish Highland Games will feature professional and amateur athletes competing in many different events including tossing the caber, Highland wrestling, haggis hurling and the stone put.

Entertainment is also a key component of the

popular two-day festival, which will feature a variety of acts as well as an assortment of Pipe and Drum Bands competing in individual and band events.

Dozens of Highland dancers from across the country will compete at the Games, and border collie demonstrations are a featured event. Scottish Clans will be on hand to assist visitors in finding their heritage and vendors will offer wares ranging from Scottish clothing to a sampling of Scottish foods.
