

In addition, it is hoped that our next Clan Ross National Project will be complete in time to be unveiled in honour of Dr. Alexander Ross while touring Uncle Tom's Cabin Historic Site.

With such a full weekend of activities as well as all the regular business of the Annual General Meeting, June 23-25 in London. ON should be a priority for Ross Clan members from across the country.

Hugh Ross of Treherne, Manitoba, a long-time member of Clan Ross, passed away on January 6, 2006. Left to mourn are his beloved wife Elda and children Heather, Hughie, Brenda and Eldridge.

Hugh was born January 29, 1928 in Holland, Manitoba. He was a self-made man. He didn't go beyond Grade 8 in school, but he briefly attended classes at the Manitoba Technical School while holding a job at a candy factory during the day. The majority of his skills were self-taught, and these skills were many. He operated the family grain farm for several years, and then developed and ran a plumbing and heating firm. He subsequently established a construction company that built and renovated many homes in the Treherne area. In his "retirement", he could often be found in his impressive workshop, where he crafted fine furniture and taught himself the almost lost art of making buggy wheels. His great pride in these retirement years was the Model T truck he restored, complete with wooden coachwork and hand-made upholstery, in which he led the 2003 Austin Thresherman's Reunion Parade.

But perhaps most important was his wide circle of friends in Southern Manitoba. Hugh and Elda square danced twice a week. They were the first on the dance floor and the last off at regular dances at the Treherne Friendship Centre. He always had a joke to tell. Hugh organized a tremendously successful Burns Dinner for many years in Treherne, raising thousands of dollars for the local high school grad and countless other community needs. And his friends always looked forward to the peanut brittle he regularly made. Clan Ross – Manitoba fondly remembers their Christmas Party that Hugh hosted one year at the Treherne Masonic Lodge, where he proudly presented trays full of his wonderful bread pudding.

Proof of the remarkable impression that Hugh made on his community was the fact that the Treherne United Church was filled to overflowing at his funeral. There were representatives of no less than five Masonic Lodges in attendance, and the entire Treherne Rec Centre was needed to hold those paying their respects after the service.

Over 60 fans of Burns gathered at the Fort Garry Hotel this last January 28th for the 9th annual edition of this shindig. It wasn't really a "drunken blellum", but it well achieved our goal of maintaining the Burns Dinner traditions in a friendly, non-stuffy atmosphere.

Once folks got by the watchdog eye of Treasurer Len Perry collecting tickets at the door, they were greeted by Chapter President Don Ross and Dinner Committee Chair Denis Fletcher, while Ian & Jacquie Ross practiced their sideshow barker skills by selling them Silent Auction tickets. MC James Hickerson officially started the proceedings by introducing President Don for a more formal welcome from the podium. Don used this particular "pulpit" to advantage in promoting awareness of the new National Project honouring A. M. Ross and his development of the Underground Railroad ... plus promoting attendance at the AGM in London this coming June.

Shirley Tulloch gave an excellent Scots Grace which (hooray!) was not the Selkirk Grace. Good for you, Shirley. The Selkirk one has become as worn out as the piping of Amazing Grace! An enjoyable light-hearted Toast to the Lassies and Response were given by John & Judith Perrin.

To wrap up this fine evening, Ian & Jacquie MC'd the silent auction, and Donna Fletcher led one and all in joining hands for the singing of Auld Lang Syne. We look forward to the 10th annual edition next year. (New committee members are required!).

The Tradition of the Atholl Brose

The St. Andrew's Society of Winnipeg has the distinction of being the only group in the world to develop a formal ceremony of the Atholl Brose ... creating a Scottish tradition out of thin air. In 1990, Eldon Ross established the position of Keeper of the Atholl Brose through the donation of this marvelous chain of office. It was first worn by Rod McRae, then by Dr. Glen Lowther. Last year, I was honoured to assume this post.

Now what in the world is Atholl Brose? It is, of course, a drink. But what a drink! Made of whisky mixed with oat water, honey and cream, it is sheer nectar of the gods. And it has a legend ... centering on Clan Ross. Here it is, as recounted by Glen Lowther:

It seems that John, Earl of Ross, was laying siege to Blair Atholl, the great castle of the Duke of Atholl, chief of Clan Murray. The Ross was having the best of it and Lord Murray, not wanting his household goods to fall into the hands of The Ross, proceeded to hide them. His prize stores of oats, whisky, honey and cream were dumped straight down his well so that they could not be carried away. The Earl of Ross drank deeply from this well and, in the gospel according to Lowther, got royally pissed and passed out. The Duke seized upon this unexpected turn of events, and took the comatose Earl prisoner.

Now that story has never rung true for me. I have personal knowledge of Ross capacity for strong drink. Even on an off day, an average Ross can easily manage a well-full!

So I did my own research. I discovered that this John, 10th Earl of Ross and 4th Lord of the Isles, was in fact a most unruly troublemaker... a typical Ross. In 1462 he and his wild northern clansmen led a rebellion against King James II, captured the royal castle at Inverness, then Urquhart castle and, according to my **highly** reliable sources, **successfully** stormed Blair Atholl, dragging the then Earl and Countess of Atholl off to Islay as **his** prisoners.

Manure

In the 16th and 17th centuries, everything had to be transported by ship and it was also before commercial fertilizer's invention, so large shipments of manure were common. It was shipped dry, because in dry form it weighed a lot less than when wet, but once water (at sea) hit it, it not only became heavier, but the process of fermentation began again, a by product of which is methane gas. As the stuff was stored below decks in bundles you can see what could (and did) happen. Methane began to build up below decks and the first time someone went below at night with a lantern, BOOOOM! Several ships were destroyed in this manner before it was determined just what was happening.

Clan Ross Canada will honour Dr. Alexander Milton Ross (1832-1897) as part of our 2006 Gathering

The driving force behind Canada's involvement in the Underground Railroad was Dr. Alexander Milton Ross of Belleville, Ontario. Dr. Ross was an extraordinary character, but one relatively unknown except to historians specializing in his era. The theme behind Clan Ross's National Gathering is to help uncover the role this great Canadian played in helping bring freedom to thousands of people.

Our Special Guest will be a Dr. Ross expert, author Steven Duff

Clan Ross is honoured to have Steven Duff, an author, historian and Dr. Alexander Ross expert, as our special guest through out this incredible weekend. Mr. Duff's book, "Hunter of Dreams" (www.trafford.com for more information) reveals the story of the relatively unknown Dr. Ross, based on his own memoirs and contemporary magazine and newspaper articles.

Alexander Ross traveled in the Deep South, using his background in ornithology (the study of birds) as pretence at doing research. In reality, he was alerting slaves to the existence of the Underground Railroad and in the process, faced a number of dangerous situations. His work brought him to the attention of Abraham Lincoln, who commissioned him as a special agent to monitor the Confederate activities in Canada during the Civil War. Ross's work, declared Lincoln, shortened the Civil War by the better part of a year.

Steven will join us for all of the weekend's events, and will be our "after lunch" speaker on our Saturday bus tour.

Tour itinerary:

A) Our First Stop - Uncle Tom's Cabin Historic Site. www.uncletomscabin.org

This world famous site commemorates the life of Reverend Josiah Henson and his contributions to the Underground Railroad. Josiah Henson's name became synonymous with the central character "Uncle Tom" in Harriet Beecher Stowe's famous novel Uncle Tom's Cabin. The novel sold 300,000 copies within the first year and helped to raise awareness to the brutality of slavery. Abraham Lincoln credited the book as being a catalyst of the Civil War. It was Henson's life experiences that inspired Ms. Stowe's creation of the character Uncle Tom in her 1852 outcry against slavery. Born in Maryland, Josiah Henson worked as a slave for forty-one years. In 1830, he and his family escaped to Upper Canada (Ontario) via the Underground Railroad. In 1841, he moved his family to Dresden and helped to establish the Dawn Settlement. The settlement was established to provide a refuge and a new beginning for former slaves.

Clan Ross will enjoy a special guided tour of the site and a wonderful catered lunch. Our visit will conclude with an interesting presentation by Steven Duff on Dr. Alexander Ross's role in the Underground Railroad. We are tentatively planning on unveiling a gift to the site to honour Dr. Ross on behalf of Clan Ross Canada.

B) Our Second Stop - RM Classic Car Exhibit, www.rmcars.com

This restoration shop and museum features an ever-changing display of 100 historical automobiles from the last century. The exhibit offers an once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to see some of the world's rarest and greatest automobiles up close.

C) Our Final Stop -Buxton Museum & National Historic Site - www.buxtonmuseum.com

The site is a memorial to the Elgin Settlement, which was a haven for fugitive slaves. The tour guides are descendents of fugitive slaves and are a wealth of information and stirring personal stories. It is one of Canada's few remaining Black Canadian settlements in existence since the pre-civil war era.
