Please share this email with our friends and relatives, and don't forget to advise us about any changes in email addresses. Additional email addresses are always welcome. Please DO THIS NOW.


Our Family Tree

Doug is pleased to announce that over 25,000 individuals have been recorded at the <u>My Heritage</u> website, more than double the increase from last year. There are 137 members (69 from our family) and over 2300 photos. You are invited to become a member. You may invite your family as well. I have a firm belief that all family members retain the absolute right to add facts to OUR family tree, which is free to use. Hopefully you may add information to the family tree for those who can no longer speak for themselves: whether aunts, uncles or cousins. Family photos also make Our Family Tree more interesting. A new <u>My Heritage</u> "Sun Chart" is now available for displaying three or more generations in a member's family. Keep in touch; those who participate will always be informed of the latest developments.

Family members who supported the production of the "Our Ross Family Story" manuscript have received information about a new online update if our files contain an accurate email address for them. The "new" version includes nine corrections to typographical errors, plus major revisions to include the immigration of Alexander's brother Donald in 1844 as the second family emigration. Additions of new material will make use of blank pages on the reverse sides of maps, etc. Pages in the Appendices, References and Index have been numbered or renumbered to make a total of 254 pages. If you "inherited" a copy, and did not receive the internet address of the update, just let me know the copy number so you may be included before the year ends. Stephen Saywell was very helpful as a proofreader for much of the book, and he suggested that "calligraphy" would be a better substitute for the word "chirography" at the bottom of page 137; rather than referring Stephen to an Oxford dictionary, he found it more expedient to allow the change. Unfortunately, the word was misspelled. Well, nobody is perfect.
