

# Wallace Wedding Bells: Whiteside/McKinney, February 2007

The formal, evening, candle light, ceremony took place at the Old Stone Church of Winchester. This historical church was built in 1783 and established the Church of Scotland in Virginia. The church was fully restored in 1943. Currently the church is used for special events and tours as approved by the First Presbyterian Church of Winchester and the Winchester Historical Society.

The wedding was small, attended by family and a few friends, as the church only holds 100 people maximum. Approximately 85 attended despite the ice storm of the previous week. 
