ROYAL AIR FORCE INSTRUCTION (INDIA) 1920.

20th January.

1. Introduction of "Royal Air Force Instructions (India)."

In Army Department Notification No 36, dated the 2nd January 1920, the Government of India have decided that, with effect from the 1st January 1920, the orders of the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for India or of the Governor General in Council, of general importance affecting the Royal Air Force in India, shall be conveyed directly to all concerned by "Royal Air Force Instructions (India)" published serially when necessary, and distributed from the Government Press in accordance with a distribution list of requirements

2 Army Department letters will, in future, be restricted to cases of individual application or to matters of a confidential nature

3 "Royal Air Force Instructions (India)" are published on separate sheets in order that they may be conveniently attached to files. A bound copy of all the orders to which an index will be attached, will be distributed quarterly

4 As the Instructions are despatched direct to all authorities concerned, including Controllers of Military Accounts, only the number and date of an Instruction need be quoted in correspondence with reference to the subject

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2. Reproduction of Army Instructions (India) which are of special application to the Royal Air Force in India.

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No 46 of 1918

Despatch of "Clear the Line" telegrams by officers of the Royal Flying Corps.

Flying Officers of the Royal Flying Corps in India have been authorized to send "Clear the line" telegrams, as stated below, when engaged in cross country flying duties —

- (a) on departure,
- (b) in cases of forced landings in transit,
- (c) on arrival

In the case of arrivals, "Clear the line" telegrams should be used only when the machines do not arrive up to scheduled time; otherwise "Express" telegrams should be despatched.

No. 92 of 1918.

Procedure to be followed in the preparation of pension claims.

It has been decided that the procedure detailed in the instructions contained in I. A. F. A.-366 shall be followed in the preparation and disposal of ordinary family pension claims not arising out of the war.

2. The pension certificate (I. A. F. A.-373) will be prepared by the Controller of Military Accounts concerned and forwarded to the pensioner by registered post in the case of ordinary and invalid pensions as well as in the case of wound and injury pensions, whether arising out of the war or not.

No. 117 of 1918.

Road journeys in India of officers granted leave from overseas forces.

In partial modification of the orders contained in the second clause of paragraph 2 of Army Department letter No. 5417, dated the 17th April 1917 (*vide* paragraph 2 of India Army Order

from Government on the production of a no-warrant certificate from the embarkation officer at the port of disembarkation.

Government accept no liability for any expenditure over and above that which would have been incurred had the officer travelled on warrant.

No. 129 of 1918

Decision that injury gratuities or pensions are inadmissible in cases of disability wholly attributable to illness, even though contracted or aggravated on field service and resulting in permanent unfitness for military duty.

grant of wholly Warrant gratuities, even though the illness was contracted on or aggravated by field service, resulted in permanent unfitness for military duty.

No 187 of 1918

Decision that, in the case of a journey performed partly by rail and partly by road, the rail journey may be completed by warrant and the road journey by travelling allowance

It is notified that paragraph 35 VI, Army Regulations, India, Volume X has been reconstructed as shown below —

All other inspecting officers will ordinarily travel on warrant when moving on inspection duty, but may, at their option, draw travelling allowance for any such journey

In the case of a journey performed partly by rail and partly by road, the whole journey may be completed either by warrant or by travelling allowance or the rail journey by warrant and the road journey by travelling allowance at the option of the officer concerned

The officers mentioned in clause V above, for whom reserved accommodation is admissible under rule when travelling by rail, may also draw travelling allowance by road if they so desire but in that case they will be restricted to the road allowance admissible under paragraph 29

No 204 of 1918

Reckoning of field service for the purpose of the grant of disability pensions.

It has been decided that field service for the purpose of the grant of disability pensions under the provisions of paragraph 1031 A Army Regulations India, Volume I counts from the date of embarkation to the date of disembarkation, both days inclusive

No 380 of 1918

Free passage for attending instructional courses and examinations

The passage concession authorised in Army Regulations, India, Volume X, paragraph 50 (a), is admissible to all individuals attending authorised courses of instruction or examinations in professional subjects and languages, whether *voluntary* or *obligatory*, provided that in the case of voluntary examinations, etc they are detailed or permitted by competent authority to attend them

No 469 of 1918

(As subsequently amended by Army Instructions (India) Nos 1163, 1176 of 1918 and No 788 of 1919)

Scale of technical furniture to be issued to the Royal Air Force in India.

It has been decided that technical furniture shall be issued to the Royal Air Force in India on the scale shown in the Appendix to this Instruction

2 The expenditure is debitable to the Military Works Grant for ordinary demands

3 Standard plans of technical furniture for the Royal Air Force in India have been approved and will be issued to all concerned by the Director-General of Military Works

No. 483 or 1918

Pay and allowances of officers of other arms posted to the Royal Air Force in India.

It has been decided that an officer of another arm of the service posted to the Royal Air Force and performing the duties of a Royal Air Force officer will receive pay and allowances in accordance with the ordinary rules for officers of the Royal Air Force in India

No 497 or 1918

Royal Air Force Pay of Park Commander employed in India.

It has been decided that the pay of a Park Commander, Royal Air Force, employed in India, shall be Rs 1,040 per mensem consolidated, inclusive of exchange compensation allowance. A command allowance of Rs 100 per mensem will be admissible to the officer actually in command

No 885 or 1918

Royal Air Force Pay during absence from duty consequent on flying accidents in India.

It has been decided that, during the war, an officer of the Royal Air Force serving in India, whether a pilot or an observer, shall, for the period of leave granted in respect of a disability sustained owing to (i) an accident while flying and due to the working or management of the aeroplane or balloon, (ii) damage to the aeroplane or balloon by gunfire, or (iii) collision in the air, receive for the first three months of such leave the full pay of which he was in receipt before being struck off duty, and thereafter the rate of pay ordinarily admissible on sick leave under British or Indian regulations, as the case may be

No 856 or 1918

Royal Air Force. Pay and allowances of officers under elementary instruction

It has been decided that an officer selected for elementary instruction in flying duties with a view to qualifying as a flying officer, Royal Air Force, shall receive the emoluments of which he was previously in receipt, and shall, in addition, receive flying pay continuously at Rs 3 a day during the period spent on elementary training

2 Officers who at the time of their selection are holding appointments on the Staff will revert to regimental rates of pay on vacating their appointments

3 The daily rate of flying pay at Rs 3 will only be admissible while an officer is undergoing instruction in actual flying duties and not when undergoing instruction at schools where flying is not carried out

No 1074 of 1918

Procedure for the recovery of expenditure incurred on the upkeep of bicycles

It has been decided that the allowance for the upkeep of bicycles will be recovered on contingent bills as expenditure is incurred up to the limit of Rs 20 for each machine per annum

2 The allowance will not be paid in a lump sum either in advance or arrears

No 1081 of 1918

Abolition of clothing allowances for the Army in India, British and Indian, and public followers, and the substitution of free issues in kind

Commencing with effect from 1st October 1918, and for the remaining period of the war, or until further orders all clothing and kit allowances for the army in India, British and Indian, and public followers, except those mentioned in paragraph 7, will be suspended. Thereafter the necessary renewals of clothing will be effected by issues in kind in exchange for unserviceable articles

2 The scales to be maintained are published in the Appendices to this Instruction, together with rules governing the issue of renewals

3 On the date mentioned above the soldier must be in possession of all articles of clothing and necessaries in a fully serviceable condition according to the scales previously sanctioned and for the upkeep of which he has hitherto drawn clothing allowance. Any deficiencies will be made good at his own expense, and thereafter all his clothing and necessaries will be treated as public property, to be renewed or replaced according to the rules hereinafter laid down

4 Any articles in excess of these scales will be withdrawn and where such excess is clearly the property of the soldier compensation at an assessed rate will be credited to his accounts, when this has been done clothing accounts of Indian troops and followers will be closed and the debit and credit balances held in suspense until further orders or until a man becomes non-effective. In the latter event the clothing accounts will be

adjusted in accordance with the rules in Army Regulations, India, Volume XI. A form with the necessary instructions for assessing compensation will be issued in due course.

5 Articles in the attached scales which have not hitherto been included in the scale on which men have been clothed will be issued free to complete the kit to the new scale. The following articles of equipment for Indian troops which are not included in these scales should pending their inclusion in Army Tables, be drawn free under the various authorities under which they are at present admissible —

Belts Sam Browne for Indian officers
 Cooking pots
 Emergency ration tins
 Waterbottles

6 To meet the cost of washing and haircutting, an allowance of 6 annas per week will be drawn for British soldiers with effect from the 1st October 1918.

7 The following categories are excluded from the operations of this Instruction —

- (a) Silladar units
- (b) Bands and Body Guards of the Viceroy and Governors
- (c) Indian officers (other than those included in Tables III, IV, VI and VIII), and sub assistant surgeons of the Indian Subordinate Medical Department, who are at present in receipt of clothing allowances
- (d) Nepalese Contingent
- (e) Veterinary assistants of the Indian Subordinate Veterinary Corps, who may elect to come under Army Instruction (Ind a) No 511 of 1918
- (f) Warrant and non commissioned officers and men on consolidated pay or pay which includes clothing allowance
- (g) Menials employed in Indian troops' war hospitals
- (h) Indian Defence Force (British)

APPENDICES

RULES GOVERNING THE ISSUE OF RENEWALS OF CLOTHING DURING THE PERIOD OF THE WAR

Clothing and necessaries will be replaced free when found to be unfit for further use owing to fair wear and tear.

No condemned article of clothing or necessaries will be retained by the soldier and no replacement or renewal will be made free except in exchange for the condemned article.

2 In the case of articles lost, made away with, or rendered unserviceable through neglect, the value at the time of loss will be assessed regimentally and charged against the soldier. In no such case will less than one fourth of the new value be charged unless it is established by evidence that the actual value (which will then be charged) is less.

3 Articles considered to be unserviceable will be brought before a station Board of Survey when they will be carefully examined, and if found to be thoroughly unserviceable and past repair, will be condemned.

5 For the purpose of detecting extravagance, quarterly returns showing the issues of certain items (to be selected by the General Officer Commanding Division or Independent Brigade) will be submitted by the unit, through the usual channel to the General Officer Commanding concerned, who will compare the wastage of one unit against another, taking into consideration the conditions of wear and tear and the normal period of wear of each garment.

6 Articles which have been condemned as in paragraph 3 will be returned to the Clothing Depot or disposed of under instruction.

 for fitting clothing will be allowed on account of only those garment that have undergone actual alteration. The rates for making, fitting and altering clothing will be as at present allowed under rule. These rates will not be charged when the work is done by specially enlisted darzies.

8 In place of the foreign service kit allowance special North-West Frontier kit money and clothing allowances and special local clothing allowances, authorised by A. G. O. D. 14

 issued since the commences
 issues of clothing authorised in Army Department letter No 732-3 (Q M G -6), dated 24th April 1914, for troops (British and Indian) and followers serving in Baluchistan, General Officers Commanding are empowered to issue, at their discretion on the recommendation of the local medical authority, such articles of field service clothing (*vide* War Establishments, India Table VIII) as are considered necessary (summer or winter), for the troops and followers under their command.

Special allowance for parents of unmarried soldiers.

With reference to paragraph 5 (a) of Army Order 440 of 1914, which provides that the grant of an allowance to a dependant shall be conditional on "actual dependence for a reasonable period prior to mobilization or to the enlistment of the soldier, if later," it has been decided to dispense with this condition in the cases of parents (including step-parents) of unmarried soldiers who, on the 4th August 1914, or on the date of joining the Colours (if later) were under the age of 23 years, and to issue an allowance at the fixed rate of 5s a week in such cases with effect from the 1st October 1918, or from the date on which the soldier attains the age of 21, whichever is the later.

2 This special allowance will also be issuable to the grand-parents or other persons who have acted as foster parents to the soldier, provided that they wholly or mainly supported the soldier for a period of not less than one year before his enlistment; such period need not necessarily, however, be the year immediately preceding enlistment.

3. Except as otherwise provided in this Instruction the special allowance will be subject to all the conditions and limitations applicable to dependants' allowances granted on the basis of pre-enlistment dependence, e.g., (a) it will be subject to the limits governing multiple payments as laid down in paragraphs 70 and 71, Separation Allowance Regulations, (b) it will cease on the marriage of the soldier; (c) it will not be issuable concurrently with an allowance to another dependant of the soldier; (d) it may be substituted for a child's allowance under paragraph 61, Separation Allowance Regulations, if more advantageous, etc.

4 Where the parent or foster parent is already in receipt of a dependant's allowance of less than 5s a week [including excess allotment taken over as a State charge under Army Instruction (India)* No. 338 of 1918], such

* Reprinted below. allowance will be increased to 5s. or such less amount as is admissible under paragraph 3, from the appropriate date without any application on the part of the soldier, provided that the conditions prescribed in this Instruction are fulfilled. The necessary initial steps in connection with the increase of the existing allowances will be taken by Regimental Paymasters, Secretaries of Territorial Force Associations and Controllers of Military Accounts

5 The special allowance, other than an increased allowance under paragraph 4, will be issuable only on the application of the soldier, or his parent or foster parent

Application will be made by the soldier on Army Form W.-5019, which will be forwarded by his Commanding Officer to the Regimental Paymaster of the unit, or the Local Controller of Military Accounts as the case may be; if the soldier is serving on a Territorial Force attestation the Paymaster will after verifying date of birth and date of enlistment, transmit the application to the Territorial Force Association concerned

Application will be made by parents and foster parents on Form P A -5, which will be obtainable at any Post Office in the United Kingdom or any Divisional office in India. The Form, when filled in, will be forwarded in accordance with the directions thereon

6 Officers Commanding units will take steps to ensure that the conditions under which an unmarried soldier can obtain a special separation allowance for a parent or foster parent are made generally known to the men under their command

7. The necessary forms will shortly be obtainable from Contractors for Printing Government of India forms (through the Superintendent of Government Printing, India, Calcutta).

No. 338 of 1918.

Increase of pay for British soldiers.

The following was published as a *Gazette of India* Extraordinary on the 1st April 1918 :—

No 641.—The Governor General in Council is pleased to announce that the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for India

has approved an increase of pay for British soldiers in India as follows :—

1. From the 29th September 1917 and for the remaining period of the present war the qualifying period for the grant of proficiency pay as required by Army Regulations, India, Volume I, shall be reduced from 2 years to 6 months, subject, in the case of those enlisted as boys, to the additional modification that they must have attained the age of 18½ years instead of 20 years as hitherto, and proficiency pay shall be issued to all soldiers eligible for that emolument who on or after the 29th September 1917 have fulfilled the conditions for the grant of proficiency pay as now modified

2 In the case of soldiers who are in receipt of the rates of pay laid down in Army Regulations, India, Volume I, the issue of separation allowance shall, from the 29th September 1917, and for the remaining period of the present war, cease to be dependent on the soldier making an allotment of his pay

Where the wife or dependant of such a soldier was in receipt of separation allowance on the 2nd December 1917, or subsequently becomes entitled to receive an allowance with effect from that or an earlier date, the whole sum which the soldier was allotting on the 2nd December 1917 (including any allotment in excess of that prescribed in the Appendix to the Regulations, issued on 27th October 1914 under the Royal Warrant of the 23rd September 1914) up to a total of 10d a day for a soldier of the rank of serjeant, or higher rank, or 6d for a soldier below the rank of serjeant shall be issued from public funds as separation allowance, and shall not be deducted from the soldier's pay

Where the wife or dependant of such a soldier becomes entitled to separation allowance with effect from the 3rd December 1917 or a subsequent date, the usual procedure for assessing the allowance shall be followed and the whole amount to which the payee is entitled shall be issued from public funds as separation allowance, but in these cases any allotment voluntarily made by the soldier will be a charge against his pay

3 From the 29th September 1917 and for the remaining period of the present war, the sum of 1d per day War Pay in respect of each complete year of service with the Colours, rendered since the commencement of the present war, shall be granted to all soldiers, except soldiers of the Non Combatant Corps, who are in receipt of sterling rates of pay laid down in Army Regulations, India, Volume I

Service within the meaning of this paragraph forfeited for desertion or fraudulent enlistment shall not be allowed to

towards War Pay unless restored in accordance with the King's Regulations and Orders for the Army Any period of penal servitude, or of imprisonment or detention exceeding 28 days, undergone by the soldier, and any continuous period of absence without leave exceeding 28 days, will not be reckoned as service for the purpose of the grant

4 From the 29th September 1917, and for the remaining period of the present war, the sterling rates of pay laid down in Army Regulations, India, Volume I, for warrant officers and non commissioned officers down to and including the ranks of corporal, bombardier, or 2nd corporal, Cavalry of the Line, Royal Horse and Field Artillery, Royal Garrison Artillery and Infantry of the Line, shall be increased by the sum of 3d a day

5 From 29th September 1917, and for the remaining period of the present war, in the case of any soldier below the rank of serjeant, with the exception of boys, of soldiers of the Non Combatant Corps, and of soldiers employed in agriculture, or otherwise under conditions which bring their earnings up to civil rates of wages, when for any day on which he is entitled to receive his full emoluments his total pay assessed in the manner hereinafter prescribed does not amount to the minimum sum herein laid down for his rank or appointment, there shall be added for that day such amount as will increase the pay so assessed to the minimum sum herein laid down for his rank or appointment

In assessing the total pay for this purpose there shall be taken into account, in addition to regimental pay (as increased by paragraph 4 above) any proficiency pay, service pay, engineer or corps pay to which the soldier may be entitled, but if entitled to Class I proficiency pay or Class I service pay the minimum in his case shall be increased by 3a

The minimum sum shall be at the following rates, according to the soldier's rank or appointment.—

Trooper gunner driver, sapper, pioneer (R.E), private	1	6
Paid lance corporal or paid acting bombardier	1	9
Corporal or 2nd corporal	2	0

6 All warrant officers, non commissioned officers and men now serving who, having, on or since 4th August 1914, completed 22 years' service on their current attestation, including the extra year under Section 87 (1) of the Army Act, have been retained in the Service under the provisions of the Military Service Act, 1916 (Session 2), or have voluntarily continued in the service during the war, may elect within 3 months from the date of this

notification to draw with retrospective effect, the pension to which they would have been entitled by service if they had been discharged on completing 22 years' service. A soldier who had more than 22 years' service on 4th August 1914 and who elects to draw pension under this notification may have his pension assessed and paid with arrears as though he had been discharged on 4th August 1914, but not sooner.

Similarly, soldiers who now have less than 22 years' service may, if they complete 22 years' service during the war, elect to draw service pension from the date of completion of 22 years' service.

The right to elect to draw service pension from the completion of 22 or more years' service must be exercised within 3 months of the date of this notification, or of the completion of 22 years' service whichever is the later date, the election once made will be final, and the pension granted will not under any circumstances be subsequently increased, though, if disabled, the soldier will be eligible for a disability pension in addition on the usual conditions.

A soldier who elects to draw his pension under this notification will be regarded as having terminated his existing engagement with effect from the date from which pension becomes issuable and as having entered into a new engagement terminable at the end of the war. A soldier who does not claim his pension as above will continue to serve in the Army under the usual conditions providing for the continuance of men of such service, counting his service towards increase of pension.

7 From the 29th September 1917 and for the remaining period of the present war, no stoppage shall be made from the pay of any soldier in respect of his admission to hospital unless the disability is due to an offence under the Army Act or to the soldier's own fault.

The following subsidiary instructions and explanations are notified for general information:—

(1) The grant of proficiency pay, Class II (or in the case of a soldier holding the rank of sergeant or higher rank Class I), will in future be automatic on the soldier eligible for that emolument completing 6 months' unforfeited service, or, in the case of a boy, having attained the age of 18½ years in addition.

Divisional Disbursing Officers will therefore begin to credit the accounts of all men eligible as soon as they have completed the necessary service, unless an entry appears in Part II Orders to the contrary. Commanding Officers on whom the duty of ascertaining the soldier's efficiency devolves, should take steps, in the case of any man who is considered unqualified, to make an

immediate announcement in Part II Orders when the soldier has completed the period of qualifying service. The pay of the soldier will not however be reduced below the minimum laid down for his rank in consequence of such an announcement [see paragraph (4) below]

Except with regard to the qualifying period of service, the conditions and procedure for the grant of proficiency pay, Class I will remain as heretofore

(2) Paragraph 2 of the Notification does not apply to cases where allotment only and no separation allowance is being paid except in the case of an allotment made to secure a special separation allowance from the funds administered by the special Grants Committee of the Ministry of Pensions in regard to which separate instructions are being issued by the Ministry. Stoppages in respect of separated wives or illegitimate children will be made as hitherto from the pay of soldiers as required by Sections 138 and 145 of the Army Act and the benefit granted by paragraph 2 is therefore not applicable to cases in which separation allowance is being issued under paragraph 65 (c) or 75 (b) of the Separation Allowance Regulations 1916, where there is an Order of Court. The paragraph does however apply to all other cases where separation allowance is being issued with allotment, including allotments for motherless children actually in payment or authorized by the soldier on or before the 2nd December 1917

(3) It will be observed that the grants under paragraphs 2, 3, 4 and 5 of the Notification do not apply to men in receipt of special rates of pay *e.g.* men enlisted under the conditions of Army Order 283 of 1914 or under subsequent instructions at the rates of pay laid down therein or similar rates granted under the Royal Warrant published in Army Order 282 of 1914

Men in receipt of special rates of pay who for any reason are brought on to ordinary rates of pay will be entitled to the benefits of the Notification from the date of commencing to draw ordinary rates. Subject to the provisions of the Notification their whole service whether at special or ordinary rates will reckon for the purpose of the benefits

Any man in receipt of special rates of pay will have the option of drawing ordinary rates and the benefits of the Notification in lieu of his special rate. Such election when made will be final and will be recorded on his documents. He will not be entitled to re-elect his special rate at any subsequent date.

No arrears of the grant under paragraph 3 of the Notification will be paid for the period before 29th September 1917, but all service, as defined in the Notification, since the commencement

of the war (whether on a current or a previous attestation) will be allowed to reckon in calculating the addition to the soldier's pay

the purpose of deciding Notification is necessary to be taken into account for soldiers serving at the rates of pay of arms which earn proficiency pay are —Regimental pay, proficiency pay, and service pay

For soldiers serving at Royal Engineer rates —Regimental pay, engineer pay and service pay if entitled thereto

For soldiers serving at the rate of arms which earn corps pay —Regimental pay, corps pay and service pay if entitled thereto

The following classes of pay will not be taken into account —

- (a) The War Pay of 1*d* for each year of war service under paragraph 3 of Notification
- (b) Working pay under paragraphs 664 to 671, Army Regulations, India, Volume I
- (c) Additional pay.
- (d) Messing allowance admissible under paragraph 500, Army Regulations, India, Volume I

It follows that the minimum rate for the Cavalry, Artillery, Infantry and other proficiency pay earning arms will be —

For soldiers entitled to proficiency or service pay, Class II, or to no proficiency or service pay—

Private 1*s* 6*d* , paid lance corporal or paid acting bombardier 1*s* 9*d*

For soldiers entitled to proficiency pay, Class I, or service pay, Class I, whether at 6*d* or 7*d*

Private 1*s* 9*d* , paid lance corporal or paid acting bombardier 2*s*

A corporal of Infantry of the Line with less than 6 months' service and therefore not entitled to proficiency pay will get 2*s* , if in receipt of proficiency pay, Class II, 2*s* 2*d* , Class I, 2*s* 5*d*

The grant under paragraph 5 will only be drawn if the soldier is entitled to his full emoluments and consequently will not be issuable if the soldier is subject to hospital stoppages (as now modified) or to any forfeiture or reduction of his pay under the following provisions of Army Regulations, India, Volume I:—

- (a) Any forfeiture of service pay under paragraph 492-A.

- (b) Any forfeiture of service pay under paragraph 13 of Appendix XV
- (c) Any forfeiture or reduction of engineer or corps pay under paragraph 675, clauses (b), (c), (d) and (f)

It is not intended that the soldier shall forfeit this benefit for lack of efficiency other than as provided above. A soldier's pay will not therefore be reduced below the minimum in consequence of the forfeiture or reduction of proficiency pay under paragraph 492-B, Army Regulations, India Volume I

For the purpose of paragraph 5, a soldier will not be regarded as being in receipt of less than his full emoluments by reason of stoppages of pay under Section 138 (excepting those under paragraphs (1) and (2) thereof) or under Section 145 of the Army Act

(5) Detailed instructions as to the method of exercising the option of drawing service pension and as to the system of payment of pensions will be issued at a later date

(6) Hospital stoppages will be maintained as at present laid down in the case of any soldier who is admitted to hospital as the result of alcoholism or venereal disease as certified by the medical officer or other cause notified in Part II Orders as due to the soldier's own fault

(7) The increased rate of pay which, under the Notification will be admissible for any soldier from the 29th September 1917, will be notified by the Divisional Disbursing Officer to the soldier's Commanding Officer. The notification will be made without delay

The increased rates of pay granted by the Notification will not be inserted in Army Book 64, except on the Divisional Disbursing Officer's authority, but pending receipt of the authority, Company, etc. Commanders may make such reasonable advances of cash as the increased net rates may justify, having regard to the provision in paragraph (2) of these subsidiary instructions relating to the continuance of compulsory stoppages

(8) The special allowance of three annas per diem admissible in the case of British soldiers who are not drawing field service rations will be continued. This allowance should not be taken into account for the purpose of deciding whether the pay of a soldier is to be increased under paragraph 5 of the Notification

(9) The orders regarding compulsory allotments, hospital stoppages, and pensions and those serving for pension members of the Indian Army Medical Department included of pay

The special allowance sanctioned in India Army Order 228 of 1916 and India Army Order 1266 of 1917 is admissible under the conditions therein stated, to warrant and non-commissioned officers and men of the Royal Air Force (late Royal Flying Corps)

Recovery of messing charges

With the approval of the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of State for India, it has been decided that the period of voyage to be adopted for the purpose of the recovery of messing charges from lady and other passengers (when necessary), provided with passage to and from India at the public expense via the Cape, shall be assessed as follows:—

United Kingdom to Calcutta or *vice versa* 5½ days

” ” Bombay ” ” 51 ”

” ” Madras ” ” 51 ”

Any recoveries which have been made in India in respect of homeward passages should be adjusted in accordance with these periods

Childrens allowance for certain officers of the British Service in receipt of Indian rates of pay and for officers of the Indian Services

It has been decided that children's allowance shall be granted with effect from the 1st October 1917, under the terms of Army Instruction (India) No 1340* of 1918, to the following officers of the

*Published below

British Service in receipt of Indian rates of pay —

- (1) Officers of the Royal Engineers on the Indian establishment drawing Military Works Services' and Sappers and Miners' rates of pay
- (2) Officers in the Indian Ordnance Department
- (3) Officers of the Royal Air Force

2 It has further been decided that no officer entitled to children's allowance under this Instruction, or under Army Instruction (India) No 1340 of 1918 should, by reason of his pay and staff pay exceeding the limits of Rs 500 or Rs 625, laid down in paragraph 1 of Army Instruction (India) No 1340 of 1918, receive emoluments less than if his pay and staff pay did not so exceed those limits. For example a married officer with four children, whose pay and staff pay amounts to Rs 630 per mensem, will receive a children's allowance of Rs 90 per mensem instead of Rs 60 bringing his total emoluments up to Rs 620 per mensem the amount which he would receive were his pay and staff pay Rs 500 per mensem only.

This decision also has effect from the 1st October 1917

3 The children's allowance will be issued to officers on leave whose pay is within the stated limits on the date on which they proceed on leave

No 1340 of 1918

Children's allowance for officers of the Indian Army, Indian Medical Service, Indian Army Reserve of Officers and Staff and Departmental officers (including those with honorary rank)

With the approval of the Secretary of State for India, it has been decided that, with effect from the 1st October 1917, and for the remaining period of the war, a children's allowance shall be issuable to staff and departmental officers (including those with honorary rank) officers of the Indian Army, Indian Medical Service, and Indian Army Reserve of Officers, on the following basis —

- (a) Officers whose pay of rank and staff pay, or consolidated rates of pay, do not exceed Rs 500 per mensem shall be granted an allowance of Rs 30 per mensem for each child (residing in India) up to a maximum of four. In cases where the children are in England, the allowance will be issued at the equivalent current rate of exchange of £2
- (b) Officers whose pay of rank and staff pay, or consolidated rates of pay, exceed Rs 500 per mensem but do not exceed Rs 625 per mensem shall be granted an allowance of Rs 15 per mensem for each child (residing in India) up to a maximum of four. In cases where the children are in England, the allowance will be issued at the equivalent current rate of exchange of £1

2 This allowance is paid to the officer and he must make his own arrangements for sending it home by allotment or remittance

3 The term "staff pay" for the purposes of this allowance includes staff pay, command or charge pay, or special additional pay

4 Payment will be limited to legitimate children and step-children together with any other children of officers, having served in the ranks who under the rules applicable to soldiers' children were then eligible for separation allowance

Claims on account of children adopted prior to the 1st October 1917, and not provided for above, should be forwarded to the local Controller of Military Accounts for submission to the Government of India

Claims on account of children adopted between the 1st October 1917 and the date of this Instruction may also be put forward for special consideration

5 An officer with more than four eligible children will be entitled to claim the allowance for any four of his children who are eligible

6 In any case where a compassionate allowance from public funds is being issued in respect of a step child or of an adopted child for whom children's allowance is granted, the total payment from public funds will not exceed the maximum issuable under the regulations for either the compassionate allowance or the children's allowance, whichever is the greater. Officers will be required to furnish information as to any such compassionate allowances issuable for children in respect of whom claims are submitted for an allowance under the regulations

7 Payments will be made until children attain the age of 18 in the case of sons and 21 in the case of daughters, if the officer remains so long on full pay or half pay, but will cease in the event of the marriage of daughters at an earlier age. The allowance will be admissible in respect of sons who are cadets at the Royal Military Academy, the Royal Military College, or at the Royal Naval Colleges at Dartmouth and Osborne except in the cases in which no payments are required from the parent

8 Where mental or physical infirmity which prevents a son or daughter from earning his or her own living *exists before reaching the age limit* referred to in paragraph (7), and is of a permanent

grant of the allowance beyond the usual age limits will be forwarded to the local Controller of Military Accounts for submission to the Government of India. The issue of the grant will be subject to verification of the circumstances and to the rendering of periodical certificates.

9 Payment will be made by the Controller of Military Accounts from whom officers draw their pay unless the officers otherwise direct. The allowance will be issuable monthly with the officer's pay for the month and will be subject, so far as recovery, taxation and other general conditions are concerned to the rules in force as regards pay in so far as they are applicable.

10 Children's allowance will continue to be issuable for officers transferred in future to half pay so long as they remain on the active list. The allowance will be issued by the agents by whom full pay was last issued. Officers of the active list now on half pay will be eligible for children's allowance at the rate and under the conditions applicable to officers on full pay, their status when last in receipt of full pay being taken as determining the rate of allowance (if any) issuable, these officers will submit their applications to the agents from whom they last drew full pay.

11 Children's allowance will be issued to officers on leave whose pay for the time being falls within the limits fixed.

12 Original applications for the grant of the allowance authorised by this Instruction will be made on Army Form W 3697 or W 3698 (modified for India), in accordance with paragraphs 13 and 14. The necessary forms are obtainable from Contractors for Printing Government of India Forms (through the Superintendent of Government Printing, Calcutta). If the officer is serving in India the application form must be signed by himself. For an officer who is serving abroad or who is a prisoner of war the application form may be signed by his wife or other person authorized by him to act on his behalf.

13. In the case of an officer, whether now holding a commission or commissioned in future who has *not* served in the ranks since the 4th August 1914, or who while so serving had no child eligible for separation allowance Army Form W-3697 (modified for India) will be used. It will be forwarded by the officer or his representative direct to the Controller of Military Accounts issuing the officer's pay, accompanied by marriage and birth certificates.

14 In the case of an officer whether now holding a commission or commissioned in future who has served in the ranks since the 4th August 1914, and in respect of one or more of whose children Army separation allowance has at some time been drawn,

Army Form W -3698 (modified for India) will be used. It will be forwarded by the officer or his representative to the Regimental Paymaster or Controller of Military Accounts who last issued the officer's pay before he was commissioned. The Regimental Paymaster or Controller of Military Accounts will check the particulars at Table ' A ' of the Army Form, after a reference in Territorial Force cases to the Association concerned—see Army Order No 21 of 1915. He will then certify as to the particulars which have been verified and will transmit the claim to the Controller of Military Accounts issuing the officer's pay as shown on the form.

15 The officer will be responsible that a notification is made to the Controller of Military Accounts concerned without delay by himself or his duly authorized representative of any circumstance, *e g*, death of a child, or marriage of a daughter—affecting the issue of the allowance.

16 In the case of officers reported as dead or missing prior to the date of this Instruction no application for children's allowance will be required. The necessary steps will be taken by the Controller of Military Accounts concerned.

17 A claim for an additional grant on the birth of a child will be made on Army Form W -3697 (modified for India) and will be forwarded direct to the Controller of Military Accounts issuing the officer's pay, accompanied by a birth certificate.

18 The marriage and birth certificates will be returned in due course to the officer or his representative by whom they were rendered. No payment from Army Funds will be allowed in connection with the provision of these certificates.

19 On change of payment of an officer, his last pay certificates will contain information as to the issue of children's allowance and be accompanied by the original allowance documents in possession of the Controller of Military Accounts.

20 Charges for the allowance will be classified to the head and sub-head bearing the pay of the officer concerned.

Grant of free passage to British officers and other British ranks desirous of obtaining post-war employment in India when proceeding to have a personal interview with their prospective employers.

With a view to assisting British officers and other British ranks to obtain post-war employment in this country should they desire it, sanction is accorded to the grant of free passage on warrant by rail, road, river and sea within Indian limits, to each candidate when proceeding to have a personal interview with his prospective employer

No expense will be admitted on account of families, servants, and baggage (other than the authorized free railway allowance) or on account of detention.

Warrants will be endorsed "War—Imperial" and the cost debited to His Majesty's Government through the Controller of War Accounts.

2. In order to safeguard Government against an abuse of the above concession, the procedure to be adopted will be for an employer to secure a form of application from the Provincial organization, which, after completion, the employer will return for approval or otherwise. The form of application will then be sent by the Provincial organization to the candidate who will apply for passage in accordance with the instructions given in the form

Provincial organizations will only recommend the application when they are satisfied that the man selected for interview is *prima facie* a suitable candidate and that the employer is reliable. Where an employer desires to interview an unreasonable number of applicants the application for leave will only be recommended provided the employer pays the travelling expenses of the men who are in excess of the number which the Provincial organization considers fair and reasonable.

Chevrons for active service to be worn by officers and airmen of the Royal Air Force.

Air Ministry Weekly Order No 1, dated 2nd January 1919, regarding the chevrons for active service to be worn by officers and airmen of the Royal Air Force, is republished as an appendix below.

2. A supply of the chevrons will be made when stocks become available.

APPENDIX.

AIR MINISTRY WEEKLY ORDER NO. 1, DATED THE 2ND JANUARY 1919.

Chevrons for active service.

1. All officers and airmen who, on 31st March 1918, were qualified to wear one or more chevrons for service rendered in the Naval or Military Forces may wear the corresponding number of chevrons of the description hereby authorised upon their Royal Air Force uniform.

2. Officers and airmen who have been on active service overseas, or who have been posted to and served with operation units in the United Kingdom, shall be entitled to wear a chevron for service rendered since 1st April 1918.

3. The complete period of service for the award of each chevron under this order is one year. A second chevron for officers and airmen under this order will not become due until 1st April 1919.

4. The chevron for 1914 will be *green* worsted embroidery, and for subsequent years of *black* worsted embroidery. No other pattern chevron is to be worn by officers or airmen.

5. Two chevrons will not be worn for the same period, *i.e.*, if an officer or airman has been awarded a chevron for naval or military service rendered in 1918, he will not be entitled to a further chevron for the same period of service, but when periods will count towards a further chevron.

6. Chevrons worn under this order are not to be regarded as in the nature of a decoration or reward.

7. Officers and airmen sent overseas, or to an operation unit on duty of a temporary nature, but who are not appointed for duty on the establishment of a unit serving overseas or on operations in this country, and who return on completion of the appointed duty,

- (d) The proposals in all cases will then be submitted through the General Officer Commanding, Command, Independent Division or Independent Brigade concerned, who will forward them with his recommendations to the General Officer Commanding, Royal Air Force

(II) Selected grounds will fall under the following heads --

(a) *State lands in military occupation.*

These will be made available under the orders of the General Officer Commanding, Command, Independent Division or Independent Brigade.

(b) *State lands in civil occupation*

The General Officer Commanding, Command, Independent Division or Independent Brigade, will arrange with the Local Government or Administration for these to be placed at the disposal of the military authorities as a temporary measure. When it has been finally decided that the ground is required permanently, the formal sanction of the Government of India will be obtained by the Quartermaster General in India to the transfer of the land from civil to military.

(c) *Privately owned lands.*

- (i) These will be rented under the orders of the General Officer Commanding, Command, Independent Division or Independent Brigade, where possible, year by year pending decision that the land is required permanently and issue of the necessary formal sanction of the Government of India. Orders with regard to the lands thus rented will be issued hereafter.
- (ii) Where the land cannot be rented or in cases where it is deemed advisable for specified reasons to acquire the land immediately, the matter should be referred to the General Officer Commanding, Royal Air Force, with as little delay as possible, accompanied with a plan and schedule as mentioned in paragraph 407, Army Regulations, India, Volur copy being retained and the concurrence of the Government or Administration. Should the proposal to

acquire the land be concurred in, the sanction of the Government of India will be obtained by the Quarter-master General in India

After acquisition, the necessary boundary pillars will be erected in accordance with paragraph 53, Army Regulations, India, Volume XII.

(III) The incidence of expenditure will be as follows :—

(a) *Hiring or acquisition of land for landing grounds or as sites for Royal Air Force buildings*

Incidence of cost will be notified hereafter

(b) *Compensation for crops, etc*

Debitable against Army Estimates under "Grant 14 Part II Miscellaneous Compensation for losses (other than Supply and Transport Corps)"

(c) *Preparation of landing grounds*

Debitable against Military Works grant for ordinary demands in the case of ordinary landing grounds, and against the Training grant in the case of landing grounds required for military training purposes, e.g., Artillery Practice Camps, etc

2 The incidence of cost indicated in clauses (III) (b) and (III) (c) above will be observed in the case of all landing grounds, the accounts of which have not yet been closed

No 269 of 1910

Clothing Regulations for the Army and Royal Air Force in India.

A provisional edition of Clothing Regulations for the Army and Royal Air Force in India has been approved. Copies will shortly be distributed to all concerned by the Superintendent, Government Printing, India, Calcutta

Special allowance for parents of unmarried soldiers.

It has been decided that the provisions of Army Instruction (India) No 189* of 1919 shall be applicable to the Royal Air Force in India

No 189 of 1919

Special allowance for parents of unmarried soldiers.

It has been decided to extend the special allowance of 5s-a-week, authorised by Army Instruction (India) No 20 of 1919, to the parents (including step parents and foster parents) of unmarried soldiers who have attained the age of 18 and who on the 4th August 1914 or on the date of joining the colours (if later), were under the age of 26. Payment of the allowance will commence as from 5th November 1918, but this will not affect the right of those who were eligible for the allowance under the age limits stated in paragraph 1 of the above mentioned Army Instruction (India) to payment of the allowance from 1st October 1918 in appropriate cases.

2 The forms referred to in paragraph 5 of the above mentioned Army Instruction (India) will require amendment in the conditions thereon printed by substitution of the ages 18 and 26 for 21 and 23, respectively, and by deletion of the words "from October 1918"

No 290 of 1919

Decision that Income Tax under Indian Income Tax Regulations shall not be charged on gratuities granted to officers or to the widows, children, or other relatives of officers and others, under certain conditions.

A notification has been issued exempting from income-tax —

- (1) Gratuities which are granted to officers and others in respect of wounds or injuries received either in action or in the performance of military duty otherwise than in action
- (2) Gratuities which are granted to the widows, children or other relatives of officers and others who are killed in action, or suffer violent death due directly or wholly to war service, or are killed or die of injuries sustained on flying duty or while being carried on duty in aircraft under proper authority, or die within seven years from wounds or injuries so received

2 These gratuities will also be left out of account in calculating their recipient's total income for income tax purposes

Extra remuneration for those retained in the Royal Air Force of Occupation.

FORCES OF OCCUPATION—FORMATION AND MAINTENANCE

Royal Air Force of Occupation

The reasoning and method which apply to the formation of the Armies of Occupation will also govern, with minor exceptions, the formation and maintenance of the Royal Air Force necessary to co operate with the land and sea forces required during the transition period

The rules governing retention are fully set out in the Army Instruction (India) which follows. The principles are the same as those which have been settled for the Army. Officers and air-men will be retained who were not enlisted and posted before January 1st 1916, have not attained their thirty seventh birthday, or are not entitled to three or more wound stripes. The remainder will be demobilized as rapidly as possible in the priority of the industrial groups now open

Pending an announcement of the permanent establishment and terms of service for the "after war" Royal Air Force, which will be made with as little delay as possible, approval has been given to the grant of a bonus at the following rates —

1 The strength of the Royal Air Force, which it is necessary to maintain to co operate with the Sea and Land Forces of Occupation, has been decided upon

The Forces of Occupation comprise —

The Fleet.

The Home Army

The Army of the Rhine.

The Army of the Middle East

The Detachment of the Far North

The Garrisons of the Crown Colonies and India

The Royal Air Force serving with the above will include—

(a) Men serving on ordinary engagements

(b) Men who have extended their service under Air Ministry Weekly Order 1560—1918

(c) Volunteers

(d) Men held to serve on "Duration of War" engagements

2 On and after 1st February 1919, airmen belonging to the categories shown in the Schedule below will be demobilized at the earliest opportunity

Men serving on pre-war conditions of service are necessarily retained for the duration of their engagements, except in so far as individuals may be released under paragraphs (2), (9) and (10) of the Schedule

All other airmen are specially retained for general service so long as their services are required during the occupation period

Schedule

(1)—(a) All airmen now serving who entered the Naval Service prior to 1st January 1916, or who, having been entered in the "Class Y" Reserve of the Royal Navy, were called up for duty prior to that date

(b) All airmen now serving who were attested and joined the Regular Army for immediate service with the Colours prior to 1st January 1916

- (c) All airmen now serving who, after being attested or deemed to be enlisted and posted to the Reserve of the Regular Army, were called up or joined the Colours for continuous service prior to 1st January 1916
- (d) All airmen now serving who enlisted in the Territorial Forces and who were attested prior to 1st January 1916
- (2) All airmen entered under pre war engagements who have completed the active service or Colour portion of their current engagement
- (3) All airmen serving on "Hostilities Only" or "Duration of War" engagements who attained the age of 37 years by 1st February 1919. Those who subsequently attain the age of 37 years will become eligible from the date of attaining that age
- (4) All airmen who have been duly certified by the Ministry of Labour before 1st February 1919 as civil demobilizers or pivotal men, and whose demobilization is ordered by the Air Ministry on A F Z-82
- (5) All airmen whose special release has been recommended by the Ministry of Labour before 1st February 1919, and whose demobilization is ordered by the Air Ministry on Z-556
- (6) All airmen who belong to Industrial Groups which have been opened for demobilization prior to 1st February 1919
- (7) All airmen who prior to 1st February 1919, are registered in their units as "ship men" on A F Z-16 A, or who have produced "contracts" for employment from their pre-war employers
- (8) All airmen whose claims to return to their pre war homes or businesses outside the United Kingdom have been approved, or may be approved, by the Officer in-charge, Repatriation Records, Winchester, on A F Z 6
- (9) All airmen who are entitled to three or more wound stripes
- (10) All airmen whose releases on extreme compassionate grounds have been ordered by the Air Ministry, or whose releases on such grounds may be subsequently approved by the Air Ministry

3 Additional emoluments in the form of weekly bonuses will be payable, under the Appendix to this Instruction, to men specially retained

‡ Any airman who is eligible for demobilization under paragraph 2 of this Instruction, or who, having already served during

the present war, has been demobilized or discharged, may, provided he is suitable, be permitted to volunteer for general service with the Royal Air Force for one year under the following conditions:—

- (a) Rates of pay, bonus and allowances to be the same as for those men held to serve under this Instruction.
 (b) Substantive rank will be retained or re-assumed.

6. After 1st February 1919, all leave except on urgent compassionate grounds, will be limited to those who are retained in, or who are accepted for, the Royal Air Force of Occupation.

7. All officers are liable to be retained under this Instruction, but, if sufficient numbers of volunteers are forthcoming, those who wish to be demobilized will be released as soon as the exigencies of the service permit.

APPENDIX.

1. A bonus will be payable, as from 1st February 1919, at the rates and under the conditions shown below, to all officers and other ranks who are definitely selected for retention for Royal Air Force service, and to all who volunteer and are accepted for such service.

2. The bonus will, until further notice, be payable also to officers of the Royal Air Force, holding permanent commissions in the Navy, Army or Royal Air Force and to airmen serving on ordinary engagements.

3. If any officers and other ranks due for demobilization forthwith and not specially selected for retention as above have not been released by 1st May 1919, they will be credited, as from that date, with a bonus at half the rates shown below, under the conditions stated. (This half-bonus will be issued to them on their release).

5 The bonus is not issuable to personnel locally enlisted in Malta, Egypt, etc., for special and not general service.

6 The bonus, when dependent on rank, will be based on the rank for which pay is drawn

7 The bonus will be issuable to British Service troops serving in India under the same conditions as those applicable to troops elsewhere

8 The period during which issue will continue for officers and men definitely returned will be that for which it is found necessary, to maintain forces of occupation in various occupied territories

9 As regards officers' gratuities, the bonus will not be taken into account in their assessment. Gratuities under Article 497 of the Army Warrant for pay will not be earned beyond 3rd August 1919, or the date of the termination of the war as defined by statutory authority, whichever comes first. Instructions will shortly be issued as to the war gratuity issuable to officers holding permanent commissions, the same limit of time will apply

10 As regards other ranks, the bonus is in addition to the special bounties for extension of service, and to any war gratuity earned. The war gratuity authorised for airmen serving on ordinary engagements will cease to be admissible for any period after 3rd August 1919, or the date of the termination of the war as fixed by statutory authority, whichever comes first. The conditions governing the war gratuity for all other airmen stand as already published. The bonus will be issuable during the 2nd days' furlough granted on demobilization

11 The bonus will be subject to the same rules for stoppages, public claims, etc., as regimental pay

12 Except in the case of the half bonus, issuable to certain officers and men on release, the bonus will be issuable with ordinary pay, monthly in the case of officers and weekly in the case of other ranks

13 Instructions will follow at once as to the action to be taken by Commanding Officers to enable the amounts of the full bonus to be drawn by those entitled to it

14 The bonus will not be issuable to airmen employed on civil rates of pay

15 The bonus authorised in this Instruction has no bearing on the scales of pay, separation allowance etc of the Air Force in the future, or on future terms of service. The same will shortly be reconsidered in their entirety

No 299 of 1919

Supplementary instructions as to the issue of extra remuneration to the Air Forces of Occupation

[This Instruction will be read in conjunction with Army Instruction (India) No 298 of 1919]

I—OFFICERS

Officers holding permanent regular commissions

1 All officers of the Royal Air Force holding permanent regular commissions on the active list of the Navy Army, or Royal Air Force, will be entitled to the bonus until further orders

2 Officers Commanding units will prepare lists of these officers at the earliest possible date

3 The lists will be prepared in duplicate, and one copy forwarded to the Divisional Disbursing Officer concerned quoting this Army Instruction (India) as authority for the payment of the bonus. Any alterations to this list will be notified by Officers Commanding to the Divisional Disbursing Officer. The bonus will be claimed in the monthly pay bills of officers

4 The lists should show in each case the rate of bonus due

Other officers

5 As regards other officers any who, on existing or future Air Ministry Orders can be informed individually by their Officer Commanding that they are definitely retained, will be entitled to the full bonus as from 1st February 1919. Commanding Officers will forward lists as in paragraphs 2 and 3 above*

* *B*—These lists of officers definitely retained are quite distinct from the lists which are being called for of officers recommended for retention

6 Officers coming within the classes specified in paragraph 26 below will be regarded as entitled to the bonus, and will be shown on these lists forthwith

7 The final selection of officers to be retained cannot be completed for some time but any full bonus issuable will be antedated to 1st February 1919 in the case of those finally selected

8 In the case of officers who have not been definitely selected for retention, but who nevertheless have not been released from service by 1st May, the agents will, subject to the conditions attaching to the bonus, issue at the time of the officer's demobilization a bonus at half the ordinary rate, for the period beginning 1st May 1919 and ending on the date preceding that on which the officer ceases to draw pay

9 Officers who are accepted for permanent commissions in the Royal Air Force will come under the terms of entitlement to bonus applicable to officers holding such commissions (see paragraph 1 above)

10 Nothing contained in this Instruction will be held to prevent the demobilization in ordinary course of any officer otherwise entitled to be demobilized, under orders in force from time to time

II — WARRANT OFFICERS, NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, MEN, AND BOYS

Men on ordinary engagements

11 All men on ordinary engagements are eligible for the full bonus if the period of active or colour service for which they engaged expires on or after 1st February 1919

12 Men on ordinary engagements whose period of active or colour service has already expired by 1st February 1919, and men who had been called up from a reserve, will be dealt with on the same lines as men on duration of war engagements

Men on "duration of war" or similar engagements

13 Men on duration of war or similar engagements are entitled to the full bonus if they are now definitely retained, or if they volunteer and are accepted

14 Men coming within the classes specified in paragraph 26 below will, for purposes of entitlement to the full bonus, be regarded as definitely retained

15 No others on duration of war engagements are entitled, unless their release has not taken place by 1st May 1919, in which case they will be credited with half bonus, for issue on release

16. Men who are definitely retained and at a later date are informed that they can then be demobilized, their services being no longer required, will continue to draw the full bonus until their release. If, however, any man definitely retained is at a later date specially released on compassionate grounds, he ceases to be entitled to the bonus from the date of the authority for the release.

Volunteers (including extension of service).

17. Any man who volunteers for continued service for a year (and is accepted) or who extends his service under Air Ministry Weekly Order 1960, will be entitled to the bonus as from 1st February if he volunteers or extends his service by 14th February, or within 14 days from the receipt of the original order relating to these bonuses. Any man who volunteers or extends his service after that date (and is accepted) will be entitled to the bonus from the date of volunteering or extending.

Issue during 28 days' demobilization leave

18. The continuance of the issue of the full bonus during this period is admissible only for those who were entitled to it on the day immediately preceding their furlough. The half-bonus is admissible for all other men for all or any portion of their demobilization leave which extends beyond 1st May 1919.

Procedure at the units

19. Officers Commanding units will assume that all men definitely coming under the clauses of the schedule to the original order (other than men on ordinary engagement whose term of colour service has not expired by 1st February and men specified in paragraph 20 below) are eligible for demobilization. These men will be indicated in the original order. If a man is not to proceed as early as possible, the unit will be notified. If a man has been retained, the unit will be notified. If a man has been retained from the date of the original order, the unit will be notified. If a man is now or later, for special release on compassionate grounds will be informed as in paragraph 16 above.

20. Those who wish to volunteer, or extend their service under A M W O 1960, now or later, will be informed as in paragraph 17 above.

21. All other men who are retained, for purposes of their bonus will be marked with a star (*) in the book (A. B. 64) of every airman overseas who is thus retained will be marked

to draw the bonus until demobilized. This class will
 be dealt with in the personnel of record and pay offices, but a fuller
 consideration of doubtful cases

- (b) Officers and men detained in overseas garrisons pending relief by other personnel for garrison purposes. This will be applied as shown in the summary below :—

India :—

All officers and men will be entitled to the bonus.

Personnel in hospital.

27. Officers and men who are eligible for demobilization and are not retained, temporarily or otherwise, for public reasons, but are retained in hospital for their own benefit, will not thereby become entitled to the bonus or half bonus. Those already entitled to the bonus or half bonus before entering hospital will continue to be so entitled

Indian Army.

28 Personnel belonging to the Indian Army (other than those holding temporary commissions in the Royal Air Force) are not covered by the orders relating to the bonus and will be dealt with in separate instructions, if necessary.

Forces of Overseas Dominions

29. These orders relating to the bonus are not intended to apply to officers and men (including cadets) of Forces of Overseas Dominions serving with the Royal Air Force who are not in the pay of the Royal Air Force at Imperial rates of pay.

Delegation of financial powers to the General Officer Commanding the Royal Air Force in India.

In supersession of Army Instruction (India) No. 1170 of 1918,*

it has been decided that the General Officer Commanding the Royal Air Force in India shall be invested with financial powers equivalent to those of Heads of Departments as defined in paragraphs 6 (iii), 10 (c) and (d) and 12 and 13-L (sr) of the "Revision of paragraphs 4 to 10, Army Regulations, India, Volume III (Provisional Issue)," the consequent amendments to which are published in the Appendix to these Instructions (reprinted below)

Entitled passengers who disembark at Marseilles for their own convenience will bear any expenses thereby entailed.

No 418 of 1919.

Issue of pay books to British personnel of the Royal Air Force proceeding home.

It has been decided that the provisions of *Army Instruction (India, No 1453 of 1918,* shall be applicable to British personnel of the Royal Air Force serving in India

*Reprinted below

No 1453 of 1918

Change of system of accounting for British units serving in India and Burma, with effect from the 15th December 1918, in connection with the transfer of British soldiers to the United Kingdom.

Immediately on receipt of intimation of the probable date of embarkation to the United Kingdom, the amount due to the personnel concerned shall be credited to their pay books. The amount so credited shall be the amount estimated to be payable on disembarkation. This amount may be considered as a provisional estimate, and will be limited strictly to the amount estimated as payable on disembarkation. These payments will be recorded in a Pay Form A.-27, as may be necessary, and the necessary information will be sent to the Fixed Centre Dis-

be telegraphed to the Fixed Centre Officer, if time does not permit of the Pay and Mess Book or the India Army Form A -27 being received in Poona before the soldier leaves his station

The Officer Commanding will issue a Pay Book (Army Book 64) to each soldier under orders to embark for the United Kingdom immediately after pay, to date of embarkation, etc, has been paid and entered in the Pay and Mess Book or the India Army Form A -27. In this Pay Book will be entered complete particulars of the soldier's name, rank or corps, rates of pay, etc. These entries will be signed in the space provided. The rates of pay and allotment will be found recorded in the Pay and Mess Book returned to the unit by the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer, Poona, for the period, ending 29th November 1918, they can be entered from the statements of accounts which are being forwarded to units by the Divisional Disbursing Officers concerned. Care will be taken that entries are made and attested in respect of all matters affecting the pay, etc, of a soldier arising after the despatch to Poona of the final Pay and Mess Book or India Army Form A 27 as follows —

- (a) Alteration in the rates of pay, etc, occasioned by promotion, reduction, etc
- (b) Changes in the rate of allotment
- (c) Casualties entailing a forfeiture of pay
- (d) Remittances, stoppage of fines—these will be entered across the cash payment page

In the event of an advance being issued to a soldier after the issue of the Pay Book owing to delay in his embarkation the amount paid will be duly recorded in the Pay Book.

On the issue of Pay Book (A B -64) to any soldier, he should be informed that he will be required to produce it on his arrival in the United Kingdom and that a speedy settlement of his account entirely depends on the production of the book complete and in proper order.

A stock of pay books is maintained by the Superintendent of Government Printing, India, Calcutta, and Officers Commanding should obtain their requirements from him immediately.

Note — In the cases of British warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of British units attached to Indian units and departments or extra-regimentally employed, whose pay is being drawn and paid in full through the pay bill of the establishment with which they are employed. Officers Commanding will furnish the necessary information as to the charges to the date of embarkation to the Divisional Disbursing Officer, Controller of Military Supply Accounts or other officer by whom pay is being issued.

No. 433 of 1918

Pay and Allowances of the Royal Air Force in India.

Appendix IIa of Air Force Memorandum

No 1 is republished in the Appendix* to this Instruction

The rates of pay for all ranks other than commissioned officers of the Royal Air Force, as shown therein will take effect from the 1st April 1918.

If the rate of pay of any man on the 31st March 1918 (exclusive of any Indian allowances) was higher than the rate now sanctioned he may continue to draw that higher rate until absorbed by increased pay on promotion or otherwise unless disrated for other reasons

Those transferred or attached to the Royal Air Force after the 1st April 1918 may retain the rates of pay they were then in receipt of, if higher than the new Royal Air Force rates of pay up to the 30th June 1919. From the 1st July 1919 they will receive the new rates of pay.

From the date of this Instruction the special allowances sanctioned in paragraphs 6 and 8 of Government of India (Army Department) letter No. 34644-1 A. G., dated 2nd August 1916, will be discontinued.

Groups and trade classifications of the Royal Air Force.

TRANSFER OF THE ROYAL NAVAL AIR SERVICE AND ROYAL FLYING COIPTS TO THE ROYAL AIR FORCE.

This pamphlet is issued by the Air Council in order to give officers and men now serving in, or attached to, the Flying Services a general view of the conditions of service in the Air Force, together with a statement of the rates of pay, etc., which will be in force.

APPENDIX IIA.—PAY OF MEN.

1. The rates of pay of warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the various branches of the Air Force are as

shown in the attached table Appendices IIB and IIC* show the Air Force rank into which the various ranks and ratings of the existing Flying Services will come

2 *Rates of Flying Pay* remain as at present —

with special rates for men employed in airships, and kite balloons, on acceptance and observation duties, etc. These special rates will be liable to certain modifications

3 *Increases for War Service*—The increase of 1d a day for each year of service, given to the Army as "War Pay" is not applicable to the Air Force, as the rates were specially fixed so as to render such a grant unnecessary. The following classes, however, will be entitled to War Pay, under the conditions already announced for the Army —

- (a) Boys at 1s privates, 2nd Class and clerks, 3rd Class
- (b) Men who come over from the Royal Flying Corps at their existing Army rates of pay and who would have been entitled to War Pay under Army Regulations. Such men will retain it during the war until it is absorbed by increases for length of service or on promotion. Those coming over on a higher rate of pay may draw their Army pay and War pay if these together would be more beneficial

It should be noted that service in the Navy or Royal Marines does not count towards War Pay.

4 *Allotments of Pay*—The recent concessions will apply as follows —

- (a) To men from the Army—as already authorised for men now serving in the Army
- (b) To men from the Navy—the benefit of the Army system will be given. No allotment will be charged against the man's pay in respect of the amounts due as separation allowance or dependants' allowance under Army scales and regulations. As a temporary measure, however, the present allotment will continue to be charged against the men's accounts until the reassessment is completed. This will take some considerable time. Any arrears due to the men in respect of allotments so charged will, be made good to them. (See Appendix III,* para 9)

5 *Men on Special Rates of Pay*—Following the present practice such men are not entitled to the concessions given under

• 1483—GROUPS AND TRADE CLASSIFICATIONS.

(C 12169-18.)

1 The existing division of other ranks into three groups (technical, non-technical, clerks and storekeepers) will be abolished on 1st January next and thereafter the "other ranks" in the R A F will be as follows—

*6 In the case of any person *transferred* to the Air Force, for the purposes of pay, pensions gratuity, and retired or half-pay, and of any decoration or reward dependent on length of service, any previous service with His Majesty's naval or military forces which would have counted as service towards pay, pension, gratuity, retired or half pay, or such decoration or reward if he had not been so transferred, will be deemed to be service with the Air Force towards pay, pension gratuity, retired or half-pay, or such decoration or reward

*7 In the case of any person *attached* to the Air Force, the fact that he is so attached will not affect any right to any pay, pension, gratuity, retired or half pay, or such decoration or reward as aforesaid already earned by him in that branch of His Majesty's naval or military forces to which he belonged at the date on which he was so attached and the period during which he is so attached shall, for the purpose of any provisions relating to pay, pensions, gratuity, retired or half-pay, or such decoration or reward, be deemed to be service with that branch of His Majesty's naval or military forces to which he belonged at the date on which he was so attached

CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL RANKS

7a Every officer or man serving in the Air Force will, if medically fit, be liable to be called upon to go into the air, either in airships, aeroplanes or kite balloons

7b Every officer or man serving in the Air Force will be liable to be ordered to any station, at home or abroad, if considered medically fit for such service

GENERAL RULES AS TO EMOLUMENTS—ALL RANKS

In the exercise of the future as to the prospects latitude must be reserved to privileges or emoluments (such as allowances) which are not subject to vested rights it may be taken as a governing principle that no officer or man will suffer during the war by reason of transfer to the Air Force, in respect of the pay and pension of the substantive, temporary or acting rank held by him in the Navy or Army immediately before transfer,

*The position of officers of the Indian Army and of the Indian Army Reserve transferred or attached to the Air Force is being specially considered in accordance with the provisions of these two paragraphs. In the meantime nothing as to the matter shall be treated regarding pay. Officers of the Indian Army shall be informed individually

an officer or man, however, may be required to relinquish his temporary or acting rank under the existing rules of the Services. Nor will officers or men suffer through any revision of the rates after the war in respect of the pay and pension of the substantive rank held by them on the date of such revision. At the same time, it must be borne in mind that certain concessions in regard to emoluments in the Navy and Army have only been authorised for the period of the war, and this limitation must equally apply to such emoluments in the Air Force. Officers and men who are merely lent, as a purely temporary measure, to the Air Force, are not dealt with in this pamphlet.

9 *Scales of pay*—The rates of pay of officers and other ranks IC, and IIA, IIB, appointments in

All officers who are transferred or attached to the Air Force will (subject to their not drawing less than their existing rates under para 8) be paid at the rate of pay appropriate to the appointment in the Air Force to which they are assigned and not necessarily at the rate of pay in the Air Force to which their own rank would carry under Appendix IA. They will, of course, draw the rate appropriate when the

transfer will draw the pay of which they were in receipt at the time of the transfer of their attachment to the Air Force, plus instructional rates of flying pay until they qualify.

10 *General rule as to allowances*—Allowances generally will be at Army rate and under Army regulations. These allowances will be reviewed from time to time as may be necessary, to adapt them to the circumstances of the Air Force. Typical rates are shown in Appendix II as a general guide. Navy allowances (other than separation allowance) will apply in the case of officers and men while actually borne on the books of His Majesty's ships.

11 *Officers' children's allowance*—This allowance will be issuable during the war at the same rates and under the conditions already authorised (see Appendix III).

12 *Separation allowance—Men*—Separation allowance will be issuable at Army rates.

Appendix III shows how the allowances in the case of men transferred from the Navy will be adjusted on transfer.

13 *Disability pensions*—These are administered by the Ministry of Pensions. The general position is that no officer or man will lose in his present rank on transfer.

14 *Pensions for length of service half pay, etc*—See para 7 above. Details of pensions for length of service of half pay, etc.

have not been finally settled, but a general guarantee is given that pension rights for officers on a permanent commission, or men on a regular engagement, transferred or attached to the Air Force, will be at rates not less favourable than those that can be earned in the Navy and Army

15 *Income tax*—Steps have been taken to secure for officers and men of the Air Force income tax reliefs similar to those granted under recent Finance Acts to members of the naval and military forces

These reliefs include reduced rates of tax, exemption where the total income does not exceed £160, an abatement allowance of £160 where the total income does not exceed £300, etc

16 *Prize money and prize bounty*—Officers and men of the Royal Navy and R N A S if entitled, at the date of transfer or attachment to the Air Force to prize money under the regulations which may be approved for its distribution, will not forfeit their claims by such transfer or attachment

17 *War Gratuity*—The position of officers and men of the Army transferred or attached to the Air Force will not, by reason of their transfer or attachment, be altered as regards any claim they might otherwise have had to participate in any war gratuity the issue of which may hereafter be sanctioned by His Majesty's Government

CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL OFFICERS

18 All officers transferred or attached on the formation of the Air Force will be placed on a gradation list, which will fix their seniority in the Air Force

In drawing up the Gradation List consideration has been given to the permanent, temporary or honorary rank held by each officer

In the case of officers holding permanent commissions in the Navy or Army, the permanent rank has been the first basis. Certain promotions have, however, been made in cases where officers have been advanced in temporary rank more than one grade, or have held temporary rank (while holding appointments carrying temporary rank), for a certain period

In grading temporary officers consideration has been given to their temporary or acting rank, whether gained in the R N A S or R F C or in other branches of the Services. Unless for exceptional reasons, those who have not held their *present temporary* rank for more than a certain period are graded in the rank below, and given temporary rank of their present grade

Owing to the difference between old and new ranks and scales of pay, it has been found that certain officers if graded in their present permanent or temporary rank, would receive pay of appointments higher than those they now hold, and in which there are at present no vacancies. In these cases they have been graded

in the rank corresponding to their present rate of pay and granted honorary rank in the grade they hold before the promotion of the Air Force.

In certain cases the Air Council have made special promotions to meet the needs of the Air Force on its formation.

The list has been compiled by the senior officers of the two Services, and each individual case has been considered, although, in view of the fact that all promotions in the Air Force above the rank of Lieutenant will be by selection, the exact order of seniority in the different ranks is not of so much importance as in the older Services. It is not improbable that there may be errors in the list, and attention should be drawn to these through the usual channels.

19 All officers (other than those under instruction) who are transferred or attached to the Air Force from the Navy or Army will, in order to give them authority under the Air Force Act, receive temporary commissions in the Air Force for the period for which they are transferred or attached.

20 In the event of the services of an officer attached to the Air Force proving unsuitable, the Air Council may arrange with the Admiralty or Army Council for his return to his original service.

21 A limited number of permanent commissions in the regular Air Force will be given to such officers (whether transferred or attached) as apply for, and are selected for, permanent transfer.

CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO SPECIAL CATEGORIES OF OFFICERS

22 Officers of the following categories, *viz* —

- Regular officers — Navy and Royal Marine,
- Officers holding other than temporary commissions in R N R & R N V R,
- Regular officers — Army and Indian Army,
- Officers of the Reserve of Officers,
- Officers of the Special Reserve of Officers (except Special Reserve, R F C),
- Officers of the Territorial Force,
- Officers of the Territorial Force Reserve,
- Officers attached to the R N A S or R F C under any special order of the Admiralty or Army Council,

who on the date prescribed by the Order in Council (*see para 1*) were attached to the R N A S or R F C will, subject to their rights under Section 1 of the Act (*para 2*), be attached to the Air Force.

23 Officers of the above categories who exercise the right to object to attachment (*see para 2*) will revert to naval or military service.

24. Officers of the following categories, viz.—

- Officers holding temporary commissions in the Royal Marines, R N V.R., R N.R., and R N A S.,
- Temporary officers on the General List of the Army and Indian Army,
- Officers of the Indian Army Reserve,
- Officers of the Special Reserve of the Royal Flying Corps
- Officers attached to the R N.A.S. or R F.C. under any special order of the Admiralty or Army Council;

who on the date prescribed by the Order in Council (*see* part 1) belonged to or were attached to the R N.A.S. or R F.C. will, subject to their rights under section 3 of the Act, be transferred to the Air Force

25 Temporary R N V R, R N R and R N A S officers, who have not served with a commission in any branch of the Royal Navy, except the R N A S, will, if they refuse to be transferred to the Air Force, have no claim to be accepted by the Admiralty as commissioned officers in another branch of the Navy

26. An officer of the R F C Special Reserve, who refuses to be transferred to the Air Force, will have no military unit to which he can be re-appointed, and will have no claim on the Army Council for appointment to commissioned rank in another branch of the Service

27 Temporary officers on the General List of the Army, who have not served while holding a commission in any branch of the Army except the R F C, will, if they refuse to be transferred to the Air Force, have no claim to be accepted by the Army Council as commissioned officers in another branch of the Army

CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL RANKS OTHER THAN OFFICERS

28 All warrant officers, chief petty officers, petty officers, air officers, men and boys who, on the date prescribed belong to or are attached to the R F C, will be transferred to the Air Force, with effect from the date to be fixed by the Order of the Air Council referred to in paragraph 2

Royal Fleet Reserve ratings will be attached only

29 The rank of those transferred to the Air Force under the preceding paragraph will not be lower than the corresponding rank in the Navy and Army held on the day preceding transfer. The ranks are set out in Appendices IIb and IIc.

4. *Allotments of Pay*—The concession will apply as follows—

(b) To men from the Navy—the benefit of the Army system will be given. No allotment will be charged against the man's pay in respect of the amounts due as separation allowance or dependants' allowance under Army scales and regulations. As a temporary measure, however, the present allotment will continue to be charged against the man's accounts until the re-assessment is completed. This will take some considerable time. Any arrears due to the men in respect of allotments so charged will be made good to them. (See Appendix III, paragraph 9)

5 *Men on Special Rates of Pay*—Following the present practice such men are not entitled to the concessions given under paragraphs 3 and 4 above—e.g., men of the R. F. C. in Canada drawing a special allowance while serving there.

6 *Army Gratuities*—The gratuities given under Army Regulations to soldiers on transfer to the Army Reserve or on discharge will continue to be the R. N. A. S. with effect from gratuities are at the rate of £1 for the Army to the Air Force is not a

Where an allotment from the man's pay in respect of motherless children was actually in payment, or authorised by the man on or before the 2nd December 1917, the allowance as stated above will be increased by the amount of the allotment (3s 6d or 4s 13d). This concession is applicable to the Army only. Allotments made subsequent to that date must be borne by the man.

(2) *Other Dependants* — The Army rates for dependants other than wives

(3) *Adjustments on Transfer to the Air Force* — There will be no change in the allowances of men coming over from the Army, except in so far as individuals may be promoted on transfer, to a rank in the Air Force carrying a higher rate.

In the case of men coming from the Navy the benefit of Army rates and conditions will be given when they are more favourable than those of the Navy. The allowances will be adjusted to Army rates and conditions as follows —

(b) *Allowances for Dependants* — The amounts due on the Army system of assessment as described in (2) above will be ascertained and will become payable in full without any contribution by the man.

If the amount now being received by the dependant is less than the Army scale would give, the Army rate will be issued and no charge will be made against the man's account. For example take the case of a man whose dependant is now getting 12s a week, 2s 6d of which is being contributed

from the man's pay. If the Army regulations would allow 16s the full 16s will be issued without any contribution at all by the man.

If the amount now being received by the dependant is greater than the Army scale would give the full amount as hitherto will continue to be issued to the dependant (unless and until the man notifies his desire to the contrary), but the share of this charged against the man's account may be less. For example take the case of a man whose dependant has been receiving 11s a week (that being the pre war dependence), 4s 6d of which was charged against the man's account. If the amount due under Army rules is 12s 6d, 14s will continue to be issued to the dependant, but only 1s 6d of it will be charged against the man. Take, again, the case of a man whose dependant has been receiving 16s, 5s 6d of which was charged against the man's account, but whose dependence allowance under Army rules turns out to be only 10s 6d, i.e., the amount of the pre war dependence. In that case 10s will continue to be issued, 10s 6d will continue to be borne by public funds as hitherto, and 5s 6d will be charged against the man's account.

Thus in many cases there will be a clear gain to the man or to his family or dependants and in no case will the amount paid from public funds by the Air Ministry be less than the amount which they are now entitled to be paid from public funds by the Admiralty or War Office.

It should be clearly understood that the re-assessment of separation allowance, in cases where any increased benefit is due, will take some considerable time. Until the rate has been re-assessed, the issue will continue as at present. When the new rate has been fixed the increased benefit (if any) will take effect for the future, and the arrears (if any) will be made good to the man or his wife or dependant.

Bounty in lieu of furlough for British other ranks of the Royal Air Force.

With reference to Army Instruction (India) No 243* of 1919, it has been decided that a bounty of Rs 250 in lieu of passage, shall be granted to British other ranks of the Royal Air Force in India who extend their service under the provisions of Air Ministry Weekly Order† No 1563 of 1918 and who desire to forego their furlough.

EXTENSION OF SERVICE OF AIRMEN IN THE ROYAL AIR FORCE

1 In order to provide the airmen for overseas garrisons, and the necessary reserves at home, it has been decided that airmen may specially extend their Air Force service for periods of approxi-

are now published for the information of all ranks but no action in the direction of accepting men, under the conditions laid down, is to be taken until further detailed instructions are issued

With a view to simplicity, the term "special extension of service" is used throughout these instructions, but it must be understood that this term includes also re-engagement, etc., according to the procedure finally decided as necessary under the present terms of service of each individual airman

2 *Men eligible to extend—*

(a) Men serving on "Duration of War" engagements

(b) Men serving on normal engagements, whose term of colour service has expired, or is due to expire, before 1st April 1919

3 *Periods of service—*

Men will be required to extend their service for one of the following periods —

(a) From date of extension to any date between 1st January 1921 and 30th June 1921

(b) From date of extension to any date between 1st January 1922 and 30th June 1922

(c) From date of extension to any date between 1st January 1923 and 30th June 1923

The actual date of discharge in each individual case to be determined within the limits laid down above, by the Air Ministry, according to the requirements of the Royal Air Force from time to time

4 *Qualifications—*

(a) Must be physically fit for service in his Air Force trade at home or abroad

(b) On extension of service, must not be over the age of 38

5 *Conditions—*

(a) Airmen, who wish to extend their engagements, but for whom vacancies in the Peace Establishment, in their existing

ranks, do not exist, may, subject to the conditions set forth in the preceding paragraphs, be allowed to extend their service in lower ranks. In such cases, a statement, signed by the airmen, to the effect that he is willing to accept the lower rank and pay, is to be attached to the application for extension (F S Form 82)

(b) It must be understood that acceptance for extension of service will be subject to the following limitations —

- (i) The number that can be accepted in the rank of sergeant must necessarily be limited, and it must be in proportion to the number of rank and file extending
- (ii) The number extending in any trade must be limited to the requirements of that trade
- (iii) The numbers extending for each of the three periods referred to in paragraph 3 must be approximately equal

6 Terms—

(a) *Pay*—The present ordinary rates of pay and allowances for the Royal Air Force will continue in force for the period of extension of service, and the rates of pay for any airman, voluntarily continuing to serve after the termination of this extension, will be the normal rates then in force

Men originally transferred from the Navy and Army (including the Royal Naval Air Service and the Royal Flying Corps), who are in receipt of special emoluments as a vested right, will be granted the regulated pay and allowances of the Royal Air Force rank only. Similarly, men enlisted at special rates of pay, *e.g.*, drivers, clerks, *etc.*, and *ex* Royal Naval Air Service drivers in receipt of driving pay, will be offered the normal emoluments of their present rank only

All men subsequently promoted will come on the then existing rate of pay appropriate to the rank

(b) Service, after the termination of the war, will not count for increased "War Pay."

(c) The rates of separation allowance now in force will be continued in the case of men in respect of whom they are now issuable

(d) *Bounties*—In addition to any pension, reserve pay, or gratuities to which men may be entitled on account of war or other service, bounties at the following rates will be given to men extending their service for one of the three periods laid down in paragraph 3, provided they so extend their service before—

In the case of units at home and with the British Expeditionary Force—1st January 1919,

In the case of units in the Middle East, Mediterranean, Canada, and America—1st February 1919 and

In the case of units in Mesopotamia and India—1st March 1919

Men extending up to any date between 1st January 1921 and 30th June 1921, three sums each of £6 13s 4d—

the first payment on extension of service,
the second payment on completion of first year, and
the third payment on completion of second year, or on discharge
Total £20

Men extending up to any date between 1st January 1922 and 30th June 1922, four sums each of £10

the first payment on extension of service,
the second payment on completion of first year,
the third payment on completion of second year, and
the fourth payment on completion of third year or on discharge
Total £40

Men extending up to any date between 1st January 1923 and 30th June 1923, 5 sums each of £10—

the first payment on extension of service
the second payment on completion of first year,
the third payment on completion of second year
the fourth payment on completion of third year, and
the fifth payment on completion of fourth year or on discharge
Total £50

(e) Special leave to the United Kingdom will be granted to men extending for one of the periods laid down in paragraph 3, as follows—

Men extending up to any date between 1st January 1921 and 30th June 1921—two months

Men extending up to any date between 1st January 1922 and 30th June 1922—three months

Men extending up to any date between 1st January 1923 and 30th June 1923—three months

This leave will be given as soon after extension of service as the exigencies of the service permit, but in the case of men going to overseas garrisons it will, in any circumstances, be given before they proceed to such garrisons

(f) Preference will be given to single men without dependants, or with dependants drawing low rates of allowance

Consideration may be given to the applications of other men but passages to and from foreign garrisons will only be granted to a limited number of families

In the case of married men, the present rates of separation allowance, when otherwise admissible, can only be guaranteed to the families of such men as are married at the date of this order

The privilege for a family cannot be commuted for a money bounty

7 In the case of men extending for 12 years, a bounty of £50 will be paid, as laid down in paragraph 6 (d), and the terms of service will be as in this order for the period of four years. Subsequently, ordinary Royal Air Force Regulations will apply

When service pattern bicycles are on charge, components for repair can be obtained on payment from an Arsenal

It has been decided that General Officers Commanding, Commands or independent Divisions may hold parades periodically for the purpose of presenting to officers and soldiers or their next-of-kin, the insignia of orders, decorations or medals conferred during the war.

2. The provisions of paragraphs 2, 3 and 4 of India Army Order No 1062 of 1917, republished in the Appendix () to this Instruction, are extended to these parades.

EXTRACT FROM INDIA ARMY ORDER No 1062 of 1917.

* * * * *

2. The insignia of an order, decoration or medal conferred for distinguished or meritorious service in the field since 4th August 1914, upon an officer or soldier, British or Indian, who has not survived to receive it, may be publicly presented at these investitures to the next-of-kin resident in India if the latter so desires. In cases where the next-of-kin are not desirous of attending an investiture the insignia of the order, decoration or medal will be forwarded to them by post.

3 Free passage from residence to place of presentation and return will be granted to next-of-kin, but to only one relative in each case. In exceptional cases, such as those of age or infirmity

relatives of British officers, second class to those of British ranks and Indian officers, and 3rd class to those of other Indian ranks.

4 British officers ordered to attend investitures with a view to receiving decorations will be entitled to travelling allowance at the temporary duty scale for the journeys involved under the provisions of paragraphs 29 and 55, Army Regulations India Volume X, and the Government of India have decided that they shall also be granted detention allowance for a period not exceeding three days in any one case. Other British ranks will be entitled to the ration allowance admissible under paragraph 643, Army Regulations, India Volume I.

Income-tax, Liability of house-rent allowances and value of rent-free quarters to taxation.

The following Finance Department ruling under section 3 (2) (vi) and (ix) of the Income-tax Act,

FINANCE DEPARTMENT LETTER No 1019-F, DATED THE 17TH APRIL 1919

Section 3 (2) (vi) and (ix)

The liability to income tax of house rent allowances and rent-free quarters is governed by the provisions of t

the case of rent free quarters the Government of India have been advised that, except in cases in which it is permissible to sub let the perquisite which they represent is not reasonably capable of being converted into money. The following criterion should therefore be adopted in determining whether the perquisite is liable to income tax —

Where a person occupies a house rent free by virtue of his office and has the right to let the house, its annual value should be taken into account in computing his income. Where however he has not the right to let the house, its annual value should not be regarded as part of his income.

In the case of house rent allowances since these take the form of money, the provisions of section 3 (2) (c) do not apply, and these will ordinarily be chargeable to income tax. The conditions which are necessary in order to justify exemption are two. The expenses incurred by the employe must be wholly and necessarily incurred in the performance of his duty as an employe, and the allowance must have been granted by the employer with the set purpose of meeting the extra expense thus caused to the employe and that extra expense only. The following example indicates the exceptional class of case in which house rent allowances may be entitled to exemption —

A Government office has its headquarters in Bombay, but proceeds for some months in the year elsewhere and grants its ministerial establishment house rent allowances in the place to which it proceeds with the specific object of providing for the maintenance of a second and from the point of view of the grantees unnecessary residence in order that they may perform their duties there. The allowances will be exempt from income tax.

APPENDIX.

Letter from the Finance Department Government of India, No 2159-F., dated 2nd August 1918, to all Local Governments and Administrations.

I am directed to request that the enclosed ruling under section 3 (2) (c) of the Income-tax Act, 1918, may be substituted for that given in the memorandum of instructions and rulings forwarded with my letter No 791 F. dated the 26th March 1918.

Section 3 (2) vs

House-rent allowances directly, and the value of rent free quarters indirectly, as perquisites, form additions to the remuneration of an employe, and, even where residence in a particular town

or building is necessary for the proper performance of an employé's duties, they are liable to income tax, unless the conditions imposed by this sub section are fulfilled. The conditions are two. The expenses incurred by the employe must be wholly and necessarily incurred in the performance of his duties as an employe, and the allowance or the perquisite of rent free quarters must have been granted by the employer with the set purpose of meeting the extra expense thus caused to the employe and that extra expense only. It will thus be a question of fact in each case whether a house rent allowance or the value of rent free quarters is exempt from the tax, but the following examples will serve to indicate the lines on which the decision should be made —

- (a) A Currency Officer is granted rent free quarters in his Currency Office. Even though his residence in that office is necessary for the proper performance of his duties, he will be liable to the tax on the value of his rent free quarters, since he would in any case have had to provide himself with a residence, and the perquisite does not therefore meet expenses wholly incurred in the performance of the duties of an office or employment of profit.
- (b) A firm in Calcutta makes a practice of providing its employés with rent free quarters, and houses some of

the value of their rent-free quarters

- (c) A Government office has its headquarters in Bombay, but proceeds for some months in the year elsewhere, and grants its ministerial establishment house rent allowances or rent free quarters in the place to which it proceeds with the specific object of providing for the maintenance of a second and, from the point of view of the grantees, unnecessary residence in order that they may perform their duties there. The allowance or the value of rent free quarters will be exempt from income tax.

No 692 of 1910

Payment of advances and grants-in-aid to officers' and serjeants messes of the Royal Air Force in India.

It has been decided that the provisions of Army Instruction (India) No 215* of 1918 shall also apply to the officers' and serjeants' messes of the Royal Air Force in India, except that the advances, to be re-

equal monthly instalments, shall be deducted from the mess allowances given below which are now authorised in supersession of all previous orders on the subject —

For each squadron	} Rs 8 per mensem per officer, subject to a maximum of Rs 250
For the Aircraft Dep't	
For each Wing Headquarters	Rs 10 per mensem per officer

The maximum of Rs 250 per mensem will not be applied until the advances have been fully recovered

2 Excluding the advances, which are recoverable and adjustable under a suspense head, the extra expenditure likely to be incurred during the current financial year is estimated at Rs. 31,699. From this amount a sum of Rs 22,449 on account of the new Royal Air Force units will be chargeable to "War—India, North-West Frontier—1913" and the balance of Rs 9,250 to the Army estimates under Grant 3—Royal Air Force—Miscellaneous Allowances, to which a sum of Rs 9,250 is hereby transferred from the Reserve with the Government of India under Grant 14, an allocation statement of which will be issued in due course

No 215 of 1918.

Payment of advances and grants-in-aid to officers' and serjeants' messes of all Territorial units and Garrison battalions and of any units or formations, whether regular or temporary, which were not in existence in August 1914.

Army Department letter No 11603 (M W-2), dated the 24th November 1914, as modified by that Department's letter No 15788—1 (M W-1), dated the 29th August 1916, sanctioned the grant of certain concessions to Territorial units in India, and these concessions have been subsequently extended by the Government of India to various other units, formations, etc

2 It has now been decided that the concessions referred to above shall be introduced for Garrison regular or temporary, which were not in existence in August 1914 —

- (a) Payment of initial grants and advances in cash for the purchase of equipment and furniture for messes will be made, such grants and advances being in accordance with the sliding scale shown in the diagram* printed as Appendix 26 to this Instruction. Both initial grants and advances may be given to officers' messes, but serjeants' messes will receive initial grants only

*Not reproduced

- (b) The payment of the initial grants and advances mentioned in (a) above will be made only if the General Officer Commanding the Division or Independent Brigade concerned, considers that the formation of a separate mess is necessary and desirable for the unit. General Officers Commanding may, however, arrange at their discretion for the formation of station or combined messes which will be eligible for these initial grants and advances.
- (c) The amounts of the advances shown in the sliding scale are maxima only, and may be drawn in full, or not, at the discretion of the Officer Commanding concerned.
- (d) The advances will be repaid in 25 equal monthly instalments and will be deducted from the mess allowance admissible under paragraph 284, Army Regulations, India, Volume I. The maximum of Rs 150 per mensem will not be applied until the advance has been fully recovered.
- (e) Those units which have already received either mess equipment in kind under Army Department letter No 11603 (M W 2), dated the 21st November 1914, or an allowance in lieu of mess equipment under that Department's letter No 10788-1 (M W -1), dated the 29th August 1916, or a grant from the War Office for the purchase of mess equipment, will not be eligible for a further initial grant under these orders. They may, however, be allowed to draw the advance admissible under these orders.
- (f) Sergeants' messes which have received furniture additional to that authorized in Table 44, Section IV, Army Tables, Miscellaneous Services, will be permitted to retain such furniture as a free gift.
- (g) Officers' messes which have received furniture from the Military Works Services on hire will be given the option of taking it over at a valuation to be fixed by the Standing Barrack Committee. If not taken over, the furniture will be withdrawn and returned to the Military Works Services.
- (h) Officers who have received furniture for their quarters on hire from the Military Works Services under the orders contained in the Army Department letters quoted in paragraph 1 above will be given the option of taking it over at a valuation to be fixed by the Standing Barrack Committee. If not taken over, it will be withdrawn and returned to the Military Works Services.

- (i) If a unit leaves India, or a mess is abolished before the whole of the advance is repaid, Government will have a lien on the mess property purchased from the grant and advance to the extent of the unpaid portion of the advance
- (j) Claims for support by units, the Divisional
- (k) Units, and not the Military Works Services, will be responsible for the purchase and maintenance of furniture other than that authorised in Tables 44 and 45, Section IV, Army Tables, Miscellaneous Services, which will continue to be supplied and maintained by the Military Works Services

3 Officers' messes which have been provided with billiard tables, etc., under the conditions laid down in Army Department letter No H S 113, dated the 12th February 1917, may be permitted to retain such tables, etc., under those conditions, but no new tables, etc. will be purchased by the Military Works Services in future

4 The expenditure involved in giving initial grants to messes under these orders should be adjusted in the same way as other charges of units, depots, etc., in India. The advances should be treated as advances recoverable on the books of the Divisional Controllers of Military Accounts

5 The amounts realized by the sale of the furniture referred to in clauses (j) and (k) of paragraph 2 above will be credited to the receipt head corresponding to the disbursement head against which the initial cost of purchasing the furniture in question was charged

XIV — Armies of Occupation

1 *Introduction* — In accordance with the Government announcement, the Armies of Occupation to be maintained as from 1st

February 1919, pending the reconstruction of the regular army, will be the Home Army, the Army of the Rhine the Army of the Middle East and Egypt, the Detachment of the Far North, and of Siberia, the Garrisons of the Crown Colonies and India. All those who are retained in the Armies of Occupation or who may volunteer for such armies may be called upon to serve in any Corps or Arm of the Service or in any of the Armies of Occupation. No soldier under the age of twenty, however, will be required to serve elsewhere than in the Home Army or the Army of the Rhine.

2 *Officers*—The officers (other than regular officers) required to complete the establishment of each portion of the Armies of Occupation under the Command of a General Officer Commanding will be provided within such

and shall be retained with the following exceptions—

- (1) Officers entitled to wear three or more wound stripes
- (2) Officers duly certified by the Ministry of Labour before 1st February 1919, on Army Form Z-27, as civil demobilizers or pivotal men or officers whose special release has been recommended by that Ministry on Army Form Z 56 excepting those whose retention in the Army is essential for demobilization purposes
- (3) Officers whose release on extreme compassionate grounds is approved by the Army Council
- (4) Officers whose claims to return to their pre war homes or business overseas have been or may be approved by the Officer in charge, Repatriation Records, Winchester, on Army Form Z 6
- (5) Officers over 51 years of age

(B) In selecting officers for retention, each rank in each corps within each command referred to above will be treated separately and the officers required to fill the establishment of each rank plus a surplus of 20 per cent of captains and subalterns will be taken in the following order of priority—

- (1) Officers who volunteer
- (2) If the number of officers volunteering in any rank is insufficient to meet the requirements of that rank then the balance will be made up firstly by the promotion of officers in the next lower rank who volunteer to remain in that rank for promotion to the rank to which they are promoted by the compulsory retention subject to the exceptions enumerated in sub paragraph (1) above, junior of the rank to be taken first

(C) If the number of officers volunteering in any rank is surplus to requirements the names of the surplus officers will be reported to the War Office with a view to their being eventually posted to another command so as to release officers compulsorily retained.

(D) Officers who have been or shall be passed to the Reserve immediately on receiving a commission from a cadet unit shall not be retained either voluntarily or compulsorily under these instructions.

(E) Acting rank will not be taken into consideration in giving effect to these instructions.

(F) Officers who have been or shall be passed to the Reserve immediately on receiving a commission from a cadet unit shall not be retained either voluntarily or compulsorily under these instructions.

(G) Officers who have been or shall be passed to the Reserve immediately on receiving a commission from a cadet unit shall not be retained either voluntarily or compulsorily under these instructions.

(3) *Warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men.*—With the exception of—

(a) warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men serving under pre-war conditions of service who have not completed their term of colour service;

(b) warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the non-combatant corps (N. C. C.);

(c) those who are temporarily required for the military machinery of demobilization (as defined in the attached schedule) until they can be individually substituted or dispensed with; and

(d) those detained in overseas garrisons pending relief, the following are to be demobilized as soon as the exigencies of the service permit.—

(1) All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men who—

(a) were attested and joined for immediate service with the colours prior to 1st January 1916; and

(b) after being attested or deemed to be enlisted and posted to the reserve were called up or joined the colours for continuous service prior to 1st January 1916.

(2) All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the Territorial Force who were attested prior to 1st January 1916.

- (3) All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men serving under pre-war conditions of service who have completed their term of colour service
- (4) All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men who have attained the age of 37 and those who subsequently attain that age
- (5) All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men entitled to wear three or more wound stripes
- (6) All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men duly certified by the Ministry of Labour before 1st February 1919 as civil demobilizers or pivotal men for whom orders for demobilization have been or may be issued by the War Office on Army Form Z-32.
- (7) All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men whose special release has been recommended to the War office by the Ministry of Labour before 1st February 1919 and for whom orders of demobilization have been or may be issued by the War office on Army Form Z-56
- (8) All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men whose release on extreme compassionate grounds has been or may be ordered by the War Office on Army Z-56, or whose release on extreme compassionate grounds is approved by General Officers Commanding-in-Chief in accordance with instructions issued to them.
- (9) All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men whose claims to return to their pre-war home or business overseas have been or may be approved by the Officer in charge, Repatriation Records, Winchester, on Army Form Z-6

4 Warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men, who are qualified for demobilization under paragraph 3 may be permitted to volunteer for the Armies of Occupation provided that they are considered generally suitable

The conditions of volunteering are as follows.—

- (a) Those accepted may be called upon to serve in any Corps or Arm of the Service and in any of the Armies of Occupation as defined in paragraph 1, but as far as possible any one volunteering will be posted within his own corps.
- (b) Acting rank will be relinquished.
- (c) The term of enlistment will be for one year

5 *Limitations of leave after 1st February 1919*—All leave except on urgent compassionate grounds will be limited to those who are retained in or who are accepted for the Armies of Occupation.

6 *Financial benefits*—The financial benefits to be paid in connection with this Army Order are contained in the Royal Warrant issued concurrently.

7 *Composition of dispersal drafts*—Instructions regarding the composition of dispersal drafts and the order of priority of industrial groups are issued separately.

SCHEDULE

1 *Definition of military machinery of demobilization*—For the purposes of this Army Order the expression "Military machinery for demobilization" shall include

(1) the following demobilization units overseas —

- (a) Concentration Camp units
- (b) Staging Camp units
- (c) Embarkation Camp units
- (d) Prisoners of War Reception Camp units
- (e) Animal Collecting Camp units
- (f) Animal Dispersal Camp units
- (g) Repatriation Camp units in the United Kingdom
- (h) Dispersal units (with travelling dispersal units affiliated as necessary)
- (i) Disembarkation Camp units
- (j) Military collecting place units
- (k) Dispersal Hospital units
- (l) Repatriation Camp units
- (m) Prisoner of War reception Camp units
- (n) Remount dispersal units

(2) Personnel of Record Offices in the United Kingdom

(3) Personnel of Army Pay Offices overseas and in the United Kingdom

(4) Personnel of 3rd Echelon, General Headquarters, Expeditionary Forces

(5) Demobilization Military Staffs employed at the War Office and at Headquarters of Commands and Formations

(6)

personnel as may be employed in connection with demobilization, in construction or maintaining roads, buildings, or camps or other works

- (7) Such personnel of the Signal Service Royal Engineers as may be employed in connection with demobilization, in constructing maintaining or operating signal communications
- (8) Such personnel of the Army Postal Service, Royal Engineers as may be required in connection with the process of demobilization
- (9) Such personnel of the Transportation Corps, Royal Engineers as may be necessary for transportation duties in connection with demobilization
- (10) Such Royal Army Service Corps personnel, whether of the Supply, Horse Transport or Mechanical Transport branches as may be employed in connection with demobilization on maintenance and transport duties

- (13) Such personnel of the Royal Army Veterinary Corps as may be required in connection with demobilization, in the collection, treatment and disposal of animals in the United Kingdom and overseas
- (14) Personnel of Remount Squadron, Depôts and Companies
- (15) Personnel of the Corps of Military Police employed with formation in the field, or in garrison stations, and demobilization units in the United Kingdom and overseas
- (16) Personnel of the Military Provost Staff Corps employed in Military Prisons in the field and in detention barracks in the United Kingdom and overseas

- (17) Personnel of the Railway Traffic Establishment
- (18) Personnel of Claims Commissions, Standing Committees and Adjustment, Billeting and Quartering Committees
- (19) Such personnel of the Army Printing Stationery Services as may be required in connection with the process of demobilization
- (20) Personnel of Embarkation and Disembarkation Staffs in the United Kingdom and overseas

The Armies of Occupation

Explanatory note by the Secretary of State for War

1 On the 11th November when the Armistice was signed there were about 3,500,000 Imperial British officers and soldiers on the pay and rat on strength of the British Army

During the two months that have passed since then rather more than three quarters of a million have been demobilized or discharged. The system of demobilization which has been adopted aims at reviving national industry by bringing them Home in the order of urgency according to trades.

There is no doubt that this is the wisest course and it will continue to be followed in the large majority of cases. The time has now however, come when military needs must be considered as well as industrial.

2 Unless we are to be defrauded of the fruits of victory, and without considering our Allies to throw away all that we have won with so much cost and trouble, we must provide, for a good many months to come, Armies of Occupation for the enemy's territory.

These armies must be strong enough to exact from the Germans, Turks, and others the just terms which the Allies demand and we must bear our share with France, America and Italy in providing them. The better trained and disciplined these armies are, the fewer men will be needed to do the job. We have therefore to create, in order to wind up the war satisfactorily, a strong, compact, contented and well disciplined army, which will maintain the high reputation of the British Service and make sure we are not tricked of what we have rightfully won. It will be an army far smaller than our present army, in fact it will be about one quarter of the great armies we have been using in the war.

3 Our military commanders who know what Marshal Foch's wishes are, say that in their opinion not more than 900,000 men of all ranks and arms will be sufficient to guard our interests in this transition period, therefore when this new army has been organised, and while it is being organised, over two and a half million men, who were held to military service when the fighting stopped, will be released to their homes and to industry, as fast as the trains and ships can carry them, and the pay officers settle their accounts. In other words out of 3,500,000 it is proposed to keep, for the present, about 900,000, and to release all the others as fast as possible.

4 How ought we to choose the 900,000 who are to remain to finish up the work when men are marked for release? They obviously ought to go home in the order which will most quickly re-start our industries, for otherwise they would leave their means of livelihood in the army or relinquish their rations and their separation allowance only to become unemployed in great numbers. But when men are kept back in the service to form the Armies of Occupation a choice cannot be made simply on trade grounds, it must be made on grounds which appear broadly to a sense of justice and fair play. Length of service, age and wounds must be the main considerations entitling a man to release. The new army will therefore be composed in the first instance only from those who did not enlist before the first of January 1916, who are not over 37 years of age, and who have not more than two wound stripes. If anyone has to stay it must be those other than those who come the earliest or those who have suffered the most.

5 We therefore take these broad rules as our main guide. According to the best calculations which are possible they should give us about one million three hundred thousand men out of which it is intended to form the army of 900,000. If we find, as we shall do in all probability, that we have in the classes chosen more men than we actually require, after dealing with a certain number of pivotal and compassionate cases, we shall proceed to reduce down to the figure of 900,000, first by reducing the age of retention from 36 to 35, next releasing the men with two wound stripes, and then on to 34. As the time

age. When, however, the results of war are finally achieved, the divisions, which have remained to the end will be brought Home as units and make their entry into the principal cities of Great Britain with which they are territorially associated. Volunteers for one year's service at a time for the Armies of Occupation will be

accepted from men who would otherwise be entitled to release, if they are physically fit and otherwise suitable, and young soldiers now serving will be sent from Home to take their turn and do their share. All these will be in relief of the older men; they will enable the age-limit to be further reduced, and the older men to be sent Home in particular. The 69 battalions of young soldiers of 18 years of age and upwards, who are now at Home, will be sent at once to help guard the Rhine bridgeheads; they will thus enable an equal number of men, old enough to be their fathers, to come Home and they themselves will have a chance to see the German provinces which are now in our keeping, and the battlefields where the British Army won immortal fame. The new Armies of Occupation will begin forming from 1st February and it is hoped that in 3 months they may be completely organised. There will then be two classes of men in khaki, *viz.*, those who form the Armies of Occupation and those who are to be demobilized. Everything possible will be done to send Home or disperse the 2½ million men who are no longer required, but they must wait their turn patiently and meanwhile do their duty in an exemplary manner. Any of these men, who are marked for Home, who are guilty of any form of insubordination, will, apart from any other punishment, be put back to the bottom of the list. There are no means of getting these great numbers of men Home quickly unless everyone does his duty in the strictest possible way. It is recognised, however, that service in the Armies of Occupation is an extra demand which the State makes in its need upon certain classes of its citizens. The emoluments of the Armies of Occupation will, therefore, be substantially augmented, and every man will draw bonuses from the date of his posting to these armies with arrears from 1st February. The bonuses will be as follows:—

Private soldier, 10s 6d. per week.

Paid Lance-Corporal, Corporal, 12s. 6d. per week.

Serjeant, 14s. per week.

Colour-Serjeants, Company Serjeant Majors, Company Quartermaster-Serjeants, and Quartermaster Serjeants, 17s 6d. per week.

Warrant officers, Class I, 21s. per week.

2nd-Lieutenants, 24s. 6d. per week.

Lieutenants, 28s. per week.

Captains, 31s. 6d. per week.

Majors, 35s. per week.

Lieutenant-Colonels, 38s. 6d. per week.

Higher ranks, 42s. per week.

The graduated bonuses will be paid as a special addition to the pay of the army during the period of occupation in recognition.

8 Leave will be granted to men of the Armies of Occupation, Home and overseas garrisons on as generous a scale as possible

No leave will be given to men marked for Home, and waiting their turn for demobilization, as it is desirable that all the facilities should be concentrated for the benefit of those who have to stay (except in cases of special urgency)

9 The Armies of Occupation will be as follows —

Home Army, Army of the Rhine, Army of the Middle East, Detachment of the Far North, Garrisons of the Crown Colonies, and India. These forces will be varied as circumstances may require but no young soldier under 20 will serve elsewhere than at Home or in the Army of the Rhine

10 Besides the men of the classes mentioned who will be held to form the Armies of Occupation, and the Home and overseas garrisons (who include the regular army and such special reserve and Territorial Force officers and men as must be retained), they are a certain number of special services on the lines of communication, at the bases, and here at Home, in which all men must be retained whatever their class, because, like the railway men, the necessary Royal Army Service Corps units, and the Pay and Record Office staff, they are vitally necessary for demobilizing and paying off all the others. These, not exceeding the numbers required, will therefore be needed to be included in the Armies of Occupation as indispensable and will participate in the increased rates of pay. They will, however, be demobilized as soon as the great bulk of the 2½ million men who are to be dispersed have passed through their agencies back into civil life

At the rate at which demobilization is now proceeding, 11,000 a day, this should not take many weeks

11 There remains the British in India. Many of the Territorial and Garrison battalions who left England in the autumn of 1914 to guard our Indian Empire or our overseas possessions have served four hot weathers in the East without either relief or the excitement of battle. Up to the present, hardly any volunteers have come forward to take their places, or those of the Home garrisons as part of the permanent after war army of the British Empire. It is therefore necessary while this "after-war" or "old British Army" is being reconstituted, that these men should remain abroad for another hot season

It is felt that in all the circumstances they ought to participate in the bonuses which apply to the Armies of Occupation

13 It is not necessary at this stage to settle the conditions on which the national Home Defence Army for after the war will be formed. There are many more urgent problems which should be solved first.

14 The entire scheme of the War Office for dealing with the many difficulties of the present situation and for safeguarding British interests is thus published to the army and the nation at large. It has been agreed upon between all the authorities and departments concerned. The consent of Parliament, where necessary, will be asked for at the earliest possible moment. It remains for all ranks and all classes to work together with the utmost comradeship and energy to put it into force, and thereby to safeguard the best interest of each one of us and the final victory of our cause.

Extra remuneration for those retained in military service

With reference to Army Instructions (India) Nos 121 and 166, dated respectively 11th February and 4th March 1919, it has been decided to extend the extra remuneration referred to therein to British officers of the Indian Army and Indian Army Reserve, officers of the Indian Medical Service in military employ and to all ranks of the India Unattached List. The extra remuneration will be given subject to conditions similar to those for the British Service.

Extra remuneration for those retained in military service.

With reference to Army Instruction (India) No 121 dated 11th February 1919, all officers warrant officers non commissioned officers and men serving in India including those otherwise eligible for demobilization, are liable to be retained for military service until they can be relieved. Officers and other ranks who are not otherwise eligible for demobilization under the terms of Army Order XIV, dated the 29th January 1919 will receive the full bonus as from 1st February 1919.

In the case of India and garrisons east of Suez such officers and other ranks as will be eligible for demobilization if not forming part of an overseas garrison and are not required for garrison purposes pending relief, as far as possible will be relieved during the present trooping season which extends approximately up to the end of May. Arrangements are being made for the selection of officers and other ranks for return to the United Kingdom during the present trooping season within certain fixed limits, those selected will be warned of their selection. Such

APPENDIX

Copy of Finance Department letter No 752 C. S. R., dated the 16th July 1919

I am directed to invite a reference to the rule contained in Article 15 of the Rules of 1919, which provides that an increment is withheld, and that the authority is to decide both for what period and whether it is or is not to have the effect of similarly postponing future increments. It has been brought to the notice of the Government of India that this procedure is not always strictly observed, and that in some cases orders to withhold have in consequence, been interpreted as automatically postponing all future increments, though it probably had not been the intention of the withholding authority to inflict so severe a penalty.

In order to guard against undue hardship the Government of India have accordingly decided to lay down a general principle for the guidance of audit and other officers who have to interpret such orders, and the opportunity has also been taken to lay down a similar principle of interpretation in the case of increments granted in advance.

2. As the postponement of all future increments is a very severe cumulative penalty, the Government of India have decided that when the authority passing orders to withhold an increment fails to specify clearly for what period the officer is to be deprived of his increments the deprivation should be held to cease on the expiry of the period during which the officer would have drawn the increment withheld. For example if on the 1st July 1919 an officer already drawing a pay of Rs 110 in a grade of Rs 100—10—150 and in ordinary course entitled to an increment of Rs 10 on the 1st July each year, is punished by refusal of the next increment to which he would otherwise have been entitled on that date, he will in the absence of special orders to the contrary, be entitled on the 1st July 1920 to draw Rs 130 and not Rs 120 only.

and, in the absence of special orders to the contrary, he should be placed on exactly the same footing as regards future increments as an officer who has so risen.

Similarly, if these officers draw British pay while on leave, their children's allowance should be re-adjusted for the time being on the rank basis laid down in Army Instruction (India) No 510 of 1918.

3 With reference to paragraph 10, Army Instruction (India) No 1340 of 1918, it has been decided that an officer in receipt of unemployed pay at sterling or rupee leave rates shall receive children's allowance on the salary basis laid down in Army Instruction (India) No 1340 of 1918. An officer on temporary half pay

at a sterling daily rate shall receive children's allowance on the rank basis laid down in Army Instruction (India) No 510* of 1918.

Children's allowance to officers of the British Service in receipt of Indian rates of pay.

Allowance for officers' children.

With the approval of the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of State for India, it has been decided that, with effect from the 1st October 1917,

British Service in receipt of Indian rates of pay as Captain,* Lieutenant, or 2nd-Lieutenant, at the rate of £2 per mensem for each son under the age of 18, and each unmarried daughter under the age of 21, up to a maximum of £8 per mensem for each officer. An allowance of £1 per mensem for each child will be issuable under the same conditions to regimental officers of the British Service in receipt of Indian rates of pay as Captain when in receipt of command allowance

2 Regimental honorary commissioned officers will receive the higher rate of allowance, i.e. £2 in respect of each child, up to a maximum of £8 per mensem, irrespective of rank.

3 Payment will be limited to legitimate children and step-children, together with any other children of officers having served in the ranks who under the rules applicable to soldiers' children were then eligible for separation allowance.

Claims on account of children adopted prior to the 1st October 1917, and not provided for above, should be forwarded to the local Controller of Military Accounts for submission to the Government of India.

Claims on account of children adopted between the 1st October 1917 and the date of this Instruction may also be put forward for special consideration.

4 An officer with more than four eligible children will be entitled to claim the allowance for any four of his children who are eligible.

5 In any case where a compassionate allowance from public funds is being issued in respect of a step-child or of an adopted child for whom children's allowance is granted the total payment from public funds will not exceed the maximum issuable under the regulations for either the compassionate allowance or the children's allowance, whichever is the greater. Officers will be required to furnish information as to any such compassionate allowances issuable for children in respect of whom claims are submitted for an allowance under these regulations.

6 Payments will be made until children attain the age of 18 in the case of sons and 21 in the case of daughters, if the

Royal Naval Colleges at Dartmouth and Osborne, except in those cases in which no payments are required from the parent

7 Where mental or physical infirmity which prevents a son or daughter from earning his or her own living *exists before reaching the age limit* referred to in paragraph (6), and is of a permanent nature, children's allowance will be issuable irrespective of the foregoing age limit. The rules for such cases will follow generally except as regards the age limit, those laid down in paragraph 49 of the Separation Allowance Regulations. Application for the grant of the allowance beyond the usual age limits will be forwarded to the local Controller of Military Accounts for submission to the Government of India. The issue of the grant will be subject to verification of the circumstances and to the rendering of periodical certificates.

8 Payment will be made by the Controller of Military Accounts from whom officers draw their pay unless the officers otherwise direct. The allowance will be issuable monthly with the officer's pay for the month, and will be subject, so far as recoveries, taxation and other general conditions are concerned to the rules in force as regards pay in so far as they are applicable.

9 Rank for the purpose of determining to what rate of children's allowance (if any) the officer is entitled, will in all cases be the rank whether substantive, temporary or acting, of which the pay is drawn for the period in question.

10 Children's allowance will continue to be issuable for officers transferred in future to half-pay so long as they remain on the active list. The allowance will be issued by the Agents by whom full pay was last issued. Officers of the active list now and stationed at the time of their applications to the Agents from whom they last drew full pay

11 Original applications for the grant of the allowance authorised by this Instruction will be made on Army Form W-3697 or W-3698 (modified for India) in accordance with paragraphs (12) and (13). The necessary forms will shortly be obtainable from Contractors for printing Government of India forms (through the Superintendent of Government Printing, India, Calcutta). If the officer is serving in India the application form must be signed by himself. For an officer serving abroad, or who is a prisoner of war, the application form may be signed by his wife or other person authorized by him to act on his behalf.

It has been decided that all whole time members of civil establishments employed under the Army Department shall receive the same concessions which have been sanctioned by Local Governments and Administrations in the same areas for their own establishments on account of the increased cost of living caused by the war subject to the following conditions —

- (i) The temporary increases of pay sanctioned by Local Governments and Administrations will not apply to individuals who have been enrolled, attested or enlisted on special terms, or engaged on terms embodied in specific contracts
- (ii) The allowances now sanctioned will absorb, or be in replacement of, any local allowances previously sanctioned for the same purpose during the period of the war, and will continue in force only for so long as the orders of the Local Governments and Administrations hold good
- (iii) The allowances will not be drawn by men on daily or nerrick rates of pay or by men in receipt of field service concessions

APPENDIX 1 (See R. A. F. I. (I) 4).**ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 550 OF 1919**

- (1) Provision of permanent headstones over the graves of British soldiers and members of the nursing services dying in India and Aden during the War.
- (2) Supply of photographs of such graves to the next-of-kin of the deceased.

Sanction is accorded to the erection, at a cost not exceeding Rs 80 in each case, of permanent headstones over the graves of British officers and other who have died or will present European war, marking of such graves at private expense is made by the relatives or friends of the deceased

2 The design and dimensions of the headstones to be erected are shown in the drawings which will be issued to all concerned as soon as possible. The headstones will be of marble or stone, and the name, full particulars of the regiment, department or service, and date of death of the deceased will be cut on the headstones, care being taken to ensure that these details are absolutely correct. Any one of the four authorised designs may be chosen.

3 In cases where a regiment has already erected a particular type of headstone the regiment in any other desired, be erected in that the regiment is with the sum of Rs 80 per

4 Sanction is also accorded to the supply to the next of-kin of each British officer, soldier and member of the nursing services who has died, or who may die in India or Aden during the present European war, of a photograph of the grave of the deceased at a cost not exceeding Rs 2 in each case, whether the grave is provided with a headstone under this Instruction or under private arrangements.

5 General Officers Commanding Divisions and Independent Brigades will be responsible that the headstones authorised by this Instruction are erected over all graves mentioned in paragraph 1 above which are situated within their respective commands, and also that the photographs mentioned in the preceding paragraph are taken and sent to the next-of-kin.

6 A report that this has been done will be made in each case to the Adjutant General in India for record.

7. Orders will be issued subsequently as to the head to which the expenditure will be debited.

No 962 of 1919.

Refund of the cost of permanent headstones erected under private arrangements before the 1st July 1919 over the graves of British soldiers and members of the nursing services who died in India and Aden during the war.

With reference to Army Instruction (India) No 550 of 1919, it has been decided that where a permanent headstone had been, or was in course of being, erected, under private arrangements, before the 1st July 1919, over the grave of a British officer, or other rank, or member of the nursing services, who died in India or Aden during the European war, a refund of the cost not exceeding the sum of Rs 80, sanctioned under that Instruction, may be paid to the person or persons who bore the cost of erecting the headstone.

2. Such refunds will be claimed on India Army Form A-115 supported by a certificate signed by the Officer Commanding the unit, depot or department to which the deceased belonged at the time of death, that a permanent headstone has been properly erected, under private arrangements, and is correctly inscribed.

3 It has also been decided, with reference to paragraph 7 of the Instruction referred to above, that the expenditure incurred under orders shall be provisionally debited to the Indian Government.

APPENDIX 2 (See R A F I (I) 7)

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) NO 1076, DATED 17TH SEPTEMBER 1918

Travelling and detention allowances for officers travelling on duty by aeroplane.

It has been decided that the rule in paragraph 29-A, Army Regulations, India, Volume X, shall be extended to journeys performed by aeroplane, and the necessary amendments to the regulations will be published in due course as an appendix to India Army Orders

2 It has also been decided that detention allowance at the rate of Rs 3 per diem shall be granted to officers travelling by aeroplane under the following conditions —

- (1) The allowance will be admissible only in cases of journeys (and halts during such journeys) performed by aeroplane in respect of which no travelling allowances are drawn other than the actual cost of conveying servants and baggage
- (2) The allowance will only be granted in respect of each night of absence of an officer from his permanent station
- (3) The ten days' halt rule* will apply to cases where an officer remains at an outstation and flies over the surrounding country, returning to the same outstation each night

* *vide* definition of "Detention Allowance" in Army Regulations India, Volume I
- (4) The allowance will not be admissible while an officer is on manœuvres with his unit

APPENDIX 3 (See R. A. F. I. (I.) 8).

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No. 199 OF 1918.

Hire charges on account of tentage drawn from arsenals for the accommodation of officers temporarily attached to units.

It has been decided that when tents are drawn and retained in regimental charge for the use of officers, owing to the deficiency of bungalow accommodation, hire shall be payable for the period of actual occupation only. It should be understood that undue delay must not occur in returning tents to arsenal charge when it is clear that their continued retention is unnecessary.

APPENDIX 4 (See R. A. I. I. (I) 9).**[ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 851 of 1919]****Dental treatment of followers on field service.**

It has been decided, as a temporary measure, that followers on field service shall receive free dental treatment to such an extent as will prevent their evacuation, as unfit, from the field. They will not, however, be provided with dentures at the expense of the State.

2 The incidence of the expenditure involved will follow that of the operations on which the men are engaged.

3 The above decision will have retrospective effect from the commencement of the operations on the North-West Frontier.

APPENDIX 5 (Sec R. A. F. I (I) 10)

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 50 of 1919

Children's allowance for officers of the Indian Army, Indian Medical Service, Indian Army Reserve of Officers and staff and departmental officers (including those with honorary rank.)

The following amendments are made to Army Instruction (India) No 1340 of 1918 —

In paragraph 9, lines 2 and 3, *expunge* the words "unless the officers otherwise direct," and *add* the following at the end of the paragraph —

"In the case of officers on field service overseas, the amounts can be paid at home together with the family allotments, in *all* other cases officers who wish to make remittances to their families in England must make their own arrangements for doing so"

In paragraph 14 line 8, *for* the words "the officer's pay before he was commissioned" *substitute* "such children's separation allowance"

APPENDIX 6 (See R. A. F. I. (I) 11)**ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 797 OF 1919****Family allotments of officers and other ranks serving with the North-West Frontier and Baluchistan Forces**

In continuation of Army Instruction (India) No 522 of 1919 and in supersession of clause (C) IV thereof, it has been decided that the concession for the payment of family allotments through the public accounts, granted to officers and other ranks serving with the Expeditionary Forces overseas, shall be extended to all officers and other ranks (British and Indian) and to followers and establishments serving with the North West Frontier and Baluchistan Forces

2 As regards British personnel, such family allotments whether payable in India or in England, will be arranged by the Divisional Disbursing Officer or other Accounts Officer who disburses the individual's pay in India

3 As regards Indian personnel, family allotments will be paid by the Officer Commanding the depot or by the departmental officer concerned

4 When the North West Frontier and Baluchistan Forces cease to exist as such, the above concessions will be admissible to all British and Indian personnel so long as they are detained on the North-West Frontier under field service conditions

APPENDIX 7 (See R A F. I (I) 13)**ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 227 of 1910**

Method of securing relief due to officers under the Home Income Tax Acts

— Army Council Instruction No 33 of 1919, regarding the procedure necessary to secure relief under the Home Income Tax Acts, is reproduced as an Appendix to these Instructions for the information and guidance of officers concerned, with reference to Army Instruction (India) No 1463 of 1918

ARMY COUNCIL INSTRUCTION No 33 of 1919**Income Tax**

1 With reference to A C I 342 of 1918, officers are reminded of the necessity of furnishing a return of their income on A F O 1656 (or 1656A at foreign stations) in order to secure all the relief that may be due to them under the Income Tax Act. This is especially necessary for the year in which officers may receive a gratuity on demobilization or cessation of employment.

2 Forms of claim can be obtained from the Agents or Paymaster

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 1463 of 1918

Instructions regarding the deduction of British income-tax from the pay of officers

Army Council Instruction No 342 of 1918, regarding the deduction of British income-tax from the pay of officers, is republished as an appendix to this Instruction, for information with reference to Army Instructions (India) Nos 302 and 899 of 1918

ARMY COUNCIL INSTRUCTION No 342 of 1918**Income-tax on Army Pay.**

1 Army pay is legally taxable on issue, but under present conditions, owing to uncertainty as to the annual total of an officer's taxable emoluments and to the complications of the scale of tax, it has proved impossible in very many cases to assess the tax correctly in advance

2 To minimize correspondence and inconvenience to officers, a new scheme will take effect from 1st April 1918 under which *provisional* assessments will be made at the beginning of each year on the information available as to an officer's *net* liability (i.e., after allowing for abatements and relief on unearned income, such as taxed dividends etc.), and recovery will be spread over the twelve months of the year by as nearly as possible equal instalments

3 The instalments as fixed at the beginning of the year, will require revision if the rate of pay is materially altered, and especially if the alteration brings the income into a category involving a different rate of tax, but otherwise one final revision will take place after the end of the year

4 The monthly instalments will rarely total to the exact amount of tax payable, which can be determined only when the accounts for the fiscal year are complete. The exact liability of every officer will be determined as soon as possible after the end of the year. Agents and Paymasters will then be instructed to adjust the assessment by retaining any tax that may be due to an officer, or recovering any tax that may be due to the Revenue

5 The proposed system will not only secure the tax due, with the least possible inconvenience to the officers concerned, but will also secure to them, by a set off against the tax on Army Pay, any relief due in respect of unearned income. To this end it is necessary that they should render an annual return of income early in the fiscal year, without which Paymasters and Agents will be unable to calculate correctly the relief allowable. Forms of claim (A 1 O 1656) can be obtained from Army Agents or Paymasters

6 The monthly deduction will bear no immediate relation, so far as the *rate* of tax is concerned, to the amount of pay from which it is deducted and enquiries as to the *rate* of tax charged in any particular month will be unnecessary

7 Officers joining the Army or resuming duty from Retired Pay during the year should immediately send a return of income to the Agents or Paymaster to inform them to what official *and from what address* a return has already been made. Provisional deductions of tax will be made until receipt of such return when the amount of the monthly deduction will be fixed with reference to the final liability, as far as it can then be determined

8 In cases where the relief due on unearned income exceeds the amount of tax chargeable on pay, no tax will be deducted from the latter and the balance of any relief allowable, and not already allowed from income assessed locally will be refunded through the Army Agents or Paymasters as soon as the total pay is

APPENDIX 9 (See R. A. T. I. (I.) 15).**ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No. 74 OF 1920.****Rate of exchange for purposes of claims against Colonial Administrations.**

With reference to Army Instruction (India) No. 913 of 1919, it has been decided that, for the purposes of claims against Colonial Administrations, the rate of exchange will be as follows :—

- (1) In respect of remittance of funds—
 - (a) 2s 2d to the rupee with effect from the 25th November 1919 to the 15th December 1919, inclusive ;
 - (b) 2s 1d to the rupee with effect from the 16th December 1919 and until further orders
- (2) In respect of other transactions—
 - (a) 2s 2d to the rupee for those brought to account in Indian Schedules for December 1919.
 - (b) 2s 4d. to the rupee for those brought to account in Indian Schedules for January 1920 and onwards.

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No. 913 OF 1919.**Rate of exchange for purposes of claims against Colonial Administrations.**

With reference to Army Instruction India No 775 of 1919, it has been decided that, for purposes of claims against Colonial Administrations, the rate of exchange of 2s. to the rupee will be applicable :—

- (a) in respect of remittances of funds with effect from the 16th September 1919,
- (b) in respect of other transactions brought to account in the Indian Schedules for October 1919 and onwards.

APPENDIX 10 (See R A F I (I) 16)**ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 71 of 1920****Rate of conversion of sterling war gratuity for British officers and British other ranks.**

With reference to Army Instruction (India) No 1034 of 1919, it has been decided by the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of State for India to limit the concession of converting sterling war gratuity at 1s 4d to the rupee to officers and other ranks serving in India or Mesopotamia on the 4th August 1919

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 1034 of 1919**Rate of conversion of sterling war gratuities for British officers and British other ranks**

It has been decided by the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of State for India that sterling war gratuities of British officers and British other ranks shall be converted at the rate of 1s 4d to the rupee

2 Any readjustment that may be necessary in the case of gratuities which have been paid to officers or to estates in England, will be arranged by the India Office

3 In the case of other British officers and estates, the necessary readjustment should be made by the Accounts Officers concerned

APPENDIX 11 (See R A T I (I) 17)

(a) Walls to be 18 ft high from floor to top of wall plate

(b) Verandahs to be 10 ft wide in the clear excepting those of hospital wards in which they should be 12 ft wide. Front verandahs of married quarters to remain 12 ft wide as at present.

(c) Verandah openings to be screened to exclude sun's rays by louveres or otherwise, down to a height of 7 ft from the edge of the verandah floor

(d) Walls are only to be 1½ ft thick but the main walls above verandahs are to be shaded from the direct rays of the sun, when the latter is at an elevation of about 30 degrees by a shade roof on brackets. This roof can be an extension of the main roof, *i.e.*, extended eaves in case of tiled roofing

(e) Main roofs in single men's barracks, married quarters, messes, dining halls and institutes to have

(i) double tiles, with ceilings, or

(ii) flat roofs with a total thickness of not less than 9 inches, preferably divided into two thicknesses with an air space

(f) Verandah roofs should preferably be flat with a thickness of not less than 6 inches. If the verandah roof is sloping, double tiling should be used

(g) Buildings are to be sited as far as possible with long walls facing north and south

Continuance of separation allowance to wives of British soldiers for the period during which they may be temporarily employed in Government service.

It has been decided that separation allowance admissible under rule to the wives of British soldiers may be continued to the wives for the period during which they may be temporarily employed in Government service while unavoidably separated, provided that they do not receive free quarters or house rent in addition to salary

APPENDIX 14 (See R. A. F I (I.) 20).

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 538 of 1919.

Pay admissible to a soldier while in debt.

The following is substituted for Army Instruction (India) No. 783 of 1918:—

Paragraph 203 (~~111~~), Army Regulations, India, Volume III, is hereby cancelled. Deductions from the pay of soldiers who are in debt will be regulated by paragraph 58 (e) of that Volume, under which they will receive two-thirds of their pay and allowances after deducting the usual regimental charges.

APPENDIX 15 (See R A I I (I) 21)

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 80 OF 1920

Rate of exchange between the United Kingdom and India for Army remittances, etc.

With reference to Army Instruction (India) No 19 of 1920, it is notified that the rate of exchange for remittances between the United Kingdom and India through the agency of Government has been raised to 2s 2d to the rupee with effect from the 16th December 1919. This rate will be applicable to payments in the United Kingdom on account of remittances included in rolls which left India on or after that date.

2. Allotments paid in the United Kingdom from pay earned for December 1919 and payable on or after 1st January 1920, and all occasional allotments on account of accumulated balances of pay advised to the United Kingdom by roll or by telegram after the 1st January 1920 will be adjusted in India at the same rate.

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 19 OF 1920

Rate of exchange between the United Kingdom and India for Army remittances, etc.

With reference to Army Instruction (India) No 912 of 1919, it is notified that the rate of exchange for remittances between the United Kingdom and India through the agency of Government has been raised to 2s 2d to the rupee with effect from the 25th November 1919. This rate will be applicable to payments in the United Kingdom on account of remittances included in rolls which left India on or after the 25th November 1919.

2. Allotments paid in the United Kingdom from pay earned for November 1919 and payable on or after the 1st December 1919, and all occasional allotments on account of accumulated balances of pay advised to the United Kingdom by roll or by telegram after the 1st December 1919, will be adjusted in India at the same rate.

APPENDIX 16 (See R. A. F. I. (I.) 22).

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No. 306 OF 1919.

Extra remuneration for those retained in military service.

It has been decided, with the approval of the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of State for India, that the extra remuneration sanctioned* for those retained in military service, shall be admissible when on leave in or out of India to all British officers and British other ranks of the British and Indian Services who are eligible for this concession.

APPENDIX 17 (See R. A. F. I. (I) 23).

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No. 491 of 1919.

Procedure to be adopted for the adjustment of expenditure in connection with the present military operations on and beyond the North-West Frontier.

It has been decided that all extra $\frac{\text{expenditure}}{\text{receipts}}$ in connection with the military operations in progress on and beyond the North-West Frontier shall be adjusted in the books of the Controller of War Accounts under a sub-head "North-West Frontier, 1919," which will be opened under the head "War--India" under Grant $\frac{14}{XIV}$ of the Army Estimates. All extra $\frac{\text{expenditure}}{\text{receipts}}$ in the Military, Civil, Railway, and in the Military after audit to the Cc

2. All expenditure in connection with measures which were sanctioned for the protection of the North-West Frontier, before the commencement of hostilities with Afghanistan will continue to be adjusted under the existing sub-head, *i.e.*, "North-West Frontier, 1916."

APPENDIX 18 (See R A F I (I) 25)

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 90 OF 1920

Rate of exchange to be adopted for the purpose of the conversion of the extra remuneration authorised for those officers and other British ranks retained in Military service after the 1st February 1919.

For the purposes of clauses (1) (b) and (1) (c) of Army Instruction (India) No 18 of 1920, the following rates should be adopted as the official remittance rate in force from time to time —

- (1) 18*d* for bonus earned up to the 12th May 1919
- (2) 20*d* for bonus earned from the 13th May to the 11th August 1919
- (3) 22*d* for bonus earned from the 12th August to the 15th September 1919
- (4) 24*d* for bonus earned from the 16th to the 24th November 1919
- (5) 26*d* for bonus earned from the 25th November to the 15th December 1919
- (6) 28*d* for bonus earned from the 16th December 1919 and until further orders

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No. 18 OF 1920

Rate of exchange to be adopted for the purpose of the conversion of the extra remuneration authorised for those officers and other British ranks retained in Military service after the 1st February 1919

With reference to the Army Instructions (India) of 1919 Nos 306, 336, 367, 518, 546, 691, 709, 716, 827 and 843, originally cited, regarding the extra remuneration for officers and other British ranks retained in military service after the 1st February 1919, it has been decided that the rate of exchange to be adopted for the purpose of the conversion of this extra remuneration of those serving on the Indian establishment, shall be as follows —

(1) *Officers on rupee rates of pay—*

- (a) Officers who draw children's allowance in rupees shall have the whole of the bonus converted into rupees at the fixed rate of 1*s* 6*d* from the date of the grant of the bonus, viz, the 1st February 1919

- (b) Other married officers, wherever serving, *whose wives are in India*, shall have *half* their bonus converted at the rate of 1s 6d to the rupee with effect from the 1st February 1919, and the other half at the official (or remittance) rate from time to time in force
- (c) All other officers shall continue, as heretofore, to have their *whole* bonus converted at the official (or remittance) rate from time to time in force

(2) *Officers on sterling rates of pay* —The bonus of these officers shall be paid at the ordinary sterling rates

(3) In the case of *British troops other than officers*, the bonus shall be issued at 1s. 4d. to the rupee, so long as this rate is applicable to the conversion of their pay.

APPENDIX 19 (See R A F I (I) 26)

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 65 OF 1920.

Procedure to be adopted when the Military Accounts Department are not satisfied regarding the action taken on cases of financial irregularity which have been brought to the notice of the authorities concerned.

The Comptroller and Auditor General has represented that disciplinary interval and the bringing of the same, through his Audit and Appropriation Report, to the notice of the Administrative Departments which finally dispose of such irregularities in accordance with the orders contained

*Reproduced as an Appendix to this Instruction in Government of India, Finance Department, Office Memorandum No 476-A, dated the 18th May 1914 *

2 It has therefore been decided that Accounts Officers should, in future, report immediately to the Government of India, Army Department, all cases in which they are not satisfied with the action taken by the authorities concerned on financial irregularities brought to their notice

3 The orders of the Government of India on such cases will in due course be communicated to the Administrative and Accounts officers concerned

4 The Comptroller and Auditor General will, however, at his discretion include in his Audit and Appropriation Report any case which has been dealt with in accordance with the above procedure

Procedure to be adopted when instances of financial irregularities are brought to notice.

Office memorandum No 476-A, dated the 18th May 1914, from the Government of India, Finance Department

The undersigned is directed to invite a reference to paragraphs 3, 5 and 10 of the Resolution in the Finance Department, No 2534 F, dated the 18th April 1912, on the subject of financial irregularities brought to notice by the Comptroller and Auditor General in his annual Appropriation Report on the accounts of the Government of India

2 Though the form and subject-matter of this report have been carefully prescribed, no procedure has yet been laid down for dealing with the matters which are thereby brought to notice. Considerable delay thus occurs in initiating the enquiries which any reported irregularities may demand, and there is also some uncertainty as to how any cases which are thus opened can be finally and satisfactorily closed. The responsible and efficient disposal of these reports has now become a matter of special importance in view of instructions, recently received from the Secretary of State, that the Auditor General shall in future submit his annual Appropriation Report direct to the Secretary of State himself. The Finance Department is of opinion that it will be a convenience if some detailed procedure can be generally adopted, and considers that this procedure should be as follows

3 It is desirable, in the first place, that, in order to save delay, the Administrative Department concerned should at once institute enquiry into all individual cases of irregularity occurring in a department under its direct control, which are brought to special notice in the Appropriation Report, without waiting for a request to that effect from the Finance Department. Though the officers concerned will probably not have been mentioned by name or by an im-

tion of
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Secondly, the Finance Department considers that the Administrative Department, having obtained the explanation of the officer concerned and having otherwise completed its enquiry, should record a finding and take such action, in the event of the explanations received not being wholly satisfactory, as may be fitted to the circumstances of the case. This may include disciplinary or other action in regard to the officers particularly concerned, and also in some instances, the issue of general instructions designed to prevent misunderstanding or misconduct in such matters in future, or suggestions for the amendment of existing rules, and so forth. It is particularly desirable that a copy of the Department's finding and a full statement of the action taken should be communicated to the Auditor General for his information. The Auditor General possesses the discretionary

should not be given for a renewal of complaints in this manner. The Finance Department trusts therefore that the Administrative

Departments will readily accept the necessity of supplying full information to the Auditor General in the first instance, with a view to removing all avoidable misunderstanding and friction

5 On receiving such a communication the Auditor General will intimate definitely to the Department concerned whether he is prepared to accept the matter as closed, or whether he intends to pursue it. In the event of the Auditor General remaining unsatisfied with the action taken, the undersigned is to request that the Department will report the facts to the Finance Department with a view to its considering what further action, if any, to take. This is required to enable it to report on the case eventually to the Secretary of State should that become necessary. The Auditor General will also himself inform the Finance Department from time to time as to the extent to which the questions raised in his report have been finally disposed of, and as to those matters on which a difference of opinion between himself and the Administrative Departments is still outstanding.

6 It will be seen that the foregoing paragraphs contemplate direct references between the Administrative Department concerned and the Auditor General in all cases, until the stage mentioned in the first sentence of paragraph 5 above is reached. It is believed that this will be most convenient to the Departments themselves and will conduce to the rapid disposal of outstanding points.

7 In conclusion the undersigned is to suggest that action be taken forthwith with a view to the early disposal of any matters arising out of the Appropriation Report for 1912-13 in which the Army Department may find itself concerned,

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 1395 OF 1918

Change of system of accounting for British units serving in India and Burma

1 With effect from the 30th November 1918 the accounts of all British warrant officers, non commissioned officers and men of British units serving in India and Burma borne on regimental pay lists will be prepared by the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer at a Fixed Centre situated at Poona, under the control of the Field Controller of Military Accounts, Poona

Any appeal from a decision of the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer will be submitted to the Field Controller of Military Accounts, Poona

British warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of British units attached to Indian units and departments or extra regimentally employed, who may be in receipt either of consolidated pay or regimental pay and allowances and extra duty pay and for whom pay is being drawn and paid in full through the pay bill of the establishment with which they are employed, will continue to be so paid. A statement of the pay drawn on their account will however be sent before the 6th of each month by the Divisional Disbursing Officers or the Controller of Military Supply Accounts or the officer by whom paid, to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer, Poona, for record on a Soldier's Loose Leaf Ledger which will be maintained in the Fixed Centre Office. The last pay certificates of such soldiers who are transferred Home without reversion to their units, together with a statement of their accounts for the month in which they are transferred, should be sent immediately through the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer, Poona, who will complete the Soldier's Loose Leaf Ledger and despatch it, together with the last pay certificate to the Regimental Paymaster concerned, in England. When such soldiers are reverted to their regiments last pay certificates for them will be issued immediately to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer

In the case of soldiers extra regimentally employed, whose regimental pay is drawn at present through the pay list of their units but whose extra duty pay is drawn and paid monthly in full in the pay bill of the establishments with which they are employed, extra duty pay will continue to be drawn and paid by Divisional Disbursing Officers or the Controller of Military Supply Accounts, etc, as at present.

Fixed Centre Disbursing Office As soon as it is known that extra duty pay ceases to be admissible to a soldier, a statement for the portion of the month during which extra duty pay was drawn will be forwarded to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer

NOTE I—British personnel of Sapper and Miner units and the Educational establishments of British units will continue to be paid as at present by Divisional Disbursing Officers

British personnel of Signal units will be paid by the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer

NOTE II—When soldiers retained on the present system of payment revert to their units last pay certificates will be forwarded immediately to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer Poona

2 The instructions for the payment of British troops serving in India issued with India Army Order No 223, dated the 17th April 1916, will remain operative excepting so far as they are modified by this Instruction

3 All cash required for the payment of troops will be obtained as hitherto, from the Divisional Disbursing Officer of the area in which the unit is situated, and the Divisional Disbursing Officer will notify to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer, Poona, the amounts so issued

4 Payments made to British soldiers in India and Burma except in the case of soldiers on leave from an Expeditionary Force, will be recorded in a Pay and Mess Book, India Army Form A -J, which, with effect from the period ending the 27th December 1918, will be rendered in duplicate to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer, Poona, for the period from the 30th November to the 27th December 1918, and for all subsequent monthly account periods on or before the Monday following the last Friday in each month. The entries in the Pay and Mess Book will be arranged in strict alphabetical order irrespective of rank. One copy will be returned to the unit for retention by the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer, after he has recorded therein any necessary amendments of pay and also the balance of each soldier at the end of the account period

Such of the British troops referred to in India Army Order No 145 of the 12th February 1917 as are borne on the strength of a unit and Reserve Battalions and Reserve Pay and Mess Book with effect

Paragraphs 1, 3 and 6 of India Army Order No 145 of the 12th February 1917 are cancelled accordingly

All Commanding Officers, including those in command of attached sections and sanitaria in the case of men on leave for

Expeditionary Forces who are not maintaining a Pay and Mess Book at present, will conform to this Instruction with effect from the 1st December 1918

All regimental warrant officers, non commissioned officers and men absent from their own units, whether on leave or detached duty (other than those paid by Divisional Disbursing Officers through establishment bills *vide* paragraph 1 *ante*) will be paid on detachment pay sheets (India Army Form A -33) as provided for in paragraph 42, Instructions for the payment of British Troops

Except in the case of soldiers on leave from an Expeditionary Force, all Army Books (A B 64) now in possession of British soldiers in India or Burma will be withdrawn and forwarded to the Disbursing Officers maintaining the pay account up to the 29th November 1918

Payments made to soldiers on leave from an Expeditionary Force will be entered on Acquittance Rolls in strict alphabetical order, separate rolls being issued for soldiers of different units, such Acquittance Rolls will show the amounts of all bills and stoppage due from the soldiers concerned and will be despatched to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer on the date on which payment is made. The Officer making the payment will take credit for the total amount paid, on Form 3 of the Pay and Mess Book, showing the numbers, dates and amounts of the Acquittance Rolls. The use of Army Form N 1591-A in India will be discontinued with effect from the 1st December 1918. All payments made in these cases, and all stoppages, will be entered in the soldier's Pay Book (A B 64)

NOTE—Detailed instructions for the preparation and submission of acquittance roll and the maintenance of A. B. 64 are contained in Sections III and IV of the Pamphlet entitled 'Instructions for the guidance of officers who hold their Imprests from Officer in Charge Clearing House M E Force'. Copies of this pamphlet should be obtained from the Field Controller of Military Accounts

5 On receipt of the first intimation that a unit, a draft or an individual is proceeding to the United Kingdom, the Officer Commanding will estimate the amount due to each soldier up to the presumed date of embarkation, and will pay this sum before the soldier leaves the station. These payments, together with all other charges, will be recorded in a Pay and Mess Book or on India Army Form A -27 as may be necessary and these will be forwarded to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer without delay. If time does not permit of these documents reaching the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer before the soldier leaves his station the necessary information will be telegraphed to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer

This information will be telegraphed invariably for the troops serving in Burma to be followed by India Army Form A 27 or Pay and Mess Book Particulars of the charges disclosed after the despatch of these documents will be telegraphed to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer. On receipt of such Pay and Mess Book or India Army Form A 27 the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer will take steps at once to close the man's account and issue his last pay certificate to the Home Paymaster.

NOTE—Such Pay and Mess Books and India Army Form A 27 will not be returned to the Officer Commanding.

6 The use of the monthly Pay List will be discontinued. The Divisional Disbursing Officer will maintain the account of each soldier on a Loose Leaf Ledger for the period from the 26th October to 29th November 1918 and will send copies of the whole of the entries made thereon to the unit for retention by the soldier and similar copies to the Regimental Paymaster concerned, for record.

From the 30th November 1918 the accounts of British soldiers will be maintained by the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer, Poona, to whom all Loose Leaf Ledgers should be transferred by Divisional Disbursing Officers before the 1st January 1919.

11 All contract allowances and all miscellaneous expenditure on account of stores will be claimed on separate bills from the Divisional Disbursing Officer concerned, and will not be charged in the Pay and Mess Book

12 Permanent advances to meet the cost of contingent expenditure will be obtained from, and accounted for to, the Divisional Disbursing Officer as at present (*vide* paragraphs 60—62 Instructions for the payment of British Troops)

13 National Health Insurance contributions will cease to be entered in Pay and Mess Books with effect from the 30th November 1918. The necessary deductions will be made by the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer

14 Native establishments will continue to be paid by the Divisional Disbursing Officer concerned

15 The importance of rigid adherence to these instructions is impressed on all concerned

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 201 OF 1919

Change of system of accounting for British units serving in India (and Burma) as notified in Army Instructions (India) Nos 1395 and 1453 of 1918.

When a soldier is transferred in India to another unit or to a company or squadron of the same unit, India Army Form A-27, duly completed in accordance with paragraph 29, "Instructions for the payment of British troops," will be forwarded to the Officer Commanding the unit, company or squadron, as the case may be, to which the soldier has been transferred, and not to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer. In such cases, no last pay certificate will be issued. Paragraphs 29

* *Vide* paragraph 2 of Army Instruction (India) No 1395 of 1918 and 30, "Instructions for the payment of British troops," are accordingly modified by this Instruction *

In the case of a soldier proceeding home or transferred to another unit or department not in the payment of the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer, the above India Army Form, duly completed should be forwarded to that officer.

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No. 579 of 1919.

Change of system of accounting for British units serving in India and Burma.

The following modifications are made to Army Instruction (India) No 1395 of 1918.—

(1) In paragraph 10, line 1, after the word "payment" insert "from clothing factories and clothing depôts."

(2) Add at the end of paragraph 10, the following subparagraph:—

"Where clothing is issued on payment from regimental stocks, the Officer Commanding the unit will pay the amount into the nearest Treasury on a receivable order obtained from the Divisional Disbursing Officer, and will send the Treasury receipt, with a copy of the voucher on which the clothing is issued, to the Disbursing Officer of the Division in which the unit is stationed."

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 370 of 1918

Detention allowance to officers in receipt of British rates of pay when detained within Indian limits.

APPENDIX 41 (See R. A. I. J (I) 37)

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) NO 1015 OF 1918

Gratuity admissible to officers of the Indian Army Reserve of Officers on transfer to the British Service and vice versa and also to officers of that Reserve who may relinquish their commissions and be re-commissioned in the British Army.

With the approval of the Secretary of State for India the following instructions are issued with reference to the grant of a gratuity under Article 497 of the Royal Warrant of the 1st December 1914 and paragraph 166, Army Regulations, India, Volume I, and Army Department letter No 12913, dated the 29th August 1917 (Appendix 174 to these Instructions), to officers of the Indian Army Reserve of Officers on transfer to the British Service or vice versa. The officers concerned are covered by the following categories —

- (a) An officer who has hitherto served only in the Indian Army Reserve of Officers and who is called upon to relinquish his commission with a view to being re-commissioned in the British Army
- (b) An officer who has hitherto served only in the Indian Army Reserve of Officers and who is transferred at his own request to the British Army
- (c) An officer who has hitherto served only in the Indian Army Reserve of Officers and who is transferred not at his own request to the British Army
- (d) An officer who had British service before joining the Indian Army Reserve of Officers and is called upon to relinquish his commission with a view to being re-commissioned in the British Service
- (e) An officer who had British service before joining the Indian Army Reserve of Officers and who is transferred back to the British Army as at (b) or (c)
- (f) A British Service officer who is transferred to the Indian Army Reserve of Officers

As regards class (a) the gratuity due in respect of service in the Indian Army Reserve of Officers will be issued, but it should be made clear to an officer in this category on being re-commissioned into the British Army that the gratuity issuable to him on the termination of service will be assessed on the whole period of service at British rates, allowance being made for any sum previously received in respect of Indian service. If the British gratuity is less than the Indian gratuity, already received, no fund will be required

As regards class (b) no gratuity should be issued at the time of transfer. On termination of service the gratuity will be assessed at British rates for the whole period of service.

As regards class (c) an officer will be entitled to a gratuity on termination of service with the British Army based on British rates for the whole period of service or to a gratuity based on Indian rates for the period of service with the Indian Army Reserve of Officers, whichever is greater. This provision will cease with effect from the date of issue of these instructions and an officer transferred at any future date from the Indian Army Reserve of Officers to the British Service, whether at his own request or not, will come under the conditions explained in clause (b); although the gratuity issuable may be less than that earned at the date of transfer from the Indian service.

As regards class (d) the same procedure will be adopted as that laid down in clause (a).

The case of an officer in class (e) should be dealt with as explained in clause (b).

As regards class (f) a gratuity based on Indian rates for the whole period of his service will be issued to an officer on termination of service with the Indian Army Reserve of Officers at the end of the emergency or on relinquishment of commission before that date.

APPENDIX 174 TO A. I. (I) No 1015 OF 1918.

3 These revised rates will also be applicable to retired officers of the Indian Army who entered the Indian Army on or after the 9th January 1892, and who, on re-employment, may elect to remain under the rules laid down in India Army Circular, Clause 99 of 1893, instead of coming under the conditions governing the re-employment of retired officers laid down in Army Department letter No H-2760, dated 6th January 1915.

4 The Secretary of State has intimated that the additional gratuities now sanctioned will be paid by the India Office to Officers residing in the United Kingdom who have been invalided from the Indian Army Reserve of Officers after more than one year's embodied service (including any period of leave granted, except leave without pay) and also to the estates of Indian Army Reserve of Officers who have died in the United Kingdom and whose estates have been dealt with at home. In the case of officers invalided from the Indian Army Reserve of Officers who are residing in India as well as those who have died in India or while

If, therefore, these concessions are ultimately given, the rates of pay now sanctioned will require alteration, but they will not, in present circumstances, be altered in such a way as to reduce the total cash equivalent. Further, the revised rates of pay now sanctioned have been granted in consideration, amongst other things, of the present high cost of living, and they will be subject to revision on this account also, either upwards, or downwards, to an extent not exceeding 20 per cent, according as the cost of living rises or falls. The first revision will take place after an interval of five years from the date of this sanction and subsequent revisions will be undertaken at such intervals as circumstances may determine :—

8 With the following exceptions, the revised rates of pay will, for the present apply to officers granted permanent commissions as well as to those granted short service commissions in the Royal Air Force —

- (a) Officers who were actually serving in India on the 1st April 1918 may draw existing rates so long as they continue in their present ranks and appointments.
- (b) Naval and military officers attached to the Royal Air Force before 1st August 1919 will be entitled to retain their naval or military emoluments when more beneficial than the revised Royal Air Force rates.
- (c) The rates of pay for officers employed on stores duties, for whom special rates as at Home will be required, are still under consideration.

Allowances applicable, until further notice, to officers, other than officers belonging to the British forces in France and Italy, when travelling on duty individually or with troops between French or Belgian Channel ports and Mediterranean ports across France and Italy en route to or from other countries

There are two methods of transit mail or passenger train and troop train Officers travelling as individuals may, according to military necessity, proceed by either method but officers travelling with troops proceed by troop train only

I The following allowances are issuable in respect of the journeys between the terminal ports —

A — *Journeys by mail or passenger trains*

- 1 Officers travelling as individuals normally make their own arrangements for food, etc, *en route* and may be granted regulated rates of travelling allowance in such cases, subject to the usual conditions

B — *Journeys by troop trains*

- 1 Officers whether travelling individually or with troops are normally provided with rations in the train, and accommodation and rations are provided at rest camps for periods of detention *en route*
- 2 Officers who on proceeding from the United Kingdom received an advance of 91 days' field allowance are not entitled to any further allowances for the outward journey except ration allowance when admissible under clause III
- 3 Officers who have not received an advance of field allowance may be granted a nightly travelling allowance at a rate equivalent to the rate of field allowance admissible for their rank The rates of travelling allowance admissible for Indian Army officers will be the rates of field allowance admissible for British Army officers of corresponding rank

II The following allowances are (subject to clause IV) admissible for periods of detention at terminal ports —

- 1 At Boulogne staff and field officers are allowed to make their own arrangements for board and lodging and a

similar system obtains at Havre and Marseilles for officers of the rank of Lieutenant Colonel and upwards. Such officers when detained at these places may be granted travelling allowance at regulated rates when they provide themselves with food and accommodation at their own expense.

- 2 At Boulogne, Havre and Marseilles officers other than those mentioned above, and at other ports all officers are normally accommodated at rest camps or under other public arrangements, and the allowances issuable will be as shown in clause I, B 2 and B 3. If, however, an officer has at any Continental port necessarily to provide himself with food and accommodation, he may be granted travelling allowance at regulated rates.
- 3 At Taranto officers are sometimes messed at the public expense on boardship in Taranto harbour instead of being accommodated and rationed in camp on shore. No travelling allowance is issuable in such circumstances.

III Ration allowance will only be issued for periods in troop trains and rest camps when the claim is supported by a certificate to the effect that rations could not have been drawn. The rate of ration allowance will be 2s a day. Officers in receipt of Indian rates of pay are in no circumstances entitled to ration allowance.

IV Officers in receipt of a consolidated rate of pay, temporary Royal Army Medical Corps officers in receipt of an inclusive rate of pay of 24s a day, and officers drawing Indian rates of pay, will not be entitled to any allowances for nights spent at terminal ports when food and accommodation are provided at the public expense. In cases in which these officers have necessarily to provide food and accommodation at their own expense at terminal ports they may be granted travelling allowance (Rate 1, paragraph 395, Allowance Regulations) under the conditions of paragraph 3 of Army Council Instruction No 1199 of 1916, a copy of which is printed in Appendix 139 to these Instructions.

V Claims should show specifically how officers were situated throughout the whole Continental journey.

VI This Instruction cancels all War Office letters previously issued regarding the allowances admissible for officers travelling on duty to and from the United Kingdom and other countries viz France and Italy and all outstanding claims may be adjusted in accordance therewith.

VII In the case of officers proceeding to or returning from stations other than India or Mesopotamia on duty, claims will

rendered in accordance with the instructions contained in War Office Circular Memo 14 Gen No 5923 (F 5) of 23rd September 1916, a copy of which is printed in Appendix 140 to these Instructions

The same instructions apply to officers proceeding to and returning from India and Mesopotamia with the exception that claims for expenses to the port of embarkation in the United Kingdom will be forwarded to the War Office in accordance with paragraph 429 (a), Allowance Regulations

The authority for the issue of the above allowances is Army Council Instruction No 194 of 1918

Travelling allowance according to the scales laid down in the Allowance Regulations will be admissible to departmental officers with honorary rank and warrant and non-commissioned officers of the India Unattached List

APPENDIX 139 (See A I I 841)

Army Council Instruction No. 1199 of 1916

WAR OFFICE

15th June 1916

1199 Temporary officers, Royal Army Medical Corps, Conditions of issue of travelling allowance.

1 Attention is called to the fact that (apart from ration allowance) no cash allowance is ordinarily issuable to temporary officers, Royal Army Medical Corps, drawing the daily rate of pay of 24s, this rate being inclusive of all allowances even though their period of duty at any given station may be very short. The following instructions as to travelling allowance will, for the future, be strictly observed

2 The nightly rate of travelling allowance is only issuable for periods when these officers are actually travelling, and are not rationed and accommodated at the public expense

3 Cases in which they happen to be temporarily detained at a station, whether at home or abroad, will be dealt with as follows:—

- (a) If the period of detention is expected to exceed eight nights, including night of arrival, no travelling allowance is issuable

- (b) If the period does not exceed, or is not expected to exceed eight nights, nightly travelling allowance may be issued, but not beyond the date when it is known that the detention will exceed eight nights.

Claims should be certified accordingly

APPENDIX 140 (See A I I 841)

War Office Circular Memo 14-Gen. No 5926 (F-5) of 23rd September 1916, addressed to Command Paymasters at Home and abroad

It having been brought to notice that some diversity of practice exists with regard to the payment of travelling claims of officers proceeding to or returning from stations abroad (except Ind a) the following rules will be observed in future in order that any risk of double payment may be obviated —

Outward Journeys—

- (a) Officers travelling with troops Expenses to the port of embarkation will be adjusted by the home paymaster concerned and claims for the journey subsequent to embarkation by the Command Paymaster of the Command to which the officers are proceeding
- (b) Officers not travelling with troops Whole claim from starting point to destination will be adjusted by the Command Paymaster of the Command to which the claimant proceeds

*Homeward Journey—*Expenses incurred before embarkation will be paid by the Command Paymaster at the station abroad and claims for the remainder of the journey will be paid by the appropriate Paymaster at home

APPENDIX 46 (See R A F I (I) 43)

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 1098 of 1918

Travelling allowance for journeys outside Indian limits, performed by officers in receipt of English pay. Rates and conditions of issue

Officers in receipt of English pay, while travelling outside Indian limits (except where otherwise provided in this Instruction), will draw travelling allowance under the "Regulations for the allowances of the army"

2 For journeys between Marseilles or Taranto and the United Kingdom *en route to or from other countries*, the terms of Army Instruction (India) No 841 of 1918 will apply except as provided in paragraph 4 below

3 Field allowance at the rates laid down in paragraph 493 and subject to the conditions specified in paragraph 495 of the regulations quoted in paragraph 1 will be issued to officers accommodated in tents and provided with rations. Colonial allowance is inadmissible in these cases

4 In the case of homeward journeys from Mesopotamia and places within Indian limits, expenses incurred before embarkation should be claimed in India. Claims for the remainder of the journey should be submitted to the War Office. In the case of outward journeys to Mesopotamia and places within Indian limits, United Kingdom should, be submitted to the Office, and others to the er of the journey should

be submitted to the military authorities in India

5 The General Officer Commanding at the port will be the sanctioning authority for claims which are payable in India

6 All outstanding cases should be disposed of in accordance with this Instruction

7 Army Instructions (India) Nos 810 and 456 of 1918 are cancelled

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No 1121 of 1918

Travelling allowance for journeys outside Indian limits performed by officers in receipt of Indian rates of pay. Rates and conditions of issue.

The following instructions as regards travelling allowance for officers in receipt of Indian rates of pay will hold good until further notice. Attention is especially directed to paragraph 5 in connection with paragraphs 2 to 4 inclusive.

2 For journeys within the United Kingdom and for other journeys outside Indian limits (except where otherwise provided in this Instruction) travelling allowance may be granted at the rates and under the conditions applicable to British Army officers drawing British rates of pay.

3 For journeys between Marseilles or Taranto and United Kingdom *en route* to or from other countries the terms of Army Instruction (India) No 841 of 1918 will apply except as provided in paragraph 10, below.

4 Officers paying short visits to France or Italy will be treated for allowances in accordance with War Office memoranda 121-Finance 977 (F-5) of 7th February 1917 and 14 Gen No 6208 (F-5) of 16th February 1918, copies of which are printed in Appendix 198 to these Instructions.

5 For officers drawing Indian rates of pay, travelling allowances will be granted at Indian rates of pay in one such stay would exceed eight nights, and that no allowances will be issuable to officers on Indian rates of pay beyond those normally issuable for such officers when travelling allowances are not drawn.

6 Officers who belong to Expeditionary Forces will continue to be treated for travelling allowance in accordance with the existing practice in the Expeditionary Force concerned.

7 Indian Army officers (including those on British rates of pay) who belong to the garrison at recognized stations abroad will continue to be treated for travelling allowance in accordance with the existing regulations at the station concerned.

8 For the purpose of adjusting outstanding travelling claims these instructions may be applied to journeys completed subsequent to 31st May 1917.

9 Indian Army officers drawing British rates of pay will be treated for travelling allowance in the same manner as British

Army officers drawing British rates of pay except as provided in paragraph 7.

10 In the case of homeward journeys from Mesopotamia and places within Indian limits expenses incurred before embarkation should be claimed in India. Claims for the remainder of the journey should be submitted in the case of Indian Army officers, to the Secretary, Military Department, India Office. In the case of outward journeys to Mesopotamia and places within Indian limits claims relating to expenses incurred in this country should, in the case of officers of the Indian Army, be submitted to the Secretary, Military Department, India Office, while claims for the remainder of the journey should be submitted to the military authorities in India.

11 The General Officer Commanding at the port will be the sanctioning authority for claims which are payable in India.

12 Field allowance at the rates laid down in paragraph 493 and subject to the conditions specified in paragraph 495 of the "Regulations for the allowances of the army" will be issued to officers accommodated in tents and provided with rations. Colonial allowance is inadmissible in these cases.

13 Claims from officers, warrant and non-commissioned officers of Indian services should be adjusted in accordance with the terms of this Instruction.

14 All outstanding cases should be disposed of in accordance with this Instruction.

15 Army Instructions (India) Nos 310 and 456 of 1918 are cancelled.

APPENDIX 198 (See A I I 1121)

[War Office memorandum 121-Finance-977 (F.5) of 7th February 1917, addressed to Command Paymasters, all Home Commands and Base British Armies in France]

The question of the allowances payable to officers who proceed from this country to France for short visits and who are not permanent members of the British Expeditionary Force has been under consideration, and it has been decided that an officer who proceeds for a period of less than 28 nights whose duties are mainly on the lines of communication may while so situated be granted travelling allowance at Rate 1, paragraph 395, Allowance Regulations, reducible by 2s 6d for each day on which he is rationed and by 2s 6d for each night on which he is billeted and this rate may be continued for any periods of a day or so during

which it may be necessary for him to be within the Army Areas. This allowance will be paid by the Home Paymaster.

An officer whose duties are mainly in the Army Areas and an officer whose stay in France extends over 27 nights will be granted the allowances laid down in War Office memorandum 121-8117 (Q M G F A.) of 1st July 1916

[War Office memorandum 11-Gen. No. 6208 (F.-5) of 16th February 1918, addressed to Command Paymasters, (1) all Home Commands, (2) Base, British Armies in France and (3) Italy.]

It is notified for information and guidance that officers who proceed from this country to France for short visits of less than 28 consecutive nights and are entitled to the allowances specified in the opening paragraph of War Office memorandum 121-Finance-977 (F.-5) of 7th February 1917, may be granted, for each night necessarily spent on duty in Paris, an increase of 2s 6d. over the rate of travelling allowance normally admissible.

[War Office memorandum 11-Gen. No. 6208 (F.-5) of 16th February 1918, addressed to Command Paymasters, (1) all Home Commands, (2) Base, British Armies in France and (3) Italy.]

The question of the allowances issuable to officers who proceed from this country to Italy for short visits and who are not permanent members of the British Forces in France or Italy has been under consideration and it has been decided, in view of the fact that the British Forces in Italy have been brought on to the same system of allowances as the British Forces in France, that the allowances laid down in War Office memorandum 121-Finance-977 (F.-5) of 7th February 1917, as amended by War Office memo-

Officers who proceed from the United Kingdom and visit both France and Italy will receive active service allowances if the total period of absence from the United Kingdom exceeds 27 consecutive nights.

APPENDIX 48 (See R. A. F. I. (I.) 43).

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No. 254 of 1919.

Travelling allowance claims of officers for journeys outside Indian limits other than those to the United Kingdom.

It has been decided that, as a temporary measure, the claims of officers journeying across Europe to Mesopotamia or India shall be accepted on the certificates of the officers travelling without the countersignature of General Officers Commanding at the ports at which they are detained *en route*. Audit officers should obtain any information required to check claims from the military authorities at the ports.

ARMY INSTRUCTION (INDIA) No. 705 of 1919.

Delegation of authority to the Controllers of Military Accounts to admit claims to arrears of pay and allowances which have become time-barred under the provisions of paragraph 59, Army Regulations, India, Volume III, owing to unavoidable circumstances connected with the war.

It has been decided, for the purpose of accelerating the final adjustment of accounts and reducing references to the Government of India, that, as a temporary measure until the 31st December 1919, claims to arrears of pay and allowances which are admissible under regulations, but the submission of which has become time-barred owing to circumstances connected with the war, may be admitted by the Controller of Military Accounts concerned without reference to the Government of India.

The remainder will now cease to be operative from 1st July 1920 inclusive, except those indicated in the appendix attached regarding which special instructions will be issued hereafter as found necessary and excepting also those the continuance of which on a permanent or temporary basis has been agreed to by special orders without reference to the official end of the war e.g., the payment of the six monthly bonus to Indian other ranks.

The object in view is that establishments generally shall be reduced to normal or to revised strengths, as may be decided upon separately and that temporary concessions granted, as far as this is now concessions or establishments on exceptional grounds and it is enjoined on all concerned that applications for the further continuance of any such special measures should be discountenanced and that, as far as practicable, normal conditions must be re-established at the earliest possible date. Where terms of engagement or of contracts require as a legal matter the continuance of definite allowances or concessions, these will be continued whilst such temporary establishments remain in service, but all temporary establishments other than those indicated in the appendix must be dispensed with by the 1st July 1920.

3 Captains, who are desirous of drawing pay at the rate of Rs 800, will be required to engage forthwith for one year from the date of engaging and must, within one month from the publication of this Army Instruction (India), notify to the Divisional Headquarters of the Division in which they are located their decision in the matter. The one year's engagement will not be terminable by either party except on the grounds of medical unfitness, inefficiency or misconduct

4 In the case of those officers accepting the new rates specified above, service for gratuity will cease to count from the 1st July 1919

5 The above conditions are applicable only to temporary contract Royal Army Medical Corps officers serving under the Government of India and are not applicable to officers in Mesopotamia and elsewhere

Applicability of the revised rates of pay to all temporary officers of the Royal Army Medical Corps who have recently arrived, or may arrive in future, for duty in India.

Arrive effect pay laid down in re applicable, with India and for so long as they continue to serve in this country, to all temporary commissioned officers of the Royal Army Medical Corps who have arrived for duty in India since the publication of the Army Instruction (India) referred to above, or who may arrive in future

2 Captains, who are desirous of drawing pay at the rate of Rs 800 per mensem, will be required to engage for one year with effect from the date of their disembarkation in India and must, within one month from the date of publication of this Instruction, or from the date of their disembarkation in India, whichever is later, notify the Headquarters of the Division in which they are serving of their decision in the matter. The one year's engagement will not be terminable by either party except on grounds of medical unfitness, inefficiency or misconduct, or in the event of the officer's services not being required for the full period of twelve months.

3 Captains who engage for any period less than 12 months will be restricted to the lower rate of Rs 750 per mensem.

4 No gratuity and no Army of Occupation bonus is admissible in addition to the revised rates of pay referred to above.

5 These rates of pay will apply regardless of the fact that the officers may have previously engaged under contracts providing for different terms.

1 Officers proceeding to India for service in that country will be paid at British rates up to the date prior to that of landing in India; thereafter Indian rates will be issued

2. These rates are consolidated and inclusive of all pay and allowances. It will thus be necessary for officers serving in India themselves to make provision for remittance through bankers or agents of such portion of their Indian pay as they consider necessary for the support of their families, if not accompanied by them.

3. Quarters are not at present necessarily provided by the State in India for officers and their families, and in any case, rent is charged for them when provided.

4 The Indian rates of pay issuable are at present under revision and the new scales will be promulgated in due course.

1 From the 1st February 1920, the special arrangement will terminate under which Indian rates of pay have been continued to British Service officers serving in the Royal Air Force out of India, Aden and Mesopotamia in virtue of their having been on the Indian Establishment on 5th August 1914, and having proceeded out of India for purposes connected with the war. Such officers will be brought on to the rates of pay to which they are entitled under Air Ministry Weekly Order 1003 of 1919.

This rule will not apply to Royal Engineer officers who had completed five years' service with an Indian formation or on Indian rates of pay on 5th August 1914 and whose service, while on the Indian Establishment, is reckoned for pension under Indian Army rules

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outside India,

Aden and Mesopotamia to officers holding permanent or short service commissions in the Royal Air Force. This principle applies from the date of the commission in all cases, including those of officers of the Indian Army and British Service officers with reserved rights as in paragraph 1 above.

1003 — New Scheme for the Pay, Allowances, and Pensions of Officers of the Royal Air Force.

SECTION I — GENERAL

1 This scheme covers all officers who accept permanent or short service commissions in the Royal Air Force, and also (with certain necessary modifications) officers holding permanent commissions on the active list of the Navy and Army who are attached to the Royal Air Force. It will also apply to officers of the Reserve of Officers of the Royal Air Force as reconstituted, when called up for duty or training.

2 The existing code of regulations is retained as a temporary measure for all other officers, including —

- (a) Officers temporarily retained during the present transitional period or awaiting demobilization
- (b) Dental, Education, Works and Pay Officers *
- (c) Officers temporarily loaned to the Royal Air Force from the Navy or Army who will continue to be dealt with under the regulations of their own service

3 (a) As now issued, the scheme provides for those classes of officers who have hitherto been carrying out the duties of the

* Permanent officers on the active list of the Navy or Army employed in these specialist branches who are temporarily retained will have the option of drawing the resulting emoluments of those of their substantive rank in their permanent service.

Flying Technical, and Administrative Branches, together with Staff appointments connected therewith, and the Chaplain's department Attention is drawn to the note in paragraph 14 as to the Quartermaster Branch

(b) It will shortly be completed to include provision for the remaining services (such as Dental)

(c) Officers serving in Airship sections desiring to come on to the new scheme of emoluments should apply to the Secretary, Air Ministry, through the usual channels (without any vested right to their continuance or to their present Royal Air Force rank) if the new scheme would be more beneficial to them

Officers serving in Airship sections desiring to come on to the new scheme of emoluments should apply to the Secretary, Air Ministry, through the usual channels

(d) The future of the Works and Pay and Schoolmaster Services is also under consideration and the scheme does not apply to officers of these services

4 The rates and conditions of this scheme, subject to claims to benefits under previous War bonus for the Air Forces will be recognised Until it is published as part of the King's Regulations for the Royal Air Force (to be published as part of the King's Regulations for the Royal Air Force) these rates and conditions will be administered under the relevant articles of the Royal Warrant for the Pay of the Army, the Allowance Regulations of the Army, Pay and Allowance Regulations of the Royal Air Force (FS Publication No 4 and Supplement) and FS Publication 68, as amended from time to time, by Air Ministry Weekly or other Orders

5 (a) Officers holding permanent commissions on the active list of the Royal Navy or Regular Army who were attached to the Royal Air Force on 1st April 1918, and who accept permanent commissions in the Royal Air Force, will be allowed—

(i) to receive the rate of pay (without subsequent increases) of the substantive rank held by them in the Navy or Army to which they were actually entitled at the date of receiving the permanent commission in the Royal Air Force if more favourable than the rate payable under this scheme Additional pay in the other services will not reckon in that comparison

(ii) to draw pension either in accordance with Air Force rates and conditions or under the regulations of

previous service (Navy or Army) on the basis of the substantive rank held by them in that service at the date of receiving a permanent commission in the Royal Air Force whichever is the more favourable

(b) Officers holding permanent commissions on the active list of the Royal Navy or Regular Army who were attached to the Royal Air Force after 1st April 1918, and who accept permanent commissions in the Royal Air Force, will be treated under (a) (i) as regards pay, but will come under Air Force rates and conditions as regards pension

(c) Officers holding permanent commissions on the active list of the Royal Navy or Regular Army seconded (or re seconded) or temporarily retained for duty with the Royal Air Force will be allowed to receive the pay of their substantive rank in their permanent service if more favourable than the rate issuable under this scheme. They will be treated as regards pension under the regulations of their permanent service any period of service with Royal Air Force being allowed to count. The instructions governing the seconding of officers from the Navy and Army will be published in a separate order

Note—The foregoing classes of officers will in any case come under the new scheme of allowances from the date of receiving a permanent or short service commission or of being seconded

6 The new scheme will come into operation for those officers provided for in it as regards pay, half pay and allowances from the date from which the officer is gazetted to a commission or appointment under it

Officers already holding permanent commissions on the active list of the Navy Army or Royal Air Force will be brought on to the new scheme from the 1st August 1919

Airship officers on application as in paragraph 3 (c) above will be allowed to draw the rates of pay and allowances under this scheme, with effect from the 1st August, 1919, if more beneficial than those of which they were in receipt prior to that date

The new rates and conditions of pensions will apply as from 1st April 1919, and pensions already awarded will be reviewed as from that date

7 The new rates of pay and pensions have been drawn up in the light of the present high cost of living, and it has therefore been decided that 20 per cent of the rates should be regarded as detachable and liable to alteration, either upwards or downwards according as the cost of living rises or falls. No revision of this kind will be made for five years, and thereafter the revision will be

made every three years. These revisions will apply to all pensions which are being drawn on the new scale at the date of revision as well as to future awards. They will not apply to gratuities or the lower rate of half pay.

8 As allowances are given for specific purposes, the cost of which may vary at comparatively short intervals, the rates of allowances are liable to be reviewed as circumstances may require.

9 (a) All pay, allowances, and other pecuniary advantages granted under this scheme which shall not have been claimed within a period of 12 months from the date on which they might have been claimed shall be deemed to be forfeited except under such exceptional circumstances as shall be approved by the Air Council or an officer duly authorised by them.

(b) The pay and all other emoluments granted to an officer under this scheme shall be held liable to be stopped on the order of the Air Council to meet any public claim that may be outstanding against him, any service debt that may be due from him, and any service claim that the Air Council may direct him to pay.

(c) No officer shall be entitled to claim hereafter any pay, pension, or other advantage conferred by any provision in this scheme in the event of such provision being at any time added to, varied or cancelled.

It must be clearly understood that while every consideration will be given to the reasonable and legitimate interests of individuals it will be competent for the Air Council at any time to modify the administrative regulations under which the emoluments of the Royal Air Force are drawn. In particular no claim can be founded on a regulation the operation of which is merely contingent, e.g. on a regulation prescribing a rate of pay, which is revised before the claimant attains the rank to which it was assigned.

10 For periods of service given under Indian administration and payment officers will come under the rates and conditions authorised from time to time by the Indian Government in so far as these rates and conditions may differ from those in this scheme.

11 Subjects (such as indemnification for loss of kit) not dealt with in this order as not relating directly to the pay, allowances, and pensions of officers, though dealt with in the Allowance Regulations for the Army, and in the Pay and Allowance Regulations of the Royal Air Force, will for the present be administered as hitherto.

12 The grant of short service commissions will be the acceptance by the of the conditions laid down

scheme, including the date prescribed in paragraph 6, in so far as these may modify Weekly Order 781 of 1919.

Officers who may have gone to pension before taking a short service commission (e.g., under Article 572A of the Army Pay Warrant) will not draw their pension for any period of service for which they draw full pay and earn gratuity as short service officers.

The period during which additional pay for service at the Air Ministry may be continued to an officer on leave or sick leave is under consideration. Further regulations will be issued in due course.

18 All these rates of pay are inclusive, in the sense that no extra pay (such as additional working or command pay) will be payable except as may hereafter be specially authorised by the Air Council.

SECTION III — HALF-PAY

19 The regulations as to the rates and conditions of issue of half pay are under consideration and will be issued shortly.

SECTION IV — PENSIONS AND GRATUITIES

20 The following scale of pensions will, subject to the reservations below and to the special provisions as regards officers transferred from or seconded from the Navy and Army contained in paragraph 3 of Section I of these regulations, be applicable to all officers of the Royal Air Force, with effect from the 1st April 1913 —

A—Air Officers

Air Marshal — 975*l* after 24 years' service, increased by 22*l* for each year beyond 24, with a maximum of 1,195*l*

Temporary retirement laid down in paragraph 20 above will apply to medical officers with the proviso that the retiring age of squadron leaders will be 48 years, instead of 45, and the maximum retired pay 500*l*, instead of 450*l*.

24 *Gratuities* to officers who retire before qualifying by length of service for service pensions:—

A gratuity of 75*l* for each completed year of service will be awarded with a maximum of 1,000*l*, provided that no officer is allowed to resign with a gratuity unless he has completed 5 years' full-pay service.

The gratuities mentioned in the preceding paragraph will be payable to medical officers retiring before having qualified for service pensions, but the following further provisions are made in the case of those officers:—

(a) Medical officers holding permanent commissions who have

pension

(b) Medical officers may retire after 16 years' service with a gratuity of 2,000*l* in lieu of pension.

(c) Medical officers accepting short service commissions and retiring after 4 years' service will receive a gratuity of 125*l* a year for each completed year of service.

(This gratuity will not be payable to officers on short service commissions who are granted permanent commissions but the whole period of service, including that spent in the short service commission, will count (retired pay).)

25 These pension scales will be applicable generally to officers appointed to perform the duties of the present Flying, Technical, and Administrative Branches, and to Chaplains. The following will be dealt with under special regulations which will shortly be issued —

- (a) Officers who may be appointed to the Quartermaster Branch on the special rates of pay of that Branch
- (b) Commissioned Warrant Officers, Warrant Officers, and ratings from the Royal Navy on regular engagements who have been given temporary commissions in the Royal Air Force
- (c) Warrant Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and Men from the Army on regular engagements who had been given commissions in the Army or were given temporary commissions in the Royal Air Force
- (d) It should also be noted that these scales do not apply to specialist services, such as Dental Officers, Pay Officers, and Schoolmasters

26 Subject to the exceptions in paragraphs 22 and 23 above, all regular officers of the Royal Air Force will be considered subject to the Council

27 Officers appointed to permanent commissions in the Royal Air Force who have drawn or may draw the gratuities under Article 497 or Article 226B of the Pay Warrant, or the corresponding gratuities under Naval Regulations, will be allowed to count towards pension or gratuity, on the above scales, the service for which they have already drawn gratuity, provided they refund the difference between the gratuity so drawn and that to which they would have been entitled as permanently commissioned officers (Weekly Order 550 of 1919). If they are entitled to these gratuities, but have not yet drawn them, they will become entitled to regular officers' gratuities only on accepting permanent commissions.

Similarly, officers granted short service commissions under Weekly Order 781 of 1919, who are subsequently appointed to permanent commissions, will be allowed to count their service in the short service commission towards pension or gratuity on the above scales, but will not draw the gratuity of 75% a year under paragraph 12(v) of that order. Service prior to the grant of the short service commission, in respect of which the gratuity applicable to temporary officers has been drawn, will, in no circumstances, count for pension.

27A Gratuities for the war period are unaffected by the new rates of pay. Officers now serving who come under the new scheme with effect from 1st August, 1919, will have their war gratuities assessed on the basis of their pay or rank as on 31st July, 1919 subject to any right they may have under existing regulations to an award based on their pay or rank at an earlier date.

SECTION V — ALLOWANCES

28 Fuller regulations as regards allowances will be issued later, but pending their publication the rates and conditions of issue will remain as at present, subject to the modification set out below. These modifications apply only to those officers who come on to the new rates of pay, and the present system and rates of allowance continues for other officers until further notice with the exceptions noted at the end of paragraph 5 above. The new rates of travelling allowance will apply, however, to all officers as from 1st August, 1919.

The additional pay for officers gazetted to appointments at the Air Ministry will be issued by the agents, officers already holding staff appointments at the Ministry being brought on to the new rates from the dates laid down in paragraph 6

The allowance of 10s per day to Officers temporarily attached to the Air Ministry will be issued by the agents. Officers entitled to it should claim each month through the head of their branch, showing the original date of attachment and quoting the date of the posting list. The claims, certified by the head of the branch, should be forwarded to F P 1, Air Ministry

The introduction of a monthly return from units is under consideration, giving the names, etc., of all officers on the effective strength of each unit or other formation, which will be the authority for the agents to continue officers on pay from month to month:

43 As regards allowances, officers will come on to the new rates and conditions from the same date as for pay. Units, in claiming allowances on F S Form 501, will claim for the officers under the old and the new terms respectively on separate forms, with separate forms also for each agent as now. The date of the gazette will be quoted as the authority for bringing an officer on the new rates, and before submitting claims at the new rates it will be certified that it has been ascertained from the officer that he is accepting the commission to which he has been gazetted. In case of doubt the old rates can be drawn and adjustment made later (by refund or supplementary claim) when the date of gazette and the acceptance of the officer are definitely known.

The claims for L F L allowances in the case of married officers under paragraphs 30 (a) and (b) will be supported by a certificate from the officer that he is over the age of 30 (if below the rank of squadron leader) and responsible for the provision of accommodation for his wife and family.

In order to avoid delay in the payment of allowances, the utmost care will be required in making out these claims.

44 It should be noted that the present preferential rates of Income Duty payable by Royal Air Force officers will cease to be operative from the beginning of the next financial year. From that date the rates of pay under this scheme will accordingly be chargeable with income duty at the same rates and under the same conditions as apply to the rest of the community.

Army Instruction (India) No. 190 of 1920, regarding the rate of exchange to be adopted for purposes of adjustment of credit balances of officers on field service where the Government of India rupee is not legal tender, is applicable to the Royal Air Force and is produced as an appendix to this Instruction.

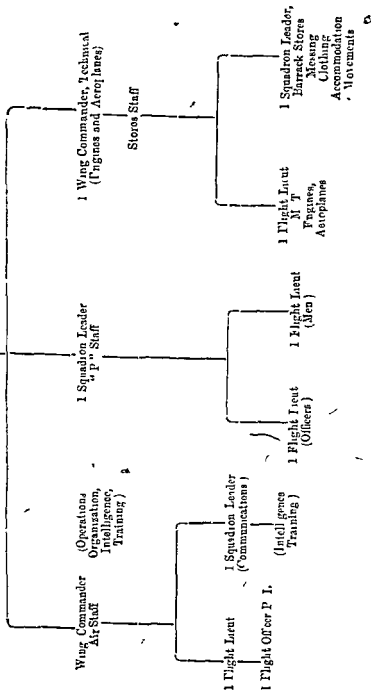

Detention allowance of Rs: 3 per diem for officers provided with special or reserved railway accommodation when travelling on duty by rail.

It has been decided that the provisions of clause (a) in paragraph 1 of Army Instruction (India), No. 355 of 1918 shall be held to have been temporarily superseded by the provisions of Army Instruction (India), No. 1397 of 1918, with effect from the 17th December 1918. Similarly, officers and others who fulfil these conditions, should be given travelling allowance when moving at the public expense from a war area to a peace station.

- (d) *Indian ranks*—Ordinary pay and allowances retaining the batta admissible while in Mesopotamia under paragraph 971, Army Regulations, India, Volume I. In addition they will be granted a ration allowance as under —

- (ii) Rs 2 8 0 per mensem for followers

Pay and Allowances—With reference to India Army Order No 570 of 1917, the Government of India have decided to extend the orders therein to the officers and lady nurses of the following classes —

- (a) Temporary Royal Army Medical Corps and Indian Medical Service officers in receipt of contract rates of pay

Pay and Allowances—The Government of India have decided that all British officers of the British and Indian Services, when detailed or permitted by competent authority to attend a course of instruction at a station other than their own, shall be granted detention allowance at the rate of Rs. 5 per diem up to the first 30 days of a course and at the rate of Rs 3 per diem thereafter. The allowance will not be admissible for more than 42 days in all, nor for any days for which travelling allowance is drawn.  - (i) No simple spherical lens will be supplied of a less strength than 1.00 dioptré, or of a greater strength than 18.00 dioptrés.
 - (ii) No simple spherical lens will be supplied of a less strength than 0.50 dioptré or of a greater strength than 6.00 dioptrés.
 - (iii) No sphero-cylindrical lens will be supplied having before or after transposition —
 - (a) one of its component parts less than 0.50 dioptré and the other component part less than 1.00 dioptré,
 - (b) a combined strength greater than 18.00 dioptrés, or
 - (c) a cylindrical strength greater than 6.00 dioptrés.
 - (iv) No sphero-cylindrical lens will be supplied with a concave-spherical surface and a convex cylindrical surface.
 - (v) No quarter-dioptre lenses will be supplied above 3.00 dioptrés and no half dioptre lenses above 6.00 dioptrés. No lenses with intervals of less than quarter dioptrés will be supplied.

- (v) In every instance in which the Ophthalmic Surgeon prescribes glasses under 1.00 dioptré or over 10.00 dioptrés he will record on the back of the prescription form, in the space provided for the "Ophthalmic Surgeon's" remarks, his full reasons for prescribing such glasses, bearing in mind the instructions contained in paragraph 5 of Army Department letter No 2358, dated the 16th February 1917

- (iv) In the case of remittances other than regular allotments, the rate of conversion shall be that in force on the date of signature of the roll or other advice to India Office

If an officer is granted special war leave from a temporary staff appointment, the notification must show from what date he will vacate it in order that his leave allowances, during the remainder of his leave, may be assessed on his substantive appointment. All such variations must, therefore, be clearly shown both in the orders granting the leave and in any subsequent orders relating thereto which may be issued, to enable the audit authorities to record all necessary details on the officer's last pay certificate

- (b) where dentures have been lost or damaged in and by reason of service in the Royal Air Force

(iii) Where dentures originally supplied from Royal Air Force Navy or Army funds can be shown to be lost or damaged through the culpable neglect of an airman, he should be placed under stoppages for the cost of repair, or of supplying a new denture, as an expense caused by him under section 138, paragraph 4, of the Air Force Act

(iv) Dental treatment of airmen will be carried out by dental officers of the Army, whenever these are available

(v) Where no such officer is available the medical charge may refer airmen to local civilian surgeons for

(r) The following scale of fees for dental treatment by civilian dental surgeons is authorised. General anaesthetics will be given in the nearest station hospital, the fee for the dentist being Rs 16:—

- (a) extractions —Rs 1 each tooth
- (b) anaesthetics —local Rs 2 (only one fee for anaesthetics per man)
- (c) fillings —Rs 5 each filling (limited to Rs 10 per tooth).
- (d) root treatment —Rs 7-8 each tooth completed. Total cost of (c) and (d) not to exceed Rs 45 without authority from the Principal Medical Officer, Royal Air Force in India.
- (e) scaling —a separate fee of Rs 5 is admissible only when certified to be absolutely necessary by the medical officer in charge of the unit. The certificate to this effect will be entered on the form referred to in Section III, paragraph 2, below. The combined charges for all operative treatment may not exceed Rs 60.
- (f) examination and charting:—a fee of Rs 2 where the airman does not return for treatment.
- (g) dentures —a complete upper or lower denture Rs 20
- (h) partial dentures —Rs 5 per tooth with a minimum of five teeth, maximum fee Rs. 40 for any partial denture
- (i) repairs to dentures —fractions, Rs 2 per denture, each new tooth, Rs 5
- (j) remodelling —Rs 20 per denture

II *Flying personnel*

All officers and non commissioned officers, who are engaged or are under instruction in aviation, are entitled to whatever treatment is necessary to make them dentally fit including the provision of dentures, *etc.*, to bring their teeth and gums into as healthy a condition as possible.

III. *General Instructions*

1 Dentures will be supplied or repaired —

- (a) where the dental surgeon or medical officer superintending treatment certifies that these are necessary to make the recipient dentally efficient
- (b) to replace teeth or dentures which though not necessary under (a), have been lost or destroyed in and by reason of service in the Royal Air Force

2 Air Force Forms 632 and 633 are not at present available in India. Until they are taken into use the Army procedure will be followed. Whenever dentures are required, the form in use in the Army (reproduced as an appendix to this Instruction) will be filled in, the Principal Medical Officer, Royal Air Force in India, being the sanctioning authority.

3 Before submitting any recommendation for dentures for men of low category, the officers concerned will carefully consider whether the man's services are of such value as to warrant an expenditure from public funds on artificial teeth.

4 The expenditure involved is debitable to the ordinary grant and head of account affected.

The rates under Groups A, B, C and D are to be regarded as covering all duties which men of the Medical Branch may be called on to perform. Men of unclassified occupations and men under training in the Medical Branch are to receive the rates for Group V (Non-technical).

PROGRESSIVE PAY

No increments of pay under the above scales are to be granted except in respect of service in a trade assigned to the group to which the individual is mustered. Thus a fitter (aero-engine) who had served for over three years as such would automatically receive the appropriate 'over three years' rate as laid down for Group I. Where part of previous service has been in a trade assigned to a group different from that to which the individual is mustered, service for progressive pay counts only as from the date of last remustering.

Previous service is not allowed to reckon for progressive increments of pay on reduction to a lower rank in the same trade or group.

Any cases which may arise where an individual airman would actually lose in pay on being remustered to a higher group should be referred to the Headquarters, Royal Air Force India, for decision.

II—APPLICATION OF THE RATES OF PAY.

2 The rates of pay shown above will come into force as from the 1st August 1919 and as from that date the existing rates, including war pay and bonus, will, in general, cease to apply.

3 In cases, however, where the rate of pay laid down in this Instruction is less than the existing rate together with the army of occupation bonus a vested right to the existing rates will be allowed as follows —

- (a) *Men on regular engagements* may draw their present rates plus bonus, if more beneficial than the new rates up to the 30th April 1920 when they will come on to the new rates, subject to paragraph 6 below. This will include men serving on 1st August 1919 who have without a break in their service re-engaged or signed regular engagements.
- (b) *Men serving for Occupation Period*, if not on regular engagements, retain the old rates plus bonus until discharge, if more favourable.

4 *New Enlistments*—All men enlisting on or after 1st August 1919, whether with previous service or not, will come on the new rates of pay forthwith.

5 As from the 1st May 1920 the army of occupation bonus will cease to be payable. Men on Occupation Period, who retain a bonus, as being more beneficial than the new rates, shall be allowed the bonus, as being more beneficial than the new rates, as from 1st May 1920. This Instruction.

6. Men who have extended their service for 2, 3, or 4 years under Air Ministry Weekly Order 1560 of 1918, and men who entered into regular engagements prior to the 18th July 1918 may, up to 30th April 1920, draw their present rates including war bonus, and thereafter (i.e., during the period of the engagement on which they were serving on 1st August 1919) their present rates without war bonus, if more beneficial.

7. The rates of pay allowable as from 1st May 1920 (if any) should be compared with the rates of pay in this Instruction, together with good conduct pay and any non-substantive pay as aerial gunner, etc., that may be payable. In order to avoid heavy reductions of pay from 1st May 1920 as a result of recalculation on that date, it has been decided that no individual airman's pay shall be reduced by a sum exceeding 8d. a day.

8. In no case is war bonus issuable concurrently with the new rates of pay. On the other hand neither good

non-substantive pay under this Instruction is to be issued in conjunction with the old rates of pay

9 The trades and occupations to which the various rates are applicable are as shown above. It will be seen that the main change in classification is a division of the former technical group into three.

III — GOOD CONDUCT BADGES AND PAY

10 Conditions of award are set out in Appendix VIII to King's Regulations and Orders for the Royal Air Force (published as Appendix A to this Instruction)

IV — NON-SUBSTANTIVE RATES OF PAY, ETC.

11 In addition to substantive pay, non substantive pay, etc., has been approved for the possession of certain qualifications and the performance of specific duties as follows —

12 Non substantive pay as aerial gunners will be issued to men who have qualified in the prescribed tests and will be payable continuously so long as the men continue to perform, or are available for the duty, provided they remain efficient. At the same time the numbers to be allowed in the various establishments will be indicated and must not be exceeded. If, however, an establishment is temporarily exceeded (e.g. three aerial gunners borne instead of two) the non substantive pay will be continued, but immediate steps should be taken to adjust the establishment.

Non substantive pay in these cases will cease—

(a) on ceasing to remain efficient or on failure to re-qualify,
or

(b) on ceasing to perform, or be available for, the duty

Thus, an aerial gunner on transfer to other duties, will cease to draw non substantive pay as such

Payment may be continued during ordinary leave, sickness or convalescent leave following such sickness, provided that the airman has not become permanently unfit to perform the duties of the non-substantive rank, or that the sickness is not due to his own misconduct or neglect

13 The necessary entries in Part II Orders, in respect of the non-substantive pay admissible since 1st August 1919 to date should be published forthwith.

14 Crew pay of 4s. a day to serjeant pilots (heavier than-aircraft) will be allowed as under present regulations. Crew pay of 2s. a day will be paid to the regular flying crew of all aircraft, who are definitely borne in establishments for duty in aircraft. The numbers to be allowed such pay will be indicated in future establishments and payment will normally be continuous whilst the men are filling vacancies in this manner. Under these regulations crew pay will not be admissible for group engineers, constructional or testing parties etc. It should be noted that the number to be allowed crew pay will be definitely limited by the establishment, e.g., if two aerial gunners are allowed and three borne, only two may receive crew pay.

15 Flying pay for casual ascents will not in any circumstances be admitted after the 31st July 1919.

V—SEPARATION ALLOWANCES

16 The existing separation, special parents' and dependants' allowances will continue to be admissible until the 30th September 1920, for all who were entitled to them. With effect from 1st October 1920, these allowances have been abolished except in the case of certain airmen and the introduction of marriage allowances in India on the lines adopted at Home is under consideration.

VI—ACCOUNTING INSTRUCTIONS

17 In order that airmen may be issued with the correct rates of pay admissible under this Instruction and that the correct rates may be credited to the airman's accounts by the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer, the following procedure will be adopted.

18 Officers Commanding units will prepare rolls in triplicate in accordance with the *pro forma* Appendix B to this Instruction of all the airmen on the strength of their respective units as on 1st August 1919, cash issues will from 1st August be made provisionally in accordance with column 11.

19 These rolls will be forwarded to the Officer-in-charge, Records, Royal Air Force, who will check them, making such amendments in columns 1 to 7 as may be necessary, and forward two copies to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer and return the triplicate copy to the officer commanding the unit

20 The officer commanding may then make cash issues, including any arrears due, on the basis of the information in columns 1 to 7 as amended by the Officer in charge, Records, less any allotment. Should the provisional payment which has meanwhile been made from the 1st August 1919 be in excess of the new rate based on the amended particulars furnished by the Officer-in-charge, Records, immediate steps should be taken to recover any over-issues by reducing current cash payments until the over-payment has been rectified. The necessary entries should also be made in pay and mess book (Book 4) or airman's pay book (Book 64) regarding the rate of pay for issue.

21 If the unit does not concur in any amendment made by the Officer-in-charge, Records, the matter will be referred back to the latter officer, but cash issues will be made in accordance with the amended rank, etc., approved by the Officer in charge, Records, until that officer has agreed to a further amendment.

22 The Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer on receipt of the original and duplicate rolls will check the rates of pay entered in columns 8 to 11 on the information furnished in columns 1 to 7, making such amendments as are necessary, and enter the information on the airman's ledger sheet clearly showing the airman's rank, trade classification, and correct rate of pay under this Instruction, and in the case of men entitled to a higher rate of pay under paragraph 6 of this Instruction will note in red ink on the ledger sheet "Entitled to pay at . . . per diem under paragraph 2 of . . . until".

23 If the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer disagrees with any of the information appearing in columns 1 to 7 as amended by the Officer-in-charge, Records, he will at once refer the case to the Officer-in-charge, Records, and any necessary amendments will be made on both original and duplicate rolls. The duplicate roll will then be returned to the officer commanding the unit who will if necessary amend the rate for issue in the pay and mess book or airman's pay book, as the case may be, and reduce current cash payments until the over-issues, if any, have been adjusted.

24 In the cases of men who are transferred from one unit to another after the 1st August 1919, the officer commanding the unit with which they were serving on 1st August 1919 will

men are posted, of the entries may be subsequently notified on the duplicate roll returned from the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer. These notifications will take the form of Appendix B to this Instruction and will show all the information entered on the roll.

25 All Part II Orders from 1st August 1919 will contain full information regarding an airman's trade classification and rank in all cases of enlistment, promotion, reduction in rank, remustering of trade, etc.

VII—GENERAL

26 The sterling rates of pay sanctioned in this Instruction will be converted at one shilling and four pence to the rupee in the case of airmen serving in India on 1st November 1920 and those who have been demobilized or become non effective from other causes on or before that date, and all arrears due to the Royal Air Force in India on this basis shall be paid with retrospective effect from 1st August 1919. The rates of pay for airmen enlisted or re-engaged for service or who arrived in India after 1st November 1920, will be announced hereafter.

- (iii) The period of probation will be six months and this period will be reckoned for promotion, pension, etc, if the clerk is confirmed and retained in service
- (iv) On completion of the period of probation, all clerks, if retained in service, will sign the usual contract (Articles of Agreement) India Army Form Z 2055
- (v) The rates of pay are consolidated and rations or quarters will not be granted in addition. Field service concessions will be admissible on field

- (vi) Any allowances that may be sanctioned by Local Governments and Administrations for their own employees in particular areas will not be admissible.
- (vii) The time-scale of pay has effect from the 1st October 1920, except as provided for in paragraph 2 below.
- (viii) Each clerk serving in the Royal Air Force on the 1st October 1920 will be brought on the time-scale of pay, his initial pay from that date and subsequent increments being regulated with reference to Article 157, Civil Service Regulations.
- (ix) The clerk should have passed at least a University Entrance Examination and be able to type.
- (x) All first appointments, transfers, discharges and dismissals of clerks should be sanctioned by the Air Officer Commanding, Royal Air Force in India, who will also be the authority empowered to withhold or accelerate periodical increments under Articles 152 and 153, Civil Service Regulations, and to determine the efficiency bar.
- (xi) Except as provided for in clause (x), the clerks will serve for purposes of discipline under the Commanding Officers of their units who may also grant them leave in accordance with the rules in the Civil Service Regulations.

2. The pay, etc., of clerks entertained since the 6th July and before the 1st October 1920, with reference to Royal Air Force Instruction (India) No. 65 of 1920, will be governed by the time-scale of pay sanctioned in the Civil Service Regulations of entertainment; any case of special consideration should be referred to the Air Officer Commanding, Royal Air Force in India, for communication with the Deputy Financial Adviser attached to Group Headquarters, Royal Air Force.

3. No proposals involving any revision in the pay and conditions of service of clerks will be entertained by the Government of India for a period of at least five years from the 1st October 1920.

126. Procedure to be adopted in respect of the supply of technical and non-technical stores required by the Royal Air Force in India.

In supersession of the orders contained in Army Department letter No 9782, dated the 21st July 1919, it has been decided that the following procedure shall be adopted, as a tentative measure, in respect of the supply of technical and non-technical stores required by the Royal Air Force in India.—

- (i) In the case of technical stores not procurable in India from the sources shown in clause (ii) below, or by local purchase, the Officer Commanding, Aircraft Depot, Royal Air Force, will prepare every two months a list of stores required. The list will be submitted to the Air Officer Commanding, Royal Air Force in India, for transmission after examination to the Director General of Stores, India Office. The general form of indent, which is reproduced as an appendix to this Instruction, will be adopted by the Royal Air Force. The indents will invariably show which items, if any, have been demanded in advance and in all such cases the letter or telegram in which the advance demand was made
- all indents legibly typewritten. Indents will, after scrutiny, be printed by the latter and nine copies thereof will be sent for compliance to the Director General of Stores, India Office, and one copy to the Secretary, Board of Industries and Munitions.
- (ii) With regard to technical stores procurable in India and non-technical stores, the Officers Commanding, Royal Air Force units, will draw on the Ordnance Department, Supply and Transport Corps, Military Works Services,

Medical Stores Department and Mathematical Instrument Department, as the case may be, for stocks of articles of the kind which they already supply to the Royal Air Force in India, in accordance with the scales authorised in Mobilisation Store Tables. Articles not supplied by these services, but obtainable in India, will, if necessary be purchased by Officers Commanding, Royal Air Force, within the limits of their financial powers, the cost being recovered on contingent bills in the usual manner. No stores, however, the cost of which exceeds Rs 200, will be purchased locally without the previous sanction of the Air Officer Commanding, Royal Air Force in India, or of the Government of India, as the case may be.

- (iii) In cases, however, where the restrictions as to price and quality, etc., imposed by the stores purchase rules in paragraph 13 *et seq.* Army Regulations, India, Volume III, may preclude purchases in India of articles either manufactured or otherwise obtainable in India, and the Air Officer Commanding may consider it necessary to place indents on the Director General of Stores, India Office, the indents should be forwarded by the Air Officer Commanding to the Board of Industries and Munitions for scrutiny and countersignature in the first instance, before transmission to England.
- (iv) Indents for all articles of clothing required free or on payment will be submitted to the Divisional Clothing Depot on which the depot or unit is dependent.

APPENDIX 101 (See R A F. I (I) 102)**Pay of airmen acting in higher rank**

The following rules are promulgated for information and guidance —

1 Immediate steps will be taken to fill all vacancies occurring in establishments but should the necessity arise for the employment of an airman on the duties of a higher rank pending the arrival of a relief, the airman in question will be allowed to draw the minimum pay and allowances of the higher rank under the conditions laid down in paragraphs 3 and 5 for a period not exceeding 42 days in cases in India (the Air Ministry have fixed different periods for different areas) or until the airman who succeeds to the vacancy assumes the duty and begins to draw the pay, should he do so prior to the expiration of this period

2 Payment will only be made on the authority of the Air Officer Commanding area or force abroad, and all applications for this authority are to be accompanied by a statement showing—

- (i) The vacancy on the establishment in which the man has been acting, and the steps taken to fill such vacancy
- (ii) The rank and trade of the man concerned.
- (iii) The trade of the higher rank in which the duties have been performed

A certificate should also be furnished to the effect that the man's general conduct and performance of the duties are satisfactory

3 The provisions of this order do not apply where the higher rank concerned is lower than that of non-commissioned officer (e.g., no payment can be allowed where an aircraftman, 2nd or 1st class, acts in a vacancy for leading aircraftman), nor in any case should application be made for payment at a rate higher than that of the rank immediately above the substantive rank which the airman may hold, irrespective of the actual vacancy which he may fill (e.g., a corporal acting in a vacancy for a flight serjeant would be allowed to draw the minimum pay of a serjeant only, with appropriate allowances)

4 The higher rate of pay is not admissible in the case of a Serjeant-Major II performing the duties of a Serjeant-Major I

5 In no case will a non-commissioned officer be paid for performing the duties of a warrant officer Upon a vacancy for a

4 The case of any airman below the rank of serjeant who is considered by the officer commanding unit as being inefficient at his trade will be reported fully to the general officer commanding who will cause the airman to be examined by a board. On receipt of the board's report the general officer commanding will either remuster the airman to the group and trade for which he is considered most suitable, or reduce him in rank or to a lower classification in the ranks. Where an aircraftman 2nd Class is not considered suitable for remustering the case will be submitted to the Air Ministry with a view to approval being obtained for his discharge.

In the case of flight serjeants and serjeants it is for the general officer commanding to decide, in the event of the board reporting adversely, (a) whether he will reduce the non commissioned officer in rank for inefficiency under paragraph 282 A K R & O, Royal Air Force, and retain him in his present group and trade, or (b) to remuster him to another trade in his existing rank.

In the case of warrant officers, the general officer commanding will cause the warrant officer to be examined by a board, the proceedings of which will be submitted by the general officer commanding together with (1) his opinion of the case, (2) the service documents of the warrant officer, to the Secretary (D of P), Air Ministry, Kingsway, W C 2, for decision.

4 The case of any warrant officer, non commissioned officer or man who is considered by the officer commanding unit as being inefficient at his trade or in his rank will be reported fully to the air officer commanding who will cause the airman to be examined by a board. On receipt of the board's report the air officer commanding will decide, in the event of the board reporting adversely—

- (a) whether he will submit the case to the Air Ministry or one for reduction in rank, or to a lower classification in the ranks for inefficiency under paragraph 2S2A, 2S2B Regulations, and retain him in his present group and trade, or
- (b) to recommend to the Air Ministry that he should be remustered to another trade in which he is qualified and considered suitable in his existing rank if a vacancy exists

5 In case of inefficiency to perform duties particulars of such inefficiency will be furnished to be clearly distinguished from misconduct.

Training and Remustering of Semi-skilled Airmen.

1 Recruits who on trade test fail to attain the required standard for entry in Groups I, II, III but who obtain 25 per cent on trade test are to be informed that if they accept entry in Group V (*vide* Weekly Order No 908 of 1919) they will be given every opportunity to improve their position whilst in the service

2 Such men are to have an entry made in their certificate of service F S Form 280 in the space for "Classes of Instruction, etc" to the following effect—"to be trained as fitter" or whatever trade the man has qualified on trade test

3 (i) On being posted to a unit the commanding officer is responsible that any airman whose certificate of service is so marked is placed under a skilled airman of the appropriate trade for instruction

(ii) If, for any reason it is impossible to place an airman so that he can receive proper instruction, the commanding officer will report the fact to the area or group commander, who will take the necessary step to have the man posted to a unit where he can receive instruction

4 Commanding officers are to forward on the first day of each month to the area or group commander a return showing number, name rank trade to be trained as, date of enlistment, and date of arrival at unit, of all airmen who have the notification "to be trained as" in their certificate of service Unit commanders will also show those who have successfully qualified for remustering in the past month, and those who are recommended for examination and are willing to sit

5 Pending other arrangements being made for men's technical training, area and independent group commanders will appoint a board composed of one squadron leader and two other officers with good technical knowledge to examine men who are willing to sit for examination and who are recommended by their unit commander for remustering to a higher trade group

Note—A standard of trade test will be published shortly for the guidance of examining officers

6 (i) The result of all examinations will be shown in Part II Orders, and will also be entered in the certificate of the loose leaf ledger at the Records Office.

7 Air Officers Commanding and officers in command of independent groups are to cause periodical inspection of 'the certificate of service' to ensure that all airmen who have the entry "to be trained as" in the certificate of service are receiving proper instruction and given every encouragement to qualify for remustering

8 In the event of an airman failing to pass the examination, he is to be given a further opportunity of qualifying within six months. Should he fail to pass within this period the entry "to be trained as" is to be ruled through and initialed by the commanding officer

9 An airman will not be considered eligible for examination and the notification 'to be trained as' is to be ruled through if he does not sit for examination within 12 months of commencing training, unless he has been absent through sickness when the case is to be referred to the area or group commander for decision

10 Airmen who are marked 'to be trained as' are to be retained at the unit to which they are first posted for a period of 12 months if not qualified for remustering within this period, except in the cases of those transferred under paragraph 3 (ii) of this Order and those detailed to attend a course at any technical training centre which may be formed in due course

11 Those airmen who entered the Royal Air Force prior to the date of this Order as aircraft hands but who from their trade test result would have had their certificates endorsed as laid down in paragraph 2 above if this Order had been in force are to have the entry made forthwith. The Officer in Charge Records is to inform the commanding officers concerned of any airmen entitled to this entry. Commanding officers will then deal with them as laid down in the above paragraph

2 Learners who were enlisted prior to 18th September 1919 as such, are to be remustered to group V, and classified as aircraft hand, followed by the trade they are learning, e.g., "Aircraft hand, photographic learner"

3 When the learners are fully qualified and able to pass the entry trade test for their trade, they are to be remustered to that trade and placed in the appropriate group. This remustering will be carried out under paragraph 1 of Weekly Order 918 of 1919, sub paragraph (a) not being regarded as applicable in the case of learners

4 Pending the issue of the revised entry trade tests, application should be made to the Officer in Charge, Records Detachment, Halton Camp, for the appropriate test when the action, as in paragraph 3 above, becomes necessary

5 Learners enlisted after 18th September 1919, will be dealt with under Weekly Order 1054 of 1919

7 The trade classification fitter (torpedo) has been added to the trades in Group I

8 The required qualifications, etc., for the trades referred to in paragraph 1 (a), (b) and (c), and paragraph 3, are as follows —

- Electrician (compass setter and repairer), Group I Basic knowledge of fitting and turning. Capable of carrying out armature winding, magneto repairs, dynamo repairs, turning and machining of electrical parts. Must possess a sound working knowledge of lighting and power plants, and a sound knowledge of the principles of electricity and magnetism.
- Electrician, Group II Must possess the qualifications equivalent to those required of a switchboard attendant in a power house, and must also be a qualified wireman and telephone linesman.
- Instrument maker, Group I Considerable manual dexterity both as a fitter and turner and capable of manufacturing instruments including cameras and be capable of manufacturing and repairing simple metal parts for replacement. Must be capable of making elementary drawings of parts.
- Instrument repairer, Group II Must be capable of stripping and re-assembling all Royal Air Force instruments and of replacing defective parts by spares. Must be capable of diagnosing faults in instruments, and of repairing them but is not required to manufacture parts for replacement purposes.

APPENDIX A

GOOD CONDUCT BADGES AND PAY

(C 95374)

1. *Number and Date of Award.*

Badges for good conduct not exceeding three in number are to be conferred on airmen entitled to hold them

All airmen granted badges are entitled to the good conduct pay attached to them

Badges are to be granted with effect from the date they become due whether the airman applies for the award or not

2. *Good Conduct Pay*

Airmen (warrant officers, 2nd class non-commissioned officers and men) serving on ordinary engagements on whom good conduct badges have been conferred under these Regulations are entitled to the following allowance in addition to their full pay so long as they retain such badges :—

For each good conduct badge, 3d. per diem

(It should be noted that these regulations do not apply to warrant officers, Class I)

3. *Qualifying Service*

The following periods of service will be required to qualify for the award of a badge —

For one badge	3 years
For two badges	8 "
For three badges	13 "

The whole of an airman's service in the Royal Air Force, provided that the individual airman was serving on an ordinary engagement on the 1st August, 1919, or has since entered into such engagement, may be counted as qualifying service

Airmen duly transferred from the Royal Navy, Royal Marines or Army under the Air Force (Constitution) Act, 1917, on the 1st April 1918, or at any later date, may similarly count as qualifying service in the Royal Air Force any service in the Royal Navy or Royal Marines which counts for badge purposes under Naval Regulations, or any qualifying service for pension on an Army engagement after attaining the age of 18 years, provided that such service has been continuous.

The foregoing is subject to the following exceptions —

- (a) Service before attaining the age of 18 years
- (b) Three months for each entry made in the Service Conduct Sheet
- (c) Service for which "Indifferent" is the highest character admissible under paragraph 415
- (d) Service forfeited under paragraph 273 for desertion or fraudulent enlistment, unless and until such service is restored
- (e) Service prior to absence from the forces for five years or more, except as provided in the case of men discharged on medical grounds
- (f) Time for which pay is not allowed, for example, time forfeited through imprisonment, detention or civil custody followed by conviction, on account of time in hospital, etc, when pay is inadmissible, or during which a man has been out of the service for any cause

See also paragraphs 5 and 12 below.

4 Two years' "Very Good Conduct"

(i) During the two years of actual service in receipt of pay immediately preceding the award of a badge a man must not have incurred an entry on his Service Conduct Sheet, excluding awards of confinement to barracks not exceeding 10 days and stoppage of smoking on board ship, and he must have conducted himself with sobriety, activity, and attention. During this period his conduct in the opinion of his officer commanding must also have been uninterruptedly very good.

(ii) A second or third badge is not to be awarded unless the man has qualified himself, as above, during the two years of actual service in receipt of pay immediately preceding its award, and has been in continuous possession of the preceding badge during this period. Two or more badges, however, may be awarded together or at less intervals than two years on account of service restored subsequently to forfeiture for desertion or fraudulent enlistment.

(iii) *Method of Reckoning* — The two years with continuous very good conduct required by paragraph 4 (i) is to be reckoned without reference to "V G." or other assessed character on the Certificate of Service except "Indifferent." For example, the latter part of a year for which "V G.", "Good" or "Fair" is awarded may be counted, but although a man may have been given "V G." character for two years it is within the discretion of the officer commanding his unit to disallow any part of this time

served under his command, a higher standard of conduct being required for good conduct badges than for the 'V G' character

(17) In the case of a man who joins from another unit, "Very Good" time for badge purposes is to be reckoned from the date entered on his Conduct Sheet

Note—In reckoning service towards badges, care should be taken that the same period of time forfeited is not deducted more than once, for example, under "Detention" and "Indifferent" character

5. *Navy or Army Service*

(i) Airmen who, with not less than five years of discharge from the Navy or Army, enlist in the Royal Air Force and acknowledge their former service, will be allowed to reckon towards the acquisition of Air Force Badges any "Very Good" service after attaining the age of 18 years which counted towards pension in either of the above forces but in no case exceeding four years, provided that such service was continuous and immediately preceded their discharge

(ii) Airmen discharged on medical grounds from the Navy or Army who are allowed to enter the Royal Air Force may only be allowed to reckon their former service on the authority of the Air Council

6. *Forfeiture and Deprivation*

(i) *Desertion and Fraudulent Enlistment*—An airman found guilty of desertion or fraudulent enlistment forfeits all badges and past service for the purposes of the award or restoration of badges

(ii) *Convictions by the Civil Power*—Should the offence be one that has brought disgrace or discredit on the uniform, the service, or the position which the offender holds, he may be deprived of one or more good conduct badges, if recommended by the officer commanding his unit and approved by an officer not below the rank of group captain

(iii) *Consequent Penalties*—A sentence of imprisonment, field punishment, or detention, or reduction for misconduct, whether awarded summarily or by court-martial, shall carry with it in all cases deprivation of all good conduct badges

(iv) A conviction by court-martial, or an order dispensing with the trial, which entails forfeiture of former service towards engagement shall also entail forfeiture of badges

(v) Deprivation of one or more good conduct badges may be ordered by a General Court Martial or District Court Martial

(vi) The authority of an officer not below the rank of group captain is required for the deprivation of a good conduct badge, or badges except as provided in sub paragraph (v)

(vii) In exceptional cases, however delegated authority may be given abroad for deprivation of badges to an officer below the rank of group captain when such an officer is in command of a detached force or unit operating independently. This authority will only be given by the Air Council or an Air Officer Commanding abroad (Including the Air Officer Commanding in India)

7 Restoration

(i) One badge lost under these regulations may be regained by six months of continuous very good conduct, and additional badges by further periods of six months reckoned in each case from the date of the preceding restoration

(ii) If, however, a man has forfeited or has been sentenced to deprivation a second time within three years, the qualification is twelve months for the first restoration and six months for each subsequent restoration

(iii) The period of very good conduct qualifying for the restoration of a badge is to be reckoned in the same way as the two years of very good conduct that must precede an award (See paragraph 4)

(iv) The following time is not to be reckoned towards the award of restoration of badges —

- (a) Service for which pay is not allowed
- (b) Three months for each entry made in the Service Conduct Sheet
- (c) Service for which "Indifferent" is the highest character admissible under paragraph 415.

(e) Restorations are to be made with effect from the date they become due, whether the man prefers his claim or not

8 Reserves when called out by Royal Proclamation or undergoing Training

(i) May wear the same number of badges and receive the same good conduct pay as when transferred to the Reserve, without reference to the time that may have elapsed since they last served

(ii) Should any such reservist when called out by Royal Proclamation not have been in possession of three good conduct badges when transferred to the Reserve, his previous service towards a further badge will be allowed to reckon in accordance with the foregoing paragraphs

(iii) Periods of training while in the Reserve will not count as service for the purposes of the award or restoration of good conduct badges.

9 *Good Conduct Badge Awards*

Awards and restorations of good conduct badges are to be made only by an officer not below the rank of group captain and are to be accepted as final, being subject only to revision under the authority of the Air Ministry [See Note (1)]

10 *Newly enlisted men, information to be given*

Newly enlisted men are to be informed of the conditions governing the award, restoration, and forfeiture of good conduct badges.

11 *Airmen rejoining within five years*

Airmen who rejoin the Air Force within five years of their discharge are to resume the good conduct badges, and the position in regard to further badges, which they held when they quitted the service.

12 *Re entry after discharge on medical grounds*

Airmen who are allowed to re-enlist in the Royal Air Force after having been previously discharged on medical grounds may only be allowed to resume their former badges and to count former service for badge purposes on the authority of the Air Council.

13 *Deserters and others*

(i)—(a) recovered deserters, unless the forfeited service is restored,

(b) airmen who rejoin after being out of the service for five years or any longer period,

(c) airmen allowed to re-enlist having been previously discharged for misconduct,

are to be considered in respect of the award of badges as though they had never previously served.

(ii) In the case of a recovered deserter, where forfeited service is restored, any badges forfeited in consequence of desertion and any further badges for which the man may be eligible according to his total service may be granted from the date of the order for the restoration of the former service as though the same had never been forfeited.

(iii) In the case of an airman found guilty of fraudulent enlistment, where any portion of forfeited service is restored, badges to which such restoration may entitle him, and any fur

badges for which the airman may be eligible according to his total qualifying service may be granted from the date of the order for the restoration of the former service, or part thereof, as though the same had never been forfeited

14. Procedure for Award and Restoration of Badges

(1) Upon an airman becoming eligible for the award of restoration of a badge or badges, Form 457 will be prepared by the officer commanding the unit in which the airman is serving, and will then be transmitted through the usual channels, accompanied by the airman's service documents, to the group captain or air officer under whom the unit is serving

(2) When Form 457 is received back by the officer commanding the unit, he will promulgate in his Part II Orders with the designation of the badge or restoration will be recorded on the lower portion of page 4 of the airman's certificate of service, and the Form 457 will be immediately despatched to the Officer in-charge, Records, R A F, for custody

10 These regulations do not confer any right to an addition to pension in respect of good conduct badges and pay

Note—(1) Awards in respect of service up to and including 31st December 1920 will be dealt with in accordance with the special procedure laid down in Air Ministry Weekly Orders, subsequent awards will be dealt with in accordance with paragraph (9)

ANNEXURE I TO APPENDIX A

GOOD CONDUCT BADGES—PROCEDURE FOR AWARDS.

1 The following procedure will be followed for the first awards of Good Conduct Badges under Appendix VIII to King's Regulations

2 Officers Commanding units will prepare Form 457 in duplicate. Each badge to which an airman is entitled will be entered separately and the date of entitlement will be shown in column 5. The entitlement and date thereof will be ascertained from the following documents —

(a) In the case of Ex-Naval (including R. N. A. S. and R. N.) Ratings —

Naval service certificate
R. A. F. certificate of service.
R. A. F. conduct sheets

(b) In the case of Ex Soldiers (including R. F. C.)—

Original or duplicate attestation
Army Form B 103 or Form 103
Army and R. A. F. conduct sheets
R. A. F. certificate of service.

3 Form 457 (in duplicate) when completed will be submitted to the Headquarters, R. A. F., India, accompanied by the airman's documents referred to in paragraph 2 above. The Air Officer Commanding will, provided that the claims are in order, approve the award, enter the date of approval in column 6, return one copy of the form to the unit, and forward one copy to the Officer-in-charge, Records, Blandford, with the documents.

4 Upon receipt of the form from Headquarters, R. A. F., India, the officer commanding the unit will award the badges and issue the pay (3*d* a badge per day) *with effect from the date of the approval of the Air Officer Commanding* and will promulgate the award in his Part II Orders, indicating the date from which pay is being issued, e.g. :—

Good Conduct Badges

2468-Sgt (Fitter A T.) Smith, A., awarded 1st and 2 G C Badge with effect 1st August 1919. Pay issued from November 1920

(See also appendix to this Order)

5 The Officer in charge, Records, will verify all provisional awards as recorded on Form 457 received by him from the Headquarters R F A, India, and will pass these to the Fixed Centre Disbursing Officer for concurrence and insertion in the forms of the amount of the arrears of badge pay due. The forms will then be returned to the Officer-in charge, Records, who will promulgate in his Part II Orders the awards, showing the date of effect, when he has confirmed them, and the amount of the arrears due. On receipt of these Part II Orders, officers commanding may then issue the arrears of badge pay to which airmen may be entitled, and will record the awards in the airmen's certificates of services as laid down in paragraph 8 below.

Officers commanding, when issuing these arrears of pay to airmen, should have regard to any debit balance on their accounts.

6 *Cases where units have insufficient documents to assess date of entitlement*—If there is not sufficient documentary evidence in the unit to allow the date of entitlement to be arrived at, the officer commanding the unit will prepare Form 457, columns 1 to 3, and will forward it, accompanied by any of the documents referred to in paragraph 2 above to the Officer in charge, Records, Blandford. That officer will enter in column 5 the earliest date on which the badge can be awarded, and will promulgate a Part II Order as follows —

G C Badge Service —

2367 Sgt (Carpenter), Brown, T, completed qualifying service for 1st and 2nd Badge on 1st August 1919 and 5th February 1920 respectively

The Officer-in charge, Records, will return the form and documents to the officer commanding the unit, who will then take action as laid down in paragraphs 3 and 4 of this Order, with the exception that, having received the approval of the Air Officer Commanding for the awards, he will issue pay as from the effective date of the badge or badges, and will promulgate the awards in his Part II Orders in the following manner —

G C Badges

2367 Sgt (Carpenter), Brown, T, awarded 1st G C Badge with effect 1st August 1919

Awarded 2nd G C Badge with effect 5th February 1920

Authority A O C, R A F, India Records D R O 832, dated 3rd April 1920

7 In no case can the effective date of a badge be prior to 1st August 1919

8 *Certificate of Service*—All badges awarded will be noted on the certificate of service. The notations will be made on page 2 (Medical Boards column) of the certificate of service in the following manner, *e g*—

Part II Order dated 23rd April 1920. 1st G C B. awarded 1st August 1919

9 Whenever documents are being transmitted in accordance with the instructions contained in this Order the envelope is to be clearly marked in the bottom left hand corner—

“GOOD CONDUCT BADGES”

APPENDIX TO ANNEXURE I

Cash Issues

1 The intention of paragraphs 4 and 5 of the above Order is that cash issues in respect of good conduct pay should begin *currently* as from 12th November 1920, pending confirmation of the rate and of the date from which *arrear* issues (if any) are due. On confirmation from the Record Office the arrears can then be issued.

2 As regards current cash issue of good conduct pay from 12th November 1920 no difficulty arises in the case of men who are on the new rates of pay. In the case of men continuing to draw a previous rate of pay as a vested right [*see* Section II of R A F Instruction (India)] the officer commanding will take into account—

- (a) on the one hand the vested right rate, including “war pay” (issuable under Army Regulations for certain men from the R I C until further notice), and
- (b) on the other hand the new normal rate of pay of the man, *plus* good conduct pay and non substantive pay, if any.

Of these two totals (a) and (b), the greater may be given for such men as have a vested right to the old rate, if higher. This rule is subject to the provisions of paragraph 7 of this Instruction

3. As regards arrears from 1st August 1919, airmen who have been continuing to draw a higher rate of pay (*i.e.*, old rate of pay *plus* war bonus) than that of their rank and group under the new scheme will only draw, as arrears, the amount by which their old rate *plus* war bonus falls short of their new rate *plus* good conduct pay. This is subject to the provisions of paragraph 7 of this Instruction. If any airman has drawn non-substantive pay in addition to his old rate, that non-substantive pay will be taken into account in both sides of this comparison.

ANNEXURE II TO APPENDIX A

GOOD CONDUCT BADGES

With a view to removing hardship in cases where aviators have been awarded relatively minor punishments during the war, the following purely temporary modifications in the sub paragraphs of Appendix A shown below are approved. These temporary modifications had effect only as between the date 4th August 1917 and 1st August 1920.

Sub paragraph 3 (b) and 7 (1st b) — Entries in respect of awards by the commanding officer under Section 46 of the Air Force Act of Field Punishment No 2 of seven days or less, or of forfeiture of pay for seven days or less will not entail a loss of three months for each entry necessitated in the service conduct sheet as a result of these punishments.

Sub paragraph 6 (1st) — The summary award of Field Punishment No 2 for seven days or less shall carry with it no deprivation of badges.

Sub paragraph 4 (i) — The award by a commanding officer under Section 46 of the Air Force Act of Field Punishment No 2 of seven days or less or of forfeiture of pay for seven days or less shall not be regarded as service entries for the purpose of the two years very good conduct required by this paragraph.

Commanding officers empowered to make these awards should in future carefully consider the effect of the summary award of Field Punishment No 2 or of forfeiture of pay, having regard to the regulations governing the award, forfeiture and restoration of Good Conduct Badges.

920 —Officers—Increases of Pay for Length of Service

(274949/20)

1 The following decisions are promulgated with regard to the service which may be counted towards increases of pay due under the new scales of pay for officers of the Royal Air Force in respect of length of service in a rank.

2 It should be clearly understood that these decisions, so far as they allow service other than service in the Royal Air Force to count towards increases of Royal Air Force pay, are applicable only to officers serving in the Royal Air Force at the date of this Order and to officers demobilized or otherwise dispersed from the Royal Air Force who may at a later date be brought back for a further period of service on the active list. In future the rule will be that only service in the Royal Air Force will count towards increase of Royal Air Force pay.

3 Full pay service in the substantive rank or equivalent substantive rank will be allowed to count, whether rendered in the Royal Air Force, or in the Royal Navy (or Royal Marines) or the Army, and whether on temporary or permanent commission, and (except as provided in paragraphs 4 and 5 below) irrespective of the branch or arm of the service in question. For example any full pay service in the substantive rank of major in the Army will be counted towards increase of pay as squadron leader, and no distinction will be made for this purpose between say, the executive and the accountant branches of the Royal Navy.

4 Service other than commissioned service as chaplain in the Royal Navy, the Army or the Royal Air Force will not count towards increase of pay as chaplain in the Royal Air Force.

5 Service other than commissioned service as medical officer in the Royal Navy, the Army, or the Royal Air Force will not count towards increase of pay as medical officer in the Royal Air Force.

6 Service in temporary, acting or honorary ranks, including service on *pro forma* commissions, will not be reckoned towards increase of Royal Air Force pay, except as provided in paragraph 7 below

7 As an exception to the general rule, stated in the preceding paragraph, service in an honorary rank in the Royal Air Force will be counted towards increase of pay, in the case of an officer promoted to that rank when attained, in the case of an officer promoted to that rank on transfer to the Royal Air Force, provided that the corresponding substantive rank in his parent service was held by him up to that date, and that honorary rank was held by him continuously from 1st April 1918, to the date of his promotion to the corresponding substantive rank in the Royal Air Force

8 In the event of an officer being granted leave without pay the period of such leave will not reckon as service towards increase of pay or other emolument

9 The period of any absence without leave is forfeited for all purposes connected with pay

10 An officer lent or seconded for extra Royal Air Force service will count the period of such service towards increase of pay on return to full pay service in the Royal Air Force, provided the service for which he is lent or seconded is military or quasi-military employment. If it is civil employment the period will not count towards increase of pay. Quasi-military employment is such as, in the opinion of the Air Council, is clearly of a nature to afford practical experience likely to be afterwards of advantage in Royal Air Force service

11 Time on the half pay list of the Royal Air Force will be counted in full, in the same manner and to the same extent as full pay service, for purposes of increase of pay, no distinction being made in this respect between half-pay, scale A, and half pay, scale B

12 An officer who has been attending a University course on which his pay is not drawn, and who, if the course had been suspended, will be entitled to reckon towards increase of pay the periods for which

13 An officer sentenced by court martial, or by an officer having power to deal summarily with the case, to forfeiture of seniority of rank, will not be allowed to reckon towards increase of pay the period of service between his old and his new date of seniority in the Gradation List. Loss of seniority may thus be accompanied by an immediate reduction of pay.
