

Willie Smith (golfer)

Willie Smith (8 October 1876 – 26 December 1916) was a <u>Scottish</u> golfer. He won the 1899 U.S. Open.

Early life

Willie Smith was born in <u>Dundee</u>, <u>Scotland</u> on 8 October 1876. He learned to play golf in <u>Carnoustie</u>. His brothers <u>Alex</u> and <u>Macdonald</u> were also expert golfers.

Golf career

1899 U.S. Open

Smith worked as a club professional at Midlothian Country Club, near <u>Chicago</u>, in his early adulthood. During this time he won the <u>1899 U.S. Open</u>, played at <u>Baltimore Country Club</u>'s Roland Park Course. He won by a margin of eleven shots. This record wasn't broken during the entire 20th century and wasn't surpassed until <u>Tiger Woods</u> won the <u>2000 championship</u> by fifteen shots. Smith's prize was \$150. He played in nine U.S. Opens in total, and made the top-10 in eight of them, but he did not win again.

Western Open and California State Open

In 1899, Smith won the first <u>Western Open</u> in a playoff against <u>Laurie Auchterlonie</u>. He also won the 1900 <u>California State Open</u>.

Later life

In 1904, Smith moved to <u>Mexico City</u> to become the golf pro at the Mexico City Country Club. He was injured during the <u>Mexican Revolution</u>. He had refused to leave his post at the country club and was found trapped under a fallen beam after <u>Emiliano Zapata</u>'s troops ransacked the club which they saw as a symbol of the corrupt ruling class. with designing a new course, the <u>Club de Golf Chapultepec</u>, however due to his death it was completed by his brother <u>Alex Smith</u>. It has hosted the Mexican Open multiple times, and the WGC-Mexico Championship since 2017. [4][5]

Death

He died of pneumonia on 26 December 1916. [6][7] His body was returned to Scotland for burial in the family plot.
