

INTRODUCTION.

The present volume—third of the series of this calendar of the American MSS. in the Royal Institution—covers a period of nine months, namely, from July, 1782, to March, 1783, leaving material sufficient for one more volume to complete the whole of these manuscripts, which extend to the close of the year 1783.

Sir Henry Clinton having returned to England, was succeeded in New York, as shown towards the end of Volume II., by Sir Guy Carleton, afterwards Lord Dorchester, who had previously served as governor and commander-in-chief in Canada from 1768 to 1778. Like his predecessor, Sir Guy held, together with his powers as commander-in-chief, the authority to act with Admiral Digby as Commissioner for restoring Peace. Before leaving England he was acquainted with the negotiations for peace opened by Lord Shelburne upon his appointment as Secretary of State, and though on the first of the month of which this volume opens, the death of the Marquis of Rockingham had closed that short administration, yet, Lord Shelburne being placed at the head of affairs, the negotiations proceeded with but little interruption. The military events belonging to these dates are therefore few, but the details of this concluding period of the British occupation of their late colonies are not without interest.

One of the first papers is a state of the army under Sir Guy Carleton, giving the total of the effectives as 34,529. An attack by a party of Americans on Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, in the month of July, is entered on page 305, and, on page 157, is described the attack by Indians on General Wayne's camp on the outskirts of Savannah, though that event actually took place in June. The skirmish in South Carolina in which the American Colonel Laurens was fatally wounded is also mentioned, (p. 110). The arrival of the French fleet at Boston and the movements of the armies of Washington and Rochambeau, though not specifically stated, are probably the foundation of the opinion given at New York by General Lossberg in October as to the danger of attack (p. 162), and later of the dispositions and minute regulations given by General Robertson for the troops in case of such an event (p. 260).

The evacuation of Savannah took place in July, under a parting protest from Governor Sir James Wright (p. 11). That of Charlestown was next proceeded with and took much

longer to accomplish, the correspondence with General Leslie, who was in command there, continuing to the month of December. The artillery and ordnance stores were sent to Halifax, while most of the troops were distributed in the West Indies, East Florida, Halifax or New York. The decision to retain East Florida an asylum for the loyalists induced a great number of these with their slaves to remove thither, *see* the correspondence with Lt. Col. McArthur and Governor Tonyn at St. Augustine. Many other loyal inhabitants went to Jamaica and a few hundreds to Nova Scotia.

On the 20th December Carleton writes:—The evacuation of this place (New York) is to commence as soon as possible.

It was decided that Halifax should be put in the best state of defence and in his letter of the 9th September to Major Gen. Paterson (p. 110), the commander-in-chief intimates that the whole reinforcement of the year was to remain in Nova Scotia. To that province came the civil governor—John Parr—in October, and the correspondence and arrangements as to providing lands, shelter, and provisions for the loyalists, disbanded troops, and others arriving there, continue to the end of these papers. The “troublesome post” of Penobscot, as Washington calls it, was also retained for the time being.

The payment of the various provincial regiments by warrants issued every two months to their own paymasters is explained by Mr. Morgann, secretary to Carleton, as a method introduced by Sir Guy on his arrival (p. 158). Three of these American regiments were placed on the British establishment from December, 1782, viz., the Queen’s Rangers under Lt. Col. John Graves Simcoe, the King’s American Regiment under Col. Edmund Fanning, and the cavalry of the British Legion commanded by Lt. Col. Tarleton.

Delays and difficulties thrown in the way of exchange of prisoners are remarked on in another letter from Mr. Morgann to Commissioner Elliot (p. 129). The prisoners which remained of the Troops of the Convention of Saratoga had actually been in captivity since the year 1777. Papers in the months of December, 1782, and January, February, and March, 1783, describe the sending out from Headquarters of supplies of clothing, money, and other necessaries, conveyed under pass-port by Captain Armstrong and Major Gordon to the various prisoners—British, German, and Provincial—in Pennsylvania, Maryland and Virginia, and the seizure and detention of some of these supplies *en route*. The action of the Spaniards towards the prisoners taken in the capture of Pensacola and West Florida calls forth a very angry letter from Major Campbell, *see* page 22. Depositions of Germans show the efforts made to induce them to become American settlers (pp. 314, 407). A letter from Lord Cornwallis regarding his personal exchange may be noted, as well as some papers relating to the release of Capt. Asgill.

Of the unscrupulousness of army contractors a glimpse is given on page 43, in the destruction of certain barrels of flour which consisted of "sweepings of storehouses and bake-houses, rags, paper and old hats."

Some private bills of the commander-in-chief for groceries, haberdashery, etc., show incidentally the prices of such articles at the time in New York.

The situation in the West Indies seems an anxious one for the various commanders, naval and military, in view of the movements of the combined French and Spanish forces at Hispaniola, and of the known fact that while the negotiations for peace with both countries were being conducted in Paris, an expedition was in preparation at Cadiz of which the French Admiral—Comte D'Estaing—was to take command. On the 24th March, however, the French minister at Philadelphia communicates to Sir Guy Carleton his official news of the signing of the preliminaries on the 20th January and consequent cessation of hostilities (p. 414).

A few papers at the end of the book may be pointed out as showing the exertions of Lt. Col. Thompson, better known as Count Rumford. In August, 1782, he had been publicly thanked in General Orders for completing the King's American Dragoons (p. 97). At the end of March the papers referred to include a scheme to attach four companies of light infantry to that regiment, as well as plans for the raising of a corps of volunteers from the disbanding Provincial forces to serve in the West Indies.

This volume, like the preceding ones, has been seen through the press by Mr. Henry J. Brown.

MAJ. GEN. EDWARD MATHEW to SIR GUY CARLETON.

1782, July 2. Antigua.—Acknowledges letter by Maj. Nesbitt. The corps under Gen. O'Hara, consisting of the 19th and 30th Regiments, arrived on 24 June last, on its way to Jamaica. The season being so far advanced and Jamaica appearing from the successful action of 12 April to be in perfect security and the troops most exceedingly wanted here, took upon himself to detain them, and has added them, for the present, to the garrison of St. Lucia; they have sailed to-day for that place. Gives extract from Shelburne's letter to him, authorising him in case of the arrival of any troops from N. America to detain them, also that he (Sir Guy) had orders to assist with reinforcements from his army. The French since 12 April have sent back some of their troops to their former stations to windward and have strengthened Brimstone Hill, and as the re-possession of St. Christopher appears to be a principal object with the administration, encloses extract of his last letter to Shelburne stating his reasons for not attempting it. Submits for consideration the sending what troops can be spared to put him in a state to act offensively and that they could proceed from New York to arrive in November at St. Lucia; would also be glad to have more ordnance if possible. Has adopted his Excellency's plan, and appointed a commissary, Henry White, of New York, to transact all business that may occur in North America relative to the army under his command. Captain Bibby will deliver this. Sends a cypher.

1782, July 3. New York.—"Your letter of the 18th April . . . addressed to Genl. Campbell, has been placed in my hands. Since which, I have also received two letters of your Excellency's"

Your Excellency will observe by the inclosed receipts, some slight difference between the number of prisoners intended to be sent, and those actually received, which your Commissary of Exchange will doubtless set right.

Upon the subject of exchanges, and of the detention of Major Campbell and Captn. Deans of the Navy, as Hostages, I had received in May last a letter from His Excellency Genl. Galvez, dated 30th December 1781. In his opinions upon

these subjects I cou'd not concur, but I referred the whole to that generosity by which your national character has been always marked, assuring him, as I now assure your Excellency, of every attention on my part towards the subjects of Spain, and so far as it depends upon me, I shall preserve that intercourse of good will and regard between the subjects of two nations, which no course of open war has hitherto been able to destroy. With this disposition of mind, I shall represent with frankness, that it has been inconvenient to the officers, whose regiments are in Jamaica, to be sent here, and as their transmission to this or that place, seems to be of no public moment, I therefore hope, Sir, that in future exchanges those private considerations may be mutually attended to.

I am further to acquaint your Excellency, that those officers, whose corps were in Jamaica, have frequently applied to be conveyed thither in Flags which were often passing, and that two officers whose men have been brought here in the Flags have themselves been sent to Bermudas, circumstances with which it is probable your Excellency has not been made acquainted."

He says much about peace, religious & Christian duties having been educated and ordained a minister at Dartmouth College in New England, a place famous for the true spirit of canting and zeal in the cause of rebellion; he has been preaching to the Stockbridge and other Indians more immediately under the care of Mr. Kirkland who was educated under the same pious masters, and who by his unwearied endeavours got the Oneida Indians, to join the rebels, neither of these people being able to come at the salary allowed by the Society in Great Britain to Indian Missionarys Mr. Simons's principal business here is to find means of getting that or some other reward for what he calls his Christian labours, and having heard of the money given by the people of England to Whitaker *Wheelock* and the mohigan Indian preacher *Ocum*, under the pretence of their sole motive being the civilisation of the savages—he proposed to ask a passage to England there to solicit and get his salary fixed, also to endeavour to obtain other donations. I have put him of this at present being well assured it would occasion much trouble and no one good can arise from it,—

He says he hears the Oneida Indians have retired from amongst the inhabitants and gone back to their former settlement, that the Indians of Stockbridge and the New England tribes who were with the Rebels have quitted the service and are now at home and he thinks if the Commander in Chief sends a favourable message to them forgiving their former behaviour, they will remain at home, attend to their own affairs, and have nothing more to do with the Rebels notwithstanding Mr. Kirkland's endeavours to keep them in their service, who with many others have made them believe it was the Kings Troops from Detroit who murdered the moravian Indians on the Ohio.—I know several instances of kindness shewn by the Connecticut Indians, particularly the Nahautick Tribe, to His Majesty's persecuted subjects and believe any favourable report this man may make will have a good effect and I think the sooner he is dismissed the better. I will do myself the honor of calling upon you and if theres any other circumstance concerning him you wish to know will give the best information in my power, and am with great respect, &c.

LT. GEN. JOHN CAMPBELL to DON BERNARDO DE GALVEZ.

1782, July 17. New York.—A very angry letter caused by the communication of his (Galvez's) letter to Sir Henry Clinton dated 30 December last, and the language he has therein "indecently presumed to express." Conscious of rectitude he presents his conduct to the rigid test of a public investigation. "I have transmitted the correspondence in question with you Sir, to the Minister of my Sovereign. Have you done the same? If so, why disturb the Commander in Chief of these armys, or attempt to divert his attention from more important objects, by the intrusion of a subject, which was already left to the mutual and ultimate decision of the Courts of London and Madrid." Were the epoch of the assault on Pensacola to revolve he would repeat his conduct, and glories in recollecting that "the handfull of gallant and intrepid officers and men I had the happiness to command, resisted a multitude of foes (in the combined forces of France and Spain) in a manner that I leave to the chaste pen of a candid historian to relate. . .

I think it beneath me here to comment on the use you have made of that power [gained by the capitulation]. Let events, and the too often mentioned correspondence speak for themselves. I am above, & feel my conduct superior to expostulations. And I here declare, that with respect to personal considerations, I consider myself & my reputation, so far above, & so much out of the reach of your ungenerous, & unbecoming reflections, that as a private gentleman, I would have treated your last letter with a disregardfull & contemptuous silence. But when I view myself as an officer holding a respectable rank in the service of my most gracious sovereign, and beloved country, I obey the impulse of a just resentment, at your unavailing effort, & impotent attempt to tarnish the lustre of the arms of Britain, & gloss the inconsistency of your own conduct in doing which you have stained your paper with language, I would blush at the thoughts of imitating, in retorting with similar illiberality on you.

It is with unexpressible satisfaction Sir, I now announce to you, that I am now no longer in your power, nor subject to the haughty & wanton caprices of your temper. By recent letters from Havannah & Jamaica, I have with real joy received authentick, & unequivocal intelligence, that conformable to the laws of nations, & of war, as well as to the first article of the capitulation, signed & ratified with

you (on the surrender of the garrison of Pensacola) on the 10th May 1781, the officers & soldiers, together with myself, the publick & staff officers composing that garrison, have been fairly & actually exchanged, by an equivalent of officers & men in the service of Spain (that had been captured and detained as prisoners of war to the British arms) being sent by the Governor & Commander in Chief of the Island of Jamaica, to the Havannah, & there received for the purpose of said exchange, by the Governor & Captain General &c of the Island of Cuba, and that transaction stamped with every necessary & conclusive sanction, agreeable to the honourable and liberal cartel settled & interchanged between their Excellencies the Governors of said Islands on the 18th November 1781.

I would wish . . . to avoid making any further mention to you of Major Campbell . . . I shudder at the accounts of cruelty being added to injustice in his confinement at Mobile, which as being one of the most unhealthy situations on earth, offers a probability he may there perish (and with him the power of that pen you seem so much to dread), and of representing the accumulated injuries that have been vindictively & illiberally heaped on him. Should he survive his maltreatment, his liberty & redress of his sufferings will be sought & expected from other powers than those you possess.

As it is utterly impossible that any thing you can ever say or do, will amount to an atonement for your conduct & behaviour towards me; and as from education and disposition, I am unaccustomed to a harshness of expression reluctantly forced from me by you, I hope our correspondence will here for ever finish, and as my service is now again called for, & devoted to my King & country, I never wish to meet you but in arms. I cannot however lay down my pen, without observing to you, that should the chance of war, in your turn ever place you a prisoner to the arms of Britain, & in my power (an event by no means unusual even in that career of conquest, & unequal advantages that seems to have intoxicated your imagination) you may rest assured that a liberal treatment, contrasted to that I have experienced from you, would in my humble opinion, be the deepest reproach, & the severest censure you could possibly meet with."

Closes with sincere testimony to the uncommon politeness and liberal treatment received from Don Manuel de Cagigal Governor of Cuba.

of March, I was induced from motives of various consideration to adopt the measure of sending them immediately to the Havana; in the number of which the expectation of being able to obtain some consequential intelligence of the strength and situation of the enemy's force at that place had much weight with me, which the then critical state of our affairs in that part of the world, and the invasion which threatened Jamaica had rendered an object of considerable importance.

In this view I made choice of Mr. Robert Ross, who embarked in the Flag of Truce which conveyed the Spaniards, with the temporary appointment of a Commissary of Prisoners for the purpose of adjusting the exchange. This Gentleman readily engaged in a design which from his connections with the Spaniards during his former residence on the Mississippi he was well qualified to execute. The uncommon ability with which this service has been performed, will in the perusal of the extensive and correct information which I have the honor herewith to enclose be manifest to Your Excellency, and render my praise superfluous—I embraced the opportunity of the Zebra sloop of war sailing from this port to the West Indies to transmit a copy of it to Sir George Rodney.

The relation which I also enclose of the situation of Captain James Campbell, I thought it my duty to procure, and to lay before Your Excellency; I have every confidence that a proceeding of so extraordinary a nature, thus coming Sir to your knowledge will not remain unredressed, and the pain with which I represent the unmerited sufferings of a British Officer is alleviated when I reflect that I address myself to Your Excellency. I have the honor to be, &c.''

Col. McArthur, from the knowledge I have of him, will be, if it can be contrived, the properest person to leave the command of that fort to.—From the late changes in the publick departments, I have reason to think, that application will be made to your Excellency, by Major General Dalrymple, for Capt. McKinnon, Deputy Quar. Masr. General Greene has moved his army opposite Ashley Ferry near Mathew's plantation. Thinks the amount of shipping required for evacuation of Charlestown cannot be estimated at less than 15 to 20,000 tons, and doubts if the total embarkation can be completed in less than four or five weeks. Has given leave to Lieutenant Colonels Balfour and Cruger and Captain Barry to proceed to New York to request Carleton's permission to return to Europe. Has appointed Lieutenant Colonel Allen of the New Jersey Volunteers to succeed Balfour as Commandant of Charlestown. P.S. Has learned that Greene has been joined by 300 new men under General Pickins; a number of boats have been collected on the Ashley, and the militia ordered to assemble. As it will not be possible to keep any number of them together at this season of the year he has probably some immediate attempt in meditation to which every possible attention will be given.

JOHN GRAHAME to SIR GUY CARLETON.

1782, July 20. Tyby in Georgia.—His Majesty having been graciously pleased to appoint me Superintendent of Indian Affairs for the Western Division of the Southern District in the room of Mr. Cameron deceased—I presume to address myself to your Excellency, and to request that I may be honored with your instructions as to the line of conduct which your Excellency may wish me to pursue, in respect to the different Nations of Indians within my district.

Above two hundred of the Chactaw Nation arrived in this Province in January last and have remained with the Garrison of Savannah ever since—they have upon every occasion shown themselves ready and willing to go upon service—and in every instance where they have been actually employed have behaved not only with spirit but with a degree of good order and regularity, not very common amongst savages, they are now embarked for East Florida, and having been absent from their Nation near twelve months—I shall send them home how soon they arrive.

I beg leave to observe to your Excellency that from the contiguity of the Chickesaw and Chactaw countrys to West Florida and the Mississipi, the Indians of those Nations have it at all times very much in their power to harrass the Spanish Settlements in that quarter, and indeed not only to break up the more remote ones altogether—but likewise to possess themselves of several of their outposts,—and I humbly apprehend a diversion of consequences may be made by them, should your Excellency think proper to give me orders to that purpose.

St. Augustine being now the only British post to the Southward from whence any communication can be kept up with the Indian Nations in our interest—I shall there wait your Excellency's orders—I have carried with me the few presents which remain undistributed—of which a fresh supply is very much wanted—letters from Lord Geo. Germain of the 7th Decembr mention that two different cargoes of such goods had been shipt for Pensacola for the use of my Department, but on the surrender of that garrison were stopt at Jamaica, and had been since ordered to New York—where if they should be arrived—I hope your Excellency will be pleased to give orders that they may be sent to me at Augustine.

If the Commanding Officer of his Majesty's Troops in East Florida should require of me—as necessary and essential to the King's service & the security of that Province; that I should order down a considerable body of Indians—I conceive it will be my duty so to do—but in obedience to late instructions signified by the Right Hble. Welbore Ellis Esqr. I shall persevere in restraining them from committing any acts of violence or from acting at all offensively, unless they should be ordered on detachment with the King's Troops."

"The command of the navigation of the River Delaware is of the utmost importance to the British Nation, both in peace and war, and the taking possession of it would be one great and decisive step towards terminating the American Rebellion. To do this effectually and permanently, it would be necessary to establish a respectable post between Philadelphia and the sea, on the banks of the River, whose guns could command the ship channel." Two points are proposed—one at the mouth of Christian Creek, the other at Reedy Island. Advantages of both these. The post of Reedy Island "would bring over to the British interest, a most valuable, extensive, and fertile tract of country, commonly called in Virginia and Maryland the Eastern Shore. . . . This country is well peopled, and besides tobacco produces abundance of wheat, Indian corn, oats, rye, with plenty of pasture and hay. So that were the British established either at Reedy Island or Christeen Creek in the Delaware, they could draw from it the same resources, as they do now from Long Island by possessing the lower parts of Hudson's River, the East River & Connecticut Sound, but much more abundantly, as Long Island is by no means so rich or fertile as the country above described whose inhabitants have already made many advances to come under the protection of the British Government, and have long wished

for the execution of the plan now suggested. And were they to prove upon trial insincere in their professions, a few frigates and armed vessels would soon reduce them to submission, as they could not long subsist with any comfort without free egress to the ocean thro' the Cheaseapeak and Delaware Bays. Their example would very soon be followed by the inhabitants of Virginia and Maryland, on the opposite shore of the great Bay of Cheaseapeak. In short the Delaware and Cheaseapeak are so connected, that whoever is master of the first, will very soon be so of the last, with the help of such a sea force as may be reasonably expected, where almost every thing depends on the command of the water, and the proper distribution of cruisers and armed vessels. . . . The town of New York tho' well situated for trade, is one of the worst situations in the world for a military post. It commands no extent of country or important pass, either by land or water, but is itself commanded by Brooklyne and Powles Hook; both its land and water lines are so extensive, that it requires an army to defend it, and has accordingly had one for that purpose these six years past. It is a spot of no intrinsic or natural value to Great Britain, and has a very bad harbour for ships of war, tho' its temporary importance is at present very great, by its immense quantity of moveable property belonging both to the King and to the British merchants that is at this time within it." Brooklyne on Long Island is infinitely preferable to the city or island of New York. The post called the Flag Staff Hill on Staten Island may be rendered very respectable. But Sandy Hook is thought by good judges to be the most important spot to Great Britain of any spot connected with this communication. Description of Gardner's Bay called by Admiral Arbuthnot the Spithead of America. "Rhode Island and Boston Harbours having already been mentioned in the Remarks dated July 1780, it is only further to be observed, that whoever commands the navigation of Boston and Rhode Island Harbours, Hudson and Delaware Rivers, will finally bridle the whole Rebel Country, and reduce those infatuated people to the necessity of suing for peace on any terms. It may be objected to this plan that the securing of a few harbours or rivers included altogether in the short distance of four hundred and fifty miles, can never command the rebel coast which is upwards of fifteen hundred miles in extent, with many harbours, rivers, and bays both to the Southward of Delaware and to the Northward of Boston, besides several small harbours between them—To this it is answered that the countries depending on the Delaware and Hudson Rivers, Rhode Island and Boston Harbours for exports and imports, contain upwards of three fourths of all the whites in the thirteen revolted colonies, and produce the sinews of war in the same proportion, therefore whoever

permanently possesses that coast will have the whole." The great Bay of Cheasapeak with the Carolinas requires a decided superiority at sea to engross it. If Great Britain cannot keep on the American Coast this decided superiority all other plans for permanently holding N. America will prove abortive. Besides the Royal fleet armed vessels must be at each post. "It is notorious that the present American Rebellion was raised by the smugglers of New England, New York and Pennsylvania, residing in the sea port towns, particularly the large cities. The Bostonians gave the first being to the thought, their example was soon followed by the rest, and finally adopted by the thirteen provinces now in Rebellion. These are the greatest enemies to America as well as Britain, to the latter they will never be reconciled but by compulsion, and when the rebellion is over, they will begin their smuggling again, unless they are curbed by Britain's effectually commanding the navigation of the four principal posts, above mentioned, when that is done all the rest will be easily bridled by cruizers." The choice of a military emporium will fall either on Rhode Island or Gardner's Bay as the fittest situation.

That in the year 1775 when the rebels were associating the people to carry on rebellion Kelly commenced counter-associations—that Fleming being appointed associating officer for the rebels he joined Kelly under that colour and together in Maryland, Virginia, and Pennsylvania they associated upwards of 1900 men. “That in the year 1779, a report prevailed in Maryland, and Virginia, that part of the British Troops, was preparing, to penetrate from Fort Detroit, to Pittsburgh, on which Kelly immediately went to Red Stone Settlement, near Pittsburgh (where he had large connexions) above two hundred miles, from his residence in Maryland, and there associated one hundred and seventy five men to join the Kings Troops at their coming to Pittsburgh, and that at the same time, Fleming went to the Kittawnings, in the upper part of Pennsylvania, and associated seventy five men to join the King's Troops at the same time and place. . . . That previous to June 1781, near thirteen hundred fighting men, had taken the annexed oaths, No. 3 and 4, under the name

or appellation of the Maryland Royal Retaliators, and near five hundred the affirmation No. 1 and oath No. 2." That Kelly with officers and privates was apprehended, Fleming escaped to Lord Cornwallis in North Carolina; Kelly, condemned to be hanged, was saved by a dispute between the civil and military authorities. Later, 170 officers and privates were apprehended and some sentenced to death—but in spite of dangers Kelly and Fleming continued to prepare the Loyalists for the coming of Lord Cornwallis, but hearing, with a number of other loyalists, of his Lordship's then situation in York Town, and a reward of 500*l.* and 350*l.* respectively being offered for them dead or alive, their property in the hands of the rebels, they resolved on separating and getting to New York. On his way to that city Kelly was apprehended and kept in gaol twenty two days. On his arrival at New York he met General Hamilton who gave him the annexed certificate. His case was laid before General Clinton who promised to provide for him, but other than a dollar and a ration per day and fuel for one room he has received no consideration or gratuity, though he has lost property, been at much expense, and been thirteen times tried by the rebels. Both he and Fleming now expect their families in New York and have no means of providing for them.

I think I convinced her that it was impossible that the letter could arrive in America time enough to be of any use, but yet she was unwilling to give up sending it, I have therefore taken the liberty of inclosing it to Your Excellency, that you may determine whether it ought to be sent to Genl. Washington, if, contrary to all probability, you should receive it before that unfortunate transaction is finally settled.

I mentioned in a former letter how my exchange was circumstanced; but lest that packet should have miscarried I will again trouble you with a repetition of it. Mr. Laurens on obtaining his liberty engaged to procure me a release from my parole; and as Dr. Franklyn had been empowered by Congress to offer Lt. Genl. Burgoine in exchange for him, & as that General had already been exchanged in America, he requested the Dr. to give me an immediate release, that I might not be under the necessity of waiting for an answer from America. The Dr. said that he had no authority from Congress to propose any person in exchange for Mr. Laurens but Genl. Burgoine, but that, as he was of opinion that in justice & equity I ought to be released, & that it was for the honour of his country that it should be so, he would take it upon himself to do it, but he still seemed to entertain some doubts whether the Congress would confirm it. He likewise concurred with the Marquis de Lafayette in giving their activity to my aides de camp Lt. Chewton, Majr. Ross and Lieut. Haldane, (who are still however to be exchanged whenever a cartel shall take place), as a civility of nearly a similar nature was done to Genl. Lincoln.

I shall take it as the greatest favour if you will give every assistance in your power for the final settlement of this business. I most heartily beg pardon for giving you so much trouble about my affairs, and can only assure you that if it ever should be in my power to obey any commands of yours, it will give me the greatest satisfaction to do it. I have the honour to be with great esteem & regard &c.

Tho' my letter of the 23rd of May last, was so full, respecting the conduct to be observed in the evacuation of Savannah, and was equally intended for that of Charlestown, yet, having received information from home, that Government disapprove very much of the officers of the police at Charlestown having extended their jurisdiction beyond its proper limits, that they have given in to a very dangerous policy of interfering with the property of Rebels, lying within the British lines, and have taken cognizance of debts prior to the capitulation, all which is considered as unwise, and unauthorized, I think it right to communicate the same; tho' what has been said in my letter above mentioned, I thought sufficiently strong to prevent plundering of any sort, or carrying away any property which may belong to Rebels. I recommend, not only the leaving the property of such persons uninjured, but to treat those in your power with lenity and generosity.

Such prisoners of war as remain in your possession you will try to get exchanged as soon as possible.

Upon this occasion, & looking to that liberality of sentiment which prevails in England on the subject of exchanges,

I cannot help wondering that so many difficulties should be made here, and that on a point wherein not only the common interests of humanity are concerned, but the clear undoubted rights of prisoners. Exchange is a measure which cannot possibly wait on any tedious liquidations whatever, as in such case, prisoners, under the rigors of confinement, wou'd perish, and the question of course be lost in the discussion. One shou'd think by this strange union of a future interest with a present remedy, that America cou'd see no other security for her claims but a few miserable pledges, that are daily melting out of her hands, whereas a claim of money, if any due, is a national point & will remain unimpeached after every exchange has been made. Liquidation & exchanges have never been united in Europe, among other obvious reasons because each party considers their own imprisoned subjects, many or few, as entitled to immediate redress, with which the measure of liquidation is manifestly an incompatible thing. It is the prescribing of an instant remedy requiring one knows not how much time to prepare.

“It is plain that in England they have an unbounded confidence that America will not be outdone in acts of humanity and justice, & which appear so evidently to be *such*, and, in their nature, so indispensable, that they make part of the ordinary laws and regulations of war; for cartels are to be considered only as the mode of doing that, reciprocally, which previous to and independent of such cartels it is universally acknowledged ought to be done.

Major General Leslie desiring no offensive operations to be carried on by the Indians against the frontiers, has directed the officers to prevent their doing so and to pursue their hunting in order to divert their thoughts from war. Has always endeavoured to restrain the Indians from any wanton outrages. The Cherokees “have given uncommon proofs of their fidelity and attachment to His Majesty’s interest; from the exposed situation of their towns to the incursions of the rebels from the frontiers of Pennsylvania, Virginia, and the Carolinas they have twice been laid in ashes & their plantations destroyed—numbers of their women and children have been butchered in cold blood or burnt alive—, yet no species of rebel barbarity, or the loss of their towns, provisions, families or friends have induced them to abandon His Majesty’s service. The rebels & Spaniards have been lavish of their promises & presents to corrupt the fidelity of the Creeks, and to detach them from our interest” but without success. . . “The Creeks on a late occasion manifested extraordinary proofs of their zeal and attachment to His Majesty’s service. The chiefs of the nation having received information that Savannah being invested by the rebels the path to their friends was destroyed, immediately sent off Emistisicho (head warrior of the Upper Creeks) with one hundred and fifty chosen Indians. Having marched near five hundred miles, they understood that the rebel army under General Wayne was encamped within five miles of the town. Not disheartened at this intelligence, they determined to cut a passage through the rebel army or perish in the attempt. After a march of sixty miles without halting, they surprised and routed the rebels, and with a very trifling loss (the brave, gallant Emistisicho excepted) arrived in town.” Stock of Indian presents is exhausted. Promises strict economy in the Indian Department but suggests that the services of Indians in general are not equal to the expense. New York.—On occasion of transmitting to the Treasury the quarterly account of warrants for money issued here, it became proper to make some observations on the novelty of paying the provincial corps by warrants for each corps after the manner in which the British are paid instead of issuing sums of money on account to a general agent as had been heretofore the practice. The Commander-in-Chief, not being minutely informed by what rule or upon what principles those payments were made or how they had been applied, and at a loss how to state the matter in a public dispatch with certainty, the packet being on the point of sailing, and time being wanting to make a perfect investigation, has desired him to state his own conceptions of the case to His Lordship. Understands that the whole Provincial Force has been heretofore paid by one agent or paymaster common to them all, that this agent has been nominated by the Commander-in-Chief for the time being, that he was allowed for this service thirty shillings per day, that he also withheld two pence in the pound upon the total pay of each corps in the quality of agent, and had also, it is understood, the advantage of a contingent man in each company, and that he retained also in his own hands one shilling in the pound upon the pay of the commission and staff officers, which deduction was held necessary in order to place the Provincial Forces on the same footing, in that respect, with the British. Presumes this will be a matter of investigation and account, though understood by many here that these advantages are to belong to these paymasters and agents as the perquisites of office. When the present Commander-in-Chief arrived here one of his first attentions was to reform this practice, and he accordingly ordered every separate corps of provincials to be paid separately by warrants granted to their own separate paymasters and the stoppage of one shilling in the pound to be detained in the deputy paymaster general's hands as a surcharge, and he has placed these corps, in other respects, on the same footing with the British, they being now paid regularly two months in advance and their stoppages of provisions charged for the

two months preceding, and this regulation extends likewise to the stoppages of their men in the general hospital, but those stoppages having been paid up to the 24th of June by the former agent or his substitute here, the present warrants do not appear to carry any stoppages, or only a few, but those of the 24th of this month will contain the proper deduction of provision and hospital stoppages. 1782, October 11. Bayard’s House.—Paper headed “Memorandum.” “From the superiority of our ships, and the difficulty of the thing itself, a descent upon this Island by the East or North-rivers, or Harlem Creek, in view of a prepared army, is very improbable.

The works at King’s bridge are the most likely to be attempted.

In this case it is my opinion, that small corps of observation be left at Harlem to observe the creek and opposite shore, and at McGowan’s Pass and Harlem Cape to observe the North river—and that the main army occupy the works at King’s bridge, and there wait the event, or act according to the circumstances.

But if the works at King’s bridge are to be considered as outposts not to be supported, and the main defence to be made at this side of McGowan’s Pass, then the heights from Harlem Cape to McGowan’s Pass will afford a very advantageous position, to be occupied according to the nature of the ground, without adhering to a regular line.

By such a position the front and flanks would be perfectly secured, especially as the light troops may be kept concealed in the bushes, in front and on both flanks of the Army.

The possibility of a descent by the East or North Rivers may be precluded by a proper number of armed vessels, or at least delayed, till a sufficient land force can arrive on the spot to oppose it.

Should a serious attack be attempted by laying bridges from Morosinia across Harlem Creek, the success must be

rendered very doubtful, in the first place, from the opposition which we are able to make by our artillery from Snake hill and other batteries, in that case to be erected, and in the second place, because the enemy may be defeated en detail, by immediate attacks from proper detachments of the army, as it will not be possible for them to bring over a large force at once.

General Leslie will I presume give your Excellency the earliest information of the Refugees from Carolina destined for this province; and you will be able to judge of their capacity, and the additional strength they will afford us." That he was taken on his passage and carried into Connecticut; thence obtained liberty to visit his connections, the Livingstons; was suffered to come into New York ostensibly to effect his exchange; was entrusted by the King's Commissioners in 1778 with a number of proclamations which he took with him in a quantity of goods amounting to 1600*l.* sterling; on account of the proclamations the goods were condemned and he himself confined, until, having formed with others a plan of extricating the loyalists from the tyranny they laboured under he escaped bringing with him the whole plan. Awaits still Sir Henry Clinton's promised action in the matter and meanwhile asks that rations, rooms and fuel, stopped the 20th May last, might be renewed. The losses sustained will appear from an enclosed deposition [*see* August 15th 1782]. It is a most interesting business, and I wish to do my *best*,—but must fall very short of your expectations, for officers long in this country look on negroes as their property, and the slaves are exceeding unwilling to return to hard labour, and severe punishment from their former masters, and from the numbers that may expect to be brought off, including their wives, and children, if to be paid for, will amount to a monstrous expence.

If your Excellency will please mention any number of blacks, or (if paid for) a certain sum of money to be paid (or receipts given) to a certain amount, this will be a guide for my conduct, for every department, and every officer,

wishes to include his slave into the number to be brought off. They pretend them spys, or guides, and of course obnoxious, or under promises of freedom from Genl. Prevost, Ld. Cornwallis, Ld. Rawdon, or some other officer of rank, or free by proclamation.

I shall attend that all those that are paid for, or carryed off *by permission*, shall be sent to St. Lucia under a proper officer for the public service there.

If they are valued here, they will come very high, from the numbers already gone off.

If your Excellency intends them paid for, suppose receipts given of their names, occupations, ages, sex, owners &c. &c., and this to be settled by some men at home well informed in the value of slaves of all degrees, Genl. Green and their Governor dont seem to agree in this business, and if Mr. Greene continues to insult our front, while their commissions are here, I shall break off the business; a letter is gone out on that head—the Hessians desert very fast, every precaution is taken to prevent it—

The troops are getting, again in health—since the beginning of this month. I have the honor to be &c.

I should not wish the Admiral to know I write your Excellency on the subject of a letter to Cap. Swynney—

The want of cavalry makes Mr. Greene take the liberty mentioned in the letter—I have not 100 horses left from desertion from the S. Carolina Regiment, mounted.

St. Augustine.—Dear Sir, On the 17th I was honored with your letter of the 8th & on the 25th with yours of the 20th inst^l.; every possible endeavour has been used when the weather and this horrid bar would permit to land the troops and provisions; the former have been several days on shore & the latter are landing as quick as the few craft here can effect.—I am sorry to inform you that much too high a proportion of the provisions have been sent to St. John's, as you will see by the inclosed return; I remonstrated on this head to Capt. Edwards, whose answer was, that want of time, proper craft, & ballast for the ships off this Bar rendered it impossible to bring the proportion wanted, here, before the Hornet & Adamant sailed.—These provisions are now landing in the Bluff. at St. John's where I have sent an officer's party to cover them, & ordered Capt. Howe to station his galley so as best to protect them till they are brought here by small craft; which will incur a heavy expence to Government, exclusive of the risk; about one fourth would have been sufficient to have landed at St. Johns. Col. Glasier informed you he had appointed Mr. Winniott a commissary for the refugees at five shillings per day:—I have found it necessary to continue him, and formed a committee of four of the principal refugees viz: Colonels Ball & Cassells for Carolina & Cols. Tattnall & Douglas for Georgia, to ascertain by oath the number of refugees & blacks & superintend the delivery of provisions;—they request three or four assistants for one month to deliver out the provisions & prevent confusion & impositions; I have taken upon me to allow them two at half a crown each per day, which I hope you will not disapprove of. The refugees not being yet all landed we have not been able to ascertain their numbers, or that of the blacks.—I expect by next opportunity Willson & I will be able to send a few blacks rebel property as you desire.

A vessel bringing the clothing of the new garrison over the Bar two days ago was cast away on it:—The clothing is got out with little damage, but the master of a transport humanely coming to her assistance, his boat upset & he with three or four of his men were drowned.

I am much obliged to you for what you say touching the *Roti*. I purpose immediately to replace the gunns at the Matanza fort & make it an officer's post, it is the key of this place,—I shall also have either a galley or gunboat there.

Now that Providence is out of our hands, would not this be a very proper place for a company or two of old fogies, they might smoke their pipes & tell their lies in great tranquility without fear of flux or ague.

We are all anxiety for a confirmation of the naval victory, should it prove true, I flatter myself you will not quit Charlestown.

The new garrison is likely to be much distressed for blankets, the 60th who are just gone on board having taken the barrack blankets with them;—I remonstrated pretty strongly to Col: Glasier, but he was positive as to the 4th Battn.—and to have ordered the third to leave theirs might have been attended with serious consequences. The Barrack Master is possessed of the regl. receipts given when the furniture was issued. Please accept a small cask of sweet oranges. I have the honor to be, with the most grateful sense of your friendship, &c.

Have these corps leave to enlist men? Col. Brown has been good enough to offer his assistance in pointing out lands & procuring settlements for the refugees on St. John's River, & I shall furnish them with the publick boats for that purpose.

London.—“Sir, I did myself the honor to write to your Excellency the 13th May, and I inclosed a letter for Sir Henry Clinton respecting my Regiment, but as the letter may have miscarried, I take the liberty of inclosing a copy.—Since my last I am informed by Captain Frink, that he has requested of your Excellency to have his troop draughted from my regiment and attached to the Queen’s Rangers, or some other Corps. A request so very *unreasonable* and *unjust*, I am convinced you never will comply with, especially as it is unprecedented and would deter any person in future from attempting to raise a new corps.—It was at the request of Sir Henry Clinton (which General Robertson well knows) that I undertook to raise a regiment, who promised me every encouragement, and desired me to give my sons commissions in the regt. and assured me that they should have leave of absence as long as I choose to keep them at school.—In consequence of which I had the full complement of men inlisted for my son Richard, and Sir Henry Clinton was pleased to appoint him a lieutenant, and afterwards sent him to me in England for his education. Capt. Frink now informs me that application has been made to your Excellency to put him on half pay, and that Cornet Cagney should do duty in his room, which I am convinced you will do, as he had leave of absence, but if it is necessary that he should join the regiment, I will bring him out with me, tho he is but twelve years old and can be of little use in the regiment.

I employed Lieut. Furlong to enlist fifteen men for my son Henry, to entitle him to a lieutenantcy, which number of men were enlisted by him and inspected, and I paid the bounty, but by the extraordinary measure which has been taken with my regiment (for I don't find that it has been extended to any other) the deserters from Mr. Washington's army have been claimed by the navy, and I have lost the bounty money, near one hundred guineas, and my son his appointment, notwithstanding his men were inspected, and the county paid in consequence of it.—If the men were improper recruits the Inspector General ought not to have passed them. It is very hard that I should lose the bounty and appointment too, and equally so upon the officer who enlisted the men, provided he did not know they had been in the navy, which I verily believe he did not.

Most of the officers of the regiment as well as myself have made great sacrifices by joining the King's army and have been at a very great expence in raising men, and I have the fullest confidence that your Excellency will not in my absence, suffer the Inspector General, by his misrepresentations, to injure the regiment, or any particular officer of it, but that there will be no distinction made between the Provincial Corps, altho Colonel Innes has declared his intention to break up and ruin mine.

I am informed by my agent in New York that my batt and forage money has been stopped in consequence of my absence. I had made the necessary preparation to return to New York in consequence of the King's pleasure signified to me for that purpose by Lord Amherst, but was detained by Lord Shelburne, who assured me that my detention should not in the least affect my pay or emoluments, and Mr. Secy Townshend now assures me that he thinks it reasonable, and that I ought to receive it. Had I been in New York I should with other officers have received not only my batt and forage money, but rations of forage and provisions, and have had a house provided for me. But as I have been detained here at a great expence and contrary to my intention, I trust that your Excellency will order my batt & forage money to be paid to me—had I been absent on my private affairs I should not have asked it.—

Besides that allowance it appears that about the beginning of the year 1781 General Riedesel made application by

letter to Lord George Germain for batt & forage money for the officers. An extract from this letter was laid before Lord Amherst, who gave it as his opinion, that he did not think it would be right the officers of the Convention army should receive batt & forage money like those employed in the field—but on account of the particular circumstances of that unfortunate army his Lordship thought, that it might be recommended to Sir Henry Clinton, if he should think proper, to make some allowance or *douceur* to those officers out of the contingencies of the army in America, in aid and by way of *recompence* in part of the heavy expenses they had been put to. Lord George Germain transmitted Genl. Amherst's opinion to Sir Henry Clinton to whom it was left to apportion the quantum.—Sir Henry Clinton upon this proposed a certain sum for each officer, which he submitted to a board of General Officers, who (as it appears by their letter to Capt. Smith the Secretary) gave it as their opinion, that the allowance his Excellency proposed was perfectly proper. Accordingly Sir Henry Clinton on the 22nd July, 13th Octr. & 5th Decr. 1781, granted three separate warrants for the payment of the allowance, to the British, Brunswick & Hessian officers. The allowance made to each Officer appears from the distributions annexed to these warrants. The distribution seems to be made on very just principles. The whole officers have the allowance from summer 1778 (165 days batt & forage being paid them the beginning of that year) and from that time continued till the officer was exchanged or went home. Those who remained in America were allowed it for the whole time, till exchanged”

MAJ. GEN. JAMES PATERSON to SIR GUY CARLETON.

1782, November 13. Halifax.—No. 4. “The fleet which sailed for Spanish River to load coal, is safely returned and fully laden; with the exertions now using in cutting wood, I have no doubt we shall have a sufficient supply of fuel for the troops.

Being disappointed in the return of one of the transports from Penobscot, and impossible to procure another here, I had it only in my power to send half of the intended reinforcement to that post, it consisted of the Anspach Yagers, as by the inclosed return. They sailed three days ago under convoy of the Atalanta and Savage sloops of war, by which I sent three thousand pounds to Brigr. General Campbell.

I have directed Colonel Hatzfeld who commands the foreign troops, lately arrived, to detain such baggage as he shall think necessary for this service, the remainder goes to New York by the present convoy.—The transport Holderness, loaded with camp equipage and stores, I have also ordered to proceed together with the ordnance ship Lady Amherst with this convoy to New York. Out of this last mentioned ship, I have directed the ordnance storekeeper here, to take out all the arms reported to me to be in a bad state, four hundred and fifty barrels of powder for the use of this garrison, and one hundred barrels for the sea service. The Store Keeper's report of the state of the arms is inclosed.

The Superintendent of the Hospitals must have been misinformed, as no medicines have arrived here by the last fleet.

By the inclosed state of the Provincial Forces in this province, it will evidently appear how absolutely necessary will be a reformation in that Corps. I have directed an inspection of the men unfit for duty in order to their being discharged.

The troops are under cover, the British recruits are hutted about five miles from hence on the communication to Fort Sackville.

I beg leave to submit to Your Excellency's consideration, the inclosed letter from the surgeon to the hospital, requesting that the mates in that department here, may be put on the same footing with those at New York; and also a memorial from Lieut. Governor Desbrisay.

With respect to the public accounts of this command, I have only to observe that every attention shall be paid to the strict regulation of Your Excellency; And I have directed, that all accounts, prior to my command, shall be closed, and sent in agreeable to orders signified to me by the Adjutant General.

The short notice I had of the fleets sailing prevents my sending the necessary lists and customary certificates respecting the recruits to be drafted into the 70th Regiment, by the next opportunity I will do myself the honor of transmitting them.

Herewith are sent lists of the several warrants granted by me, for the public service, to the 30th October, and also a letter from the Deputy Pay Master on the difficulty of procuring money here.

A detachment of the 42th of one subaltern, one serjeant and forty privates arrived here a few days ago from St. John's Newfoundland in order to join their regiment. I have ordered them on board the Berwick navy store ship and the ordnance ship Lady Amherst.

In consequence of the inclosed letter, I have granted leave of absence, to the Chief Engineer, Captain Spry, and shall send for Captain Hartcup, engineer at Penobscot, to remain here till his return.

Not being competent to decide on the inclosed memorial from Captain Callbeck respecting the cloathing &c. of his company, on the Island St. John, it is submitted for Your Excellency's determination.

Brigadier General Campbell having appointed a Mr. Shaw to do the duty of Deputy Provost Martial at five shillings p. day, with the rank of junior captain, I am to beg the honor of Your Excellency's decision.

I therefore wish your Excellency to know, that when 100 men of Odell's American Rangers were lately sent to the Spanish Main, it was not in pursuit of fresh conquests, but merely to prevent the Spaniards from annihilating His Majesty's settlers and friendly Indians on that shore—who were then exposed to the worst calamities of war. Every circumstance at that period concurred to render such an attempt successful, without any hazard to the security of this island.—The Spanish troops at Black River from the little opposition they met with in the attack of that post, chose to lull in listless security; the Spanish had returned to the Havannah; the French Fleet were on their way to North America; ten sail of British ships of the line were at anchor at Port Royal, and the hurricane season was far advanced. The consequences which ensued have fully justified the measure; our settlers on the shore have been re-established in peace; the enemy's projects discomfited; their troops, artillery and stores have come into our possession, and the detachment sent from hence is actually on its return to Jamaica without the loss of a man."

1782, December 23. St. Augustine.—The Refugees who arrived by the first convoy are forming settlements in the country; has provided them with agricultural tools. A thousand Loyalists are supposed to have arrived under convoy of the "Bellisarius" and also 1500 negroes; General Leslie's information thereon will no doubt be particular. They are disembarked with the loss of some small craft owing to their rashness in venturing over the bar without sufficient guides. Suggests formation of a military establishment on St. Mary's. Will be short of grain next summer unless provisions can be sent from Carolina and Georgia and an allowance is granted

to these distressed Refugees. Submits a proclamation to pave the way for this necessary supply. Also submits a mode of rendering the militia useful by raising a regiment either allowed rations or pay while doing duty. Apprehends the state of inactivity to the southward will not be lasting. "The Superintendent Lieutenant Colonel Brown, and Colonel McArthur will no doubt inform your Excellency of the particulars of the Indians, who have lately come into this province, Creeks, Chactaws, and Cherokees, and sundry nations from the North, Mowhawkes, Senacas, Delawares, Shanases, Manjoes, Tuscararas, Yatanous, and other tribes from Fort Detroit. The expence in presents must be considerable, and we feel severely the weight of their provisions; should they in such trains repeat their visits, we shall be altogether without the means of supplying them.

I am informed that the chiefs of numerous nations are on their way with a talk confederating the whole body of Indians on the continent: before such embassy it will give me the highest satisfaction to receive your directions; in what manner they are to be treated, and in case of their demanding assistance upon being attacked, what assurance I can give them of it, and how the Indians are to be supplied with provisions? Your Excellency is sensible this province is not equal to so large a demand of supplies, and that there is no other channel of communication but this province between the southern Indians and the King's troops. And how far it may be justifiable, or otherwise, in case of refusal of provisions from Carolina and Georgia, to make foraging incursions for that purpose. I have the honour," &c.

The captain of one of the privateers, whose name was Babcock, and who had command of the party on shore, sent Wollenhaupt with a flag to the militia, who were then assembling, to say that if no opposition was made they would only take the merchandize in the town and would not injure buildings in town, which was acquiesced in. Having plundered everything to the amount of about 10,000*l.*, they got on board their vessels and then demanded a ransom of 7,000*l.* for the town, but agreed to take 1,000*l.*, for which memorialists were obliged to give a promissory note payable to Noah Stoddard, captain of the largest privateer. The block house and Colonel Creighton's dwelling house were burnt, the guns spiked, and all the small arms carried away. Pray for a captain, two subalterns, and fifty British troops to be stationed with a hundred stand of small arms and ammunition for use of the militia.

GERMAN TROOPS.

New York.—Depositions before a Board consisting of three officers, Captain de Eschwege, of the Hesse Hanau Regiment; Lieutenant Reinking, Regiment de Riedesel, and Lieutenant de Eptingen, of the Linsing Battalion Hessians, appointed to examine into the cause of the German soldiers entering into the rebel service on board the frigate "South Carolina," also to enquire of the treatment received from the enemy. All to the effect that the German prisoners of the Convention of Saratoga, when taken to Lancaster or Reading, being separated from their officers were, on the 30th July, 1782, visited by an American clergyman, who read to them the following proposition: "The King of Great Britain refused to pay for their maintenance, their Tyrant princes also had abandoned and sold them, the Congress did therefore leave it to their choice, either to enlist in the American Service, or pay 30*l.* currency of Pennsylvania

for their past maintenance in hard money, which sum, if they would not afford to pay, the farmers would advance for them, on binding themselves to serve them for three years, in both of which cases they must take the Oath of Allegiance to the United States. The clergyman did advise them rather to enter into military service, than submit themselves to the disposal of the farmers, to which he added, that everyone, who should enlist as a soldier, was to receive eight dollars bounty, and one hundred acres of good land in America after the war." No answer was given to this, and on the 8th August General Lincoln and Brigadier General Haysen (*sic*) came to Reading and repeated the proposition, with this addition, "That provisions could no longer be allowed to them as their army was in want thereof, they must therefore accept one or the other of the above mentioned propositions." That to this they begged leave to send sergeants to New York to enquire into the truth of their situation and ask orders. That many of the prisoners being removed from the barracks at Reading to the jail, they were either shut in the yard or crowded in rooms where they could neither sit nor lie. They had generally to pay the gaolkeeper for both water and fuel. Their allowance only consisted of 10 ozs. of bread and 10 of meat generally rotten and unfit to eat. As to the serving on the "South Carolina," they had been urged to do this by the American Commodore for six months, after which time they were assured they would have their liberty and allowed to go where they pleased. That many of the King's friends advised them to do this in the hope that the frigate would soon be taken by the King's ships. At the end is translation of the letter said to be written by the prisoners at Lancaster to Sergeant Vaupel at Reading the 22nd September begging him to write a letter to New York describing their situation, and that without money or clothing they cannot hold out much longer, but must enlist with the enemy or indent themselves to the farmers.

St. Augustine.—“I have the honor to inform your Excellency that the fleet under convoy of the Bellisarius, with refugees and provisions, arrived off this bar on the 31st ulto, but in coming over it the Rattlesnake galley and two provision vessels, with six others (private property) were lost; the 18-pounder and rigging of the galley were saved; four lives from the private vessels were lost; the cash is arrived safe.

By the Commissary's return of provisions come in this fleet, which I have the honor to inclose, your Excellency will perceive it is so far short of what General Leslie intended that

no more than half the allowance can be issued to the refugees untill a further supply arrives ; and even in the event of our being able to afford them what was originally intended, the crop here comes in so late, that those helpless people are likely to feel great distress in the summer months. I inclose a return of refugees and negroes that arrived before this last importation ; no return of them being sent here, it will take some time to ascertain their numbers, as many of them are looking out for habitations ; but by the best acct. I have been able to procure, there are more than fifteen hundred souls arrived with this fleet.

I likewise inclose the Commissary's return of provisions that will remain in store after the first importation of refugees from Carolina shall have received their compleat six months, and the Georgians their compleat three months first ordered ; by this your Excellency will see how very small a quantity there is for those arrived in this last fleet, and to make the Georgians equal with the first arrived Carolinians. I have therefore resolved to issue only for six weeks to those now come, and when the second delivery for three months to the first batch of Carolinians becomes due to give them only for one month, and the same to the Georgians, which I hope will enable us to give a second delivery to those now arrived ; and when those periods are expired we must issue weekly though it will be attended with much inconvenience to the people. I hope no untoward accident will prevent a supply arriving, as in that event a famine must ensue ; and to save the lives of those unfortunate people I may be necessitated to break in upon the supply of the garrison.

Above two years ago, on the arrival of a quantity of gunpowder it was judged improper to risk all in the Fort ; a house was hired for depositing nearly half the quantity, which the proprietor lately sold ; and I was threatened with a prosecution for keeping possession ; but it being a very indifferent magazine, and not chusing to trust a jury, who in all probability would find largely, the Governor is taking the necessary steps for getting us a piece of land which we are to purchase ; the Engineer and I deem it a more eligible situation and he is to immediately to set about building a proper magazine, capable of being made bombproof, but it will be attended with considerable expence.

As the rank of the corps here has not been properly ascertained, Lieut. Col. Hamilton has requested I would transmit to your Excellency the inclosed certificates, and I beg your decision on that head, as likewise on the rank of Lieutenant Colonels Brown and Hamilton, as in the event of the command devolving on either of them it might be attended with inconvenience to His Majesty's service should there be any doubt about it ; in the interim Lieut. Col. Hamilton acquiesces in the seniority of Lieut. Col. Brown. Col. Innes can afford your Excellency the best information

on those heads ; I likewise inclose a memorial from Lieut. Col. Brown.

With respect to the defence of this place, as the Matanza may be considered the key of it, it has since the arrival of the new garrison been an officer's post, with two eighteen pounders ; and next month a capt. and thirty men will take post there, with one large and one small galley ; three galleys will be stationed in this harbour and the same number at St. John's. An eighteen pounder was lately sent to the block house at the bar of that river, and the Engineer has given the plan and estimate of a work to be made at a place called the Sisters, which commands the inland navigation from Georgia ; this the Province is to do without any expence to Government, and is to be an officer's post. The assembly meets in a few days, and the Governor assures me they will furnish us negroes (we feeding them) to make an abbatis across the Neck ; this will be an arduous task, the space being at least twelve hundred yards, the timber to be brought near a mile by land carriage, and then over St. Sebastian's Creek. A space sufficient for three rows of trous des loups will be left between the abbatis and the ditch, and when a stockade is made in the ditch, the pickets for which are preparing, the outer line will be in no great danger of being carried by assault. It is in pretty good order, but the soil is so sandy it requires a number of men constantly employed to keep the works in good repair. By next opportunity the Engineer will have a plan of the works ready to be transmitted to your Excellency. The Musquito inlet being about eighty miles off, I did not think it advisable to send more than an officer, a sergeant and 10 men there, as it would be impossible for them to join us should we be attacked ; but as there are near a hundred men in that neighbourhood capable of bearing arms, with a good block house to occupy they will be able to prevent privateers plundering the settlements as they did a few years ago.

I have pressed the Governor to assemble the Militia, were it only on a Sunday, by companies, to accustom them to a rendezvous, for I apprehend in the event of our being attacked, that for want of this necessary precaution it would be difficult to collect them, A hint from your Excellency on this head would produce a good effect.

Capt. Graves not thinking it advisable to take the victuallers with him at this season of the year, they remain here till spring.

Such of the small craft as may not be judged necessary for the defence of this harbour or St. John's shall be immediately paid off. As it has been understood here that it was in contemplation to occupy St. Mary's, Lieut. Mowbray, of the Navy, who has resided here for several years, has requested I would transmit to your Excellency his remarks on that harbour ; which, with his letter to me, I take the liberty to inclose, but if your Excellency chuses to have a

more accurate description of it I shall send Lieut. Willson, the Engineer, there, who is well qualified to execute it.

The new garrison are much improved in their discipline since their arrival, and considering the service they were upon are by no means so licentious as I expected; they live in good harmony with each other and with the inhabitants.

I transmit herewith a return of the military stores.

The barracks being much in want of repair, the Engineer has already begun upon them.

A great deputation from the Northern Indian nations arrived here a few days ago from Detroit. They profess themselves firmly attached to His Majesties interest, and to have been sent to confirm the southern tribes in the same sentiments, as well as to learn the state of affairs here. We have had two *talks* with them, paid them all military honors, shewed them the fort, magazines, and some explosions with shott and shells, with which they seemed highly pleased.

I am infinitely obliged to your Excellency for honoring me with this command, and shall use my best endeavour to prevent your having reason to regret it. I have the honor to be, &c.

In 1778 more troops being wanted for the defence of the frontiers of Florida, he engaged, at his own expense, three hundred and fifty men who were formed by General Prevost into a regiment called the South Carolina Royalists, the command of which was given to Colonel Innes. That in the year 1779 General Prevost was

ordered to form them into a regiment of Infantry under the title of the King's Rangers and to confirm memorialist and others in their rank of 1st June 1776, which was ordered to be recorded, as Captain Prevost, Deputy Inspector of Provincial Forces, can bear testimony. That in consequence of the constant and distant service in which he and his regiment have always been engaged, neither himself nor his officers have yet received commissions except those formerly delivered by Major General Tonyn. LIEUT. COL. THOMAS BROWN to SIR GUY CARLETON.

St. Augustine.—Quotes extract of a letter from Major de Peyster dated Fort Detroit 18th July last informing of a victory gained by the Indians over six hundred of the enemy, “who had penetrated as far as Sandusky, with a view of destroying the Wiandotts, man, woman and child, as they had done with ninety six of the Christian Indians at Muskingum a few weeks before. The affair at Sandusky happened on the 4th of June, when the enemy left two hundred and fifty in the field, and it is believed that few of the remainder escaped to Wheeling. Their Major, McLellan, and most of their officers were killed in the action. Colonel Crawford, who commanded, was taken in the pursuit and put to death by the Delawares, notwithstanding every means had been tried by an Indian officer present to save his life. This the Delawares declared they did in retaliation for the affair at Muskingum.” The Major is sorry the imprudence of the enemy has been the means of reviving the old savage custom of putting their prisoners to death, which with much pains and expense the Indians had been weaned from in this neighbourhood. Canada is quiet, well fortified against attempts, and the Western Indians are attached to Britain. A deputation from the Northward Indians with 1,200 Cherokees arrived at St. Augustine lately to establish a league and confederacy among the different tribes. Gives substance of the talks delivered to him by the Indian representatives, reminding that the Indians had fulfilled their engagements and hoping that the Great King would not abandon them. In his reply, he had renewed assurances of attachment, urged them to

desist from all offensive operations and attend to hunting and trading.

“ They were perfectly satisfied with their reception and will set off for their land in two days.

“ As the towns of the Cherokees are too much exposed to the incursions of the rebels from the frontiers of Pennsylvania, Virginia, and the Carolinas, in order the better to contribute to their security, I have prevailed on the head men of the Cherokees to move their towns this winter to that part of the country between heads of Coosa, Chatahanchie and Tannassie river, where it empties itself into the Ohio, that in case the rebels presume to disturb them, they may more readily and conveniently effect a union of force with the Creeks, as well as be in a capacity of intercepting the rebel and Spanish boats navigating the Mississippi and Ohio.

“ Since my arrival in this province above three thousand Creeks have been down, and though I have positively ordered them to follow their hunting, they still persist in their visit and plead their poverty and friendship.

“ On a service at present deemed so odious and expensive by Government, however necessary, as the rebels and Spaniards spare no pains to excite the Indians to abandon us and take up the hatchet against us, I have, to free myself from the imputation of in any manner improperly contributing to the public expence, informed the Commg. Officer of the King’s troops and the Governor (who is conversant with Indian affairs) of every circumstance relative to their disposition, situation, and wants, and have always requested instructions from them in what manner I ought to conduct myself for the good of the King’s service.

“ With respect to the Northward and Cherokee visitants they told me to subsist them, supply their wants, and send them away satisfied. In obedience to them and with their approbation I purchased blankets and shirts (none being in the store or sent in the last cargo from New York for the eastern or western department); lest I might in any manner through a zeal for the service subject myself to censure, I shall undertake no step without their sanction.

“ The Creek nation contains six thousand and the Cherokee three thousand gunmen; the western department contains about five thousand. The annual supply of presents without respect to numbers, circumstances, situation, or wants is sent equally to both. The Creeks and Cherokees from their vicinity to the rebels and us are more exposed to temptation from the former, and are equally prevented from hunting to procure supplies, and from their contiguity to us are more frequent in their visits in the proportion of ten to one.

“ The westerns from their distance are scarce comparatively an object of consideration. I have represented this matter to the Commg. Officer and Governor, who purpose to write to your Excellency on the subject.

“As the securing and preserving the friendship of the Indians will, I imagine, appear to your Excellency an object of moment, no exertions on my part shall be wanting to strengthen their friendly disposition towards us.

“At the same time, I beg leave to request your Excellency will be so obliging as to honor me with your orders relative to Indian affairs, which I shall endeavor to execute to the extent of my judgement and abilities: for should the rebels be disposed to make encroachments on the Indian lands, I shall be under some difficulties what line of conduct I am to pursue. I have the honor to be, Sir,” &c.

“I have this moment received information from a Mr. Ross, a merchant, that a quantity of Indian goods, addressed to Mr. Stuart’s (my predecessor in office) correspondent in Jamaica, were sent to the Havannah and from thence sent to New Orleans to the manifest prejudice of the King’s service. I shall endeavour to procure some authentic proofs of this iniquitous transaction and transmit them to your Excellency.”

ADMIRAL HUGH PIGOT to SIR GUY CARLETON.

1783, February 28. “Formidable,” Gros Islet Bay, St. Lucia. “Dear Sir,—I take the opportunity of writing to you by the *Narcissus*. I am sorry I have it not in my power to give you a more pleasing account of my own situation; the great distance between Jamaica and this island makes it a difficult task for me to know how to act, more especially as the islands here are in so weak a state, that whenever I may be obliged to go to leeward, I think they will all be taken by the enemy, if they have any naval force here.

“By dispatches I received from Government two days ago, I am informed a great armament is upon the point of sailing, if not sailed, from Cadiz to the West Indies; that they are sending ten sail of the line to reinforce me, but as part of them come with convoys, they may be a long time e'er they get here, the enemy is supposed to sail with forty ships of the line. I have no information whether they mean to come first to these islands or proceed immediately for Jamaica: My last letters from thence are dated the 10th of January, they had then got the reinforcement of troops sent from this island: the *Carolina* troops not arrived. I have letters from Lord Hood of the 22nd of January, dated off the Cape. He had intelligence of *Vaudreuil's* being off Porto Rico, where I have since learned he took shelter, and as Lord Hood must long ago have been obliged to go to Jamaica for water, I have not a doubt but *Vaudreuil* is gone to the Cape. I have no certain accounts of the Spaniards at the Havanna. Lord Hood seemed to think they would not move from thence. My accounts from England are that two ships of the line with a frigate is convoying out fifteen or sixteen hundred men that are to call at Barbadoes, and proceed from thence to Jamaica; that a thousand men more are to come out in the merchant ships bound to these islands and Jamaica, which men are for Barbadoes. I am also informed that orders are gone to you to send sixteen hundred men to Barbadoes; with these supplies the islands might with a small naval force be able to defend themselves, and leave me more at liberty to go to

leeward. I hope the vessels that are appointed to watch the enemy at Cadiz will give me early information of them ; if the ten sail intended to reinforce me all arrive before the combined fleet, I shall muster thirty-four of the line, besides the fifteen Lord Hood has belonging to me to leeward. I am in hourly expectation of something from Jamaica, which will be a great relief to my mind, wishing to know the state of that island, which may direct me how far it may be necessary for me to go there ; if I go and am not wanted, I expose all these islands, for I cannot get back to give them any assistance. It is strange that with all these armaments we are negotiating for peace, or rather I may say the French are trifling with us ; you see, my dear Sir, that my case is critical. I must hope for good intelligence by which I may be able to take the properest steps for the King's service ; I have been cruizing a month for Vaudreuil, who gave me the slip by going to the northward of the islands. One of my ships, the Leander, had a smart action in the night with one that I believe to have been one of Vaudreuil's, the action much to the credit of Captain Payne and his people, and it is not a clear point the enemy's ship did not sink. For further particulars I refer you to my letter to Admiral Digby ; the Jupiter has taken Vaudreuil's great store ship, and brought her into English Harbour ; this will distress him, and give us the masts and other stores we were much in want of."

The signature at the foot of this letter will probably bring to your recollection the little acquaintance that subsisted between us, in the better days of two countries now almost exhausted in their mad endeavours to wound and tear each other to pieces! And that, too, at a time when every consideration founded in wisdom and true policy called loudly upon them to have remained as they were, in the mutual bonds of cordial friendship! Human affairs, however, never did, nor ever will, go as true wisdom and sound policy point out; we must therefore take the world as we find it.

Concluding as I now do from accounts lately arrived from England, that the cruel and unnatural war between the two countries, is before this time totally at an end! and that it is become the fervent wish and desire of the King, his Ministers, and people, to endeavour by all laudable means to bring about as far as may be practicable a cordial return or renewal of intercourse, friendship and commerce! an event I as ardently wish for as any man in England possibly can, I avail myself of the present opportunity of writing, to bear testimony to the just claim that Mr. Bowdoin *in honor* hath upon the Government of England, for large and valuable property at various times taken from his estate (islands in the vicinity of New York) in the course of the war; and for which strong assurances of payment were repeatedly made. Permit me, Sir, to introduce him (brother to Mrs. Temple) to your notice upon the occasion, as a gentleman of strict honor and integrity! who would not make application for a single farthing more than he thought to be his just due. Nor need I suggest that an honorable attention to the just and reasonable application of Mr. Bowdoin may, in no inconsiderable degree, forward the desirable object of an hearty and general reconciliation.

From personal observation on the spot, corroborated by the concurring sentiments of the best informed leading gentlemen, both civil and military, in this country, with whom I made it my business to be conversant when I came to America in Seventy Nine, I found that a very great majority

of the people in these States, so far from what had been represented in England, were at all events determined to be independent of the Government of England, and I became fully persuaded that they would substantially effect it, however long or distressing the war might be continued for the purpose of defeating such their object. I therefore, after having been deliberately through the Northern and Middle States, and with Congress, returned to England; and on the first day of my arrival there, assured Lord North in person, and in the most explicit terms, that the Ministry had been almost totally misinformed of both the disposition and resources of this people, for that, circumstanced as affairs then were, the arms of England, I was confident, would never be able to wrest their independence from them; though a continuance of the war might probably drive them further than desirable, into foreign connections. Events shew that my opinion was not unfounded. Happy, happy then would it have been for Great Britain, and happy too for this country, had that Ministry attended more to the just representations I then made (for I went back to England on purpose to *undeceive* them) rather than to the delusive, and almost fatal statement of affairs, made by Lord Carlisle, Govr. Johnstone, Mr. Eden, Gallaway and others; who, however faithfull they intentionally may have been, *never had* the means or opportunity of obtaining *true knowledge* of either men or things in this country. *They* could learn only from those whose interest and inclination it most certainly was, to *misrepresent* and to deceive them. Millions of money and much blood might thereby have been saved to the two countries, and peace, friendship and commerce have long since been restored! But it is to no purpose to look back, further than to make past errors subservient, as they some times may be made, to better conduct—to, as far as may be, recovering conduct, in future.

Ever since my last return to America, seeing as I had long seen, that these United States were, and must be, independent of the Government of England, it has been my constant zealous wish and desire that they may be, and that they may continue to be, as completely independent of every other Power, Kingdom, State or Potentate, upon earth! and that, every kind of undue *influence*, foreign or domestic (artfully introduced and set on foot in the hour of our necessity and distress) militating with, or like a slow poison acting upon, such an entire independence, might be effectually counteracted and completely destroyed! my efforts to that purpose have not, I trust, been altogether fruitless. In the same line of conduct I, however, mean stedfastly to persevere.

St. Augustine.—“The provisions in issuing have held out beyond expectation—by withholding from a dozen of people who have large gangs of negroes and who are best able to purchase provisions for them, we are enabled to issue for the fifth month to all the necessitous Refugees who came with the two first fleets, and for ten weeks to those who came in the last fleet, retaining provisions for the garrison to the end of June.

It has hitherto been impossible to ascertain with precision the number of Refugees that came in the last fleet, they drop in daily from distant parts of the Province where they went to look out for habitations, but they are nearly three hundred short of what I mentioned on the 9th January; several vessels when that acct. was taken had not got within the Bar of this place or St. John's, and the masters of vessels who were got in gave at random the numbers on board those without.

The duty of the Inspector of Refugees having become much more laborious since the Carolina people arrived, I was necessitated to increase his pay from five to ten shillings per day, with an assistant here and another at St. John's, each at five shillings.

I mentioned in a former letter to your Excellency that the house where near half of the gun powder was kept had been sold, and it being necessary to remove the powder to the Indian Church till a new magazine was built—yesterday when the powder was removed, Colonel Bull, the new proprietor, gave notice by an attorney that we were not to remove a neat guard room built by us for the magazine guard, a large stage for drying powder in, and the pickets above the magazine. HESSIANS.

1783, March 20. Mount Hope.—“ Abstract of a letter from thirty-five Hessian prisoners of war to his Excellency Lieut. General de Lossberg.

In the goal at Philadelphia one Mr. Fash on the 28th of April, 1782, proposed to procure their enlargement, if they would go and work for him ; he promised at the same time to bring them back to Philadelphia whenever they should desire it.

The miseries of a goal, in which they had been confined for eighteen months, upon small allowances, prevailed upon them to consent. They accordingly went with Mr. Fash to Mount Hope. On the 15th of Novbr., 1782, a Captain and three men came to enlist them, which they refused. Mr. Fash procured a continuance of their stay with him.

In the month of February last they attempted to escape to New York, but having got as far as Newark they were taken up and put in goal, where they were kept for eight days without any allowance of provisions, when Mr. Fash again procured their freedom, paying twenty dollars for each of them, which sum he was to deduct from their wages.

Some time after, some of them asking Mr. Fash for money or linnen, he went away saying that he would get some, but Captain Dille with a detachment came to carry them to the goal at Brompton, to make them enlist or pay the 30*l.* for their maintenance. They insisted upon being brought back to the goal at Philadelphia according to Mr. Fash's promise, but he said they were out of his hands, and refused to pay the balance of their wages.

The Captain told them they were at his disposal, because they were Continental servants, to which they replied that they were no servants, but the King's soldiers. Upon which the Captain drew his sword, put it to their breasts, threatening to kill them, and struck them, till he broke it upon the head of one of them. He then carried them off, and that night put them into a house surrounded with centries, and allowed them neither bread nor water.

The next day, which was the 8th of March, Mr. Fash came again, and offered the 30*l.* for them, for which they were to work. As they could not hold out in their present situation, and had no other choice but to enlist, which they would not, or return to Mr. Fash, they accepted his proposal.

On the 12th of March they were made to swear that they would either repay the money or work for it.

In this situation they remain.

On the 19th of March they heard of a peace being made, and that all prisoners were to have their liberty.

They can get no certainty of it from Mr. Fash, and beg to be informed of their situation by an answer from New York.

As they apprehend being reported as deserters, they express their happiness in having this opportunity to declare their firm intentions, and only desire to rejoin their regiments, and to explain to the General in what manner they were forced into their present condition.

Their names are subscribed to the letter. They number thirty of the Regt. of Knyphausen; two of the Regt. of Prince Hereditaire; one of the Regt. of Hessian Artillery; two of the Regt. of Hesse Hanau Artillery. Total, 35.



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

INTRODUCTION.

This fourth and last volume of the Calendar of the American MSS. in the Royal Institution, London, covers the few remaining months of the British occupation of the late colonies, that being now limited to New York, St. Augustine, and the small post of Penobscot. The correspondence extends from April to November 1783; a few subsistence accounts are made out to the 24th December; some papers bearing no month follow, while a few to which no definite year has been attached bring the Calendar to a close.

Having urged his request to be relieved, and received permission to return, Sir Guy Carleton was only waiting the arrival of his successor in order to embark. At the end of May he had still to complain of the embarrassment caused by the non-arrival of Sir Charles Grey, appointed to succeed him. The change of ministry had, however, broken off the arrangements with that general, who, besides his political views, had desired active service and had no wish to be employed in diplomacy or negotiation. On the first of June Sir Guy received from Lord North, the new Secretary of State, an earnest appeal to remain and carry out the evacuation, the words of which so well explain the position of the Commander-in-chief at this time that they may be here quoted:—

“I beg leave to submit it to your consideration whether you will chuse to avail yourself of it (the leave granted) in this very important moment; when the evacuation of New York, and the distribution of His Majesty’s forces under your command are depending, a service tho’ less brilliant, yet not less difficult, and much more disagreeable than any which you had in contemplation at the time that you undertook the command. I will not conceal from you that His Majesty has that confidence in your attachment to his service, and your zeal for the public, that he hopes to hear that you consent to remain at New York till the principal arrangements are settled, which are necessary for the speedy and orderly execution of the great and complicated business which you have now in hand. The removal and destination of the troops under your command, the security and disposal of the public property, the proper regulations for the liquidation and adjustment of the accounts, the care, support and assistance to be afforded to the Loyalists, are but a few of the points which will come under your consideration.
Give me leave once more most earnestly

to entreat you to remain in your command till this great business is properly arranged, and the machine put in order. I perfectly feel and acknowledge the justice of your reasons for demanding your recall, and I would not press you to stay, if for the execution of this important work I could find any man so much trusted on your side of the Atlantic and on ours."

This appeal, as Sir Guy answered the following day, left him no choice, and the papers in this volume abundantly testify to the way in which the trust reposed in him was fulfilled.

Though preliminaries of peace with America had been signed on the 30th of November, 1782, they were conditional upon the settlement of that with France and Spain. These were signed on the 20th of January, 1783, and the news was immediately transmitted from France to the Americans, being received by them before official notification from England reached New York. An account of its reception at Philadelphia is given in the opening letter from the pen of a British officer—Captain Armstrong, Deputy Quarter Master General, who, as shown in the third volume of this Calendar, had been commissioned to convey certain stores and money to the British and German prisoners of war in Pennsylvania and Maryland. In spite of passports these stores were stopped in transit, and representations to the authorities took him to Philadelphia where he evidently made good use of his opportunities of observation, though not daring from his situation to commit anything to writing. On his return to New York, at the Commander-in-Chief's desire, the interesting narrative quoted was set down, and includes the opinions of the Americans on the articles of peace, remarks on their relations with the French and Spaniards, and on the French Minister, their finances and army, General Washington and Congress, parties in Pennsylvania, the future union or disruption of the thirteen states, trade with England, etc., etc.

The last military episode of the war was a successful though belated attempt made in April 1783, to recover New Providence, Bahamas, from the Spaniards, who, assisted by some American ships, had captured it in May 1782. The small expedition started from St. Augustine under Major Andrew Deveaux, a provincial officer of South Carolina. In General McArthur's words:—"With a handful of ragged militia and five privateers he took Providence, where were five hundred Spaniards, seventy pieces of cannon and six galleys, but unluckily he was nine days too late." By the fifth Article of the treaty with Spain, Providence and the Bahamas had been restored to England. He remained on the island some time, together with the Spanish governor, and his action was rewarded by Carleton with the temporary gratification of 20s. a day to the 24th of December and a strong

recommendation to Government for a more permanent mark of the King's favour, not only for his gallantry in this but for previous services and losses. He and others of the same family or name appear at a subsequent date amongst the claimants under the royal commission appointed in London to compensate American sufferers.

By the cession of East Florida to Spain the minds of the loyalists of South Carolina and Georgia who had removed thither were again disturbed. It was hoped that the Bahamas might be available to settlers, and Brig. Gen. McArthur, who commanded at St. Augustine, was instructed by Carleton to send Lieut. Wilson of the Engineers to examine Providence, and, later, all the other islands, to report on their nature, soil, harbours, defences, etc. His plan of the harbour and town of Nassau is still amongst these papers. The reports of some intending settlers as to Providence were not very favourable, as the soil was said to be rocky and no tracts of land contiguous where negroes could be employed. Many, however, of these southern loyalists did remove to that and other islands, and from New York more than a thousand persons associated themselves to settle at Abbaco. The question of titles to ungranted or escheated lands was one of the subjects submitted by Carleton to the home Government. The islands were put by him for the time being under the military direction of McArthur, who, on the evacuation of East Florida, was to take thither the remains of the garrison of St. Augustine. Strong representations being made by the Governor and Houses of Assembly of East Florida against the too early removal of the troops, under apprehension of depredations by lawless people on the frontiers, a detachment of the Royal Artillery, reinforced by three companies of the 37th Regiment from New York, was ordered to remain till the actual delivery of the province to Spain. The attachment of the Indians to the British is dwelt on by Governor Tonyn, by the Brigadier and by Lt. Col. Brown, the Superintendent of Indian Affairs :—"The minds of the Indians are as much agitated as those of the unhappy loyalists on the eve of a third evacuation, and however chimerical it may appear to us, they have seriously proposed to abandon their country and accompany us, having made all the world their enemies by their attachment to us (p. 59)." On this point, however, Carleton's orders to the superintendent were decisive,—to discourage the idea as destructive and embarrassing.

A good deal of correspondence occurs over the question of the disbanding of the Royal Garrison Battalion stationed in Bermuda. Against the orders to remove all Provincial Regiments to Nova Scotia there to be disbanded, it was urged that this battalion consisted almost wholly of veterans, that they were nearly all entitled to Chelsea, and that their removal to such a climate as Nova Scotia would be fatal to many.

Finally, Carleton agreed to have them disbanded in Bermuda and passage home given to such as should pass the Chelsea Board, the others being removed to Nova Scotia. To this island also Carleton sent an officer of the engineers to survey its military defences and report generally with a view to its security or benefit, but the ship of war, the *Mentor*, on which he was returning, was wrecked, and he and all the information collected, lost. Lt. Durnford, of the same corps, was afterwards appointed to a similar duty.

Two sets of prisoners remained in the hands of the Americans, namely :—those of Gen. Burgoyne's army held since the Convention of Saratoga in 1777, and those taken at Yorktown in Virginia, by the capitulation of Earl Cornwallis in October, 1781. By the end of May these had nearly all been returned, but in the case of the German troops the numbers fell short of what were expected. Amongst other reasons, no doubt, it was found that, in consideration of money paid for their release from prison, many had become indented servants and taken the oath of allegiance to the States, the Americans said "willingly," the Germans themselves said "by compulsion." A particular case is cited of about thirty-five who were thus indented to a Mr. Faesch at Mount Hope, and to whom, on the calling in of prisoners, the following propositions were made by the American officers (p. 131).—First, to purchase their liberty by the payment of 30*l.* each and become free citizens of America ; second, to enlist in the American army ; and third, on refusal of these, to go back to Philadelphia jail. Choosing the latter, they were actually marched off, but apparently hesitated and sent for Mr. Faesch to whom they are said to have entered into "a voluntary agreement" on his paying the 30*l.* per head required. Gen. Lincoln, the American secretary for war, disclaimed all responsibility, maintaining generally that if prisoners did not come in, it was to be inferred that they did not wish to return. The Governor of the State also declined to act and the matter was said to rest with the inhabitants. The conclusion of the case is not given in these papers, but the last mention of Mr. Faesch is at New York where he was expected to be found willing to release his claim to several.

By the letters of recommendation from Carleton to Gov. Parr it will be seen that numbers of officers and men of these corps took advantage of the permission from the German Princes to quit the service and joined the settlers in Nova Scotia, where they received grants of land as others.

With the exception of six of the best regiments, which were kept to the last, the German troops with the British invalids were returned to Europe as a first embarkation in June and July.

Amongst the miscellaneous activities of the Commander-in-Chief's office throughout these months was the establishment of numerous boards of commissioners, the most noticeable of which were:—that to settle and adjust matters of debt, and that appointed, jointly with General Washington, to superintend embarkations at New York, complaint being made of the shipping of negroes who were said to be American property. A careful register and description was kept, and is still here, of all the negroes embarked and inspected by these commissioners, to be of service in any claims of unlawful deportation which might be put forward later. There is also in this connection a bill of 18*l.* for a dinner given at Roubalet's tavern by the British Commissioners in return for one given by the American Commissioners at Black Sam's tavern, as well as some accounts of Captain Gilfillan and others, presumably in the same capacity, for dinners and suppers, in which the entry "a large chicken paye" at a cost of over 2*l.* figures more than once. Another subject is the disposal of the prisoners in the provost, many being recruited for service in the West Indies; in the case of the worst criminals sent thither an opportunity was to be taken of dispatching them to the coast of Africa. Orphan children in the Orphan House were sent to Halifax in the care of a minister of religion. Public records were handed over and property delivered up. Militia was organized for the Bermudas, the Bahamas and Nova Scotia, and stores and money transferred there. The people of the civil departments of the army were assisted to Nova Scotia; other clerks received six weeks' pay to enable them to get to their homes. Towards the end, as the city fund gets low, even the question of a supply of oil for the lighthouse has to be submitted to the General. Several accounts of wages to his own servants and "chore women" remain, in one of which is this item:—"Bought by the Commander-in-Chief's orders, clothing for two poor children, 5*l.*"

But that which lends to this evacuation its peculiar interest is the spectacle of the enforced emigration of the thousands of loyalists of all classes, who, after the peace, found that they were still under existing laws of proscription, banishment, and confiscation of property, and that any attempt to return to their homes or native States met with maltreatment and threatened death. Carleton writes of the leaders of the Americans as elated and intoxicated by the peace and as having cast off all desire to be reconciled to the loyalists, and refers to associations forming to prevent restitution of property and renewed intercourse, which associations were quite uncontrolled by the States. These committees or associations are frequently referred to in this volume. He suggests to Clinton, the Governor of the State of New York, that "seeing the hostile dispositions of the committeemen, the legislature might give some direction to a more

desirable spirit by repealing laws made during the war." To Lord North he wrote, "it is utterly impossible to leave exposed to the rage and violence of these people men of character whose only offence has been their attachment to the King's service," adding that "the proceedings are not to be attributed to politics alone—it serves as a pretence, and under that cloak they act more boldly, but avarice and a desire of rapine are the great incentives." Concerning the whole matter of the treaty in its relation to the loyalists, the attitude of Congress and the different legislatures, the reader is better referred to the monograph entitled, "The Loyalists and their Fortunes," in Winsor's "Narrative and Critical History of America," Vol. VII., p. 185. So many were driven to the necessity of seeking fresh homes that the tonnage available at New York was wholly inadequate. Transports were collected from the West Indies and sent from England, while refugees who were able joined forces in ships of their own providing. An order issued on the 1st September attempted to restrict free passages and provisions to persons actually in want. As early as the 17th of April there is a return of 5,593 persons for Nova Scotia. In June 4,000 more are reported. Later are 47 families of the Reformed Calvinistic Church and 60 families of Quakers. In July Gov. Parr writes :—"The people from New York number about 12,000." By September, great numbers—eight to ten thousand—were still desirous of being removed, so that Gov. Parr in October again reports :—"They arrive by two or three ships at a time, which makes it difficult to obtain exact numbers, but I believe they amount to 24,000." A few days later he says 29,000. In the official return by Brook Watson, Commissary General, dated two days before the troops finally left, the total number gone from New York to Nova Scotia is given as 29,244. Adding those from Penobscot and Carolina, part of the Garrison Battalion from Bermuda, and troops discharged at Halifax, the result is 32,224, while those to Abbaco number 1,458 and to Quebec, 1,328, the latter not including those who went there by way of the Lakes. No complete return appears here of those who went to Britain. Copies of the almost daily letters of recommendation written by Sir Guy Carleton to Gov. Parr on behalf of individuals or parties are preserved, as well as those to the Secretary of State for such as went to England, and to the Governors of Bermuda and the Bahamas. In calendaring the appeals addressed to him for relief and assistance* it was found impossible to narrate the circumstances of each claimant, but one or two entries are suggestive :—A refugee from New York has signed to go with his wife and family to Nova Scotia "and cannot command as much money as would purchase either of them a pair of shoes." Another is "without a shilling,"

and a third family formerly "lived in plenty and even fashion, but lately have been nearly in want of bread." Sums of money were granted and other assistance provided, stores of linen and woollen material, spades and axes were sent with them, but hardships, suffering and distress were inevitable both before and after their final settlement on the lands allotted to them. At the time of the autumn arrivals Gov. Parr represents that he had been obliged to put Government to expense for boards, etc., to preserve many from perishing, for "the oldest man in the province does not remember such severe bad weather as we have had for some time past." Amongst his other duties Carleton found time to draw up the outline of a plan for the granting of lands in the neighbourhood of towns, to prevent the mischief of large grants in such situations, and to secure to the inhabitants the means of supplying themselves with pasture and vegetables; as well as to urge on Government the total abolition of the temporarily suspended quitrents, and that, in the revision of the constitution of the colony, there should be a clear and explicit exemption from all taxation, except by their own legislature. He also sent thither Lieut.-Col. Morse, Chief Engineer, to obtain a general knowledge of the province and to examine and report on its military defences, its natural strength, resources and advantages. Several interesting letters from that officer appear in this volume. His survey took so long and his report became so voluminous that he could not return to New York before the evacuation, but remained in Nova Scotia till the next summer. The long report mentioned may be found printed in Dr. Brymner's Reports on Canadian Archives for the year 1884, published 1885.

That class of loyalists which had taken up arms, spoken of throughout these volumes as the Provincial Troops and British American Forces, were now to be disbanded and also settle in Nova Scotia. By royal order given early in the year each non-commissioned officer was to receive 200 acres, and each private 50 acres, exclusive of what he should be entitled to in right of his family, with rations for one year. Many of the regiments in New York, had, by their agents, selected lands in the vicinity of St. John's River, and, on the 12th September, transports conveying seventeen corps sailed direct to that place, where they were to be disbanded and hut during the winter on their own lands. One of the transports, the *Martha*, on which were the Maryland Loyalists and part of the 2nd Battalion of Delancey's Brigade, was wrecked on Seal Islands in the Bay of Fundy, and one hundred lives lost, six officers and seventeen persons being saved. Strict orders were issued for the preservation of peace and regularity amongst so many disbanded soldiers, and names of officers fit to act as justices of the peace were recommended to the Governor.

By the exertions of Lieut.-Col. Benjamin Thompson, of the King's American Dragoons, whose letter recounting his efforts on their behalf is given on page 204, the officers of the Provincial regiments became entitled to half-pay. Colonel Thompson himself was a native of America, and was proscribed and banished as a loyalist by the State of New Hampshire. As Count Rumford or Von Rumford, his brilliant career is well known, and it is worth noticing that he was the projector of the Royal Institution, in which this collection of MSS. is now deposited.

Only a hint is given in these pages of the royal commission established by Act of Parliament in July of this year in London to afford compensation to loyalist sufferers. Its history belongs to the next few years, the papers relating thereto being in the Public Record Office.

On the 21st to 22nd October the evacuation of New York by the British troops began in earnest, having only been delayed, as Sir Guy pointed out to the Americans, by the necessity of first seeing the loyalists in safety. Fifteen days later the last of the Hessian regiments followed, together with the Royal Artillery and the ordnance ships. On the 25th November the remaining loyalists and the troops were withdrawn from the city "without the smallest circumstance of irregularity or misbehaviour of any kind." By arrangement with Governor Clinton and his Council, Staten Island and a few other convenient points were reserved till the transports which were daily expected arrived to remove about two thousand of the troops still left. Sir Guy himself embarked on His Majesty's Ship *Ceres*. Though not in this collection, it is characteristic that his last letters, dated off Staten Island on the 29th November, are both in connection with the loyalists:—the one, a recommendation of certain memorials of widows of Provincial officers; the other, concerning lists and statements on behalf of the officers themselves.

A word may be added with regard to the occasional references throughout these four volumes to duplicates in the Public Record Office. Some of the series there, particularly that of the "America and West Indies," have recently been reclassified and renumbered, but the papers referred to may still be identified without much difficulty.

As previously explained, the material of this Calendar was well advanced in the lifetime of the late Mr. B. F. Stevens and has been seen through the press by Mr. H. J. Brown.

CAPTAIN WILLIAM ARMSTRONG to SIR GUY CARLETON.

1783, April 1. New York.—“ Sir. The desire that I ever have to be of service in any capacity makes me most readily comply with your Excellency’s wish that I should put in writing such observations as came within my knowledge during the time I was at Philadelphia and other parts of the interior country.

From the time I left this place, the 17th Decr. last, every person outside our Lines expected and wished to hear of peace being settled almost upon any terms. They were tired with the length of the war, and the most sanguine amongst them knew they could not long support it, on account of the very deranged state of their finances.

On the 23rd of March the Triumph sloop of war arrived express in 37 days from Cadiz, w^t letters from the Comte d’Estaing and Marquis La Fayette to the French Minister at Philadelphia and different people in Congress, informing them that a general peace had taken place at Paris on the 20th of January. The captain of the vessel had orders from Comte d’Estaing to order all vessels belonging to France to cease hostilities, and to give copys of y^e orders he had received to all British cruisers. He brought out with him a table copied from a French newspaper, specifying at what time hostilities were to cease in different latitudes. I could not procure a copy of it, but recollect hearing a gentleman say that it mentioned they were to cease in eight days after the ratification of peace in the English seas, two months in this country and four months in the East Indies. The accounts of the unlimited Independance of America being granted, gave the greatest pleasure to the Whig party, the greatest uneasiness to the Torys, all of whom dread the consequences of a separation from Great Britain and anticipate the evils that ’tis more than probable will ensue from it.

Some of the warmest Whigs acknowledged to me that had Great Britain made it an Article that the restoring all the

confiscated property of the Loyalists should be the condition on which Independency should be granted, it most certainly would have been complied with. When the Provisional Articles were read before the Assembly of Pennsylvania and a number of people gathered together on the occasion, they acknowledged that the terms were much more liberal than they had any right to expect, at the same time they ridiculed that Article which says that Congress should recommend to the different Assemblies the restoration of ye property of the Loyalists, well knowing that no attention would be paid to it by the Assembly's; and Col. Hamilton, a Member of Congress, acknowledged to me that he was of the same opinion. Yet the Article on their part should certainly be complied with, tho' sensible it would not answer any purpose wished for on ours. The boundaries established by the Commissioners are much more extensive than they expected, and they all think very politick in our Commissioners giving up the Floridas to Spain, as it will save Great Britain much expence and trouble, and places a power close to them that they expect ever to be at enmity with, as they already declare they will have the sole navigation of the River Mississippi.

I heard Col. Hamilton read part of a letter he had received from the Marquis La Fayette, dated at Cadiz, and sent to him by his servant who came passenger in the *Triumph*, wherein he says—'Had not the accounts of peace arrived we should in three days have sailed from hence with forty-nine sail of the line and twenty thousand troops, to have been joined in the West Indies by the combined Fleets, consisting of twenty-six sail of the line and fifteen thousand troops, forming altogether a force consisting of seventy-five sail of the line and thirty-five thousand troops, the whole to be under the command of Comte d'Estaing, with which he was to have made an attack on Jamaica; yet such an idea have they of the force that Britain would have sent out to oppose them, that they are happy the attempt was not made, as they have not the smallest doubt that this would have proved unsuccessful, and consequently the terms of peace would have been less favourable.'

The Marquis says likewise in his letter that he wished much to have been the bearer of such wellcome news as this must have been to America, but was obliged to go to Madrid wth Comte d'Estaing; he, however, flattered himself with the hopes of being here in July next, when he expected he will come out as Ambassador.

They all appeared much surprised at Comte d'Estaing's not being more explicit in his letters as to the terms of peace and cessation of hostilities, and were at a loss to account for it. Yet not one person doubted that a general peace was agreed upon. So convinced were the merchants of it that they immediately dissarmed some letters of marque, purchased vessels of large burthen, and were loading them with

flour, some of which is destined for a British market, and goods were sold 50 p. cent. lower than before the arrival of that vessell. Many of the merchants applied to me to bring in and forward letters to merchants in London with whom they wish to form connections; all agreeing that when the animosity incidental to a Civil War was subsided, that if Great Britain adopt proper methods with America she will still, from the similarity of religion, manners, &c., retain the principal trade of it, and the attachment between the two countries will be as strong as formerly.

Many of the Americans are already jealous of the French, and all in their hearts detest them, but have too much policy to show it, and it appears reciprocal, but less concealed by the French.

They have still a greater dislike to the Spaniards, who on their part treat them with the most sovereign contempt.

They are exceedingly anxious for the arrival of ye Treaty of Commerce, and reprobate every idea of their trade being restrained by France, which next to the weakning the powers of Great Britain by dismembering the Empire has been the great object. They are convinced that Spain will not allow them to trade with their colony's, as they are supplied from Mexico and Old Spain, and have the same idea with regard to France. To this power they acknowledge themselves under great obligations, yet do not hesitate to say it was not regard for America that made them take the part they have done.

They admire very much the conduct of their Commissioners, Messrs. Franklin, Jay and Adams, in making this Treaty of Peace, and think that Franklin outwitted Mr. Oswald in the Article with regard to restoring the property of the Loyalists, which was first proposed by Mr. O. and intended to have been made a positive Article in the Treaty, from which he was dissuaded by the eloquence of Franklin and obstinacy of Jay, to whom with that quality they allow much merit, as they do likewise to Adams, altho they dont think him equal to the other two.

Altho I never could meet with any person that could well explain it to me, yet I have every reason to believe that those three are much influenced by the French Ministry, and have often heard it hinted that Mr. Franklin in particular was in the pay of France. If so, it is natural to suppose the others likewise are. And I also believe, nay, am certain that several people about Philadelphia are also paid by France; who in every transaction wth them shows the greatest policy.

In every place or company the French Minister or rather Mons. Marbois (the Minister being only the ostensible person) has spys who carefully attend to the conversation and sentiments of each person, and regularly repeat them to him, so that he has the earliest intelligence of the effects each step has on the minds of the people, and acts accordingly.

Had it not been that the finances of France were in so bad a situation as to make an immediate peace absolutely necessary it was not the intention of that Court to conclude one at this time. As they very justly flattered themselves that the longer this country was kept at war with Great Britain, the greater wou'd be the animosity and difficulty of connecting them again, whilst they of course woud gain a larger share in the trade. It does not appear to me that in making the peace the American Commissioners have attended more to the interest of one State than of the whole. But untill the particulars are known tis impossible to form any idea on this subject.

Every person at Philadelphia acknowledges the bad state of the finances of this country, and all agree in saying that had our Ministry not been in such a hurry to conclude a peace with them, they must have accepted any terms that had been offered, as they have not any funds or prospects of raising any money to support the expences of another campaign.

The officers of the army at West Point have lately sent in to Congress two Memorials or rather Remonstrances, worded in the strongest terms, insisting that as there was a prospect of peace their arrears shoud immediately be paid, and security given for future pay. Their last Memorial was occasioned by a well written inflammatory paper being distributed through the Army, which after stating the causes, recommended a meeting of so many officers of each rank to form a committee to wait upon Congress—a move that was reprobated in the strongest terms by Genl. Washington, who with his usual policy on such occasions advised more gentle methods, put off the day they had appointed to meet as above mentioned and made a new arrangement of the officers appointed to form the committee, at which I believe he attended, and backed their Memorial, which, I was told by a gentleman who saw it, was drawn up in a firm and manly stile, to which Congress replied that every step shoud immediately be taken to satisfy their demands. Thus, by General Washington's policy, a step was prevented taking place which gave the greatest alarm, and might have been productive of very serious consequences.

I was informed that their Army at present consists of fourteen thousand men under the immediate operating command of Genl. Washington, that they are well appointed in every particular and highly disciplined. The French officers all told me they were amazed to see them so perfect in their exercise and manoeuvres.

Great reductions and reformatations have taken place in the Army; much greater will take place on peace being ratified.

They talk of not keeping more than two regiments in each State; those that are reduced, and chuse to accept of it, to have grants of land in the back country, particularly on the

banks of the Ohio, where great numbers have already emigrated and settled.

Tis said that when peace takes place Genl. Washington means to retire to his estate in Virginia, and not take any part whatever in publick affairs. They do not think him ambitious, else he might very easily gett himself appointed King of America, as the Army is entirely at his command. In general he appears to be respected by all partys, more for his capacity as a politician than a soldier.

The powers of Congress are now very confin'd, as they can only recommend to the Assemblys of the different States what they wish to have done, it still remaining with the Assembly to determine whether or not they will comply with their request. Congress can assess the different States with their proportion of taxes thought necessary to be raised for the use of the whole, but cannot themselves raise any money. The Members of Congress acknowledge that they are little better than mere cyphers, and attribute to themselves the blame of transferring so much of the power out of their own hands into that of the Assemblys of the different States.

In each of these, there appears to be two partys who study to counteract each other, particularly in Pensylvania, where they have run very high, and are now headed by Mr. Dickinson, the present Governor, and Mr. Reed his predecessor; till lately all the principal people were much attached to Mr. Dickinson, thinking him a man of very superior abilities—which as a courtier he certainly is—but they now find him timorous, fickle, and indecisive, an unfit character to govern a State in its present convulsed situation. Mr. Reed, his opponent and head of the other party, or rather the mobility, is a man of great abilitys, possessed of a daring, enterprizing genius, but said to be destitute of every honorable sentiment.

Few of them expect that the thirteen States will long remain under the same Government, the ideas of the Eastern and Western States being so very different in every particular. Some people think they will be divided into two Governments or Kingdoms, divided by the Hudsons River; others think into three Governments, comprehending the Eastern, Middle and Western Governments, divided by the Hudson and Susquehannah Rivers. In a very short time they will take the Floridas from Spain, and tis more than probable they will not stop there.

They speak warmly of forming connections in trade with England, and I heard many of the merchants openly declare that whatever article could be got there equally good with that from any other country they would ever go to England for it. I understood that the French Ministry dreaded this very much, and were exceedingly jealous of the apparent intimacy between Mr. Oswald and Mr. Adams, as it seems

they have a much higher opinion of Mr. Oswald's mercantile than political ideas.

They expect that an Ambassador will shortly be sent out from England to reside in Philadelphia, and that there will then be an English and French Party, but all think the first will easily gain and keep the ascendancy, if the person sent out is a man of ability and address. In general, the people appear to be easily led by appearances, being open to every species of flattery, fond of every kind of amusement and entertainment, and always most attached to the person who will contribute most to their pleasures. From this rule I must except the Quakers, but they from principle as well as policy will ever attach themselves to the English interest.

When it was known that the Washington Packet, Capt. Barney, which brought the Provisional Articles of Peace, protected by a passport from His Majesty, had also brought a considerable quantity of money, which was lodged in the Bank, and also sixty bales of dry goods (which were uninsured) every person I heard speak of it exclaimed against his conduct as an infringement of the passport, and it was said he was to be prosecuted for so doing, but I do not expect they will take any further notice of it, as they reprobated his conduct more from the risk he thereby run of being detained if taken by any of our cruisers, than from any ideas of publick honour or honesty, which, as yet, are as infantine as their States.

On the 21st of March a brig named the Duc de Lauzun—Green, master—arrived at Philad' in three weeks from the Havannah, which place he left in company with the Alliance frigate, Capt. Barry, and ten sail of Spanish line of battle ships, going to join Vaudreuil's Fleet.

Had not an express arrived there from Cadiz those ships were to have convoyed a fleet then laying ready to sail for Old Spain, on board of which were twenty millions of dollars, which immediately on the arrival of the express were relanded. Green, brought with him fifty or sixty thousand dollars; Barry, who arrived about ten days ago at Providence, brought 135,000 dollars, 85,000 of which were publick, the other private property.

Had it not been for the supply of cash brought by these three vessels, the Bank must certainly have stopped payment for some time, as they had very little cash in possession, not even sufficient to answer the common demands. The credit of the Bank is looked upon as perfectly good, as the shares are only held by persons of large property. Each share is 250*l.* curry., and no one person is allowed to hold more than four shares. The profits of the Bank arise from discounting bills of short dates, and the use of the cash whilst their notes are in circulation. The idea of this Bank first originated with Mr. Robt. Morris, who sett it on foot and by his credit raised it to its present situation. He still presides, and so well is his credit established thro the country, that one of

his notes is much easier passed than a bank note. His resignation of the office of Financier General alarmed every person in power, as they well knew they had not any person of equal capacity or credit that they could appoint to succeed him. If another campaign had taken place it would have been the severest stroke that could have happened to them, as no person would have entered into any contract for supplies, unless he made himself responsible. That appears to be reason of the vote of secrecy imposed upon him by Congress, which in his second letter he desires may be taken off, as after his first letter of the 24th of January, in which he informs them of his intention of resigning next May, they formed contracts in his name before the people knew of his having resigned.

The instant that the Triumph arrived with the accounts of peace, they talked of the evacuation of New York and its dependencies. Many of them thought it ought to be done immediately; those less sanguine and more liberal in their ideas allowed till the end of June, but none exceeded that period.

It was reported in Philadelphia that a law had lately been passed in the State of New York, confiscating the property of those three islands. I conversed with several of them on this subject, and the most sanguine amongst them reprobated the measure as a most cruel and unjustifiable step. I have since heard that an attempt was made to pass this law, but it was thrown out. I also heard that Messrs. Clinton, De Waine and Livingston are appointed a Committee to act for thirty days after the evacuation of this place, their orders and decisions to be final.

The day before I left Philadelphia, Genl. Lincoln, Secretary at War, told me that he supposed all our prisoners would be sent to New York immediately after the arrival of the official accounts of peace, which were every day expected from Brest.

I have thus endeavoured to mention everything I can recollect, but as it entirely depends upon memory, not daring to write any thing on account of my situation whilst amongst them, there may still be many things in which your Excellency may wish for information. Should any questions occur, if in my power I shall be happy to answer them and by every method study to assure your Excellency that with the highest esteem and respect I have the honor to be, &c."

 “ overseers, who were to render an account to the police.”

On my arrival here I found this order in force, and practised under the direction of General Pattison, Commandant of the city. On General Pattison's departure, finding the method directed by Sir Henry Clinton perfectly consonant to that which my instructions directed me to observe, in case the Commander-in-Chief, by setting any part of the

country at the King's peace had suffered this care to devolve on me, when Sir Henry Clinton desired me to carry the spirit of my instructions into execution not in the character of a Civil Governor but of a General Officer, subject to his orders, I continued the practice I found instituted, with this difference, that I gave free entry into the vestry to all the respectable citizens, and I subjected the payments to be made by the Treasurer to more cheques. The receipts and payments, after being examined by men of character and well versed in accounts, have been stated and published. Every particular is stated in books I now put into General Birch's possession, not only for his information, and to enable him to proceed in this business, but subject to the direction of the Commander-in-Chief to be open to the inspection of the publick.

The houses have been preserved by being put under the care of persons interested in their preservation, and as the produce has been applied for purposes absolutely necessary, and which otherwise must have been an expence to the Crown, the amount is a publick saving.

I found that the distance from some parts of Long Island, and the expense of living at New York, made most of the inhabitants of that isle rather suffer wrong than apply to the Courts of New York for redress, and that the want of Courts on Long Island left every licentiousness and crime unpunished. These considerations led me to institute a Court of Police on Long Island, with such amendments as observations made me think proper. Happily, the gentlemen who were chose for judges have executed whatever I could hope from them. Justice and equity and order have taken place there, and a want of the rules which are instituted for guarding liberty have been little felt, while delay and expence have been entirely avoided. The farms and derelict houses have, agreeable to my instructions, been employed and divided among distressed refugees; such as could not be applied to the advantage of these, have been let for their benefit, or for the payment of the judges and officers of the police on Long Island.

I leave in General Campbell's hands accounts of all the moneys that have been received or paid. The books show the distribution of all the houses and farms, the names of all that have been provided for, and will give an idea of the advantages that have been derived from the cultivation of these farms. The houses which have hitherto covered refugees, will, when returned to their owners, be found in a better condition than they would have been without this regulation.

It is my duty, as the powers by which I have acted are derived from the Commander-in-Chief, to lay these matters before you. If the attention I have paid to these subjects meets with your Excellency's approbation, I think myself abundantly rewarded. I am, &c.

of to the more deserving, and if I have trespassed so as to incur your Excellency's displeasure in so doing, I am most sinserely sorry for it, and submitt this jenuine relation of the transactions to your will and pleasure. I am, with infinite respect, your Excellency's, &c."

The King's American Dragoons, who are dismounted, having desired to be sent to St. John's River, Bay of Fundy, I have agreed to their request, and they will proceed directly to that place, where they are to encamp and do duty for the present; but as the period of their stay there is uncertain, I wou'd advise you not to withdraw the troops actually posted there.

Many officers of the Provincial Troops take this opportunity of going to Nova Scotia to look for places for future settlements; as their situation claims our particular attention,

I recommend them to you for every assistance in your power.

I send an engineer to Port Roseway, and enclose a copy of the instructions he has received, for your information.

You will observe in these instructions that the engineer is directed to apply for an ample reservation of lands for the purpose of establishing a military post for the defence of the settlement. You will please to make application to the Governor for this purpose, but you will not admit of any works being constructed, or of any expences being incurred at that place, nor any other without express orders.

I am obliged to express myself in these general terms (which you will understand as extending to all extraordinary expences whatever) as the accounts of the expenditures within your district have hitherto been kept from me, notwithstanding repeated and express orders for their being transmitted here.

You will please to send Captain Hare, of the Royal Artillery, to Port Roseway by the first opportunity, where he will take the command of that department, and give every assistance in his power to the settlers.

I enclose an extract of a letter from Sir Henry Clinton to Governor Patterson, with a copy of a letter from Lord George Germain on the subject of Captain Callbeck's affair, by which you will perceive the matter appears to have been referred home; and that until I receive directions in consequence, I can take no further steps in it. But I must observe that Captain Callbeck's claims appear to be for expenditures made previous to any proper authority for so doing, and part even in direct contempt of orders.

It does not appear to me that Captain Callbeck's Company has been so far completed as to entitle him to the usual allowances, or even to a commission."

Whilst the chiefs are with us, the young men dare not attempt the commission of any depredations or outrages on the persons or property of the inhabitants, to which resentment or their natural ferocity of temper might hurry them.

In a conference with a Creek chief yesterday, he told me he had heard "That the Great King had sent a peace talk "to the Virginians and Spaniards to inform them that if they "would bury the hatchet, that he would order all the "English across the great water, and give them as a present "all the Indian warriors their families and lands to be "divided betwixt them. I am, said he, a man and a warrior, "and a friend to the English. This talk is a Virginia lie; "I don't believe it; an Englishman will never turn his back "and betray his friend."

The situation of our poor unfortunate allies most sensibly affects me. They were ever faithful to me; I never deceived them. Your Excellency, I hope, will pardon the liberty of saying, I now feel for my own honor."

my attempting to travel there and cultivate a friendly intercourse with the people of the place into which I first entered, and doubting whether it may be altogether so proper *immediately* to address his Excellency on the subject as more mediately and indirectly to communicate it to one of his aids-de-camp ; I presume on your goodness, Sir, for the freedom I take in a recital of the facts, in order that you may (*if you think proper*) lay them before his Excellency *seasonably*, in case he should find any purpose in holding them up in his conferences with General Washington.

They are as follows:—Some little time after the publication of an armistice between the belligerent Powers, I thought it might prove of use to myself and family to pass into the Jerseys, and speculate on the spirit and temper of the times there, in order to determine whether it would be feaseable to replace my wife and children in the township where they formerly resided, for the purpose of a more easy maintenance of them, and to be in the way, with the assistance of their friends, of finally recovering their property ; and accordingly I pitched upon the neighbourhood of Woodbridge to make my entrance, where I had been subject for near three years past in the capacity of a prisoner of war on my parole given to General Washington, in consequence of a parole of like nature given by a certain John Hampton to his Excellency Sir Henry Clinton, at the time of the said Hampton being liberated from the Provost. In this place, where I had received much civility, for a course of time, as well from the particular party who captured me, as from the inhabitants in general, between whom and myself had passed a reciprocation of good offices, they frequently granting me real indulgences that were not common to every one in a like predicament with myself, and I embracing every opportunity to make all possible acknowledgements consistent with my avowal of the strictest loyalty and fidelity to the cause of my rightful Sovereign, I say, in this place, I received the most outrageous insults, and narrowly escaped the most shameful and degrading abuse. A number of fellows came about me with sticks and whips (the most of whom had *formerly* treated me with *great courtesy*) telling me the case was altered now ; that when a prisoner of war, they thought it incumbent to be civil to me, but the peace had dissolved all paroles, and I had no right or title to come there, and they were determined to give me (as they insultingly termed it) a *continental jacket*. I expostulated with them whether I had ever injured any of *them* or others they had heard of in their properties ; or had so much as in the slightest manner affronted their persons ; in answer to which they told me I had proved a traitor to my country and had joined the enemy, and they were determined that no such damned rascals should ever enjoy the benefits of the country again ; and had, with the approbation of the Magistrates of

the township, entered into an association for the purpose of expelling every rascal that attempted to come into it in like form as they meant to treat me, by whipping them out again. Near or at this juncture came General Heard, of their militia, and appeared to aggravate the spirit of the mob very much by pointedly asking them what they meant to do with that *damned rascal?* and a Justice Freeman coming up shortly after, called out aloud *hang him up, hang him up.* A Justice Bloomfield, too, who finally showed a disposition to appease the spirit that had arisen in the people, first told me it was a crime to come there, and on my enquiring whether their conduct was authorized by the Magistracy, he said so far as that they had entered into an association, *with the knowledge of the Magistrates,* to treat persons coming as I had done in such sort, and believed they would find no redress. In short, it was with infinite difficulty I escaped their clutches with all the assistance I could get from a certain Thomas Edgar, who pleaded that he had received favours from one of my sons when a prisoner under his charge, and held himself under obligations to the family; and from the benevolent interposition of their clergyman, Mr. Rowe, who in every instance and respect behaved very much like a Christian and a gentleman.

I could mention many other circumstances expressive of a most intollerant spirit prevailing among them, but I have been already too prolix, without being well able to avoid it, and relate the whole of the principal facts, for which I must beg your pardon, and subscribe myself, Your most obedient, etc.

The same day it was read to the naval prisoners in the Provost, and a circular letter sent off express to the prisoners who were on parole on Long Island informing them thereof, and desiring them to hold themselves in readiness to be sent out. The next day I had six vessels in the Walabough under flags of truce, which on the 9th of April took the whole of the prisoners on board and carried them to their respective places of abode to save them expence and the fatigue of long marches—excepting about 18 or 20 sick and wounded who could not be removed with safety—concerning them I wrote to Mr. G. Turner, chief under Mr. Morris for marine prisoners, but received no answer. The poor people having got better,

they were delivered to Mr. Hopkins, intendant for prisoners, who sent them to Boston the 3rd instant.

The provost was cleared of the marine prisoners (without exception) on the 10th of April. And on and after the 7th of same month passports were granted to those who were on parole to go out, as it suited their convenience."

The strictest attention shall be paid to everything you have mentioned; I fear, however, I must venture to deviate a little from the mode of delivering presents to the Indians, as Colonel Brown has represented to me it would intirely ruin his credit with them, particularly at this critical juncture, when the utmost attention is necessary in our conduct towards them, in order if possible to keep them in temper, and Colonel Brown's character for integrity is so well established there is not the least danger of misapplication; nothing, however, shall be purchased or given them without my knowledge. Your Excellency will perceive by the state of the presents remaining in store that there is little to be delivered untill purchased.

I shall most carefully guard against every improper expence, but if the numbers arrive that are talked of, I foresee a heavy expence will unavoidably be incurred. In all transactions with the Indians I shall consult with the Governor and Superintendant, and use every possible means to conciliate their good will. The minds of these people appear as much agitated as those of the unhappy loyalists on the eve of a third evacuation; and however chimerical it may appear to us, they have very seriously proposed to abandon their country and accompany us, having made all the world their enemies by their attachment to us.

I have the honor to inclose to your Excellency a return of the receipts, issues, and presents remaining in store with each of the Indian Departments; Lieut. Col. Douglass has no vouchers to enable him to go further back, Mr. Graham not having left them with him; and Lieut. Col. Brown having been on a court martial for several days past has not had time to go further back, but promises to furnish it by next opportunity.

The several instructions, letters from the Secretaries of State and estimates, which Lieut. Colonels Brown and Douglass have furnished to me being exact copies of those your Excellency was pleased to send me, except an instruction relative to the Siminolies from Lord George Germain, dated 5 July, 1780, and a letter from Mr. Knox, Under Secretary of State (dated 6th June, 1781), to Mr. Charles Shaw, Deputy Superintendent, I thought it unnecessary to trouble your Excellency with any other copies except the two last mentioned, I likewise inclose a copy of Mr. Townshend's letter of the 14 February, 1783, to Lt. Col. Brown, a letter from the Speaker of the House of Assembly to Col. Brown of 29th April last, Col. Brown's letter of the 15th instant to me, and the substance of *talks* with the Indians.

I am infinitely obliged to your Excellency for honoring me with the rank of Brigadier General, and hope by a strict

attention to my duty to merit a continuation of your Excellency's good opinion.

I have appointed Capt. Roworth, of the King's Rangers, to act as Major of Brigade.

Col. Ball has cried *peccavi* and receives his rations.

This additional supply would have made the poor refugees very happy were it not for the sad alternative of seeking a new asylum or living under Spanish government. I have the honor to be, etc.

P.S.—The *Eliza*, victualler, with 379 barrels of flour, 237 do. pork, 63 do. beef, 60 do. oatmeal, 60 tierces of rice, and 289 barrels of peas, being missing, a ship anchored off this bar on the 19th inst. which some naval officers pronounced the *Eliza*; on this supposition the Commissary made the inclosed calculation and return, the sea running too high for any boat to pass the bar in order to ascertain what ship had arrived; but Lieut. O’Halloran, of the King’s Rangers, who was on board the *Eliza*, arrived this day and informs that the ship and cargo are lost. I inclose his letter to me on the subject [see 22 May]. I hope this loss will soon be replaced from York. That of the flour will be first felt; there is some to be purchased here and a good deal of rice, both cheaper than at York.

As to the refugees and old settlers, they dread Spanish government so much that on the first account of the evacuation most of them talked of removing, yet knew not whither, but since they have seen the violent resolves against the loyalists in many of the rebel provinces they are more undetermined, and what contributes much thereto is an account from London in some private letters by last mail of a vague report there that Government was to exchange Gibraltar for Porto Rico and the Floridas, and until this is done away by the arrival of a mail, the greatest number can form no resolution. A good many people have given in their names to go immediately to Europe and Providence agreeable to the Governor's proclamation, which I inclose; the Governor is to send you the exact number that is to go as above.

I inclose another newspaper which will inform your Excellency of a very spirited action lately performed by Major Deveaux, of the Beaufort Militia. With a handfull of ragged militia and five privateers from this place he took Providence, where were five hundred Spaniards, seventy pieces of cannon and six galleys, but unluckily he was nine days too late.

Major Manson, of the North Carolina Regiment, being in a very bad state of health, and the faculty having certified

the necessity of his trying his native air, I have taken the liberty to allow him to go to Britain first opportunity that offers.

St. Augustine.—“Your Excellency having been pleased to desire I would transmit some general account of this province, its produce, etc., I beg leave to observe that the number of souls is about sixteen thousand, the proportion nearly three blacks to two whites. The militia are formed into eight regiments, of some more than two hundred each, but they have never been properly mustered.

The chief crops are rice, indigo and Indian corn, but the profits of late years on tar and turpentine have been so great that the planters have given much into that, neglecting agriculture and trusting to the precarious supply of prize flour. Rye answers well and is fit for reaping in May.

A great inconvenience here is the flatness of the country; when an easterly wind prevails after heavy rains, the tides cannot fall, and the face of the country is in a manner covered with water, as was the case last winter for above two months; at these times the cattle suffer much, the higher grounds to which they retire affording little pasture.

The natural soil in the neighbourhood of this town being in general bad, it must always be ill supplied with provisions till a cut is made from Pablo or Julianton Creek to the North River, which empties itself into this harbour; these two creeks fall into St. John's River; the cut from the former would be about six miles, from the latter near four. Had the province remained with us it is probable one of these would be soon effected and then this town would be plentifully supplied with provisions; at present the distance being near forty miles is too great for land carriage. I mean from St. John's, where the best plantations are.

The large grants of ten or twenty thousand acres each to noblemen and gentlemen at home who have scarce done anything to them has been one great cause of the province being so little cultivated. The useful planter could find little land fit for his purpose without going far back, the best having been early taken up by those I have mentioned; the best lands are on St. Mary's River and towards the Musquito inlet.

No other produce has been exported except indigo, lumber and naval stores; the province in no year has yet been able to feed its inhabitants, at its first settlement the cultivation of indigo and of late years the making of tar and turpentine being more advantageous than raising provisions, but in time of peace the demand for the latter being much less the people would naturally apply themselves to agriculture.

Large quantities of deer and bearskins are brought down by the Indians, and during a peace, when few presents are made them, they would take a considerable deal of British manufactures in exchange for their peltry.

The two principal advantages this province enjoys are the healthiness of the climate, particularly in the neighbourhood of Augustine, and the great plenty of fish, all the creeks and rivers being amply stored with them; oysters are also in the greatest abundance, all the lime used here is made of their shells; from the great number of people that have lately come into the province and who were beginning to be reconciled to their fate, had it remained with us there is not the least doubt but it would be in a few years in a good state of cultivation could the large grants be done away. An order from the King in Council for this purpose has been issued some time ago, but some doubts remain with the people here as to the legality of that order.

Since the evacuation of Charlestown a little town regularly laid out is forming at the Bluff on St. John's River, seven miles from the bar, which (were we to keep the province) would soon become a place of some consequence on account of the bars being so much deeper and safer than that of Augustine and the goodness of the harbour of St. Mary's would materially induce numbers of people to settle there, where without doubt a town would soon form.

As to the defence of this place, whoever possesses it should keep several stout galleys and gunboats to defend the entrance of this harbour and that of the Metanza; the beach seldom admits landing cannon and stores upon it, and if an enemy is obliged to bring these by land carriage from St. John's River, and the Indians are not their friends, a few hundred of them, which could soon be brought down, would harrass an army so much by obliging it to send such strong escorts with each convoy as would greatly retard the progress of the siege."

All this is done under the cloak of friendship to the suffering loyalists, as they are to be kept until the Governor and his Council see what the States will do regarding the repeal of the Laws of Confiscation.

As you are fully satisfied that this is not the true cause, neither is it the way to soften the very disagreeable situation of the loyalists, who are much in the mercy of the States—I hope your goodness will do all in your power, and that speedily (as no opportunity is now missed in carrying off negroes by people to whom they do not belong), to put a stop to the wicked practices of this place.”

He has gone so far as to say the Commander-in-Chief had no power over him, therefore had no right to direct him,

This, my dear sir, is the situation we at present are in. All public business under the immediate control of a man whose chief study is to enrich himself at the expense of many. He and part of his Council give for the reason of their present conduct that they must first know that the Confiscation Laws in the State of Georgia and South Carolina are repealed, and the Loyalists restored to their property, before they will deliver up a negroe. Whether this mode of proceeding is agreeable to the provisional articles I will leave it to you to judge. In the meantime, this conduct must irritate the inhabitants of the different States, and at a time when they are going to call a meeting of their assemblies to receive the recommendations of Congress, when the fate of many will be determined unfavorably upon, and many families intirely ruined.

Agreeable to your directions, I have inquired into the complaint made by the Germans at Mount Hope, and it appears to me to be altogether without foundation, and the least colour of truth.

Agreeable to your orders to me to collect the prisoners of war together, I sent Captain Selin and Lieut. Mooers, of my Regiment, on or about the 20th of November last, to Mount Hope, with the following propositions to those at that place in Mr. Faesh's employ, viz :—That as orders had been given to call in the prisoners of war those Germans might be indulged to purchase their redemption for 30*l.* per man, and become free citizens of America; secondly, they might enlist into our service—an indulgence granted to the Germans only; and thirdly, in case they did not chuse to accept of either of those offers, they were to be sent back to Philadelphia Goal. These propositions being communicated to them by Captain Selin, a native of Germany, and Mr. Faesh being absent at the time, those prisoners requested a little time to consider of the matter, and to consult with Mr. Faesh on the subject; their request was accordingly granted, and soon after, they or a number of them attempted to make their escape to New York, were apprehended and committed to Newark Goal. Mr. Faesh paid a reward for taking them up, as I am informed, near the sum which they have stated in their letter of complaint, and therefore it was but just to charge them with it, more especially as it was at their own request rather than to return to Philadelphia Goal.

On or about the 25th of March last, I sent Capt. Selin with a small detachment from this place to Mount Hope to carry the previous proposition with the Germans into execution. They at first declined purchasing their redemption or inlisting into our service, consequently, after giving them time to settle their accounts, Capt. Selin marched them off for Philadelphia, and halted in the evening about two miles from Mount Hope, from which place those prisoners sent back for Mr. Faesh and requested that he would come and see them, which he accordingly did next morning. They then entered into a voluntary agreement with him, who advanced and paid into my hands thirty pounds Pennsylvania currency a head, which sum has since been paid into the Public Treasury at Philadelphia.

Thus, sir, stands the case with those Germans—complainants at Mount Hope. If it is not a crime to inlist prisoners of war to assist in spilling the blood of their countrymen, it may be allowed a virtue in that state who admits a mercenary soldier and a prisoner of war to become at his own election a free citizen in the State to which he owes his existence.

From Mr. Faesh's character, and the little acquaintance I have with him, I am fully persuaded he is incapable of that deception or injustice he is charged with. Capt. Selin I know to be a soldier and a man of humanity.

The severity complained of by being eight days in confinement without provisions, is, I daresay, as unconnected with truth as the other grievances stated in the letter of complaint. With great respect, etc."

On the 22nd of May I was visited by the populace of Danbury at my father’s house, when I was called forth by a Mr. Theophilus Taylor, who was appointed as their speaker. Mr. Taylor said they had come to inform me that I must immediately retire, that at present they did not intend to hurt me, but if I was seen within thirty miles of Danbury after sunset (which was then only half an hour high), I must stand the consequence, for they would not answer for my safety after. I then presented my permit from the authority and select men of Danbury to visit my father; they damned the authority who would allow such a person as I was to come into the country; in the course of conversation several of the authority arrived at my father’s, who endeavoured to quell the mob, but it only attended to aggravate them. My father sent to Lieut. Col. Jimmerson, of the Continental Army, who gave me a guard to protect me till next morning, when by the advice of several officers of the Continental Army I retired a few miles from Danbury. 1783, June 19.—Information before William Smith, Chief Justice:—“That they were of the corps called DeLancey’s Refugees, and by their colonel’s order above a month ago quitted the county of West Chester, and have since spent their time on Long Island and York Island.

That yesterday three weeks they cross’d in a boat from Long Island to Frog’s Neck to visit their mothers, who then resided on the Neck, and get from them their cloaths and some supply of provisions.

That they had scarcely landed and fastened the boat before they discerned a party that were armed and commanded by Lt. Hill, of Col. Sproat’s Corps, advancing towards them.

Taking them to be Continental soldiers, they put off their boat but were called back and fired upon, and verily believe had thirty shot at the boat before she got to the shore. The party promised before they landed that they should be well used, and yet as soon as they were landed they were beaten several blows, and had their cloaths or part of them taken from them, viz. : from James Bulyea, a pair of shoe buckles and a pair of knee buckles, both of silver, a plated stock buckle, a pair of stockings, a Manchester jacket and breeches ; and from Isaac Aerse a silk handkerchief, a pair of fustian overalls, a pair of shoes and brass buckles ; and from Arthur Aerse a new Castor hat.

They then led them to a house possessed by Joseph Castin on Frog's Neck, where they were detained that night, and conveyed them next morning to West Chester Jail. This happened on a Thursday morning.

On the Saturday following they were taken out jail, and sent under a guard to Frog's Neck, where they were allowed to get their things together, and ordered to begone by that night, threatening that if found there afterwards they should be treated as thieves and robbers.

They were twice examined before they were dismissed from jail by Mr. Morris, who was stiled the judge. They were treated very civilly by him. The scope of his questions respected their being out in service during the war on the side of the Crown, and what cattle or other property had been at any time taken, and he declared at the close that in his opinion none that had been in arms for the King would be permitted to continue in the country."

I approve of what has been done respecting Lieutenant Angus McDonald, of the Corps of Guides and Pioneers.

The claim of the seven officers of the King's Rangers shall be referred to a Board of Officers for examination.

Lieutenant Col. Morse, chief engineer, will give you information relative to Lieutenant Wilson. The plan of the works which you mention he has sent to the Chief Engineer has not been received by him. I suppose there has been some mistake in that matter, which has prevented its being transmitted.

The Provincial Corps under your command may be assured that there is no intention of sending them to the East or West Indies; on the contrary, at a proper time every man shall have liberty to go where he pleases, and if any of them chuse living under the Spaniards or United States in preference to the British Government, let them have permission.

My letter of the 7th of April informed you of my intention to furnish them with very assistance in my power, which should have convinced them that the report you mention was without foundation.

That part of your instructions relative to Indian affairs was written before it was known that the province of East Florida was to be ceded to Spain. But now under the very extraordinary circumstances of your situation, when numbers of the Indians are expected at St. Augustine, an extraordinary expence must unavoidably be incurred. I am, however, under confidence that neither you or Col. Brown will enter into any expences on their account, but such as are necessary for the public service and the security of the people of the province.

I am astonished Colonel Brown should conceive that the regulations I directed to be observed in distributing presents to the Indians would ruin him in their opinion. In Canada they had orders from home to adopt that method, and as the Indians should understand that the presents made to them are from the King and not from his officers, the more ceremony there is observed on such occasions, the stronger will be the impression they receive of the King's bounty and regard for them.

I do not expect that the same form shou'd be observed on every trivial occasion, but when any considerable numbers are assembled, it should be strictly attended to.

Such of the Indians as persevere in their demand of being carried to the Bahamas shall be furnished with the means, but as it is a situation ill adapted to their mode of life, and of which they would be soon tired, you cannot use too many arguments to dissuade them from a measure destructive of their happiness.

The provisions lost in the *Eliza* shall be replaced and the Commissary General will make provision for those persons who are to remove to England and Providence.

Whatever other wants you may be apprehensive of should be communicated in time that the necessary steps may be taken for supplying them.

I beg you will accept my thanks for the description of the province of East Florida contained in your letter of the 23rd May.

The Adjutant General will transmit my approbation of the several sentences of the general court martial held at St. Augustine the 19th May. I approve very much of the spirited conduct of the party of militia, and of your having rewarded them for it.

I have not had time to examine the lists of warrants granted by you, transmitted in your letters of the 27th May and 6th June. They shall be sent to the Board of Accounts for their inspection."

GEN. LOSSBERG to SIR GUY CARLETON.

New York.—“Every information which I have been able to obtain respecting the German prisoners of war to the United States, who have been indented as servants or enlisted in the American army, concurs in convincing me, that having been brought to this condition by compulsion and other devices, many of them are strongly desirous of returning to their duty, and that they are detained against their inclinations.

As I do consider the resolve of Congress and the subsequent treatment of the prisoners, from which this situation originates, as a procedure unprecedented and illegal in itself, I think it my duty to submit to your Excellency the propriety of employing your authority with Congress on that subject, demanding a just redress of this grievance, by issuing a proclamation in the most public manner announcing to all German prisoners, whether indented or enlisted, their perfect liberation and free permission of returning to their respective corps in the King's service, as also strictly forbidding all inhabitants to detain them against their inclinations on any pretence whatever.

The situation of the thirty-five men indented to John Jacob Faesch at Mount Hope is a notorious evidence for the justice of this demand.

LIEUT. COL. BENJAMIN THOMPSON to SIR GUY CARLETON.

Pall Mall Court.—Sir, "I beg leave to congratulate with your Excellency upon an event which I am confident will afford you great satisfaction: the resolution of Parliament to give half-pay to the provincial officers. We all feel ourselves under infinite obligations to your Excellency upon this occasion.

As you have had the goodness to interest yourself so much in our behalf, I think it my duty to acquaint your Excellency with all the steps I have taken in this country relative to the provincial business, since my arrival from New York.

Soon after my arrival in London, finding the Session of Parliament drawing near to a conclusion and that no resolution had been taken by His Majesty's Ministers relative to the memorial of the provincial officers recommended by your Excellency, I took the liberty of writing a letter to Lord North upon the subject, copy of which is inclosed, and made personal applications to General Conway, Lord Sheffield, and other gentlemen of the House of Commons who assisted in bringing the business forward.

I then, at Lord North's desire, set about to prepare estimates of the expence of half-pay for the provincial officers, with other information relative to that matter, copies of which I put into the hands of General Conway and Lord Sheffield, who both interested themselves very warmly in our behalf. Inclosed I have the honor to transmit to your Excellency for your information copies of all the papers I took the liberty of laying before Lord North. I earnestly hope they will meet with your approbation but if I have made any mistakes your Excellency being fully acquainted with what I have done will have it in your power to rectify them.

The paper No. 1 contains copies of all the letters between the Secretary of State and the Commander-in-Chief in N. America relative to the provincial corps, to which are added a few observations, and a copy of the memorial of the commanding officers of the provincial regiments.

No. 2 is a list of the provincial corps in N. America which was made out from your Excellency's return of the army under your command, dated New York, 11th April, 1783. The establishments of officers of the different corps were taken principally from the printed list of the provincial army published at New York this year.

Your Excellency will observe that in this list, as well as in the list No. 3, there is a colonel and a lieutenant-colonel put down to the King's American Dragoons. This was done with the knowledge and consent of Lord North and General Conway, and upon this ground:—Being disappointed of getting my regiment put upon the British establishment, I took the liberty of soliciting the rank of colonel of the King's American Dragoons and that Major Murray might be promoted to the rank of lieutenant-colonel of the same, which request I flattered myself would not be thought unreasonable, as it was originally intended that there should be a colonel and lieutenant colonel to the regiment; and as your Excellency had given me reason to hope that you would have honored me with the provincial rank of colonel had I embarked for the West Indies with the corps to the command of which you had appointed me.

I took the liberty of writing to your Excellency upon the subject by the last packet, since which His Majesty has been graciously pleased to approve of the King's American Dragoons having the full establishment of field officers as was originally intended, and that I should be promoted to the rank of colonel. I cannot help flattering myself that this arrangement will be agreeable to your Excellency, and that I shall be returned in your list of the provincial officers for half-pay as a colonel.

The rank to me is of infinite importance, as I am going abroad in a short time with a view to foreign service, but the half-pay is also an object as I have little else left to depend on, except my industry.

The paper No. 3 will explain itself. I wished much that the House of Commons would have voted the full or complete establishment of the different corps, but Lord North seemed very desirous of bringing the sum wanted for the provincial half-pay as low as possible that it might pass the easier. With that view the calculation of the savings of part of the chaplains half-pay, the adjutants, quartermasters, etc., were made. But all these regulations will depend intirely upon your Excellency. Whatever you think right I am confident will be done without any kind of objection or difficulty.

As it was impossible to lay correct estimates before the House at the time, none of the corps have been voted specifically, but their claim to half-pay in general is substanciaded by the vote of a certain sum "on account of half-pay"; and so the matter must rest till your Excellency can furnish His Majesty's Ministers with such returns of the different provincial regiments and corps as may be proper to lay before Parliament.

I hope your Excellency will approve of my having made no separate claim or interest between the three provincial corps that are established with permanent rank (of which the King's American Dragoons is one) and the rest. I thought it would have a better appearance if we were all unanimous, and would be more pleasing to the rest of the corps that we should take our chance in common with them and stand or fall together.

At the end of the paper No. 3 your Excellency will observe that Major Rooke is returned for half-pay as a Deputy Inspector General of Provincial Forces. This was done at the desire of Colonel Innes, who arrived in London after all the papers were prepared. I know nothing of Major Rooke's pretensions and therefore cannot answer for the propriety of his being included for half-pay, but as it is a matter that must finally be determined by your Excellency, I am sure nothing but what is perfectly right will be done respecting it.

In the vote of the House of Commons no mention is made of half-pay for the Muster Master General or his deputies, but it is by no means intended to exclude them, and if your

Excellency returns their names the vote for their half-pay will pass of course. I have spoken to Lord North upon the subject, and he thinks it perfectly right that they should be included, as also Mr. Bridgham, Colonel Innes's deputy.

With regard to the Seconded Provincial Officers who are mentioned in the memorandums contained in the paper No. 4, both General Conway and Lord Sheffield strongly advised against bringing their claims before Parliament at the same time with the application of the officers of the provincial corps, as the largeness of the sum wanted for the whole might prevent our success, whereas if what we then asked should be granted, it would strengthen the claim of the seconded officers, and their application would afterwards be brought before Parliament with greater propriety, and with a much better prospect of success. I conceal no part of the transaction from your Excellency, and I hope what I have done will meet with your approbation. I am certain the motives which induce me to take the steps I have followed in the prosecution of this business are such as cannot fail to be approved of by your Excellency. I have been indefatigable in my endeavours to carry what I thought your wishes respecting the provincials into execution, and if what I have done meets with your approbation and with the approbation of my deserving countrymen in whose behalf you have so generously and so nobly interested yourself, I shall be amply repaid for all the trouble and anxiety I have had in the course of my solicitations.

I have the honor to be with the greatest respect, and with unfeigned gratitude for all your goodness to me," etc.

Having judged it proper for the present to include the Bahama Islands in the Southern District, you will therefore consider them as under your command until further orders, and will give such directions in the present situation of them as you may judge prudent and necessary for the King's service.

I have heard, but not from good authority, that the Spanish Governor and several other persons have been detained at Providence by Colonel Deveaux, on a charge of a breach of the former capitulation.

I desire you will please to have this matter enquired into, and a state of it transmitted to me.

You will please to order the sum of 20s. sterling per diem to be paid to Colonel Deveaux from the day of his leaving St. Augustine, to go against Providence, till further orders, or until he is otherwise provided for; unless you should see sufficient reasons for deferring it, which you will report to me.

Many applications have been made to me by loyalists who are desirous of settling on the Bahamas, but as I am unacquainted with the real state of those islands, and what land, if any, remains ungranted, I cannot give them the recommendations for grants of land they desire. I therefore would be glad you would make enquiry into the general state of those islands, the situation of the landed property, and such other matters as may enable me to decide on these applications, as I have recommended home that the lands ungranted or escheated, may be given, free of all expense, to those loyalists who have lost their estates and property in con-

sequence of their attachment to His Majesty's Government ; and may be desirous of settling there.

You will direct an account to be taken of all military stores in the Bahama's belonging to the King, which you will transmit to me that I may judge what may be necessary for the future defence of those islands.

I have given directions that provisions be sent to you, to replace those lost in the 'Eliza,' also a further supply for the garrison to the end of this year.

The request of the Field Officers of your garrison cannot be granted ; no forage is allowed to the Field Officers in Nova Scotia, nor any equivalent for it ; nor has any forage been allowed to the officers in Canada during the war.

I have directed the department of the Commissary of Provisions here, to be discontinued from the 30th June last ; you will please to do the same in your district."

Halifax.—"Brigadier General Fox writes to your Excellency by this opportunity so fully upon the military business of the province as to leave me but little to say—he has already collected returns of the troops and persons employed in the several Departments—of the barracks and houses hired for the troops, in which considerable savings will immediately be made—of provision store houses, which are all hired, and at a very considerable expense, the annual amount being 1,379*l.*, and which I fear must for a time be increased as more provisions are daily expected. The Return of ordnance store houses is not yet made, but they are numerous, and I am of opinion that the powder and inflammable articles had better be put on board some hulk and kept afloat, and that even the purchasing such a vessel would be economy and tend to the safety of the town, as well as preservation of the stores, by the removal of which, too, room would be obtained for the provisions. These expedients I propose as temporary ones, but should our situation here become permanent, wharfs, store houses, etc. must be built, and here I beg leave to observe that there is scarcely any land remaining of such as was originally reserved for these uses, for which licenses of occupation have not been given, and which from long possession and certain laws of the province it will be difficult to recover; I mention this with a view to obtain from your Excellency a caution against any more such licenses being given in the town, especially upon the water side.

I have as yet made no progress in collecting materials for my report, upon which I hope to proceed in a few days, so soon as Brigadier General Fox shall have made such arrangements in which he may wish to have my assistance. My first object will be Passamaquody Bay and the Boundary River, about which I much fear some difficulties will arise. There are no less than three rivers running into Passamaquody Bay, each called the River St. Croix, and representations have been made to the Governor that persons from the Massachusetts Bay are already settling between them. The westernmost was the former boundary between the two provinces when belonging to Great Britain, but the middle one is by much the most considerable river,—which is meant for the present boundary between the province of Nova Scotia and the American States may, and I fear will, admit of disputes. I shall endeavour to have them explored, so as to be able to give your Excellency the clearest lights in my power. The Governor has applied to General Fox for troops to be sent there directly, upon which subject both, I presume, will write to your Excellency.

There is a number of valuable logs and a quantity of lumber at Penobscot that has been paid for by Government, which I wish to know if you would have removed. Whenever establishments may be made at Passamaquody or in the harbour of St. John's River, these will be very usefull. You will pay the 200 days' bat and forage money to the troops under your command.

I have been informed that Captain Studholme has employed the craft intended for the assistance of the refugees on St. John's River in other services, which has distressed them and retarded their arrival at their settlements; you will order enquiry to be made into this matter, and that it may be prevented in future.

I enclose an extract of a letter from the Secretary of State, which you will please to communicate to the officers of the British American Corps, that they may be informed on what ground they stand as to their hopes of half pay; I have no other information on this subject.

1783, August 22. New York.—On the 18th inst. I received your letters of the 19th and 20th July with their several enclosures.

In the general orders which are sent to you by the Adjutant General, you will find His Majesty's instructions to me for

the disposal of the troops under my command, and the advantages held out to those who choose to become settlers in Nova Scotia.

Vessels will be sent from hence as soon as possible to convey the British American Regiments under your command to Halifax or any other part of Nova Scotia where their lands may be located, and where they are to be disbanded, but should any of them chuse to be dismissed at St. Augustine, or go to Providence or any other of the Bahama Islands, I shall have no objection, and in the latter case you will please to furnish them with conveyances.

These corps are to be paid by you to the 24th October, 1783; such men of them as chuse to be discharged at St. Augustine are to be paid up to the day of their discharge, and to receive fourteen days' full pay in advance.

Some refugees from this place have gone to make an establishment on the islands Abbaco and Cat Island, but as I am unacquainted with the tenure of the lands in all the Bahama Islands, and whether the King has any to grant or not, I could give them no encouragement; however, if any persons chuse to go there at all hazards, I have no objection to their being provided with conveyances, and the same assistance refugees have had going to other parts.

The detachment of Royal Artillery now at St. Augustine must remain to do the duty until the final evacuation of that place.

You will please to issue 200 days' bat and forage money for the present year to the troops under your command.

As soon as the troops leave St. Augustine you will repair to Providence and take upon you the immediate command of the Bahama Islands, for which purpose I enclose you a particular letter of service which will be in force until further orders, or until the arrival of a Governor appointed from home. You will try to persuade the people to arrange themselves into a militia for their own security, and the defence of their property, in such manner as you shall think will best answer the end and be most satisfactory to themselves; you will likewise do everything in your power to accommodate the refugees who go from hence, who take with them six months' provisions, and I shall complete them to one year.

As I make no doubt it will be agreeable to you, it is my intention to recommend you to be appointed Governor of the Bahamas.

On your departure from St. Augustine you will pay yourself and your major of brigade up to the 24th December, '83; the other officers of the extra staff are to be paid up to 24th October only, to be reduced at the departure of the troops, excepting those of the Indian Department. Colonel Deveaux is also to be paid up to the 24th December, '83.

In consideration of the services and exertions of the extra officers of the Indian Department mentioned in the enclosed

return received from Lt. Col. Brown, you will pay them up to the 24th December, 1783, agreeable to a letter from the Secretary at War, that being the latest period to which any of the extra staff of this army can be paid, and you will recommend it to them to lose no time in providing for their future maintenance.

You will please to require of Mr. Gale, the Assistant Deputy Paymaster General at St. Augustine, a return of money remaining in the military chest in specie and in bills of exchange drawn by Mr. Thomas on the Paymaster General in England. Should there be more money or bills of exchange than may be wanted, Mr. Gale will, of course, bring it to New York upon the removal of the troops, but shou'd the money he now has be insufficient, you will direct him to draw bills upon Mr. Thomas for such sum as you may think necessary for the service to the time of their removal.

In consideration of the former services and present distress of Colonel Pearis, you will please to grant a warrant for paying him one hundred pounds sterling out of the extraordinaries of the army.

I enclose an extract of a letter from the Secretary of State, which you will please communicate to the officers of the British American Corps, that they may be informed on what ground they stand as to their hopes of half pay. I have no other information on this subject.

1783, August 22. New York.—“By the June packet lately arrived I have received the King's commands to disband forthwith in Nova Scotia all the British American Corps and some of the British.

The King's orders specify that the British American Corps are to be disbanded at Halifax, but as that would be attended

with many inconveniencies and the lands appropriated for them are on the River St. John's, as I learn by a letter from Mr. Bulkeley to Major Barclay, dated the 2nd instant, I have directed those corps to be sent there, and I request your Excellency will lose no time in allotting to the respective corps the lands for each; and on this occasion I am of opinion the provincial troops should be considered as refugees with respect to the number of acres allotted to each man; many of them certainly have equal pretensions on account of the property they have been obliged to abandon in consequence of their loyalty, their having taken up arms and served during the war I consider as an additional merit, and must therefore again recommend them in the warmest manner to your protection and favour.

Another class of people belonging to the Civil Departments, and at present employed with this army, consisting of civil officers, artificers and labourers, armed boat men and seafaring people, who from their occupations cannot all be spared from hence 'till the final evacuation, I beg leave also to recommend for a reservation of lands in your province; they will send forward some of their number as agents to choose a proper station for building a town, and I have no doubt they will meet with all that encouragement from your Excellency so useful a body of men are entitled to expect.

Besides all those above mentioned, there will be a large embarkation of inhabitants, consisting of merchants, farmers and mechanics, and many persons of large property, amounting to several thousands, who from their sufferings and the additional strength and wealth the province will derive from their settling in it, deserve every encouragement and assistance.

The military force to be stationed in Nova Scotia and Newfoundland is to consist of six British battalions; Major General Campbell is to command, with a small military staff. The numbers of inhabitants acquired to the province and the great security given it by placing the provincial troops (who are to have their arms, as indeed are almost all those sent into your province) on the River St. John's, will render it unnecessary to disperse the British regiments for the purpose of defence, and I trust your Excellency will have been able to make such effectual arrangements of the militia as will give the most perfect security to the province.

I conceive that the persons from Machias, mentioned in your Excellency's letter of the 8th July to have possessed themselves of lands within your province, are only a sett of lawless people, unknown to any of the States, who first fled from taxation, and now may think to acquire a right by possession. In the present anarchy of the times it may be in vain to apply to any of the States on this matter, but if your Excellency is clear that the tract on which they have placed themselves is within the limits of your province, as

described by the late treaty, I would recommend that the most friendly means are taken to remove them from thence, and that you should take possession of that part of the frontier as soon as possible.

The Secretary of State having transmitted to me a copy of an additional instruction to your Excellency respecting the granting lands in Nova Scotia, and also a copy of a letter enclosing a list of articles sent out from England for the use of the refugees, I transmit copies of them, lest the originals should not have been received by you."

That Mr. Mathews had no concern in putting these people in and appears to have taken no other part than to recommend them as suffering loyalists and to constantly refuse to remove them unless another dwelling was provided. The Board proceeded to enquire into the suggestion of Mr. Thurman that the report of the Board of Claims respecting the house claimed as his property was very erroneous, and found that the suggestion was without foundation, it appearing from Mr. Thurman's original letter to General Robertson that his application respected his house in Wall Street, for which he was then paid rent by Government.

JOHN THURMAN to [SIR GUY CARLETON].

1783, September 4.—No. 2. Is compelled to this address in his duty of guardian of orphans [executor to the late Nicholas Roosevelt on behalf of his four children, three girls and a boy]. The simple case consists in a demand for the restoration of a house in this city the property of these orphans, and for rent due to himself for a house in Broadway on the Barrack List. The necessity of the appeal is founded on a denial of justice in subordinate departments, especially in a late application to the Board of Commissioners, who rejected his cause unheard, altho' on the day they had previously referred the business, he appeared prepared with proper proofs that Mr. Mathews was the cause why the property of these orphans was wasted and from whom he demanded restitution. His evidence would have substantially proved the following facts:—

- No. 1.—Miss Elizabeth Rosevelt would have proved an early application to Mr. Mathews for the house on the North River so far back as 1776, together with the discouraging reception she then met with from him. See exhibit No. 1.
- No. 2.—Miss Sally Rosevelt has sworn and would have proved to the Board that she three different times applied to Mr. Mathews, who treated her with evasion at first, and afterwards peremptorily refused the delivery of the house, altho' the vestry at that time compassionated the distresses of the orphans, and gave them charity. Exhibit No. 2.
- No. 3.—Samuel Bayard would have proved that he also made an inefficacious application to Mr. Mathews, and that he conceived him the sole cause why the orphans were refused their right. See certificate No. 3.
- No. 4.—Catherine Kirby would have proved that she did apply to Mr. Mathews for the house in question. See her deposition, No. 4.
- No. 5.—William Kirby would have proved that a certain Mr. Lawson was cutting up the dock on which the house was built, belonging to those orphans and that, *Lawson* shew'd him, on being questioned a writing from Mr. Mathews for the purpose. See exhibit No. 5.
- No. 6.—As a further proof that Mr. Mathews retained this house from the orphans, and placed others therein, altho' he denies it, permit me to offer a copy of Daniel Coe's petition to him and his grant. No. 6.
- No. 7.—Being a solicitor merely for the right of others, I conceived my evidence also might legally have been offered. This evidence would have consisted in a variety of written as well as personal applications to Mr. Mathews in behalf of the orphans, wherein

justice, humanity, policy, and every argument that would have moved a man of the least sensibility to have stretched out his hand to relieve complicated misery was exerted; he turned a deaf ear to all my entreaties, and the following addresses to him and others will prove the barrs Mr. Mathews threw in the way, being determined not only to deny relief himself, but endeavoured to prevent it in others. This testimony your Excellency will find in exhibits Nos. 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, and 19.

To this charge against Mr. Mathews, I can see no other defence of his unjustifiable conduct than what is contained in Isaac Springstead's and Catherine Allison's oath, with Jeronimus Alstyn and Edward Laight's certificate and the letter of the Lieutenant Governor, Mr. Elliot, see A. B. C. D., in answer to which as it was laid before the Board as a vindication I would beg leave to offer a few objections for your Excellency's information, how far my proof would have gone had the Board been pleased to have heard me and also exhibit E.

1st. Mr. Elliot declares every necessary enquiry besides receiving affidavits was made on my claim in consequence of my application agreeable to the order of February 18th. How far this is the fact, I appeal to the certificate of Alexander Leckie, who was present when I made a memorandum of my application to Mr. Elliot on the 2nd April, this memorandum fully confutes this assertion exhibit No. 16, for your Excellency from them will perceive no evidences were received, nor the reason why the reports were not made, was because your pleasure was to be known in the mode *how*, and the exhibit No. 17 says the reports were made to your Excellency. 2dly., "*Mr. Elliot says it appeared Mr. Mathews had nothing to do with the disposal or detention of the house in question*" and yet exhibits No. 6 and 5 speak a language diametrically opposite, and almost every other exhibit. How far Mr. Elliot's relation of your Excellency's perfect satisfaction with Mr. Mathews' conduct is also true, I must leave to your Excellency now to determine.

In answer to Mr. Elliot's last clause in his letter to the Chief Justice, I have to say he was no stranger to my frequent applications, and the unwearied assiduity I exerted for my wards, and I can with truth declare I have spoke to him on this very subject frequently as my memorial to General Robertson, exhibit No. 9 does prove.

“Mr. Gale has almost ten thousand pounds in the chest; the troops are all paid to 24th October, but the bat and forage, Mr. Turnbull's balance and other extraordinaries will probably amount to about five thousand pounds; the expense of the Indian Department we can yet form no idea of, our friends the Creeks who have been all detained at home on account of the green corn festival, are expected to visit us in great numbers, and to quiet as much as possible the poignant apprehensions of the unhappy people who remain here, we must endeavour to send the Indians home in temper, and

your Excellency knows that without purchasing we have nothing that suits them except ammunition ; you may rely on no expense being incurred that is not unavoidable.

“ As Colonel Brown with a high proportion of the men and officers of his regiment intends settling on some of the Bahama Islands, he has requested me to ask your Excellency’s concurrence to their retaining their arms and accoutrements in the same manner as those who go to Nova Scotia ; he apprehends many of his Indian friends will insist on accompanying him ; of the South Carolina Regiment near two-thirds propose getting their discharges here ; of the North Carolina Regiment above one-half propose going to Nova Scotia ; few of either of these two corps propose going to the Bahamas, about forty of the N. C. Regiment are desirous of going to Britain ; I have informed them I had yet no instructions on that head.

“ I had wrote thus far when I was honored with your Excellency’s letter of 29th July by the *Loyalist*, with several duplicates, her passage has been so tedious that Lieut. Wilson has been at Providence in obedience to your orders and returned here on the 30th ulto., and only this day received Col. Morse’s instructions to view all the Bahama Islands. Of course his report must be far short of what your Excellency had reason to expect. He shall therefore set off again for the Bahamas so soon as he has made up the accounts of his department.

“ Mr. Wilson understood that a large quantity of gunpowder has been brought from the Havannah to Providence and is still there, with more than seventy pieces of cannon of different calibres, no small arms, but unless it is stipulated by the treaty the Spaniards most probably will demand all, the capture of Col. Deveaux having happened after hostilities were to cease ; for this reason Mr. Wilson did not think it necessary to take a particular account of them.

“ Don Claraco having received considerable sums of money from several of the inhabitants for the use of the Spanish troops before Col. Deveaux arrived, these people requested he might be detained till the money was repaid, which I understand from some other gentlemen as well as Mr. Wilson is the cause of his detention.

“ The Colleton family, of South Carolina, are said to have a claim on all the lands of the Bahamas which Government does not admit ; as few people have settled there of late years, such as became settlers set down where they thought proper without any grants ; this account I have from many people who have been there, and without recourse to their records no better can be had. Mr. Wilson shall be instructed to report to me on these three heads, which shall be forwarded to your Excellency.”

I am just now come from Passamaquody Bay, where I was detained eight days. I arrived there in time to point out to the surveyors employed in laying out different towns, and the lands adjoining, such spots as appeared to me proper to be reserved for the uses of Government, and future protection of the country. I likewise dispatched Mr. Nicole up the River St. Croix (or Scodiac) with orders to go, if possible, to its source, to ascertain its course and distance, which I consider objects of importance. I went up myself as high as a boat could go, and from what I saw, and the information I could collect, I judge the course of this river to be nearly west; I have left directions with Mr. Nicole to explore the two other rivers likewise, this being the middle one, and by much the most considerable.

“From St. John's I propose going to Annapolis, and from thence to Cumberland and Windsor, and unless I continue to be very unfortunate in winds, I hope after calling a second time at Port Roseway to return to Halifax the first week in October. I have received no letters from New York since I left it, but as I expect to meet General Fox at Annapolis I am in hopes of receiving from him some of your commands.”

JOHN COOK. Information before WILLIAM SMITH.

1783, September 16.—Information by John Cook, of Charlotte Precinct, Dutchess County, Province of New York. He owns a farm in the above precinct in fee simple of about 260 acres; has a wife and eleven children. Being a known Loyalist during the present troubles, he has suffered much from the party in opposition to the Royal Government. Lately he found it necessary for him to quit his estate and the precinct, and to remove to the manor of Livingston. The paper hereunto annexed is a copy of an intimation from the Committee of the district. It appeared to him to be dangerous to abide any longer within the limits of their power, and he is in great apprehension for his safety in the manor; nor indeed knows any quarter in the colony where any loyal subject may hope for protection, or the benefit of the provisional articles. The country in general is under the dominion of committees, and there can be no confidence even in the new erected Government, which the committees despise. Mr. Clinton indeed talks favorably to those who are oppressed and against the usurped power of committeemen, but they find no relief. The language of the committees is that none shall rule but the majority of the people, and that the committees represent the majority—that the acts and agreements of the Congress, the legislatures, governors and rulers, are all to be subject to the will of the people expressed by the committees; and upon this principle they hold the provisional articles to be not binding, for that the Congress had no authority to give to the commissioners but what shall be controllable by the committees, as the representatives of the majority of the people. The informant is credibly informed that very lately an exchange was made of a farm in Dutchess County for another upon Long Island with Governor Clinton's privity and approbation, and yet after the removal of the proprietor of the latter from Long Island to Dutchess County he was abused by the Committee of Romboat Precinct, whipped

39 lashes, and a resolution made to repeat the whipping if he remained 24 hours in the precinct, and to give the same punishment to such as harboured or assisted him. The informant had his information from a Mr. Wyly of Romboat Precinct, who added that the transaction had been represented to Governor Clinton, but it was followed with no remedy, and it is a recent event of within five or six weeks." *Accompanied by* Order of the Committee to John Cook, Nine Partners, Charlotte Precinct, to take his all and family and leave the county, 19 August.

"Your Excellency's letter reached me at this place, where I arrived on the 10th instant, after having visited the posts at Fort Edward, Cumberland, and Cornwallis. I was in doubt of the propriety of my continuing my route across the Bay of Fundy to Fort Howe from a rumour which had prevailed that General Campbell had sailed from New York to take the command in this province, but on the receipt of your Excellency's letter it appeared to me of some importance that I should proceed to that post, and I am to embark this day. Shall disband such provincial troops as may have arrived there. Will enquire into the conduct of Captain Studholme. "The dismissing such considerable bodies of men in the remote parts of this province where the inhabitants are not numerous and the civil authority not in sufficient force to restrain them from irregularities, renders it necessary in my idea to keep up the garrison of Cumberland and Fort Howe for the present. And as the regiment doing duty at those places is to be paid up to the 24th of October, the continuing the garrisons is not attended with any inconvenience or expence. Indeed those places cou'd not be left at this time without troops, there being considerable quantities of public stores deposited at both of them. And as I did not know what troops might be ordered there in the general arrangement I did not wish to risque sending detachments of the recruits which it might afterwards be necessary to relieve in an advanced season." Submits request of Governor Patterson, of the Island of St. John, for a small detachment of soldiers to be sent to that place. "I shall endeavour to return to Halifax as soon as possible, and shall there wait

your Excellency's further commands. Whenever the arrangement notified to your Excellency by the Secretary at War takes place, I shall have particular pleasure in communicating to my successor in the command every observation which has occurred that can tend to the benefit of the service. And I have only to acknowledge that I feel myself under particular obligations to your Excellency for the honour done me in appointing me to the command of His Majesty's troops in this district." I am happy to find that our neighbours are not so desirous to settle at Passamaquoddy; there are many people in this province who wish very much for land there on account of its goodness, as also for the great quantity of lumber and conveniency for fishing; these considerations made me the more desirous to have the Provincial Corps settled there I am now glad to find they are so well pleas'd with their situation on the River St. John's. I have from the beginning consulted the inclination of every individual Loyalist, and have allotted them lands agreeable to their wishes and shall continue to do so, notwithstanding some of them are not very deserving.

Major Hanger seem'd very happy to have Port Mouton allotted for the Legion. I hope Mr. Watson has been able to settle that point with him; if they come here it will be much out of their way. I have the honor, etc."

I am sensible hath exerted himself most anxious with unfeigned duty in behalf of the accomplishment of the work.

The noted I. Allen is lately arrived here among the Indians as colonel comandant of them, with a little vessel loaded with many articles, etc., for the Indians, which causeth them at this time to pay the greatest attention to him. I this day received a few lines from him, requesting a conference with me, a copy of which is here inclosed; as I am not clothed with any authority to treat on matters relative thereto, I seriously took the advice of Esquire Curry, and also Captain Morris, deputy surveyor, which was to wait on Mr. Allan; that I did, and carefully observing their instructions.

He declared to me that he had lately received special orders from Congress as also from the Massachusetts State to repair to this place in order to see there should not be any encroachments made on lands (to the westward of Majegadaway (?) River) by any British subject, and that there should not any surveys be taken, and also that no inhabitant on said land should give any aid or assistance or even harbour a British subject in their house, at the expence of the last drop of blood in his body, for he had part of his family about him (signifying the Indians) who were always ready and willing to obey his commands.

The Indians then present declared that there should not any British subject go on the survey up Scodiac River, and that it was best they would not attempt it, for if they should they would not return, etc., etc.

I declared to Mr. Allan that the intention of exploring those rivers was that a plan of the courses and distances only should be taken to be laid before Commissioners for their better ascertaining the right river that the preliminary articles of peace hath recourse to, called the River St. Croix. He said if that was the case he should be so far from making any objection, that he would give every assistance in his power, but he could not think that was the intention, for the provisional articles of peace was not signed, for which reason he was confident there would not be any Commissioners appointed for the present for that purpose. I then said I was not invested with any authority to treat with him upon a subject of that nature; I was only in a private capacity and beg'd the favor he would be so kind as to let me see his authority for saying I should not explore those rivers; when I should be able to give satisfaction to my employers, for I was under oath and consequently obliged to strictly attend to my duty; which if he would gratify me with I would immediately return, and not assume going further on the business, and he utterly refused to do it.

I this day waited on Mr. Crowe, who informed me that he should be exceeding happy to give his assistance as a pilot in exploring the River Scodiac, but since it was attempted by Captain Nicole he had many threats from the Indians that

if he ever went as a pilot he should not return alive, and in particular since Mr. Allan's appearance here they had declared to him repeatedly that if they found him guilty they would kill him; therefore he thought it his duty to endeavour to save his life, for it was sweeter to him than money. I then engaged him to appear before Justice Curry, which he did, and passed an examination as above described, this being the same case at this time with all other pilots.

I was very particular in making every inquiry I thought was necessary for Chiefs, Captains, etc., or any one belonging to either of the tribes, viz., Mellisheet, Mickmuck, or Penobscot, but finding no intelligence of either of them being near this place.

Sir, you may think it very extraordinary that there should be such a sudden turn of times here, but I do verify it to be the truth, which I am willing to declare on oath."

1783, October 3. Annapolis Royal.—“I avail myself of the earliest opportunity to communicate to your Excellency (agreeable to your desire) a proposal for the distribution of His Majesty's troops in this province, and my reasons therefor.

Having personally inspected the barracks at Fort Edward, Fort Cumberland, and Fort Hughes, I find that those at Cumberland will contain five companies on the peace establishment, those at Fort Edward three companies, and those at Fort Hughes one company; and I have received good information that there are barracks at the island of Saint John's for one company (shou'd your Excellency suppose it necessary to send a detachment to that place). I mentioned to your Excellency in my letter of the 16th of September several reasons which induced me to propose sending troops to Cumberland. I am now perfectly convinced from the most authentic information collected on the spot that a considerable part of the settlers in the vicinity of Cumberland are disaffected to His Majesty's Government. The intelligence I have received on this subject has not been from sanguine or partial inhabitants, nor is it the effect of party zeal, but certain evidence respecting the individual persons who have carried arms and assisted in the investment of the fortress while defended by the King's troops, and of their uniform opposition to Government in every instance. The new settlers who have arrived there are of a character so diametrically opposite that (situated as both parties are at present) altercations must arise and unless there is some appearance of restraint from His Majesty's troops occasionally to aid the civil magistrates, it appears to me that great confusion must ensue, and the intention of Government in sending settlers there will be defeated. These are some of the considerations which would induce me to station troops in that district, as mentioned in the inclosed proposal.

Lieutenant Colonel Morse having given proper directions for repairing the barracks at this place, the barracks and casemates will easily contain four hundred men, and the inhabitants having offered the church for the use of the Government without rent, and only on condition that a floor shall be lay'd in it, four hundred men may be accomodated in that, provided stoves can be sent from New York.

It appears to me absolutely necessary that troops should be stationed at this place, as from it's local situation it will be particularly convenient to detach parties from it to any part of the Bay of Fundy where troops may be wanted. And it also appears to me of very great importance that a detachment of troops should be stationed at Fort Howe. Separated from the peninsula of Nova Scotia by the Bay of Fundy, and remote from the seat of Government, the operations of the civil authority are very feeble there, and the multitude of people of various orders which have lately arrived on the

River St. John's increases the necessity of keeping up some appearance of check on the licentious and disorderly, without which in my idea the progress of that extensive settlement may be interrupted and greatly impeded. In addition to this, it is very certain that a military garrison there will considerably facilitate a communication with Canada. I communicated to your Excellency the requisition of Governor Parr respecting stationing troops at Port Roseway. The other three companies of the 37th Regiment I propose should remain at Halifax Harbour, that they may be ready to join the detachment at Shelburne in the spring if necessary.

The three regiments at Halifax and Birch Cove appear to me sufficient to answer every purpose at those places.

I have preferred the 54th for Cumberland, and the other places in that neighbourhood, and the 57th for Annapolis and that district, as their detachments of recruits are the most numerous and are commanded by captains; and I have preferred the 37th Regiment for Roseway and Halifax Harbour, as they are already a broken regiment.

I must also observe to your Excellency that all these posts are easily approached by vessels with provisions and stores, and that the preservation of the barracks and public buildings appeared to me a considerable object.

The 54th Regiment (although dispersed) will be so situated as that a constant intercourse may be kept up between the detachments.

I am now on my return from the River St. John's, and am making all possible haste to get to Halifax; I therefore cannot be so particular in my representations to your Excellency by this accidental conveyance as I could have wished.

I proceeded one hundred and twenty miles on the River St. John's to the place allotted to the King's American Dragoons, where they were mustered by Mr. Winslow, and I ordered them to be disbanded on the tenth instant.

I considered myself fortunate in meeting the remainder of the British American Regiments at the mouth of the river, as I was thereby enabled to afford some assistance in carrying your Excellency's orders into execution. I beg leave to refer your Excellency to Major Prevost for particular information relative to disbanding those corps and for other circumstances respecting them. I have great pleasure in acquainting your Excellency that they were making preparations to proceed immediately to the lands assigned them. And from my own observation I am perfectly satisfy'd that the country which they are to possess is capable (with industry) of affording every necessary of life.

I shall do myself the honor of communicating to your Excellency such observations as appear to me of importance so soon as I return to Halifax."

General Washington.—“Soon the Protector of America. A deep, endless ambition, too thinly veiled to escape penetration of some who see him behind the coulisse as well as on the stage makes the basis of the character of this man who has for ever inscribed his name in the annals of the world; great not by shining talents, but by a happy concurrence of circumstances, a useful understanding, a passive perseverance, the mediocrity of his competitors, and the weakness and perfidy of his antagonists. Genius it seems is not the growth of this western world. He is without a spark of imagination, enthusiasm or that torrent of talent that carries everything before it, cold, deliberate, patient, persevering, he finds himself elevated to a pitch of grandeur he never dreamed of, and would not grasp at the supreme power if to obtain it he must as Cromwell surround the State-house and tell them, ‘Be gone, the Lord you seek has left this place.’”

But no such exertion will be required, the nation is sick of Congress. Congress is tired of its situation. "I know they all expect and *most* desire a revolution."

Congress.—Its members of little respectability and acknowledge they have no power at all, but the persecution of the loyalists springs from them.

Dr. Witherspoon.—Political firebrand who perhaps had not a less share in the revolution than W—— himself—he poisons the minds of his young students and through them the continent. Account of the orations, etc., of these students and Dr. Witherspoon at the "comencement" when Washington was present.

The French Minister and French Gold.—Of all the men the French could have chosen, the most improper.—"What do you think of the *savoir faire* of a French Ambassador at Philadelphia who remains an entire stranger to many, who invites the Americans to his house and entertains them with the "condescendence" of a French lord of the manor, who gives a feast to his tenants, who leaves the supper table when the company are just seated to pay a visit at half after ten at night to the charming Mrs. Cr (?), and who by every look and action tells the inhabitants, *Vous etes de la canaille et moi je suis Baron François?*

"Marbois is the soul of the embassy and possesses every talent but that of pleasing. Their grand aim is to prove that they had done all and the Americans nothing. Their open contempt of the nation is incredible. All this the Americans feel and gratefully return the compliment. The French interest extends not an inch further than French gold. Yet they dread French influence. It would be easy for a British Ambassador to ruin the French interest here. Send a man of a social turn who can stoop to conquer, but let it be a man of rank—for pride is after all the bosom passion of the Americans. French stiffness and formality will be no match for British hospitality nor French gold for good old Madeira wine. I hope for your indulgence in treating on a subject so foreign to my pursuits and in a language not my own. But your good nature, I know, will be my advocate. Besides, I think my ignorance in political matters is rather an advantage to you. When I wish to get an account of any subject of natural history I always chuse as ignorant a man as I can. He has no system and sees neither through Linnear [*sic*] nor Bufhons [*sic*] spectacles, but merely with his own unprejudiced eyes."

I have been too long in the service not to know I cou'd not abandon a command your Excellency has done me the honour to entrust me with, without leave, and I hope your Excellency has that opinion of me that I woud not be capable of indelicacy, especially to the friend I so highly esteem as General Fox. I therefore hope you will do me the justice to believe I had not the most distant idea of moving without your orders for the purpose, and that the step that lead to the mistake was only preparatory in case I shoud.”

Not having any particular directions from your Excellency on this subject, and the Assistant Commissary General not being instructed by his principal to purchase them, and having

very few of the articles mentioned in the list, in the public stores here, I doubted the propriety of giving orders for purchasing those things at this place.

I have delivered out a proportion of such articles as were here, a particular return of which will be transmitted to the Commissary General, and have ordered axes and spades to be purchased, but I apprehend there cannot be a sufficiency procured, and I have assured the settlers here that they shall receive the remaining articles whenever your Excellency will give me directions to purchase them; I have been rather embarrassed on this subject, because his Excellency the Governor was fully perswaded that they ought to be immediately procured and issued, and that a refusal on my part would prevent very considerable numbers from becoming settlers.

The 60th and 84th Regiments and company of the Garrison Battalion were disbanded on the 10th instant agreeable to your Excellency's orders; the men of these regiments who intend to go to England remain here in barracks waiting for conveyance.

The commanding officer of the 82nd Regiment having obtained a grant of land from the Governor, I have allowed him to discharge such men as wish to settle here, who will take possession of their land immediately.

I take the liberty of suggesting to your Excellency that there are not above three hundred soldiers in this province (artillery excepted) who have not a right to their discharges, and that although their behaviour has hitherto been regular and proper, I beg leave to submit whether it may not be expedient for one or more regiments to be sent, and whether it may not be beneficial to the service for the officers who have the care of the recruits for the six regiments intended for this province to have orders from their respective commanding officers to reinlist such men of their own or other regiments as incline to enlist here, as those men when reinlisted will be under better discipline than in their present precarious state.

I am honor'd with your Excellency's letters of the 22nd instant with the inclosures.

Your Excellency will undoubtedly before this reaches you have received intelligence of the loss of one of the transports bound to the River St. John's with part of the 2nd battalion of De Lancey's and part of the Maryland Loyalists on board. I approve of your having refused to issue warrants for the pay and bat and forage money of the officers of those British American corps which have not settled with their men, and of the steps you have taken in order to do justice to the soldiers.

I have also received a duplicate of your letter of the 3rd October, the proposed distribution of the troops to be stationed in Nova Scotia, which you mention as enclosed in it, I have not received. My intentions were that you should distribute them for the winter where they might be most conveniently covered, but for the next season, that they should be stationed in one or two corps at most, and where they might render essential service to the province by opening roads and in many other particulars, for I can by no means approve of provinces or parts of provinces requiring armies to protect them in time of peace; besides, by distributing the army into small corps the discipline of it is destroyed and the troops spoiled at the same time that it multiplies expence and generates rapine and knavery of various sorts under various pretences.

The season being far advanced, I send all the troops destined for Nova Scotia to Halifax, as, from thence, they might be sent with most facility to their respective quarters before the severe weather set in.

It is my opinion that when the Minister talked of Nova Scotia the Island of St. John was meant to be included, and you will be pleased to consider it in that light with respect to the allowances granted to the disbanded soldiers and loyalists settling there.

Governor Parr mentions that twenty-three Waldeckers fixed near Annapolis are destitute of clothing; if you find them in distress, and likely to suffer from the severity of the winter, you will order a suit of provincial clothing to be given to each of them.

All discharged soldiers who mean to settle in N.S. should be put on the same footing with soldiers who went from hence, and I have desired the Commissary General to send orders to his assistant at Halifax to purchase, under your directions, such things as may be wanting to supply them with the several articles allowed, and I have directed that such corps as settle in a body should be considered as entitled to the same utensils and necessaries as the British American corps placed on the River St. John's.

The Adjutant General has communicated to me your desire to be informed whether you were to issue pay to the absent officers of the British American corps, the order for not paying them being still in force. As the affair is at an end you will please to order their accounts to be settled to the 24th October, 1783, and paid as soon as the claims of the men of their respective corps are satisfied.

I was seven weeks out exploring, and though I did not compleat the tour of the province, I collected more materials than I have yet been able to digest and put together in a form satisfactory to myself, much less I fear to your Excellency.

The brig *Maria*, too, on the tour received considerable damage, first by running on shore, and afterwards in a heavy gale of wind on her return to this place. She is now under repair at the King's Yard, upon my application to the Commissioner, and will not, I fear, be ready to go to sea these eight days; I wish I knew your Excellency's pleasure in respect of her.

The moment my account of this province is in such a state as I may think it acceptable to your Excellency I shall forward it to you, indeed if I can obtain permission I shall be more disposed to wait upon you with it.

“I shall first describe the three rivers which fall into the Passamaquody Bay, each of them called by different surveyors St. Croix, and for the better understanding their positions they are marked with their original names in the enclosed sketch, which as far as it goes is very correct. The Copscork or Western St. Croix was the old boundary between Nova Scotia and New Hampshire, as appears upon record in this province; but as the middle river or Scodiac is by much the most considerable, I am clearly of opinion, for reasons I shall explain in my report, that should be made the boundary between the province of Nova Scotia and the American States, but what I wish now to show is the position taken up by the people from Penobscot, which I conceive to be totally out of dispute. The town laid out for them is on St. Andrew’s Point and is stained red in the enclosed sketch; their lands extending up the east side of the River Scodiac. The spots coloured yellow are those I have recommended to the Governor to reserve for public uses.

“Now the river Mr. Allen pretends is the boundary as having been called the St. Croix also, is the Majiggaducey, which I conceive to be quite out of the question, but as it would seem not only from his conduct but from publications in the Boston papers, that he is acting under some kind of authority, I humbly presume that an early explanation should be required, lest the unfortunate people from Penobscot should be again disturbed; or before any military force is sent there. I mention this as a man-of-war is now under orders for that place.

“Your Excellency will, I am persuaded, pardon the liberty I take in making these observations, and attribute them to an honest wish of preventing evil, which I have no other chance of doing but through your Excellency, as my credit with the Governor is not such as I could wish. I have just finished arranging the books and papers of the Port Office, and agreeable to the wish you expressed when I

last had the honor of conversing with your Excellency on this subject, in enumerating the books and papers, I shall take the liberty of mentioning my ideas as to the disposal of them.

Two books comprehend all the outward and inward entries from the first establishment of the office, except the inward and outward entries of vessels to and from the ports of the United States of America, since the 19th of April last, when this port by your Excellency's orders, was opened for the American trade; at that time a new set of books were begun, in which no entry is made but of these vessels; the papers connected with the first mentioned set of books are the cockets from Great Britain and Ireland, which are very numerous and bulky; as these only express the brokers' names who shipped the goods for the merchants, their being left here can be of no bad tendency to any individual, and perhaps a reference to them on some future occasion may be found necessary; I would propose lodging them with Mr. Seton, who remains here, and has always transacted the business of this office, and to whom such reference would naturally be made. The clearances from the West Indies, and those that attended the licensed vessels, as also the manifests both outward and inward, together with the certificates relating thereto, might be attended with risque to individuals if they were left here, and if carried home can be of no use as their contents are fully expressed in the books. I would therefore propose destroying all these and carrying the books away.

The books opened the 19th of April as mentioned above, as they contain only the inward and outward entries of the American trade, may with their manifests be left in the office being of no consequence.

The certificates on which registers have been granted if left here would perhaps be fatal to many individuals; I would therefore propose destroying these, as the registers granted are all recorded in books which ought also to be carried away.

In regard to the police, as their transactions were reported daily to the commandants, the only papers of that office are in possession of the Mayor, consisting chiefly of the different securities taken at the police, and the determinations of the Chamber of Commerce of such matters as were by the police referred to that Board; there is a necessity, either for these papers being carried home or destroyed, as they would be of bad consequences to many that remain, should they fall into the hands of the Americans.

As soon as I am honored with your Excellency's directions, they shall be immediately complied with."
