LERWICK.

LERWICK, the "claybay"—from the Norse leir, mud or clay, and wik, a bay—is the capital of the Shetland Islands, and is a town of over four thousand inhabitants. It is of comparatively modern growth, its first house having been built about the beginning of the seventeenth century. In appearance it is not unlike a seaport town in the Netherlands. It lies for about a mile along the shores of a crescent-shaped bay, and consists mainly of one long street, very narrow in places. Our view is taken from Bressay, an island opposite Lerwick.

Sow beans and peas in the beginning and end of the month; a few early cabbages, red cabbages and sawoys in the last week. Sow also early horn carrots, Dutch turnips, onions for a full crop in light soils, with a few leeks. Strawberries may be planted about the end of the month. Continue the transplanting of hardy biennial flowers. On mild days admit air freely to auriculas, etc.

DOUGLAS.

This, the chief town of the Isle of Man, and a favourite watering-place, stands on a fine semi-circular bay on the east coast of the island. The older streets are irregular and narrow, but the modern ones, on terraces rising beyond the old town, are handsome, and spacious. A splendid new pier, at which passengers can land and embark at all states of the tide, was erected in 1872, and a handsome promenade, enclosing the greater part of the shore, was constructed four years later.



SOW main crops of peas, beans, cabbages, onions, leeks, carrots, parsnips, Brussels sprouts, borecoles, lettuces and spinach. In the beginning and also at the ent of the month sow turnips and savoys. In the last fortnight sow asparagus, cauliflowers, celery, &c. Plant the main crop of potatoes during the last fortnight. Sow hardy annuals about the ent of the month.

ON THE CAM.

CAMBRIDGE, as everyone knows, is situated on the Cam, a river which forms the scene of the boating of the university. The races which are held here are picturesque spectacles never to be forgotten by those who have once wit-nessed them. The men spectators chiefly frequent towing path, and many run with one or other of the boats; those who have breath to spare shouting appropriate words of encouragement. The ladies, who prefer quiet to rushing, are to be seen watching the race from the meadows on the opposite bank.

A MARBLE PALACE.

POTSDAM is the seat of government for the Plussian province of Brandenburg, and the summer residence of the German Emperc. It is almost entirely surrounded by a frige of royal palaces, parks, and pleasure grounds, which fairly substantiate its claim to the tille of a "German Versailles." It lies about sixteen miles south-west of Berlin, and is rather a sleepy town except in summer, when its streets are enlivened by endless streams of excursionists from the capital.

SOW small salads every week; radishes and once a fortnight; carrots and ontons for late drawing. Sow peas and beans, cauliflowers, &c., for late crops. Propagate by cuttings, dahlias, pausies, double wall-flowers, rockets, scarlet lychnis, and lobelias by dividing the roots. Plant out during the last week dahlias and stocks, protecting the dahlias from slight frosts.

SHANGHAI.

This is one of the cities of China, situated on the western bank of the Hwang-p'u river, about twelve miles from the point where that river empties itself into the estuary of the Yang-tsze-Kiang. As a port Shanghai was thrown open to foreign trade in the year 1842, and its manifold advantages have attracted to it merchants of all nationalities. The streets of the native town may be said to illustrate all the worst features of Chinese cities—dirt, closeness, and absence of all sensible sanitary arrangements.



SOW peas and beans for late erops. Sow salaning every ten days; also carrots and onions for drawing young. Puil and store winter onions if ripe. Train and prime the summer shoots of all descriptions of wall and trellis trees. Net over cherry-trees to protect them from birds. Take up bulbs and tuberous roots, and dry them in the shade before removing them. Remove all kinas of decaying crops.

FORDINGBRIDGE.
As the crow flies, Fordingbridge lies about nine miles from Salisbury. It is a considerable town on the right bank of the Avon, which is here crossed by a bridge of seven arches, shown in our illustration. On the road from Salisbury to Fordingbridge are many objects of interest, including Longford Castle, the seat of the Earl of Radnor, with a splendid collection of paintings; Trafalgar House, the seat of Earl Nelson, and Breamore House, an Elizabethau mausion.


GARDENING.

IN the first week sow of the scason. In the last crop of the scason. In the last week sow yellow tunips for a full winter crop, and spinach for an early winter supply. Gather and dry medicinal and fot-herbs; also propagate such by slips and cutings. Continue the summer pruning and training of all wall-trees. Take up the remainder of tuberous roots, such as anemone, ranunculus, etc.



THE Church of St. Mary Magdalene at Sandringham is of ancient date, and has been twice restored and enlarged by the Prince of Wales since the purchase of his Nofolk seat. The Prince has caused several monuments, busts, etc., to be placed there, conspicuous being busts of the late Princes Alice and the Emperor Frederick, and a medallion to the late Duke of Albany. There is also a handsome brass lectern, placed by the Princess as a thank offering for the recovery of the Prince from his illness of typhoid fever.

SOW early frame peas and mazagan beans in the second week for an early erop. Protect endive, celery, artichokes, and seakale with stable litter or ferns. Mulch asparagus with hot-bed manure. Plant all sorts of fruit-trees in fine weather. Plant dried tubers of border flowers, but the finer sorts had better be delayed till spring. This is the month for repairing drains and renewing fences.

BUXTON.

This fashionable watering place is situated in Derbyshire and lies 160 miles from London. It stands high, being 900 feet above the level of the sea, and is surrounded at a distance by hills of considerable elevation, except on the south-west side, where the Wye, which rises about half a mile off, makes its exit, The mineral waters of Buxton, the most noted in England, are particularly efficacions in cases of rheumatism and gout. The season at Buxton extends from June to October.

SOW a few beans and feas as in November. Very few oferations can be carried on this month, with the exception of trenching and digging in dry weather, operations which should by all means be attended to. Courts.

Circuit Courts (embracing the Counties of Roxburgh, Berwick, and Selkirk) are held in April or May, and September or October, when cases for trial.

Sheriff Ordinary Courts are held at Jedburgh on Thursdays at 11 o'clock. First Court day of the year is first Thursday of January, and the session ends with the last Thursday of March; summer session May to July inclusive; winter session October to March inclusive. It is lawful for the Sheriff to adjourn the Court at Christmas for a period not exceeding 15 days. Commissary business is disposed of on the same days as the Sheriff Courts. Jury and Summary Courts held as occasion requires.

At HAWICK every Wednesday during session. At MELROSE the last Fridays of March, June, September, and December.
