He has graciously offered space on his site for our Gathering and hopefully you will be able to thank him in person. He is presently living in Canada.

Angus Macintyre was the late poet and storyteller who was born in Taynuilt and left a rich legacy for our enjoyment and pride. He is the father of Lorn Macintyre, the master of ceremony at the MacIntyre ceilidh and the uncle of Murray Sim, our local contact in Taynuilt and Treasurer of the Golf Club we will be using.

Archie McIntyre, our master piper for the Gathering, was born in the Taynuilt area but presently resides in England. He is the appointed Gentleman Piper to the High Council of Clan Donald Chief and is the only individual with arms approved by the Lyon Court that contain pipes. He has agreed to guide the activities of the other seven pipers who to date plan to attend the Gathering. Two of these pipers have already composed new pipe tunes in honor of the Gathering. At the final Gathering at Glenoe, Archie will play "The McIntyres' Salute." More about this in later updates.

**Duncan MacIntyre** of Kilmore, south of Oban, is an elected councilor in the Argyll & Bute government representing Oban and Taynuilt. If that weren't enough good fortune, he is also the chairman (spokesperson) for the Transportation Committee. Transporting you to and from the events has been my major concern to reduce the number of people renting cars and the possibility of accidents. But, there's more. His wife is Rosemary MacIntyre (also my wife's name). She runs a high class B&B south of Oban – See Accommodations.

Gordon A. McIntyre is a professional golfer, originally from Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe), then South Africa and now Scotland. The week after the Gathering, he will be competing in the British Senior Open Championship at the famous Royal Troon course south of Glasgow but he will warm up at the First World MacIntyre Invitational Tournament at the less famous and perhaps older course at Taynuilt. He has offered to give a limited number of free golf consultations to Gathering attendee for a donation to the Taynuilt Golf Club's junior golf program.

Gordon McIntyre is the master for the Celtic galley Aileach, an authentic working reproduction built by the non-profit trust Lord of the Isles Galley Trust who are interested in preservation of the history of Scotland. It is the kind of galley that the first MacIntyre, Muriach The Wright, may have drilled a hole in as the means to secure the marital and political ambitions of his Uncle Somerled. There is a possibility that the Aileach might be present at our Gathering and that some of us can have an excursion on Loch Etive, either as passengers or rowers. Gordon is also a re-enactment specialist and could make a presentation on weapons, dress and games of the early medieval period. Let's hope our luck holds out and he can attend the Gathering. Cron Mackay, a board member of Trust, said that there is a possibility the BBC might do a second documentary on Scottish Clans and OUR Gathering might be featured! Cross your fingers.

John S. McIntyre of Australia has composed two new pipe tunes for the Gathering. Another tune has been promised by a Campbell living in Taynuilt. Hopefully, some of these tunes will be learned by the 7 pipers who will be attending.

Lorn Macintyre resides in Aberdeen and is mentioned in the Program Details section on the MacIntyre Ceilidh, where he will be our Fear An Taighe or Master of Ceremony. Mary Macintyre, Lorn's wife, will be leading the dancing at the Ceilidh.

Martin L. MacIntyre resides in San Francisco. In 2003 he decided to convene a World Gathering in the 2008. He is the son of the late L. D. MacIntyre who wrote Clan MacIntyre – A Journey to the Past. He is also the appointed Lieutenant to Glenoe, Chief of Clan MacIntyre. He is working on but has yet to complete the second edition of his father's book, which is out of print.
