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### excommunications and genealogical research

During my recent lecture on Catholic Church Records, several patron evaluations raised questions about ex-communications. While many identify this action solely with the Catholic Church, many other denominations practice the same procedure, even if they don't call it an ex-communication.

The Catholic Church, in most instances, maintains no formal records on this action.

However, in historical terms, some records were

maintained by the parish or diocese if the action or incident was significant in nature. If the ex-communication involved a divorce, that may add certain complications since strict Catholic doctrine usually mandated an automatic excommunication.

In the case of most ex-communications within the Catholic Church.

avenues exist where the act can be reversed under a variety of situations. In some cases, this simply meant moving to another parish in another state.

Some parishes and priests will interpret situations differently than others. Even if you have technically violated a doctrine of the church, if there are mitigating circumstances, and/or you show repentance, there are many roads to overcoming an ex-communication.

In Judaism, the equivalent action would involve the issuance of either a Cherem or Siray.

In most historical Protestant denominations, excommunications often followed the same general pattern as those in the Catholic Church.

However, the same penalty among the Quakers, Mennonites, Huguenots, and some fundamentalist Christian denominations not only meant the termination of membership and fellowship rights within the congregation, often it includes permanent spiritual condemnation as well. Historically, those members excommunicated may have faced additional sanctions including banishment, shunning of the entire family, regardless of their involvement or lack thereof, and economic retaliation.

This was particularly true if the church exercised

influence over the economic priorities of a town, village, or region.

References to ports, etc.

ex-communications may be found in a variety of sources including church minutes, congregational or parish registers, dairies or journals of priests and other clergy, church or congregational disciplinary meetings or re-

If you wanted to check to see if some form of a record concerning an ex-communication took place, here are some suggestions based on feedback from patrons and classes that I have attended: 1. Determine the date and name of the priest, pastor, rabbi, or representative of a bishop who issued the directive. 2. Contact the church, parish, or designated archives and inquire about a records search. 3. Contact someone in a local genealogical or historical society. They often have members who are familiar with churches in the area and how to search for records.

Meeting set for September



Mr. Albert L. Henderson, Jr. passed away April 13, 2009. He is survived by his wife, Doris Hawkes Henderson, their son Albert L. (Lee) Henderson, III and daughter-in-law, Cindy McLeod, of Tallahassee and brother, Robert L. Henderson Mountain View, Ca. Al was born in

Tallahassee on October 6, 1936 and graduated from Leon High School in 1954. After teaching stints in New Port Richey, Fla., and Cameron, Tx, he returned to Tallahassee in 1974 and began a 22 year teaching career at Nims Middle School. He was affectionately known by several of his students as Papa Smurf and he will be remembered by them for his beautiful blue eyes.

Al continued to work with young men in the community through the Boy Scouts of America, first as Cub master and Webelos leader of Pack 110 and later as Scoutmaster of Troop 106.

Spending time in the woods hunting with several good friends made for good memories and even better tales.

In his last years, he enjoyed the friendship of many friends he met through membership in the St. Andrew Society and was a willing participant in their activities even though he did not consider himself as a "joiner."

He was a member of Phi Delta Kappa, Seminole Boosters, and a life member of Florida State and University of Texas alumni associations.

Aperennial favorite actress of British TV, **Wendy Richard** passed away recently of cancer at age 65. Born Wendy Emerton in Middlesbrough but raised in London, she was educated at the Royal Masonic School for Girls in Rickmansworth.

Richard had originally wanted to be an archaeologist. She left school at 15, though and worked in the fashion department of luxury Piccadilly store Fortnum and Mason. She left to study drama at the Italia Conti Stage Academy in London and decided to change her surname to Richard because "it was short and neat."

Her leggy, blonde looks soon secured her a role



in the Albert Finney film *Gumshoe* and on television she appeared in numerous shows, many of which have not been shown on American TV.

Early on, she was best known as Miss Shirley Brahms, the glamorous but dippy shot assistant, in the long running BBC sitcom *Are You Being Served?* From 1973 until 1985, she was the resident sexpot of Grace Brothers Department Store.

It was the damaged but undefeated Pauline Fowler on the soap drama *EastEnders* that she will be best remembered for playing. For nearly 20 years, she was brought to life by Wendy Richard, who said of herself, "I am not a hard person. I cry very easily and my feelings get hurt."

In 2000, Richard was awarded the MBE for services to television and in 2007 she was given a British Soap Award for Lifetime Achievement for her role in *EastEnders*. (From BBC and from Celtic Seasons, Rich and Rita Shader, 2593 Chapparal Drive, Melbourne, FL 32934.)



A memorial statue to those affected by the Highland clearances has been officially unveiled. We all know of the clearances and now two statues to commemorate this sad part of Scotland's past with the promise of more in the countries our ancestors settled – maybe one in Australia?

### Memorial statue Marks Clearances

In 2007, Scotland's First Minister Alex Salmond attended a ceremony to remember the clearances in Helmsdale, on the Sutherland coast.

The 10ft-high bronze "Exiles" statue commemorates the people who were cleared from the area by landowners and left to begin new lives overseas.

Canadian mining millionaire Dennis Macleod, who was behind the scheme, also attended the ceremony.

The statue, which depicts a family leaving their home, stands at the mouth of the Strath of Kildonan and was created by Black Isle sculptor Gerald Laing.

Mr Salmond at the unveiling said: "This statue is not only a reminder of the Highland clearances, but a great example of the skill and vision of those who remain.

"This statue is a reminder of the men, women and children who left Scotland and took their skills, their strength and their stories across "While we deplore the clearances we can be proud of the contributions that those cleared have made to humanity."

The original plan for a commemoration by a group of campaigners was to obtain permission to knock down a controversial statue of the laird involved in the clearances, the Duke of Sutherland, which towers over the town of Golspie. Although this never happened, they got together with Mr Macleod, who was born in the much-cleared Strath of Kildonan. He set up a Clearances Centre which commissioned the statue now in place.

An identical one is also been set up on the banks of the Red River near Winnipeg - the modern city founded by those who left Scotland for Canada. Mr Macleod told BBC Scotland: "It's my personal ambition to have the same statue erected in all of the areas where the Highlanders settled.

"We now have two planned and I can see five or six eventually, in places like Canada, the States and Australia."

#### 2008 Clearances Statue Unveiled in Canada

The copy of the statue mentioned has been unveiled, by Scottish Government minister Michael Russell, near the Red River in Winnipeg, Canada, where the Earl of Selkirk settled Scottish families. Named "Exiles" this time, it is said to be the first statue outside of Scotland which commemorates those who left during the Clearances. Speaking about the monument, Mr Russell said: "The Exiles statue is a beautiful and poignant piece of art that commemorates those families who were dispossessed of their homes and land and who left for distant shores, enduring great hardship in the process. But it is also a celebration: A celebration of the contribution the emigrants made in the course of their new lives overseas, recreating a little bit of Scotland in their new homelands; and a celebration of the countries, such as Canada, that not only accepted them but embraced them."


# Franklin, NC welcomes you for "A Taste of Scotland" June 20, 2009

On Fathers' Day weekend Franklin will for the 13th consecutive year be awash with the colors of authentic Scottish tartans, the aroma of Scottish food, and the dramatic music of bagpipe and drum bands. Franklin's annual Taste of Scotland Festival, always on Fathers' Day weekend, will begin on Friday evening, June 19, at 6pm with a free Ceilidh at the Stewart Street stage (behind the Scottish Tartans Museum and Heritage Center) with live Celtic music and dance.

Saturday the 20th starting at 9am the streets will be alive with free continuous entertainment, including Celtic dance and music groups, an always fabulous parade of tartans at 10:30 led by John Mohr MacKintosh Pipes and Drums, Scottish clans, children's games, the hilarious Knobby Knees Contest, and Brasstown's own Rural Felicity Dancers and Stix in the Mud. Also featured will be Franklin's own piper Jean Hayes, piper David Landis, Dunham Harps of Westerville, Ohio, Nashville's favorite Celtic Band Nosey Flynn, ArtSaturday for wee laddies and lassies from 11-2, the Nikwasi Dulcimer Players, and Scottish food and vendors.

Returning this year will be one of the most popular events of the festival, Bill Coburn and his Border Collies. They will be demonstrating several times on Saturday and have agreed to stay over and perform on Sunday afternoon behind the Burrell Building. Bill's unique relationship with Border Collies began 15 years ago when he became interested in training his collie to herd cattle on his farm, Windy Knoll Farm, in Laurens, South Carolina. According to Bill, he knew nothing about how to go about turning his pet into a working dog until he met a man who had trained his own dog. He agreed to help Bill learn the ropes, and thus was born the well-known and respected exhibition and competition Border Collie trainer that Bill has become.



Bill says he was lucky to have a very good dog when he was a beginner. Joy was his first Border Collie, and she and Bill worked as a team. Although Joy has since passed on, Bill counts several of her offspring among his current award-winning dogs. Bud, 10 years old, and Hope, 8, generally rank in the top 10% of Border Collies in competitions and are currently the "stars" of the 5- dog family. The young dogs first start working on the farm, and then after a year they are introduced to the world of exhibitions. Bill says Border Collies make good pets and are "workaholics". On the farm the dogs practice herding ducks and goats. Goats are very difficult to herd, and

Bill says if a dog can work with goats, he or she will have no problem herding sheep. During exhibitions Bill uses his voice to direct the dogs when they are nearby and whistles when they are far away. Common commands are "come by" (go left), "way to me" (go right), and "that'll do". When the dogs retire they spend the rest of their lives working when they can.

Bill's Border Collie exhibitions are much in demand along the East coast, particularly at Scottish Games. Bill also provides programs for children, schools, and for hospitalized children, and does this free of charge. Surprisingly, the talents of Border Collies extend to some pretty unusual uses. Bill has sold Border Collies to golf courses to keep geese off the putting greens, to airports to keep seagulls off the runways, and even to countries in South America for search and rescue operations!

The Romans introduced the craft of tending sheep to the British Isles. Various Celtic clans soon created their own

varieties of sheepdogs. The dogs became associated with their regions. Bill notes that the Bible refers to a "black and white" dog herding sheep and wonders if this is a reference to what we now know as the Border Collie. The dogs' Scottish heritage is evident in the Scottish dialect word "collie", used to describe herding dogs. Border Collies can be taught to herd a

variety of livestock. It is said that some will naturally herd anything that moves: ducks, chickens, sheep, cattle, even bicycles, motorcycles, cats, cars and children!

The Scottish Tartans Museum and Heritage Center, the only one in the United States, will be open all day Saturday and Sunday afternoon 1;30-4 for festi-

val-goers to get help researching their Scottish heritage and their clan tartan and take free guided tours of the Museum. It will be a great opportunity to meet Matt Newsome, museum curator and master kilt maker. The public can be fitted for an authentic kilt and make purchases of authentic Scottish items in the Museum's large gift shop.

Sunday the 21st the Kirkin' o' the Tartan will be held at the

First Presbyterian Church at 11am followed, beginning at 1:30, by Border Collie demonstrations, free museum tours, and free ice cream for kids of all ages.

MUNRO, believed born Westray & Papa Westray, Orkney, Scotland in 1831. He married ISABELLA CAMERON DREVER c1852. They emigrated to South Australia in the 1850s and had four children, all born in Australia; JAMES JNR, JOHN ALEXANDER MUNRO (married ELIZABETH COLYER), WILLIAM TULLOCH MUNRO **JEMIMA** and WHITFORD MUNRO (married ANDREW **OLIVER**). **JAMES SNR** died September 1862, just prior to **JEMIMA'S** birth. At least two of JAMES and ISABELLA'S children had children of their own (I'm from JEMIMA'S line). ISABELLA remarried WILLIAM JONES in 1872. **JEMIMA** spent some time with family, possibly cousins, at Cape Jervis SA, called **FOULIS** or **FOWLIS**. I'm hoping someone out there might be able to help out with some of the other lines. JOHN ALEXANDER MUNRO and **ELIZABETH COLYER** had children: **GEORGE ALEXANDER MUNRO** 1885; **HENRIETTA GIBSON MUNRO** 1887; **JANE COLYER MUNRO** 1889: **WALTER JAMES DREVER MUNRO** 1891; **EDWIN COLYER MUNRO** 1894; **ISABELLA COLYER MUNRO** 1899. # Danus Skene of Skene writes about the Scottish clan system & its end

### Danus Skene of Skene

Scottish clans in the period in which they were dominant social structures in Northern Scotland - say, from the 11th until the 18th centuries - were both expressions of community and feudal instruments of monarchy.

The collective heritage of the clan - its "duthchas" in Gaelic - placed the Chief in trust as the leader of his community and in particular as the protector of its lands. In a pre-modern sense, this was a democratic culture, in which the Chief's authority was accepted by all his people.

But, the lands were also the Chief's holdings, his "oighreachd" held from the king, and to an increasing extent as time passed validated by the grant of a charter which said so. To a considerable extent, clans and the institution of the chiefship in particular, were anything but democratic. These were top-down, feudal and monarchic structures.


It is this latter legalized feudal structure which makes Scottish clans different from tribal organiza-

tions in other cultures. They are not just groups sharing the tradition of a common ancestor, their lands and their defense. They are also groups bound by the emerging law of Scotland through their Chief to the Crown and to the State.

This tension between duthchas and oighreachd is what eventually destabilized the collective traditions of the clan system. Oighreachd evolved into a personal right of freehold property by the Chief. The clan system was finally destroyed after the Jacobite Rising of 1745, when the last truly feudal army in Europe was raised.

It was the chief's themselves who put the final nails in the coffin of the old Highland way of life by willingly becoming landlords of a new kind.

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
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# Mr. Munro, the penguin, doing fine in Australian Taronga Zoo!

From the Australia Clan Munro newsletter..."When Mr Munro (the penguin) was rescued, Ray Munro sent me a newspaper cutting which I used in an earlier newsletter. I have come across a piece on the Taronga Zoo website which told how Mr Munro is settling down in his new home. As you can see from the photo, he cuts a dashing figure."

Fiordland Crested Penguin Mr. Munro made news headlines after being nursed back to health at Taronga Zoo following a heroic 2000km swim from New Zealand. He was found washed up and in distress on Hargraves Beach at Norah Head in November 2006.

Munro and female companions Chalky and Milford are the only Fiordland Crested Penguins to be cared for by a Zoo anywhere in the world. Fiordlands are listed as a 'vulnerable' species and are only found in the wet coastal rainforests of New Zealand's Fiordland and Stewart Islands.

Zoo visitors have recently been surprised to discover Munro and his companions walking throughout the Zoo grounds as part of their exercise routine. Their path takes them all over the Zoo, and they frequently come across Zoo visitors all of whom adore watching the trio explore their surrounds.

Zookeepers are taking the opportunity to educate the passers-by about the threats facing the Fiordlands such as habitat destruction and introduced predators, as well as how unique and endangered they are.

Taronga has extremely high hopes for Munro, as he is about to take part in an important breeding program with the females. This will not only help the Zoo to learn more about breeding *in situ*, but will also provide valuable information on creating an insurance population for the future. The Zoo is hoping that Munro will mate with one of the females and breed a new generation of Fiordland Crested Penguins, providing the unique opportunity to study the breeding and brooding behaviour and habits of these shy and elusive penguins. The marine keeper said that Milford has definitely taken a shine to Mr. Munro and bosses





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# Pinkerton was a Scot - from Glasgow!

One of our most famous detectives and our first "Private Eye" was Allan Pinkerton, a Glasgow-born immigrant to the United States in the mid 1800s. He was appointed the first detective of Chicago in 1849 and later the Sheriff of Chicago.

America's own James Bond formed the Pinkerton Detective Agency with a motto of "We Never Sleep." His agency solved several series of train robberies during the 1850s and he became known to President Abraham Lincoln.

Following the outbreak of the Civil War, Pinkerton served as head of the Union Intelligence Service and foiled an alleged assassination plot in Baltimore while guarding Lincoln on his way to his inauguration.

His agents often worked undercover as Confederate soldiers and sympathizers in an effort to gather military intelligence.

He is credited with developing several investigative techniques that are still used today such as "shadowing" and "assuming a role" in undercover work.

When Pinkerton died in 1884, he was working on a system that would centralize all criminal identification records - a database that is today maintained by the FBI.

Fraser's Scottish Annual

ALEXANDER FRASER [1860-1936] When Alexander Fraser left Scotland in 1886, he could not have known that he would become a leading historian and a prolific author who would devote his life to promoting the interests and culture of the Scottish community in Canada.

Educated at Inverness High School, Davidson's Classical Academy, Perth and Glasgow University, where he received his M.A., the son of Hugh and Mary (Mackenzie) Fraser came to Canada on the recommendation of Sir Charles Tupper, to take up a position on the editorial staff of the *Toronto Mail* (later the *Toronto Mail and Empire*).

He also served as editor of the *Scottish Canadian*, *Massey's Illustrated*, *Presbyterian Review*, and *Fraser's Scottish Annual*.

In 1889 Alexander Fraser married Christina Ramsay, daughter of Dr. Samuel Ramsay of Toronto and his wife Jessie Fraser, daughter of James George Fraser and Chistina MacLeod of Galt, Ontario.

Alexander and Christina Fraser had nine children, two of whom died in infancy.

The letters to his wife and children during his many absences contain vivid commentary on his travels, concern over their welfare and advice about household matters.

During a 1994 interview, his daughter Shelagh recalled the wonderful ceilidhs she had watched as a child, and the continuous stream of visitors including Mme Alice (Fraser) Prevost (a descendant of Lt. Malcolm Fraser of the 78th Fraser Highlanders) and Archbishop McNeil from Nova Scotia (one of the few outside the family to call her father by his first name).

She showed me the rare book *Huronia* (1909) on the history of the Jesuits, authored by her father (a Presbyterian), for which he was awarded a medal by the Pope.

Alexander Fraser organized the Gaelic Society of Canada in 1887; was its first Secretary, for many years its President.

He was a key organizer of the 48th Highlanders of Toronto in 1891; the revival of Clan Fraser Society in 1894; and the Toronto Historical Society, of which he was President. He served as President of the Sons

of Scotland Benevolent Association for 12 years and as President of St. Andrew's Society of Toronto.

He assisted in placing 426 families from the Highlands on Canadian Free Homesteads without cost to country or to settlers.

Colonel Fraser became the first Archivist of Ontario in 1903 and continued in that position until his retirement in 1935.

He served as Honorary ADC to the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario from 1914 through 1932 and Continued on page 30

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
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

was an Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel of the 127th York Rangers. He was one of the charter members of the Empire Club, a Past Master of St. John's Lodge, A.F. and A.M. and later an officer of the Grand Lodge.

He was a notary public, a justice of the peace, and special representative for the Province of Ontario at the International Exposition at Havana, Cuba in 1924. He edited or authored numerous books, papers and articles including the 2 volume *History of Ontario*; *Huronia*; *Brock Centenary* 1812-1912; *The Last Laird of MacNab*; *History of the 48th Highlanders of Toronto*; *The Highland Regiments at Quebec*; *District of Hesse*, *U.C.*; *The Clan Fraser in Canada*; *Simon Fraser*, *the Discoverer of the Fraser River*; and many others in English and Gaelic.
