Hall Russell Remembered

Foreword

The company of Hall Russell & Co was set up in 1864 to build engines and boilers however it wasn't long after in 1867 that they commenced to build their first ship. The company grew to be one of the most successful shipyards in the UK and built an amazing variety of ships. Under nationalism in 1977 the company came under the umbrella of 'British Shipbuilders' and had great success in building offshore patrol craft for the Ministry of Defence (MoD), however under the Tory government in 1986 the yard was de-nationalised and due to the work carried out in previous years was designated a warship building yard. Being designated a warship building yard meant that it was very difficult for Hall Russell's to compete in other markets and the yard was not eligible for any government subsidies. After de-nationalisation the yard won no further warship work and struggled until a lifeline was thrown with ship number 1000 the £19 million 'St Helena' contract; however the 'St Helena' contract was actually the beginning of the end, receivership, new owners (A&P Appledore) and mounting costs (£32 million) meant a loss of over £1 million for the new owners. A further contract for a n offshore supply vessel hull (ship no 1001) was completed but nothing else.

125 years after the first ship was built in 1992 they closed the yard gates for good and the equipment was auctioned off. It wasn't long after that the Aberdeen Harbour Board moved in with the bulldozers and reclaimed the site, a total of 15 acres. Now to anybody traveling along York Street or York Place who doesn't know the history of the area could quite easily pass through with no idea oft the shipbuilding history that was made here.

Introduction

This book gives a small selection of the wide variety of ships built by Hall Russell basically as displayed in the 'Visitors Corner' of the 'Banffshire Maritime Heritage Association' exhibitions held in Macduff in 2006 and 2007.

From a 100 ton steam drifter fishing boat to the mighty 'Thameshaven' cargo ship of 10,493 tons deadweight the biggest ship ever built in Aberdeen; Hall Russell built them all large or small. Among the 1001 ship numbers allocated by the yard Hall Russell's built an amazing variety of ships including yachts, dredgers, fishing boats, tankers, whaling boats, frigates, corvettes, mine sweepers, patrol craft, mooring and salvage vessels, fisheries research vessels, offshore supply vessels, ferries etc.

Some of the Hall Russell ships are more famous than others, but none can compare with the fame of 'Sir William Hardy' she was rescued by Greenpeace and became their flagship the 'Rainbow Warrior'; she became known all over the world during their campaigns to save the world.

Special thanks is given to Adam Leiper who spent 47 year at Hall Russell latterly known as the Electrical Manager who saved many of these photos from the skip when Hall Russell closed, without them this publication would not have been possible.

Key Dates In The History Of Hall Russell (1864 to 1992)

1864 - Founded by William Hall, James Hall, Thomas Russell (a Port Glasgow engineer) and John Cardno Couper from Sussex when they purchased the 'Aberdeen Ironworks' they set up initially to build engines and boilers.

1867 / 8 – Built their first iron hulled ship the 'Kwang Tung' a gunboat for the Chinese Navy.

1972 – The 112.8m long dry-dock was built.

1977 - Hall Russell became part of 'British Shipbuilders'.

1982 – The building hall was erected.

1986 – The yard was privatised when sold to a consortium known as 'Aberdeen Shipbuilders'.

1988 – Nov / Dec the company went into receivership.

1989 – The yard was taken over by A&P Appledore.

1990 - Ship number 1000 the 'St Helena' was built.

1992 – The yard closed, equipment was auctioned 11th March 1992.

Launch Days

Launch days were always a great occasion in Hall Russell, it was the first time that this great mass of steel would move, gracefully under its own weight entering the water of Aberdeen's Harbour, it was like a birth, it's first sign of life and we the workers had all contributed our part in her creation.

The occasion was always marked with the naming of the ship by smashing a bottle of champagne on her bow, this ceremony normally carried out by a woman, usually chosen by the owners of the ship, the naval ships we built were often named by royalty. (e.g. - Princess Anne named HMS Jersey in 1976).

A few hours before the official launch time the keel blocks, bilge and side shores were removed, the ship was now only being held by two triggers (wooden poles lashed with rope) underneath the hull of the ship, one on each side of the well greased launch-ways. On hearing the bottle smash, the ropes were cut and the poles moved to the side. Most of the times the ship would just sit there, being held only by the stickiness of the grease, but gradually she would slowly move accelerating as she hit the water to a great cheer from the visiting crowd and the workers. On the slip-way aside the ship there were large mounds of chain (Drag chains) these were attached to the side of the ship's hull and as the ship entered the water these began to be pulled down the slip, screeching and squealing under a great cloud of dust as they made their way to the water. Their function was to stop the ship in the middle of the harbour so she did not crash into the guay at the other side. Usually after the ship was in the water some of the crowd would venture down the slip to catch a better view of her afloat. It was then that someone always got caught out with the returning wave which entered the building hall and soaked a few, usually apprentices or visitors the others knew to keep back!














