Biographical Information, April program — Lee Pennington

LEE PENNINGTON is the author of 23 books including *I Knew a Woman* (1977) *Thigmotropism* (1993) and *Appalachian Newground* (2016)--each nominated for a Pulitzer Prize in poetry. His book, *Daughters of Leda* (2017) was selected as a finalist for "Best Book of Poetry published in 2017" by the American Book Fest. His *Songs of Bloody Harlan* was reprinted and re-released in 2019. His most recent book (2019) is *Segovia's Fingernail*. He has had over 1300 poems published in more than 300 magazines in America and abroad. He has had nine plays produced, wrote the script for *The Moonshine War* (MGM, 1970, starring Alan Alda, Richard Widmark, etc.), and has published thousands of poems, articles and short stories in everything from *Playgirl* to *MountainLife and Work*. His novel, *Moment of the Butterfly*, will be released by Hydra Publications in 2022.

Beginning in 1990, through his video production company, JoLe Productions (joleproductions.com), Lee, along with his late wife, Joy, produced 21 documentaries including *In Search of the Mudmen* 1990, *Wales: History in Bondage* (1995), and *Secret of the Stones* (1998), *Eyes that Look at the Sky: The Mystery of Easter Island* (2001), *The Mound Builders* (2001), *The Serpent Fort: Solving the Mystery of Fort Mountain, Georgia* (2005), *Let Me Not Drown on the Waters: Fred Rydholm, Michigan's "Mr. Copper."* After Joy's death, Lee produced five more documentaries for a total of 26: *Some Days You Clean, Some Days You Litter: The Amazing Warner Sizemore*, 2012; *Room To Fly: Anne Caudill's Album*, 2013; *Bosnian Pyramids Hidden History*, 2015; *Seafaring Strangers: Vikings in America, Part I*, 2016; and *Gunung Padang: Monument to Atlantis*, 2017.

Lee is a graduate of Berea College in KY and the University of Iowa. He holds two Honorary Doctoral degrees: Doctor of Literature from World University, and Doctor of Philosophy in Arts from The Academy of Southern Arts and Letters. He taught for nearly 40 years, the last 32 as Professor of English and creative writing at University of Kentucky Jefferson Community College until he retired in 1999. In 1983 the Kentucky State Legislature named him Poet Laureate, a lifetime appointment.

He has traveled extensively (in all the United States, in all the Canadian Provinces except two, and in 93 foreign countries). For the past fifteen years, he has served as president of the Ancient Kentucke Historical Association, a group dedicated to the study and research of pre-Columbian contact in the Americas, especially Kentucky.

In 2013 the University of Louisville opened the *Lee and Joy Pennington Cultural Heritage Gallery,* named after Lee and his late wife. The gallery contains U of L's most valuable works including the likes of first editions of Galileo, Copernicus, and Newton. It will house all of Lee's writings, films, and many artifacts he has collected traveling around the world.

Two films are presently in the works about Lee: one, a documentary on his life, and the second, a movie about his Harlan County, KY teaching experience where he was run out of town and had contracts taken out on him--all because of a book of poetry his students published in 1967!

He presently lives in Kratz House, a designated historic home, in Middletown, KY with his lady, Jill Baker, an artist who has illustrated several of his books.

Program and Education Commissioner Robbin Goodin introduced our speaker, Lee Pennington.

The Case for Prince Madoc and King Arthur in America

Mr. Pennington has researched this topic for many years, and shared some of his findings that support the idea of the Welsh, and specifically Prince Madoc and King Arthur, as being in America as early as 500 AD. He started by telling us that there has been a long-running coverup of Welsh history, extending throughout the United Kingdom and the United States. During the reign of Edward I, the king deliberately set about to destroy all Welsh records. He tried to conquer Wales, but the people vowed to never follow a king who had not been born in Wales or had ever spoken English. His response was to have his pregnant wife travel to Wales to give birth. The resulting son was raised in Wales, and never taught to speak English so that he could legally rule Wales.

This cover up has continued for hundred's of years, making it difficult to find older Welsh books and even songs and poetry. Mr. Pennington found King Arthur's tombstone stored in a shed with other headstones. It was clearly marked and easy to read. He asked several museums if they were interested in showing the headstone and information about how it was found to the public, but museums showed no interest.

He showed us a great many pictures of artifacts and writings that he believes prove that Madoc and Arthur were in America, and that Arthur was killed here and his body taken back to Wales for burial. He says there is evidence that some Indian tribes spoke Welsh along waterways the Welsh were supposed to have traveled along.

He told us that there are over two hundred books and articles written about the Welsh in America.

Here is a short list of some of these books:

America Discovered by the Welsh in 1170 AD, by Rev. Benjamin F. Bowen

They All Discovered America, by Charles Boland

Traditions fo the Earliest Visits of Foreigners in North America, by Reben Durrett

The Chrildren of Firstman, by James Alexander Thom

Prince Madoc: Founder of Clark County, Indiana

Mr. Pennington explained his theories and why he believes that Madoc and Arthur were in America, as well as other Welshmen.

There was a wealth of information, much of it in pictures, and the only way to truly enjoy his program would have been to be present. He was happy to answer questions and tell our members where to look for information.

Next month we will have the installation of officers at CCUM, where we hold our meetings.

Membership Meeting Minutes by Secretary Linda Wilson

The word Welsh means wallische in German, or "stranger". There were two major migrations of European peoples to Britain, one in about 500 BC, and the other in 1500 BC. Identical artifacts have been found in Troy, in Greece. These migrations are thought to have begun in Greece.

He showed us a list of artifacts from the United Kingdom and America from the 6th century.

- 1. The Paleo-Hebrew alphabet shows up every place the Khumry (Weslh) travelled.
- 2. Many identical artifacts in both areas
- 3. Identical stone works
- 4. Welsh-speaking Indians
- 5. DNA matches
- 6. A mural found hidden in Britain shows King Arthur being killed and his body being returned to Wales.

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This chart was hard to make out, there is so much information on it. It includes family lineages for several important people, including Arthur, Madoc, and several of their relations.

The SSL has been invited to set up a table at the Chancey Elementary School on Thursday, April 20 for their World Fest. The school is located on Murphy Ln. in the East End. The event will be open from 6pm to 7:30pm and we will be able to set up around 5:30pm. They normally have about 200 families attending their World Fest.

The International Fest at IUS in New Albany usually happens during March or April. I sent an email asking for set up information and **Dr. Kok Cheow Yeoh** (pronounced 'coke chow yo'), Associate Professor of Fine Arts and Director of Study Abroad and Global Awareness (SAGA) emailed back to let us know that the International Fest will not be taking place this year. He has just recently been put in charge for this event and due to his short time in charge, they will not be able to have it this year. Hopefully, it will be back next year.
