


Established in 1993 as a nonprofit organization to enrich the cultural lives of members in the Kentuckiana area.

SSL Membership Virtual Meeting August 26, 2020

Robbin Goodin introduced our entertainment for this evening. Our program tonight is musical, featuring Tom Cunningham and Kate Sanders. There is a link on the Scottish Society website that will allow you to hear and see their recorded performances on YouTube. The setting is outdoors in a garden, a beautiful backdrop for the music.

They began their performance with a lively, toetapping rendition of "Father Kelly's" and "The Reconciliation", and continued with "Ramblin' Rover", a lively tune featuring Tom with vocals, and Kate on keyboard.

These were followed by a slow, sad song, "Neil Gow's Lament After the Death of His Second Wife". This was instrumental, with Tom on violin and Kate on keyboard.

This was followed by a more upbeat tune, "The Leaving of Liverpool", written about those immigrants who left for more opportunities in America. They usually took a ship in Liverpool, England. Tom sang and played violin, and Kate played on keyboard.

Next, they performed "Off to California", with Tom on violin and Kate on hammered dulcimer, instrumental only. A very lively tune.

Following was a more somber piece, "I'd Cross the Wide Atlantic", with Kate singing and playing on the keyboard, and Tom on violin.

They switched to a couple of lively jigs, with Tom on violin and Kate on hammered dulcimer, instrumental only. Real dance music!

These were followed by "Wild Mountain Side", with Kate singing and playing on the keyboard, and Tom on the violin. They were accompanied by birdsong, as a bird in the garden decided to sing along with Kate. Quite lovely, and something they could not have replicated in a live performance in our meeting room at the church!

During the question and answer session, Robbin mentioned that Tom has tunes on his Facebook page. He talked about these, as there is a wide selection of music that he recorded on YouTube. He performs on many different instruments and a variety of musical selections.

There have been some problems with Webex during the meetings, which he believes is a lack of bandwidth at his home. For this program, he suggested that we listen to the program using the link on the website. He said that the sound quality is much better on YouTube.

Member At Large Commissioner Dianne Holland was not present due to a health issue (not the virus). Pat Schweitzer has been cleaning up our DropBox account but says there is much still to do.

Directions for Crust Ingredients Blend shortening, salt and flour together until mixture **2 Cups Sifted All Purpose Flour** resembles course sand. 1 ½ tsp Salt 1/2 Cup Vegetable Shortening Add milk and mix until moistened. DO NOT OVER WORK 1/4 Cup Cold Milk PASTRY TO PREVENT CRUST FROM BEING TOUGH. Divide in two and wrap in wax paper or saran wrap. Chill until ready to use. Blind bake the pie crust in a 425°F oven for 5 minutes. Remove weights and bake for another 2 minutes or until golden brown. **Directions for Filling Ingredients** Stir together sugar, cornmeal, vinegar, vanilla, butter, milk, 2 Cups Sugar and flour until well blended. 1 Tbsp Cornmeal 1 Tbsp White Vinegar 1/2 tsp Vanilla 1/2 Cup Butter 1 Cup Milk


Add eggs and salt, stir well.

Pour into cool pie crust and bake at 350°F for 50-55 minutes. Shield edges of crust with Aluminum foil after 10 minutes to prevent burning.



BEGINNER LEVELWhat's Your Nickname?

How often have you encountered an individual or family who looks like yours in a census, but the names aren't quite right? Have you found what appears to be your great-grandfather's marriage record, except that it says he's married to someone by a name other than what you always heard?

Our ancestors' seemingly changing names often leave us puzzled and frustrated, when in fact such apparent name changes are often just a result of the recording of an individual's nickname or middle name in the official records. While some think this is a historical trait, in reality, many people today are known by different names to family, friends, and business associates. My father's name was Lawrence, yet his family always referred to him as Bob. His middle name was Robert.

Nicknames stand for the name of a person in place of the proper name. The nickname may either substitute for, or be added to the proper name. It may be a familiar or truncated form of the proper name, such as Bob, Bobby, Rob, Robbie, Robin, and Bert for Robert. It is common in many genealogical records, especially more informal records such as census records and obituaries, to find ancestors listed under names you might not expect. In many cases these names may have been the nicknames known to their family and friends.

Nicknames have always been popular, but until the modern era, people generally used whatever variation of their legal name they felt like using at various times during their life. Once a person was out on their own, they often adopted a nickname or a variation of their given name. Legal requirements that now govern the processing of legal papers were non-existent in earlier times.

Nicknames can sometimes be difficult to catch. "Kim" as a nickname for "Kimberly" is straightforward, but "Polly" as a nickname for "Margaret" have tripped up many genealogists. Sometimes nicknames were formed by adding a "y" or "ey" to the end of a name or part of a name; i.e., "Johnny" for "John" or "Penny" for "Penelope." The name may have been shortened in some manner, such as "Kate" for "Katherine".

Sometimes it is just a matter of knowing which nicknames were commonly used in a particular time and place. That's why genealogists should become familiar with commonly used nicknames and their corresponding given names. Remember, however, that what appears to be a nickname is not always the case. Many nicknames became so popular that they were bestowed as given names.

INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED LEVEL Reclaim The Records

Are you frustrated by commercials and online solicitations about how more and more genealogical information is available on the Internet that will make research faster and more convenient? Have you wondered why access to public information is increasingly restricted even though your tax dollars funded the civil servants and the agencies that compiled it? Do you find it interesting that access to public information is increasingly limited to subscription databases whose rates continue to increase? If you answered yes to these questions, relief may be on the horizon due to the efforts of a group called Reclaim the Records. https://www.reclaimtherecords.org.

The non-profit 501 (c) 3 organization was the brainchild of its founder, Brooke Schreier Ganz. Her background is in technology, but she became involved in genealogy in 2011. Like many genealogists, she grew frustrated by the lack of online access to New York City and New York state archival records. At that time, few New York records had been put online by their respective city or state government archives or agencies, nor were the records available to search or to view through any genealogy websites. Access was limited to being physically onsite in New York records repositories. After unsuccessfully attempting to use New York City's open data law to generate the publication of the basic indices to these records, Ganz decided to use the state's Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) to force release of the data.

Eventually her success led to the establishment of the Reclaim the Records organization. While the original strategy was to use FOIL and the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) to force the release of records, the group's success has mushroomed into a nationwide effort. Reclaim the Records advocates for greater transparency and accessibility of genealogical, archival, and vital records information in all 50 states. They have established a successful track record using FOIA requests and

lawsuits to force government agencies, archives, and libraries to make available to the public previously inaccessible records. Reclaim the Records then digitizes and publishes the records online for free public use, without any copyrights or usage restrictions.


Reclaim the Records is the first genealogical organization to successfully sue a government agency for the release of records back to the public. As of 2020, the organization has acquired and freely published more than twenty eight million records. Their website not only features a very impressive listing of successful lawsuits and the eventual outcome of their efforts, but an equally impressive "to-do" list of their future legal targets nationwide.

Their goal is best summed up in their own words: "We're tired of begging archivists, librarians, city clerks, and state Departments of Health for access to our own records, paid for with our taxes. Those days are done. We pick our targets, carefully study the vital records laws and the state Sunshine Laws, craft our records requests, and if we don't get an appropriate answer, we sue." Genealogists owe this organization a huge debt of gratitude.

Heritage Fund

The Heritage Fund Committee is accepting applications for the dispersal of scholarship funds. The Fund helps support the efforts of SSL members to pursue studies of the many different aspects of Celtic culture, which may include music (piping, drumming, fiddling, etc.), art (dancing, weaving, etc.), language (Gaelic, etc.) and athletics (Highland games).

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
