

The God emerges as the May King and Jack in the Green. The danced Maypole represents Their unity, with the pole itself being the God and the ribbons that encompass it, the Goddess. Colors are the Rainbow spectrum. Beltane is a festival of flowers, fertility, sensuality, and delight.

## NAMES, SEPTS AND ALIASES OF CLAN GREGOR AS RECOGNIZED BY THE CLAN GREGOR SOCIETY

With a few exceptions, spelling variants are omitted but are accepted. M', Mc and Mac are considered interchangeable. Many names were adopted as a result of proscription and some families retained the new names when the proscription was lifted in 1774, while many others re-adopted their rightful name of MacGregor.

# From the Pesk of the Chapter President:

Dear Griogarach,

As you may have noticed, or not noticed as the case may be, there was no newsletter towards the end of last year, due to the "crash" of our Membership Director's computer, which amongst other things, normally produced all the mailing labels for said newsletter. It was only comparatively recently that this situation was rectified,



and our Membership Director has labored long and hard to retrieve the lost data, and catch up on the long overdue business. (More about that in this issue.) Consequently, my President's message, with report and update on events for that time was not printed. Therefore, in the hopes of reviving the Scottish Spirit, which seems to wane a little during the winter months when we have no activities, and to encourage others to attend this year the events we enjoyed last year, I intend to lead off here with a modified version of the 2006 end-of-year message, and progress on to events attended and upcoming for this year.

In 2006 I managed to get to more Scottish Games and Gatherings than ever before, and certainly enjoyed fraternizing with Gregor cousins, visitors, and new members. I last reported on attending the Dunsmuir Games in Oakland with my two youngest daughters; the next ones we went to were the ones at Pleasanton over Labor Weekend. We got good attendance from Clan members over the two days, although we missed Joe Foss and the Stoop's, amongst others, but as well as the Games themselves, enjoyed a dinner and a breakfast with fellow Gregors. I personally spent a lot more time at the tent than I had before, as I was already pretty familiar with all the vendors and their wares, having been going there for a number of years, and got great enjoyment out of greeting and meeting a lot of visitors and signing up new members. Also, the temperatures were noticeably lower than they usually are, which made things more comfortable, and not so tiring. A most enjoyable and successful event I felt.

The next Games I attended were on September 16th, at Fresno, a site I had not been to before, and we also held our Annual General Meeting there, followed by a short Council Meeting. I was quite impressed with the venue; out in the country park, alongside a river, and under huge trees, which certainly helped to shelter from the direct heat of the sun. This was not a very large Game, and not very well attended by Gregors considering the holding of the AGM; we were really scraping to get a quorum. However, the meetings were conducted, some reports given, business transacted, and several Council members due to rotate off at the end of 2006 were re-instated, they being myself, Todd Raines, and Carl Basile, all back in our current positions of President, Vice President, and Newspaper Editor respectively. Apparently no-one else wanted these jobs! The Sykes family had shopped around and got a good deal on a new trailer to house and transport the northern tent equipment, and kindly agreed to finance that to the Clan with half being paid at the meeting, and the balance next year. With Chris in his first full year as official Northern Tent coordinator, he and his family members have put in a wonderful effort in providing the tent on behalf of the Clan at more Games than in the past, and done a great job of representing us, and they certainly deserve our thanks. Ed Sykes has taken up shinty, and we were able to see him play or demonstrate his equipment at several events this year.

The next Games for us were in Dixon on September 24th. These appeared to have been declining

over the last couple of years, and we originally weren't going to go to them as we had lots of other activities coming up over the following weekends. However, we decided to go and support the Sykes family who were faithfully taking the tent, and we stayed longer, had a much more enjoyable time than originally anticipated, despite the number of vendors being seriously reduced. However, they did have the usual bawdy and hilarious "Bonny Knees Contest" for guys in kilts, and your old President came in second! (The guy that came in first was of similar age, much to the chagrin of the "young studs" who fancied themselves a shoe-in to win!) Unfortunately there are no trophies or prize money for scoring in this contest; only "bragging rights!" Unexpectedly, a couple of vendor friends were there, not with their own booth as usual but helping out someone else, so we got to spend some time with them also, and ended up having dinner together.

The following weekend the Grass Valley Celtic Faire was scheduled, only 45 minutes or so away from my home. We had not been to this before, as we had always heard it was fairly expensive, but after I had contacted our "North Eastern" Tent coordinator John Pechin during the previous week, to make sure he was going to represent the Clan, we decided to go for a few hours to support him. Well, it certainly was expensive; way more than any other Games, so that influenced us to stay all day to get our money's worth! (It's that Scottish thing!) And we did, and once again enjoyed them way more than we had expected to.

October 7th, brought the Ben Lomond Games. Once again we had tossed up whether to go or not, as it was a quite some distance away, and we'd been away from home four of the last five weekends, with more to come, but our friends Carolynn and Bob Stoops were coming down from Oregon for the event, and we wanted to take the (rare) opportunity to see them. Patricia and I took the Friday afternoon off work, leaving around lunchtime to drive down to Santa Cruz, where we had reserved a reasonably-priced, older, but very clean motel a block away from the boardwalk. We met Bob and Carolynn, and also Clan members Jay and Dale Whyte for dinner, and had a great get-together. After we got back to our motel I went for a stroll out to the end of the Santa Cruz pier, and although there were very few stores open, there were lots of sea lions, and a full moon shining across the ocean onto the boardwalk; a most enjoyable conclusion to the day.

I have certainly enjoyed my attending and supporting an increased number of Scottish & Celtic events this year, and especially the increased fraternization with my fellow Gregors, (and potential new Gregors). Hopefully many of you were also able to enjoy a lot of these events and the opportunity to support our Clan associations and traditions.

So far this year we have attended a Robbie Burns dinner in Sacramento in January, and no doubt other of you attended similar gatherings in different parts of the country. Next we attended the Celtic Faire at Angels Camp on Saturday March 10<sup>th</sup>, with the intention of opening and closing it! I think it was supposed to go from 10:00am till 10:00pm; we made it there shortly after opening, but after a long enjoyable day, eventually decided to call it quits around 8:00pm. We did see our Membership Director, Ed Moore there, with his lovely wife, Raiyn, and also a number of the well-known and enjoyable Celtic performers. The weather was kinder this year; it wasn't snowing as it was the year before!

We did not make it to the games at the Queen Mary in Southern California; if I remember correctly it clashed with racing again. One of these years we intend to make it there.

Our next event is the Woodland Games on April 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>, where we are also holding our required biannual Council Meeting, and getting together for dinner on Saturday evening at a local barbecue restaurant. So far we have a good response from Clan Members intending to attend on this weekend.

Hopefully the woes and consequences of computer "crashes" are behind us, and we can move ahead in a positive manner for the future. The Woodland Games, for us here in Northern California, are the start of the busy games season for the rest of the year. I encourage you all to attend as many of the events as you can; to rekindle the Scottish Spirit, and fraternize and reunite with your own Clan Brothers and Sisters.

### The Clan Gregor DNA Project

As some of you know, I've participated in the Clan Gregor DNA Project along more than 100 other members of Clan Gregor. Recently, I also joined the McPheeters/McPeters FamilyTreeDNA Project as well (all that means is Richard McGregor shared my DNA data file with the McPheeters/McPeters project administrator, no new testing required). Some results from both projects have helped my bride, Robin McPeters, make breakthroughs in her efforts to gather genealogy data for my side of the family.

Then something really surprising happened. I got an e-mail from a lady in California (I'm still on active duty at Bolling AFB in D.C.; Bob McGregor - as in Airman Robert **B.** McGregor - didn't destroy all of it when he was in the Air Force) telling me her brother "Bob **D.** McGregor" is a match with my DNA. To my surprise and delight, the lady in California is Carolyne McGregor Long, our Western USA Clan Gregor Chairman Emeritus.

It's a very satisfying feeling to have so many aspects of my life turn out to be intertwined. About 14 years ago in Nashville, Tennessee I met a girl wearing a MacGregor Tartan skirt. She introduced me to the Clan Gregor Society, both Western USA & Great Lakes chapters, and somewhere along the way agreed to marry me.

At the Clan Gregor tent I've made many good friends, discovered common values and traits while meeting up with Todd Raines and crew at the Southern Tent. The clan Gregor DNA project referred me to the DNA project following my father's family name. And they've shown me the DNA trail from my father's birth-place in Northern Alabama, through Tennessee (remember the girl in the tartan skirt) to North Carolina and ultimately to the British Isles. Stumbling around the Carolinas it came to light a McPeters ancestor served in the same Civil War regiment as one of Todd Raines' ancestors. I get an e-mail telling me I'm genetically related to our Chairman Emeritus' family. Currently, military service allows me to tread the same Air Base where our friend Bob (Robert B.) McGregor served his country.

As another of the tent regulars, Richard McAdams, described it: "It's your DNA calling you home."

So here's my pitch, please give serious consideration to participating in the Clan Gregor Family DNA project (http://www.clangregor.org/macgregor/dna.html) The cost is relatively small, and the potential benefits are many. You can help Clan Gregor pursue its historical and cultural mission. You may create a breakthrough in your own genealogy efforts. You may get to tell your own cool story of family, friends, genetics and tartan skirts.
