Again, we certainly hope you do enjoy your visit and most definitely hope you will join the Gregor clan!



IMBOLC



Imbolc, also known as Candlemas and Groundhog's Day, occurs at the beginning of February. It marks the middle of Winter and holds the promise of Spring. The Goddess manifests as the Maiden and Brigid. The Groundhog is a manifestation of the God. Colors are White, and sometimes Red. It is a festival of spiritual purification and dedication.

Brighid is the Celtic Goddess of inspiration, healing, and smithcraft. She is one of the best examples of the survival of a Pagan Goddess into Christian times. She was canonized as St. Brigit by the Roman Catholic Church and various stories are given of Her origins and Her life. She was a Druid's daughter, described in the Carmina Gadelica as the "daughter of Dugall the brown." She is reported to have predicted the coming of Christianity and to have been baptized by St. Patrick. Popular folk tales describe Her as the midwife to the Virgin Mary, and She is thus always called upon by women in labor. The Christian St. Brigit was a nun, and later an Abbess, who founded an Abbey at Kildare in Ireland. She was said to have had the power to appoint the bishops of Her area, an unlikely role for an Abbess, made stranger by Her unusual requirement that these bishops also be practicing goldsmiths.

If Candlemas day be fair and bright, Winter will have another flight. If Candlemas day be shower and rain, Winter is gone and will not come again.

Many names were adopted as a result of proscription and some families retained the new names when the proscription was lifted in 1774, while many others re-adopted their rightful name of MacGregor.

From the Pesk of the Chapter President:



Dear Brothers and Sisters of Clan Gregor,

Greetings, and welcome to a New Year. Hopefully you were all able to celebrate the occasion in an appropriate fashion, and, even more, were in good health the next day! I did hear of a number of people who did not manage to stay awake to see the New Year in; I only just managed it myself! I know this couldn't possibly be an indication of getting old, because I have decided not to participate in that! Did anyone celebrate in the traditional Scottish manner of "first footing"? Well, the New Year can bring new things, and this one has brought you a new President. (And you thought that lump of coal in your stocking was the bad news for the season!) Not only that, but we have a new Vice President, Todd Raines, who currently serves the Clan as tent co-coordinator in the south. And, speaking of which, we also have need of a new northern tent convener; after a great many years of faithful service, Don Motter has decided to retire from this position, and let someone else contribute to the Clan in this capacity. Any volunteers? Thankfully, Don is not depriving us of his company, his talents, his knowledge, and experience; he is only giving up the northern tent convener position. He intends to continue on council and as a loyal contributing member of the Clan.

Our first Council meeting of the year is scheduled for February 5th in Pismo Beach, being a reasonably central location considering the domiciles of the Council members concerned.

By way of interest, as of this time, our Western Chapter consists of 109 members, distributed approximately as follows:- 43% live in Northern California, 34% live in Southern California (the greater LA to San Diego area), 5% live in Central California, 2% live on the mid-California coast, 9% live in Arizona, with 1% each in Utah, Colorado, New Jersey, Nevada, Idaho, Mexico.

I was amazed when I officially joined Clan Gregor several years ago, to find in the statistics in the winter 2001 Clan Gregor Society Newsletter (our parent), that 70% of the (then) 1022 Clan Gregor members world-wide live in the USA and Canada, while only 13% live in Scotland, 10% in England, and much smaller percentages in various other parts of the world. (My own home country of New Zealand had 12 members; a whopping 1%!). So, brothers and sisters, this means that we here in this great country certainly are the major contributing force in ensuring that Clan Gregor "flourishes forever", and each of you can play a part in that. Clan Gregor needs each one of us; any, or all of your contributions to YOUR FAMILY can help. Feel welcome to volunteer your services, ideas, items of interest and other contributions to our newsletter, or to your organization, to help it function and provide successful and enjoyable Family associations for us all. I was reminded, when I was being "encouraged" to run for President, that "new blood", on an ongoing basis, is what keeps an organization "flourishing".

Although by most accounts the infamous "Clearances" were a far from happy situation, as the

old saying goes, "absence makes the heart grow fonder", and from what I've read in prose, poem, and song, this is certainly the case with ex-patriot and descendant Scots' feelings for their homeland. I know a number of you have had the privilege of visiting Scotland, some of you a number of times, for various significant events; I am envious of you, and have hopes & dreams of visiting there myself in the not-too-distant future. I am descended from Rob Roy; he was my sixth great-grandfather, and I have a great desire to explore the Trossachs and all areas associated with himself and the Clan, and to discover and peruse all sites, relics, artifacts, and history of the Clan I can find.

I have known of my MacGregor ancestry since I was a small child, and, thanks mostly to my mother and her parents, who are the MacGregor side of the family, have been collecting MacGregor family memorabilia since then. And, since I became an official member of the Clan, one of my greatest delights at the Games & Gatherings is to peruse the vendors and displays and search out anything I can find relating to our Family! However, in order to have the appropriate energy to accomplish this diligently, I am also "forced" to indulge frequently in the various offerings of sustenance and refreshment available at these events, such as I have fond memories of growing up with in my (British Commonwealth) home country! But, try as I might to consume enough of this fare, so far I haven't been able to summon up quite enough energy to participate in the "games" portion of the gatherings, comprising such events as "hurling the haggis", "tossing the telephone pole", etc! (Of course this still has nothing to do with getting old, because I'm not!)

I am most excited at the increased opportunity I now have to try and help our MacGregor Family Chapter to grow and flourish. Once again, I encourage each of us to participate in all the events that we can, to put forth our efforts to their successful functioning, and to submit news, articles of interest, ideas, suggestions, details of family accomplishments or successes, to your newsletter, or a member of Council as appropriate. THE CANDELIGHT CHRISTMAS WALK

Folks gathered from near and far at Volcano, California, located in the Sierra Foothills east of Sacramento, on December 10, 2004 for the 20th annual Candlelight Christmas Walk. This much-loved event is not a Highland Games or Celtic Faire. It is simply a pilgrimage to Jackson and Volcano to meet old friends and make new ones, to socialize and relax, and to Walk and sign carols just after dark in the wee village of Volcano. Volcano is a tiny town at about 2000 feet elevation, perched on the side of a mountain that looked to the gold-miners like a Volcano, but it never was one. We carry on a tradition begun by the Mother Lode Scots and Jock MacLeod Thebalt (age 91), which at one time attracted thousands of attendees. Today, the Mother Lode Scots no longer host the event, but it happens anyway, as if by magic. Actually, it is many die-hard Candlelight Walkers who show up every year, the second Saturday of December in Volcano. Hot mulled cider, scones and brownies are served by Jock and others. Clan Society members, including Clan Gregor, meet and exchange news, hugs, small gifts and enjoy the warm camaraderie.

This past December 10, many Gregors traveled to Jackson and Volcano to enjoy sunny, dry weather and met at the old Union Inn for hot drinks and fellowship in the afternoon. At about 5:15 p.m., the procession formed in front of the Inn and headed off through the streets of Volcano, singing Christmas carols and carrying glowing candles. Around 100 or so people participated. The houses were all lit with holiday decorations and the residents listened with pleasure to the singing and laughter of the Candlelight Walkers. The event brings as much pleasure to the locals as it does to the visitors. The Walk ends at the tiny Catholic Church, where greetings and a blessing are given to the crowd by the priest and the stalwart Jock Thebalt. Everyone sings "Amazing Grace" was the last of the candlelight glimmers in the darkness. It is a beautiful and magical experience.

Following the Walk, people break up into groups and head off to banquets and gala Scottish dinners in Volcano and Jackson. This year, Clan Gregor members gathered at the Union Inn for a wonderful feast that included Haggis (once again provided by Jock), prime rib, lamb stew, and roasted turkey legs. We enjoyed beverages from the bar including a wide selection of imported Scottish ales and California wines. Throughout the evening, everyone at the Union Inn was joyously entertained by a group of Celtic musicians who performed traditional and lively Scottish tunes for our pleasure. The setting was cozy, warm, and jolly, and, as always, was the perfect start for the holiday season.

Members of Clan Gregor Society who attended included Don and Kim Motter, Bob and Carolynn Stoops, Glynn Clark, Patricia Baldwin, Jay and Dale Whyte, Jerry and Alice White, Linda Corey, Helen Gibbs, and Ed and Raiyn Moore. Friends in Clans Buchanan, MacDonald, McLeod, and the St. Andrews Society were also present.

With the weather so sunny and pleasant on that weekend, many in our group enjoyed shopping and touring the quaint towns of Sutter Creek, Plymouth, Jackson, Somerset, and various parts of Amador County. We discovered a Bed & Breakfast Inn at Somerset called MacGregor House, which is 3 stories and can accommodate a small group or two couples. It is set in horse country and includes stables for your horses or you can arrange for a trail ride through the owner. There is a large deck for outdoor dinners and parties.

We plan to do the Candlelight Christmas Walk again next December and will try to arrange for a private

dinner for 22 people at the Union Inn. The Union Inn is also a Bed & Breakfast with 4 guest rooms. I hope to see many of you at Volcano in December!
