

IMBOLC



Imbolc, also known as Candlemas and Groundhog's Day, occurs at the beginning of February. It marks the middle of Winter and holds the promise of Spring. The Goddess manifests as the Maiden and Brigid. The Groundhog is a manifestation of the God. Colors are White, and sometimes Red. It is a festival of spiritual purification and dedication.

Brighid is the Celtic Goddess of inspiration, healing, and smithcraft. She is one of the best examples of the survival of a Pagan Goddess into Christian times. She was canonized as St. Brigit by the Roman Catholic Church and various stories are given of Her origins and Her life. She was a Druid's daughter, described in the Carmina Gadelica as the "daughter of Dugall the brown." She is reported to have predicted the coming of Christianity and to have been baptized by St. Patrick. Popular folk tales describe Her as the midwife to the Virgin Mary, and She is thus always called upon by women in labor. The Christian St. Brigit was a nun, and later an Abbess, who founded an Abbey at Kildare in Ireland. She was said to have had the power to appoint the bishops of Her area, an unlikely role for an Abbess, made stranger by Her unusual requirement that these bishops also be practicing goldsmiths.

If Candlemas day be fair and bright, Winter will have another flight. If Candlemas day be shower and rain, Winter is gone and will not come again.

NAMES, SEPTS AND ALIASES OF CLAN GREGOR AS RECOGNIZED BY THE CLAN GREGOR SOCIETY

With a few exceptions, spelling variants are omitted but are accepted. M', Mc and Mac are considered interchangeable. Many names were adopted as a result of proscription and some families retained the new names when the proscription was lifted in 1774, while many others re-adopted their rightful name of MacGregor.

The Society extends, a warm welcome to persons bearing names included in list A and to those with maternal descent from an eligible person. Persons bearing names or descent from names in Lists B and C who can show evidence of descent or a family tradition or MacGregor connection are also eligible for membership. Names in list D are properly the domain or other Clan and Family societies, however we would welcome enquiries from persons bearing these names who can show their descent from a MacGregor who adopted the name as an alias.

From the Pesk of the Chapter President:



Dear Fellow Gregors,

Happy New Year to each and every one. I hope you all had a most enjoyable Christmas season with family and friends and loved ones. It hardly seems possible we are already in a new year!

Since I last wrote, I attended the Tartan Ball in Sacramento on the 19th November, and as usual, had a very enjoyable time, meeting with friends and acquaintances, enjoying demonstrations of highland dancing and piping, eating, participating in the silent auction, then highland and ballroom dancing ourselves. The final Scottish event of the year for us was the Annual Scottish Christmas Walk in the small old goldera town of Volcano, near Jackson. Us Gregors, ten of us, assembled ourselves at Giannini's, an Italian restaurant in nearby Pine Grove, which apparently we had done in years past. We had a most enjoyable get-together around a meal that lasted about three hours! They just kept on bringing more courses, but I didn't hear anyone complaining, certainly not me! It was a most amicable occasion, with excellent service amidst the ambience of the Italian decor. Definitely worth repeating in my opinion. Those from our Clan who attended the Christmas Walk, and the dinner afterwards, were Carolynn and Bob Stoops, who had come all the way from their new home in Oregon, Ed and Raiyn Moore, Jerry and Alice White and daughter and son-in-law, and Patricia and myself.
