At the New Zealand Society's Annual Dinner at the Dorchester Hotel in London, on the 5th February 2005, the Chairman of the New Zealand Society Scotland, Peter Leslie was voted "the New Zealander of the Year"

Peter Leslie was born in Ashburton, Canterbury New Zealand in January 1964. The son of Clan Leslie Society of Australia and New Zealand members Barbara and Brian Leslie of Feilding Canterbury.

Peter is descended from Peter Leslie (a soldier) and Margaret Yorkstone from Edinburgh who, had a son, Peter, born 3rd March 1802 at Slateford Edinburgh. The first of the family who emigrated to New Zealand was another Peter, born 20 September 1826 who first appeared at Ashburton and married Margaret Isbister and drowned in the Ashburton River, 22nd March 1898, while collecting firewood.

KIWI FROM "HEARTLAND NZ" WINS AWARD.

Peter Leslie didn't expect to win an award on Friday night. In his words, he wasn't enough of a celebrity to be named, The New Zealand Society's, New Zealander of the Year, at the Annual Waitangi Day dinner at the Dorchester Hotel.

"I'm not a celebrity, I'm not from academia, from the arts or from politics. I'm just from heartland New Zealand".

But the judges obviously disagreed.

The award recognised the achievements he has made in promoting New Zealand in Scotland and strengthening the ties between the countries.

Leslie is a founding member and chairman of the Society's Scotland branch, but is quick to point out that he isn't solely responsible for the groups rapid expansion.

The group has seen its numbers swell due to the hard work of Leslie, working tirelessly to promote its activities.

He's quick to acknowledge those who work behind the scenes with him, to make sure events are organised and people contacted, but it's his work in presenting an "outstanding positive image of New Zealand in the UK' that swayed the judges.

Air New Zealand's Simon Bean, who presented the award, said "we were delighted to present the award to Peter. Through his quiet achievements, he has shown exceptional dedication in promoting New Zealand and Scottish relations. Having founded the Scottish New Zealand Society, he has been pivotal in organising the Arbroath ANZAC ceremony, a memorial to New Zealand airmen and the 150th Otago Settlement. His commitment is a great example to us all".

Leslie said that he didn't expect to win the award, for which he was nominated alongside Hilary Alexander (fashion editor of the Daily Telegraph) and Tim Bevan (co-founder of the British production company, Working Title Films). Previous winners include Dame Judith Mayhew Jonas DBE, celebrity chef, Peter Gordon and golfer Michael Campbell.

Leslie told New Zealand News UK that the award had capped off his 10th wedding anniversary on Friday.

He acknowledged the support that she had given him and the flexibility to "let me go and do things with the Society". Leslie didn't prepare a speech for the occasion, because he was certain that he would not win, "I actually thought that the film guy (Tim Bevan) was going to get it, to be honest"


During his acceptance speech, Leslie told the 400 people who attended the dinner, about the robust group of about 80 New Zealanders who made up the Scottish group.

He also paid tribute to the late Rachel Windsor, who had been a significant figure in the expatriate community, "She did a power of good for New Zealand in the UK".

The New Zealand Society also presented its Lifetime Achievement Award to acclaimed concert organist, Dane Gillian Weir, DBE. Weir arrived in London in 1961 to study at the Royal College of Music and stayed in the UK to make her mark in the world of classical music.


LESLIE MEMORIAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH & MANSE, BLACKHEATH. SYDNEY. NSW.

How many of you have been driving through the Blue Mountains of NSW, and passing through Blackheath, have not noticed the sign "Leslie Memorial Church", or having noticed it, have not stopped to look? Guilty? Well you have missed a great slice of Leslie history in Australia.

James Leslie was born at "Woodville" on the Paterson River in NSW, in 1848, to James Leslie and his wife Mary McMaster who arrived in Australia in 1838 on the "St George" from their ancestral home, Laggan, Inverness-shire, Scotland. James Leslie Snr died at "Milthorpe" Hunters Hill Sydney on the 30 July 1876.

James was educated at Kings School Parramatta, NSW and when he was about 25 years of age, was appointed manager of Binna Station, the property that belonged to his uncle, Duncan McMaster. He

subsequently purchased Nerida Station, near Muttaburra Station in Queensland, a large sheep raising property that he held for 17 years. After he sold Nerida Station, he took up residence in Sydney, NSW as a Stock Exchange investor. During the First World War, 1914 – 1918, he offered his home, "Balquhain" at Blackheath in the Blue Mountains, NSW that he had built in 1880, as a convalescent home for Officers. He also donated the money to build the Leslie Memorial Presbyterian Church and Manse at Blackheath, as well as donating a motor vehicle to the Presbyterian Church.




James Leslie Esq.

Before his death on the 19th July 1934, James Leslie gave his home "Balquhain" at 161 Govetts Leap Road, Blackheath, to the Presbyterian Church, as a rest home for the clergy. Unfortunately the Presbyterian Church sold "Balquhain" to the Fairfax family and it is now a Bed and Breakfast facility.

James Leslie married Elizabeth Waddell in 1888, the sister of the Hon Thomas Waddell.



A VERY IMPORTANT ARTICLE FOR ALL LESLIE'S.

FAMILY TREE DNA GENEALOGY SEQUENCING.

I would like to bring to the attention of all Leslies the advantages of a Leslie name DNA Project. This project would enable all those males of the name of Leslie to identify their male ancestors and possibly, in time, even settle the question whether Bartolf was from Hungary or Flanders.

I will attempt to give an explanation of DNA in laymans terms.

DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) is the chemical, inside the nucleus of all living cells that carry the genetic instructions for all living organisms. A DNA molecule consists of two strands that wrap around each other to resemble a twisted ladder. Each strand of the DNA molecule is held together at its base by a weak bond and four bases pair in a set manner. These Base Pairs are the basis of Y-chromosome testing.

Chromosomes.

Chromosomes are paired threadlike packages of long segments of DNA contained within the nucleus of each cell. In humans there are 23 pairs of chromosomes. In 22 pairs, both members are identical, one deriving from the persons mother, the other from the father. The 23rd pair is different and in females this pair has two X-chromosomes. In males it comprises one X and one Y. It is these chromosomes in the 23rd pair that determine sex.

Y-Chromosome.

Human sex is determined by the X and Y chromosomes. A female has 2 X-chromosomes and a male has an X and a Y-chromosome. When a child is born, it gets one X-chromosome from its mother and either an X or a Y-chromosome from its father. The chromosome from the mother is always an X, but the chromosome from the father is either an X or a Y. If it is an X the child will always be a girl, if the child gets a Y from the father, it will be a boy.

The Y-chromosome has certain features and the main one is that the Y-chromosome is inherited as an integral unit and is passed from father to son without **ANY** alteration and that is where the Y-chromosome benefits the genealogical searcher. The vast majority of the time the Y-chromosome is passed from father to son, unchanged, but there is sometimes a mutation. The advantage with DNA searching comes when you have a large number of people of the same name undertake DNA testing and the number of markers can indicate the closeness of a relationship.

I earnestly suggest that members of Clan Leslie contact Family Tree DNA under the Surname Project and start a Leslie DNA Surname Project. See the Family Tree DNA website and see the Leslie Project for the Leslie Surname Project DNA application form at. There are no participants yet, although I will be taking the test.

The cost of a 12 marker test is approx \$99US, but if a match turns up, you can go back and get the DNA sample checked again for a 36 marker, which unfortunately will cost more if you decide to get the more accurate test. Further information can be Family Tree website seen on www.familytreedna.com or do a Google search for genealogy DNA. I am willing to enter into correspondence on this subject as I consider that it will be a great benefit to the ongoing search for linked relatives and as I said at the start, in time it could solve the ancestry of Bartolf.

The Y-chromosome test is only for the male members of the family, but there is another test, which can be used for the maternal side of the family, which is called the Mitochondrial Haplogroup, but that can be looked into later.

THE KINGS OWN SCOTTISH BORDERERS.

Upon a Saltire, the Castle of Edinburgh with mottoes, In veritatem religionis confido(*I trust in the truth of my belief*) and Nisidominus frustra (*In vain without the Lord*) all ensigned with the Royal Crest.

You will most probably be aware that there has been a push from the British Government to amalgamate the Scottish regiments into one super Scottish regiment, to be called The Royal Regiment of Scotland.

The Kings Own Scottish Borderers, The Black Watch, The Royal Scots, The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders and The Royal Fusiliers and the Highlanders would all be combined and would have a single cap badge.

Defence Secretary Geoff Hoon has confirmed that Scotland's regiments will be combined into a single unit and the Scottish National Party MP, Annabelle Ewing was thrown out of the House of Commons for calling Geoff Hoon, "a backstabbing coward" over the proposal, which Mr Hoon said "was vital as part of a drive to improve efficiency in the deployment of soldiers".

As I see it, it is only a device to reduce the spending on defence and I would say to Mr Hoon if you want to save money, reduce the salaries of MPs and also reduce their "perks".

General Sir Mike Jackson, Chief of the General Staff said that the battalions would keep their roots in Scotland and that they would still continue to recruit from the same areas in Scotland and would still wear items, such as The Black Watch's red

hackle and the Highlanders' blue hackle. There is no sign of recruitment being carried out and what is a small piece of cloth to losing the identity of the battalions.

If the amalgamations are being carried out to improve efficiency and to save money, why not return to Scotland some of the billions of pounds being taken from the oilfields of Scotland, by England, and retain the proud history of these Scotlish Regiments and improve the infrastructure of Scotland, which has been shabbily neglected.

The Kings Own Scottish Borderers Regiment was initially raised in Edinburgh, in 1689 by the Earl of Leven (Leslie) under a Commission given by a Committee of the Convention of Estates to oppose the advance of the Highlanders at the Pass of Killiecrankie, where it withstood the charge of the Highlanders, and other regiments fled. It was originally named, Leven's or The Edinburgh Regiment.

It next saw action in Ireland in 1691 at the sieges of Athlone, Galway and Limerick. In 1692 – 1697 the Regiment was in Flanders and won its first battle honours at Namur in 1695, during The War of the League of Augsburg. The Regiment has been in action in most campaigns since that time and is still an active serving Regiment in the British Army.

The Regiment has the privilege of recruiting in Edinburgh without obtaining the permission of the Lord Provost and it has the right to march through the streets of Edinburgh with fixed bayonets and colours flying and this is the heritage that the British government wish to dispense with.

The Kings Own Scottish Borderers Regiment was recalled by the British Government to fight at Culloden and then returned to Flanders for further action and it was fighting on the Continent during the Seven Years War of 1756 - 1763. It is possible to go on and on about the various engagements that the Regiment has fought. Sufficient to say that during The Great War 1914 – 1918, the Regiment fought on the Western Front, Gallipoli and Palestine and during the Second World War 1939 – 1945 in served in France until Dunkirk and after the Normandy invasion it had battalions fighting in North West Europe, Burma and the 7th Battalion was in the Airborne Division at Arnhem.
