Charles Smith was the grandson of John and Ann Leslie who were married in Ireland and arrived in Australia in 1852.

He enlisted in the A.I.F. 27^{th} May 1915 when he was aged 16 years and nine months and was posted to the 50^{th} Battalion and then posted to Egypt on the 25^{th} Nov 1915. He remained fighting in Egypt until the 5^{th} June 1916 when he was transferred to France on the "Arcadian", arriving in Marseilles 12^{th} June 1916.

He fought in battles at Rouen, Etaples and at Mouquet Farm where he was awarded the Military Medal for Bravery in the Field on the 3rd and 4th September 1916. He was wounded in the field and admitted to Haire Hospital, then

transferred for further treatment to the Field Hospital on the 25th Nov 1916.

He needed further treatment and was transferred to England, on the Hospital ship "Wandilla" and was hospitalised in England until he was discharged from the army, due to his wounds, on the 6th Aug 1917 and returned to Australia.

Approximately 12 months before the outbreak of War in 1939, Charles joined the peacetime Militia and was called into full time service when War was declared in 1939.

Until the end of the war in 1945 Capt Smith was placed at the Concord Repatriation Hospital in Concord Sydney, supervising electrical operations. The Concord Repatriation Hospital at Concord was established for Australian war wounded personnel who had been repatriated to Australia for further treatment.

A DARWIN STORY ABOUT The Right Reverend Ken Leslie

On the night of the 17th September 1942 at the HQ of 17 Australian Field Ambulance there was grave concerns for a reconnaissance party that had been due to return by 1400 hours.

Lt Col Reginald George Worcester ED despatched a search party to find the missing patrol. At 1920 hours the missing truck was located 28 miles from camp.

The driver Cpl FW Knorr had suffered fractures of six cervical vertebrae. Cpl Knorr was conscious but in no pain. He was paralysed from the shoulders down and was immediately evacuated to 119 Aust Gen Hospital.

On the 20th September 1942 Cpl Knorr died and was laid to rest at 1100 hours on the 21st September at Adelaide River with Full Military Honours. The funeral service being conducted by the Army Chaplain the Reverend Ken Leslie.

SCALLOPS MANUKAU

First if you are lucky enough to live in Auckland, go out onto the Manukau Harbour mudbanks and either pick up or dredge for scallops, observing the limit that you are allowed to collect and before the season finishes on the 14th February. If not go to the nearest fish shop and find the best looking scallops that you can. Make sure that the muscle is clean and the roe a bright orange.

Dip the scallops into a beaten egg, which has been seasoned with salt and pepper.

Next roll the scallops in breadcrumbs and put into a moderately hot, deep fryer with enough vegetable or peanut oil to cover the scallops. Cook for about two minutes or until the scallops are a golden brown and then eat with whatever dressing or salad takes your fancy. Magnificent, and I do speak from personal experience.

THE MARITIME LESSLIE'S PT 2

In June 1812 as master of the brig ACTIVE, Captain Robert sailed from Port Jackson, for the Derwent and New Zealand, with a Mr Gordon as a passenger. This Mr Gordon is thought to be Charles Gordon, who was then 21 years of age and had arrived in Australia in 1804. Charles Gordon's daughter, Hepzibah, was later to marry Robert's nephew William. Charles Gordon and his first wife were to be two of the first 12 persons forming the Rev Samuel Marsden's first missionary settlement in the Bay of Islands New Zealand. The ACTIVE was purchased by the Rev Marsden, with the intention of servicing the settlement.

Later in 1812 Robert, still as master, the ACTIVE was recorded as whaling in Frederick Henry Bay near Hobart only a few miles from where Abel Tasman first landed on Australian soil. The year 1812 is only 24 years after Australia was first settled and five years before the settlement extended further than 50 miles westward over the Blue Mountain. Unfortunately, it was only a year later that Captain Robert Lesslie B 1768 was murdered by natives at the island of Otahete, now called Tahiti.

Captain Robert's younger brother William B 1771, then assumed control of the business. He had married a Dunbar girl Elizabeth Wallace and they had 5 children all born in Dunbar. Wallace continues as a family name to this day and William continued to operate within reach of the Dunbar base and home.

Their children were,

ROBERT LESLIE
Born 21st April 1807

JAMES LESLIE
Born 3rd December 1809
Died 21st April 1830

WILLIAM LESSLIE
Born 2nd December 1812

THOMAS LESSLIE
Born 17th June 1817

ELIZABETH LESSLIE
Born 15th May 1819

Apart from Captain Robert B 1807 the surviving children became progenitors of most of the Australian double S, Lesslie's.

Captain Robert B 1807, was master of the STAR and like his uncle, he spent much of his time at sea far from home. In 1833 and 1835, he was in Valparaiso Chile, and in 1836 as master of the SUCCESS he arrived in Sydney from Western Australia, via Melbourne and in 1837 handed the ship over to his brother, Captain William Leslie. He continued to operate in Australian, New Zealand and Javanese waters until May 1840. Robert certainly developed a maritime interest in Australia, which passed down through his family.

After the death of his parents, Captain William B 1768 and Elizabeth Wallace, the Dunbar establishment apparently passed to Robert and his heirs. His family ultimately sold out and moved to London where they became involved in the foundation of the Orient Line, now part of the P&O Line. This interest was retained for many years. One Robert John Lesslie died at the age of 93 still working in the management of the Orient Line. He held a number of important posts in Australian shipping circles. His son William Douglas Lesslie also in the Orient Line recognised the non continuance of their male line and arranged for the family bible to be sent via an Orient Line ship to the Australian branch of the family where it remains today.

Many members of the family of Captain William Lesslie and Elizabeth Wallace, individually

developed an interest in Australia and subsequently migrated to Australia.

Elizabeth B 1819 the only daughter married a Robert Nisbet and moved to Sydney. They had no children

Thomas B 1817 who married Sarah Gowan Foster stayed in England as a tide surveyor at the Port of London and this family, except for one branch now in Norfolk England and one in Canada generally moved to Australia, to ultimately locate at Kenthurst NSW, Eumungerie NSW, Dubbo NSW, Penrith NSW and Springwood NSW.

Captain William B 1812, the other son, arrived in Australia as master of the sloop /cutter VANSITTART, a ship of 80 tons, in time to celebrate his 24th birthday on 30th January 1836. As was the custom in those days he had travelled from Cowes London, via Hobart. Later that year he carried goods and passengers between Hobart, Sydney, Spencer Gulf and Nepean Bay, now Kangaroo Island, South Australia's first settlement prior to the founding of Adelaide in January 1837

He travelled to Port Phillip, {now Melbourne} then only one year old. On two voyages he carried J. Gellibrand an associate of John Batman who founded Melbourne. In January 1837 Captain William Lesslie relinquished command of the VANSITTART and then took command of the SUCCESS from a Captain James Leslie {relationship unknown} who, had previously taken command of the SUCCESS from William's brother Robert, Captain Robert Lesslie B 1807. Captain William Lesslie's, elder brother had command of a number of ships and through to October 1836, he had command of the SUCCESS.

Captain William went on to take command of a number of other ships. He was wrecked in one of them, the FALCON, in the Bay of Plenty New



Zealand. He ultimately purchased his own ship the PEDLAR and traded between Sydney, Newcastle and Wollongong until it was wrecked at the southern end of Bondi Beach.

Captain Lesslie's earlier command "VANSITTART", in which he travelled to

Australia, then under a different master, was sold to the Van Dieman's Land Government and was attached to Port Arthur, the notorious convict settlement for search and rescue work. Later in 1842 it was seconded to HMS BEAGLE {Charles Darwin's old ship} to be used for surveying Australia's coastline. An island near Tasmania in Bass Strait was named after her

How William Lesslie and his wife, Hepzibah Gordon met is uncertain, but it could have happened when William's uncle Robert and Hepzibah's father Charles, previously sailed to New Zealand in the ACTIVE. After their marriage on the 25th July 1842, the family resided in the eastern suburbs of Sydney, initially in Surry Hills and later in Double Bay on an estate purchased by Charles Gordon, at the original sale of land by the government when Double Bay was opened up. On their marriage day an oak tree was planted and years later a table and chair were made from its wood. Today Russell Lesslie holds the chair, received under a family bequest and the Hardie family holds the table.

Some of the Double Bay property was rented to the Guilfoyles, where they ran a nursery. They were responsible for being the first importers of a large number of plants and establishing several botanical gardens.

Captain William Lesslie, died in 1855 at the early age of 43, leaving his wife to bring up a young family, Mary Elizabeth then 12 years of age, William Charles then 8 years of age and Anna Maria then 5 years of age.

Mary Elizabeth grew up to marry Robert Hardie founder of the Estate Agents Hardie and Gorman and Anna Maria never married and remained in the family home in Double Bay till she died.

William Charles Lesslie, the only son was friendly with the Guilfoyles and attended the St Marks parish school in adjacent Darling Point. When he grew up he entered the world of commerce. Under these family circumstances and without his seafaring father's influence, it is reasonable that he leaned towards an occupation on the land.

After many generations of master mariners, originating in Scotland, the family's long association with the sea and ship's, ultimately came to an end in colonial Australia.

THE REV SAMUEL MARSDEN

The brig "Active", was purchased by the Reverend Samuel Marsden, in March 1814, from Captain Robert Lesslie, while it was laid up in Sydney, after a voyage from India. It was said to be about 110 tons and the purchase price was £1,400, which Samuel Marsden paid from his own resources, to enable him to supply the missionaries in New Zealand with supplies, as there was no other reliable means of getting supplies to New Zealand.

The "Active" made a preliminary voyage to the Bay of Islands under the command of Capt Dillon, arriving in June 1814 with two missionaries, Thomas Kendall and William Hall on board.

Before making its historic second voyage, Marsden had the brig inspected and certified as to its suitability, as it was intended to use the "Active" as a trading and passenger vessel for the Missionary settlement and general trading to make the vessel pay its way.

The original document is now held by the University of Otago New Zealand and stated the vessel 'was well adapted for the purpose of taking missionaries from Port Jackson to New Zealand and will with occasional repairs, caulking etc, last many years to carry on communication between this place and the proposed settlement in the Bay of Islands". The document was dated 22nd September 1814 and was signed by Richard Brooks, agent for the underwriters, Lloyds of London, E Bunker, master of the Seringpatum and Thomas Hansen, master of the "Active".

When the "Active" left Port Jackson on 19th November 1814 with Thomas Hansen as Master, it also carried five members of the Captain's family amongst the total of 35 people on board. These five were:-


Mrs Hannah Hansen, wife of Captain Hansen. Thomas Hansen, son of Capt Hansen, unmarried Mrs Hannah King, The Captains daughter and wife of

John King, The Captains missionary son in law Philip Hansen King, the Hansen's 15 month old grandson.

The "Active" also carried what was described as 'a Noahs ark", consisting of horses, cattle, sheep, pigs, goats, poultry, and cats and dogs, intended for the mission settlement.

By Friday 16th December 1814, the "Active" was within sight of the New Zealand coast and during Saturday, it lay at anchor off North Cape for the

whole day, whilst Marsden made arrangements to contact the local Maori tribes and also to obtain fresh supplies for both passengers and the animals on board who needed fresh grass.

As the "Active" proceeded down the East Coast of New Zealand, Marsden went ashore at the Cavalli Islands and again on the nearby mainland. Finally at 3-00pm on Thursday 22nd December, the "Active" reached its destination and dropped anchor in the cove opposite Rangihoua,the home of the local Maori Chief Ruatara and while surrounded by canoes, the "Active's" great guns were fired as a salute to Ruatara and his people.

During his two month visit, Marsden preached the first Christmas Day service to be held on New Zealand soil. Hannah King gave birth to the first European child to be born in New Zealand and on the same day in February 1815, Marsden performed the first baptism in New Zealand and also executed the first Deed of Land Sale with the Maori people.

The "Active" returned to NSW on 25th February 1815 and Captain Hansen continued as Master until 1817, when he and his wife returned to Sydney.

Marsden kept the "Active" until 1825 when he sold it to a Sydney merchant. The new owner put the "Active" on the Sydney-Calcutta trade, but after the second voyage, it was found to be unseaworthy, and broken up in India.

LESLIE'S WITH WEBBED FEET!!!

Well not quite. I have in the back of my mind a story that I heard years ago, that some Leslie families had a web of skin between some of their toes

When I went over to New Zealand in October I wanted to get more information on the Leslie's of Kaeo and the Leslie's of Kaiwaka, both in North Auckland

William Day Leslie from County Kerry in Ireland, who arrived on the "Mary Shepherd" in the Bay of Islands, 25 Oct 1865 was the Patriach of the Kaeo Leslie's and William Leslie from Westing in the Shetland Islands Scotland who arrived in New Zealand on the "Maori" in 1859, was the Patriach of the Kaiwaka Leslie's.

Now these families are from different branches of the Leslie family yet members of both of these families have a web of skin between the second and third toes. It would be interesting to know where their links to the Leslie family in Scotland diverge. More than likely in the mid 1600s, under "The Plantation Scheme", whereby farmers from Scottish families were given land in Ireland and thereby the Ulster Scots sprang. I would also suspect that they are descended from the Balguhain Leslies.

I will not mention the names of the descendants who have this distinguishing feature, maybe they will write an article for our newsletter, but it would seem to be a genetic feature passed down through the female line.

If any members of CLANZ have any information on this genetic feature, or know of any other Leslie families who have the web between the toes, I would be most interested to hear from them

NEW ZEALAND TRIP

I would like to apologize to CLANZ members further south in New Zealand. I would have liked to have got down to see you, but maybe next time I am over in New Zealand.

As I said in a previous article, I wanted to find out more information on the Kaeo and Kaiwaka Leslie's, and even a small country like New Zealand takes time to get around.

I called in to see Lavina "Tuppy" Jones on my way up north. She is descended from William Day Leslie and she was kind enough to give me a copy of the drawing of the Brig "Active" that was sold by Captain Lesslie to the Rev Samuel Marsden.




Lavina "Tuppy" Jones and Barrie Leslie with the drawing of the "Active" in the background.

The sons of William Day Leslie, Lavina's great uncles, cut down the mighty Kauri trees for The Auckland Timber Company and also cut and milled the Kauri for the timber to build the Leslie homestead and also the timber for All Saints Anglican Church at Kaeo, which even to this day is maintained by the Leslie family.

John McGee of Kaeo, a cousin of "Tuppy" was kind enough to show me around Kaeo and open the church for me and also took me up to Greens Road to the Bramley family Cemetery and showed me the Headstone of William Day Leslie,

Inside the Church is a lot of memorabilia devoted to the Leslie's, not least the marble plaque remembering two sons of William Day Leslie who were killed in the Great War 1914-1918.

Just to give some indication at how close the families were who lived around the Bay of Islands.

William Day Leslie married Cecelia Stephenson 31st May 1872 at "Woodside" the home of William Murray at Taraire. Cecelia's younger sister then married John Bramley, son of William Bramley the Kaeo schoolmaster, then Cecelia's

half sister from England came out to New Zealand and married William Bramley.

Finally William Murray at whose house William Day Leslie and Cecelia Stephenson had married in 1872, married William Day Leslie's sister, Mary Ann Leslie in Auckland in 1866, where he had a butcher shop on the corner of Queen and Wellesley Streets. William Murray was a member of the Scottish family Murray of Mastrick.
