OPENING OF THE LESLIE LOG HOUSE

The Dedication of the Leslie Log house in Mississauga went well, in spite of the constant downpour. Someone said that it was Scottish weather; I corrected them that it was spring weather in Ontario, and April showers (in May this year) bring May flowers. The log house was moved about 6 miles from its original location into a very stylish residential area. A little bird told me that it cost about half a million dollars to move it and rebuild it to modern building requirements while saving the original logs, floors and windows and doors.

The event was attended by City of Mississauga officials and those most responsible for initiating and completing the project. Anne Byard and her husband Malcolm, President of the Streetsville Historical Society, deserve a lot of credit for saving the Log House and initiating the project.

Leslies were there. I met and talked to many of the people associated with The Leslie Log House. It is now a part of the Mississauga Museum and has full time staff. It has a climate controlled storage room for some of their valuable old documents, including the original deed for the Leslie property and all of Harold Leslie's wealth of research. Harold Leslie has spent years and countless hours on his family research, in Ontario and in the family homelands in Sutherlandshire in Scotland. The Log House now has the entire history of this Leslie family back to their beginning in Scotland thanks to Harold and Val. John and Esther Leslie and their seven sons arrived by sailing ship, river boat, canal boat and ox cart in 1824. One of those sons, George Leslie became famous in Toronto as a Tree Nursery operator, a City Councillor and influenced his friend Alexander Muir to write the "Maple Leaf Forever" which became Canada's unofficial national anthem in 1867.

The Clan Leslie Society International which has a program of recognizing organizations that protect and preserve Leslie historical sites and raise awareness of the Leslie family name and history, presented the Bennachie Award.

The plaque, designed by Laura Messing of the CLSI Council, was presented by William Leslie, Commissioner of Clan Leslie, North America. It was well received by the politicians and the many people responsible for completing the Leslie Log House. The plaque will be placed over the mantle of the rebuilt fireplace. They were all very grateful and were interested in the fact that this award has been presented to only two Leslie Castles in Scotland and one in Ireland and now to their Leslie Log House.

Joanne Doucette from Leslieville in Toronto who has written articles for our Grip Fast about George Leslie, one of the sons of the Leslies of Streetsville, was also there. Joanne has just finished her book, after 12 years of research, on the history of Leslieville. It includes the history of George Leslie of Toronto. A copy of Joanne's book, Pigs, Flowers and Bricks, A History of Leslieville to 1920, will be sent to the Clan Leslie Collection at the University of Guelph Library.

Loren with her handicap attained a blue belt in Karate, a level 12 in life guard training, even knowing that she could never be a life guard. Loren would mentor kids online from all over North America. I received messages after her death, about certain kids who had been contemplating suicide; she would stay with them online and talk them out of their situation. We never knew why she did not get enough sleep and she would not tell anyone that she was saving lives during the night. She would say that she just could not sleep. Loren is still making so many changes in our lives. Loren was very guiet, but listened very loud. She was taken from us, murdered by a 20 year old in 2010. We may never know why. We are starting the LOREN DONN LESLIE FOUNDATION. It should be incorporated any day and I will definitely be in touch.

FIRST LETTER TO THE CLAN LESLIE FROM THE FIRST COMMISSIONER, ALEC KLIEFORTH

I have transcribed this letter to the best of my ability. The original was prepared on a typewriter, and as a result there was no italics type font. The correct method of indicating italics was to underline (underscore). I have maintained this as per the original.

As most of you know, Alexander Leslie Klieforth (Alec) was appointed as the Commissioner of the Clan Leslie by the Earl of Rothes even while Alexander was still a diplomat in the American Embassy in Bonn, Germany. Alec published this letter in the first issue of the *American Clan Leslie Society Journal* in the autumn, 1978. Alec explains his hopes for our Society, and some of the reasons behind the drive to form such a society. His vision should still be a guide of each of us.

Letter by Alexander Klieforth

It is a year since I sent out the first circular letters soliciting interest in the formation of a Leslie association in America. Now the ACLS is founded and we are off to a modest start, having reached the minimum (30 duespaying members) advisors from other clan associations said was necessary to get under way. It would not have been possible to reach this point without the unflagging help of our associate member, Ruth Christ, working as <u>de facto</u> secretary from first exploration of the possibility of a Society with our Chief more than two years ago to the present. She and other friends have contributed their time and know-how. I could not have

gotten things under way without their help, especially that of Miss Christ, so that it is proper that I begin my first report to the members by thanking them.

The Earl of Rothes heartily endorsed the formation of the ACLS, is genuinely pleased to be our Chief and giving it all the support he can. However as pointed out in earlier communications, the Leslies have not been a close-knit a family as others in Scotland, particularly in the Western Highlands and the islands. Consequently unlike the case of some of the great Highland Clans, the Leslies have not had an organization in Scotland to serve as a launching platform for overseas activity. While our Chief is organizing the Leslie Council on a more structured basis, it will take some time before it can backstop the ACLS, in a more formal way. Nevertheless he believed that the sooner we got started with the American organization the better, particularly given the fact that Leslies in America are scattered all over the country and it usually takes several years for an association such as ours to take form and substance. Subsequently the Earl in a letter of appointment naming me his representative, asked me to organize and bring the ACLS into being, and serve as Commissioner for the United States.

Although fully occupied with my present duties, I agreed because of my belief in the worth of an organization such as ours hopefully will become, particularly in view of the fact that so many young people are in search of identity and something familial, they can relate to and associate with. The "desire to belong" has misled many young people at home and abroad to join some rather bizarre outfits. Others find what they look for in organizations of good purpose and the growing participation of young Americans of Scottish ancestry is wonderful evidence of this. The Leslies are one of the oldest families in Scotland, with an illustrious history every Leslie should be proud of. It is worthwhile, therefore, that we gather together in kinship not only because of our own interests but also in terms of heritage for younger Leslies.

So we got started and while at this point very small, the ACLS is a <u>bona</u> fi<u>de</u> organization, a full member of the growing community of American Scottish organizations and ready to participate with them in matters of common interest. It is in this spirit that the ACLS has become a member of the Council of Scottish Clan Associations.

So, where do we go from here? The first goal is to grow, which we can only do by bringing in new members. Enclosed with this issue of the ACLS <u>Journal</u> is a fact sheet which you are invited to use in helping to recruit. Those of you who have reproduction facilities are free to reproduce the fact sheet and send it to anyone you know of who is interested and qualified to join. As soon as we have sufficient members clustered in one state or adjoining states, such members will be informed by a regional ACLS representative and encouraged to meet and start activities together. By then we should have our "rump organization" formed from among those members who have volunteered to be active. This "rump organization" will also serve as a council to assist in getting the ACLS though its next phase of organization, which is to get under way until a slate of officers headed by a Chieftain, has been elected and can functionally take over management of our Society. We hope we will have had several regional gatherings as a prelude to our first national gathering attended by our Chief.

In the meantime, the <u>Journal</u> is to serve the membership as a means of information dissemination and interchange as well as communication from the Chief and myself. By late winter I hope to have the first issue of <u>The Griffin</u> out to you, its elegance (or lack of it) dependent on the state of our finances. I will be glad to correspond with any of your directly, and solicit your contributions to the Journal.

What can members expect in the future? The ACLS aspires to serve as the central clearing-house in the United States for information about the Leslies. In due course we should be able to provide genealogical information, maintain a reference library of material about the Leslies, and serve as a point of contact with other clan associations; later there could be a charter flight to Scotland for a tour of the old Leslie Castles (houses) and meetings with members of the Leslie Council. There can be regional and national Gatherings with festive trimming, such as a ceilidh, pipe performances and the other activities which are so pleasant for Scots. There will be official Leslie participation at Highland Games. In this context, any ACLS member who attends any Games is encouraged to show the Leslie tartan and promote the Society.

We have made a beginning. Let us now build. "Grip fast."

TENT HOSTING AND MEMBERSHIP RECRUITING

A Convenor is a volunteer position appointed by the Chieftain. Other clan societies may title them "Commissioners" or "Tent Captains." Convenors and Tent Hosts are charged as follows:

"They shall promote the objectives of the Society as set forth in its constitution and bylaws. They shall be residents of the area (i.e. region or state) for which they are appointed." The purpose of a Convenor/Tent Host is to call the members of our Society together. This can be done in several ways, and can be as extensive as you want it to be. Another important purpose is to grow the membership by retaining existing members and recruiting new members. The following are suggestions to help accomplish these purposes.

- **1. Be Energetic:** Host a CLSI tent at Scottish festivals. Hand out materials that inform prospective members about our Society and our history. Have appropriate handout materials that provide information on the septs. Be prepared to explain what a "sept" is. Have images of several of the Leslie castles. Prepare a new member's packet. Join your local Scottish societies and attend the St. Andrews and Robert Burns dinners. Get to know the Convenors, Tent Captains, etc. of other clan societies. They can refer Leslie, Abernathys, Laings, Moores and Cairneys to you.
- **2. Bond People Together**: Maintain and strengthen the bonds between our members during the times between festivals. That steady dialog is crucial to retention and growing our society. Perhaps organize a Ceilidh, a picnic, a potluck dinner of just gather local members at a restaurant. Give your existing members the incentive to renew year after year.
- **3. Be Welcoming:** Set up your tent so that people come in. Move the table with your materials to the <u>back</u> of the tent. The "Scotland of Old" (Clan Names Map) by Bartholomew showing the lands, the arms and the crests draws attention. Display your literature, the *Grip Fast* book by Alexander Leslie Klieforth. Offer a chair and some refreshment (bottled water, soda or something to eat). Supply a pen and an application form. Offer a free CLSI patch or pin for those joining at the games. If they don't join at the festival, be sure to get their name, addresses (postal and email), and telephone number. Then about two or three days after the event, follow up with an email, a CLSI postcard or a telephone call.
- **4. Recruit Shamelessly**: You must get out there and get people into your tent by any means necessary. Be resourceful and innovative!
- **5.** Request/Require Involvement: It is flattering to other CLSI members to be asked to help. Your job will be a lot easier if you get people to help you. By working together, you get to know each other better and you will gain new ideas from the members.
- **6. Provide Value:** People want to know what they get from their membership fee. Have samples of our *Grip Fast Online* newsletter and our *Grip Fast Journal of The Clan Leslie Society International.*

- **7. Be a Family:** Newsletters, e-groups, phone calls all work to grow and maintain the family bonds. Help each other. Announce and celebrate births, marriages, promotions, graduations, etc. and share in the concern and sorrow of a serious illness, injury or the passing of family members. Communication is the main ingredient. Stay in contact with the members.
- **8. Become Informed About Scotland:** There are several publications that you can subscribe to for a reasonable cost. *The Highlander* (The Magazine of Scottish Heritage) is an excellent and interesting source of information about the history, people and events in Scotland and Scots around the world. In addition, it lists most of the scheduled games and festivals about four months in advance. *The Highlander* is published seven times a year and a U.S. subscription is about \$31. Their website for subscriptions is www.highlandermagazine.com Another excellent magazine is *Scottish Life*, published quarterly. It is oriented toward travel in Scotland, with excellent articles and photos of current and coming events in Scotland. Excellent for travel planning! It also has an extensive calendar of events in North America and Scotland. You can visit their website at www.ScottishLifeMagazine.com
- **9. Communicate:** Keep in contact with the members in your region or branch. Also, keep the Secretary/Registrar informed if anyone has a new address (postal or email), or if a member has passed away. Pass on news of births, marriages, deaths or other significant events to the Publications Editor. Send photos and a write-up of your participation in festivals, games, Burns Nights, etc. to the Publications Editor. Include the name of every member that attended. People love to read about themselves!
- **10. Delegate:** As a Convenor, Branch President or Tent Host, you cannot do it all. You cannot attend every Scottish festival in your region or branch. Identify your markets (where the most Leslies, Abernathys, Laings, Moores and Cairneys are located and where Scottish festivals are held). Teach and recruit other members in your region to be Tent Hosts/Captains in those likely markets.

HARLAW HISTORY AND LESLIE CASTLES

THE DISTRICT OF THE GARIOCH

The Garioch is a fertile district in Aberdeenshire of which the principal town is Inverurie, situated on a point of land between the rivers Urie and Don, about fifteen miles north-west from Aberdeen. It is bounded on the south by the river Don, which separates it from the district of Mar: and the east and north by Fortmartine, and the hills of Foundland: and on the west by the river Bogie. It is watered by the rivers Don, Urie, and Gadie, and is overlooked by the beautiful conical hill of Bennachie, which lies in the parishes of Oyne, Premnay, and Chapel of Garioch.

About a mile to the east of the parish church is the battlefield of Harlaw, fought 24th July 1411, between the Royal forces under Alexander Stewart, Earl of Mar, Sir Andrew Leslie, third Baron of Balquhain, who commanded the horse, Sir Alexander Irvine of Drum, and other distinguished leaders, and 10,000 Highlanders, who lost the chiefs of Maclean and Macintosh, and 900 men. On the Royal side the loss was also great, including Sir Andrew Irvine of Drum, Provost Davidson of Aberdeen, and no less than six sons of Sir Andrew Leslie, third Baron of Balquhain. A cross was erected on the place where the Leslies fell, and was called Leslie's Cross from this circumstance.

A BILL TO OBSERVE NATIONAL SCOTS, SCOTS-IRISH HERITAGE MONTH

A bill has been introduced in the House by Representative Larry Kissell of District 8, North Carolina, to designate May as the National Scots, Scots-Irish Heritage Month. This is House Resolution 238. This appears to be supportive of our efforts to "promote, foster and preserve" our history.

Text of H. Res. 238:

Urging the people of the United States to observe National Scots, Scots-Irish Heritage Month

May 2, 2011 - Introduced in House. This is the original text of the bill as it was written by its sponsor and submitted to the House for consideration. This is the latest version of the bill currently available on GovTrack. 112th CONGRESS, 1st Session

H. RES. 238. Urging the people of the United States to observe National Scots, Scots-Irish Heritage Month. IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES May 2, 2011

Mr. KISSELL submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform

RESOLUTION. Urging the people of the United States to observe National Scots, Scots-Irish Heritage Month. Whereas the Scottish and Scots-Irish people were among the first to explore North America;

Whereas the contributions of the Scottish and Scots-Irish people have played a vital role in the development of

industry, education, medicine, government, and the military in the United States; Whereas many Scottish and Scots-Irish people immigrated to the 13 American colonies as indentured servants

working to gain their freedom;

Whereas the Declaration of Arbroath, in which Scotland declared its independence from England, was a precursor of the Declaration of Independence of the United States;

Whereas almost half of the signers of the Declaration of Independence of the United States and a significant number of the governors of the 13 American colonies were of Scottish descent;

Whereas there are many Scottish Highland games and festivals that take place throughout the United States, celebrating all aspects of Scottish and Scots-Irish culture, history, and heritage while educating the general public on such culture, history, and heritage;

Whereas more than 27,000,000 Americans can trace their ancestry to Scotland and Northern Ireland;

Whereas many Scottish and Scots-Irish societies, clans, and organizations, along with various State and local governments, recognize April as National Scots, Scots-Irish Heritage Month; and

Whereas the Scottish and Scots-Irish people have been a part of the governmental institutions of the United States since the inception of the United States: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved. That the House of Representatives urges the people of the United States to observe National Scots. Scots-Irish Heritage Month.


CLAN LESLIE SOCIETY INTERNATIONAL – SCHOLARSHIPS
