We give a welcome back to Barrie who has just returned home from hospital, after a rather lengthy stay in rehab, following his back operation. So just stick with it Barrie "times heals all".

I also had the pleasure of meeting our Membership Secretary Mal Leslie and his wife Colleen, who came to a Celtic Festival at Ormiston House on Sunday 29th of June 2012. They came from Toowoomba and Mal and I represented Clan Leslie and tried to meet as many people as possible, I also introduced Mal to Kathleen Procter-Moore, our Clan Patron, who was singing on the day. Ormiston House has a long Scottish Heritage. We give a warm welcome to our new member, Greg Leslie of Engadine in NSW. Greg's ancestors trace back to County Derry, Ireland.

Signalman Patrick Leslie 31842 2NZEF.

Signalman Patrick Leslie was born on the 14th October 1912 at Okahukura, Kaipara, North Auckland, New Zealand, as Patrick Perekara but decided to take the name of Leslie, owing to his closeness to Andrew John (Jack) Leslie and Andrews wife Mary Edith Leslie, nee Hall, as when he was 12 he started to work on the Leslie farm and was treated as one of the family and when he joined the 2NZEF in 1940, he put as his next of kin, Mrs Mary Edith Leslie, RD. Kaiwaka New Zealand. Patrick joined the Divisional Signals and departed New Zealand on board the "Orcades" for Egypt.

Patrick served in the Greek, Crete and North African campaigns and was captured at "Sidi Rezegh" in Libya and spent the rest of the war in POW Camps in Italy, Germany and Czechoslavakia until liberated by the Americans 1st May 1945 and received his discharge 22nd June 1946. While travelling around Britain he met his wife and after a six week courtship they were married. They returned to New Zealand and Mrs Mary Edith Leslie who had saved the allowances made to her by the New Zealand Army gave them

back to Patrick and with the gratuity made to returning servicemen and the savings of his wife, bought 142 acres of scrubland and made them into a dairy farm on which they lived for 32 years. Patrick eventually received a full war pension but the years in POW camps took their toll and he suffered very bad memories. He work very hard but eventually sold the farm but kept 50 acres on which he raised Hereford cattle and bought a house in Kamo, Northland.

Patrick Leslie died at Whangarei, 20th October 2000, soon after his 88th birthday and is buried in the Maunu Cemetery Whangarei New Zealand Grave reference RSA Block 17, Plot 1231.

DEATH OF THE 16TH EARL OF LEVEN AND MELVILLE.

Alexander Robert Leslie-Melville was born 13th May 1924, the eldest of twin boys to Archibald Alexander Leslie-Melville 15th Earl of Leven and Lady Rosamond Sylvia Diana Mary Foljambe and he married Susan Steuart-Menzies, daughter of Lt-Col Ronald Steuart-Menzies and Sybil Mary Willoughby Boulton on 30th April 1953.

He was educated at Eton College Windsor Berkshire England and joined the Coldstream Guards when he left school in 1942 where fighting in World War II, he gained the rank of Captain. He succeeded to the title of 13th Lord Raith,

Moneymail and Balwearie on the 15th January 1947.He succeeded to the title of 16th Lord Balgonie [created 1641] on 15th January 1947. He then succeeded to the title of 13th Earl of Melville [created 1690] on the 15th January 1947. He succeeded to the title 16th Earl of Leven[created] on the 15th January 1947. He succeeded to many other titles but we need not go into them at the moment.

He had a 10 year Army career and saw action in Normandy where he was injured in the leg, when struck by shrapnel and was evacuated from France to Raigmore Hospital Inverness Scotland which was just a few miles from his family home at Glenferness House. After he recovered his fitness he returned to duty in Germany and Tripoli.

Of interest to New Zealanders is that between 1951 and 1952 the 16th Earl of Leven was appointed as the aide-de-camp to Lt Gen Bernard Cyril Freyberg, 1st Baron Freyberg, VC. GCMG. KCB, KBE, DSO and three bars, 7th Governor General of New Zealand from 17th June 1946 to 15th August 1952. Although born in Richmond London in 21st March 1889 and dying in Windsor Berkshire United Kingdom 4 July 1963, he had emigrated with his parents to New Zealand when he was 2 years of age. During the Second World War he commanded the New Zealand Expeditionary Force in the Battles of Crete, the North African Campaign and the Italian Campaign. In late 1914 records exist of him in San Francisco and Mexico, reportedly under Pancho Villa but upon hearing of the outbreak of World War I he crossed to Britain and met Winston Churchill, then First Lord of the Admiralty and persuaded him to grant him a Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve

Commission in the Hood Battalion of the newly constituted Royal Naval Division. In 1915 Freyberg became involved in the Dardanelles Campaign. During the initial landings by Allied troops following the unsuccessful attempt to force the straits by sea, Freyberg swam ashore in the Gulf of Saros. Once ashore he began lighting flares so as to distract the defending Turkish Forces from the real landings taking place at Gallipoli. Despite coming under heavy Turkish fire he returned safely from this outing and for this action he received the Distinguished. He received serious wounds on several occasions and left the peninsular when his division was evacuated in 1916.

After the 16th Earl of Leven left the Army in 1952 he set about implementing his father's plans to plant more trees on the estate and improve the fishing on the River Findhorn, which runs through the estate. One of his roles was the Lord Lieutenant of Nairn, which he held for 30 years, between 1969 and 1999 and he held the Office of the Chairman of the Nairn County Council between 1970 and 1974.

He is survived by his second son Alexander who will now inherit the Earldom. His eldest son David Alexander Leslie-Melville [Lord Balgonie] died in an avalanche near Verbier in Switzerland on 14 Feb 2007, which was featured in the CLANZ newsletter in April, May, June 2007

ORMISTON HOUSE 277 Wellington St Ormiston. Queensland.

Ormiston House was built between 1858 and 1865 for Captain Louis Hope who was born on the 29th October 1817 and was the 7th son of the 4th Earl of Hopetown. He arrived in New South Wales in 1843 and moved to Brisbane in 1848. In 1859 he married Susan Dumaresq and had 3 sons and 5 daughters. In 1842 he became a member of the new Queensland Legislative Council and in 1882 he returned to England and died in Switzerland in 1894.

Ormiston House was built on a 325 acre property that was the home of the Australian sugar industry pioneer Captain Louis Hope and his family and is regarded as one of the finest examples of colonial architecture in Queensland and has been a museum since the mid 1960s.

REPORT ON HEALTH PROBLEMS OF BARRIE LESLIE.

I have to report that on Sunday 4^{th} March 2012 I was admitted to Dalcross Hospital at Killara, Sydney, NSW, for an operation the next day to fuse the L3, L4, L5 and the S1 vertebrae in my back. The operation took in excess of 12 hours and apparently after 2 days I had to go back for another 2 hours of surgery for a blood clot and a haematoma next to my spine. I was apparently a "difficult" patient and spent the next 7 days in the intensive care ward. I was then transferred to Mt Wilgar Rehabilitation Hospital at Hornsby in Hornsby, Sydney. After 2 days I was transferred back to Dalcross Hospital as I had become ill, but no reason could be found and I was sent back to Mt Wilgar. As I should have been exercising from day 1, my muscles had become "wasted" and I was very weak and could not walk.

I spent 1 month at Mt Wilga before being sent home. I am undergoing daily physio treatment and am finding it very hard to sit and work at the computer, or do anything at all, although in the last couple of days I have been able to get around a bit better, The surgeon examined me last week and said that it will take up to six months for me to get to a reasonable recovery. Something to look forward to. I would not recommend to anyone to spend two months in hospital. The food is better at home.

Then awa again across the waves, on Anzio's beaches he lay. The din the chaos the stink he'd never forget that day, His webbing was a' soakin', his rifle foo o' sand, twas thoughts o' Buchan that forced him to keep goin'. He looked at me an' said "I dinna ken if I should brik my rule". In 1889 the railway line was built from Brisbane to Cleveland and passed through Wellington Point, which led to greater use of Wellington Point, although this line was closed in 1960, due to lack of use, the Wellington Point Railway Station was re-opened in 1988.

FAREWELL:- MARGARET DODGSON.

On the 19th October 2011, noted Queenslander Patricia Margaret Dodgson died peacefully at home, aged 81.

Margaret Dodgson first contacted me, late in 2010 and asked me if I could help her trace which family of Leslie, she was descended from. I was only too happy to help and she told me that she was descended from a William Leslie and Mary Duff, of Wilcroft House, Parish of Lugwardine, Herefordshire, England. This William Leslie had applied for the registration of a Grant of Arms to his only child, Mary Leslie [Duff]. These arms immediately showed the characteristic Leslie three buckled belt.

This of course was not Scotland, so the immediate difficulty was tracing where in Scotland her family came from. Margaret had lots of paperwork which enabled me to deduce that the Leslie family was the Rothes Leslie's, but not much else.

Margaret was very proud of her ancestors, which include, the Rev Charles Lutwidge Dodgson, better known as Lewis Carroll, the author of many children's stories, among which is "Alice in Wonderland".

Charles Dodgson was born on the 27 January 1832 in Daresbury, Halton, Cheshire, England, to the Rev Dodgson, later Archdeacon of Richmond, and his mother was Frances Jane Lutwidge.

Charles Dodgson [Lewis Carroll] died on the 14 January 1898 at Guildford, Surrey, England.

Another ancestor that Margaret was very proud off, was Archdeacon Alfred Teed Puddicombe. Alfred Teed Puddicombe was born on the 31 January 1838 and was christened at St Mary Marylebone London, England on the 21 June 1838. The Rev Alfred Teed Puddicombe was Rector at the Anglican Church at Moruya in NSW from 1866 to 1871 and was then Assistant Minister at St Saviour's Cathedral at Goulburn in NSW from

1874. He was made Archdeacon and then Canon at St Saviours Cathedral. He remained at St Saviours at Goulburn for almost 25 years.

He retired from his duties at St Saviours Cathedral in 1894, announcing that his poor health required him to resign his position, but there was events that were happening in the background and were reported in the Sydney Morning Herald, Thursday 26 March 1896.

He moved back to England and was working at the church at Morwenstow, North Cornwall and his death was reported on Monday 20 June 1904, as falling from a cliff.

I asked our Chieftain, George Leslie to contact Margaret and see how we could help her. She gave George a collection of material which included all the above photographs and many more items. George has contacted The Hon Alex Leslie to see if these items could be held by the Clan Leslie Charitable Trust, as they certainly deserve conserving.

I was able to find only one photograph of Wilcroft house at Wilcroft of Lugwardine Herefordshire which I presume is the original Wilcroft House of William Leslie and his daughter Mary.

From some of the items that Margaret sent me, I was able to discover that her Leslie family was The Leslie's of Burdsbank who were descended from George Leslie 2nd son of Robert Leslie, 1st Laird of Findrassie who was the son of George Leslie 4th Earl of Rothes and his second marriage to Margaret Crichton. Robert Leslie 1st Laird of Findrassie's second son George, became the 1st Goodman of Burdsbank who married Margaret Stirling of Craigborned. Their son William married Helen Munro of Miltoun and became the 2nd Goodman of Burdsbank and their son George became the 3rd Goodman of Burdsbank who married Christian Baird, daughter of Sir James Baird of Auchmedan and had issue, but there was no further trace of this family since approx. 1660. As can be seen Margaret had great pride in her Leslie family.

When she died George Presley Leslie, the Chieftain of Clan Leslie Society of Australia and New Zealand, represented us at her funeral service, which was held at the Brookfield Hall Brookfield, Queensland at 2-00pm on Thursday 27 October 2011. About 100 people were expected to attend, but about 1400 people attended, such was the popularity of Patricia Margaret Dodgson.
