For those of you who enjoy the arts, go to **the Fringe (pictured above)**. The Edinburgh Festival Fringe is the largest arts festival in the world and runs through the entire month of August. In 2018 it spanned 25 days and featured more than 55,000 performances of 3,548 different shows in 317 venues. Book your tickets early! Combine several days for the shows and an evening enjoying the Tattoo, and you will have a trip of a lifetime.

Many of you have told me that you'd like to visit Scotland. I'll stress that you start your planning early. Contact me if you have any questions or travel concerns, how to dress for the Gathering events, what sites to see, or what tours to take. I'm always glad to assist with information and suggestions.

A loving father, grandfather, and great-grandfather, Marvin Alfred Smith, 75, passed away on Thursday, June 20, 2019, in Lubbock, Texas.

On February 28, 1944, Marvin was born in Kingfisher, OK and adopted by Willie Lockhart Smith and Thelma Lynn Berryman. He joined the US Air Force in February 1962 and was stationed in Alaska, working the flight line on a base in the Aleutian Islands until 1966. After his honorable discharge he moved to Fresno, California and started work at Pacific Gas and

Electric. Marvin received an accounting degree from Fresno City College.

Marvin met Jan through work and they were married on July 16, 1983. He worked in various field locations and San Francisco as an accountant. Marvin retired from PGE after thirty years. In 2006, he and his wife Jan moved to Roswell. Marvin loved Harley Davidson motorcycles and the Dallas Cowboys. Every holiday season he helped with Toys for Tots.

Marvin was a member of Chaves County Veterans, Elks Lodge, American Legion, Clan Macpherson Association and the Harley Davidson Group.

Loch Arkaig Gold

The Jacobite rebellion, or the war of the British succession, was a series of uprisings, rebellions and in Great Britain wars and Ireland between 1688-1746.

Jacobites were followers of the exiled branch of the House of Stuart who sought Scottish thrones after the Glorious Revolution of 1698. They take the name from the Latin form (Jacobus) of the names James.

In 1745 Bonnie Prince Charles landed in Scotland to reclaim the British throne for his father. In the beginning he was very successful; however, the British forces crushed this rebellion and regained full control over Scotland after the Battle of Culloden. Thousands of (mostly Scottish Highlanders) were killed.

Charles spent five months as a fugitive in the Western Highlands. Charles was supported by France, but limited financial support was supplied by both Spain and the Pope. However, getting this gold to the rebel army was the difficulty.

The first installment was dispatched in 1745 and a French sloop successfully landed its monies on the west coast of Scotland. Unfortunately for the Jacobites, the riches were captured by Clan Mackay, who were loyal to King George.

In April of 1746 another Spanish installment, plus a large French supplement, arrived on the ships Mars and Bellona. Seven caskets of gold arrived, but one was stolen by McDonald of Barrisdale, s men. As the Jacobite cause was by then lost, with the army scattered and the Prince and his Lieutenants in hiding, the gold was to be used to assist the Jacobite clansmen and to facilitate the escape of leading Jacobites to the continent. Six caskets were brought to Loch Arkaig (just north of Fort William) and hidden. The secret was entrusted to **Murray of Broughton (pictured right)** and when he was apprehended, the treasure was entrusted first to Lionel, Chief of the Clan Cameron, then to Macpherson of Cluny of Clan Macpherson.

He was able to escape capture by government troops for 9 years even though a large reward was offered for his capture. **(Next page) A solid silver candelabra in the Clan Macpherson Museum portrays a British Officer searching for Cluny.** He offers a shilling for information. The servant is Cluny.





Cluny escaped to France in 1755. Charles briefly joined him there. Cluny had control of the gold which was still hidden in Arkaig.

Charles escaped Scotland on a French ship and arrived back in France in September of 1746. However, the fate of the gold is not clear. Cluny is believed to have retained control of it, and during his long years as a fugitive was the center of various futile plots to finance other uprisings. He remained in hiding in his "Highland cage" for the next 8 years. Meanwhile, a cash strapped Charles was constantly looking for his gold and at least some of it came to him later. However, it is said that all of the gold never was recovered. Charles, years later, accused Cluny of embezzlement. Whatever the case, the gold became a source of discord and grievance among the surviving Jacobites.

In June of 1753 the last Jacobite to be executed (Archibald Cameron) was hanged. The trail then goes cold. However, the Stuart's papers (now in the possession of Queen Elizabeth II) record a host of claims, counter-claims and accusations among the Highland Chiefs and Jacobites in exile, as does the fate of the gold. Some French coins were found buried in a nearby woods in the 1850's. Only one leather bag of gold coins has ever been recovered and the gold is still out there, worth in excess of ten million pounds.

The Arkaig treasure is featured in Nigel Tranter's historical fiction novel "Gold for Prince Charles".

Cluny Castle, about five miles southwest of Newtonmore in Badenoch, is a stronghold of the clan. The original castle dated from the 14th century, but was razed by the Duke of Cumberland after the Jacobite Rising of 1745 which the Macphersons had supported. **(Right) The present Cluny Castle is in fact the 19th century mansion that was built on the site of the original stronghold.**



Originally I saw a program on television about the lost treasure. As I was a member of Clan Macpherson, I received *The Urlar* and didn't remember ever seeing anything about this in the Journal, so wrote the Editor on same. His reply was if I wanted to do the research, write the article and submit it, he would publish it - so here it is. Most of the information I got off the internet. I am very proud to be a member of Clan Macpherson and hope you enjoy this bit of history.

Greetings everyone:

Where has 2019 gone? School has already started for another year, and Fall weather will soon be upon us. Fall is a beautiful season with the tree leaves changing from green to orange, yellow and red.

In school, we have music in various ways, such as Orchestra, Band and Choir. In Scotland, they have a place that's ringing with music. Let's read on...

Fingal's Cave

Staffa is an uninhabited island of the Inner Hebrides. They say the place called Fingal's Cave looks like it is man-made and something to be seen only in dreams. However, it is a real place made by completely natural processes.

The name is linked with ancient Scottish and Irish lore. If you remember, we discussed the Scottish poet and historian James Macpherson. In "Ossian", his collection of epic poems had mentioned a giant named Finn mac Cumhaill or Fingal. The sea cave was named after this giant.

A lot of famous people have visited this spot. Felix Mendelssohn visited the cave and it inspired him to compose "The Outer Hebrides, Op. 26, or Fingal's Cave Overture." This aided in other famous people visiting and also being inspired, such as: author Jules Verne, poets John Keats, William Wordsworth and Alfred Lord Tennyson, romantic artist J. M. W. Turner, playwright August Strindberg, prolific Scottish writer Sir Walter Scott, Queen Victoria, artist Matthew Barney and Pink Floyd.

It was part of the Ulva estate of the Clan MacQuarrie until 1777. Sir Joseph Banks, who was an 18th Century naturalist, brought it to the attention of the world in 1772.

What is Fingal's Cave? **(Left)** It is a sea cave comprised of multiple basalt columns, joined in hexagonal shapes. Some refer to them as looking like saluting soldiers. When first



looking at it, it has a large arched opening.

The defining characteristic of Fingal's Cave is that it has incredible natural acoustics. The naturally formed roof with the unique motion of the ocean makes the waves sound like they are singing. They sing in hypnotic melodic keys, and often compared to the sounds you would hear throughout a cathedral.

If you wish to see the caves, there are several sightseeing cruises that can be taken by local businesses. They pass the entrance to the cave from April to September. It is my understanding, that some of these cruises will allow the boat to stop at the island's landing place in calm conditions. People can walk the short distance to the cave. **(Right) There is a place where a row of fractured columns forms a walkway just above high-water level permitting exploration on foot.**



That concludes our story about the Fingal's cave. In the Fall season, we enjoy the holiday of Halloween. Yes, a time for dressing up for Trick or Treat, and

also a great time to read and/or watch movies about Frankenstein, vampires and werewolves. Did you know that not all werewolves are mean or evil? Let's move on to our next story which is about the kindhearted Shetland werewolf.

Wulver – The Kindhearted Shetland Werewolf

As stated earlier, most people consider the werewolf to be evil. Those who want to terrify people and/or make them become werewolves too. The "Wulver" is actually a kindhearted and generous werewolf. He is known to help some of the most unfortunate people in the country.

The Wulver come from the Shetland Island which is north of the Scottish mainland. **(Right) He has a man's body but the head of a wolf.** Wulver is covered in a layer of thick brown hair. What makes him different? He was never human. He was not human and turns into werewolf whenever there is a full moon. Ancient Celts believed that the Wulver actually evolved from wolves, and are symbolic of the in-between state of man and wolf.

There isn't much documentation that can be found of the Wulver. In fact, the last sighting was back in the early twentieth century. The Wulver was said to be living alone in a cave on Shetland and enjoying the peaceful life.

Wulver could be frequently spotted fishing for its daily meal from a rock dubbed "The Wulver's Stane". As long as people leave the Wulver alone, they will not pose any risk to humans. If he does intervene with humans, it is by his choice. When he



intervenes, it will be to perform generous and kindly acts.

The Wulver is known to help lost travelers by guiding them to nearby towns and villages. It is reported that they will leave fish on the windowsills of poor families. If a Wulver found out that a family was dealing with hardships and was without food, he will supply the family with a steady supply of fish. It has also been said that a family dealing with sickness and death, the Wulver can be seen mourning and paying his respects outside their homes.

There are some accounts that say the Wulver is an immortal spirit. None have been reported for more than 100 years. Some theories in modern times state a Wulver was someone suffering from “Hypertrichosis”. This is a condition in which the entire body is covered in hair. Another theory is that someone is suffering from the psychological condition of Lycanthropy”. This is where they believe they are a wolf or another animal. Do they exist? Whether they existed or not, the superstitions attached to the Wulver still remain to this time.

Sennachie's Scottish History

Willilam Wallace

In previous stories, I oft told of Robert The Bruce; this time I'm going to tell you about his contemporary, William Wallace. Most of you are familiar with the name, thanks to the motion picture "Braveheart". Surprisingly, prior to the movie, few had ever heard of this Scottish hero outside of Scotland. Even centuries old monuments to the man had been neglected so that even the Scots were beginning to forget him. By the point of view of a Sennachie, the film is embellished by much old Scottish lore and many modern fictitious plot elements.

(Such as the romantic liaison between Wallace and the wife of Edward II, **Isabella**, pictured right, daughter of Philip IV of France, born in 1295, who would have been about 3 at the time. She married Edward in 1308 when she was 13.) Let me tell you briefly what historians know.

William Wallace was born c. 1270, likely in Ayrshire. His father was Alan Wallace lesser son of a powerful family but not himself a noble. Alan was listed in rolls as a 'crown tenant' in Ayrshire. By today's standards – middle class. William is believed to have been well educated at the local abbey, as was



the way for boys of his social status. **(Left) He is always described as a large, powerful man of great height.** Some believe he may have served as an archer in Edward I's army in Wales where he received his military training. Again, a logical career choice for a boy of his class. However, this is speculation based on the bow on William Wallace's personal seal, which exists. It proves William was a bowman however. A true Scottish Robin Hood.

The first written records from Scotland relating his deeds was by "Blind Harry"(c. 1440-1492) an epic poem published by a noted bard of that era (c. 1470). (Note this was 172 years after Falkirk.) This bardic story, was how the history was transmitted in those days. In another early version of the tale we learn of "Marion Braidfoot", the wife whose murder spurs William to turn murderer and outlaw. Another variation has him siring a girl child by Marion. There are no actual contemporary records of her existence or a marriage or a child. Clearly the author of "Braveheart", Randall Wallace had researched the old tales in developing his story, but took plenty of liberties with history for sake of story.

Blind Harry says William's father was Sir Malcolm Wallace of Elderslie, this is now considered an invention. Some still hold to this old account, saying William was born in Elderslie in Renfrewshire. Evidence now indicates his father was Alan, second son of a minor noble family, of which William was a second son, as previously mentioned. Blind Harry also claimed Wallace was 7 feet tall. Modern

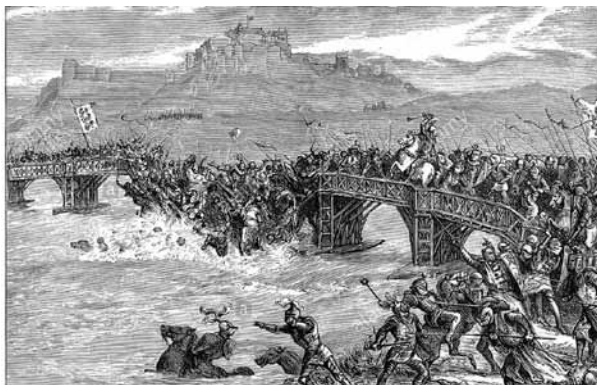


estimates say he may have been 6'6". Whether the old oral then bardic written tale is accurate is still open to debate. But what we know for sure is this.

Official records show he killed **William de Heselrig the English High Sheriff of Lanark (pictured left)** in May of 1297, and became an outlaw. Some say William was already on the wrong side of the law, already part of the growing rebellion. Rebellions were common in Scotland

during that period after the English occupation of Scotland following the death of King Alexander III in 1286. Wallace was soon leading a band of rebels who eventually linked up with William 'The Hardy', Lord of Douglas and Andrew Moray, the rebellious nobles', armies. Wallace became the top field commander of the army, and conducted several successful engagements with the English at Scone and Ancrum.

On 11 September 1297 the Scottish Army under Wallace and Andrew Moray met the English Army under John de Warenne, 6th Earl of Surry, at Sterling Bridge. In those days, the bridge was a wooden structure built on stone pylons, and was very narrow. The existing old stone bridge you see in pictures was built centuries later at a different location. Anyway, the Scots allowed about 1000 English cavalry and some infantry to cross before attacking suddenly. The English, caught on boggy ground, unable to maneuver and without further reinforcements, were slaughtered. **It is reported the bridge finally collapsed under the weight of retreating Englishmen (illustrated right).** Hugh Cressingham, Edward's High Treasurer for Scotland was killed at the battle and legend tells Wallace had a baldric for his sword made from Hugh's skin.



After the victory at Sterling, Wallace and Moray were made Guardians of Scotland. However, Andrew Moray died soon after from injuries suffered at the battle, leaving William Wallace as the sole Guardian. Wallace then led raids into Northumberland and Cumberland slaughtering numerous innocent English, and committing horrendous war crimes according to English chronicles. How much of the biased English reports of his barbarity were accurate or hyperbola we cannot tell. We can be certain that it was rather unpleasant for all who encountered the enraged Scots.

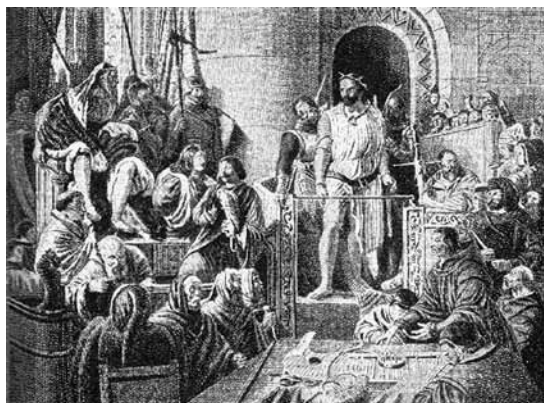
Upon his return to Scotland Wallace was knighted by the Scottish Earls in Selkirk. In April 1298, Edward I led the English Army north to re-capture Scotland. After a few months of cat and mouse campaigning, eventually they caught up with Wallace's Scottish Army at Falkirk on 22 July 1298.

The Scots, using the schiltrons Wallace is credited in developing, prepared for the usual cavalry charge for which the English were famous. But Edward had

brought thousands of Welsh archers, by which to overcome the emplaced Scots. This new tactic worked well and became the standard for the English army for the next hundred years. The Light Scottish cavalry retreated leaving the infantry to be slaughtered. Wallace escaped, but ten thousand Scots were killed.

Following the defeat, Wallace resigned the Guardianship to Robert The Bruce (Earl of Carrick) and John III Comyn (Lord of Badenoch). Shortly thereafter, Wallace traveled to Europe and engaged in diplomatic overtures to the French court and the Pope on behalf of Scotland. He is known to be in France in 1300 and believed to have returned to Scotland by 1304, where it is said he participated in the fighting at Haprew and Earnside.

Wallace was by this time, England's most wanted individual. He was betrayed by John de Menteith, a Scottish Knight, who William believed was loyal to Scotland, but was in fact a paid spy for Edward, "Hammer of the Scots". Wallace was captured on 5 August 1305 and taken to London, briefly imprisoned in The Tower, taken to Westminster Hall for trial (23 August 1305) and execution. **(Right) A depiction of his trial.** His defense was that



he was not a "traitor" since he never declared loyalty to Edward. This defense did not sway the English court and the verdict was swift and the sentence of death carried out immediately.

Even today, centuries later, his story inspires Scottish Nationalism and patriotism in native Scots as well as we dispersed descendants of Alba.

Regional Reports

Northeast Region

Greetings Cousins,

The Alleghany County Celtic Festival in Western New York is the first event for our Region on June 1. Graham and Debby Gillespie were the Conveners.

Next, June 15 was the Day of Scots located on the grounds of Fort Ticonderoga. This event honors the men of the 42nd Highland regiment (The Black Watch), who fought in the bloody battle to capture the fort from the French forces on July 8, 1758. The Black Watch was the only regiment to breach the defensive ditch-works, known as the "French Lines". The 42nd held their position but were recalled as the British decided to retreat, after six hours of fighting, 645 brave Scotsmen were either killed or wounded. Combined losses of the entire British force was estimated at 2,000. History has recorded that the defeat of the British in this battle was due to poor generalship on the part of their commanding general, James Abercrombie. He was a political appointment. His forces numbered close to 16,000 troops, as compared to the French, who had a mere 3,500 all totaled. His biggest mistake was to make a full frontal assault on the fort without the use of artillery. Order in the ranks broke to chaos, and panic set in and a mass retreat began. They dropped



everything and ran, leaving the dead where they fell. The true significance of this battle was the bravery of the Black Watch penetrating the French lines and holding their position. This they could do for only a short time, they needed support from the rest of the army who was too busy running from the field like a bunch of frightened birds.

The wreath laying ceremony is a solemn affair. It starts with Clans and spectators led by a

pipe band, this year it was the Plattsburg Police Pipe band, up the road about a mile in length to the stone cairn. The cairn contains stones from 36 districts in Scotland signifying that the Black Watch was made up with 36 different Clans. Clan MacPherson's stone came from the front garden of the MacPherson Clan Museum in Newtonmore. A second stone was collected from the top of Mt. Marcy, the highest peak in the New York State; 5,344 ft. This stone was contributed by C. Peter McPherson Fish, Keen, New York.

The Dundee Scottish Festival, July 13 at Dundee, New York with Graham and Debbie Gillespie and Ryan Smith as Conveners.

On July 20, Chuck Alsdorf and I filled in for Angus MacPherson at the Glasgow Lands Scottish Festival in Northhampton, Mass. at Look Park. This is a grand place to have a Scottish event. This park has open and wooded areas, babbling brooks, and covered bridges. The weather was very hot, temps. were approaching 100 degrees. I guess it was better than rain. We had many cousins and visitors at the tent. A very good turnout indeed.

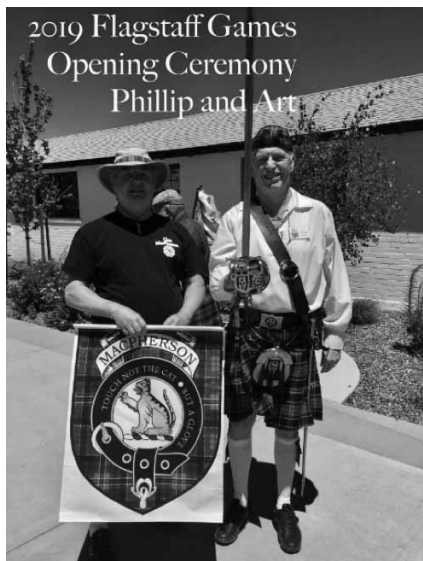
