The weekend of Feb 18-22 gave me the opportunity to meet Enoch Kent, one of Scotland's best known ballad singers. He has five cd's to his credit and at the tender age of 77, he tells me, "I am not through yet." Getting to meet Enoch face to face and visit with him over dinner and for scones and jam was a highlight of my week. He was

generous enough to give me all five of his cd's for taking him out to dinner the previous night and then sat down and recorded a few songs and stories on an inexpensive tape recorder.

His voice is strong without being overpowering and his distinctive style speaks to his native influ-

ence. He resides in Canada now but was raised in Glasgow. Andy Cohen, who he was staying with, told me that Enoch was simply brilliant in all of his 6 shows. I can personally vouch for only his first cd, on which I found several songs that touched me enough to listen to them numerous times trying

to pick up his nuances. If you haven't heard of him or his music, you have missed a real treat. Also, if you haven't ever been to one of these conferences and you are a music lover, it may be well worth your time effort to reserve the time for next year's event, which is held in Memphis annually. 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SCOTTISH CONNECTION

Here's a little known fact about Texas' Sam Houston, who as it turns out, has a **Scottish Connection**.

Exempted from Iain Lundy Scotland on Sunday, August 6, 2006:

He was one of the greatest military and political heroes in United States history, a founding father of modernday Texas after whom the fourth largest city in America is named.

On March 2 every year, Texans celebrate Sam Houston's birthday and Texas Independence Day in memory of the man whose vision and outlook shaped their start. But evidence recently come to light reveals that the greatest influence in Houston's life came not from his fellow Americans but from his Scottish ancestry and the works of Robert Burns.

He drew inspiration from one particular Burns poem, 'Epistle To A Young Friend', which he memorised as a child and referred to throughout

his life for guidance. In a letter to his teenage son, Sam Jr., Houston called the poem "one of the most salutary and safest guides I have met with in life" and "a beautiful emanation of heart and intellect."

Now, after years of gathering dust in the vaults of the Sam Houston Memorial Museum in Huntsville, Texas, the Burns poetry book which belonged to Houston's mother and which he read avidly, has been put on public display along with details of his Scottish heritage.

"That poem by Burns was really his lost polestar that guided him through life," said Texas-based author James L. Haley, who wrote a book on the life and career of Houston.

"There is one line in the poem about being lost in the tempest of life and he never lost sight of that image during his lifetime. He even signed an autographed book for a young cousin using that image...."

Houston, whose great grandfather had left the family home in Renfrewshire and settled in the New World via Ireland, went on to have eight children....

In a letter to his son, Sam Jr., Houston wrote, "I would commend to your particular attention a poem of Burns. It is his advice to a young friend Andrew. In my course of life I have found it one of the most salutary as well as one of the safest guides I have met with in life."

Burns wrote the poem in 1786 and sent it to Andrew Hunter Aiken, the son of a family friend, who he refers to as "Dear Andrew".

So, next time you're in Houston or you watch the Rockets, Astros, or Texans play, remember Sam Houston and his **Scottish Connection.**

The 2009 Immortal Memory

Many of our members fondly remember the presentation of the Immortal Memory at Burns' Nicht this January by Andrew and Angela Massengale, accompanied by Bill Fuller, the Director of Cantiamo!, a vocal ensemble. The Board has decided to honor both Andrew and Angela with an honorary membership and we hope to see them soon at some of our meetings! Andrew has many Scottish family ties, including, Massengale, Matheson, Gordon, Cooper, Anderson, and Murray while Angela has Mothershed on her side of the family tree.

The songs they sang that night were My Love Is Like a Red, Red, Rose, a choral arrangement by James Mulholland that Angela has had since her high school days at Hutchison, John Anderson My Jo from the Skene manuscript, Afton Water by Alexander Hume and A Highland Lad My Love Was Born. These are certainly four of Burn's well-known songs that we all know and love. Thank you for sharing these renditions with us. Below is biographical information from Drew and Angela.

Drew Massengale has lived in Memphis for seven years, during which time he has sung with the Memphis Chamber Choir and the Rhodes Mastersingers, among others. He has appeared in stage productions with such companies as Theatre Memphis, DeSoto Family Theatre, Little Theatre of Crittenden County, and Opera Memphis, and was a featured soloist for the Como Opera Guild's 2006-2007 Performing Artists Series.

A Music History student at the University of Memphis, Drew currently sings professionally with the St. Mary's Episcopal Cathedral Choir. He plans to continue his performance career through solo work as well as with his vocal ensemble, "Cantiamo!", and his improvisational theatre troupe, "Running Gag Improv."

Angela Garretson-Massengale has lived in Memphis most of her life, and is a graduate of the Hutchison School. A recipient of the prestigious Ocie Higgins Music Award, she studied piano performance at Mississippi University for Women under Kathy Anderson and James Allen before moving back to Memphis in 2001.

Angela has worked as an accompanist, orchestral pianist, and music/theater director at Bishop Byrne High School, Immaculate Conception Cathedral School, Threshold Theatre, and Playhouse on the Square. She also held the post of Interim Executive Producer of Memphis Theatre Project during their 2006-2007 season.

Angela is the owner of the Massengale Music Studio, which offers piano and voice classes to students of all ages, and is based out of the Yarbrough School of Music in Bartlett, TN. Currently working on a degree in History at the University of Memphis, Angela continues to perform as a singer alongside her husband with the St. Mary's Episcopal Cathedral Choir, and in the vocal ensemble group "Cantiamo!"




BBC to Record Six Hundred works of Robert Burns

The BBC has embarked on a three-year project to record more than six hundred works of Robert Burns. The project was launched on January 25, 2009, the 250th anniversary of Burn's birth.

"Burns still resonates hugely more than two centuries after he penned over 600 poems and songs, both here in Scotland and beyond," said the head of radio for BBC Scotland, Jeff Zycinski. (Wonder what clan THAT's a sept of?) "This project will ensure that his works are available to everyone for years to come."

Though prepared with posterity in mind, the archive has specific appeal for contemporary Burn's lovers: many of the voices featured in the archive are current celebrities, including First Minister Alex Salmond and actors Alan Cumming, Robert Carlyle, and Robbie Coltrane. Even the Prince of Wales is participating, having recited for the project "A Red, Red Rose" and "My Heart's in the Highlands", described as "two of his favorites".

The Scottish Text Society is a major publisher of important texts from Scotland's literary history. Since 1882 it has played a significant part in reviving interest in the literature and languages of Scotland. The Society's editions are both authoritative and accessible, meeting the highest standards of scholarship. To date, the Society has published some 150 volumes, covering poetry, drama, and prose, from the fourteenth to the nineteenth centuries. The majority of its editions are in the high period of Older Scots literature, from 1500 to 1700.

In 2008 the Society published the first modern edition of The Poems of Walter Kennedy, edited by Nicole Meier, and an authoritative new edition of Golagros and Gawane, edited by Ralph Hanna. It has also made available to members a DVD publication of The Chapman and Myllar *Prints*, to mark the 500th anniversary of printing in Scotland. Other editions currently available include reprints of the Society's editions of the two great epic poems of the wars of independence, Barbour's Bruce and Hary's Wallace; a new edition of Sir Gilbert Hay's *The Buke of the Law of Armys*; a revised edition of The Shorter Poems of Gavin Douglas; a new edition of the poetry of Scotland's greatest Renaissance poet, Alexander Montgomerie; and Sir David Hume's History of the House of Angus, which has not been available in print since the eighteenth century.

The Society's continued vitality depends, first, on the supply of

scholarly editions suitable to be included in its series and, second, on the maintenance of subscriptions and sales of volumes at a level which will cover the printing and distribution costs of new and reprinted books. The Society's volumes are printed and distributed by Boydell & Brewer (Rochester, NY and Woodbridge, Suffolk), a highly successful scholarly publisher. The Society has members all over the world. In return for their subscriptions, members receive the Society's annual volume or volumes published by the Society in its main series in that year and the right to buy back copies and other non-series publications at a discount.

Subscription rates are available for your review at http://www.scottishtextsociety.org/, where details of how to join the Society are also to be found. Annual membership fees may be paid using Paypal.

- ~ The City Chambers covered in musical notation as part of the presentation; "Auld Lang Syne" across the City Chambers at the


end of the slide show;


