Our sympathies are extended to Gary and Cathy Paisley on the death of Cathy's father, William Henry "Bill" Thurman who passed away at his home in Monroe, Georgia on July 30. A child of the Great Depression Bill was born in Memphis, Tennessee, and raised by a maternal aunt, Maybelle They moved to Cincinnati Ohio to be near Bill's mother, Ila Zenath Thurman, and Bill, like so many other children of the time, was sent to the Cincinnati Children's Home. After graduation from high school, he enlisted in the Navy. Serving in the Armed Guard, these gun crews crossed the Atlantic, Pacific and Panama Canal theatres. While waiting in Okinawa for the invasion of Japan, the atomic bombs rained down on that nation. Discharged in 1948, he returned to Cincinnati and married his sweetheart, Wilma Biddle June 19, 1949. He studied accounting at the University of Cincinnati, and began his career at Moser Safe. In 1965 the company moved to Atlanta, and in 1987 he formed his own company, Motor Carrier Services. Until recently he was still involved in the company. He and Wilma had two daughters: Cathy Paisley and Cindy Pope. They were blessed with five grandchildren and three great-grands. Bill lovingly cared for Wilma

when her health failed until her death in 2016.
