PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE, SPRING NEWSLETTER, 2011

FROM THE CLAN ROSS HOME OFFICE

I have really enjoyed having the "head office" of Clan Ross in my home over the past two years. As I have the email address and phone number that many use to connect with the Clan, it has introduced me to new and interesting people. I wanted to share a few of the more unique connections I have made.

American Scottish Walking sticks

At the Fergus Festival last year, I carried a beautiful walking stick with the Clan Ross crest and name. I was asked about it several times. Incredibly enough, it was given to me two years earlier by its creator at American Scottish Walking Sticks to promote his handiwork. I only recently found the gentleman's card and you can find Douglas, based in Michigan, at www.aswsticks.com. It was very kind of him to give me such a unique gift.

Relatives of Sir George Ross

Last year we ran several pieces on Sir George Ross, who was Premier of Ontario (1899-1905) and the first president of Clan Ross in America in 1911. His great X 3 granddaughter, Dr. Valerie Dawn Ruddell-Girhiny, was our guest of honour at the Fergus Scottish festival. Her brief speech to the opening ceremonies of the games can be found on our Youtube Channel: ClanRossCanada. Thanks to this coverage, three distant cousins of Valerie Dawn, and descendants of Sir George Ross, contacted me! One man just joined our clan prior to Christmas and lives in BC; one, a member for a longer time, lives in Owen Sound; and the third, who lives in Texas, just contacted me a few weeks ago! He found our articles in a Google search when he investigated his family tree. Valerie Dawn was thrilled to have distant cousins reach out to her.

Finding Family

It is so encouraging to hear that, thanks to our association, people have discovered important parts of their family tree. I got a nice email last year from new Clan member Jack Rumsden of Three Hills, Alberta. He wrote:

I have been working on my family history for the past couple of years and seemed to come to a dead end with my Great Grandfather Benjamin Ross. I was able to find birth information on my Grandmother and her three Ross sisters, but was unable to get beyond Benjamin. Then out of the blue I received a communication on the Ancestries Website from a long lost cousin named Suzanne Whyte, thanking me for posting pictures of my Grandparents (John Ewart Ramsden & Verina Ross Ramsden) and my Father (John Ross Ramsden). In a few short email exchanges I was exposed to a wealth of information about my Great Grandfather's family taking me all the way back to Scotland. Suddenly I belonged to a massive family. Of course Suzanne also sent me a link to the CLAN ROSS and to the more specific family website that Doug Ross has created. I learned that I am directly related to Alexander Ross through Donald Ross to my Great Grandfather Benjamin and that in Doug Ross's terminology I am actually D6A1B! Wow what a lot to take in at one time!!

Thank you for joining our association Jack! Congratulations on expanding the family tree!

The Ship, "Clan Ross"

Over Christmas, I received an interesting email from Gary Wright from Australia. It was in regard to the Ship "Clan Ross" built by the Clan Line Shipping Company.

The Clan Line Shipping Company was first founded in Liverpool before transferring to Glasgow. By the 1930's they were the largest shipping company in the world. Their tradition was to name ships after the Clans and they built 3 ships named the Clan Ross! They were:

SS Clan Ross (1) built 1894. 1914 sold to Adelaide Steamship Company, renamed Cantara. 2,604 tons.

SS Clan Ross (2) built 1914. 1938 transferred to Houston Line, 1942 torpedoed and sunk by Japanese submarine west of Bombay, with the loss of 11 lives. 5,897 tons.

SS Clan Ross (3) built 1956. 1960 transferred to Houston Line, 1961 transferred to Safmarine, renamed South African Scientist, 1962 transferred to Union-Castle Line, renamed Kinnaird Castle. 7,698 tons.

Gary owns a model of the ship sunk during WW2. He writes:

I am seeking any information on the Clan line Shipping Co. that built the Ship named "Clan Ross" in 1914, You see, I am the owner of one of the only two models made of the ship and was hoping to get in touch with anyone interested in this wonderful model.

The model's hull built up from the solid in lifts in 1/4 in.=1 ft. scale, painted with a red bottom, black and white topsides, timber rudder, and a brass propeller. The decks of laid veneer, the foredeck, forward and aft work decks are painted a cream color with the deck plating drawn in, the upper decks are in veneer with the deck planking and details drawn in India ink. Fitted with numerous gold plated details including: anchors, anchor chain, anchor windlass, chocks, bollards, ventilators, mahogany capped railings, cargo hatches with green covers, masts with standing and running rigging for cargo booms, cargo winches, covered double bridge with bridge wings and canopy frames, semaphore post, ship's wheel, binnacle, funnel painted black with a red band, (6) lifeboats with davits, canopy frames on the after deck, engine telegraph, flagstaff, and other details. Displayed on six baluster turned pedestals on a raised plinth, and displayed within a mahogany framed glass case and cabinet underneath. The overall length of the cabinet is 3.330 meters long.



As you can see, this is a huge model in stunning detail! If you want to contact Gary about his model ship, please email me and I will share his contact details with you.

TAM O' SHANTER - FACT OR FICTION?

"I think a wee bit of both", says long-time Clan member Jack Ross of Mississauga who recently gave an audio & visual presentation on the Burns poem "Tam O Shanter" at the Scottish Studies OOR Club luncheon in Toronto. In the presentation, the narration was synchronized with 40 artist drawn slides depicting scenes from the tale. This made the story easier to follow for those unfamiliar with the Ayrshire dialect.

Jack then shared his research by identifying the most likely people that Burns used as prototypes for all the characters in the poem (except for Auld Nick). He gave their names, their connection with Burns, and showed on a map the localities of the farms and places where they had lived and the graveyards where they now lie buried.

Here are some extra tidbits that Jack thought the audience might find interesting:

- 1. I spent much of my youth in the village of Crosshill about seven miles from Kirkoswald, the village near which most of the Shanter characters lived. As a teenager I cycled all over that territory and was familiar with all the places.
- 2. Since my schooldays I have been intrigued by who the people in the poem were. Not until the Internet came along did that information become easier to dig for.
- 3. Because many of the sites, e.g. Ardlochan Mill, have long since disappeared, tracing them involved long searches through old maps and documents.
- 4. I bought the 35 mm colour slides in Ayr about 40 years ago before coming home from a trip. They were very expensive, but I knew I might never have another opportunity. I was right.
- 5. My first presentations required me to recite the poem and simultaneously yank the lever on my projector to and fro. By 1975 I had made a tape recording with pulses which advanced a Kodak Carousel projector. As technology advanced, so did I, and now have it run automatically on a DVD

You all know the story of the Earl of Ross ... leading his wild Ross Clan out of the mountainous Highlands in rebellion against the King and assaulting the Castle of Blair Atholl, residence of the Earl of Atholl, Chief of Clan Murray. The Murray, worried that his stores of oats, honey, cream and whisky ... ESPECIALLY the whisky ... would fall into Ross hands, dumped the lot down his well. The Chorus is important. That's where you folks come in. Yes, this year we've gone interactive. In tonight's version, entitled *The Ballad of the Earl of Ross, our Brave Mountaineer*, you will holler out our hero's name whenever it appears in the chorus. So, in a line like "Casey Jones ... mounted to his cabin", instead of hollering CASEY JONES, you will holler **EARL-OF-ROSS**.

But ... without a copy of the poem before you, how will you know when? That's easy, when I raise my left hand ... like this. One last wrinkle. This poem has four choruses. For the first three ... at the sign of my left hand you holler **EARL-OF-ROSS**. But in the last chorus, Lady Ross makes a most revealing announcement. In that chorus I will raise my right hand and you will holler **LAY-DEE ROSS**. Let's try it.

I think you've got it! Here goes.
