





Cooking Corner ~ Holiday Fare

May you have warm words on a cool evening, a full moon on a dark night, and a smooth road all the way to your door.



Evergreen Punch

2 cups Sugar2 quarts Warm Water2 pkgs. Lemon Lime Kool-Aid1 46 oz. can Pineapple Juice1 2 ltr. Ginger ale

In large container, dissolve sugar in water. Cool. Add Kool-Aid & pineapple Juice. Mix and pour into two pitchers. Chill until ready to use. Can do individual servings by shaking mixture well before pouring over ice leaving room to top with ginger ale or serve in punch bowl by adding shaken mixture & ginger ale together with ice or ice ring. Jezebel Sauce

1 18 oz. jar Pineapple Preserves1 small can Dry Mustard1 Tbsp. course ground Pepper1 18 oz. jar Apple Jelly1 4-5 oz. jar Horseradish

Combine all ingredients mixing thoroughly on low. Store in jars in refrigerator. Perfect condiment for chicken, beef & pork or served over cream cheese crackers.

Rum Raisin Shortbread

½ cup Raisins
¼ cup Dark Rum
1 cup Butter
½ cup Powdered Sugar
2 cups Flour
¼ tsp. Salt
¼ tsp. Baking Powder

Soften butter to room temperature. Combine raisins and dark rum in small sauce pan and bring to boil (can also be done in microwave). Remove from heat and let stand for about and hour. Drain. Cream butter and sugar together until smooth. Combine flour, salt and baking powder and slowly blend into creamed mixture. Stir in drained raisins. Chill dough if necessary (about an hour). Roll out to 1/4" and cut out cookies with favorite cookie cutter. Place on un-greased (I use parchment paper) cookie sheet. Bake 325 for 15 minutes until lightly browned. Remove to a rack to cool completely. Store in airtight container.

6TH CLAN WALLACE INTERNATIONAL GATHERING: SEPT 11-13, 2009



PROCEEDINGS OF THE 2008 ANNUALBOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

Thursday, 25 September 2008

I. Opening

President Bill Wallace called the meeting to order at 3:32 PM. Present were the following Board members: Bill Wallace, Bob Wallace, John Wallace, Elmer Inman, Marcus Wallace, Wayne Jones and Jean Wallace. John Wallace held the proxies for Kay Cayler and Lisa Donant.

II. Reading of the 2007 Minutes.

The Minutes of the 2008 ADM were approved as read.

III. Treasurer's 2008 Financial Report

The Treasurer's Financial Report for the fiscal year ending 30 September 2008 was approved as read.

IV. Reports

The Election and Ballot Committee. Report deferred until ballots have been counted.

Membership Chairman Report. Charles Wallace reported that we have 55 new members this year: 41 Annual members, 11 Life members (one Honorary), and 4 Council members. Report approved.

Newsletter Manager Report. Elmer Inman reported mailings of approximately 560 Newsletters each quarter. Special and Winter Newsletters were combined last year. Elmer will check on costcutting measures for future mailings. Report approved.

Convener Affairs Report. Jean Wallace advised that Page 31 in the Continued discussion of Unfinished 2007 Business called to order by book The Clan Wallace will be "printed" color swatches in place of finding additional fabric swatches. Report approved.

Secretary Report. Bob Wallace reported for Kay Cayler that she had sent out 1,200 mailings in 2008 to Society members, receiving back some 65 incorrect addresses. Mailing labels are now being generated in ZIP code order to facilitate matching of multiple names at one address to save on postage expenses. Report approved.

Documents and Publications. Marcus Wallace advised that Raymond Morehead is still attempting to locate someone capable of translating the Wallace papers. Recommended reading list has been updated in the Convener Handbook and will be posted on the web site. Report approved.

Recognition Program. John Wallace advised that the Society presented two Certificates of Appreciation, two President's Awards, and three Certificates of Office. Revenue for this program is nearing \$20,000.00 at the end of FY 2008. The Rewards Program brochure will be revised before the next Games/Festivals season with an emphasis on its accomplishments. He will also advise Conveners of the importance of this program to the Society, asking for their assistance in promoting the program more aggressively at future Games / Festivals.

Special Projects. Wayne Jones advised that the Policy and Procedures Manual has been developed to assist the President and EVP to conduct the business of the Society. All Society policies and procedures can now be located in one central document, including and books, Job Descriptions, and Forms as appendices. Included is a Quick Reference Guide to facilitate locating specific infor-

mation. Any changes to handbooks require approval of President or EVP. Report approved.

Advisory Director for Canada. Bill Wallace presented for Dorothy Knight. Dorothy has recruited a new Convener and six new members in Canada. The new Convener has already convened at several Games. Dorothy has made several presentations in Canada and on Web-TV. Report approved.

V. Unfinished 2007 Business

Verification/Ratification of 2007 of CWSW Email Business. The Board approved expenditures of \$3,000 to the Culloden Battlefield Restoration Project, \$350 to the Milwaukee, Wisconsin Robert Burns Society, and a no-cost life membership to Ian Stiebar in Slovakia for his help in developing graphics used for the Culloden Project. Each was ratified by motion and vote.

Status of 2007 Action Items. Most Action items were completed in a timely manner. A report is attached to the Minutes. Position of a CWS Historian is tabled until a future date. Report accepted.

Survey of Members. Richard Wallace (Little Rock) conducted a member survey by telephone. Out of 100 random members, he contacted 18. Respondents suggested several ways of engaging young members to become involved in their heritage. Suggestions were also made to increase the visibility of CWS at Games/Festivals, and requested additional information about genealogy. Report accepted.

Friday, 26 September 2008

President Bill Wallace at 8:25 AM on Friday. Jim "Bowie" Wallace joined the Directors named above.

Special Presentation. Norma Wallace presented her idea for a handout booklet to be available at Clan tents, to anyone interested in CWS, or as reference material. Norma will have the booklet available to Conveners prior to the next Games/Festivals season.

Membership Promotions. Wayne Jones gave proposals on promotions to increase membership. Trend analysis of members prior to and following the January 2006 change in fees was presented. Incentives will be considered for 2009 implementing. Also discussed was the CWS Rewards Program and how to promote it. Report accepted.

Clan Wallace Mailings. Wayne Jones provided details on returned and duplicative mailings that are a major cost factor for the Society. Included are mailings to missing and deceased members, and to those who fail to update their address with the Society after relocating. Board approved changing the distribution of the Newsletter primarily to email and snail mail for those without computers. As part of this report, Darrell Wallace advised on generating snail mail labels using various queries within the member database. Report approved.

Clan Crawford Contacts. Wayne Jones and Marcus Wallace have been working with Clan Crawford at various Games. Clan Crawford is now assisting CWS by providing CWS information at Games where there may be no CWS Convener present. Conveners will be provided with the booklet titled "William Wallace and His Crawford Relations," written by Joanne Crawford and Kevan Crawford. Approved.

I. Opening

President Bill Wallace opened the meeting at 11:42 AM. All Directors were present except Kay Cayler and Lisa Donant.

II. Certification of New Directors

Deferred until all ballots have been received and counted by the Election Committee headed by Jan Wallace.

III. New Business

The 2009 Annual Budget was accepted as amended. Newsletter costs will be reduced by sending printed copies only to those requesting them. Email will be the default. Special Edition and Winter Edition issues will be combined in Gathering years.

Nomination Committee. Report is deferred until election ballots have been received and counted.

Convener Handbook. Prior to the ADM, Bob Wallace reviewed both the Clan Wallace and Clan Young convener handbooks, which revealed that the CWS Convener Handbook was well written. Several minor additions were suggested and approved by the Board. A new Convener Handbook to be delivered by January 2009

<u>Annual Member Renewal Notice.</u> A final post-card mailing to Annual members will be made requesting renewal of their membership with the Society. Approved.

Patriot Act Effect on CWS. Patriot Act requirements impact CWS Officers when change is made in Officers of the Society. Individual ID, bank account information, certified Minutes, and Articles of Incorporation must be presented to the bank's officer to change signatories on CWS accounts.

2009 ADM Site Selection and Gathering. Next year's ADM will be held on Thursday and Friday prior to the Longs Peak Games and Gathering. CWS is one of the honored Clans for this event.

CWS Projects – Scotland and CONUS. The Wallace Yew tree in Elderslie looks much better than it did in 2005. The Culloden Welcome Center project is nearing completion; the CWS stone will be put in place soon. Wallace 700 Association is having their ceremony annually; government financial assistance is being reduced.

Robroyston Monument sidewall has been repaired; parking has been added to the site. A CWS donation was made for the Robert Burns statue in Milwaukee. No new projects are contemplated currently. Report approved.

Newsletter Submission Dates. Submissions for the CWS Newsletter are due no later than the 24th of February, May, August

and November.

<u>Potential On-line Material.</u> Jim "Bowie" Wallace displayed for the Board how various items might be made available to Board members via the CWS web site.

Making Member Data Available to Conveners.

Darrell Wallace explained how membership data might be made available to Conveners by Zip Code, State or Region, giving Conveners the ability to contact area members.

Other Business. A picture of the Wallace Statue in Scotland will be used as a raffle item at the Estes Park Gathering. Reminder to Board members: send pictures to the Newsletter Editor in JPEG compressed format. Jean, Bob and Jim "Bowie" will serve as committee to research sites for the 2011 Gathering. It was suggested to look for a central location for ADMs in non-Gathering years. A Certificate of Appreciation awarded to Jim Schmeltzer.

Good of the Order. Wayne Jones commended Marcus Jim Wallace for service on the Board and as President of the Society.

CHARLESTON GAMES IN SOUTH CAROLINA

The 2008 Charleston Scottish Games and Highland Gathering was held this year at historic Boone Hall Plantation on September 19 through 21, 2008. This event has been held since 1973 and is one of the premier heritage festivals in the South Atlantic Region. The weekend started with a formal Sponsor's reception at Alhambra Hall in Mount Pleasant on Friday evening attended by several hundred representatives from the 40 plus Clans and Societies serving the Games followed by a tremendous Saturday of Ceremonies, Athletics, Scottish Dancing, Bag Piping, Entertainment, Heritage Clan Tents, Children's Events, and Vendors. This year the Honored Clan was Clan Gregor. The weather cooperated and it was a grand day for all who were present. THE ROADS WE TRAVELED

One of the ideas we incorporated into September's "Roads Less Traveled" was to actually travel the roads most tour companies, for whatever reasons, choose not to travel. In some instances, it has to do with the type of roads their routes would take them over, or parking lots too small for larger tour buses. While some of our stops included locations the Big Guys also visit, we did manage to get to a number of places most organized groups never visit.

Following arrival night in Glasgow, we boarded our 19-passenger coach for a ferry trip out of Gourock to Dunoon on the Kintyre Peninsula, then through the Argyll Forest Park, a stop at Inveraray Castle, drive by Kilchurn Castle (struck by lightning and abandoned in 1760) and over the hills to Oban, our two-night base for a visit to Mull and Iona the following day.

Back on the road out of Oban, we stopped at Killin to view the Falls of Dochart, the river running quite high with all the rain the Scots had put up with for much of the year. In fact, this river was carrying lots of topsoil along with it. We saw a similar situation later during our visit to New Lanark and the Falls of Clyde.

Of major interest to Clan Wallace would be the stop made in the Borders region to view the first monument erected in memory of Sir William Wallace, the 1814 statue placed in what is left of Ettrick Forest. The statue faces England across the hills to the south. Arlene Wallace Tomlin, Lois and Bob Wallace and others in the tour group walked about one-third of a mile from the parking lot to visit the site and take pictures of the red sandstone monument. This Wallace monument is in a location that requires use of a small tour bus or private motor car, given a parking lot with only a handful of spaces, and local roads that are relatively narrow.

Several stops were made in Lanark during our visit. St Kentigern's Church is located nearly a mile from the center of the burgh, is largely in ruins, and is surrounded by a churchyard cemetery. Nearby is the old cattle market. Near the center of Lanark is a site with a plaque noting that it used to be the home of Sir William Wallace when he lived in that area in the 1290s. Just across the street is a somewhat newer church that happens to have a statue of Wallace on its side. We were unable to get a view of the statue or usable photos of the church or statue due to wrap around the entire structure while work was being performed on the outside.

Other visits of a more general interest included Sir Walter Scott's home at Abbotsford, two of the four Abbeys begun under King David I in the 1100s (Melrose and Jedburgh), the burgh town of Peebles where we enjoyed their Games on Sunday without even the threat of rain for a day, and visits to sites related to Scotland's National Poet, Robert Burns, at Dumfries, Ellisland and Alloway. We were reminded on more than one occasion by both Burns guides that we were doing that part of the tour in reverse, seeing the Burns farm at Ellisland before we'd been to where he was born in 1759.

Given a small group of only 13, a small tour bus, we managed to go over roads most tour groups will never see. One reason for calling our 2008 tour the "Roads Less Traveled."
