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PREFACE.

THE Johnsons were a well-known old burgher family in Linlithgow. As Traders they are found amongst the Customars, and as Civic Chiefs in the Magistracy. William Johnoun was the King's Cup Bearer; Patrick Johnoun, a Collector of the King's Rents; Hugh Johnoun was Head Cook to the King, and Margaret Johnoun, Brewer to the King. Schir Thomas Johnoun's name first appears in the Linlithgow Records in 1528, but of his parentage not a trace has been found, although his connection with work at the Palace, and his various Church preferments, may lead to the surmise that he was connected with one of the former office bearers in the Royal Household. The existing records show that from 1528 to the end of 1578 he gave faithful service as the leading official in the community. He was a busy man, probably the busiest man in the county, and in an age of pluralists surpassed all his local contemporaries in the number of offices he held.

He was Chaplain of the Altar of St. Bridget in the Parish Church in October 1529, but resigned before 13th April 1534.¹ He was also Chaplain of the Altar of the Holy Saviour by October 1532,¹ and retained this chaplainry till his death. From an early date till the end he held also the Chaplainry of the Altar of St. John the Evangelist, an appointment which he owed to his connection with the Hamilton family, the patrons of the altar being the Hamiltons of Kincavil (Kingscavil). In 1536 he is designated Chaplain of the Altar of St. Ninian at Blackness, of which the Burgh held the patronage under Royal Charter—another life appointment. He apparently held this chaplainry at first by private arrangement with David Hutoun, the incumbent, who acted for many years as his Clerk. But the official presentation to the chaplainry as Hutoun's successor is dated 5th June 1543.² On the death of Henry Louk, Johnoun succeeded him as *curatus* of the Parish Church of Linlithgow. The date of the appointment is not known, but he is so designated on 26th April 1553.³

At the Reformation Johnoun ceased to style himself chaplain from December 1560 till April 1561, but thereafter, except in a few instances, he retained the designation. The evidence is clear that he enjoyed for life the endowments of his clerical appointments; for instance he granted a feu charter of lands at Blackness

belonging to the Chapel of St. Ninian on 9th April 1577,¹ and another on 31st May 1577.² It is interesting to note that at the Reformation he retained as his own property the new Chapel of St. Ninian at Blackness, which he had just erected. The bay to the west of the Chapel is still known as Johnsou's Bay.

At different periods he held the offices of Town Clerk or of Deputy Town Clerk, mainly, however, before the Reformation, as is evident from the dates of the deeds relating to Burghal holdings, and from the fact that the oldest Burgh Court Book is in his handwriting.

The oldest existing records of Linlithgow Sheriff Court, dating from 1541, are also in Johnsou's handwriting. He acted as Sheriff Clerk at different periods during a series of years, either by himself or jointly with another, but did not hold office continuously.³

Johnsou acted as Deputy Master of Works of Linlithgow Palace, when Sir James Hamilton of Finnart was Master of Works and Captain of the Palace. His name is recorded in the official accounts of 14th October 1526,⁴ February 1535/6,⁴ and 28th August 1536.⁴ Other entries are also given in the Exchequer Rolls.

He was frequently engaged as Finnart's Law Agent in his numerous land transactions throughout the south and middle of Scotland. After the execution of his patron on 16th August 1540, Johnsou continued to act as lawyer on behalf of Finnart's son, Sir James Hamilton of Crawfordjohn, and of his son, Sir James Hamilton of Liberton. The connection with three generations of this most important branch of the Hamilton family led in Johnsou's earlier and more active years to his employment by the local representatives of the numerous and powerful Hamilton clan.

Some years after Finnart's death Johnsou appears to have become Law Agent to Lord Fleming, and to have resided mainly at Biggar from 1545 to 1552, where Lord Fleming was engaged in founding and building the Collegiate Church. Yet he never quite lost touch with Linlithgow, but paid frequent visits, each recorded by legal transactions.

During the last years of his life Johnsou dropped most of his work for the great families, but found numerous clients among the tenant farmers of Linlithgowshire and the adjoining districts of Stirlingshire.

One of his local contemporaries was Schir Ninian Winzet, school master of Linlithgow, afterwards Abbot of Ratisbon. In his "Tractates," Winzet relates how he was "expellit and schott out of that his kindly town, and from his tender freindis thair." Doubtless Johnsoune was one of the tender friends, for in 1571, long after his banishment, Winzet is recorded as witness to a deed. Was Winzet then on a visit, not elsewhere mentioned, to his old friend?

The contrast in style between Johnsoune's use of Latin and of the vernacular is remarkable. The Latin is unclassical, but the thought is always clear. On the other hand his vernacular is obscure, clumsy, and an instrument he was incapable of using efficiently. This was the weakness of the man, not of the period, for Winzet's clear and vigorous use of the vernacular is remarkable.

Considerable sections of his Protocol Books and of the Burgh Court Book are missing. It is quaintly noted in an entry in the Burgh Court Book, dated 30th March 1564, "It wes funden that the marow of it is revin out." As many of the missing sections are covered by the Reformation Period, one may fairly conclude that these contain deeds relating to Church property.

Johnsoune's last deed is unfinished, and is dated 21st September 1578. In Andrew Ker's Protocol Book, Vol. II., a. ff. 5/6, he is designated in a deed dated 8th October 1579, "the late Dominus Thomas Johnsoune."

A few years ago, when foundations for a house were being dug at Blackness on ground formerly attached to the Chapel which Johnsoune built there, there was unearthed the skeleton of what had been a big burly man. There was nothing, so far as the labourers could note, to indicate the identity of the dead, but they may have disturbed the unrecorded resting-place of Schir Thomas Johnsoune, Chaplain and Notary Public.

Folio 5.

1. Fragment of Instrument of Sasine, following on Charter by John Lewyngstoun in favour of Sir James Hammyltoun, in half the lands of Manerstoun and Medop. Witnesses to the sasine, James Nesmyth, Matthew Hammyltoun in Mylburne, John Caling, and Matthew Hammyltoun in Lathame.
2. Instrument, on refusal of a superior to receive a vassal, narrating that William Sandelandis of Hilhous, procurator for James Hammyltoun of Kincavill, sheriff of Linlithqu, appeared at the dwelling-place of Lord John Lyndesay of Byris, at Struthirs, and there produced Royal Letters, charging the said Lord John to infest the said James Hammyltoun in half the lands of Bynis with Corsflat and half of Philipstoun, together with the superiority of the other half of Bynis (belonging to the said James Hammyltoun), also in the superiority of the two-merk land of Dunterveycrag (belonging to Alexander Hepburne), and of the five-merk land of Philipstoun (belonging to James Craufurd in Bonitoun). But the said Lord sent out his servant John Baxster of Quhelt to intimate that he refused to see the procurator or to peruse the letters. Whereupon the said procurator took instruments. At the gates of Struthirs 18 October 1528. Witnesses to the instrument, Andrew Simsoun, John Walkar, William Baxster, Henry Myddelair and James Simsoun.
3. Instrument of Sasine, following on Charter by Robert Foulis, burgess of Linlithqw, in favour of John Johnsoun, also burgess of said burgh, in 4 roods of land, called Fewarlandis, with the headrig, lying in the territory of Bonitoun and sheriffdom of Linlithqw, between the lands of Patrick Crechtoun on the east, the King's lands on the west, the lands of the said Robert Foulis on the south, and the road called the Lonyng of Bonitoun on the north. Dated 4 May 1529. Witnesses to the sasine, John Young, Patrick Coll, Alexander Blake, John Craufurd, indweller in Bonitoun.

4. Obligation by George Wilyemsoun, dwelling in Estir Pentosken, to Agnes Forrest, Lady, of Estir Pentosken, to faithfully satisfy her for the grassums, mails, and other emoluments for occupying and labouring the said lands of Estir Pentosken. Done at Linlithqw, in the house of the said Agnes,¹ the 30 of May 1529.

Witnesses, William Dennestoun, William Balderstoun, and John Hendersoun.

5. Obligation by John Hammyltoun, dwelling in Kincadyowlaw, to William Hammyltoun in Pardowin, to faithfully satisfy him for the grassums, mails and other emoluments for occupying and labouring the said lands of Kincadyowlaw. Done at Linlithqw, in the chamber of Dominus Thomas Johnsoun, chaplain, the 26 of July 1529. Witnesses, William Hammyltoun of Humbe, John Myllar, and Archibald Listoun.
6. Instrument of Sasine, *propriis manibus*, narrating that Robert Craufurd, son and heir of the late Robert Craufurd of Beircroftis, proceeded to his lands of Beircroftis, lying in the Barony of Kerss, Regality of Broychtoun, and Sherifffdom of Stirling, with Robert Craufurd, his son and heir apparent; and there gave sasine in the said lands of Beircroftis to his said son; reserving his own liferent. John Hammyltoun in Parkle sought instruments on behalf of the said Robert Craufurd. Done on the said lands of Beircroftis, the 13 of December 1529. Witnesses, Dominus Henry Louk, curate of Linlithqw, William Straherne, John Gyb, Gavin Hart, and Patrick Brone.
7. Protestation by Elizabeth Brone, wife of Robert Craufurd of Beircroftis, that the sasine in the lands of Beircroftis in favour of her son Robert Craufurd should not prejudice her liferent in the said lands. Place, date and witnesses as in the sasine.

Folios 6-7.

8. Ratification by Elizabeth Cunyghame, wife of William Baldirstoun, burgess of Linlithqw, of a conveyance to him of all her goods for his use till her death. Done at Linlithqw, in the said William Baldirstoun's house, on the 6 of January 1529/30. Witnesses, Allan Lychtman, James Laverok, and William More, burgesses of Linlithqw.
9. Instrument of Donation narrating that at a court held on the lands of Bonitoun by William Hammyltoun of Stakkis, bailie for Sir James Hammyltoun of Fynnard, appeared Andrew Keyr with John Keyr his cousin, and there the said Andrew bestowed and gifted on the said John all right and claim which he had to two oxgangs of land, formerly occupied by the late Michael Keyr, lying in the territory of Bonitoun, in the Sherifffdom of Linlithqw. Done at the said court, the 27 of January 1529/30. Witnesses, George Hammyltoun of Medop, William Hammyltoun of Kincavil, Robert Hammyltoun in Philipstoun, Mr. John Knollis, David Hakkat, William Dennestoun, and John Craufurd, sergeant.
10. Instrument of Investiture narrating that Archibald Levyingstoun of Castlecary, with consent of his mother Marion Hepburne, appeared in the chapel of the Blessed Virgin Mary, lying at the east end of the town of Linlithqw, and there invested Dominus Archibald Fawup, chaplain, in the office of chaplain of the said chapel for his lifetime, "with all its rights and pertinents, fruits, income, annualrents, lands, emoluments, oblations, and all other just pertinents whatsoever"; on condition that he perform in the said chapel "divine services used and wont for the souls of the founders¹ of the said chapel according to the tenor of the foundation made by them in times past, and for the souls of their successors and of all the faithful dead," as he should answer at the day of judgement. Investment was given to the said chaplain by delivery to him of the keys, chalice,

book, and other furniture of the altar. Done in the said chapel, the 21 of February 1529/30. Witnesses, James Lithqw, Peter Bell, Bartholomew Cuk *alias* Wobster, Thomas Lausoun, Robert Gray, and John Ker.

Folios 7-8.

11. Obligation by Dominus Archibald Fawup, chaplain, in favour of Archibald Lewyngstoun of Castlecary, patron of the chapel of the Blessed Virgin Mary, situated at the east end of the town of Linlithgow, to construct a cooptorium or sylour,¹ over the altar of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the said chapel, at a cost of £3 Scots, between this date and Pentecost 1531. In default, the patron is authorised to draw the revenues of the chapel to the value of £3, to be spent in completing the work. Place, date and witnesses as in No. 10.
12. Instrument of Sasine, following on a charter by Dominus Andrew Flemyng, chaplain of the altar of St. Anthony, founded and situated in the Parish Church of Linlithqw, in favour of John Young and his wife Helen Hammyltoun, in an annualrent of six shillings furth of the said chaplain's tenement,² lying in the burgh of Linlithqw on the north side of the High Street,³ between the lands of George Kent on the west, and the lands of James Craufurd on the east. Sasine given by James Robisoun, one of the bailies of Linlithqw, by the delivery of a penny, as use is in burgh. Done on the ground of the said tenement on 1 March 1529/30. Witnesses, Dominus Henry Louk, chaplain and curate of Linlithqw, Dominus Archibald Fawp, chaplain, William Davisoun, Patrick Merschell, and John Baxster, sergeant.
13. Notarial Instrument and Protest against intrusion, on behalf of Robert Craufurd of Beircroftis, quashing and nullifying a pretended sasine in the lands of Beircroftis,⁴ recently given by Andrew Hammyltoun, bailie for Robert, Lord Abbot of Holyrood,⁵ to William Carncorss. Done on the said lands of Beircroftis, by the breaking of a dish, on the 5 March 1529/30. Witnesses, John Hammyltoun in Parklie, Andrew Johnsoun, David Alexander, William Pawtoun, Nicholas Burne, and Patrick Burne.
14. Certification of Judicial Act in the burgh court, by John Caling, discharging William Straherne, King's Messenger, of all claims connected with the estate of the late Allan Landellis, burgess of Edinburgh. Done in the house of Richard Craufurd, one of the bailies of Linlithqw, on 5 March 1529/30. Witnesses, Robert Grynlaw, Robert Johnsoun, Dominus Henry Louk, curate of Linlithqw, and Dominus David Uthoun, chaplain and notary public.
15. Mandate granted by Robert Craufurd of Beircroftis to Mr. Henry Laudir, James Carmour, John Lethame, William Blakstok, John Touch, John Hammyltoun in Parklie, and William Stensoun, jointly and severally, to present before James, Archbishop of St. Andrews or his vicar, a dispensation, dated 26 June 1530 and sealed with the seal of the office of the Penitentiary of the Roman Court, sanctioning the marriage of the said Robert with Elizabeth Brone, which had been contracted in ignorance of their relationship within the degrees forbidden by the Church. Done at Beircroftis, 2 October 1530. Witnesses, Henry Alexander, Thomas Browne, and David Alexander.

16. Donation by Agnes Forrest, widow of William Singlar, dwelling in the burgh of Linlithqw, of all her goods movable and immovable, with right to enter into possession before the death of the donor, in favour of Agnes Edmestoun, her aunt, and her heirs; whom failing, to Margaret Edmestoun, sister of the said Agnes Edmestoun, and her heirs; whom failing, to Libra Cornwale, wife of Archibald Hammyltoun, and her heirs; whom failing, to the heirs whomsoever of the said donor. Done in the house of the donor, in presence of Mr. John Knollis, bailie of the said burgh, the 5 of October 1530. Witnesses, Lord John Hay of Yestir, Mr. John Knollis, one of the bailies of Linlithqw, William Baldirstoun, and Dominus John Manderstoun, chaplain and notary public.

17. Donation by Isabella Mailvile, daughter of the late David Mailvile and his wife Elizabeth Wardlaw now deceased, of her bairn's part of gear, in favour of John Crummy, younger, son and heir apparent of John Crummy, burgess of Edinburgh, and Margaret Mailvile his wife, aunt of the donor, in respect of her education and maintenance for eight years, and of two payments of eight merks Scots. Done at the (*indagine*) Park¹ of Linlithqw, at 10 a.m. on the 11 of October 1530. Witnesses, Dominus Henry Louk, curate of Linlithqw, Friar John Maxwell and Friar John Rucht, of the Order of Preaching Friars in the burgh of Edinburgh.
18. Obligation by John Crummy, burgess of Edinburgh, now living in the town of Linlithqw, to pay to Dominus Henry Louk, curate of Linlithqw, the sum of five pounds Scots for daily masses for the space of a year, for the soul of his wife who has just died in Linlithqw, for the souls of his children who have also died there, and for himself now lying in grave peril. Done, in time of pestilence, at the Park of Linlithqw, at 3 p.m. on the 11 of October 1530. Witnesses, Matthew Dalmahoy, John Dalmahoy, Robert Wethirspune, and Dominus Thomas Kent, chaplain.
19. Obligation by John Young, dwelling in Laswaid, and his wife — Lychtman, to pay to Nichol Watsoun, dwelling in Dawkeitht, and his wife Marion Lychtman, grand-daughter of the late Luke Lychtman, the sum of six pounds Scots as price of half of the tenement² in Linlithqw, on the south side of the King's Street, lying between the tenement of John Spenss on the east, and the tenement of Robert Perry on the west. Done at Linlithqw, in the house of Richard Craufurd, the 5 of February 1530/1. Witnesses, Richard Craufurd, William Straherne, messenger, Dominus Henry Louk, curate of Linlithqw, and James Bischoep.

Folios 10-11.

20. Instrument narrating that Richard Craufurd, burgess of Linlithqw, sitting in his own house at his dining-table (*in mensale tabula*), acknowledged that he had received from his wife Elizabeth Louk certain money in gold and silver to be spent in making a drinking-cup, in the vernacular a maseir, with a large silver band on the upper part and a large silver foot, both gilt with gold, with the inscription in Greek letters, "*Thesus est amor meus*," and bearing the arms of the said Richard in the middle; and further declared that the said maseir should be the property of the said Elizabeth his wife and their children, whom failing, of the heirs of the said Elizabeth whomsoever. Done at Linlithqw, in the house of the

said Richard, the 8 of June 1531. Witnesses, Robert Grinlaw, Stephan Wass, Archibald Listoun, Henry Louk, curate of Linlithqw, and Dominus David Hutoun, chaplain and notary public.

21. Redemption by John Mongall in Newhouses from Henry Mongall, son and heir of the late John Mongall, for the sum of eight pounds Scots, of a piece of meadow in Newhouses. The said Henry resigns the said piece of meadow in favour of the said John, and warrants him of the third part of the said sum at the hands of Elizabeth Quytquhen, widow of the late John Mongall. Done at Linlithqw, in the chamber of Dominus Thomas Johnsoun, notary, the 10 of August 1531. Witnesses, Robert Callenter of Bancloycht, Thomas Caveris, burgess of Linlithqw, and Robert Suord.
 22. Discharge by Robert Knollis, son of the late Sir William Knollis,¹ preceptor of Torfychyn, in favour of James Hammyltoun of Kincavill, sheriff of Linlithqw, of the purchase price of the said Robert's liferent of the lands of Bawhormy,² lying within the sheriffdom of Linlithqw, as also of all his other lands, tofts, crofts, buildings or tenements within or without the burgh of Linlithqw. Done at Linlithqw, in the said James Hammyltoun's house,³ the 16 of August 1531. Witnesses, Allan Hammyltoun in Wilyemcraggis, William Alexander, Patrick Masoun, Donald Gibsoun, John Loverans, and Matthew Hammyltoun.
 23. Liferent Sasine, given *propriis manibus*, by James Hammyltoun of Kincavill to his wife Janet Creichtoun, Lady of Blackness, in his lands of Maner-stoun, lying in the barony of Abircorne and sheriffdom of Linlithqw. Done on the said lands, the 15 of September 1531. Witnesses, William Sandelandis of Hillhouss, Matthew Hammyltoun, and Dominus Alexander Bege, chaplain.

24. Discharge by John Hammyltoun in Parklie of a cautionary obligation in his favour entered into by William Beir and John Wawane, burgesses of Linlithqw, to pay twenty merks Scots to William Hammyltoun in Pardowin on behalf of the said John Hammyltoun. Done at Linlithqw, in the lodging of John Hammyltoun, burgess of Linlithqw, the 17 of September 1531. Witnesses, Allan Hammyltoun, Robert Johnsoun, and Alexander Frebarne.
 25. Notarial Protest by Elizabeth Patersoun, wife of John Wawane, burgess of Linlithqw, against a pretended sasine in a tenement⁴ in Linlithqw, lying on the north side of the High Street between the lands of John Goff on the west and the lands of Thomas Sammell on the east, recently given at the hands of ——— bailie of Linlithqw to John Goff. Done on the ground of the said tenement by the breaking of a dish, the 25 of September 1531. Witnesses, William Foulis, Robert Scott, Robert Johnsoun, Robert Toddrick, John Lyntoun, and John Baxster, sergeant.
 26. Judicial Ratification by Janet Creichtoun, wife of James Hammyltoun of Kincavill, of a resignation by her in favour of William Hammyltoun in Pardowin for his infeftment in two oxgangs of the lands of Kincavill then occupied by him. Done at Linlithqw, in the house of the late Henry Creichtoun,⁵ in presence of John Hammyltoun, bailie of Linlithqw, at a

court held and sworn by the said bailie, the 2 of November 1531. Witnesses, Matthew Hammyltoun, William Sandelandis of Hilhouss, Thomas Coupar, and John Baxster, sergeant.

27. Notarial Protest by the said Janet Creichtoun that her right of conjunct fee in the said two oxgangs of land shall not be prejudiced, when her husband or his heirs regain possession thereof. Place, date and witnesses as in No. 26.

28. Discharge by William Davisoun in Volkmyltoun near Linlithqw, in name and on behalf of William Davisoun, son of the late Robert Davisoun and Katherine Quhit his wife, to George Salmont, of the sum of seventeen merks five shillings Scots, being the said William Davisoun's bairn's part of gear. Place, date and witnesses as in No. 45.
48. Instrument narrating that Dominus Henry Louk, chaplain and curate of the Parish Church of Linlithqw, was present in the said church, at the time of high mass, dressed in his sacerdotal vestments, to celebrate the sacred mysteries in presence of Dominus John Pollart, chaplain, and other priests of the said church. The curate had on a previous Sunday, viz., on the 5 of May, denounced and excommunicated John Crumme, under letters of the Official of Lothian, at the instance of William Wethirspowne and William Lauder, burgesses of Edinburgh. The suit was led for failure to pay an annualrent of 13s. 4d. annually due to the said altar from the said tenement. Similar proceedings were taken at the second head court held on 20 January 1516/7, by William Wethirspowne, James Robisoun and Thomas Hammyltoun, bailies; the said chaplain taking earth and stone of the tenement in presence of James Saltoun, sergeant, Robert Toddrick, John Gibbisoun, Robert Foster and John Ademsoun; and at the third head court held on the 17 of April 1517, by Thomas Hammyltoun and James Robisoun, bailies, the said chaplain taking earth and stone of the tenement in presence of John Balderstoun, sergeant, Robert Toddrick, John Fresall, Robert Foster and William Duncane; and also at the fourth head court held on the 5 of October 1517, by Thomas Hammyltoun and James Robisoun, bailies, the said chaplain taking earth and stone of the tenement. Thereupon the said chaplain sought ward and decree in his favour. After examination of the court rolls, in which it was stated that parties had been heard, and the tenants called at all the courts to see if any would pay, but that none had appeared, thereupon the court asked the said chaplain if he were willing to affirm his allegation by a proper pledge. This the chaplain placed in the hands of James Saltoun, sergeant. Then the court was

cleared, the bailies deliberated, and John Clerk, deemster, pronounced the judgment of the court, adjudicating the tenement to belong heritably to the said altar in respect of the non-payment of the said annualrent, saving always the time for relaxation according to use and wont.

Note on the Kae Family.—The first member of the family, mentioned as an owner of property in Linlithgow, is Patrick Ka, grandfather of the James Ka in Nos. 330 and 331. Patrick's son James married Marion Couper, heiress of John Couper, thereby acquiring the extensive burghal patrimony of the Couper family. Their son James by his marriage with Christian Ross, succeeded to the office of mair-of-fee in Linlithgowshire and the lands of Corsflattis (now part of Clarendon), held by his father-in-law. His grandson James Kae held the office of Principal Porter of His Majesty's Palaces in Scotland in the beginning of the 17th century. Consequently the family took up their residence in the Canongate. There Alexander Kae of Corsflattis and Bailie of Canongate, the last male representative of the main line, died in 1690. He left two daughters, Barbara, married to Mr. Walter Stewart of Stewarthall, and Anna, married to Captain (afterwards Major) Matthew Stewart, son of Matthew Stewart of Newton.

Acknowledgement by Robert Hammyltoun or Blaiss, husband of Begis Howburne, that he is indebted to Robert More, son and heir of the late William More, burgess of Linlithqw, in the sum of ninety-three pounds Scots, being his bairns part of gear. Done in the house of the said Robert Hammyltoun, the 9 of March 1541/2. Witnesses, Mr. Robert Hammyltoun, Allan Hammyltoun, John Hammyltoun *alias* Lang John, Arthur Hammyltoun, and Dominus William Cornwale, chaplain.
334. Obligation by William Craufurd, laird of Hanyng, to grant a new infeftment in favour of David Craufurd of Parkhall and Marjory Craufurd, his wife, in lands, tofts and crofts (not specified), which the said David and his wife now hold by alienation from the late Archibald Craufurd, father of the said William, as soon as they resign the said lands into his hands; under penalty of two hundred pounds Scots, one third to be paid to the said David and his wife, one third to the Metropolitan Church of St. Andrews, and one third to the King. Decree of Lining, following on a briefe of the Royal Chancery, pronounced in a court held in the town-house of Linlithqw by Robert Scott and John Ross, two of the bailies of the burgh, and an assise of 12 burgesses, anent a dispute between Katherine Dennestoun, wife of David Hakkat, and John Thomsoun, younger, and Marion Spenss, his wife, concerning the boundaries of the said Katherine's tenement¹ and yard, lying on the south side of the High Street, between the lands of James Hammyltoun of Manerstoun on the west, and the lands of the late Luke Lichtman on the fore part and of the said John Thomsoun on the back part on the east. It is found that the thorn hedge was given up by the late John Spenss to the late Andrew Wod, procurator for the late David Wod, and therefore belongs to the said Katherine, who is bound to uphold the hedge to prevent her cattle from straying into John Thomsoun's yard. Further that the barn, built on John Thomsoun's yard, with the west door opening on Katherine Dennestoun's yard, shall be allowed to stand,² but that the door must open inwards on the barn, and that John Thomsoun must nail a stout wooden trellis to the door-posts to prevent his free ish and entry to the said Katherine's yard.

Witnesses, Mr. Robert Hammyltoun, rector of Kincardinonele, Dominus Andrew Wod, chaplain, William Dennestoun, Andrew Hammyltoun, captain of the Palace, Robert Cukky *alias* Gardinar.

Protest by Dominus Henry Louk, curate of the Parish Church of Linlithqw, and one of the testamentary executors of the late Marion Craufurd, wife of John Thomsoun, younger, burgess of Linlithqw, before Mr. Andrew Oliphant, vicar of Invertig, and Dean of Christianity of Linlithqw, stating that the will and pretended inventory of goods, written by the hand of Dominus Thomas Johnsoune, notary, and presented to the said Dean by the said John Thomsoun, the other executor, for the purpose of obtaining confirmation, was not just and accurate, and was to the prejudice of the said Dean for his quot, and of the creditors, legatees and others having interest. He craved that confirmation should not be issued without his consent, and unless the inventory was corrected. Done at Linlithqw, in the house of James Nasmyth, the 28 of August 1545. Witnesses, Mr. Andrew Gourlay, William Walter, and William Urquhard.
344. Agreement between John Flemyng, son of Malcolm, Lord Flemyng, procurator for Mr. John Stensoun, rector of Thankertoun, and provost of the college church of Biggar, on the one part, and Mr. Bernard Balye, rector of Lamyngtoun, on the other part, granting to Mr. Bernard power to intromit with the teind sheaves of the rectory of Thankertoun for the current crop and year, and to lead the same to the stackyard of the rectory of Thankertoun, there to await Mr. John's coming. Whereupon Mr. Bernard is obliged to abide by the decree to be pronounced by four arbiters and an oversman, who shall decide what is due by him to Mr. John under the lease of the church of Thankertoun. Alexander Balye of Bakke becomes surety for Mr. Bernard. Done in Biggar, in the back room of Nichol Merschell, burgess of Biggar, the 7 of September 1545. 354. Protest by John Flemyng, natural son of Malcolm, Lord Flemyng, and assignee of his father, in and to the ward and marriage of John Halden of that Ilk, son and heir of the late Patrick Halden of that Ilk, that if the said John Halden marry other than Helen Flemyng, daughter of William Flemyng of Boghall, or Marion Kincaid, daughter of Thomas Kincaid of

759. Tack for 5 years by Mr. Alexander Hammyltoun, vicar of Carriddin, in favour of Nicol Cornwale, younger, laird of Bonhard, of his vicarage of Carriddin except the manselands and yard. Rent £6 Scots, and relief of the Queen's third, if demanded. The tenant is empowered to uptake all and sundry the fruits of the vicarage, such as, "teynd lam, teynd woll, Pasche fines, lynt teynd, gess teynd, gryss, oblatiouns." Done at Linlithqw, in the notary's chamber, the 28 of April 1566. Witnesses, Alexander Cornwale, collier, Archibald Fawup, and Robert Wass, son and heir apparent of James Wass, burgess.

760. Decree Arbitral, referred to in No. 485, finding that Charles Drummond, provost of Linlithqw, has been wrongously ejected by James Borthik from the lands of Williamcraigs, which the said provost possessed with right and kindness made to him by John Young, former possessor thereof. Done at Linlithqw, in the notary's chamber, the 6 of May 1566. Witnesses, Alexander Ka, burgess and treasurer of the burgh, James Gibbisoun, son and heir apparent of John Gibbisoun, younger, burgess, Archibald Fawup, son of the late Robert Fawup of Lochhous, and James (*sic*) Wass, son and heir apparent of James Wass, burgess.
761. Brief of Lining on behalf of James Robisoun, one of the bailies of Linlithqw, purchased in Chancery and directed to the provost and bailies of Linlithqw, to cause 12 of the worthiest burgesses to line the tenement¹ of the said James, lying on the north side of the street, between the lands of James Ka, one of the bailies of Linlithqw, on the east, the lands of the late Robert Jame on the west, and the Peel on the north. George Townis, burgh officer, summoned the 12 liners under precept issued by Charles Drummond, provost. The provost with John Forrest and James Ka, bailies of Linlithqw, compeared on the ground on 17 May 1566, along with the liners, who were sworn, and the brief and precept read. The tailrig of the tenement was by consent of the said James Robisoun excepted from the lining, because it was granted in wadset to the late Robert Jame, and now liferented by Elizabeth Ross, his widow, now wife of Alexander Ka, and held in fee by her son Archibald Jame. The lining was adjourned till the 23 of May, when the liners found that there was "na thing to eik nor to tak away, nor na merches to be sett, for all merches standis justlie efter the auld merches, auld and divisit eftir the first situation of the said burgh."

Scots, and obligation by the said John Foulis, who was then under curatory, to grant a tack, as soon as he was furth of curatory. Done at Linlithqw, in the notary's chamber, the 15 of June 1566. Done at Linlithqw, in the house of John Hammyltoun in Mauchlinhole, in presence of the notary and Charles Drummond, provost of Linlithqw, the 22 of July 1566. Offer by Gilbert Ra in the Inche to pay to James Callendar in the Halles of Airth his whole fermes of the lands of Inche resting unpaid for crop of the year 1565, on the said James delivering to him a discharge, conform to an act made by Mr. James Grahame, commissar depute of Striviling, and written and subscribed by John Wallace, his court clerk, at Striviling, the 9 of July 1566. Which offer the said James refused. Done in the said Gilbert's house, the 1 of August 1566. Done at Linlithqw, in the house of John Forrest, the 7 of October 1566. Witnesses, John Forrest, bailie of Linlithqw, John Adamsoun and John Thomsoun, bakers and burgesses.
774. Discharge by James Borthik and his wife in favour of Charles Drummond, provost of Linlithqw, for 40 merks, in payment for their tack, all as in No. 773. Place, date and witnesses as in No. 773.
775. Licence by Janet Creichtoun, widow of Henry Drummond of Recartoun, to the bairns of the late William Ingliss, burgess of Linlithqw, and John

Ingliss in Recartoun, her tenant, and Robert Young, burgess of Linlithqw, their grandfathers, to pursue James Andersoun in Recartoun for wrongously ejecting them from the 2½ merk lands of Recartoun which the late William Ingliss held. Also obligation by the said Janet to enter the said bairns in the said lands, should they obtain decree against the said James Andersoun. Done at Linlithqw, in the said Janet's house, the 6 of January 1566/7. Done at Linlithqw, in the said David Raitt's house, the 12 of February 1566/7. Witnesses, Adam Watt and John Wethirspoune, servants of the said James.
781. Assignment by Philip Duncane, occupier of a quarter of the lands and Mains of Abircorne, lying in the sheriffdom of Linlithqw, in favour of James Hammyltoun of Bormy, of the "Peithfutte quhikis lyis be est the houses and yard of the myln callit the Neythermyln of Abircorne," for the said Philip's lifetime, and so long as the said James or his heirs occupy the said myln. And the said James binds himself to maintain and defend the said Philip and his wife in all just actions whatsoever in

time coming against any person or persons before any judges, spiritual or temporal. Done at Linlithqw, in the dwelling-house of William Estoun, burgess, the 30 of March 1567.
